THE AMERICAN MEETING.

At three o'clock precisely the meet-
ing was called to order by the chair-
man, the Hon. Mr. Kirk. The legation
rooms were crowded. We noticed the
following gentlemen present:

Hon. Robt. C. Kirk, H. Rowan Hel-
per, Esq., Rev. William Goodfellow,
Messrs. Gardner B. Perry, Wm. Wheel-

James Walker, Wm. T. Livingston,
A. H. Minturn, A. G. Goodall, Addison

Brown, Chas. S. Bowers, Henry D.
Eastcott, A. Savory, Geo. F. Brown,
M. T. Dooley, James Carmen, Paul

O'Brien, Prof. Daly, Dr. Cornwall,
E. T. Mulhall, Standard, and several
others whose names we did not learn:
many were prevented from attending
owing to the inconvenience of the hour.

Mr. Perry then opened the business
of the meeting by reading the following
resolutions drawn up by the com-
mittee.

Gentlemen,
In the discharge of the melancholy
duty which was intrusted to us, at a
preliminary meeting of American citi-
zens, when we were constituted a com-
mittee with specific functions, we beg
leave to submit for your approval, the
following resolutions:—

Resolved: 1st.—That as loyal and
ever faithful citizens of the United
States of America, now resident in Bu-
enos Ayres, we have been severely
shocked and at the same time filled with
indignation and sorrow, on the receipt
here on Saturday last, the 27th inst., of
intelligence of the dastardly and fiend-
ish murder of the late eminently distin-
guished President of our country,
Abraham Lincoln, in whom we have
always recognised inflexible honesty
and pure patriotism, and to whom we
now assign in our memories a place
among the very ablest and best states-
men of America.

Resolved: 2nd.—That to the grief
stricken family of the illustrious de-
ceased, we tender our most unfeigned
and profound condolence.

Resolved: 3rd.—That in celebration
of the obsequies of our late beloved
President, Abraham Lincoln, whom we
would proclaim, and consecrate to pos-
terity, as second Father of his country,
the Rev. Wm. Goodfellow, the Ameri-
can clergyman resident in this city, be
invited to deliver at an early day, an
appropriate discourse commemorative
of the distinguished virtues of the de-
ceased.

Resolved: 4th.—That as a measure
emblematic of our sincere distress, at
this most deplorable occurrence we will
wear a badge of black crape around
the left arm, for the period of thirty
days.

Resolved: 5th.—That we gratefully
accept as a compliment to our country
and to ourselves, the voluntary and
considerate action of the authorities
here on Sunday, the 28th inst., in caus-
ing all the National and Provincial
flags to be hoisted at half mast, as a
token of grief at the untimely loss of
the honored and lamented subject of
these resolutions, and that with our
whole hearts, we thank Almighty God,

and the unparalleled trials and pre-
vocations of the most gigantic rebel-
lion ever organized among the rash and
magnified sons of man, our chief lead-
ers and dependants were uniformly
feted, with so much moderation and jus-
tice, as to secure the enthusiastic sym-
pathies and support of such enlight-
ened and progressive statesmen, as
those whom we have the honor to know,
in the persons of President Mitre and
his Cabinet, now at the head of the
Argentine Republic.

Resolved: 6th.—That Governor Sa-
avedra and the Legislature of the pro-
vince of Buenos Ayres, are equally en-
titled to our thanks, for their compli-
mentary resolution of last evening, de-
claring that the next new town or city
which shall be organized within the
province, shall be designated Lincoln.

Resolved: 7th.—That in a corres-
ponding vein of thankfulness and gra-
titude, we make our acknowledgment
to the Press of Buenos Ayres, for ap-
pearing in mourning on Sunday last and
for their numerous and well expres-
sed eulogiums of our martyred Presi-
dent, and also to the whole body of the
Argentine Congress for their sympa-
thetic resolutions of yesterday, among
which was one to signify their sad and
painful recognition of the solemn occa-
sion, by wearing the badge of mourn-
ing during the space of three days,
and also to the Argentine people whose
sympathies with us have been so un-
reservedly shown during the long and
severe trials of our country, and par-
ticularly in this last and saddest event.

Resolved: 8th.—That to our fellow
citizens in the United States, we renew
our pledge of continued and unflin-
ing fidelity to the Union, and to the
Federal Government, as constitutionally
organised in Washington.

Resolved: 9th.—That four copies of
these resolutions be presented to our
Minister resident in this city, the Hon.
Robert C. Kirk, with the request, that
he will transmit one of them to the be-
loved family of our late President,
one to the Department of State in
Washington, one to the Government of
the Argentine Republic, and the other
to the Government of the province of
Buenos Ayres.

Also Resolved: That in the attempt-
ed assassination of William Henry
Seward, Secretary of State, part of the
same dastardly conspiracy, which re-
sulted in the death of Abraham Lin-
coln, we recognise as the fitting close
of a rebellion, begun in robbery and
perjury, and ending in cowardly and
cold-blooded murder, and we extend
to him our warmest sympathies, and
offer at the same time our best hope
and wishes for his speedy recovery.

The Chairman then put the resolu-
tions to the meeting, whereupon Mr.
Goodall moved that they be put to the
meeting seriatim, which was duly se-
conded and carried.

All the resolutions were then read
and passed *nem. con.*, with the excep-
tion of the 4th, which provoked some re-
marks from Mr. Goodall, Mr. Folmar,
and other gentlemen, who seemed to
consider that the crape to be worn on
the arm should be for 15 not 30 days.
Mr. Charles Zimmermann opposed
this, and after some slight discussion
the resolution was carried in its origi-
nal form.

Rev. Mr. Goodfellow proposed that
during the 30 days' mourning, no
American wearing the crape should
attend at any public receptions or
place of amusement: as this motion
was not seconded, it was withdrawn.

Mr. Folmar moved that on the occa-
sion of Mr. Goodfellow's panegyric,
the American Church be draped in
mourning, the expense to be defrayed
by subscription; this was duly secon-
ded, put and carried.

Mr. Jacobs moved that the proceed-
ings of this meeting be published in
every paper in Buenos Ayres and the
two principal New York newspapers;
whereupon Mr. Folmar suggested, as
an amendment, that the discourse of
Mr. Goodfellow, together with the
minutes of this meeting, be published
in pamphlet form. The amended pro-
position having been duly seconded,
was put and carried.

Mr. Goodall moved that the thanks
of the meeting be given to the com-
mittee, and that they be discharged.

Mr. Walker seconded this motion,
which was put and carried.
A motion to adjourn was then moved,
seconded, and carried.

The Chairman having decided the
business of the meeting terminated,
Mr. Livingston moved Mr. Edward
Zimmermann to the chair, and that the
minutes of the meeting be given to Mr.
Kirk for his conduct in the chair.

The motion was seconded, put, and
carried, and the meeting dissolved.
Previous to the departure of the
gentlemen present, Mr. Kirk gave an
interesting biographical sketch of Mr.
Johnson, the present President of the
United States, and eloquently refuted
the paltry slanders circulated respect-
ing him.

Mr. Edward Zimmerman produced a
telegram, by which it appeared that
Mr. Johnson was installed as President
of the United States on the 15th of
April, 1865.

THE DEATH OF LINCOLN.

The following correspondence has
been exchanged between the Governor
of Buenos Ayres and the American
resident minister in reference to the
sad calamity which has befallen the
United States.

"Buenos Ayres, May 28th, 1865.
"To the Hon. Robert C. Kirk, Minister
of the U. States."

"Sir,
"The murder of the illustrious re-
publican Abraham Lincoln, President
of the United States, has caused a feel-
ing of the most profound regret in Bu-
enos Ayres. The Governor of this Pro-
vince, in common with his countrymen
laments this atrocious crime and begs
to offer your Excellency his most heart-
felt sympathy for a misfortune which
has converted into universal mourning
the joyous congratulations of the New
World at the news of the recent victo-
ries which augured the speedy triumph
of Union and Liberty in the Great Re-
public which your Excellency so worth-
ily represents.

"Accept, therefore, the public ex-
pression of regret of this Province, and
that of my own sympathy and respect
for the distinguished citizen whom
your country has just lost.

"To H. E. D. Mariano Saavedra, Gov-
ernor of the Province of B. Ayres.
Sir,

"With sentiments of the deepest
regret I have the honor to acknowledge
your kind letter of the 28th inst. I am
certain that my Government will learn
with the liveliest satisfaction the sin-
cere sympathy expressed by your coun-
trymen for the great loss we have sus-
tained in the death of President Lin-
coln. He nobly defended the existence
of our Republic, and every true Republi-
can will render homage to his mem-
ory. A great man has fallen, but thank
God he has vindicated the principles
of Self-government.

"Accept, my dear Sir, my sincere
thanks for your expressions of friend-
ship and sympathy.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

A friend from the Magdalena in-
forms us that the native people in his
neighbourhood have a most incorrect
idea of the present war; in fact few of
them know what the fight is at all
about; they for the most part believe
that Lopez wants to become President
of the Argentine Republic, being tired
of Paraguay. There has been a regular
stampede amongst peons, horse-tamers
and horse-stealers; these have all gone
to parts unknown. The camps are
good, the sheep in the best condition,
but the flocks have so increased that
there is no room for them; sheep are
offered for sale by every estanciero,
but there are no buyers, except those
who want to purchase on the same
terms as the Justice of San Nicolas,
which won't be accepted down there.
There have been no sales of lands of
late. A native estanciero was offered
eight hundred thousand dollars for a
square league of prime land, but de-
clined to sell at that price.

Last night the English bazaar was
opened, at the saloons of the Club del
Plata; the attendance was fashionable
and crowded; to-night it will again
commence at 7 o'clock. We recom-
mend all strangers to pay it a visit.

The Rev. Mr. Goodfellow, American
Pastor, has kindly informed us that
the funeral service commemoration of

Mr. Lincoln will take place at the Ame-
rican Church on Sunday June 11th,
and on next Sunday, as was supposed.

The Brazilian steamer Octaviano
left yesterday evening for Montevideo,
where he will remain a few days, and
then return to this city.

The Brazilian ram Tacuari, and gun-
boat Recife, left yesterday for up the
river, and the Magé entered port.

The English barque Joseph Taylor
has brought a good supply of arms,
which comes most opportunely.

The new corps of Sappers and Min-
ers, under Major Alejandro Diaz and
Captain Maneilla, already counts 15
officers and 14 men.

Several army surgeons left yester-
day in the Espigador for head-quarters.
News from Cordoba, confirms the
treaty with the Ranqueles Indians,
and states that 3,800 men were re-
viewed on the 21st, out of which num-
ber 500 were chosen for the war con-
tingent.

Advices from Patagones report the
Indians quiet.

The President's escort has been
strengthened by three hundred men
from the Provincial Government of
Buenos Ayres.

The Senate has confirmed the law
fixing the army at 25,000 men, and
thrown out the Deputies amendment
against conscription.

The Governor has called upon the
Legislature to take up theCodigo
Rural and discuss it; thisCodigo is
open to many objections and suscep-
tible of many changes. We hope to
see our colleagues take the question
up. As many of our subscribers are
anxious to peruse this codigo, and
through the press make suggestions,
we hope the talented codifier will kindly
favor us with a few extra copies.

The Buenos Ayres Northern Railway
Company has despatched through the
Custom-house ten splendid railway
waggons. The business of this railway
is steadily increasing, but the railway
to do a great traffic must be extended
to the Capilla del Senor.

A splendid Irish thoroughbred mare,
the finest that ever came to this coun-
try, arrived last week in the Liverpool
steamer Parana. We have not heard
her name, but suppose it is 'Kathleen
Marounen.' She has been imported
by one of our leading English mer-
chants. We have no doubt she will
greatly improve the breed, and prove
a valuable acquisition to the country.

The Boca railway is progressing rap-
idly, as we learn from a gentleman
who resides near the works. This loco-
motive (the finest in the country) is
constantly running, and the 'em-
ployees' very obliging in taking people
up and down. The southern part of
the town is improving greatly. What
with the railway, and the brick and
tile works of Messrs. Russell, Shaw,
and Co., the Yellow-house district is
completely changing its appearance.

The road leading down to the Boca,
owing to the immense traffic and the
great rain, is now a swamp.

Part of the second engine for the
Boca line was landed yesterday, and
several of the carriages are ready to
put on the road. We hope to see it
soon inaugurated. It will run from the
Custom-house to the Boca and the
Tres Esquinas in Barracas: the en-
gines are now boring for the bridge
nearly in front of Llavallol's barraca.

The Brazilian army has now nearly
all crossed the Uruguay; they crossed
in front of Paysandú, and will at once
march to the Corrientes frontier.

The total force of Paraguay in Cor-
rientes seems to be about 35,000 men;
the Paraguayan squadron consists only
of ten armed steamers.

It is the general belief amongst those
who have been in Corrientes that Gen-
eral Paunero has not re-embarked,
but held his ground and fortified the
town. Between Argentines and Bra-
zilians the total of Paunero's force
must at least number 6,000 men, and
as the allies were well supplied with
artillery, if Paunero had any time al-
lowed him, there can be no doubt he
will hold it against all the force the
Paraguayans can bring to bear against
him.

Colonel Arredondo has arrived from
Rosario in rather impaired health; his
regiment he left under the command
of Captain Segovia.

Admiral Maturate has at last left
for the scene of war; he took with him
as his secretary Dr. Alcorte. The Ad-

miral proceeds to Corrientes in his
flag-ship the 'Guardia Nacional'.

The Brazilian steamer 'Boca' it ap-
pears, did not go to Uruguay as we
thought. She arrived at Montevideo
from Montevideo, some are asking
why she does not attempt to go to look
for the Paraguayan squadron.

The rumour which we published on
Wednesday respecting Sr. Soto is, we
are happy to hear, contradicted. Sr.
Soto when last seen was on board the
British gunboat 'Dotoral.'

We advise all our friends to be partic-
ular in carrying their Consular pro-
tections about them. On Tuesday, at
three o'clock in the afternoon, a mili-
tary commission passing down Calle
San Martin stopped two of our leading
'barraqueros' one a Scotchman, and
the other a German. They were about
to be taken off to the 'cuartel,' when
luckily they produced their 'protec-
tions.' Two very fashionably-dressed
foreigners, who were gazing at the
'Pueblo' supplement, posted up at the
corner of the Plaza, were next laid
hold of. They had no papers, and we
fear had to sleep in the barracks that
night, if not by this time on their way
up to the enchanting locality where the
fight is waging.

SKETCHES FROM THE SEAT OF WAR

NO. VII. LAS TRES BOCAS.

Last week we left our readers at Es-
quina whither the Paraguayan army
under Robles was hastening at forced
marches. Since then the dashing feat
of Gen. Paunero in recoving Corrientes
has changed the seat of war and as the
Brazilian fleet is said to have gone up
to blockade the Tres Bocas public at-
tention is centered on that point.

The Tres Bocas or Three Mouths is
at the confluence of the rivers Para-
guay and Paraná in Lat. 27 10, and
Long. 61. It is about five leagues
north-east of Corrientes, and marks
the boundary between Paraguay and
the Argentine Republic. From this
point the grand water course of the
Paraná, which we have ascended some
300 leagues from its mouth near Bu-
nos Ayres; branches off north and east-
ward till lost in the wilds and sierras
of Brazil. The united waters form se-
veral islands of which the principal is
called Atajo, and the scenery here is
the finest on the river; the entrance of
the rivers being guarded by the Para-
guayan forts, Tres Bocas and Cerrito.

Going eastward up the Paraná a
couple of leagues we come to Paso de
la Patria, where there is a ferry be-
tween Paraguay and Corrientes, and
here the invading army entered the
province, in the vicinity of two little
towns called Itaty and San Cosme, the
latter of which boasts 400 inhabitants.
Here also the telegraph wires from
Corrientes to Asuncion cross the
Paraná, and most of the cattle carried
off by the invaders was here transpor-
ted into Paraguay.

The importance of the Tres Bocas to
the allies is two-fold. The Brazilian
fleet will not only blockade the river
Paraguay, and prevent reinforcements
coming from Humaytá by that river to
the invading army, but will also have
absolute mastery of the Upper Para-
ná, and be able to cut off all com-
munication [including the telegraph
wires] both above and below Paso de
la Patria, while at the same time de-
priving the invading army of the as-
sistance of its fleet and of all base of
operations on either of the rivers.

The Tres Bocas was formerly a fa-
vorite resort of the citizens of Cor-
rientes, for holiday excursions, but it
is now destined to play a more impor-
tant part as the key-position of all the
naval operations of the present cam-
paign. Perhaps Lopez will hazard an
engagement with the Brazilian fleet
for the possession of this place, in which
event the chances are decidedly in
favor of the latter if their vessels and
artillery be properly handled.

THE PARAGUAYANS IN MISIONES.

LATEST FROM SANTA TOME.

Paso de los Libres, May 27.

The news of the Paraguayan inva-
sion in Aguary arrived here on the
17th at 8 p.m., and the Juzgado was
immediately filled with a crowd of 400
natives and foreigners anxious to learn
the particulars. They then assembled
in the Plaza, sang the National Hymn,
and gave enthusiastic cheers for Pros.
Mitre and Governor Lagralla, the

serenade not concluding till 4 o'clock
in the morning.

The Paraguayans swept the country
as they came along, the inhabitants
abandoning their houses and flocks
and hiding themselves in the woods.
Numbers of people have arrived here
from Santa Tomé with stories of bar-
barities committed by the invaders,
who entered that town in Indian fas-
hion, uttering loud cries to alarm the
poor people.

Colonels Payba and Reguera got
together 2000 men to oppose the enemy
and gave him much trouble, finally
obliging him to evacuate Santo Tomé,
and retire 8 leagues northward: our
forces were successful in every combat,
and have only had one man killed in
an affray at Arroyo Soldado. They
are now encamped in a fine position
two leagues south of Santo Tomé, and
none of the men desert, as all are en-
thusiastic to support the nation and
Governor Lagralla. It is said that the
friars in Corrientes have taken part
with the invaders and pronounced for
Lopez.

COLONEL PAYBA'S DESPATCH.
Head-quarters on march, Ita-Cua,
Misiones, May 17th.

To the Governor of Corrientes, Don
Mannuel J. Lagralla.

I have the honor to advise your Ex-
cellency that learning this morning at
sun-rise of the advance of the enemy, I
started forward with all my division at
a trot to reconnoitre his force, and my
scouts reported a column of 800 (moun-
ted) infantry at Ita-Cua, about half a
league from Santo Tome: a fusilade
soon began on both sides and lasted
till sunset when I ordered my men to
retreat, being then only a mile from the
enemy. I am not in a position to
engage the enemy for want of arms:
if I had received the hundred and fifty
muskets despatched by General Hornos
from Concordia for my men, the day
might have brought glory to our divi-
sion, but the authorities at Paso los
Libres has detained them for some
reason unknown. Our loss up to the
present (3 p.m.) is very trifling, but
my men are destitute of everything,
and I beg you will send me as soon as
possible what money and supplies you
can.

would have done honor to a garrison.
The eclipse is an old story now. I have
not heard of more results from it than
what happened to two 'puesteros,'
who were taking observations at it
through a bottle (of gin) and their
flocks got mixed. The camps are
in good order yet, but the strong
frosts are telling on them. Trusting
that the 'Standard' will long flourish,

LETTERS FROM URQUIZA'S HEAD-QUARTERS.

Yuqueri, May 24th.

We have had horrible weather, which
impeded our march, but several new
divisions joined us on the route, arriv-
ing in bands of 15 and 30, each man
with two horses. Yesterday a small
number of our men got clothing, 1000
uniforms having arrived per Uruguay
on the 21st: these consist of a blue
cap with white cockade and scarlet
trimmings, a red shirt and black 'chir-
ripa.' The Caraballo, Taborda and
Ercuñ regiments with Gen. Urquiza's
escort on receiving the uniforms defiled
before the camp in first-rate order:
Caraballo's corps also got muskets.
To-day arrived Dr. Victorica, General
Viraoro and Col. Nadal with a regi-

ment of volunteers, as well as several officers accompanying D. Tomas Pellos...

We have news from Corrientes to the 18th, and learn that the two Brazilian fleets under Gomensoro and Barroso joined at Rincon de Soto...

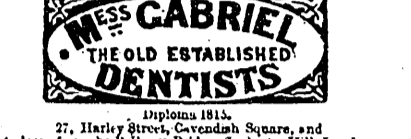
