THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

STARTLING TELEGRAM FROM SINBAD.

THE TREASON TRIALS.

Esquina, Jan. 13th.

Gentlemen,

The newly elected Governor has been duly installed in office. He has issued a circular to his fellow-citizens imploring their aid to help him through with the arduous task he has before him, thanking them for the high favor conferred and confessing his incapacity to fill the important post. The Vice-Governor has peremptorily declined serving, he publicly pronounces the election to have been an illegal farce throughout, telling his constituents the present incumbent is not their choice. Be it as it may, Don Evaristo Lopez was not spoken of aloud as a candidate till within an hour of the time when he was proclaimed Governor by the majority of the electoral votes. There are many that are clamorous to have the election annulled, and the question again mooted no matter if at the electoral table or upon the open plain with "bayonet, blade and spear." It is not sufficient that we have any number of defiant foes from without to contend with, enough in all conscience to appease any desire of inaugurating intestine broils at the present moment. Strange to say, there are those whose inclination for fighting is as great as was that of the Gentleman who had partaken freely of the hospitality at Donnybrook, met a friend upon his road home, whom he knocked down, not from any momentary disgust or old grudge or malice: no other motive impelled him to the commission of the act but pure love. At the time this was done we are told there was something wrong with the assailant's heart as well as his head. Shut up in the 'calabos' of Corrientes are a dozen persons, to whom additions are daily being made, charged with being guilty of 'incivism': the reare numbers more at large in Paraguay, in your city, and elsewhere, who are charged with the same crime.

The trials of all are set down for an early day. The public accuser has formally demanded, that they may be speedily judged and the punishment due to open traitors summarily inflicted. Query? Would it not be more business-like to apprehend the absentees first, and then apply the law? The judges certainly hold the fugitives to be very deficient of 'mother wit,' or not even to understand the plainest dictates of common sense, when they suppose any of the criminals would give heed to the like requests or threats, or dream of returning and submit voluntarily to the tribunal that held their fate, within the palm of the hand,—and where the penitent's life and death was to be the subject of debate, to undergo the chastisement due to high treason, which crime they are all undoubtedly guilty of. Mr. Billinghurst's name is upon the list of the absent: Mr. B. has been settled in Corrientes for the last twenty three years, engaged in extensive commercial transactions and noted for being upright and honorable in his dealings, he is married to a native. The supposed unlawfulness of the elections, and the procrastination of the passage of the Parana are the all-absorbing topics of the hour. The allied chiefs have without doubt strong reasons for acting as they are doing. The adage "delays are dangerous" in their case, ought to be kept in mind.

Permit, gentlemen, the repetition of what some of your readers are probably not conversant with, a retrospective glance at the manifold evils that

originated from delays—facts now pertaining to History. Lincoln was duly elected, yet ere he had been placed in the Presidential chair open rebellion to lawful authority manifested. To "squelch it out" the patriotism of the country was appealed to. At the beck of the President seventy thousand men rallied to the call, a number more than then was deemed sufficient to put down all sedition [which was looked upon as a question of a few days] and which might have been accomplished by "nipping the bud." Unfortunately there were a host of needy aspirants (more than twenty thousand) to be supplied with office. A debt of gratitude had to be paid and to cancel it all other considerations were foregone. As these were being invested with place and power many precious days and even weeks were lost. The rebels gained the time that put them in a position to contend for years against the fourfold odds in point of numerical strength, and tenfold in means or capital. It is not necessary to recapitulate the sad results of the delay. It will be the duty of some future Irving or Prescott to lament the deplorable mistake "at which the world turns pale." Other instances (they are legions) might be adduced. At the North matters were in statu quo. The Brazilian naval-officers continued to give music or flirt with the pretty Correntinas.

The allied army was preparing for an onward movement. The Correntino soldiers were taking French leave. All were eating beef and perspiring profusely. The thermometer in the shade 105°, the Paraguayans continued to persevere in petty marauding excursions made upon this side the Parana. A few breechless thieves have the imprudence to do so in the face of an army whose numbers have no parallel in the annals of South America. A new semi-weekly paper is being published at the capital under the title of La Nacionalista: it is edited by D. Pastor Obligado, a friend of progress; he has twenty-two subscribers in our village. Apropos of newspapers in our Department and village 'La Tribuna' has two subscribers 'La Nacion Argentina' two, the 'Standard' two, 'La Espana' one, 'El Mosquito' one and the local 'Esperanza' ten. No other newspapers are seen in the Department, that contains five thousand inhabitants, and has a superficial area of four thousand square miles. Although the soil is surpassed by none in the Argentine Confederation for fertility, cattle farming, or agricultural purposes, there are no English, Irish or Britons of the North to be found here. In fact there are only two persons in all the territory that can speak or read English. You Gentlemen can boast with reason that every soul contained in the district are subscribers to your paper who can read or understand the language in which it is printed. None of your colleagues can say as much.

Gentlemen, I mean to be at the Boca when the steamer passes; if anything, you shall know of it.

THE BOLSA MEETING.

BROKERS' SPEECHES.

FULL DETAILS, WITH AMUSING INCIDENTS.
On Monday, pursuant to notice, the general meeting of members and shareholders of the Bolsa was convened; a long, refectory-kind of table was placed a-stern of the speculation rail, the easy benches which adorn the hall taken from their customary places and placed in front of the table, ink-bottles, blotting-paper, etc., spread promiscuously around, and evident preparations made by the clerks of the establishment, to inspire the speculative multitude with the idea that heavy matters of importance were about to be discussed. The get-up of the place was decidedly business-like, and at half-past 2 o'clock, just as we entered the hall to take our editorial notes of the business of the day, a rapping on the table and the ringing of a small bell struck upon our ears, and at once reminded us of the fact that the business of the meeting was about to commence. As we approached the benches we saw the portly form of the Chairman, Mr. Daniel

Makinlay, in the centre of the table, surrounded by the committeemen, but, owing to the chatting that was going on, failed to catch his remarks; indeed, such was the noise at the time that we think, were we even sitting beside the Chairman, and armed with a pair of Abraham's acoustic machines, we should have been unable to hear one word that he said. Immediately on his concluding his remarks, Mr. Andrew Leguineche, the Secretary, in a clear, but utterly inaudible, voice, read the report, which yesterday we published in English. During the reading of the report we remarked that there was a regular stampede on the Bolsa; merchants and brokers left the hall, evidently taking no interest whatever in the proceedings. Mr. Andrew Leguineche sat down, when he finished reading the report, unaccompanied by a single cheer or hurrah, and the Chairman asked if any gentleman present had any remarks to offer? The assembled brokers looked enquiringly at each other when the Chairman put this interrogatory, and at last Mr. Oyuela rose and said,—

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen:—I have one objection to that report. I oppose giving power to the committee to buy Bolsa shares unless got dead cheap. It is almost unnecessary to remark there are many other ways of investing money profitably in this country. The reserve fund is now over \$100,000. With this little capital properly invested in sheep at no very distant day every member of the Bolsa may yet be an estanciero, (cheers) or, if we bound from the dull pampas of this Province, and dash into the interior, there territories may be purchased and dominions acquired with half this money. Let it not be supposed that I am illured by the visions of gossypium imaginary, but I hold that there should be some reserve about investing this reserve fund, which, under an economical administration, may be steadily augmenting each year, and thus rise to the colossal dimensions of a capital second to none other in the River Plate. Let us profit by the example of England. May I ask the Chairman what has become of the reserve fund which the immortal Pitt created for the redemption of the national debt? Did it not dissolve the moment it was touched? and will not our reserve fund meet the same fate if we disrespect the sacred character of the fund and give power to the committee to buy Bolsa shares? I oppose the motion, unless a price or limit be given to the Directors.

In consequence of the frightful noise going on at the portals of the hall between some ship-captains, we found it very difficult to follow the eloquent broker, but through the kindness of Mr. Salas we were able to get at the gist of Mr. Oyuela's remarks.

Owing to the great number of brokers who now wished to address the chair, a sort of desultory conversation sprung up, which Gurney himself would have been unable to report.

Mr. Greenway remarked that there was no necessity whatever for such noisy discussion about so unimportant a matter, and that he had many remarks to make on the report in question, which of course it was impossible to introduce so long as this argument continued.

Mr. J. Salas demanded to be heard, and asked the Chairman at what price it was intended to buy the shares.

Mr. Antonio Terrero, in a most eloquent strain, spoke to the motion, and suggested that it was only right and proper that the price of the shares should be fixed.

Mr. Domingues, who sat behind Mr. Greenway, also spoke to the motion, but such was the noise at the door that we failed to catch his remarks.

At last the motion was put to the meeting—all in favor of it stand up—and then and there the Chairman declared it carried.

Mr. J. Salas addressed the chair, and hoped that in counting those who stood up to support the measure, those gentlemen who, having no seats, could not therefore conveniently sit down, except on the floor, or on top of the speculation rail, were not included.

Vice Chairman.—Most certainly not. The next business brought before the meeting was touching the absentees

brokers. The motion was read by the Secretary.

That all brokers absent from the Bolsa for more than eight days should name a proxy; not doing so to be expelled the Bolsa or fined.

Mr. Oyuela again rose and, with true Demosthenic fire, pictured to the meeting the many difficulties which brokers have to contend with. Some had frequently to go to the camp on business, and if the wheel of the coach came off or the train missed, the absent broker ran the risk of being fined or expelled. The broker is, ex-officio, a traveller; he has to walk about town all day to get his commissions, and frequently, when he effects an important sale of land, he has to go out to the camp. Metaphorically speaking, the broker seldom requires a white umbrella to protect him against the sunshine of prosperity. And then, again, some brokers are called to the battle-field to uphold their country's flag. In a word, if a certain leave of absence, or Bolsa furlough, is to be specified, let us be generous, and at least allow a period of ten days.

Hereupon a desultory argument arose, before the termination of which many brokers left. One gentleman, whose name we do not know, remarked that ten days was hardly sufficient time to allow, as nearly all the brokers now and then take a run out to the camp, and if this motion was passed the travelling broker would have to go at full tilt through the estancias, run helter-skelter for the train or diligence, gallop to his friends' at a headlong, boisterous, impetuous, break-neck speed, and, in a word, be deprived of the 'otium cum dignitate' so necessary to all who are weighed down with specie calculations.

The ten days' furlough was then put and carried.

The next business was the election of a new Board of Directors, Messrs. Salas and Lezica acting as scrutineers. There was very little animation, yet notwithstanding the printed list invariably met with alterations, Messrs. Storp and Leslie seemed the favorites. Some votes were given for Mr. J. J. Mendez, which so excited the surprise of the chairman, that he asked was it possible to suppose Mr. Mendez would act when he declined to be Governor of Corrientes? This elicited the reply, that the chairmanship of the Bolsa was a far more influential post than that of Governor of Corrientes. The voting lasted a few minutes only, and the following is the result:—

LATEST FROM CORRIENTES

POSITION OF THE ALLIES.

We received yesterday the first number of a new journal started in Corrientes—'El Nacionalista,' the editor of which, we believe, is Dr. Pastor Obligado junr: it bears date January 6th.

A grand religious ceremonial took place in the Argentine camp on New Year's day, and after Mass the whole army defiled before Gen. Mitre. On the 7th the flag of the Morales batt. was blessed by Padre Vasquez. The Argentine army is still encamped at Eusemadita, and will push on about a mile, within three or four days. The forces of Flores are 1½ leagues from San Cosme; the Brazilians within 2 leagues of Corrientes.

A batch of 120 Paraguayan prisoners was daily expected at Corrientes, to be sent down to Montevideo. The Paraguayans are very daring in their nocturnal visits: a few nights ago they came across in canoes and carried off some horses and Paraguayan prisoners. Every night we hear of similar feats: near the forts of Itapirú a number of the enemy swam across to our side and took away two canoes, besides alarming an adjacent village, while the allies seem sleeping on their laurels.

The new Governor, D. Evaristo Lopez, has at length arrived, having been detained at Goye by a fit of sickness. He was publicly received on the 7th at Corrientes, the 6th batt. under Major Victoria doing the usual honors. A serenade went around the Plaza in the

evening to salute His Excellency. It is believed Dr. Benitez will be Minister of Government, and that the resignation of Vice-Governor Pampin will not be accepted. Numbers of sick from the Argentine army are crowding into the hospital, although there is no epidemic, and great praise is given to the efficient services of the Sisters of Charity.

We have dates from Paraná to the 12th inst. but they contain nothing of importance.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The sister steamer of the Porteña was to be launched on the 1st of Jan. Her name is the Oriental, and not the Montevideo, as our colleague states. She is much larger than the Porteña, being 230 feet long, and will draw 7 feet of water: very fast, fitted up with the most gorgeous magnificence, far superior to the Porteña or Mississippi. She will leave the States about the middle of February, and may be expected here about the middle of March. McKay and Aldus, the builders of the Porteña, are also the builders of the Oriental. She has been built expressly for the Montevideo route, and although of light draught, will be very steady in the water, and without any perceptible shaking or rocking. We may add, that every defect which the acute penetration of those connected with the Porteña discovered, has been expressly cared for and removed in the new steamer, so that she will be, beyond all question, the floating-palace of the river Plate. The Porteña and Oriental belong to the New York and River Plate Steamboat Company, of which Mr. George Savory is President.

Admiral Godon, U. S. Admiral for the River Plate station, has at last come up. We salute the gallant Admiral on his arrival in these waters. We hear that the United States' monitor Monadnock, which is at present in Rio Janeiro, is one of the most extraordinary vessels afloat. There is positively nothing of her over water but the turret, and crew, soldiers, and officers, '75 in number, live under water. As she draws 17½ feet water, she cannot come to Buenos Ayres.

A subscriber from Magdalena informs us that the finest and best wine in South America is now to be had at all the sheepfarmers' houses in the partido. At the Isla, or town, of Magdalena the hotel keepers are well supplied with the very best clarets, which they sell at \$4 per bottle. Two gauchos found a 'bordalesa' of wine on the beach the other day, and attempted to drag it home; getting very thirsty, they determined to bore a hole in the cask with their knives, but even this failed, the wine would not flow out, so they made a hole in the ground and a large hole in the barrel, turned it over, filled the hole, and then drank away until they became so intoxicated that they could not stir. They were found asleep next day by the neighbors.

We regret to announce the loss of the American pilot-boat Stella, on Lobos Island, last week. The captain jumped overboard and was drowned; he was a Swede. The Stella was cruising down there; she was not insured.

Mr. McDermott, one of our most popular pilots, brought an American war-vessel into the inner roads yesterday. The Admiral's ship, the Susquehannah, has remained at Montevideo. The Wasp, we hear, will proceed immediately to Paraguay, with the American Minister, Hon. Mr. Washbourne, on board. The heat at present is so terrific that it would be advisable to wait a few weeks, as New Orleans in the depths of summer is nothing to Asuncion in February.

Our agents in Montevideo, Messrs. Sprunck, have received from our office some of Abraham's hearing machines, which are at present such a rage amongst deaf people.

The intense heat yesterday is accounted for by the news we received from Luxan, where it has rained in torrents: all the country round is under water. In the summer months the heat is always greater after a heavy shower. The rain in Luxan has been a great god-send, as the pasturages were all drying up fast and the farmers getting greatly alarmed.

Mr. William McClymont, whom the Government named as Juez de Paz for the Guardia del Monte, this year, has, we regret to say, resigned, owing to his

inability to attend to the duties of the office. This is a great loss to the Partido. Men of Mr. McClymont's stamp are the proper persons to hold authority in the country.

A Basque, who was stopping at a house in Calle Mayo, was robbed on Monday of \$100,000, which he had in his boots. The house bears a bad name, and the police have arrested some suspected females.

Commander Vera has left Cordova with 200 men to give chase to some Montoneros on the frontiers, who are committing great depredations.

Our French colleague, the 'Courier de la Plata,' states that the Argentine Central Railway works are almost paralysed, owing to the great scarcity of hands.

The men who mutinied at the Retiro Barracks on Sunday night were French soldiers, which Ascasubi had just sent out. They were escaping over the wall of the barrack when a washerwoman at the Gas-house gave notice to the officer in command. Only about half-a-dozen got off.

The whole allied squadron has moved up the river and therefore the news in Sinbad's telegram seems improbable: however as he is generally speaking very correct we publish it.

SCOTCH MISSION IN B. ORIENTAL.

Every day a step forward. Last week we had to mention the progress of the American congregation at Rosario, a few days before it was the concursus of the Irish College at Flores, and now we have the pleasure of recording a notable move by the Scotch community in the River Plate to establish a mission in Banda Oriental. All these are unmistakable signs of the growing prosperity of the various classes of Englishmen in these countries, and of their zeal for the proper education of their families.

On Saturday last the Rev. Mr. McNeill left this city for Paysandú, on a missionary tour through the Banda Oriental. He will visit the various departments wherein there are Scotch settlers, and on determining the most central point for his residence will there establish himself for the religious care and attendance of his countrymen. The want of a clergyman of their persuasion has long been felt by the Presbyterian community of the neighboring Republic, and it speaks highly for their liberality, that the Scotchmen have made up an income of £300 per annum for the reverend gentleman above-named. Although our Scottish brethren in the River Plate are comparatively few, barely numbering 3,000 altogether, they have already three clergymen in the Province of Buenos Ayres with distinct missions, representing as many flourishing communities.

We believe the successful establishment of the new mission is due in great manner to the labors of our esteemed friend the Rev. H. Smith, senior pastor of the Scotch congregation. In congratulating him upon this occasion, we beg him also to convey our best wishes to the Rev. Mr. McNeill, hoping he will gain the same popularity in the Banda Oriental as the Scotch clergymen on this side deservedly enjoy.

MONTEVIDEO.

The English Racing Club—Pestalaro and the Gas Co.—Lalmi's benefit—Custom-house waifs—Bustamante of the sword and pen—Auction of coal British church meeting—Mr. John F. Wilson wanted—The new Philharmonic saloon—Steamer from Maldonado—The barque Amelia aground—News from Canelones.

The Foreign Races are to come off in the beginning of March, and arrangements are on foot to make it a very brilliant affair. On Saturday a meeting was held in the Policia, at which it was agreed to leave the direction of matters to the Englishmen, who were also to have a special meeting at the Foreign Club on the 15th inst, according to invitation of Mr. Uro Mac Kinlay, Hon. Sec. It is gratifying to learn that Government lends every assistance, having advised Mr. John Mc. Coll that it will give a sum of 2,000 towards preparing the ground and other preliminary expenses.

On the same day a meeting of a less harmonious kind took place in the Government-house, between Sor Pestalaro of the Opera Co. and Mr. Cock of the Gas Co. It was, however, arranged that the Gas Co. will continue to supply the Solis theatre on the same

terms as before, and the question of damages for not lighting the theatre on the 7th inst. will go for trial before the law-courts.

The Custom-house publishes a list of several hundred boxes and bales of stray and damaged goods lying in bond, which will be sold by auction if not claimed within 8 days.

The 'Siglo' seems getting into hot water with all its colleagues: after the row with Dr. Minelli of the 'Europa', it has excited the ire of the fighting editor of the 'Tribuna' Captain Bustamante.

Mr. Lettsom notifies the British public that the annual meeting of the British church committee, postponed on the 28th ult. owing to the non-attendance of members, will be held at the British Consulate on the 16th.

The Post-master General has received an afflicting letter from a lady in England, Mrs. Sophia Wilson, enquiring about her son John Fotherquill Wilson who left England in 1862.

The new saloon of the Sociedad Filarmonica is to be inaugurated on the 18th inst. with a grand concert.

We read of a new steamer shortly expected to arrive, which the 'Siglo' suggests should be put to run between M. Video and Maldonado: she can carry 40 passengers, and with 100 tons, cargo on board only draws 3 feet of water.

The Italian barque Amelia from Cadix went aground on Saturday at the Isla de Libertad, and the Captain of port with 8 men at once proceeded to render assistance: the Italian war-steamer also went to her aid.

Mr. George Sivari, an Italian merchant of old standing in the River Plate, who returned to his native city, Genoa, last year, died there recently.

Proposals will be received up to March 1st for the rental of the Beneficencia Lottery and Solis Theatre for two years. The dispute between Sor. Montero, of the Public Works Department, and the Comision Administrativa, is likely to result in the abolition of the former which is only a clog on the progress of the great municipal improvements going forward.

The Spanish Minister, Sr. Creus, has received despatches from Chile contradicting the suicide of Admiral Pareja, who died on Nov. 29th from an attack of dysentery which befel him in his last trip to Callao. It is remarked that the distinguished Spanish writer Ventura de la Vega died on the same day at Madrid.

From Canelones we hear of a fight between a Brazilian and a police-commissary, but the matter has been arranged. The neighbors held a meeting to procure funds for mending the road to the capital and rebuilding the church.

The French packet Carmel left Montevideo on Monday at 8 a.m.

Mr. CONSUL NEILL'S DECEMBER REPORT ON THE BRITISH CATTLE PLAGUE, AND THE EUROPEAN DEMAND FOR RIO PLATA MEAT.

The British packet of the 9th of Dec. brings another, and still more important, corroboration of the many previous reports and anticipations of the Monte Viduan Consul in London, as to the enduring nature of the terrible cattle plague, and the consequently improved prospects of Rio Plata meat producers.

ent the accounts about the pest as exaggerated have completely broken down; and the reality of the evil is thus admitted by the 'Times' of December the 4th:—'The ravages of the cattle plague are even exceeding our recent anticipations. We stated on Wednesday last that the number of attacks reported for the week ending the 18th of November was 2,669, and we remarked that an estimate of 2,800 or 3,000 for the week to follow would not be unreasonable. The actual return is nearly 4,000. The four weeks of last month show a succession of figures which speak for themselves. In the first week the cases were 1,765; in the second, 2,580; in the third, 2,669; in the fourth, 3,610. At this rate of progress, which is only too likely to be accelerated, we may have a return of 7,000 a week by Christmas; and if half of these perish, either by the axe or the disease, the losses, which averaged but 700 a week during the first four months of the plague, will have risen in the two months ensuing to five times that number. This is an alarming prospect, nor can we find much to reassure us in any of the particulars reported. No specific has been discovered for the treatment of the disease. Every method of cure does something; no method does much; and perhaps the actual result is determined not so much by the remedy applied as by other conditions unknown or unappreciated.'

Recurring to the same ever-present evil, the leading British journalist of the 8th of December says:—'Every week adds gloom to the prospect before the nation. There can now be no doubt that the cattle disease is a gigantic calamity, that the loss has already been great, and that the worst is probably to come. The hopes that the disease would die out with the cold weather have been disappointed. There are no signs that the winter will kill it, and when we consider its past history, its ravages a century ago, and its never-ceasing prevalence in Eastern Europe, there are no grounds for such hopes. The returns for the week ending the 2nd of December show that the number of deaths is still increasing.'

In the presence of this state of things it is needless to say that the price of meat in England must keep at least up to the present high rate, irrespective of a variety of other considerations to which Mr. Neill points; and he adds that the bad repute in which Monte Viduan meat was until lately held is now surpassed by the far worse character of certain other meats, which are producing the most shocking diseases in human beings, one of these maladies being called trinae, which results in an eruption of worms in the body, and causes rapid destruction in the brain of those attacked. Indeed, there is a variety of new ailments in the Old World, inexplicable except on the theory long since propounded by the Consul, that the grazing of animals on herbage the growth of artificial manures, impregnated with larvae, has produced most unwholesome flesh, and therefore the poisonous state of the blood observable in so many cases of the kind adverted to.

Meat and cattle importing companies are increasing in England, and as the area from which the supplies have to be drawn must continually expand, the effect upon Rio Plata must be of the most marked character. One of these companies, Jones's Fresh Meat Preserving, was in communication with Mr. Neill last year; but solid Australian inducements prevailed against the Uruguayan advocate, and the Company are now employing at the antipodes the means and appliances he tried to secure for Rio Plata. He reports that the company for the promotion of the consumption of Liebig's Extractum Carnis, to which he has alluded frequently, is now fairly before the public; and though the great success which ought to attend it is somewhat impeded by the denials given, under high chemical authority, to the alleged nutritive nature of the Extractum, there is no question that an immense consumption awaits it in Europe, especially when the employment of the capital of the Company will permit of its production at a price that will drive out of the market the spurious imitations which

are doing so much mischief to the original manufacturers of the genuine article, and so little good to the consumers of the impositions.

DEATH OF THE HON. WILLIAM J. DUANE. We publish the following obituary notice, taken from the 'Washington Chronicle,' of the late Hon. J. Duane, formerly Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, under the late President Jackson.

Mr. Duane, although born in Ireland, went to the United States when quite young. President Jackson is sometimes claimed as having been an Irishman. In blood he was so. He was born at Waxham, in South Carolina, three months after the arrival of his parents from Ireland.

We hope the day will arrive when the River Plate Republics will act towards foreigners as they do in the United States, and when they are looking about for ability to fill an important post, not ask where a man was born, but ask what he can do? The generals, lawyers, judges, and governors in the United States that happen to be born in other countries, do not appear to be any less patriotic, or any less useful than those born in the country.

The Irishmen, Englishmen, Scotchmen, Germans, and Frenchmen that fight in their armies, and serve in their municipal and state Governments, are just as loyal as those born in the country, and no one thinks of questioning their fitness or their patriotism, because they happen to be born on the other side of the herring pond.

'This distinguished jurist, and Secretary of the Treasury, for a time under Andrew Jackson, died at his residence in Philadelphia, on Tuesday, at the advanced age of 85. Mr. Duane was born in Ireland, and early came to this country, where, after studying law, he succeeded his father as publisher of the 'Aurora,' a journal which exercised, during its existence, a large influence in the politics of the day.'

Patacons going up: all the Bolsa has turned round suddenly, and now every one thinks that patacons must go up. The bulls were in great gloom to day, and bought freely both on time and for cash. It was rumored on 'Change that some 400,000 patacons are about to be sent up in the Espigadero to Corrientes, which is tending to increase the growing firmness of the market. The news from Corrientes by the steamer to-day was also much discussed, and the rumor prevalent that the Paraguayans had seized some 'chattas' belonging to the allies; but every broker on the Bolsa is growing impatient at the delays, and they all ask why does not Admiral Tamandaré at once go up the river, where his presence is so much required, instead of staying here. Private letters from the army state that owing to the scarcity of money, beef, and clothes, there is great discontent in the army, which has been increased by the conduct of a number of officers who have left the service. The brokers are keen observers of all that is passing, and regard with much distrust the attitude of affairs. Further delays on the banks of the Paraná can only be prolific of still greater discontent, and all are impatient to hear of the crossing of the allies into Paraguay, and thus putting a speedy termination to the campaign.

In the Government-house there is no money save what the Custom-house receipts amounted to. Coupons of the Foreign debt, which matured on the 1st, have been presented for payment, and the Government has given 'vaio,' payable on the 10th March, which caused strong comments on the Bolsa; but it is right to remember that the country is engaged in an expensive war, and the ordinary revenue is utterly insufficient to cover the expenses. Until the loan is negotiated, it is not probable that the Government will be in a position to pay those coupons. The time sales to-day show a rising market—44,000 for Saturday at 25 35 43,000 " 31st Jan. " 25 45 16,800 " Feb. 28th " 23 80 National Bonds fell to-day. The few sales made, with the exception of the last 1,000, were by order of a borrower on call.

Gold is now coming into more active demand than paper. 200,000 patacons discounted today 30 days, best name in town, 1 1/2 per cent. Some samples of newly preserved beef were exposed on 'Change. We understand that at the saladero of Pintos the beef preserving business is about to be commenced in real earnest. From Montevideo there is nothing new. The saladeros are all working away to fill their contracts. No sales.

We have received two letters about the last Boles report and meeting, which for want of space we are obliged to hold over. The very high charge for clerks' salaries has given rise to much comment.

Messrs. Tay & Upton have placed the American barque Talavera on the berth for New York. Messrs. H. A. Green and Co. have chartered the British barque Cornelia, to load for London; tallow 40s., bales 30s. and 5 per cent. The Liverpool steamer Galileo, Messrs. J. P. Boyd & Co. agents, sailed to-day with a good number of passengers and cargo. She takes some San Juan silver and Cordova copper to England. The Galileo did not receive her cargo alongside until Monday night, and yet nevertheless all cargo offered with the exception of 500 tons was taken on board in the short space of 24 hours. This speaks for the sleepless energy of the leading ship brokers who are the agents of this steamer—verily, it was astronomical despatch. In wools there is a little more animation, the shipments to the States for the first fortnight in January amount to six thousand eight hundred and nine bales.
