EDITOR'S TABLE.

The rainy weather has again set in, yesterday the rain was incessant. As a matter of course all the roads leading to town are in a most shocking state; even the streets in the city are in a most untempting condition...

The Provincial Government has with the most praise-worthy courtesy ordered the 4th July to be a holiday and the public buildings to be illuminated in honor of the day and of the termination of the rebellion...

The Argentine Government we hear has purchased or is about to purchase the gunboat Shell-drake. An agent of the Government is in Montevideo looking after the matter.

The American war steamer Wachusett, which it may be remembered captured the Florida in Bahía, was on the 19th met by an English barque at the Punta Negra, she sent a boat off for provisions, which unfortunately could not be supplied.

The French packet brought out to the River Plate four Sisters of Charity. The Sisters of Charity are now the sole nurses of the wounded in this city.

The latest dates we have from up the river represent Rosario and San Nicolas in an uproar: a French tailor or shopkeeper, we have not heard his name, [but it is not McCarthy] failed and ran away from Rosario, he was pursued by some mounted police and caught some few leagues this side of the city...

We perceive that the Nat. Government has paid 15 pats for a box to hold the triple alliance: Zoizimus was right after all he stated in one of his letters he saw the box, but of course no one believed it.

Yesterday several distinguished American citizens, from the sister city arrived, we suppose to attend the American Banquet on the 4th of July. Our friends got unmercifully drenched in coming on shore.

The Indians have made an incursion in the province of Salta. The Government troops displayed the greatest activity in repulsing the savages, 3 of whom were killed and several wounded. Le Courier de la Plata made its 'debut' yesterday. We salute our French colleague with the most profound bow, and wish him every success.

The Bolsa will be closed on the 4th of July, the committee having declared it a holiday. We suppose the banks will do the same.

Owing to the Paraguayan war, two articles have risen greatly in value coal and lead. The former is in great demand, and we believe our correspondent 'Cardiff' was right when he said that the Brazilian squadron was short of coal, and therefore could not follow the Paraguayan steamers. Lead is being bought up at \$2.4 mpc. per lb. ... 62 1/2 mpc. per arroba. When the Paraguayans attacked the Brazilians Barroso's vessels had only 7 hours' coal on board. We should not be surprised to see coal at £4 per ton before long. The good news respecting the hide market in the United States, which was received about a fortnight ago, had a decided effect on the market here: over 35,000 dry hides were at once bought up for the American market. The last news by the packet has checked the buoyancy.

The saladeros up the rivers are now nearly all closed, the season being over. The killing last month amounted to 38,000 head, and the 'faena'

amounts to 288,000, all the hides are sold with the exception of about 8,000. Allow is the most active article of export we have; every pound that comes to market finds a ready purchaser. at full quotations.

The state of the weather has a depressing influence on all our produce. The piazas are full of mud, the roads bad, and few carts arriving. Wool which was buoyant, is very dull, the news by the packet having frightened exporters. The total arrivals from the camp, &c., during the month are put down at 50,000 ar., and the sales in deposit were nearly 150,000 ar., which makes the sales for the month about 200,000 ar. It will interest our country readers to know that the total receipts since last October of wool up to the present are estimated at very little short of three millions of arrobes, every pound of which has been sold, with the exception of about two hundred thousand ar., which will be all probably shipped before August 1st. We learn from a gentleman who has recently arrived from the other side of the Salado, that in the southerly partidos much wool has yet to be sent to market, but as the roads are bad and peons scarce, it is not probable that much more wool will arrive until shearing time. Sheepskins also are accumulating in the camp; they are in active demand in the plaza, but only a few dozen have arrived. Good skins are worth 22 rs. per lb.

We hear of another new Santa Fe bank on the 'tapis,' name unknown. One of the most interested parties has left for England to see to raise the capital necessary, by pledging the National Bonds. We greatly fear that he will find it a more difficult task than he expects.

The letter from Liverpool, which we publish in another column, is from one of the first houses in that city. We give it to the public as a fair, impartial English view of matters. The letter was not sent to us with a view to publication, but as we believe it will interest our readers, we publish it.

Notwithstanding the abuse which our Montevideo correspondent, 'Zoizimus' received, our subscribers are most anxious to know what has become of him. Our agents in Montevideo, Messrs. Sprunck and Co., No. 93 Zavala, notify us that they have received a splendid assortment of English songs, amongst others that celebrated song which 'Zoizimus' was so anxious to get, 'Go where glory waits thee.' 'Zoizimus,' when last we heard of him, was at Basualdo engaged with Urquiza about starting a morning newspaper.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

THE QUINTEROS MONUMENT.

NO SHOOTING ALLOWED.

THE SORTEO STOPPED.

Yesterday the mails arrived from Montevideo, but our correspondent's letter came late to hand in order to keep our readers 'posted up,' on Oriental matters we glean following the items from the Montevideo papers.

The Italian sculptor Livi has been commissioned to erect a monument to the memory of the Quinteros martyrs, in the cemetery. We fail to agree with the Government in this step, as we believe it will only tend to resuscitate party feeling, which is not at all desirable at present; these monuments should be reserved for a happier time, when peace being firmly restored and war unknown the state of the treasury would admit of the necessary expense.

The repeated attacks on M. Maillefer, the French Consul, in the local papers, have called forth a protest from several Frenchmen, who deprecate strongly against this system of abusing a man. It is to be hoped this will put a stop to the matter.

The Policia department has incurred much odium by refusing to give permission to people to go a shooting. The reason alleged is that the fowlers did much damage by crossing fences, &c.; besides, owing to the Paraguayan war, the report of rifles is peculiarly annoying.

The French war-transport La Marne has arrived from Rio en route for the Pacific.

Some change has taken place in the auxiliary police force, we perceive that Dn. Felipe Arroyo has been named Colonel.

The great question of the day, 'a present is what is called the "Sorteo," which has been ordered and counter ordered until people have begun to regard it as a sort of practical joke. On last Sunday the National Guards, we read, were cited, and when they arrived they were ordered homo again: the difficulty about this sorteo business seems to be that the National Guards refuse to fight out of Oriental territory and it is said that according to the constitution they cannot be made to pass the frontier.

The new bank 'Banco Montevideo' has made a call of 30 per cent., the shares being mostly subscribed for in Montevideo; as the shareholders are all very wealthy people we suppose the call will be promptly paid.

The 'Tribuna' has a very sensible article, entitled 'the necessities of the country,' which calls upon the Government to do something towards helping the country to progress. Our colleague calls for railways, but we are at a loss to see from whence the money will come until the Paraguayan war is terminated.

It is said in Montevideo that a revolution against the Flores Government is hatching in Buenos Ayres, and that the promoters of it meet nightly at Palomeque's house. We have no hesitation in saying that we think our colleague is misinformed; at least nobody in Buenos Ayres has heard anything about it.

A pair of spirited horses ran away with two sailors on Tuesday. The sailors were thrown violently from their saddles but not much hurt. The horses cleared out for the camp.

An individual named Lopez, but we suppose no relation of Solano Lopez, the Paraguayan invader, was rather summarily walked off to the Policia for expressing his conviction that the Brazilians got beaten at the recent naval engagement of the Riachuelo. When taken to the Policia, he was asked for his 'papeleta,' which he stated was at home. Lopez, it appears, is a Spaniard by birth, and he was let out shortly after his nationality was discovered: the charge against him was speaking badly of the Brazilians. Sr. Carrasco, the Confesario, when he heard the charge, at once liberated him. The case caused great attention, and has silenced all political discussions in cafes, except in English or German.

On Saturday [yesterday] the Staff was to have embarked for the Uruguay. During the fortnight 55,910 ar. of wool were sold, at from 3 38 Nat. dol. to 2 30 the bulk of this was purchased by an English house in Buenos Ayres. Dry hides, 52,120 sold at from \$4 80 to \$4 40.

It is rumoured that the Brazilian Government has promoted Sr. Barroso to Vice-admiral. We think he well deserves this promotion.

Government has removed the Oriental Consul-General in Prussia, Mr. James Sturtz, and named in his stead Mr. Andrada. We know nothing of the motives which induced this step, but dislike this constant removal of consuls; if it is continued in, first-rate men will decline the dignity.

Government has ordered the Oriental Brigade to wear a red ribbon in their caps, so that the Oriental soldiers may be known in the allied camp.

The Brazilian schooner Novo Castro, has arrived in a damaged state; she was struck by a heavy sea and greatly injured.

The 'Tribuna' says that the Durazno Railway is already commenced, and the earthworks and surveys have been begun.

A fisherman stabbed a policeman the other day in some squabble; the vigilantes have caught the criminal, and he is now in prison awaiting his trial.

The 'Diario de Noticias' states that on the 15th July an English newspaper, to be called the 'Standard' will be published. The Editor must indeed be destitute of all originality when he cannot even hit on a name for his paper without borrowing one.

IONA.

Thursday night this truly magnificent opera was given to an appreciative audience at Colon Theatre. We need scarcely add that the singing was excellent.

The various episodes of the despairing lover, and the intriguing pagan priest, who endeavoring to deceive, is discovered only perishing in the burning lava of Mount Vesuvius to avoid death in the Roman Amphitheatre. This, with the perfect acting of Madame Briol, excited the public to the highest pitch. We cannot do better than recommend this opera to all our musical-loving friends, for it is, indeed, one of the grandest we have ever seen.

MONTEVIDEAN CORRESPONDENCE.

June 30th.

The San Francisco steam transport arrived yesterday from Rio Janeiro with nearly 1000 troops on board. She takes up these directly to Concordia.

General Nicasio Borjes arrived from Maldonado with about 400 men, and another officer, Tolledo, also brought with him from San José about 200 men, all of which have been embarked too for Colonia. The men were rather moody and some even discontented on arriving at the cuartel provided for them here; but after they had received ten dollars a piece, new uniforms, ponchos, and good rations they brightened up wonderfully, and on their being embarked these stalwart 'maragatos' burst forth in the most enthusiastic applause of all and several, Governor Vidal, Republican independence (a great many of the 'blancos' were clapped under the hatches in defiance as soon as they were placed on board, but this of course is *entre nous*, and so *entre nous* (Republican) and Gen. Flores.

Sr. Bustamante has received 200 hundred dollars money and ten dollars salary, to those who are willing to enlist in his free corps of volunteers; but he has not been able to get together a sufficient number of men. There is much difficulty felt in getting recruits here, and there is a report that the draughting of the National Guard, which, by a strange misinterpretation of orders was to stand 'sine die,' is now to take place. This piece of delectable news has caused unfeigned disgust in certain quarters, where, of course, the young advocates of perfect freedom ignore the right of the Government to force them to a foreign war. There are some malicious whisperers, who draw invidious comparisons between the respective rights and serviceableness of certain 'carpe heroes,' who may be drafted in town, and the hardworking labourer, false called a 'ganche,' who finds himself torn from his family and occupation in the camp to serve in the army. Truly we may say 'comparisons are invidious,' and a disparity of positions can never be accepted for the two classes.

We have improved on Wattel and Stuart Mill.

We have political ethics for town, and a more elastic code of the same for the country. But then we are so habituated to anomalies in this rich country, and as we are told these free Republics require a 'distinct organization' to that of the broken-down kingdoms of old Europe. 'The child,' quoth he, 'is wiser than its sire.'

We have had a most lamentable occurrence in town within the last few days. A Sr. Ventura Rodriguez, one of the General Flores' officers, had a quarrel with another party, a relative, I am told, of Colonel Rivas. I am not acquainted with what intervened between the commencement of the lawsuit, in which Sr. Rodriguez attacked, with most virulent language, the judges and law courts, and the moment of the catastrophe. It appears, however, that both parties had grown gradually more and more exasperated, and meeting one another in a store, both armed with revolvers, as I have been told, Sr. Rodriguez' adversary fell dead from a shot from his revolver. I understand that Sr. Rodriguez has presented himself to the Policia, and is not in arrest.

as if they had been Englishmen, the  
surgeon stopping (Dr. Connolly) up  
several nights to attend to their wounds  
with the utmost solicitude, in which  
task he was cheerfully aided by all on  
board.

Of course in all this our gallant  
countrymen only did their duty as Bri-  
tish seamen but this is the noblest  
title to merit, and the prayers of hun-  
dreds of poor people, English, Argen-  
tine, Oriental and Paraguayan, accom-  
pany Captain Johnson and his crew  
in their return to Old England. We  
glad to learn that the gallant cap-  
tain is about to be promoted, and we  
feel sure that if the wishes of the Do-  
tterel's refugees could be heard the same  
good fortune would await Dr. Con-  
nolly.

Hoping always to see the Union  
Jack so worthily represented among  
us we bid a kind farewell to Captain  
Johnson and the officers and crew of  
the Dotterel who leave Montevideo in  
the Satellite for England.

Notwithstanding the rain the Bolsa was crowded, and a very fair business done in specie, the market without any effort of speculation was very firm, and looking upwards. The statement in the papers respecting the arrival of gold from Rio for the Government is not quite correct; by the English steamer some gold is expected however. The Rio de la Plata brought only a trifle in specie to-day; gold is very plentiful in Montevideo, but the banks hold it up and discount only their best customers' papers at 1 1/2 per cent per month—no large remittance from Montevideo need not be anticipated. The French mail steamer brought up 12,000 patacons for a leading German house, but strange to say the specie is still on board; the delay is most injurious to the consignees and should be avoided. We suppose the excuse is the weather, but no such excuse would be allowed in Europe. The Provincial Bank has received by the packet a credit for £100,000 on Huth and Co., London, which will enable the Directors to discount more liberally and draw by the packet.

The Bolsa committee responding to the general feeling of the brokers, has obtained the 4th of July to be a holiday; it is surmised it will be a Bank holiday also. Collections through town could not be worse, no paper, no gold any place, and the weather was so bad that the clerks were commiserated. In the afternoon gold was looked for, and in the liquidation room patacons ruled 28.85.

The important loan we mentioned yesterday on Public Bonds, we hear was made by an English house to a well-known holder. There was nothing done in Exchange, no charters, and in the plazas nothing doing; paper money is easy and not much looked for. The amount of Exchange passed in Montevideo for the packet exceeds sixty thousand pounds, which is a large amount for that market.

**THE CORDOBA LAND AND COLONIZATION Co.**  
To the Editors of the 'Standard,' Cordoba, June 22nd 1865.  
Dear Sirs:  
You must have thought me uncourteous in not writing to you soon after my arrival here to say how I was getting on. But there was not much news I could give you respecting my concession, owing to impediments which sprung up with the Government at the outset, and I waited to be able to announce to you the definitive formation of the Co. in England.  
Although I have not received my letters per last packet, I have a prospectus of the Co. launched in London to the financial public. I regret not to be able to send it to you, as it is the only one I got and I have lent it to the Governor.  
I have very serious fears that the war with Paraguay as soon as known will discourage my friends in London and interrupt their labors. I believe that you can powerfully aid the enterprise in the columns of the 'Standard,' by combatting these fears, and doing your best for us, for which we shall feel very grateful.
