THE SECOND NIGHT OF THE BAZAAR.

On Friday night the saloons of the Plata Club were much more densely thronged than the previous night, the number of visitors being almost double, and including several Argentines, Germans, and French. The stalls were very animated, the buyers being for the most part among the wealthiest members of our society. We noticed Mr. Thornton and lady, Mr. Lambi and lady, Mr. Santa Maria and lady, Mr. Fox and daughter, Mr. Black and family, Mr. Boyd and family, Mr. Bell and lady, Mr. Maschwitz and lady, Rev. Mr. Forde, Rev. Mr. Smith, Messrs. McClymont, Whyte, Green, Thompou, Anderson, Hayeroft, Lumb, Rumball, &c. The Bazaar was most crowded from 10 o'clock to midnight, and money was so freely spent that one lady took 28,000\$ me at her stall. The Mlles. Baudrix, daughters to the Chilean Consul, assisted at Mrs. Darbyshire's stall, and here as well as all through the Bazaar there was a perfect medley of English, French, German and Spanish spoken by the purchasers and their fair victimizers. So completely were the gentlemen led to spend their extra dollars, that many of them after emptying their pockets clean out actually signed I. O. U.'s for further amounts payable next day, and in every case the ladies had the politeness to accept such personal security. The raffles, fines, post-office and wheel-of-fortune produced even larger returns than the night before; and the business done in flowers was something considerable, small bouquets fetching 100\$, and even a bunch of forget-me-nots attaining a purely artificial value. The political economist would be surprised to see the depreciated paper-currency at such a premium, and hardly credit the present tightness of the money-market, but whatever the taking rate, of the lady-sellers, of bills at sight, no change was given and this saved a world of trouble. A spirit of politeness pervading all transactions, there were neither 'bulls' nor 'bears' although the ladies were evidently playing for a rise in funds, which caused a corresponding fall with the gentlemen. About 12 o'clock when the gentlemen's purses were nearly cleaned out dancing was proposed, and waltzes and polkas were kept up for an hour with great animation. The refreshment-room was much patronised, being under the direction of Mr. Charles Lumb, assisted by three married and two single ladies. As much as \$50 was in some cases paid for a cup of chocolate or glass of sherry, and the receipts of this department were most respectable. A grand raffle of a cake took place, in which 100 gentlemen took tickets, and Mr. Stock was the fortunate winner. The bazaar broke up at 1 a.m. Last night was to be the conclusion, and the attendance would probably exceed any of the previous nights, as there was to be a grand auction of all articles remaining unsold, and a snappable contrivance of catching prizes in one's month at so much a turn, besides numerous other happy contrivances of polite extortion too numerous to mention.

There was some idea of giving a day-sale on Monday, from 11 to 3, to accommodate those who cannot attend at night, and postponing the auction bill till then, which might be an improvement. We understand the nett proceeds of the Bazaar are expected to amount to nearly half-a-million dollars (£3,500) a princely sum for our small community, and as flattering to the Lady-patronesses as honorable to our public and beneficial to the Hospital.

THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

LATEST FROM PARAGUAY.

MOVEMENTS OF THE BELLIGERENTS.

The steamer 'Pampico' arrived yesterday bringing the wounded and the prisoners, the most of whom are boys. General Pannero is at Empedrado; we suppose he is fortifying his position there with the Argentine forces at his command. A Brazilian gunboat has remained to protect him. Derqui fled in the 'Ranger' to Paraguay.

The Brazilian fleet has gone up to the Tres Bocas, and taken up their position there as blockading squadron. Urquiza is supposed to be making forced marches for the Rincon de Soto to join Lagrãna and Caceres.

The Brazilian army at Paysandú has not yet moved, but it was said will shortly march towards Concordia.

General Flores has called out four regiments, and enlisting is the order of the day in the Banda Oriental.

Sandes' cavalry and the prime regiment 6th of the line are at Rosario and awaiting orders to march.

The Buenos Ayres National Guards are all quartered in barracks, and will, it is presumed, leave about the 12th inst.

The Cordovan Contingent is at present marching to Rosario, and throughout the other provinces the greatest activity prevails.

General Pannero captured in Corrientes a quantity of lances, guns, and coal. He marched by land to Empedrado. The Paraguayans, it appears, did not molest him.

SKETCHES OF THE SEAT OF WAR.

NO. VIII. CURUZU-CUATIA.

Latest accounts from Entre-Rios report that General Urquiza with his army of Entre-Rian cavalry arrived at Curuzú-Cuatia on the 26th. Although this is physically impossible, since he was at Gualeguaycito near Concordia on the 25th, and the distance is over 40 leagues, yet it is highly probable that he marched in that direction and has arrived there by this date.

Curuzú-Cuatia which signifies in the Guarani tongue 'a dead horse,' is a small village with some 200 inhabitants on the high-road from the ports of Uruguay to the central departments of Corrientes, standing in Lat. 29 50 and Long. 60 25. It is in a right line between Esquina on the Parana and Paso de los Libres on the Uruguay, being 40 leagues from the former river, and 20 from the latter. On the east is the river Mirimá a tributary of the Uruguay, and on the west the Laguna Sarandí, a lake of considerable extent. About ten leagues southward, near the village of Sauge on the Entre-Rian frontier, is the battle-field of Pago Largo where General Urquiza gained a bloody victory in 1841. Curuzú-Cuatia is about 70 leagues S. E. from Corrientes city, and the centre of a district abounding in cattle-farms.

The projected Eastern Argentine Railway, the contract of which was given two years ago to Mr. Finlayson for an eminent English firm, was to start from Concordia and pass through Curuzú-Cuatia to Mercedes. We fear, however, that this most important project will be either knocked on the head or indefinitely delayed.

This village is one of the oldest Jesuit missions in the country, and has been singularly unfortunate, being wrecked in turn by all the hostile factions of the civil wars. It was ruined during the campaigns of Paz and Lavalle, and seems still so animated with a revolutionary spirit that so late as 1862 it raised the standard of rebellion against Governor Pampin the predecessor of Sor Lagrãna. The place recovered somewhat during the last three years of peace, being favorably situated for trade with the Uruguay, and the emporium of import trade for the south of the province.

If Urquiza incorporate with the Correntine militias and march on Mercedes he will be able to interpose 10,000 cavalry between the Paraguayan invading columns of the Parana and Uruguay, and prevent their junction, without any danger to himself as the enemy being mostly infantry will be unable to cope with him in the rapidity of his movements.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

On next Wednesday, weather permitting, the renowned Argentine ship-chandler, Mr. John Marshall, of Barracas, will launch a new steamboat designed for the river trade. We understand this will be the fifth steamer Mr. Marshall launched from his shipyard on the Riachuelo.

Our Scotch friends in Chascomus have recently subscribed together a flock of two thousand sheep for the support of their church in that town. This speaks highly for the Scotch farmers in that neighbourhood, and we hope to see it adopted elsewhere.

The amount of specie which the Matú bank is said to hold at present in its vaults is two millions and a half patacons.

The Governor of Rioja has sent word to President Mitre that he will march at the head of his men to fight the Paraguayans. A very good move would be to call on all the Governors in the provinces to do the same: it would then be in every respect a national war. President Mitre in command, the 14 Governors with their contingents, the army of the line and artillery also, it would be one of the most memorable campaigns in the annals of history.

General Taboada has declined to receive any salary so long as the war lasts; he has sent to a native gentleman in this city as a present a magnificent quilt, it is beautifully worked and valued at five hundred patacons.

The Provincial Government has offered to the National Government the hospitals of the city, which have been accepted, but we understand that they are at present crowded.

The weather is again broken, roads bad, streets shocking, and rain imminent. Still farmers assure us that this is glorious weather; the winter has set in favorably, and the sheep-farmers are doing so well, that if Paraguay gives any more trouble they will be able to raise a Foreign Legion at home to sweep Lopez and all the Paraguayans into the Gran Chaco.

An English gentleman, who arrived yesterday in the Era, states that the Brazilian army has not crossed over to Entre Rios, as was stated here, and asserted by all the papers. The Brazilians are all at Paysandú still.

Atar Gull, in the French Theatre, has drawn a crowded house. The French people seem to admire Capt. Mansilla's composition. We congratulate the captain on his success amongst our French friends.

The allied army when it is all ready and in full march will have a printing press, type, &c., the same as the French army in Italy. This will be a great improvement; two of our printers are in the army, so that a morning paper is not altogether preposterous.

The Era arrived yesterday from the river with a number of passengers. The description we get of Gualeguaychú is really afflicting, not a man to be seen in the streets, all women and children.

Mr. William Leslie of the Matú Bank subscribed five hundred dollars, and Mr. Thomas Armstrong one thousand dollars towards the fund for the widow of Colonel Sagari.

There are two vacancies at present in Congress, both are for Buenos Ayres, but owing to the war there will be no elections.

The Tevere was stopped last night, some said by order of Government, others by the agents; there was a rumor that she was wanted to take up troops, but subsequently we learned that she will sail without fail to-day for Montevideo.

We understand that the Brazilian corvette Magé has come into the inner roads for the purpose of getting her boilers thoroughly repaired before she goes up the river. Our friend, Mr. Stephens, of No. 117 Paseo de Julio, has undertaken the repairs. She will be ready in a few days.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

GENERAL FLORES NEARLY GONE.

BRAZILIAN HORSES.

"Fare thee well and if for ever"—Gov. Flores is nearly gone, I hear he is now only waiting to bid Sr. Octaviano good bye. "It may be for years and it may be for ever"—but the Brazilian Minister is even more tedious than the sleeping Kathleen; he has not yet made his appearance, he may come to-morrow, please hurry him up, as Bustamante is very impatient, and the ardor of the soldiers is such that the sooner the Oriental legion marches the better—delays are dangerous.

The news here from Paysandú is that the Brazilian army is crossing into Entre Rios; during their stay at the saladero S. Francisco the Brazilians behaved in the most orderly manner; they paid for everything they bought, which is more than can be said of even some people in Montevideo. The army did no damage either to private or public property. Some scores of horses which they bought at high prices, as a matter of course they lost, but this is all for the good of trade. A friend of mine who has an estancia in the neighbourhood informs me that his 'puesteros' mind their sheep on fine fat horses which have escaped from the Brazilian camp—in fact, from all I hear, the camps about Paysandú are full of Brazilian 'agenos'—the very post-boy that goes for the 'Standard' has a crack charger which cost some unfortunate Brazilian officer, who is now wending on foot through the long grass in Entre Rios, some two or three ounces.

The last forces that arrived from Brazil are composed of Pianhy policemen, and Bahia Zouaves; they are queer-looking fellows; I leave you to imagine the figures these fellows cut in the streets; the policemen realize my worst ideas of a demoralized 'star,' and as for the Zouaves, I verily believe if Napoleon was to see them he would at once declare war against Brazil.

The Government is about to order a funeral service in honor of the murdered President Lincoln; the flags on Sunday will be half-mast and guns fired all day every half hour. All Americans feel complimented at the conduct of Governor Flores.

Bustamante's 'quid pro quo' comes off at the theatre to-night. I have not seen it, but learn that some scene during the Flores' revolution tickled his fancy so much that he dramatised it. I suppose it will come up to 'Box and Cox.'

Such is the anxiety of the people here to learn news, that the papers every evening are obliged to publish 'bulletins,' stating that there is nothing new. These are bought up at once by the impatient public.

There is a sort of Hell-fire club at present in this city, the President is the ubiquitous Thomas Villalba—a few of his friends attend at every meeting—a roaring fire is kindled—the members all stand round—and then into the fire they pitch bond after bond. To think that the Oriental Government bonds, beautifully lithographed, carefully signed and numbered, should meet such a fate is lamentable: yesterday 4,500 bonds were consumed, each bond 100 pats.

Government has at last named the regiments to march: the 24th April Florida, 2nd brigade of light [very light] artillery, 1st volunteers of Fideles, and 1st volunteers literary brigade Bustamante. These men are all ordered to march; the men are ready, but one of the officers has a lawsuit on hand, and it is feared that there will be a *ne erant*.

THE TOWN GOING AHEAD.

It may interest you to know that we 'down south' celebrated, with some pomp and enthusiasm, the forty-fifth anniversary of the first foundation of this glorious Republic. With the rising of the sun, the church bells rang forth a merry and triumphant peal, and a thundering salute of twenty guns suddenly aroused the sleeping Argentinians to welcome one of their great festive days. They saw in the splendour of the rising sun the first bright dawn of the nascent Republic in 1810. The loud report of the cannon reminded them of the deafening shouts of triumph which welcomed the appearance of the first Junta, and the merry bells were expressive of the joyous feelings of a people called from the lethargy of subjection to the excitement of independence. At 11 a.m. the Juez de Paz, the Municipality, and, in fact, almost the whole of the inhabitants of the Guardia flocked to the church to give thanks to God for His favored blessings to this people. High Mass and the 'Te Deum' were sung by the Cura, Don Francisco Acampugnini, whose powerful but melodious voice, and beautiful intonation, many of your readers will remember hearing little more than a year ago, when he was one of the 'cantors' in the Cathedral of Buenos Ayres. The National flag was hoisted upon the Juzgado, Church, Comandancia, &c.; but in the whole town there was not a single British flag to be found by the unfurling of which we could show our sympathy with our good neighbours in their joyous celebration. In default of that, the best thing that could be done was to raise over the store of Messrs. Wylie and Co. a copy of the 'Standard,' as the truest emblem of British power and intelligence to be found in this part. But though you have stood the adverse winds of criticism, and the opposition of earthly power for some years, I am sorry to say that the breezes of Heaven tore down the 'Standard' in less than half-an-hour. Speaking of the Cura, the Municipality have presented to him, rent free, the magnificent mansion of the late Don Prudencio Rosas. The Scotch clergyman has also received from his congregation a neat and beautiful 'manse'; also a couple of thousand sheep towards the support of his church.

The railway is progressing rapidly, but I fear, owing to the rains and floods, the works will be considerably retarded. We want steam to connect us with the city, for no diligencia has arrived from Buenos Ayres for the last six days, and we are all anxious for the 'Standard.'

Some evenings since a few friends met at the new English College of Mr. Charles Gastrell, where the idea was mooted of forming a literary society of some sort or other, but I fear both numbers, talent, and perseverance will be wanting. Send Captain Mansilla down to us to start the thing.

Latest intelligence—Just arrived the 'Standard' of the 15th, and the fireworks for the 25th, as usual too late.

consider to be the same bed of coal exposed on a point of land near to Island Harbour [lat. 51° 50' S., long. 55° 15' W.]; but there the coal appeared to be of a more slaty structure. I had some of the coal from the latter place burnt, but found that it gave out no flame, and ignited very slowly, which I attribute to its having been, in a great measure, decomposed from exposure to atmospheric and aqueous agencies. The smoke given off during combustion emitted a very sulphurous smell. I forwarded specimens of the coal from both localities to an eminent geologist in England; but, never having received any acknowledgment of their arrival, I fear they did not reach their destination. Being aware of your geological discoveries and investigations of the Brazilian coal fields, I forward you some specimens of the Falkland Island coal for examination, and should feel indebted by your informing me whether you consider it of a quality likely to be of use in a commercial point of view. Should it prove to be a coal suitable for steamers, I need hardly observe that, if an extensive bed of it exists, the advantages possessed by the Falkland Islands as a coaling station for steamers bound to and from the Pacific and our Australian colonies would be very great. There is good anchorage and ample depth of water within 40 yards of its site, and fresh provisions are easily obtained in the neighbourhood at a very low rate.

 Note by Mr. Plant, of Rio.

I have examined the specimens of coal sent me by Mr. Cooke, and find those from 'Rincon de los Terremotos' to be true anthracite, and, although some pieces are very much decomposed, others retain their brilliancy and peculiar conchoidal fracture like the anthracite of Pennsylvania. The specimens taken from the Island Harbour have a slaty structure, and contain sulphuret of iron, which will account for the sulphurous smell emitted when burnt. The fact of Mr. Cooke finding the anthracite coal, 14 to 16 ft. thick, cropping out in the cliff 'Terramotos', and again at Island Harbour, would give about 55 miles for the extent of the bed from E. to W., and lead one to conjecture that the East Falkland Island possessed a bed of anthracite coal traversing it from one side to the other. On showing Mr. Cooke my collection of carboniferous rocks from the valley of the Candiota, in the province of Rio Grande do Sul, he at once recognised the sandstone from that district as being similar to that overlying the coal stratum in the Falkland Islands and a general similitude to the rocks of the East Falkland Island. Certainly the advantages possessed by the Falkland Islands as a coaling station for steamers going round Cape Horn are very great, and if the British Government should decide on making a penal settlement there the mines could be worked by the convicts. The facilities for steamers obtaining supplies of coal when the Rio Grande Mines are opened would be so great that, in all probability, Pacific steamers would supersede sailing vessels in taking out cargo.

They would require much less space for fuel, seeing that they could coal at Cape Verde, at Rio with Brazilian coal, and then at the Falkland Islands, which would take them to Chili, where coal is now being worked.

PARTIDO DE PILAR.

JUDGE'S REPORT.

This partido was some ten years ago one of the principal sheep-farming districts in the north. It was, in the years 1858 and 1859, crowded with Irish, English, and American sheep-farmers; sheep did remarkably well in its beautiful undulating camps, and previous to the year 1859, the sheep and horned cattle in this partido was ahead of the surrounding districts; but the great drought or epidemic of 1859 swept Pilar clean; three-fourths of the sheep and seven-eighths of the cattle perished; the whole country around was covered with dead animals. Since then it has never regained its former position: to-day it is one of our most used-up districts. The cattle estancieros have been all ruined, and the sheep-farmers so impoverished by continual losses, that few, very few, are

Dear Sir.—During a visit to Stanley Harbour, East Falkland Island, in April, 1863, I chanced to become acquainted with that indefatigable teacher of the Gospel, the Rev. C. Bull, and accompanied him on a tour round the island. Having to cross the head of Grantham Sound at low water, we observed an escarpment of rocks (Rincon de los Terremotos), lat. 51° 40' S., long. 59° 00' W., on which was exposed a bed of coal. On examining it, I found the upper part of the cliff or precipice to be composed of red-colored sandstone, below which was a thin layer of bluish clay, separating the coal seam from the overlying sandstone. The bed of coal, which is the lowest rock exposed on the cliff, and appears to incline towards the north, has been laid bare by the action of the sea to the depth of 14 to 16 feet, though it is evident that it extends to a greater depth, as the ground underneath the cliff is composed of the same coal. I managed to break off several specimens some of which immediately crumbled into black powder, while others broke up into bright, shining splinters. On the opposite, or eastern, side of the same island I also observed what I
