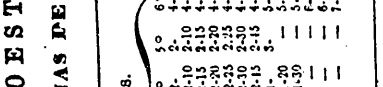

IMPORTANT FROM THE URUGUAY.

MARCH OF THE ENTRE-RIAN ARMY.

GENERAL URQUIZA AT MANDISOBOL.

On the morning of Wednesday, 10th inst., General Urquiza true to his engagement had all the Entre-Rian vanguard in readiness at Calá to take the field. The gaucho cavaliers looked in first rate trim, and mustered about 10,000 men, each with two horses. They were formed into their various battalions, Paraná, Nogoyá, La Paz, Victoria, Gualaguay, Concordia, Uruguay, &c.: the array of Generals and officers was also imposing. Around the veteran hero of Caseros and a hundred fights, were grouped Generals Virasoro and Lopez Jordan, Colonel Nadal, Victoria, Telmo, Lopez, Plaza Montero, Perez, and several other officers of repute.

The camp-fires were put out, the tents were struck, and at noon the whole army was on march, the regiments following in military order in the direction of Concordia, N. E. General Urquiza with a numerous staff accompanied his warriors, whom he has so often led to victory, and the vanguard of the grand army galloped over the prairies of Entre Rios towards the frontier of Corrientes, full of confidence and enthusiasm.

The want of arms and uniforms detracted considerably from the martial look of the columns, which would otherwise constitute a respectable army. It seems the National Government intends sending 3,000 carbines, 3,000 lances, and the necessary clothing to Concordia, for their outfit, after which they will be able to commence at once active operations. General Urquiza takes some Armstrong guns and other artillery from Calá, and it is likely his first step will be to cross the Correntine frontier in direction for San Roque and seek an incorporation with the army of Caseros.

By latest advices the Entre-Rian army had reached the locality known as Puntas de Mandisobol, and there established their temporary head-quarters. The place is about 12 leagues above Concordia, on the left bank of the Uruguay. It is distant 80 leagues from Santo Tomé and San Borja, where a new Paraguayan invasion is announced, and 55 from San Roque, the headquarters of the Corrientine forces.

Calculating the distance from Calá at 40 leagues, we see that they marched about 10 leagues per day, which is not a very rapid movement seeing that each trooper had two horses, but there will be no motive for forced marches until the men are properly armed and equipped.

An infantry battalion is being formed at Concepcion under Col. Gonzalez, which will be ready in a few days to join their brethren.

Meantime we have to congratulate General Urquiza and the Republic on the march of the vanguard, which exceeds by double the number actually called for, and has been got together within 23 days of the Paraguayan invasion.

LATEST FROM SANTO TOME.

INVASION OF 12,000 PARAGUAYANS.

Letters from Uruguayana 11th and Concepcion 15th mention that a force of 3,000 Paraguayans entered Santo Tomé on the 11th, another body of 9,000 taking the route of Paso de Los Hornos. Col. Paiva with 500 men resisted before them.

WHERE IS SANTO TOME?

The news yesterday from the Uruguay respecting an invasion of Paraguayans at Santo Tomé, everybody takes his neighbor's word that place is?

It is in Lat. 28.36, Long. 55; on the left bank of the upper Uruguay, exactly opposite San Borja (El Grande), and the chief town of the Aguapey division. It is in a right line with Bel-ista, and 70 leagues due east of the town. The invading force must have come from Fort Ytapiá, Paraguay, on the upper Paraná, which is distant about 38 leagues.

The country near San Borja is rich and populous, but the Brazilians have only 2,800 men on the spot, who can make no resistance to the invaders, and the latter will be able to make a great raid before Generals Caldwell and Canavarro gather up their forces.

NATIONAL POST-OFFICE RETURNS FOR 1864.

(7th annual report).
 [Continued].

But on looking over the Treasury returns for 1864 we find the actual deficit only \$66,334, the total outlay for the year being only \$119,869, including the expenses of the Department and subsidies to mail-coaches and steam-boats.

The post-office receipts form no part of the national revenue: tons of newspapers are carried gratis, and the tariff for letters is a uniform low rate for home or foreign correspondence: 5 cents per quarter oz. Certified letters pay 25 cents extra.

Mr. Posadas has established in the Correo a workshop for printing postage stamps with patent presses and perforating machines brought from England. The convenience of perforating the stamps is now universally admitted, though not yet practised in Brazil, Chile or any other part of South America, except Buenos Ayres.

The sale of postage-stamps has greatly increased, yielding last year \$13,221 more than in 1863.

In our limited space we can only give a meagre outline of the present Post-office returns which fill over 100 pages. The frontispiece is a handsome view of the post-office of Corrientes, which will give an idea of the improvement in all the provincial establishments. The new Postal Chart is beautifully executed, shewing all the post-roads, railways, steam-lines, frontiers, &c. of the whole Republic. Mr. Posadas is indebted to special thanks from the newspapers and the public for the new office he has opened to receive letters and distribute newspapers on packet-day, in spite of the very limited accommodation of the premises at his disposal.

The letter from General San Martin to Sor Pacheco is *apropos*, shewing the outrages committed by Justices of Peace and local military authorities, throughout the rural districts, on Maestros de Postas; and we fully agree with Mr. Posadas that it would be much better for the *Mensagerias* and *Inviducables* companies to provide their own horses and run lighter coaches on the Northern and Western routes, after the intended manner of Mr. Carpenter's mail-coach service in summer and winter across the Andes.

We also concur with the Director's request for a Secretary to be provided in the Budget of the ensuing year, which will add only a small item to the expenses of the Department and supply an urgent necessity. Mr. Posadas is post-master general of the Republic, and also chief of the Buenos Ayrean Correo: it is too much to ask him also to act as manager of the Dead-letter office, and carry on the correspondence with England respecting Registered letters, besides a thousand other matters daily calling for his attention. During 8 years he has never absented himself (for vacation or through illness) a single day, and in these countries such application to business is rarely witnessed. It is also expedient that Sor. Posadas should have a "right hand man" able to assist him in his arduous and varied labors, and supply his place when the necessity occur.

In concluding these remarks we have again to congratulate the country on the magnificent progress shewn by the returns for last year; for we maintain that no better criterion can be obtained of the prosperity, greatness, and instruction of a people than the post-office statistics. We have also to congratulate the public on possessing so inde fatigable and talented a man as D. Gervasio Posadas at the head of this Department, and only regret that all the other branches of public service

cannot boast of such directors. When we find the postal-services of the whole Republic so admirably managed with a trifling revenue of \$60,000 we see what might be done under good management with the enormous rural and municipal incomes for camp-police, road-making, street pavement, water-supply, custom-house despatch, &c.

The "Anuario de Correos" winds up with a happy allusion to Mr. Cox's discovery of the Antuco pass in the Southern Cordillera which promises easy and constant postal communication between Buenos Ayres and Chile.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The National Guards are waiting for their uniforms. All the seamstresses in town are busy, and within the last fortnight the demand for sewing machines has so wonderfully increased, that they have gone up in price.

The British barque, Thomas Daniel, left Table Bay on the 3d of February for Buenos Ayres with 50 Angora rams on board.

Mr. Fusoni's picture-shop is crowded daily. General Paunero's full-length portrait is on exhibition. The likeness is very striking, but there is a great want of proportion in the picture.

We hear that one of our leading city merchants, with an extensive French connection, is at present in Corrientes, acting the important role of army contractor.

Mr. Wilcken's lottery promises soon to come off. The sale of tickets in our office is much greater than what we anticipated. Even our friends the sheep-farmers are speculating in this splendid chance. The property is admirably located in one of our fashionable suburbs. As we have taken a couple of tickets ourself, there is a remote probability of our yet becoming landed proprietors in the charming locality of San Isidro.

Mr. Riestra has obtained permission from the Provincial Senate to leave for England. Now this suggests a nice question. Suppose, for instance, that anything happened to Governor Saara, which Heaven forbid; but, we say, suppose he died during Sr. Riestra's absence in England, the legal Governor of Buenos Ayres would be in London, for although the Senate may depose some member to act in the Senate for Sr. Riestra, we apprehend the attributes of Vice-Governor still cling to Sr. Riestra, and he can be only divested of them by his formal resignation. Sr. Saavedra is a strong, healthy man, and as good a life as there is in B. Ayres; but no man can answer for to-morrow.

The Montevidean correspondent of the "Brazil and River Plate Mail," states that Mr. Lettsom was the only foreign representative who acted with becoming dignity and decision during the siege of Montevideo. The correspondence in question is well and ably written, and highly interesting.

Our New York correspondent writes:—"With the continued success of our armies, all are looking for peace, which is thought to be near at hand, in which event a further decline in gold is expected, and further depression, both in manufactured goods, and the raw material. It is predicted in well informed circles, that many of our Mills will stop for a season. Some, because they are abundantly able to stop and await the tide of events, and others of smaller calibre, being too weak to obtain their supplies; all of which, should it occur just previous to the incoming clip of wool, will have a depressing influence on the opening price, and it may be some weeks, if not months, before we will be able to chronicle an active wool market, which however is sure to come, as the American people cannot be held still for any length of time.

Señor Gorostiaga's speech in the Chambers on the passing of the bill authorizing the Bank to open a credit for one million patacons with the Government is an able exposition of the state of the bank: we had intended to publish it, but owing to the arrival of the mails from Europe, found it impossible.

The people of San Nicolas are very indignant with the Juez de Paz for treating their editor, but sooner than that the Judge could boast of having stopped the newspapers, all the townspeople turned public writers. In every shop in the town the clerks were busy

writing leading articles, local events, &c., so that probably the most interesting paper in the province after the 'Standard' was the 'Amigo del Pueblo.'

We hear that it is the intention of the Government to take Sr. Sauze from Rosario and establish him in Corrientes, as there is a general desire that a regular overland mail should be established between Buenos Ayres and the Army. News from Bombay is now received in London in eight hours, and yet it takes us eight days to hear from Bella Vista.

Top boxes of splendid French clothes have been seized in the Custom-house as belonging to Paraguay.

The dispute going on in the newspapers about the Brazilian fleet is really very amusing. The 'Tribuna' speaks out the plain, true, unvarnished public opinion, the other papers stand up for the slow gunboats, and censure the 'Tribuna,' meanwhile there is not a word from the squadron, although it is confidently stated that Gomeñoro was to have fought on the 10th.

The little French steamer 'Lili' is about being put on the Colonia route: she will do a good business, and will prove a great convenience.

We are glad to be able to announce the date and locality appointed for the forthcoming Bazaar in aid of the Building Fund of the British Hospital. The delay in settling the time and place has been caused hitherto by the extreme difficulty of procuring suitable rooms; the Colon Saloons are not to be had, the Coliseo will not be ready for another month or two, the Theatres are too large and costly; in short, but for the opportune generosity of the members of the Plata Club, the ladies of the Bazaar Committee would have found themselves in a most unpleasant dilemma: as it is, we understand that owing to the supineness of their Secretary, or his unwillingness to go room-begging, they had to do all the work themselves. The difficulties, however, having been now removed, let us hope that the results of the Bazaar may come up to the most sanguine hopes of the ladies who have devoted so much time and trouble, to say nothing of the expense, towards so charitable an object. For further particulars we refer our readers to the advertisement in another column.

The Concert at the German Church on Monday night we learn went off, on the whole, satisfactorily; however, as it was strictly a private entertainment, we are not in a position to comment upon the performance. Apropos of music, we understand that Messrs. Werner and Schraam will probably give their second Concert on Monday next, when a new and most enticing feature will be introduced into their programme.

A splendid collection of fancy inkstands has been received by Mr. Loedel, in the new English book-store opposite the Bolsa.

IMPORTANT FROM THE FORTIN.

GREAT WEDDING PARTY.

FIRING OF CRACKERS, &c.

My last communication having been acceptable, and many of your subscribers having been well pleased, I am induced to send you the full, true, and particular account of one of the most memorable wedding parties that ever took place in this or any other town in the camps of Buenos Ayres. Weddings are, generally speaking, slow affairs in this place; in fact I so seldom hear of a ball or dinner on a matrimonial occasion, that I seize the present as a sort of social oasis in this sheep-farming desert. Saturday morning, the 6th May, was ushered in by the genial beams of Aurora striking on the unpretending thatched roof of Mr. Egan's sheep 'puesto.' To the passer-by there was nothing to attract attention, as the outside of the house bore no signs of the impending event, but within, the proprietor was up and stirring, for on that day he was what is technically termed, "to be spiced." A little farther on, and beneath the hospitable roof of her father, the young bride was preparing for her departure for the Fortin. At half-past eight o'clock, precisely, the cavalcade proceeded from the estancia, heading for the

little town; the road was good, the undulating camp on either side, chequered with rich flocks, lent a charm to the scene on that delightful May morning.

At 9 sharp, bride and bridegroom and friends entered in one happy procession the brisk little village of the Fortin. The bells were ringing, and the peaceful inhabitants of the little town imagined that more troops were assembling, or that the Justice of the Peace with Mr. Craig, was about to give another 'funcion.' There was a rush to the plaza; shopkeepers, shoemakers, and 'peons,' made for the Juzgado, but they soon discovered their error, for just as they left the Policia, the nuptial party was entering the church, the Rev. Mr. Leahy officiating. The marriage ceremony is the same in the Fortin as in Westmeath, and therefore I need not describe it to you; the young blushing bride, dressed in white, was guarded by her wealthy and matronly Madrino, Mrs. Michael Murray, whilst the bashful bridegroom, carefully attended by his best man, Mr. John Duffy, went through the imposing ceremony with a coolness or *sang froid* which would have done credit to the most fashionable swell in your city.

The ceremony over, the happy couple, attended by their friends, proceeded to the Fonda, where a magnificent 'dejeuner á la fourchette' was provided by the wealthy and hospitable groomsman, Mr. Duffy; all the delicacies of the season, the richest wines that the Fortin could afford, the most costly sweetmeats that the confectioner could get up, were on that table. I peeped into the room, and had an invitation to go in, but as I was determined to send you an account of the affair, I preferred to keep my seat in the adjoining room, sipping my coffee. Full justice was done to the eatables, and when the cloth was removed, Mr. Michael Murray, a wealthy Estanciero, rose to propose the health of the newly-married couple; he dilated upon the grand prospects of a newly-married couple in this country, and expressed a hope that all the single parties present and absent would be married before the winter was over. [Great cheers.]

Mr. Duffy then came forward, and called for full bumpers; he stated that it afforded him the most indescribable pleasure to be present at this happy wedding party, and hoped that henceforward the Fortin would not be so sterile in these happy occasions. The marked success of his fellow-countrymen in this partido was entirely due to the aid, comfort, and assistance, which sheep-farmers received from their better halves; he proposed, therefore, not the health of the sheep-farmers, but the health of the sheep-farmers' wives. [Terrific cheering and hitting the table.]

Several other toasts and speeches were given (and a few songs) by some of the other young gentlemen present, and at 4 o'clock p.m., the young couple dashed to their happy home, amidst the most unfeared noise and bustle, caused by the discharge of several hundred dollars worth of crackers and rockets. The party then separated, every one wishing the newly-married couple the greatest success and happiness through life.

AMERICAN REJOICINGS.

The news from the United States last Monday caused unusual rejoicings on the part of our American friends, several of whom transgressed the police edict by hoisting the Stars and Stripes. Numbers of people, including native gentlemen, went to congratulate the Hon. Mr. Kirke, and festive salutes and celebrations were the order of the day. About noon the inhabitants were aroused by a discharge of cannon, which caused much excitement on the Mole, crowds running in expectation of news from Paraguay. But it was the American vessel, Kate Sergeant, which fired a salute of 21 guns, and ran up the time-honored flag of the Stars and Stripes.

Argentines seemed as much rejoiced as Americans at the extinction of the great rebellion, and burst forth into almost extravagant ebullitions of joy

at the triumph of the Great Republic. The 'Tribuna,' which has always evinced great admiration for the United States and abhorrence of slavery [except in Brazil], came out yesterday with quite a Yankee heading, in large capitals and sensation paragraphs. To the honor of Buenos Ayres, the press unanimously expressed its satisfaction at the termination of this disastrous war, which threatened to ruin the finest country in the world.

The Colon opera-house was yesterday decked out in full gala, the Stars and Stripes indicating the cause of such demonstration. A grand performance was to come off last night in express compliment to the American residents and their diplomatic representatives in Buenos Ayres.

IRELAND.

Dublin, April 9.

(From our Special Correspondent).

Surrounded by the cheering influences of ever-hopeful Spring, I am well inclined to paint all that concerns the Island of Saints in *colour de rose*. But although Nature gives evidence of reviving power and renewed effort, I cannot evade the fact that Ireland, at the present moment, is neither politically nor practically, in a satisfactory or prosperous condition. Distress prevails in the West; discontent is making itself felt in the South; while in Ulster the bitter feuds of party and of creed are only kept in bounds by armed men. Political agitation, based on sectarian principles, distracts the public mind. The recent marchings and counter-marchings of Fenians in the South, Orangemen in the North cause mistrust in men's minds as to the future. The political condition of Ireland at the present time, is, to say the least, most adverse to the promotion of her prosperity or the welfare of her people. In the South of Ireland in particular the people are becoming alienated from the Catholic clergy, who have used every possible means to stay the spread of the new combination—Fenianism. Since '93 disaffection to the Crown of England was never so prevalent; and although the adherents of "law and order" use every means of disguising the true state of affairs, every-day reveals some new fact illustrating the depth and the extent of illegal combination. But still I can perceive, here and there, some hopeful signs of progress, in spite of the countervailing influences referred to. To begin with the agricultural classes, I believe that at no time within the last twenty years have the farmers of Ireland who possess capital been better off than at present. These men during the past year engaged largely in the cultivation of flax, received enhanced prices for their cattle, sheep and dairy produce; and they have added to the £14,000 which was already placed to their credit in the banks of the country. The small farmers without capital, however, has actually suffered from the causes contributing to the success of his wealthier neighbor, for, obliged to borrow to carry out the work of the farm, to run up a bill with the "gombeen" man and huxter for his daily wants, he finds all the fruits of his toil and a favorable season falling into the pockets of others. Such a hopeless struggle for bare existence drives the needy small farmer to adopt the only alternative open to him—emigration. It has set in again; and from north and south, east and west the railway and the steamboat daily carry full freights of the bone and sinew of the land. The States still absorb the majority of those self-expatriated poor ones; but agents from British possessions are outbidding each other for the material which alone constitutes the real wealth of a nation—strong hands and willing hearts. What I here refer to may suggest to you the desirability of devising means to draw a portion of this stream of living wealth to your shores. The experiment is at least worthy of trial.

Just now in Dublin we are all full of hopeful anticipation relative to the opening of our "International Exhibition." The event comes off on the 3rd May, when Albert Edward Prince of Wales will open the spacious and beautiful courts of our winter palace to the gaze of admiring thousands. I will not here enter upon details, but reserve "the descriptive" for future communications.

LATEST TELEGRAMS.

FRANCE

Paris, April 18.

Bourse very flat in consequence of rumours of fresh disturbances at Madrid. Renten closed 671.45c.

ITALY

Turin, April 18.

The Committee of the Senate has rejected the proposal to abolish capital punishment, but has amended the penal code by reducing to nine the number of crimes punishable by death.

THE SCHLESWIG-HOLSTEIN QUESTION.

Vienna, April 18.

The "Oesterreichische Zeitung" of to-day says:—On the proposition of England, negotiations have been commenced on the question of the Duchies between all the signatories of the London protocol of 1852. Russia and Sweden have proposed that all the powers should settle in common the question of succession. This was declined by Austria, who has declared her intention to maintain her rights, conjointly with Prussia, to the sovereignty of the Duchies, and that she would energetically oppose Prussia should the latter act independently of her.

SWITZERLAND.

Berne, April 18.

The Federal Council has informed the Zollverein that Switzerland is willing, provisionally, to apply the Franco-Swiss commercial treaty to Germany from the 1st July next, provided that the Zollverein would apply to Switzerland the provisions of the treaty of commerce lately concluded between the Zollverein and France.

THE POPE AND VICTOR EMMANUEL.

Rome, April 16.

The Pope is stated to have addressed a letter to King Victor Emmanuel proposing that his Majesty should appoint viscounts to the vacant dioceses in the Italian provinces which formerly constituted the kingdom of Piedmont and declaring that his Holiness would reserve to himself the full right of appointing bishops to the dioceses of former pontifical provinces. As regards bishoprics in Naples, Tuscany, Parma, and Modena, his Holiness is ready to enter into negotiations; and in order to come to an arrangement, King Victor Emmanuel will send a diplomatist on a special mission to Rome to discuss the question.

CONTRABAND OF WAR TO THE RIVER PLATE

The following has been received from the Foreign-office, in reply to inquiries from various mercantile firms as to the scope of the 'Gazette' notification of the 14th inst., prohibiting the shipment of munitions of war to the 'River Plate' during the existing dispute between Montevideo and Paraguay, and Brazil, which, if left unexplained, would have appeared to affect the ports of Buenos Ayres, Rosario &c., although the Argentine Republic is in a state of perfect peace and entirely neutral. These ports are quite free for all descriptions of merchandise, and it must be understood that although the Brazilian squadron will be entitled to overhaul any vessels destined thither, the Brazilian Government will be liable for all costs and damages that may be sustained by bona fide owners from wrongful detention. With the fall of Montevideo, however, there is reason to hope that every difficulty in that region will have been virtually terminated:—

Foreign-office, March 21.

Gentlemen,

I am directed by Earl Russell to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 18th inst., requesting to be informed whether the notification in the 'Gazette' of the 14th inst., 'is intended to apply to any port or-ports of the Argentine Republic, that Government not being one of the belligerent States.'

I am directed by his Lordship to state to you in reply that the warning in the 'Gazette' is to all British vessels carrying to ports or places in the rivers Plate, Parana, Uruguay and Paraguay munitions or articles of war of any description whatever, to or for the use of any of the belligerent States.

If you send vessels laden with such articles to or for those of a State which is not belligerent, your vessels will not be liable to condemnation; but your vessels so laden will, having regard to the position of the ports of the Argentine Republic, be liable out of the ter-

ritorial waters of that Republic to be detained by cruisers of the belligerents, and taken into port, in order that their bona fide neutral destination may be ascertained. To send munitions of war while these hostilities are pending into these rivers is obviously to subject the vessels carrying them to considerable risk, as the fact of their neutral destination may become a matter for the decision of a Prize Court.

LAUNCH OF THE PADDLE STEAMER "ARNO."

At a quarter to two o'clock on Thursday afternoon, Mess. Caird & Co. launched from their west-end works a splendid paddlewheel steamer for the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company to trade on the River Plate between Rio Janeiro, Monte Video, and Buenos Ayres. Her dimensions are: Length over all 295 feet; Length between the perpendiculars 255 feet; Breadth moulded 30 feet and sponged 2 feet on each side making Breadth extreme 34 feet; Depth of hold to main deck 17 feet; Depth moulded 17 feet 9 in; Tonnage 1,134 tons B.M. The "Arno" is a three-decked ship having spar, main and lower decks with accommodation for 112 first-class 20 second and 20 third class passengers. She has on the main-deck a first class saloon 76 feet long. Her engines are oscillating; 250 horse power nominal furnished with Caird's expansion gear, surface condensers, superheaters, and all modern improvements.

The ship was named by Miss McArthur daughter of William McArthur Esq., ship-owner; and the launch was highly successful and was witnessed by a large concourse of gratified spectators. This is the fourth large vessel which this eminent firm have already launched from their West end works.

SOUTH AMERICAN BEEF.

Mr. J. EWART asked the Secretary of the State for the Home Department whether any order had been issued for the indiscriminate seizure of South American beef when exposed for sale to the public either in London or Liverpool.

Sir G. GREY said that no order whatever had been issued on that subject. It was not till he saw the notice of his hon. friend's question that he knew of any seizure having been made within the metropolitan police district; but by a report of the police proceedings at the Mansion-house a few days ago he found that the Sanitary Inspector under the Commissioners of Sewers had seized a quantity of meat that was unfit for human food. It was said to be South American jerked beef, but from the evidence given it would not appear to have been so. At least, it was condemned on inspection, not because it was South American jerked beef, but because it was not fit for human food. There was a question now pending whether, on the application of magistrates, South American jerked beef should not be used in gaols.

THE FEDERALS IN THE TAGUS.

The "Journal do Commercio" of Lisbon publishes the subjoined details of the recent incident on the occasion of the attempt made by the Niagara and Sacramento to leave that port:—"The Stonewall entered the port about eleven o'clock on the morning of the 19th, and shortly after received orders to leave within 24 hours. During the evening the two Federal ships also entered the port, and a report was current that acts of insubordination had taken place on board the Niagara, and that four men had been put in irons. The principal anxiety of the authorities of Lisbon was to avoid a conflict like that which took place in the harbour of Bahia; a detachment of artillery was therefore sent to the Fort Belem, and to the Place Sun-Juliao-du-Baira, and guns were also mounted on the Bagia Tower. All the ships of war, and especially the Mindello and Sagres, had also orders to exercise a strict surveillance. The Federal vessels had cast anchor to the east of the Belem Tower. At eleven on the following morning the Stonewall quitted the Tagus, and at four the Niagara and Sacramento weighed anchor and proceeded in the direction of the bar. This movement was perceived from the Belem Tower, and the delay of 24 hours which should elapse between the departure of each of the hos-

tile vessels not having expired, the commander of the fort ordered the artillerymen to their guns. When the Niagara, which was in advance, came opposite to the battery a 12-pounder gun was fired at her, and as the frigate continued her way six other shots were fired. At the seventh the Niagara, wore round to the east and anchored before the Abydos rock. The Sacramento followed and took up a position by the side of the Niagara. Of the seven shots fired, three touched the hull of the latter vessel without hurting any one. An officer was sent from the harbour keeper's steamer to the fort to know why the Niagara had been fired on, when the commander replied that he had acted according to orders. The instructions given to the harbour inspector and to the commander of the fort appear to have been different. The fact of the movement of the Federal vessels towards the harbour five hours only after the departure of the Stonewall is, however, unexplained. An officer of the Niagara is said to have proceeded to the residence of the American Minister during the morning, and it was shortly after his return on board that the two ships weighed anchor and made for the entrance to the port."

COLON THEATRE.

A WORD TO THE LADIES.

The somewhat unknown, but nevertheless beautiful opera of 'Maria do Rohan,' was produced to an audience small but enthusiastic, on Friday evening, and Celestino distinguished himself as an interpreter of the tragic phase. Madame Mollo, as the heroine, also sang well and looked her best. Lelmi also sang with that increased care which lately he has exercised in all his impersonations. But it is a pity he knows nothing of the art of costume. Witness the extraordinary exhibition in 'Martha,' where he presents a mixture of the 'middle ages' with the Georgian period, garnished with pantomimic facings, and all crowned with a Fez cap, and this 'olla podrida' is presumed to furnish forth the every day wardrobe of a young English farmer of 1700 to 1750.

Our operano is altogether very enjoyable on the whole: the reform in the band, and the agreeable punctuality now enforced in beginning, are not small matters, and although Mr. Pestalardo is very tardy in bringing forth his promised novelties, an evening at the Colon is generally a treat to men. We say to men, because we have long known that there is not in this theatre the slightest arrangement made for the comfort of the ladies. And we call upon the managers to consider this as a question of policy for them, for what can they expect from the ruder sex, if their fair sisters cannot attend the opera with pleasure; and we are sure we shall be supported in demanding better accommodation for ladies, if there is gallantry and common sense left in men. For us 'male creatures' the theatre is a small paradise: we smoke our cigar in the vestibule, chattering on business, politics, &c. (even though the vestibule is dark and damp), until the curtain rises. During the *entre actes*, cigar again, chat, visits, refreshment, air, exercise, and back again to our musical banquet. We have a large room to lounge in, and a 'cote' to sup in if we wish. Theatres would be advanced with more fair faces, were a little more consideration extended to the fair sex by managers; and we trust to see this amendment made at the Colon, and then a visit to the opera will become to ladies a genuine pleasure in place of what it now is, 'a purgatory.'

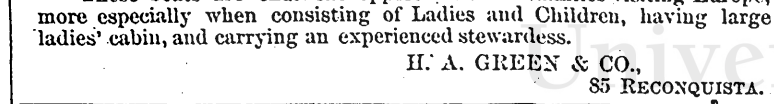
