BANKING IN BUENOS AYRES.

We understand that Dr. Avellaneda has received instruction, from the Directors of the Provincial Bank (Casa de Moneda) to institute a prosecution against the 'Nacion Argentina' for the following strictures contained in its packet-review of Friday:

"The financial crisis continues. Although money is not quite so scarce as it was a few days ago, interest keeps very high and even the best signatures are with difficulty discounted at 2 per cent. per month. This rate prevents any profitable commercial transactions and must bring ruin on a number of small traders whose limited capital forces them to rely chiefly on credit. Under such circumstances it may interest our foreign readers to have a brief sketch of the present method of our banking institutions.

"We have three Banks, the Provincial, Mauá, and River Plate. The Provincial, whose directors are annually named by Government, generally lends out money much below the current market rate; but, although enjoying an exorbitant privilege in recovering sums due in preference to all other creditors, very few, except borrowers by bonded-mortgage, can avail themselves of its benefits. A small circle of directors and their protégés incessantly put their hands into its result and lend again at a high rate what they get at a low figure. At present they allow 6 per cent. and charge 9, but unhappily it is only a small number of the elect [and these not always very respectable] who can really obtain money at so low a rate.

"The Mauá Bank at present allows, in specie account-current, 3 per cent. and charges 18, which leaves 10 per cent. for expenses and profit.

"The River Plate Bank allows, for paper-money, 6 per cent., and charges 24, being 18 per cent. for expenses and profit. Discount is at a conventional rate in both these Banks.

"Even the last-named finds customers in account-current. But we certainly think there is room for a new banking establishment with sufficient capital to aid commerce instead of flaying people, and it would find more support and realize larger profits than the majority of banking-houses in Europe."

Money has become so inconveniently tight, and usurious interest so common, that we cannot say we are surprised at any tirade against the banks, but we confess that we are astonished any colleague could descend to personalities and attack the honor and reputation of men of such good standing and position as the Directors of the Provincial Bank. Nor, on a careful reading of the article in the 'Nacion Argentina,' do we believe that the object of the writer was to calumniate the merchants and capitalists who manage the bank, but rather to attack the unjust monopoly which the bank enjoys. There is not a journal in this city that has been more systematic in its attacks on the Provincial Bank, as an institution, than the 'Standard,' but we dealt with scandalous monopoly and not private character, with despotic privileges, not vague suspicions. Nothing is easier than to raise a howl against a bank for not discounting freely; nothing more difficult than to keep always discounting and never collect. The cause of the present monetary crisis is as patent as the incapacity of some of our colleagues to deal with financial questions. We have more wool, more hides, more wheat this year than last, and we have less money to pay for them. Whilst the industry of the country

keeps progressing at a giant pace, the currency is stagnant, owing to the monopoly and privileges of the Provincial Bank. Last year we had several hundreds of new estancias started, and an increase of millions in our sheep, whilst not a single new bank or bank-note has been created, to meet the requirements of our increasing trade. The Mauá Bank and the River Plate Bank, what are they at most but banking offices? certainly not banks, for they dare not circulate a dollar bill of their own emission: they may bring millions into the country, lend to the Government and to the merchants, but with all their wealth, influence, and power they cannot avert the stringency which exists in the rotten, used-up, and inconvertible currency. It is all very well to say, let farmers sell in gold and the evil will be remedied; but neither the rent of their farm, the wages of their peons, nor the expenses of their house can be defrayed in coin. Paper money is a 'sine qua non' in the camp. We have repeatedly shown that the present currency is altogether insufficient for the country, and yet things are so monstrously out-of-joint in Buenos Ayres that no relief can be afforded. Last year the crisis was not so bad as this. Why? Because our staple produce was less. And, next season, if some steps be not taken, affairs will be still worse. Banks with specie capital should, as in Montevideo, be allowed to emit their own notes, under certain restrictions. In Montevideo there are now six banks, all emitting their own paper, which is payable in specie over the counter: money is easy, property improving, and the industry of the country healthily developed: whilst in Buenos Ayres, a place of ten times the trade, there is but one bank of emission; which though enjoying monopoly and privilege, is tottering from the effects of bad legislation, and forced loans to Governments and railways. The article of our colleague has awakened public attention to this rather serious state of affairs; and it is to be hoped that instead of calumniating the Directors, and insulting private parties, the axe will be laid at the root, and our private banks empowered to emit paper, which will at once remove the causes of the crisis.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday was another hot day, 84 Fahr., before eight o'clock in the morning. The 'quinteros' and 'chaceros' are all in the most profound affliction at the drought; and, in fact, if the rain does not soon come all the chacras and quintas will be destroyed.

On Friday a very serious accident occurred on the Boca Railway. A cart, laden with sheepskins, got on to the line and the train coming up, there was of course a smash. Mr. M. Kelsey, we understand, is the owner of the sheepskins. Luckily, there were no lives lost; but it is really miraculous how people escape, so resolute are they to walk on the line, almost under the wheels of the engine.

We received an invitation to make a trip to the estancia Martin Chico, the property of Mr. Bell, and witness the measuring of this magnificent estate, but as we have not yet sufficiently recovered from the effects of the last trip, and the busy season still reigns at our office, we declined; however, we would thank any facetious subscriber on the other side to act as 'Standard' reporter on the occasion.

The bank row threatens to be a rather serious matter. Yesterday, nothing else was talked of. The Directors have engaged the best lawyer in town, Dr. Avellaneda, to prosecute the 'Nacion'; but our French colleague, who has published much worse respecting the bank, escapes the ire of the Directors. Bank Managers and Directors are peculiarly touchy, and, as the natives say, 'no aguantan pulgas.'

A gentleman who has received a letter from head-quarters furnishes us with the following news. The National Guards of Corrientes have been sent to their homes, and the divisions of Goya and Bella Vista were almost naked when they delivered up their arms at the Gefatura. Col. Reguera sent in his resignation, which has been accepted. The Paraguayans make

constant inroads on this side of the river. There is a good deal of sickness among the allies, owing to 'tired' meat, and the heat of the weather.

The decree of the National Government relative to the Municipality declares vacant the post of all those electors who refused to attend the second meeting convened for electing the Municipality, and appoints as a provisional Corporation the gentlemen forming the list supported by the majority (which we publish in another column), under the presidency of Don Juan Bautista Peña: these gentlemen are to be installed in office at 2 p. m. on Tuesday, 30th inst., and the matter will be laid before Congress, next session.

Another Brazilian transport, we regret to say, has suffered some damage: the Isabel, which left Montevideo for Rio Janeiro on last Monday, was obliged to put back in consequence of the storm.

On Thursday night we hear that one of the leading produce-brokers made a grand oratorical display at the Club. One gentleman who was agreeably surprised at the talent and ability of the broker, requested us to mention the matter.

The Portuguese brig Arabe, on her way down from Gualeguaychú, went on to some rocks in the river and suffered much damage.

Mr. Cantillo has sent in his report of the Bienhechora del Plata, which shews the working of the Company: the figures are the very best proof of the able management of the Company by Mr. F. Moreno.

A subscriber from San Antonio de Areco informs us that the camps in that neighborhood are in splendid condition, sheep fat, and things looking well. Sheep are selling at from \$30 to \$35 in the Northern partidos, but in the South they are still cheaper.

Watson's Hotel, in Belgrano, will be the grand rendezvous to-day. We hear that the place is crowded with foreigners every Sunday and holiday; his new drink, 'up-and-down-stairs,' is the cooling beverage of the West End.

The French packet is due to-day: she will bring, probably, some specie from Rio for the Brazilian Minister, and possibly some important news about the long-talked-of loan.

In the partido of Obiscomas another fire occurred in the estancia house of Mr. Henry Twaite. The house was recently constructed. Several other fires, we regret to say, have also occurred, but we received no particulars as yet.

A gentleman from the Banda Oriental informs us that the 'chacras' outside of Montevideo this year are greatly in excess of those of any previous year, and the export of wheat will be unusually heavy.

We hear that the magnificent estate of Dn. Felipe Iglesias, district of Paysandú, has passed into the hands of the wealthy Baron Maua. The estancia is called San Roman, is one of the finest in the country, 10 suertes, and purchased by the Baron at from 17,000 to 19,000 National dollars per suerte.

We have great pleasure in introducing to our numerous friends and readers, Dr. Don José F. There will be a grand 'funcion' to-day at the Lomas de Zamorra, the distribution of school premiums takes place at 10 a.m. and there will be a ball at the Municipality in the evening. The train leaves at 9 and returns at 7.30 p.m.

We have received the prospectus of the new paper 'America,' whose motto to "America en peligro" signifies hostility to everything foreign.

The return match of the Committee and 4 Colts versus Club will be played on the 2nd of February 1866 by the Buenos Ayres Cricket Club.

We understand that the magnificent steamer Rio Parana, is thoroughly repaired and even better than when she arrived in this port from England, and we congratulate Messrs. Matti and Co. in having such a persevering intelligent and untiring Engineer as Mr. William Gallacher, as we have every reason to believe that even had the steamer been in England the repairs would not have occupied less time, said repairs being the first of the sort done in the country.

The Parana will leave to-day for Montevideo and take supplementary mails.

MONTEVIDEO.

Clementino's benefit—Opera news—Police telegraph wires—The Sanitary Committee—Departure of the American Squadron—Commercial Code, &c.

The benefit of Sig. Celestino was a great success on Wednesday night, and some beautiful souvenirs were presented to him by the Portuguese Minister, the Portuguese naval commander, and several others. Mme. Bull has again turned up, having only made a trip to Rio Negro, but Mme. Briol's illness has prevented the performance of 'Marta.' It is stated that Sr. Garcia Delgado will shortly arrive from Rosario and give dramatic performances at the San Felipe.

D. Mario Isola has sent in a project for telegraph-wires from the Policia to the various offices of Comisaria throughout the city, which would be very useful, especially in cases of fires.

The code of health, including domiciliary visits and market-inspection, of the Sanitary Committee, of which our respected countryman Mr. John Mc Coll is Chairman, has been approved by the Medical Board and received from Government the sanction and force of law.

The American squadron, under Commodore Rogers, left for the Pacific on Thursday morning.

The Codigo Comercial of Buenos Ayres is to have the force of law in Montevideo from July 1st. Several parties are preparing to come to Buenos Ayres for the Carnival. Col. Laragotia has been named to command the Urbana Co. (now Yatay) in lieu of the late Major, removed for insubordination. Col. Hubó has arrived in Montevideo after an exile of 8 years for political motives, and been warmly received. The Rio Paraná will make another day-trip, leaving Buenos Ayres this morning (Sunday) for Montevideo.

LATEST FROM CARMELO AND FRAY BENTOS.

ROBBERY OF MAUA'S CLERK.

THE MURDERER OF THE CAMPBELL FAMILY. The Montevideo papers contain letters from Carmelo and Fray Bentos to the 22nd inst.

The district of Carmelo suffers heavily from the 'seca,' but things are quiet and the new Commissary, Lorenzo Arroyo, is well liked by the neighbors. People are anxiously enquiring what about the assassin Damaso Escobar, the murderer of the Campbell family? He was sent to Montevideo some months ago and it is generally suspected that he has been either sent to the Paraguayan war, as the 'Standard' predicted, or allowed to escape from prison: the neighbors who took such trouble to catch him are naturally alarmed, that he may get back to the woods and return when least expected and some fine day murder their families for revenge. The 'Tribuna' of Montevideo recommends the old 'Standard' system of Lynch-law, as being much the safest, to rid society of such monsters as Escobar whenever they have committed more than six murders.

On the 17th inst. a young man wearing spectacles, clerk in Maua's Bank at Gualeguaychú, arrived at Fray Bentos en route for Mercedes: among the other passengers in the 'diligencia' was a negro, and on the following day the clerk and negro returned, accompanied by a noted ruffian nick-named Mata-Cristos. The three took up their quarters at the Hotel Montfort in Fray Bentos. Mata-Cristos proposed to the clerk to take a walk on the mole, and they went out together, but the former soon returned alone to the Hotel, where the clerk had left on the table his valise with 500 doubloons and some Bolivian dollars.

The clerk came home and went to bed, without thinking of his valise, but was awakened next morning by Mata-Cristos who told him that his trunk was gone, but not to be uneasy as he [Mata-cristos] knew where to find the money, which he had seen counted out. Mata-Cristos, with a revolver in his hand, retired, leaving the clerk greatly alarmed. The neighbors were called in, and as soon as Major Varas, police-officer, heard of the occurrence he sent in search of Mata-Cristos and the negro, who were soon arrested. On being lodged in prison and put in the stocks they at first denied the robbery, but afterwards began to inculcate each other, the one alleging that the other broke open the trunk and threw it into the river, while the second declared his comrade had got all the money. On being asked where the money was, they stated it was in a dust-heap behind the Potrilla pulperia: the place was twice searched without success, but on the third time Major Varas and the negro found the bag of ounces, 73 doubloons being short. The thieves could not be induced by threats to give account of the sum missing, but the wife of Mata-Cristos going to the Policia said to him—"Don't be a fool but tell where it is," whereupon he promised to procure the money and, accompanied by two soldiers went to Cestino's shop and asked him for 200\$, as he would make up the rest by subscription. Cestino refused, and then Mata-Cristos charged him with having the 73 doubloons, whereupon Cestino was put in the stocks. The Policia of Fray Bentos not being at all secure or well-guarded, the neighbors have formed themselves into a Vigilance Committee, and watch the criminals.

The conflagration at Fornari's Hotel on the night of the 16th must have cost the lives of all the occupants, but for a saladero-peon who gave the alarm: they took refuge on the river-side and the men of the Capitania, aided by a change of wind, succeeded in getting the flames under, about 5 a. m. It is supposed to have been the act of an incendiary, but Sr. Fornari is about to rebuild the Hotel on a finer scale.

LATEST FROM HEAD-QUARTERS.

LOPEZ AND HIS ARMY AT PASO LA PATRIA. The 'Nacion' correspondent, under date 21st inst., writes as follows:

We have nothing new to report for yesterday or to-day, except some detailed information respecting the enemy, obtained from two of their deserters who came across the river yesterday with a battalion in canoes, protected by a battery on the far side and some 12-pounders which they have mounted in an island in the middle of the river. You are already aware of the invasion, on the 17th, by 600 of the enemy who landed on our side and engaged the Correntino cavalry, in which skirmish several were killed on both sides, but the enemy always keep close to the coast and regain their canoes. Gen. Mitre has ordered Generals Hornos and Caceres not to sacrifice men uselessly, for the mere amusement of the enemy. We had thought to prepare for them a night ambuscade, but this has proved very difficult, as the coast for a league and a half offers numerous places for landing, and they change their route every time, landing at some new place: still we hope one of these nights to take them by surprise and give them a lesson.

On the far side of Paso la Patria the Paraguayans have put up a battery of 8 and 12 pounders, and a league inland on an affluent of the river is the grand encampment where Lopez commands in person an army of 30 batt. infantry (24,000 men) and 20 regiments of ca-

vajry (10,000) with a good park of artillery; but one-half of this force is composed of old men or boys.

At Humaytá, we learn on good authority, they have 5 battalions of artillery, besides other forces at different points threatened by the allies. Besides the Brazilian fleet and our grand army of 50,000 men, we have a Brazilian 'corps d'armée' under Baron Port Alegre about to move forward against Itapua on the upper Paraná, and another Brazilian force marching into Matto Grosso.

Lopez seems determined to risk all in a battle at the Paso la Patria, as he announces daily to his men, who are under arms night and day, but he is not without fear of some treachery and has shot the ex-commander-in-chief Robles, his aide-de-camp, and several other officers on suspicion of carrying on negotiations with the allies.

If Lopez really determines to fight a pitched battle either here or in the neighborhood of Humaitá, as seems most likely, the war may be considered as nearly over. Both the enemy and our armies will be saved many harassing and bootless marches. It is hardly probable that Lopez would allow the key of his position, Humaytá, to fall into our hands, without a desperate struggle; and the chances are that he will give battle here, counting on a secure retreat, in case of defeat, to his impregnable fortress of Humaytá.

It is necessary to explain how the Paraguayans can make these constant inroads on our side: it is that they are at present complete masters of this part of the river, which they will abandon as soon as some of the vessels now lying at anchor in Corrientes receive orders to force the passage of the river.

The greatest plague at present here is the flies which almost drive us mad, for it is impossible to imagine the swarms which assail us on all sides.

GREAT FIRE NEAR QUILMES.

MESSES. FERNANDEZ AND LATHAM'S CHACRAS BURNED.

On Friday evening the sad news arrived in Barracas that Mr. Latham's chacra was in flames. We gathered from our agent Mr. Bernard the melancholy details of the affair.

It appears that early on Friday morning the fire was discovered in a remote part of the chacra; and notwithstanding the most strenuous efforts the flames advanced, sparks flew about and ultimately a magnificently rick of hay took fire and was completely burnt down: when Mr. Bernard was at Bella Vista the flames were still visible, and he met there a peon who had been working all the morning trying to extinguish the fire. On Thursday a similar fire attended with equally disastrous results took place at the Quinta of Sr. Fernandez, a little further out. The Chacareros in the neighborhood have all taken fright, as owing to the drought the place is so dry that the slightest spark will fire up the whole neighbourhood; as yet we have not heard the amount of Mr. Latham's loss but it must be very severe. We are happy however to say that none of Mr. Latham's valuable stock have been lost; the fire has been limited to the dry craps and the hay in the farm-yard. Our camp friends cannot be too careful about fire, and we strongly advise all our country readers who have hay outside, or even wool, to at once send it into the market, and either sell, or deposit same in some safer place than straw sheds in the camps.

NEWS FROM THE CAMP.

SALES OF SHEEP.

POST-OFFICE COMPLAINTS.

On Sunday, the 21st, we had a very heavy shower of rain in Pilar; on the following day it rained constantly from 7 o'clock in the morning until 4 p.m. This rain was very much wanted, for the camps were very dry.

In consequence of sheep being cheap this year a great many storekeepers and others intend trying their hand at sheepfarming in this partido; some of them have already purchased, but the majority of them are waiting to see how the season presents itself. The writer of this sold two lots by the cut at 35¢; Don Mariano Lopez sold a thousand by the cut at 28¢. None of

these sales would have been effected at these prices had it not been that the dry weather made the owners feel a little nervous. While sheep give an increase of 30 per cent., and the wool continues to give another 30 per cent., I fear a great many will turn a deaf ear to 'Farmer's' theory, unless, indeed, he could devise a plan to introduce a few hundred thousand immigrants into the province, and thereby supply the country with farm laborers; with our present supply I doubt if his system could be even partially carried out.

The post-office malady extends to Pilar as well as to other towns; the Postmaster of this town has not had a postage-stamp for sale for many months; parties who take letters to this post-office must procure their own stamps; on the 8th inst. a registered letter was sent to Buenos Ayres from here without the necessary stamps, because there were not six stamps in all Pilar to pay the registry dues. Mr. Posadas can easily find whether this is a fact or not; if necessary I can give him documentary evidence of it. Up to the 21st the return receipt of the delivery of this registered letter has not reached Pilar. We seldom get more than three mails per month in Pilar. The last mail from the army, with dates up to the 5th, only arrived here on the 21st, whereas we have duplicates of those mailed on the 5th bearing date 11th inst., and, strange to say, the duplicates arrived two days before the originals, but then, the latter were delivered to friends in town, and by them to a mayoral, which would lead to the conclusion that the post-office red tape is not manufactured by steam machinery. The advertising columns of the 'Standard' will show that Pilar is in daily communication with the city, and yet European letters usually require a fortnight to travel between Buenos Ayres and Pilar. So far as the camp is concerned, the only difference between the post-office of today and the post-office of twenty years ago is, that now we have to pay two dollars and a half for single letters, (ten reals for the stamps and ten reals to the letter-carrier who delivers it.)

If General Mitre is short of horses he can obtain a supply by sending blank Commissions to a few of the inhabitants of this partido, but I would advise the officers of the staff to watch their own chargers when the Pilar Commissioners are in the vicinity of headquarters. DICK.

THE SAN CARLOS COLONY.

To the Editor of 'El Tiempo.'

In fulfillment of my promise on occasion of the Governor's visit to this Colony, I hasten to give you some particulars about a few of the families here.

Among the most comfortable families I mention that of Sigel, with its handsome house on the right of the high-road. This family is of German origin and arrived here in 1859: it counts 7 persons, the youngest 12 years of age. Mr. Sigel is a laborious and intelligent man, assisted by his children who are already able to guide the plough: from the beginning he has had good crops, especially that of 1862 when grain fetched 12 and even 16 dollars per fanega. In that year he was enabled to pay off all he owed to the Company, and has thus been free of the 18 per cent which less fortunate colonists still have to pay. Moreover he wrought at his trade of wheelwright, which has given him a good revenue. The Sigel family now owns 94 horned cattle, 21 horses, and 50 hens, besides laying down this year 44 'almudas' of wheat, 50 acres of maize, and planting 5,000 fruit-trees. The Sigel concession is the best in the colony.

The Taverna family, comprising Michael Taverna, his wife and 4 little children, the eldest 12 years and the youngest 14 months old, and a partner named John Bonetti, owes its prosperity to the experience of Taverna, the order and frugality of his wife, and the constant and careful labor of Bonetti: this family arrived in 1859, and now possesses a fine house with arches, 46 head of horned cattle, 12 horses, 14 pigs, 50 hens, besides a farm of 60 'almudas' of wheat, 45 acres of maize and vegetables, and 2,000 fruit-trees.

The Haemmerly family, of Swiss

origin, arrived in 1859, at first comprised Albert Haemmerly, his wife, three sons and two daughters all of an age to work: the wife died in 1862, and all the children have got married and purchased concessions for themselves, except the youngest son, who has remained with his father. Haemmerly has a neat house, 60 head of horned cattle, 20 horses, 4 pigs, 40 hens, besides cultivating 35 'almudas' of wheat, 25 acres of maize and 3,000 fruit-trees.

The Reuteman family, Swiss-Germans, is composed of 9 members, including 7 children from 2 to 18 years of age: the concession is surrounded with poplars, páraisos, and some 4,000 fruit-trees. This family owns 84 head of horned cattle, 10 horses, 1 pig, and 100 poultry, besides a farm of 65 'almudas' of wheat and 45 acres of maize and vegetables.

The Reale family, of Italian origin, counts 11 members, with a fine house and out offices, 60 horned cattle, 12 horses, 13 pigs, 60 poultry, and a farm of 40 'almudas' of wheat and 80 acres of maize, but only a few fruit-trees. The Goetschy family, of Swiss origin, owns 83 horned cattle, 6 horses, 20 hens, and a farm of 48 'almudas' of wheat, with 2,000 fruit-trees and a fence of poplars and paradise trees.

These are the families especially deserving honorable mention in your popular journal, without prejudice to the many other honest and hard working people in the Colony. I have mentioned those most remarkable for their fine appearance, good houses, and superior cultivation, hoping you will permit me at another time to specify other families in prosperous condition, in all which details you may rely on my adhering strictly to the facts.

The cash sales to-day were considerably in excess of the usual business. In the morning patacons ruled very weak, and declined to 26.45, but buyers became more numerous towards 2 o'clock, and specie stiffened, closing 5 centimos over the opening price. The general feeling on the Bolsa to-day was improved, owing to the fact of the Brazilian Government having agreed to lend the Argentine Government one million patacons, which sum the Maua Bank arranges to at once advance. This money comes at an opportune moment, and will be of the greatest assistance to the Government until the Riestra loan is negotiated.

The time sales of specie were as follows:—

Gold was felt very scarce on the Bolsa to-day. There is a growing tightness in specie, which is attributed to the demand for army purposes. Collections round town to-day were miserable. The shopkeepers complain that they have no money, and cannot collect any of their accounts. In National Bonds nothing done to-day; they look a little firmer, but there were no transactions.

In wools, we have the following sales.

A wreck or two does not seem to affect the astronomical line; we observe that next steamer is the new boat Halley, and the favorite Captain Carroll, late of the Kepler, is in command. The Halley may be expected in port on the 31st inst., and will leave with the usual promptitude about 9th February. She will carry the mail to reach the French steamer at Rio as the Carmel leaves on the 4th February.

We notice that the bales of wool which arrived from Rosario are mostly put up in sheepskins, instead of baling-canvas, so commonly used here; the appearance of the bales is very grotesque and must inspire the Antwerp merchants with rather unfavorable ideas concerning Rosario. This year we are happy to note a great increase in the export of wool from Rosario, in fact the amount is over 50,000 lbs., which speaks well for the growing industry of Santa Fé. Many who hitherto refused to leave this province are purchasing lands in Santa Fé and sending sheep up—we regard the business as safe. Yesterday we heard of the purchase of two square leagues of land on the Arroyo Media, Santa Fé side, in 160,000m/c per, bought by an American merchant of this city—this estancia formerly belonged to Sr. Botet. A square league of good land at 180,000m/c, with 5,000 good sheep, which can be bought to-day at under 525 per, employs a capital of \$320,000, which is a very small sum to represent so splendid a property. Sr. Peña, we hear, bought 15,000 common sheep in the South on last Tuesday at thirteen paper dollars per, which is a price so monstrously low that it would almost tempt any one to make such an investment. We wish our newly-arrived friends to know this, as it may stimulate them to buy at present prices. A subscriber from Magdalena informs us that real good first-class sheep are selling down there at from 20 to 25. Never before was there such an opportunity for new-comers to invest in sheep, and there can be little doubt that as soon as the war is over the price of sheep will return to their old figure, forty dollars.

In the Banda Oriental land is scarce and sheep offering on all sides, in fact, hundreds are moving their flocks out to Tacuarembó, where land is very cheap and good. Mr. Thode, of Montevideo, has even more sheep for sale than our friend Parker. The largest landed proprietor in the Banda Oriental now is the Baron Maná, having taken in payment of debts the magnificent estates of Messrs. Williams & Cabal. Actual value of sheep there at present two patacons, cash. Every boat from Rosario now brings us wool, hides, and open silver. The Gemela, with over 6,000 dry hides and some fifty bales of wool, has just arrived. The embargo which Lagragna placed on hides has been partially removed and the result is now that hides are coming down by every vessel from Corrientes. The Chasco, from Rosario, with a heavy cargo of wool and hides, also in.

The British barque Hesperus, from New York, with a cargo of pine and mahogany, has arrived consigned to Coffin.

The Italian barque Elvira Ginello, has arrived and brought out 100 emigrants.

A meeting of the creditors of A. Amoretti is convened for the 1st February, at 10 o'clock, to name an assignee of the estate.

The heirs, creditors, or next of kin, of Don Ambrosio Lescano, deceased, are called on to appear and make good their claims.

A ready-made-clothes concern, No. 82 calle Cangallo, will be auctioned on Wednesday by order of the creditors.
