NEWS FROM THE INTERIOR

THE RIOJA RIVS QUELLED

DEATH OF THE REBEL FLORES

DISRUPTIONS IN CATAMARCA

ANGORA GOATS IN CORDOBA

The steam-tug Iron King arrived yesterday from Rosario, with newspapers from Cordoba to the 23rd ult.

Official reports from Rioja to July 14 mention the suppression of the Flores riot, and the death of that rebel in a skirmish with the Government troops.

It seems after the rebels had attacked the camp, and dispersed the contingent of National Guards, they fell back on Catujá resolved to intercept the officers under Linares, openly declaring they meant to hang them all.

But Linares and his 10 officers putting their saddles on their shoulders set out by a rugged route through the Sierra in search of miles, and arriving near Catuna resolved to storm the place and take the rebels by surprise.

They soon perceived some bands of gauchos, and dismounting let go their horses, advancing on foot. The surprise was complete, and after a short but sanguinary encounter the rebel leader Flores (alias Zarate) and one of his men were killed the rest escaping in all directions.

As soon as the news reached Hedionda the rebel force there, some 60 men, cleared out, only a few prisoners falling into the hands of Linares.

From the statement of these men it appears none of the rebels belonged to the Province of Rioja, but they were all deserters from the contingents of San Juan, San Luis and Cordoba.

Governor Campos was at Atter on the 21th July, making a tour of the disturbed districts as far as the Triana, Costa Alta. He was expected at Rioja in a few days, having left some officers to continue the pursuit of the rebels, who fled in small bands in various directions.

We have letters from Catamarca containing the official despatch of Capt. Herrera, commander of the Amadores district, dated July 11th, with the following account of the riot of the contingent.

"On the evening of the 9th I gave a party at my house to celebrate the Brazilian victory at the Riachuelo. In the forenoon I had assembled the militia for drill, after which they went quietly home, but at night we suddenly began dancing when word was brought me that Col. Rocca was coming up with the contingent, and that a terrible conflict was going on about 100 yards from my house.

I rushed out and saw my militia men pounding the soldiers, whereupon I mounted my horse and rode in among them, asking 'what was up?' The soldiers complained that two drunken men had stopped the contingent, crying out 'Halt' and attacking them with knives. Four of the soldiers were wounded, whom I conveyed to my house and afterwards sent to Col. Rocca's residence.

Two of the principal rioters, named Lopes and Bowero, have been arrested and I send them herewith for punishment. It is lamentable for the fate of the Republic that these men got so drunk."

He does not say what became of the rest of the contingent, but according to previous accounts it seems to have quietly dispersed.

Cordoba arrived at Catamarca on the 6th with some of the western contingents. The Minister of Government, Dr. Laira, resigned his post to the rage of the public.

The Governor of Salta sent to Tucuman for a supply of arms for the frontier, but Gen. Rijo had seized them on the way. The citizens did not like being drafted for the war, but the Gov-

ernment ordered them to attend in the Plaza at beat of drum on the 2nd inst. In San Juan they are busy whitewashing the Sacramento school. The families of those who marched for the war are so poor that the Government had to vote \$150 monthly for their support.

The 'Standard' agent in Cordoba D. Budeindo Ybazeta, has imported a lot of Angora goats for that province, and his spirited example is being imitated by some parties in San Juan who have sent an order for some of these valuable animals.

THE PACIFIC MAILS.

THE PERUVIAN REVOLUTION.

LATEST FROM CHILE.

We have received the 'Panamá Star' of June 9th, and our Chilean exchanges to June 24th, the Cordillera being still open.

The Peruvian frigates having abandoned Arica on June 4th, that port was again occupied by the rebels, whom the townspeople welcomed with bell-ringing and rockets. The Arica garrison has returned to Callao, having been hooted by the citizens of the former place when leaving.

On the 6th these troops entered Lima, and defiled in front of the President's palace. General Canseco, who was banished to Chile, has escaped and joined the rebels, who are said to have seized Pativilca, not far from Lima, to the number of 4,500 men.

The southern army stopped at Huancayo, being afraid to advance against the rebels. President Pezet has ordered the Lima journals in treating the Chilean-Spanish question to say nothing against Spain.

Col. Galvez returned to Lima with some troops he had led against the insurgents of Canta. The Minister of War has received the Grand Cross of Charles III. of Spain. The indemnity to Spain 3 million dollars, includes a sum for having refused coal to Spanish vessels.

Nine Colonels have been made Generals. A plot for revolutions was discovered at Tacna in time, and artillery mounted in all the streets on June 3rd.

A JUDICIAL FARCE.

Probably there is no greater triumph of constitutional liberty than the fact that no man in a well-organized community is above the law.

In England it is our boast that the Queen on her throne is as amenable to the law of the land as the humblest subject in her dominions; and we have every day proof of the power of the law over even the highest peers of the realm, in the police magistrates' charge-sheet of London.

In Republics, however, the sovereignty of the law ought even to be still more acknowledged, and its power more respected.

Strange to say, however, such is not the case; and for some cause or other we observe that men holding public places are often so extremely popular that tribunals of this country are powerless as regards them, who acknowledge no jurisdiction save the good-will of electors and the votes of their constituents.

In the United States the judges in most of the state courts are elected for a fixed time by the people. This has caused much severe censure by European writers, who point with much reason to the possibility of the people electing some reputed pettyfogger to be supreme judge.

Evidently the people of Buenos Ayres, when framing their Constitution, took the European view of the judiciary, for we find here that the judges of Buenos Ayres are nominated, not elected.

Our attention has been called to this subject by the outrageous judicial scandal which is at present going on in Buenos Ayres, a scandal which if permitted must inevitably sap all the influence and power of the bench, and bring the judges of this country into an odium that will defeat their authority and make them the objects of ridicule amongst their fellow-citizens.

The case of Dr. Paz, versus Sr. Zavalía, Judge of the Villa Mercedos, is one of the greatest absurdities ever known in the record of legal cases.

Dr. Paz, the plaintiff, who besides being an able lawyer is a popular editor, thinks proper for some cause or other to attack the judge in question in the columns of his paper, the 'Pueblo.'

The judge, on reading these attacks, determines not to allow him to practice in his court. Dr. Paz is obliged to

give up his clients and their fees, and therefore brings the present suit. Now, without taking sides with either party, we feel bound to say, that if the judge erred in taking notice as he did of the lampoons, the lawyer also has been mistaken in impeaching a judge for a simple breach of privilege.

The corruption of a judge is, we are willing to admit, a most heinous offence, and deserves to be punished; but, in the present case, there is no charge of the kind, and Dr. Paz, when he was writing his articles against his worship, should have recollected that he was attacking the very court of which he was an officer.

The judge had his remedy, no doubt, to accuse Dr. Paz and his newspaper, which would probably have been the most discreet conduct on his part, but Dr. Paz seems to forget that Judge Zavalía holds his office during good conduct; and Governor Saavedra, and not the courts of Buenos Ayres, is the proper authority to apply to for redress.

Governor Saavedra named Judge Zavalía. If evidence of his misconduct is adduced the Governor should discharge him, but a stop should be at once put to the present judicial farce going on in the courts, as it can only result in bringing increased discredit on the judiciary of Buenos Ayres.

LAGRANA'S OPINION OF THE WAR.

The 'Tribuna' publishes a letter from Governor Lagrana to Sr. Mendez, dated Goya, July 23rd.

"I have just learned some particulars about the enemy from a young man arrived from the city of Corrientes. The garrison of that place consists of 2,500 men, quartered at the Bateria barrack where they have mounted several guns to command the river.

Numerous bodies of troops are stationed at the Lomas, and the total force under Robles is generally estimated at 32,000 men, although some think it cannot exceed 22,000.

From the Riachuelo to Empedrado they have several batteries on the river, in all 60 guns, including 15 rifled pieces. All the guns and 'materiel' of the Jequitinhonha, Jeju, Salto and Olinda have fallen into the hands of the invaders and been turned to account.

The 'Junta' of Corrientes had called out the National Guards for military service, which caused much alarm as it was believed they would be sent to garrison Humaytá. A decree was passed making all kinds of clothing &c., munitions of war, under which pretext several shops were ransacked.

The Brazilian vice-Consul (an old Spaniard) was arrested in the Policia. Minister Berges and Caminos had the Government of the place, and Lopez himself was expected from Paraguay on the 24th inst.

Many sick belonging to the army were sent back to Asuncion.

"The Gefé of Bella Vista under date 22nd inst. writes me word that two young gentlemen who escaped from Corrientes in a canoe, on the 16th, report horrible atrocities by the Paraguayans. Numerous families have been dragged out of their houses and sent in captivity to Paraguay.

The wife of Col. Alsina, with a baby at the breast, the wife of Major Sosa, Mrs. Jacoba Cabral, Mrs. Victoria Zeballos, Major Maciel, Col. Cayetano Virasoro, Col. Ulpiano Lotero, and an aged man named Alexis Zeballos have all been sent up the river, on being denounced as anti-Paraguayans by the traitor Juan B. Lopez, Gefé of the Lomas district.

Ex-president Derqui and family were allowed to remain, on plea of ill-health; Dr. Colodrero was beaten and his wife fired at. The captives were lodged in the Bateria barrack, before being shipped for Paraguay.

"General Pannero's division is again marching east, seeking the Tala ford on the river of Corrientes."

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Iron King arrived on Sunday from Rosario; she only brought one passenger. There is nothing particular from the provinces beyond the defeat of the rebels in Rioja. The Cordillera is still open.

A party of Englishmen, amongst whom some of our leading city merchants, have taken a run up to Concordia to see the allied camp. We hope one of the party will favor us with a graphic report of the real state of things up there, as the English reading public is hungry for news.

Scarcely any one in town has received an English paper by the French packet.

Our maritime friends the captains and ship-brokers are all afloat owing to the non-arrival of Mitchell's paper.

We regret to learn that the camps lying between Villa Lujan and the Capilla del Señor are in such poor condition that the farmers are about to remove their flocks. This is the only part of the camp we hear complaints from; we believe the estancias must be overstocked.

On Saturday Mr. Wheelwright accompanied by several engineers and property holders inspected the proposed route of the new line of railway from the Plaza 11 Setiembre to the Boca. This scheme meets with the support of the Government and the greatest public approbation, as it will considerably reduce the heavy charges attending the shipping of wool and other produce.

The Southern Railway will we understand be opened this week for the conveyance of passengers to within about four leagues of Chascomus on account of contractors. This will prove a great convenience for our friends in the South, who complain that the roads are so bad that they can hardly get into town on horseback.

We notice a decree from the Oriental Minister of War exempting all capatazes, puesteros and majordomos from serving in the war. Our camp friends would thank Sor Gelly to issue a like order as great discontent exists in the country on this head.

General Flores passed the Mocereta on the 24th ult., bound north. Conesa is not along with him. The Argentine officer who marches in this expedition is Sr. Garcia. We hear that the riverine expedition which Baron Tamandare was getting up was abandoned in consequence of its having been published in the newspapers, thereby acquainting the Paraguayans of the fact.

Flores marches 5 leagues daily, and Pallejas, the renowned correspondent, is along with him.

The 'Moniteur' states officially that France and the other European Powers will remain neutral in the present war between Brazil and Paraguay, the Foreign Ministers having only to care for the free navigation of the rivers.

The recent bank robbery in Dolores has caused the greatest excitement in that town in consequence of none of the robbers having been apprehended. It is believed that there is a regular gang of robbers in the town, and the shopkeepers and others are apprehensive that the bank affair was only a small beginning, and that if the police force is not increased the robbers will have it all their own way.

The Spanish Legation in Montevideo has just published a warning notice to Spaniards, cautioning them against enlisting in the present war. The reason of this new notice we hear is, that some recruiting agents from Buenos Ayres have arrived in that city, and are enlisting or engaging Gallegos at very high salaries, as sheep and cattle farmers for Corrientes and Matto Grosso. Business is so dull in Montevideo that employment is scarce, and many are enlisting for the war, having nothing else to do.

The Liverpool steamer Uruguay will leave this port the day after tomorrow. This is a splendid opportunity for those who purpose going home to England, as Captain Smith is one of the most popular captains in the Plate.

The far-famed Icarus of the Paraná, the Estrella del Norte took up on Saturday the melodious Lelmi and troupe to Rosario; there were 70 passengers on board, all of whom we doubt not enjoyed the dulcet notes of our popular tenor, whilst ploughing the rippling waves of the Argentine Mississippi.

The quagmires of Lujan have been declared public property by a Government edict on last Friday; it seems some indiscreet native raised the question as to territorial rights over the mudd 'banadas' along the river, and whilst the case was *lis pendens* his Excellency the Governor comes out with the decree in question: owners of property adjoining the humid spots have a preferential right to purchase, which we are inclined to think they will be rather slow to avail of.

Those who entertain any wish to begin the wild duck raising business would do well to at once apply for the rather wet pasturages on the borders of the rivers.

As will be seen by an advertisement in another column, a new Chilean steamer the Santiago will be despatched from Liverpool on the 15th inst. She will be due in Montevideo about the 6th September.

One of the scarcest articles in town was lint; all the apothecaries' shops in town have been long since exhausted. Luckily the French packet has brought out two large cases.

Few in Buenos Ayres are aware that a fellow named Oliviera recently crossed over from Gualeguaychú to the Oriental shore in a small row boat with only two followers; he has got together some fellows who were hiding in the woods; and our Montevidean correspondent states that he has raised the hopes of the Blancos in that city.

We notice also that a correspondent of the Montevidean 'Tribuna' warns the Government that Paysandú is on the eve of a revolt owing to some indiscreet nominations by the Minister.

Mr. Gowland sells off to-morrow a small cargo of sewing-machines. We suppose the importer is "sewed up," as this is the first time we have seen these useful domestic inventions brought wholesale to the hammer.

There being a great demand at present for army clothing, we suppose the machines will sell well.

The new steamer Tala, built by our friend Marshall of Barracas, will we hear be paraded on the Paraná. She was intended for the Gualeguaychú trade, but Matti, the owner, has changed his mind and will now run her up the Paraná.

When Urquiza was at Concordia the townspeople were preparing to give him a grand ball: some of our friends up there who each day as they walk about the town say "Deus nobis haec otia fecit," were intent on it, but the old General was in no humor for it, and when he returned from the review seemed so fagged that even his most intimate friends declined to even hint to him the proposed hop. As for ladies we learn there is no scarcity of them in Concordia, many of whom have recently arrived from Buenos Ayres.

We hear nothing more about the kerosene discovery in Jujuy although many of our readers take a very lively interest in the matter and according to our London Correspondent a special agent of a London house may shortly be expected out.

The Boca railway we are positively assured will be open to the Tres Esquinas, Barracas on the 1st September; the charge will be the same as the diligence, \$5. We are glad to hear that all difficulty about the station, since Mr. Wheelwright's arrival has been arranged. The old guard-house has been bought by the contractor; the reason why the station will not be at the Calle Larga in the little Plaza is, that the Municipality refuse to give the ground.

On Saturday evening the long talked of fashionable wedding came off: the Italian Consul, Sr. Astengo, led to the altar the lovely Miss Huergo, sister to the Secretary of Don Norberto Riestra.

AMUSING ANECDOTE.

When General Flores was going up in the steamer Rio de la Plata to Salto, a sort of dinner-difficulty occurred on board. It seems the steamer had besides all the military dignitaries on board, a number of Englishmen as passengers. The dining table, as a matter of course, could not accommodate all at once, so the steward carefully turned down two plates to secure seats for Brigadier General Flores and his secretary.

It so happened when the dinner-bell rang, an Englishman entered the cabin and found every place at the table occupied, save the two seats in question. He, without the slightest hesitation, occupied the seat set apart for General Flores, quietly put the plate in its proper position, and called for soup. Meanwhile the General came down to dinner, and to his astonishment saw our friend quietly eating his dinner. The captain, parser, steward, &c., at once told the Englishman of his mistake, which he could by no means see; and notwithstanding every remonstrance, and entreaty refused to leave the place.

General Flores, like a man of sense, went into his cabin, laughed at the joke, and quietly waited until the Englishman finished. The affair caused quite a stir on board, and the people put the Englishman down as a rampant Blanco. Such, however, is not the case. The party was well-known to have had a row with almost every

hotel-keeper in town about his seat in the 'comedor.' It no doubt would have been more polite for the Englishman to have waived the point and given General Flores his seat; but it must also be borne in mind that General Flores was no more than any other passenger on board, and the Englishman believing he was in a Republican country regarded himself as good as any other man.

IRELAND.

(Special Correspondence.)

Dublin, June 21.

The Exhibition, for so far is a great success, and our city has been much benefited by the large influx of visitors. Just now, however, the near approach of a General Election is absorbing public attention, and on every hand is seen active preparation in progress for the "Constitutional battle."

Sir Edward Grogan declines to stand for the city at the approaching election, and Mr. Benjamin Lee Guinness has addressed the electors—that gentleman, in conjunction with Mr. Vance, representing the Conservative interest. It is said that Alderman MacSwiney has been invited to come forward in the Liberal and National interest, supported by the Catholic hierarchy and clergy.

Mr. MacSwiney's wife presented the state chariot, and horses, which did duty during his Mayoralty, as a prize in aid of the founding of a Catholic Blind Asylum. At the drawing lately held, a Scotchman—a thorough going Presbyterian—won this handsome prize, which was forwarded to Edinburgh.

There is small chance, however, of Mr. MacSwiney representing the Dublin constituency, inasmuch as his views are generally looked upon as extreme. He is a spirited citizen—a good employer and a benevolent man, therefore, aside from politics, a general favorite. Sir John Gray has addressed the electors of the smokeless city—Kilkenny, and there is some probability of his return.

The general feeling throughout the country is to oust the supporters of Lord Palmerston, even should such a course lead to the accession to power of a Tory Government. With the great mass of the agricultural population, however, the issue of party struggles has little in common. The prevailing feeling among nine-tenths of the people is to leave Ireland at once and for ever.

The cessation of the war in America has undoubtedly given a fresh impetus to emigration, and agents from British Colonies are beating up every part of the country for colonists. Their efforts are not being successful, as the United States is still the Mecca of Irish pilgrims. I am still constrained to report unfavourably of the political condition of Ireland. There is little doubt as to the spread of Fenianism—indeed, north and south, assembling and drilling are the order of the day, thousands of young men and middle-aged men engaging in the work of training. The Government continues passive; but I incline to the belief that the Irish Executive only waits for the appearance of a "Jenny O'Brien" to swoop down on the inconsiderate men who have joined this mischievous organization. If you want accessions to your population from Ireland the present would be a favourable opportunity for the judicious expenditure of money in free and assisted passages. The better and intelligent class of would-be emigrants could be easily weaned from their penchant for the States, as they well know that some time must elapse before order is sufficiently restored in Yankoland, and that the price of labour must suffer depreciation from the number of hands set loose by the disbanding of the Union forces. Much could be done in Ireland at present to secure to Buenos Ayres a large share of the ever-moving stream of emigrants leaving our shores, and, I now leave the means of accomplishing so desirable an object in the hands of my countrymen resident with you.
