## ARRIVAL OF THE IBICUY.

### LATEST FROM PARANA.

#### STANDARD TELEGRAMS.

Parana, August 10.  
Nothing new; no arrivals from  
the above since the Espigador; and  
no news by land.

Our colleague, the 'Parana,' pub-  
lishes a letter from General Urquiza to  
Colonel Navarro, who, it may be re-  
membered, was charged with playing  
the traitor at Basualdo, in which he  
refutes everything that was said against  
him. General Urquiza complains  
greatly of the language used against  
him in the 'Pueblo' newspaper.

Our colleague states that it is gen-  
erally believed there has at last been a  
fight, but which side gained the day is  
not known in Parana.

The Esmeralda had arrived, and  
went on to the Brazilian squadron.

Not a single vessel of any descrip-  
tion had come down the river, but it  
was supposed that Goya had been in-  
vaded by the Paraguayans.

The storm on Sunday caused fearful  
damage, blowing down several ran-  
chos, and tearing up trees, &c. On  
Monday afternoon it calmed down.

The hospital had at last been estab-  
lished, and a call made on the ladies  
of the town for lint, &c.

In the town of Saladas, eight houses,  
belonging to foreigners, had been sack-  
ed by the Paraguayans.

### EDITOR'S TABLE.

The steamer Ibicuy arrived yester-  
day but as usual brought no news  
whatever; we conversed with some of  
the officers of the steamers but they all  
tell us that there is more known in  
Buenos Ayres about the war than up  
the river.

The enormous fish which was caught  
the other day in the river is now safely  
located in the Museum. We hear  
that the "grasa" was sold to a party  
in the market for several thousand  
dollars, it filled two carts.

In Barracas, at the other side of the  
bridge, about fifty men brought in  
from the camp are kept in a 'coralón';  
to-day we hear they will receive their  
uniforms. We believe they were caught  
outside without 'papeletas.'

Yesterday we were visited by one of  
the leading men of Cordova, he informs  
us that things are coming to a crisis  
there, and that we are on the eve of  
great events. The Governor, we be-  
lieve, purposes making a clean sweep  
of the Pizarro faction.

The Mersey is expected in port: if  
she arrives early subscribers will please  
send round early for their supplements  
which we have every reason to hope  
will be an improvement on the last.

Our Paraguayan colleague the 'Se-  
manario' we hear publishes almost  
as many bulletins as the native papers  
in town; we suppose each day Sor  
Benitez has some new victory to write  
about: the circulation of the Paraguay-  
an newspapers we believe beats the  
Tribuna's hollow, as all the soldiers  
are allowed to get the paper and read  
the news.

Our native colleagues will shortly  
be obliged to take all their war news  
out of our columns, as President Mitre,  
we hear, has ordered all the military  
correspondents of the Buenos Ayrean  
newspapers to cease writing. As our  
information from headquarters does  
not emanate from the camp, we only  
pose the 'Standard' will be the only  
paper in town with the latest news.

We are happy to read again of the  
patriotic devotion of our friend, Sr.  
Subiaurre, who has presented fifty  
splendid horses to the Government,  
and as many mares as Colonel Ma-

chado may require. This is certainly  
a regal present, and speaks volumes  
for the liberality of Sr. Subiaurre.  
The Government of Entre Rios has  
in reply to a note from President  
Mitre, respecting the Basualdo affair,  
stated that General Urquiza has re-  
ceived instructions to punish the par-  
ties implicated in this disgraceful  
business. It is not probable, however,  
that anything will be done in the  
matter until the present war is con-  
cluded.

One of our colleagues very properly  
calls attention to some ferocious blind  
man who at present goes through the  
streets. It seems he is armed with a  
knife, and the other day attempted to  
cut at some children that accidentally  
knocked up against him. This is fight-  
ing one's way through the world with  
a vengeance.

The embargo having been taken off  
Sr. Eguisquiza's goods, it is to be sup-  
posed now that the various English  
houses, creditors of the estate, will be  
at once paid. We hear they amount  
to the trille of eighty thousand pata-  
cons.

Congress has ordered \$68,300 more  
to be paid to Sr. Van Praet for da-  
mages he suffered during the war. This  
indemnity will be paid in National  
Bonds.

The most fashionable street in town  
now is Calle Belgrano. Half a square  
from the Calle Bolivar is the residence  
of the Vice-President, who drives daily  
down Calle Belgrano to the Govern-  
ment-house; on the other side is our  
office, which is occasionally the rendez-  
vous of the leading men in town. A  
little further down is the house of the  
Argentine Ambassador to London,  
Dn. Norberto Riestra.

If men were as easily gathered in the  
camp as horses, what splendid armies  
would not the 'teniente alcaides' raise.  
We see that in Tandil the neighbours  
have presented to the Government 202  
tame horses, all in good condition.

We notice that the trial of William  
Belford, for firing a pistol with intent  
to kill, will come off to-day; also that  
of Pablo Escobar for murder. These  
criminal trials now-a-days attract little  
attention, as the prisoners remain so  
long in prison before trial that the  
facts connected with their crime are  
lost sight of, and even when a convic-  
tion ensues, no one of our readers  
knows what becomes of the convicts.  
The general belief is that they are in-  
tamorphosed into soldiers.

The Brazilian gunboat Paranaense,  
which was sent down on Saturday  
night to take care of Montevideo, was  
all but wrecked in the late gale. We  
regret also to hear that the top of Mr.  
Richard Wilson's mole was blown into  
Phillimore bay. The Henschell also had  
a very narrow escape, being obliged to  
anchor about twenty-three miles out-  
side the harbor.

The latest news we have from Hu-  
maitá is that there are 80 boarding flat  
boats all anchored off the Gran Chaco  
ready to dispute the pass with the Bra-  
zilian Squadron whenever it attempts  
to pass up. On very superior informa-  
tion we can inform our readers that  
there are some grounds for the rumours  
respecting the removal and arrest of  
Robles. It seems that the General had  
not many particular friends in Asun-  
cion and that Colonel Barrios is a much  
more popular man.

Probably one of the most arduous  
adventures that ever was undertaken  
is the march of some 500 men through  
the very heart of Brazil to Matto Gros-  
so. The expedition when last heard  
of was in San Paulo, but several had  
succumbed to the hardships of the  
journey. The Paraguayans are spread  
over all the upper Brazilian provinces,  
and wherever they come, they fortify  
the towns and leave a garrison to de-  
fend.

We regret to notice the increased  
number of 'Ingleses' getting into the  
Policia; every day one or more of our  
countrymen get into this inhospitable  
dwelling—the fines collected now by  
Sr. Cazon must really be a very hard  
some thing.

To-day our Minister of war leaves for  
Concordia; he beats Napoleon hollow  
in the number of officers, aides, &c. The  
Rio de la Plata is the lucky steamer.  
We hope there will be no recurrence of  
the dinner table difficulty which occur-  
red when General Flores and Mr. P.

Swords, muskets, revolvers, and  
powder are now arriving by every ves-  
sel, and yet these deadly importations,  
we are told, sell splendidly. Coal seems  
to be looking a little flatter, we notice  
the last sale ex a Hamburg vessel 13  
pata. on board.

The Argentine Sanitary Commission,  
attracts our attention. The gentlemen  
who are getting it up had another  
meeting in the Municipality rooms on  
Wednesday night. We have no doubt  
that in proportion, it will be as suc-  
cessful here as in the U. States.

On Sunday and Tuesday next, some  
valuable sites, &c., close to the Sou-  
thern Railway station in Barracas will  
be sold by auction; as money is very  
abundant and the situation excellent,  
we have no doubt they will sell well.

Sight-seeing in Buenos Ayres is  
often an expensive amusement: a gen-  
tleman who was standing on Thurs-  
day morning in front of the Captain  
of the Port's, with his hands in his  
pockets, looking at Martinez's regim-  
ent embark, lost ten thousand dol-  
lars: how the money got out of his  
pocket is a mystery, but the money is  
gone.

A subscriber has called to complain  
that Sor Sprunck our agent in Monte-  
video, and who has a fashionable music  
shop, has not the Briol waltz. We have  
been requested to blow our agent up  
for this: it is well for Mr. Sprunck that  
Zozimus has left Montevideo.

We hear of a grand raffle or lottery  
which will shortly come off, poor Ca-  
thleen Mavourneen the renowned Irish  
mare of a leading English merchant  
is to be thus disposed of. *Sic transit &c.*  
we wish the spirited owner would make  
us a present of a ticket.

On Monday the trains on the Sou-  
thern Railway commence running.  
The morning standard will be on sale  
at the station at the starting of the  
first train each day: our subscribers  
along the line will please at once write

wish their papers to be left.

### HEALTH OF THE CITY.

The sanitary condition of the city is  
unchanged during the last fortnight.  
We have to report a case of malignant  
measles resulting in a speedy death;  
it was a young lady just married.

In the same house in which we stated  
one of the cases of small-pox had oc-  
curred in the previous fortnight, there  
are now two other cases; a boy of 6,  
and a girl of 7 years old. Both had  
been recovering from a bad attack of  
measles complicated with bronchitis.  
The boy was also seized with ventral  
symptoms which finally became pro-  
nounced dysentery: after this, small-pox  
set in. The pustules came out well,  
but at the period of suppuration the  
child was so completely exhausted by  
the continued diarrhoea that there was  
no means of raising his strength and  
he succumbed.

There have been numerous cases of  
'angina difterica' extending to the lar-  
ynx of false membranes, all which ter-  
minated fatally.

Also several cases of bronchitis and  
rheumatism. Such is the sad picture  
of the health of the city.

We have to express our warmest ap-  
proval of the project to establish a Sa-  
nitary Commission, on the model of that  
of the United States, which will be  
productive of immense good to our  
army during the present Paraguayan  
war. The initiator is D. Felix Frias,  
with whom the following gentlemen  
have been associated as a provisional  
Committee: Messrs. Rawson, Obligado  
Alsina, Cantillo, Gutierrez, Varela and  
Montes de Oca.

Dr. William Stokes, the renowned  
Irish physician and professor of Medi-  
cina in the University of Dublin, has  
published a valuable work on heart  
disease, which has been translated into  
French and received with much favor  
in France. It is worthy the attention  
of our medical men, and is briefly re-  
viewed in this No. by Dr. Quinche.

### MILITARY OPERATIONS.

Public anxiety is now fixed on the  
operations of our vanguard, and before  
long we expect to have news of a de-  
cisive character. But there is a still  
greater importance attending these  
movements and the attitude of the  
enemy which may bring into imme-  
diate play the whole of our elements of

war. Any move on the chess-board  
may provoke a grand attack. Hence  
people are anxious to know not only  
how the vanguard under Flores stands,  
but also what turn operations are  
likely to take from his manœuvres.  
We will briefly sketch in a few lines  
the actual position of the belligerents  
and the probable events which must  
ensue.

Two columns of our forces moved in  
different directions to cross the Miri-  
ñay, a small stream 25 leagues south of  
Paso de los Libres, where the Para-  
guayan vanguard (3,000 strong) was  
posted, while the rest of the invading  
army of 9,000, was coming down through  
Rio Grande on the opposite bank of the  
river. General Flores and Madarriga  
have already crossed the Miriñay at  
Paso Ramirez. General Paunero, on  
the 3rd inst., was within three days,  
march of the same stream, some 20 lea-  
gues higher up, and supposing him to  
have crossed it near Mercedes on the  
6th, he would be able in a few days to  
incorporate his division with the van-  
guard, thus placing Gen. Flores at the  
head of 12,000 men and 30 pieces of  
cannon to attack the enemy's van-  
guard of 3,000 men.

We learn, however, that Gen. Flores  
had to leave behind his artillery and  
infantry on the banks of the Miriñay,  
pushing on only with his cavalry to re-  
connoitre. It must also be borne in  
mind that his cavalry musters 6,000  
strong, so that if the enemy is only  
3,000 he will certainly fall on him and  
cut him up without waiting on the in-  
fantry and artillery to arrive. On the  
other hand, if the Paraguayans prove  
too strong, Flores will fall back and  
concentrate all the forces for a bold  
stroke.

In this manner we may regard this  
grand military scheme accomplished.  
The Paraguayan armies of the Para-  
ná and Uruguay are cut off from all  
communication, and the latter, or less  
numerous one may be said to be anni-  
hilated by the weight of the allied arms.

Looking into details: either the  
enemy has only 3,000 infantry, and  
then Flores' cavalry will 'whip'  
them; or there is a larger body, and  
then Flores will concentrate to over-  
whelm them with yet superior numbers.  
It is almost impossible the Paraguayans  
beyond the Uruguay can come to  
aid those on this side, as their inten-  
tion is to march on Salto, and even if  
they wished to change their route on  
this new turn of events they could not  
be in time, the operations of crossing  
the Uruguay being doubly difficult in  
presence of Gen. Canavarro's Brazilian  
army now 10,000 strong, including Col.  
Fernandez's reinforcements.

But supposing even that Bosco's  
corps was able to cross over in time,  
in support of Duarte's division, it would  
be then 12,000 to 12,000: and our ar-  
my comprises the flower of Argentine  
infantry under Paunero, the best Mon-  
tevidean cavalry under Flores, two  
crack battalions of Brazilians, and a  
park of 30 pieces of cannon which  
would mow down the masses of Para-  
guayan infantry. So that the superi-  
ority and advantage would be entirely  
on our side.

Meantime it is absurd to suppose  
that Canavarro and Fernandez would  
remain in Rio Grande if the enemy  
escaped them and crossed into Cor-  
rientes: they are, in constant commu-  
nication with Flores and Paunero, and  
would at once cross the Uruguay as  
well as the enemy. This would turn  
the tables considerably, for the Para-  
guayans (only 12,000 in all) would have  
to fight two armies in front and flank  
together numbering 22,000 men. The  
invading army of the Uruguay is there-  
fore, already annihilated, and espe-  
cially the vanguard.

It may be suggested—cannot the in-  
vaders of the Paraná come to its relief?

This is clearly impossible, since they  
have neither time nor means to do so.  
The bulk of the Paraguayan column  
on the Paraná is near Saladas, and  
even supposing they could instantane-  
ously concentrate all their forces scat-  
tered over the country from Paso la  
Patria to Bella Vista, it would be at-  
terly impracticable to march in a right  
line from Saladas to Paso los Libres.  
The swamps and marshes adjacent to  
Laké Yberá extend over most of the  
intermediate distance and are impen-  
etrable. Their army must come down in

a southerly direction some 60 leagues  
and then 50 leagues east towards Paso  
los Libres, an operation which would  
require ten times as many days as  
must intervene before the battle  
comes off.

For the sake of argument, however,  
we shall suppose that the Paraguayan  
vanguard on the Uruguay be able to  
hold its own until the army of Parana  
march to its relief. It is clear that in  
such case the General-in-chief with the  
grand army of Concordia would get  
into motion, as also the forces of Cace-  
res and Hornos, and the enemy would  
be surrounded near the Miriñay, on  
front and rear, by the whole allied  
army, viz: 12,000 under Flores, 10,000  
under Canavarro, 6,000 under Caceres  
and Hornos, and 22,000 under Mitre;  
in all 50,000 men with a large train of  
artillery.

This hypothesis would lead to a de-  
cisive battle in which all the chances  
are on our side; but it is more likely  
that the Flores expedition will result  
in a simple encounter near Paso los Li-  
bres, punishing the invaders for their  
audacious outrages. They have no  
hope of retreat, as they have a rapid  
stream on their rear; so that we may  
confidently expect to hear immediately  
of a decisive victory.

### THE DEBATE IN CONGRESS.

#### THE STEAMBOAT SUBSIDY.

On Thursday the bill authorizing a  
subsidy of twenty thousand patacons  
per annum to the first direct steam  
navigation line between Buenos Ayres  
and the U States came up for discussion.  
Sr. Frias opposed the bill on two  
grounds, first because as yet no con-  
tractor had applied for the grant, and  
second because the money could be  
better laid out in other matters. Our  
quasi colleague Sr. Piñeiro, supported  
the bill warmly, not so much on ac-  
count of any very material benefit to  
be derived from the concession, but  
simply he regarded as it the duty of Ar-  
gentine Legislators to bring this coun-  
try in contact with the U States as much  
as possible, and thus emancipate Ar-  
gentines from European books, prin-  
ciples &c. The house evidently lent a  
friendly ear to Sr. Piñeiro's views: a  
division took place, and the casting  
vote of the President of the Senate de-  
cided the bill affirmatively.

Although in favor of the bill, we  
take exception to Sr. Piñeiro's extra-  
ordinary remarks, and incline to the opi-  
nion that however injurious for Argen-  
tines European literature, the evil is  
more than counter-balanced by the  
constant flow of European bone, sinew,  
and capital into this country; it is  
indeed strange that Sr. Piñeiro's admira-  
tion for the great Republic should  
carry him so far, as to declare war  
against all Europe: why, if our Sena-  
torial friend had his will we verily be-  
lieve he would stop the packets.

The subsidy in question is money  
well spent, but it is a mistake to sup-  
pose that emigrants will ever come  
from the U. States to this country, still a  
direct steam line to the States is a gain  
for this country, and we are well pleas-  
ed that the bill has passed.

### THE SIGNAL FLAG-STAFF.

Notwithstanding all we have already  
said on this subject, we perceive that  
not the slightest attention has been  
paid by the Government or our friend  
the Captain of the Port to the matter;  
we again feel it our duty to make  
some remarks, as the necessity of some  
easy means of communication with  
vessels in the outer roads is so patent  
and so urgent, that we cannot and will  
not abandon the theme until we at-  
tain our object. On last Sunday the  
masters of vessels, on shore, had no  
possible means of communicating with  
their vessels, and although the river  
was so low that half the way to the  
outer roads, any of the Captains might  
have walked out, yet for the remainder  
of the way no boat could be got for  
even five thousand dollars. The price  
of a pole and a few yards of bunting  
cannot possibly be the objection since  
double the sum required to cover such  
an outlay would be subscribed in five  
minutes at any of the naval stores on  
the beach: the impediment is that a  
signal flag-staff is a novelty, and our  
Marine Minister is so busy about the  
War, the Captain of the Port is a su-  
bordinate, Congress is busy with other

matters, all the Ministers of Govern-  
ment are up to their ears in business,  
and ergo no one can bother about such  
a trifling thing as a flag-staff. But we  
hold that it is no trifling matter and  
that it is a disgrace to our Government  
that the city is so long without one.  
They say that the Captain of the Port  
is afraid that if he was to put up  
another flag staff on his azotea it would  
shake the house to pieces: if there is  
anything in this objection, then let  
some other site be selected but it is no  
reason because our Captain of the Port  
lives in a rickety tumble-down con-  
cern that the port of Buenos Ayres is  
to be without a signal flag-staff.

We call the attention of our Foreign  
Affairs Minister to the following de-  
scription of a new class of signals on  
show at the Dublin Exhibition. If His  
Excellency would write by this packet  
to the new Argentine Consul, possibly  
we might count on getting some such  
signals for this port which is in the  
most abandoned and neglected state.

'Ward's telegraph signals, which  
were first encouraged in Liverpool,  
have for some time past been favour-  
ably spoken of as offering advantages  
superior to those provided by other  
systems. By a series of coloured  
lamps and flags, very simply and na-  
turally arranged, it is rendered easy to  
express all that is ever required in  
signalling or telegraphing at sea, or on  
the coast or at the seat of war, either  
by day or by night. The nautical  
people in Liverpool perhaps no greater  
recommendation could be presented  
than that which this invention posses-  
ses—the double approval of Captain  
Ingfield, R.N., and the Liverpool Mer-  
cantile Association.' In connection  
with this subject, Gisborne's electric sig-  
nals should receive some consideration.'

### GREAT AGITATION IN THE SOUTH.

#### 4 FOREIGNERS IN THE STOCKS.

A subscriber has arrived from Ajo  
with news that the whole partido is in  
alarm owing to the severity of the  
authorities in pressing men for the war-  
contingents of the Nat. Guards. On  
Friday, 4th inst. picquets of 'chiripa'  
officials were scampering over the  
camps in all directions beating up for-  
eigners without their consular 'pro-  
tection.' They committed great ab-  
uses; in one case carrying off a poor  
Irishman before he had time to dress  
himself, and prodding the horse with  
lances to make him go faster; in  
another place they took away three  
men, an Englishman, an Italian, and  
Spaniard, leaving the poor widow (an  
Irishwoman) to care her estancia and  
sheep without peons.

Several of our friends, unfortunately  
without 'protections,' made a hasty  
flight, some to the shipping in port,  
others to the woods of 'cañadas,' and  
such terror prevailed that the flocks  
strayed about without anyone to look  
after them, and the farming interests  
are in danger of being seriously injured  
or destroyed by the foolish act of the  
Justice of the Peace. We regret to add  
that this official bears an English name,  
and is the descendant of a countryman,  
Capt. Farrer of the Argentine navy.

The folly of the Justice was followed  
by barbarous acts of severity; putting  
the foreigners in the stocks for 12  
hours. A highly respectable native  
estanciero, who is connected by mar-  
riage with an Irish family, came for-  
ward and gave bail to the amount of  
18,000\$ for three of the prisoners,  
whereupon they were released.

The camps are looking well, and  
sheep very fat. No sellers nor buyers.  
No new settlers lately, nor much prob-  
ability of people venturing down to  
Ajo until Mr. Justice Turner be induc-  
ed to resort to milder counsels, and  
leave his father's countrymen in quiet  
to mind their business. We would  
rather recommend him to turn his at-  
tention to vagrant gauchos who infest  
the coast in large numbers.

We understand that the commission  
of five soldiers who carried off these  
industrious foreigners, actually passed,  
on the same day, a group of three  
Matreros, or run-away natives, and did  
not offer to molest them.

### INTERESTING SHEEP ITEMS.

Under this heading, in your paper of  
the 8th instant, there is an exceed-  
ingly sensible and honest communication,  
dated 'Dolores, 3rd of August,' and  
signed 'Pastor.'

The best friends of the sheepfarmers, and the would-be sheepfarmers, are those who tell them the plain, unvarnished truth.

To 'tumble into sheepfarming,' however inexperienced the party might be, is still, generally represented as good fortune, 'par excellence.'

Sheepfarming is no exception to the law which governs all businesses. A fortuitous combination of circumstances may lead, and has led, to success and wealth in this as well as any other business.

It does not require a very lengthy or difficult calculation to arrive at the conclusion, that a long price paid for land, or a high rent, for the purpose of rearing on it a number of sheep, worth a few shillings each, \$20 or \$30, yielding a fleece worth, net 8d., 10d., to 14d., is not a very brilliant business.

In this month 1863, I wrote in the 'Standard' to the effect, that either land must fall to the level of an inferior stock, or stock [sheep] must be reared on it of a quality and value commensurate with the price or rent of land.

Sheepfarming in this country can only henceforward be made profitable by judicious management of an outlay in the improvement of the sheep, and in providing them with sufficient food and feeding ground, by which a fleece of sound stapled wool, at least double the present average weight, may be obtained.

A man can afford to pay the present price for land if he has sheep to put on it that yield him 6 or 7 lbs. of wool each, worth \$100 per acre; or if he is prepared to take the steps to attain this yield, and thus necessitate a total change of system in the management of the flocks and the selection, maintenance, and use of the rams.

Sheepfarmers might congratulate themselves if a few such honest and 'practical' writers as 'Pastor,' would more frequently address them through your columns.
