THE FATE OF URUGUAYANA.

Every hour may be expected to bring us the desired intelligence of the fall of Uruguayana and surrender of the whole Paraguayan forces constituting the 4th Division of the enemy which made so bold a raid into Rio Grande. The strength of that army is variously estimated from 6 to 15 thousand men with some dozen pieces of cannon: we incline to think 10,000 about the real number, as the Brazilian forces of Gen. Canavarro were unable to prevent its advance or impede its crossing the river Ibicuy. The force which seized San Borja last June was over that figure and the losses since sustained in the field are said to have been made up by 2000 fresh troops arrived from Paso de Itapua. It is generally believed in Rio Janeiro that the commander of the invading column is General Bóscó, the renowned and skillful defender of Gaeta; but well-informed parties in B. Ayres state that it is an old Italian officer who served under Bóscó, and that his second in command is Col. Estigarribia, who fought in the Carlist war. Be this as it may, we regard it impossible that either the skill of the leader, or the extraordinary valor of which the Paraguayans shew themselves possessed, can hold out the least hope to the beleaguered army.

If Restauracion were still in their power they might either attempt to cross the Uruguay and retreat into Misolobes, or hold out a siege in Uruguayana against superior odds, until the grand army of Robles could move in their relief. If they could command the interior of Rio Grande, or rapidly retrace their steps before General Flores comes up they might save their arms and reputation though forced to evacuate their suddenly and ill-got positions. But, none of these chances are left, and they find themselves completely in a 'cul-de-sac,' with the only alternative of surrendering to the victorious allies, or dying as valiantly and unprofitably as Leandro Gomez and the garrison of Paysandu.

We have a great admiration for valor, and can afford to admire the heroism displayed by the enemy in every encounter since the hard-fought battle of Riachuelo. But we should much regret any useless effusion of blood at Uruguayana merely to shew the bravery of an army whose very adversaries are loudest in acknowledging the same.

To retreat through a hostile territory over 40 leagues of forests, mountains and rapid rivers in presence of an active and superior foe, is impossible even in a strategic point of view; but when we consider that this force must be destitute of supplies, hemmed in on one side by the Brazilian flotilla on the Uruguay, on the other by Canavarro's army, and pressed on the rear by the powerful vanguard under Flores and Paunero, the very idea is too absurd to entertain for a moment.

To hold its ground in Uruguayana is hardly less impracticable: that town was deserted by its inhabitants, who carried off all they could, long before Canavarro declared it untenable, and the captors found so little stores that, by latest accounts they were forced to eat their baggage-oxen. They occupied the place on the 5th August, and must be now so short of food as to be unable to hold out even a week against a close siege.

It is not to be wondered why Lopez should have been the first to retreat, and why he should have retreated; but the error of the allies, and the 4th Division of the enemy, instead of retreating on Sanjo to threaten Montevideo, must infallibly terminate its

brief campaign at Uruguayana after inflicting Brazilian territory for less than a week. We are told that Major Duarte, the captive commander at Yatay, has written to his brother officer at Uruguayana advising him to surrender, at discretion and as the triumph of the allies is secure we could earnestly wish it were a bloodless one.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

THE 'REFORMA' CASE.

August 25. The Rio de la Plata leaves us to-day with nothing new to chronicle. The question of the 'Reforma Pacifica' is being agitated in the law courts, and Messrs. Bell, Garcia, and Calvo have presented an 'escrito,' couched, as I am told, in threatening language, thereby exposing themselves to the charge of contumacy. So the story goes. But whether it is true or not I cannot say. The so-called injured parties request that the judge shall expedite the course of justice in this matter.

Dr. Fernandez, of the 'Siglo,' has taken up the question with some interest, and pursues the theme with wonderful zest. This gentleman's perspicacious style becomes rather obscure when he lays down the law on the subject, and it is not a little singular that in the classic land of revolution and popular commotions, 'pronunciamentos' and civil strife, under the guidance and special sanction of these self-same journalists, such popular excesses should cause such a burst of indignation. On other and higher grounds, the allegations made by the 'Reforma Pacifica' and its friends are still more indefeasible.

I understand the parties interested in this fallen champion of the cause of Paraguay refuse to take charge of the wreck of the printing office, and intend making the Government responsible for a considerable sum, which is intended to cover all the damages sustained, including, it is said, a compensation for the moral disquietude suffered by the directors of the 'Reforma.'

The polemical element enters for much in all this, for, as to the assertion made by the 'Siglo' that Montevideo has witnessed with the greatest indignation the excesses of a handful of 'chusma,' this is simply false; because the vast majority of Montevidean inhabitants have witnessed with the most complacent equanimity the destruction of one of the organs of 'public opinion!' To-day is a holiday—the declaration of Independence of the Republic in 1825—and business is consequently suspended.

To-night Madame Mollo and company perform 'Hernani' in Solis.

LATEST FROM CONCORDIA.

The 'Republicano' of the 24th says the fugitive Paraguayans from the battle-field of Yatay succeeded in crossing the Uruguay and joining their countrymen in Uruguayana. The besieging Generals had given the intruders a peremptory date to surrender the town. Major Duarte is to be sent prisoner to Buenos Ayres: it seems the other prisoners are drafted into the allied vanguard under Flores. The Argentine army, under General Mitre, concluded shifting its encampment on the 24th, and has now taken up quarters near the Brazilian army at Aguirregrande. The rumor of the grand army taking the field has been, therefore, premature.

Mr. Cortes, the magician, and Mme. Sereno are giving theatricals at Concordia.

LATEST FROM RIO JANEIRO.

The Ironclad Tamandaré, launched on the 23rd from Ilha das Cobras, is 160 feet long, 30 wide and 10 deep. The weight of her hull was then 322 tons; her average draft 5 to 6 feet; when ready for sea she will draw 8 feet. Her screw is to be driven by an 80 horse power engine (nonsinal); she will carry coal for six days and will be armed with two 70 pound rifled pivot cannon.

The Brazilian Corvette Imperial Marinho, while sailing from Santa Catarina to Rio, was lost at 7 o'clock on the 24th on the coast near Guaratuba. After leaving Santa Catarina she encountered cloudy weather and a storm, during which time no observations could be taken, and during the

night of the 24th, when the wind went down, she was driven towards Guaratuba. She took ground early in the morning. Having only one boat left, some women swam ashore with lines and all on board were safely landed as well as some biscuit and other necessaries.

On the night of the 23rd the National Museum was robbed; it is supposed by an Italian, who concealed himself in the building when closed in the afternoon and escaped through a window, three of which were found open, leaving behind some matches, pieces of candles, and a paper in Italian of instructions as to the robbery, recommending him first to take the diamonds, then the gold dust and the gold and silver medals and coins. However, notwithstanding the instructions and abundance of time at command, he merely carried off four large diamonds and some small ones, and some coins and medals, many of them copper, leaving valuable gold and silver ones behind and most of the diamonds, thirteen of these being even found on the floor.

Three steamers bought by Admiral Grenfell are on their way out.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday two steamers arrived early, one from Concordia and the other from Montevideo. The only thing we could find out from head-quarters was that President Mitre had written to the Vice President advising him that Flores had crossed the river Uruguay with four thousand men, and that the Paraguayans were completely hemmed in. It is generally believed that this army will surrender unconditionally; it has moved out of Uruguayana, but we cannot discover that it is retreating.

It was rumored on the mole yesterday that several of the Oriental refugees had crossed into Corrientes and taken side with the Paraguayans. We cannot say how true this may be, but it seems beyond all doubt they have been ordered to leave Entre Rios.

We regret to chronicle the death of a countryman in Villa Lujan, who died from injuries received in the late terrible storm. It appears the poor man was occupied minding his sheep, when a fearful gust came which fairly blew him and his horse over. He was taken to a neighboring estancia and received every care, but all in vain; he expired last Sunday.

The people in Zarate want to know what about the extension of the Northern Railway to that town. We fear there is little hope of its being carried out until after the termination of the war.

Mr. Mills, the able contractor who so creditably finished the northern line to San Fernando and the Tigre, leaves for England in the Cordova. We regret the Government could not have arranged with him to remain and continue the road to our camp towns, where it is so much required. Zarate is a growing place, and by passing through Pilar and Capilla del Señor, this company would secure the great wool trade of the north. We hope to see our friend, Mr. Mills, soon back amongst us again.

The latest novelty is selling sheep by sample. Our country readers will scarcely credit this, yet it is a fact, and an auction will take place next week in Calle Lima, where one sheep is placed as a sample, and one thousand of the same class, quality and age as the sample will be knocked down to the highest bidder.

A splendid estancia on the banks of the Paraná, in the district of Zarate, will shortly be offered for sale. We hear the price asked is seven hundred thousand dollars currency.

It was rumored through town yesterday that Carreras, Aguirre and other blanco refugees in Entre Rios, had arrived and gone down to Montevideo in the Mercy, where they propose going on board the Vad-ras, which is lying at that port.

In the partidos of Dolores and Pils, we hear the Commandantes have caught a number of deserters, and that the Government has information that out further there are many more.

Mr. Thomson's letter to Lord Jolu Russell, relative to free navigation of the rivers, which we publish in another column, will be read with much interest, as an important official document. Several parties expect the French Steamer in port to-morrow, but we do

not think she will arrive before Tuesday. Her news is looked for with great anxiety.

Capt. Johnston, ex-commander of the Dotorell, who was so very ill at Rio from the effect of wounds received in Calle Cerrito in this city, has, we are happy to say, so far recovered as to be able to proceed to England; where we hope he will arrive perfectly recovered. Quere: what has become of the serenos who committed the assault, why have they not been tried and punished?

We hear of several passengers who have already engaged their berths in the steamer Cordova for the home voyage. Captain Batty is a great favorite here, and his steamer one of the most popular trading with this port. We recommend all our friends who think of revisiting the old country not to lose the present opportunity.

There are few, beyond the brokers, who have a correct idea of the enormous consumption of Kerosene in this city. No trade in Buenos Ayres is so steadily on the increase as this, thousands and tens of thousands of gallons arrive in port, and yet it all sells well at current prices. The American Kerosene trade at present is greater than the former important business done in American flour, and yet we are told that in several Argentine provinces Petroleum springs exists: is there no one anxious to look these oil springs up?

Our colleague in Rioja complains that he has only eight subscribers, and that all the wealthy men of that city go about borrowing a paper. This is really a hard case, but if all our readers in the camp were subscribers, we should have fully five times as many names on our list.

We learn on good authority that some two hundred rifled cannons are being cast, bored, and rifled in this city. We hope due care will be taken in the manufacture of these guns as the lamentable accident attending the trial of a Montevidean gun last year is still fresh in our memories.

The Liverpool steamer Herschell took from Montevideo to Rio Janeiro, five hundred bags of flour, and two hundred and ten capones, besides three hundred and twenty two bales of wool for Europe, hides, tallow, &c.

Yesterday we were visited by an English gentleman who came from Mandisobí; he gave us a most graphic description of the state of the country, but says that amongst the Entre Rios the greatest enthusiasm for peace exists.

The Argentine Government has received a note from the French Consul respecting the approaching Paris Exhibition, and has named the following gentlemen to constitute a committee to send Argentine products to the exhibition:—Dr. D. J. M. Gutierrez, Sr. D. G. de Posadas, D. E. Olivera, D. Leonardo Pereyra, D. Daniel Maxwell, D. M. Rom, D. Juan Hannah, D. Damian Hadson, D. Samuel B. Hale and D. Antonio Saulé.

Commander Keen has received a magnificent banner for his regiment, worked by some patriotic young ladies; it will be blessed in the usual manner on Wednesday morning.

The Rio de la Plata arrived yesterday; she brought little news from Montevideo. The absorbing topic is the 'Reforma Pacifica,' one of the owners being a Scotch gentleman he has made a formal claim for heavy damages: we hear, ten thousand pounds.

We perceive that the committee has reported unfavorably on Sor. Van Pret's claim. The question was then discussed by the whole house, and we believe ultimately passed.

The subscription to aid the poor families who have been driven from their homes by the Paraguayan invaders is going on favorably, the following gentlemen have been named as committee to carry out the project:—Sres. Dn. Juan Jose Mendez, Juan José Camellino, José Antonio Acosta, Bernardo Itarsape and Mariano Vargela.

M. Pallieri has favored us with a beautiful lithograph copy of the splendid oil painting. A troop of waggons in the Pampa, the joint production of his palette and that of the gifted and lamented Sheridan. The figures and landscape are excellently designed, and the picture, as a 'tout ensemble,' would alone suffice to stamp the reputation of any artist. So unique and harmonious is the effect, that no one

would fancy it to be the work of a painter. Besides its artistic merits, it is a 'souvenir' of the brotherly affection which existed during life between our lamented countryman and the talented French painter. It is lithographed by Vizier, and may be seen at this office.

We are a present reading Dr. Avelaneda's work on 'Public Lands,' of which he was kind enough to send us a copy, and in a few days we shall review it.

Mr. Brill has sent round 'Harper's Monthly' for June: we have also received the 'Revista de B. Ayres.'

THE FLORES EXPEDITION.

(Army Correspondence by Col. Fallejas.)

Crossing the Miriñay—Skirmish with the enemy—Scarcity of horses—Conference with Baron Jacay—Incorporation of Paunero—The poor Paraguayans.

August 9th. Our army still stationary: all day getting across the artillery and ammunition. Lost only one powder waggon from boat upsetting. Col. Regules and 20 men helped the artillery-men to load and unload the pieces and baggage on the rafts which were of very rude construction. All is safely across, and we continue our march to-morrow. Thank God! we have done with the passage of the Miriñay. Some say the enemy is actually crossing the Uruguay to join the other column in Rio Grande; others that he is still in and about Restauracion. We should be sorry the former news was true, as we are really anxious to measure swords with them, but I fear they will not wait our attack in Restauracion: if they do, they are certainly lost. Col. Amuedo is coming to join us with 135 cavalry, and Gen. Flores has despatched Col. Belen to meet him and shew him the way. To-day two men have deserted from my battalion when sent to fetch water; one of them was a negro sailor from New Granada, very fond of liquor; the other, a fellow named Iglesias, was a very bad character from the Maldonado cavalry. This makes 21 desertions already from my battalion.

August 10th. Marched at 8.30 a.m. and encamped 1 1/2 leagues from the mouth of the Miriñay on a branch of that river. Frost last night again, which killed two Brazilian women, and a sharp wind all day: assisted at the women's funeral they; died for want of sufficient covering. Learned to-day of a skirmish with the enemy's vanguard, in which Payba and Reguera killed 1 officer and 14 men; the loss of the Correntinos was only one man wounded. The fair Brazilian refugees who visited us at the pass of Miriñay came again to see us, accompanied by two Correntina young ladies, one of them surpassingly beautiful: we passed a very pleasant evening with them. Col. Bustamante sent us a present of 86 pairs of shoes for my corps, which is a godsend, for my men are barefoot, and many have their feet full of thorns and sores.

August 11th. Order to march at 7 a.m., but prevented by bad weather: it is a pity the rain should stop us, as we want to catch the Paraguayans in Restauracion, and Paunero is waiting for us, having crossed to this side of the Miriñay: an aide-de-camp arrived from him with letters, for me. Raining all day; cold bitter weather. At night-fall the rain came down in torrents; the 'bañado' became a sea, the ground a morass, and we rose covered with mud, a thick fog prevailing.

August 12th. At 8 a.m. put the tents in one of the waggons, as the men were unable to carry them. General Flores ordered the carts and women to remain here till after the battle. Poor women! what a terrible separation from their husbands and lovers. Marched at 8.30 a.m. through ground covered with water, with feet and legs bare, over 5 leagues, only halting once for a rest. At 2.15 p.m. encamped in a wood called 'Algarroba del Miriñay.' The country we marched over was fine and open, sloping down to the Uruguay, and very suitable for a battlefield, but so bare of pasture that our horses are dying of hunger, and we shall be entirely afoot unless we get fresh 'caballadas' from Brazil or Banda Oriental.

Baron Jacay has arrived on a visit to General Flores to concert operations: he asked our General for 2,000 infantry as the Brazilians are short-handed, but this has been refused by Flores who

says he wants all his forces till he has finished off the enemy on this side, and then he will pass over to settle these in Uruguayana. People may laugh at us for counting the victory as certain, but we shall be confident of it, and if not we feel at least die like heroes. We know that Paunero is close at hand, and to-morrow we shall unite with him. The weather continues bad, the rains have so swollen the Uruguay that I think some Brazilian gunboats might venture up the falls to complete the feat. The enemy's garrison in Uruguayana is so hard pressed by Canavarro that they have to get meat from this side of the Uruguay, and when the Brazilians are reinforced they will fall on the invaders.

August 13th. Struck tents at 8.30 a.m. and marched in 4 columns, along a range of hills: infantry in the centre and cavalry on the flanks. Gen. Flores leading the way with band of music. Halted only once for 10 minutes, and made 3 leagues at a stretch, passing 'cañadas' and marshes with bogs bare. At 11.30 a.m. reached San Joaquin a small tributary of the Miriñay, and camped in a snug corner with plenty of pasture, wood and water. General Paunero, encamped within 1,500 yards of us with his Division: Col. Chenan and some other officers have come to visit Gen. Flores, who received them with bands of music playing the Brazilian, Argentine and Montevidean anthems. I was glad to see my old friends of the siege of Montevideo. Several of our officers went to visit Gen. Paunero. The incorporation of the two armies is now effected, and nothing can explain the stupidity of the enemy in not preventing it: they should have fallen on us when crossing the Miriñay, and then finished off Paunero who was making a most hazardous march, changing his base of operations in presence of a superior enemy. They shall pay dearly for their error.

We are now but 3 leagues from the enemy whose advanced forces are on the Arroyo Casipiqué, with our vanguard under Payba, Madariaga and Reguera in front. This evening great activity was noticed in their lines, and they may attempt to fall back on learning the approach of Flores with 4000 cavalry. Paunero has 24 pieces of flying artillery perfectly equipped, and 3,250 men including 9 batts. of infantry and the 1st reg. of cavalry. To-morrow we shall have the pleasure of saluting the enemy so long sought for, and then the military operations will commence in earnest, with the motto 'to do or to die.'

MOVEMENTS OF GEN. HORNOS.

The 'Tribuna' of Montevideo says: All the central departments of Corrientes have risen to a man. General Hornos had made a rapid movement to the south of the river Corrientes in order to cut off all communication between the Paraguayans on the Parana and those on the Uruguay. In consequence of the defeat of Yatay all the Correntinos hidden in the woods were about to rise against the invaders, and by this time all that part of Misiones north of Paso los Libres will be free from the Paraguayans, as they must draw off their scattered forces towards Candelaria. General Hornos received a contingent of 1000 men from Candelaria, and Gov. Lagratta had sent arms and clothing for them. The Paraguayans were afraid to cross the Santa Lucia, which river was defended by the irregulars of Caceres. The army of the latter, near Goya, had distinctly heard the cannonade of the battle of Yatay, over 30 leagues distant.

THE PARIS EXHIBITION OF 1867.

French Legation, Buenos Ayres, May 2nd, 1865. To the Minister of the Interior of the Argentine Republic. Monsieur le Ministre,—The Government of H.M., the Emperor of the French, has ordered me to inform you officially of two decrees, dated June 22nd and February 1st last past, ordering a Universal Exposition to be opened at Paris on May 1st, 1867 for articles of agriculture, industry, and fine-arts. Another decree, published in the 'Moniteur' of February 21st, has placed this great international festival under the direction of a Committee provided over by H.I.H. Prince Napoleon. Such election clearly shows the importance ascribed by the Emperor to the success of the Universal Exposition.

As concerns the Committee, it is composed of Ministers and high dignitaries of State, besides men of suitable distinction.

My Government hopes your Excellency will gladly lend your valuable assistance appointing authorities who may confer with the Imperial Committee.
