THE TRUE STATE OF AFFAIRS.

THE ARGENTINE LOAN.

LOAN FOR PARAGUAY.

London, December 8th, 1865.

To the Editors of the "Standard."
 Since my last (Nov. 8th) very little of interest has taken place except the emission of the new Austrian Loan at about 60; and speaking of this and other demands on this market, the "Times" hits at all right and left, but strange to say in enumerating all doing and to be done this very valuable paper should have forgotten the demand for £2½ millions for Buenos Ayres and £5 millions for Paraguay; we suppose this oversight has taken place out of sympathy to the latter and interest to the former. Brazilian scrip is only 2½ premium, notwithstanding the Rothschilds managing this, and Montevideo is quite forgotten to be quoted and has gradually disappeared. I hope and trust our Buenos Ayrean loan may not prove a seven month abortion—but carried through with success. Mr. Bareiro, Chargé d'Affaires for Paraguay is here on a short visit, making a tour to the different courts where he is accredited. The object is not known.

Austria and Prussia are picking away at Frankfurt, but find it a nut too hard for them to crack; it is said that Rothschild refused the Austrian loan for this reason, showing by this his patriotism to his birth place, though at the same time Consul-General for Austria.

The Queen will open Parliament on dit, H. Gracious Majesty is hard up for money to fit out another little German Prince, brother to the pretender of Schleswig-Holstein, and this looks as if some future day a brawl may arise in the midst of this Royal family, as here Dane and Duchy meet, and Prussia is between them.

All sympathy here is with Chile against Spain, but there will be no interference and the affair will end in Notes Diplomatique, and Spain will have satisfaction, if the United States do not interfere, as is feared, and prevent such.

"L'Empereur s'Amuse," with private theatricals and battues at Compiègne. The part best performed was the Princess Metternich as a 'Hack Driver,' and the little Prince as the 'future.' General Schofield, with his aide-de-camp and some general officers are on a private mission at Paris, and I fear poor Maximilian is the object of this visit.

Great anxiety is felt about the Emperor Franz Joseph's visit to Pesth and opening of the Hungarian Parliament, as the demands of Hungary are classified by the German Provinces as exorbitant.

Before closing, I shall let you know a little affair, 'a la Guy Fawkes,' but a few days later in November, which has been hushed up, and not published in papers here or on the Continent. A Contra Banque was formed at Wiesbaden to break the Gaming Bank, but not with rouleaux of mil francs, but with small Orsini bombs, and intended to blow the whole establishment in the air; luckily it was discovered during the operation of placing, and the parties and accomplices are all now in prison. If the train had been fired there would have been a great loss of life, as the saloons were full with visitors.

THE PACIFIC MAILS.

REMOVED DEATH OF ADMIRAL PAREJA.

ONLY VALPARAISO AND CALDERA BLOCKADED.
 Owing to the delay in getting our Chilean exchanges, yesterday, we have only a bulletin of the 'Tribuna' with the news from the Pacific.

Admiral Pareja on learning of the loss of the Covadonga was greatly affected, and going into his cabin dressed himself 'en grande tenue,' wrote three letters, to Marshal O'Donnell, to the commander of the Numancia (Nufez Mendez), and to his family, then blew his brains out. The officers found him quite dead, and threw the corpse overboard, but succeeded in keeping it a secret till Dec. 19th.

The Intendente of Valparaiso, by order of the Chilean Government, wrote a letter of condolence to Capt. Topete of the 'Blanca,' offering sepulture to Pareja's remains, but the latter replied in a letter of thanks, that the remains of the Admiral were already in the bottom of the Pacific. The commander of the Numancia succeeds to Pareja's command of the Spanish fleet: on Dec. 21st he passed a note to the foreign Consuls intimating that the blockade was raised on all ports except Valparaiso and Caldera.

The news from Peru is of no importance, and the Dictador Prado has not yet dared to declare war against Spain or break the treaties signed by Pexet.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Arno was in port yesterday at daybreak: her news was anticipated by the San Roman, and appeared in our paper of Thursday, but we publish to-day some telegrams of importance and the latest news from Jamaica. We have no news of the intended Argentine Loan. The English papers are full of comments upon the Jamaica rebellion, and mostly condemn Governor Eyre for undue severity: sensation meetings, to sympathise with the murdered negroes who have already cost Great Britain so much, have been convened by the Mayors of Liverpool, Birmingham, and the other large towns. A dreadful fire has occurred at the Compton House, Liverpool: the worst known since the burning of the Sailor's Home.

At 11 a.m. yesterday it was announced the Tala had arrived in the Tigre with the Pacific Mails: and startling news from Chile: Admiral Pareja has committed suicide. We give the news elsewhere.

The Post-master-general has notified Mr. Loedel that he cannot establish a branch post-office, for forwarding letters to Montevideo, at the new English book-store: this is in virtue of the old decree which shut up the Buzones at the Club and Sala de Comercio.

The 'Nacion' states that the titular Kings of the African population in this city paid a round of visits on the Feast of the Epiphany to the national authorities and Foreign Consuls, at the same time reading an amusing manifesto bearing the signatures of Antonio Antefia, and José Antonio Bauza, who consider themselves lineal descendants of the Magi or Kings of the East.

The port of Laguna de los Padres is at last opened to commerce, Mr. C. Robertson having just finished laying the splendid iron mole, recently constructed in the United States. We read in the 'Tribuna' that it is 150 yards long and 36 feet high. This important enterprise had been twice attempted, with ill-success, and we have to congratulate Mr. Robertson on his carrying it out, as it will open up the valuable Southern camps.

Owing to the arrival of the Packet we delayed despatching the 'Weekly Standard' for the Northern departments till yesterday, in order to send enclosed our supplements from London. Town subscribers are requested to send to the office for them.

Mr. Zumaran's carriage was captured the other day in Montevideo, owing to the negligence of the coachman; luckily, the horses were tame, and the driver was safe.
 Mr. O'Donnell, whose editorial ambition induces him to take charge of the 'Esperanza,' in Corrientes, has resigned the pen and resumed the sword. We hear that there has been a serious editorial row consequent on the election of the new Governor, Mr. Thomas de J. Luque, who is at present in Buenos Ayres, has been named Juez de Primer Instancia, in the little town of Goya, and accepted the perilous post.

In the middle of the Paraná, at the Paso de la Patria, there is a large island which is held by the Paraguayans. The island is not fortified, but from its peculiar locality it can only be held by a regiment of swimmers, for the sand banks prevent the approach of even small boats. The Paraguayan soldiers seem to be a sort of amphibious race; the other day General Hornos, with some officers, galloped down to the banks of the Paraná about 20 Paraguayans, that were hid amongst the bushes, jumped into the river like so many 'yacares,' or alligators, and swam across, to the no small astonishment of the Buenos Ayrean General.

It is said in Corrientes that nearly all the Paraguayans who pass over to the allies are spies, and that after remaining a few days with the army they desert. Lopez knows everything that passes in the allied camp, and we even hear that when the Decidée was at Humaitá they saw the latest papers from Buenos Ayres.

The Baron of Port Alegre, at the head of one wing of the Brazilian army, stationed at San Borja, is preparing to cross into Paraguay at the north-east frontier. The soldiers are waiting for uniforms and supplies, which, owing to the low state of the rivers, can with difficulty be sent up.

Governor Oroño, of Santa Fe, is, without doubt, one of the most active Governors in the Argentine Republic: he pays flying visits to all the towns in the Province. A very serious row occurred recently between the colonists of Esperanza and Sres. Lopez y Torres; the Governor seeing that the dispute threatened to be serious, started off for the colony, and then and there adjusted the matter. He passed then on to the other colonies, and visited the farmers—travelling thus 24 leagues.

The latest dates we have from Catamarca are of a pleasing character. His Excellency is busy with the surveyor, laying out the site for a new town to be called Villa de San Jose de Piedra Blanca.

M. Lavergne, of Cordova, we understand is at present in Rosario, and shortly to visit this city. This gentleman is the proprietor of some very valuable lands near Frayle Muerte, which we understand he offers for sale on most reasonable terms.

An English estanciero from Entre Rios has called on us to say that it is all fudge, the rumors about a sea or drought in Entre Rios; the camps were never in a better condition. An Englishman is about to buy several leagues of Garcia's camp—we believe the price is ten thousand patacons per league.

We hear grave complaints about the new decree respecting stamped paper; formerly a 'pagaré' or promissory note could, although written on plain paper, be, within a certain period, stamped in town, but since the 1st January this privilege or convenience has been abolished to the small annoyance of all business men—the Government should at least, if it abolishes the privilege of stamping plain paper, have stamped paper sold at convenient places: for instance, a man in the Plaza 'Once de Setiembre' who requires to sign a 'pagaré' must come down town for the purpose, as nearer than the Government House no stamped papers can be obtained. We would suggest the propriety of the Government at once establishing agencies throughout the town for the sale of stamped paper.

It is currently believed that the Government, through Sr. Riestra, has received proposals for the purchase of the Western Railway, but as yet nothing authentic respecting this has trans-

pired: some people go so far as to say that the English Bank will be the buyer, but this we think is highly improbable, as to look up so much money in a railway would be a most serious inconvenience to the general commercial public.

A most glaring case of forgery of Bank of Brazil notes has just been discovered in Paris, and several parties apprehended, but the ring-leader it is said left Europe and came to Brazil with millions of the bogus bills in his possession.

The public bathing establishment alongside the 'Bolsa' is at last open, and we believe meets with much support from the brokers. We regret to say, however, that there is no swimming bath, which is a great drawback.

Our colleague the 'Nacional,' we are happy to remark, takes sides with us about the forlorn, neglected, and abandoned condition of Quilmes, a nice little town which if it had its rights ought to be one of the most rising places in this province; but Quilmes has been victimized by a set of splanetic Italians and diligence owners, and the Boca and Enseñada Railway has been brought to a stand-still by a trumpety petition got up and signed by the unwashed crowd of South Barracas. It is to be hoped, however, that the talented Minister of Finance of Buenos Ayres will lend Mr. Wheelwright a helping hand, and assist him to overcome the difficulties which oppose his crossing the Riachuelo. The people sigh for the Railway, and from an influential party there we gather that if the road is continued out to Quilmes the Municipality of that town will, at its own expense, lay out a large People's park on the home style, which would serve as a pleasant outlet for the citizens; but the diligence men of Barracas have with this mock petition stopped Mr. Wheelwright and paralyzed the works of the railway, which is an insult to the institutions of the country, and a slur on the good fame and reputation of the progressive administration of D. Mariano Saavedra. The people of Quilmes have a right to be heard; the Boca Railway open as it is to the Tres Esquinas is neither a convenience to the public, nor a paying speculation for the Empresarios, the sooner therefore that the trains run out to the Church Plaza in South Barracas the better for all save the Italian diligence-men and the shopkeepers at the Bridge.

The Gas Company we hear cannot get a farthing out of the Municipality. The long law-suit has been finished, the price agreed on arranged, and the cash each month agreed on, and yet, although the Company made a present of millions to the Municipality, to settle the dispute, now the monthly sum cannot be paid. Still, notwithstanding all this, the Municipality wants the Gas Company to put up lamps on the mole, and also to light some of the newly paved streets. The Gas Company of Buenos Ayres ought to imitate the example set by the Montevidean Company, and that is, stop the supply. The Montevidean Theatre Company were trying on the Municipal plan and not paying the gas bills, Mr. Kock put out the lights, and then — the Solis Company had to pay.

The Oneida, from England, brought in her last trip £300,000 for Rio, part of the Brazilian loan. On dit, President Mitre has asked for one and a half million patacons from the Brazilian Government, which we believe will be advanced.

The Juez de Paz of San Miguel has moved his office to 256 Cangallo, where all lawsuits henceforward will be tried. Foreigners wishing to vote for Municipales are called on to register themselves.

Mr. Viale, a well known Italian merchant, for many years a resident in the Plate, died on Tuesday night. He left a very large property.

Mr. Meeks, the renowned American photographer, who has his gallery on the top of our office, leaves shortly for the States, having, according to one of our colleagues, amassed a colossal fortune, photographing the Portefios.

Major Mansilla has written from the allied camp contradicting the rumor that he corresponds with the newspapers. We can testify that we never received a line from him.

ARRIVAL OF THE ARNO.

The Arno left Rio at 9 a.m. on the 6th instant, and experienced, on weather and fair winds, a passage which port she made at 1 p.m. on the 10th inst., after a passage from Rio of 4 days and 4 hours.

The Arno would have left Montevideo for Buenos Ayres the same evening, but being a short time over 12 o'clock noon in arriving at Montevideo, she was detained until Thursday, and left at 4 p.m.

The E.M.S. Mersey arrived at Southampton on the 9th December, just as the mail was starting.

REUTER'S TELEGRAMS.

Rome (via Marseilles), Nov. 29.
 It is officially announced that the Papal Government is under the necessity of concluding a new loan of 50 millions of lire, to be guaranteed upon ecclesiastical property.

The Neapolitan brigands, who have been surrounded by Papal troops, have asked to be allowed to surrender without submitting to any rigorous conditions. The number of this band of brigands is 350, all armed with revolvers.

Madrid, Dec. 2.
 The health of the Queen continues to improve. Her Majesty, if sufficiently recovered, will open the Cortes in person.

It is semi-officially stated that Spain will shortly be in a position to increase her fleet in the Pacific to twenty-five vessels.

The 'Correspondencia' of to-day says:—

"Several journals assert that the Government has sent orders to Admiral Pareja to suspend the attack upon Chilli. We affirm that such orders have not been given. The Government is not even disposed to accept the mediation of a neutral Power."

The same paper says:—
 "General Espartero cannot oppose the reigning dynasty, his wife having accepted last week a post at court with a salary of 50,000 reals, for which the lady has addressed an affectionate letter of thanks to her Majesty."

Orders have been despatched by the Minister of Marine to all the naval arsenals to push forward the repairs and the building of all war vessels now in course of construction. Three new steam frigates and two transports, with 2,400 marines at present at Cadiz, will shortly be ready for sea.

Vienna, Dec. 2.

The Constitutional Committee of the Diet for Upper Austria, sitting at Linz have drawn up the draft of an address, in which they unreservedly declare themselves opposed to the September patent, and demand the re-establishment of a constitutional state of things.

Stockholm, Dec. 2 (Evening).

A contract with several German banks was signed to-day at the office of the National Debt for a loan of nine millions of thalers for the construction of Swedish railways.

Paris, Dec. 6th.

It is stated that General Schofield is not entrusted with any political mission, and that he visits Europe for the benefit of his health, with the intention of making a lengthened stay on the Continent.

Florence, Dec. 6th.
 This evening the Chamber of Deputies elected Senor Mari to the office of President by 141 votes out of 273 members voting, after two ballots between Signore Mari and Mordini. The process of confirming the elections to the Chamber is very nearly terminated.

Klausenburg, Dec. 2.
 It is stated that the Saxon members of the Transylvanian Diet are all in favour of union with Hungary in principle. Some of the members even desire unconditional union.
 Madrid, Dec. 7th.

The 'Correspondencia' of this evening says it is possible that the Court may return to Madrid on the 13th or 15th inst.
 It also denies the rumours that the Queen is in ill health.

Florence, Dec. 8th.
 In the election for President of the Chamber of Deputies Signor Mari obtained in the first voting 112, Mordini 82, and Rattazzi 79 votes. In the second the numbers were Mari 116, Mordini 91, and Rattazzi 76. At the final balloting Signor Mari obtained 141, and Mordini 132 votes.

St. Nazaire, Dec. 8th.
 The mail steamer from Mexico, arrived here, brings confirmation of the news of cholera having broken out in Guadalupe.

Paris, Dec. 8.
 The 'Patrie' of this evening states that negotiations are taking place between Austria and Mexico for the more speedy enrolment of the 10,000 Austrians, who, under the original arrangement were to be recruited in five years at the rate of 2,000 every year. The King and Queen of Portugal are shortly expected in Paris.

Stockholm, Dec. 8.
 The Chamber of the Clergy to-day unanimously passed the Government bill for the reform of the constitution, which has now been adopted by the four Chambers of the Legislature.

Great public festivities, including a serenade of the Ministers and a general illumination, are being prepared to commemorate this event, which has excited the utmost enthusiasm and rejoicing throughout the country.

Paris Bourse, Dec. 5.
 There was a decided reaction to-day from yesterday's high prices; and the bulls—now a very small and greatly discouraged minority—are extremely despondent. The bulk of speculators cannot be blamed for viewing the imminent demise of the King of the Belgians as anything but favourable to a rise; the reports concerning the Schofield mission and the dread which prevails of a positive understanding between France and Prussia have also an influence on the speculative mind. In short, despondency seems the order of the day.

Berlin, Dec. 6th.
 The semi-official 'Provincial Correspondenz' of to-day says:—
 "Since the conclusion of the Gastein Convention the negotiations between Austria and Prussia upon the question of the Duchies have been completely discontinued. All statements by journals of offers or proposals by Prussia, or of declarations on the part of Austria, are mere inventions. No interchange of views, either written or verbal, for effecting a settlement of this question has taken place. All assertions of an intended extraordinary mission to Vienna are equally unfounded."

Vienna, 16th.

In to-day's sitting of the Lower Austrian Diet, the draft of the Address to the Emperor against the September Patent, as proposed by the Constitutional Committee, was adopted by a large majority. The Address has been the subject of animated debate in the Diet during the last three days. An Address has been brought forward in the Carinthian Diet, demanding the re-establishment of the constitution and of the Reichsrath.

NEW LOANS IN LONDON.
