### LATEST FROM CORRIEN ES.

#### TELEGRAM FROM SENRAB.

January 26, 1866.

The Hotel de los Aliados just robbed of two thousand dollars: a number of gold watches missing; correspondence for the Emperor of Brazil, and a large package from the army minus; one negro killed outright and one badly hurt—

"Ah! me, what perils do environ,  
The man that meddles with cold iron."

#### Sta. CATALINA and the G. S. RAILWAY.

Many of our readers are acquainted with that delightful country-residence, an hour's gallop distant from our city, where the first Scotch colony was established, where the Messrs. Robertson sank a handsome fortune in creating an English demesne, and where the lover of sylvan beauty may wander through leafy glades and shady avenues, admiring at every turn the genius of the late Mr. Tweedie who designed and planted the whole. We will not give rein to our poetic imaginings, by attempting to narrate the thousand and one charms which render Santa Catalina the *bijou* of B. Ayres, unique in the River Plate, and peculiarly suited for ornamental pleasure-gardens where the fashion, youth, and *demi-monde* of our city might find recreation on holidays.

The owner has for some time entertained the idea of getting up a joint-stock Co. to build a number of handsome villas on the edge of the acacia-grove overlooking the lake, and convert the mansion into a hotel with the rest of the grounds attached. As the place is barely a league from the Lomas station, it only requires an omnibus to be placed on the route, and we are convinced that Santa Catalina would become the great resort on Sundays, and the building lots be in such demand that a fashionable suburb for summer retreat would soon spring up.

Hence, it is, to our idea, the direct interest of the G. Southern Railway to take part in the scheme, and as some of the Company's agents, we believe, return to England by next mail, previous to the prolongation to Dolores, it may not be entirely officious on our part to call their attention to the subject, and for this purpose give a short sketch of the estate in question.

Santa Catalina covers about 3,000 acres [700 cuadras], the plantations counting over 40,000 full-grown trees, among which are numerous rare botanical curiosities for these parts, such as, oak, beech, white thorn, aspen, walnut, &c. These trees are the growth of some 40 years and represent several thousand pounds sterling; nor is it likely that for many years such another plantation will be attempted. What a pity if this fine timber be cut down and sold for its intrinsic worth as fire-wood or for steam saw mills, although even in this manner it would yield a handsome sum! The mansion house, built in English style, comprises more than 20 rooms, including a splendid dining-hall; besides stabling, out-offices, pigeon-houses &c., and the 'mirador' rising to a height of 40 feet commands a magnificent view of the surrounding country.

Being adjacent to Mr. Fair's princely estate of Monte Grande, the branch-railway from the Lomas, projected by that gentleman would have an intermediate station at Santa Catalina, which must further enhance the latter property. But we would prefer to lay aside the interests of the owner and the railway, and call to mind the immense gain to the inhabitants of B. Ayres by having a suitable place to spend holidays, to hold pic-nics, to recruit their

health, to enjoy easy retirement, and to escape in a quarter of an hour from the bustle of politics, the close air of the city, and the noise of bells and watermen: such a place is offered by Santa Catalina, *par excellence*, and if the G. Southern Railway aid the enterprise, there can be little fear of competition from Mr. Eugene Paris's project of Palermo or Mr. Wheelwright's intended People's Park at Quilmes.

#### THE BANK DIRECTORS.

It seems to be the object of some of our colleagues to blacken and vilify as far as possible the President and Directors of the Provincial Bank, and to accomplish this they resort to the most absurd charges. To what extent this defamatory system of argument will be carried, we are at a loss to say, but certainly it must seem to all men of business a most crying-abuse that any newspaper should have the power of blackening, 'ad libitum,' the Directors of a Bank, merely because money is tight, and some scores of bankrupt shopkeepers are shut up.

That the Bank is innocent of the present monetary crisis, the simplest tyro in commerce must admit. Paper money is scarce, not because the Bank holds it up, but because trade is inflated and the produce of the country greatly increased, whilst each day the paper-money is diminishing from its natural wear-and-tare.

But the charge now is, that the Bank never shows its books nor publishes the name to every 'pagaré' which it discounts. So frivolous a charge merits rather ridicule than refutation. If the Bank dared to take such a step no man would allow his name to any bill to be discounted in the Bank; in fact, it would be a violation of the secrecy essential to business to attempt such a course, and could only be suggested by some half-brained, scribbler, whose curiosity overcame his judgment.

Some individual boasting of the name of Belaustegui, has come forward and rather indiscreetly attempted to 'bell the cat.' He admits he has been refused money by the Bank, and since this has been made known all the discounters in town have been enquiring into his solvency; his 'naive' admission is therefore calculated to do himself more injury than any one else, and he will yet find this out to his cost. Some others, it is said, are also about to damage their own credit by similar statements, but we very much question it.

The science of banking is so little understood in Buenos Ayres that it is very generally believed that Bank Directors, who have bills discounted in the bank which they manage, are a pack of swindlers and robbers. Such a doctrine may possibly hold good in Buenos Ayres, but it would never go down in England or the States, where the great inducement to take shares in a bank is to be able to meet with any reasonable accommodation when needed, and if all the Directors of the Provincial Bank are precluded from enjoying the privileges which all merchants of good standing have, then it is idle to expect that any merchant would condescend to act as Bank Director, since it would be the very means of ruining his credit.

We willingly admit that if any gross partiality in the way of discounts is discovered, it will lay the Directors open to a very serious charge, but if the only ordinary discount accommodation is allowed them, they are every way innocent of the charges brought against them.

As to Bank Directors using their own credit for the purpose of discounting, we may quote, as a case in point, the City Bank, in New York, one of the most flourishing concerns in that city, and yet the bulk of all its discounts was monopolized by Mr. Moses Taylor, one of the directors and shareholders of that bank, and no one ever thought of attacking Mr. Taylor or the City Bank.

Good credit in a bank is always regarded as capital, and so long as we see no enormous loans, of millions made to one man, to the general public inconvenience, we feel satisfied that all parties will discountenance all such personal attacks as those recently advanced by some of our colleagues.

#### EDITOR'S TABLE.

The municipal question seems at last settled; two of the majority have resigned—Messrs. Boah and Anchorena, but the remainder is constituted into a board, and will at once proceed to business. The board as it stands now consists of—

Messrs. J. B. Peña, M. Ascuenaga, J. Lanuz, S. B. Hale, George Drabble, J. Herrera, V. Letamendi, M. Aguirre, S. Amodeo, and J. Leslie. A more respectable board could hardly be formed; we hope therefore to see it go to work at once and pave the streets: the first street that should be repaired is Calle Cangallo, it is really in a most break-neck condition.

President Mitre we are happy to say is now so far recovered as to be able to go out on horseback: he has had a very severe attack of cholera, brought on by eating Correntino oranges.

In a letter from Gen. Osorio to Sr. Octaviano we learn the following extraordinary news: an escaped Paraguayan informed the Brazilian officer that there had been a fearful mutiny in the Paraguayan camp caused by Lopez having detected a conspiracy to assassinate him whilst reviewing the troops—as Robles was connected with the affair he was at once taken out in the Plaza and shot before the troops: two whole battalions implicated in the conspiracy were also executed, and thus this awful affair terminated. The Paraguayans themselves are generally speaking very loyal to Lopez; had it been otherwise, he never would have been able to shoot such a number of conspirators.

We call the attention of our readers to a most important land auction, which will take place in Montevideo on the 28th February. Three splendid estancias in the district of Paysandú on the banks of the Rio Negro; the first estancia five 'suertes' of land bounded by Iglesias and Wendelstadt's estancias, with permanent water; the second lot, comprising four 'suertes' and 769 squares on the banks of the Uruguay, bounded by the estancias of Montaña, Correa, Visillac, and Gonzales. The third lot, containing 15½ 'suertes' with a splendid saladero establishment, estancia houses, &c. This estancia lies between the arroyos Roman Chico and Zanja Honda, facing on the Uruguay and terminating at the Cuchilla Grande; and bounded by the camps of Posadas and Haedo. We regard the sale with much attention: the auction will take place at Mr. Wells' house Calle Cerrito.

We regret to say that the health of our esteemed prime Minister still continues precarious; a trip to Montevideo would probably recruit his strength.

Mr. James Wilde, a descendant of a respectable English family, has been elected Congress deputy for Salta.

To-day the local legislature will meet, to consult on the Governor's last note respecting the municipality: the opposition are so furious with the Government that they declare the act of the Government nothing short of a *coup d'Etat*, and we may expect some very stormy debates in the house on the question.

The camps of Corrientes are covered with deserters, peones who were scarce, are now superabundant,—but some cavalry pickets are scouring the country in search of deserters; just as the steamer was leaving, an officer and ten soldiers were brought in, in irons, and tied.

We notice that the Bark 'Althea' has been cleared from Waterford for Buenos Ayres: this, we believe, is the first time a vessel was cleared from that port to the River Plate.

The meeting at the club is called for to-night; we hope members will not fail to attend.

The estancia sale which we noticed the other day in the Guardia del Monte, was Ochoa's Estancia Recreo, bought by Mr. Boyd in \$300,000.

The arrivals of wool from the far south districts attract attention. The South Plaza is crowded with wools from Laguna de los Padres, Monsalvo, and other distant partidos; but these wools are mixed, and of a second-class description.

The United States war-vessel Shawmut, from Montevideo, arrived on

Tuesday. Mr. Helper, the United States Consul, went on board.

The third Brazilian monitor has at last arrived in the River Plate, the Barroso; she is the same construction as the Tamandaré, and draws less water. The Brazilians have now three ironclads, armed with splendid guns, fitted out in the most impregnable manner; we suppose, therefore, Humaitá will be at once attacked, as the public is naturally growing very impatient at the extraordinary delays at Corrientes.

The recent rise in the fares on the Western Railway has proved rather a losing business, as the passenger traffic has fallen off considerably, and the receipts for this month last year were immensely over those of January, 1866.

We have great pleasure in saluting the distinguished Professor Pfeiffer, and regret that he returns to Brazil in March.

Governor Dominguez opened the Legislature of Entre Rios on the 25th ult.

#### MONTEVIDEO.

The Italian banquet—Innuit to the Portuguese Minister—Preparations for Quinteros anniversary—Death of Sr. Truobas—Another Brazilian iron-clad—Navy items—Blowing up the Gran Salto—The Junta deputation—Mariotti's benefit—Pharaoh's serpents—Italian and Brazilian claims—Another camp-fire.

The banquet to Admiral Ricardi and the Italian officers on Sunday evening at the Hotel Oriental, was a brilliant affair. Covers were laid for 130, and at 5.30 the Italian residents were assembled in the court-yard to receive the guests. At 6 o'clock the Admiral arrived, arm-in-arm with the Minister Count Barbolani, and followed by Consul Raffo and 27 officers of the station. The band of the Magenta played a spirited march, and the street was crowded with people. The Admiral sat at the centre of the table, having the Minister for *vis-a-vis*, and the civilians and officers alternated at each side. During the dinner the band played select airs from Marta and Semiramide. Sr. Mazzini gave the first toast on the part of the Italian residents 'to their illustrious guest,' reciting also the gallantry he had displayed at Gaeta and Ancona. The Admiral returned thanks and toasted the Italian residents. Sig. Magnanini and Count Barbolani followed. The King's health not being yet given, Sig. Wonne proposed it in eloquent terms, the band playing the royal Italian march. An Italian from Corrientes then gave 'the Italian fleet,' acknowledging the services rendered to his countrymen in Corrientes. Sig. Aptolini drank to the conquest of Rome and Venetia, the expulsion of priests and Germans, and the unity of Italy: Sig. Carini followed in the same strain. Sig. Gavazzo made complimentary allusions to the Oriental Republic. Dr. Minelli of the 'Europa' pronounced an apotheosis of Cavour. The gentleman from Corrientes gave Garibaldi's health, and at his request the band played the Garibaldi hymn. The Vice-Consul, Sig. Maddalena, wound up by toasting, in solemn silence, the memory of Christopher Columbus, after which the assembly broke up, at 8.30 p. m.

A very ugly trick has been played on the Portuguese Minister. A letter bearing the signature Baron da Sousa appeared in the 'Tribuna' of Sunday, exculpating himself from hoisting his flag for the butchery of Quinteros, to which he publishes the following reply, dated 29th inst. "Messrs. Editors of the 'Tribuna'—The letter published in your paper of yesterday, as directed by me to D. Jose Bustamante, is false, and a piece of imposture and malevolence."

Great preparations are made for the Quinteros ceremonial: the committee have invited all natives and foreigners to attend the church-service and to half-mast their flags in token of mourning on the 1st and 2nd inst. Colonel Escala arrived from Buenos Ayres to assist at the obsequies of his comrades in-arms, and a *carte-blanche* had been sent to D. Hector Varela, Oriental Chargé d'affaires, to invite all friends in Buenos Ayres to attend the 'function.' Gen. Flores was not expected to arrive from head-quarters.

The old and respected Spanish merchant D. Francisco Truobas, whose death was incorrectly reported a month ago, (died on Saturday, aged 54 years,

and his remains were, next day, accompanied to the cemetery by a large concourse of citizens.

The iron-clad Barroso arrived on Saturday, 7 days from Rio Janeiro, under command of Captain Saigado: she is manned by 150 men. The transport Riachuelo arrived on Sunday with 225 men. The American steamer Powhatan which had remained for the letters by mail from Europe, left on Saturday to overtake the rest of the squadron. The Magenta, Italian war-steamer, leaves on the 1st for Japan, via Cape of Good Hope. The Principe Odone has been returned to her owners, being no longer required for extraordinary service. Captain Lampo, post-captain, has received from King Victor Emmanuel the decoration of St. Maurice. There is a young officer on board the Veloce, named Crescenzi Gallino, a native of Montevideo, son of a famous painter. The gunboat Arditia is to be stationed at Buenos Ayres.

The Italian barque Egitto, with 250 immigrants, has been put in quarantine. The Ellen Sears from Hamburg has 73 immigrants. The cargo of the French barque Victoria wrecked off San Ignacio rocks, consisting of wine, will be sold by auction on the 7th. The Oldenburg barque Eduardo has been fined \$25 for violation of 'pratique'. A stray boat as been picked up near the Cerro, and on the coast the corpse of an Italian seaman.

A French saladero named Saturnin Ribes has commenced blowing up the rocks which form the Salto or great barrier to the navigation of the Uruguay: he has already blown away the Frayle Chico and other bad reefs, entirely at his own expense, for the benefit of his saladero; and the photographs taken show that he has removed most of the rocks: he boasts that before long he will succeed in opening the navigation of the river even at low water to vessels of small draught. This is a signal service to commerce.

The Junta Economica, finding it impossible to get along with the Public Works department, deputed Messrs. Martinez, Vidal, Perez, and Pedro Varela to wait on the Government and request an entire separation from Sor. Montero's jurisdiction. It seems that an Italian named Fieschi, coachman to Sor. Montero, is put forward as author of the alleged libel against the Secretary of the Junta: the jury was named and the cause was to be tried on Tuesday.

Mme. Mariotti's benefit was a failure: owing to Mme. Briol's illness the theatre was thinly attended, and the singers being out of voice, there was very little applause. The opera of Marta was to be given, at last, on Tuesday night.

The Botica Romana advertises having received a quantity of 'Pharaoh's serpents': this is an extraordinary pyrotechnic contrivance no bigger than a pea which being set afire on a dish produces a huge serpent. They are causing quite a 'furore' at present in England, but we caution our readers that Prussic acid forms an ingredient.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs writes to the 'Siglo' that the demands of the Italian and Brazilian Ministers for claims of their subjects are not immediately of an urgent character.

A terrific fire broke out on the Estancia Toledo, 25th January, and threatened the neighboring village of Pando, but 100 of the inhabitants turned out, and the wind luckily changed: some women and children were miraculously rescued, and only 2 houses burnt. It has rained plentifully about Santa Lucia, and that river has flooded its banks.

The Government seems to have abandoned the idea of impressing the 120 Paraguayan prisoners, resolving instead to set them free. Ten vagrants have been enrolled in the new corps. The mortality of Brazilians is now exactly 4 per diem. The masked-ball of Sunday was attended with disturbance, and one or two challenges.

#### DIARY AT HEAD-QUARTERS.

(By Colonel Palafox.)

[Ed. Note.—Having already published the diary from January 2nd to the 11th, we now give those letters since come to hand; beginning respectively December 29th and January 12th.]

December 29th.—Drill for two hours, then rations. General Flores recon-

stituted the neighbourhood with the view of shifting our camp: he has also visited the adjacent villages to select a house for an hospital. A medicine-chest has arrived from Corrientes, but our troops, in spite of the great heat, are in good health; those with sore feet gradually recovering. The Argentine army moved to-day to the right, and encamped about a mile from San Cosme: some of the officers are looking for houses for their wives, who have come from Buenos Ayres to visit them before crossing the enemy's frontier. We, Orientals, are more Spartan, and prefer our wives to stay at home.

December 30th.—Drill. Major Nicomedes Castro appointed to command the Abril Battalion, in lieu of Major Gouzalet, who goes home in ill-health, and Major Marcelino Castro, to command the Libertad Battalion, in lieu of Colonel Bustamante, resigned. Rations of soap, yerba, and tobacco; then a general wash. Order to march to-morrow.

December 31st.—At six o'clock the army moved a short distance, to shift quarters, and pitched tents on the banks of a lagoon, about a mile long, the artillery and infantry on the right, and cavalry on the left, forming a most picturesque 'coup d'œil,' which a photographer would love to reproduce. To-morrow the troops will have musketry practise: it is a pity our chiefs are so sparing of gunpowder, as the men are a little awkward in the use of fire-arms. Some of our fellows had never fired a shot [but once] before the battle of Yatay. The organisation of our troops is so defective, that at the first meeting of the Legislature it must be attended to. We are still eating bad meat, although so close to the river for getting supplies: surely this is a bad way to prepare our poor fellows to meet the foe. General Castro is ordered to look up new quarters for us on the banks of the Paraná. Our hospital has been established at Itati, three leagues higher up.

Jan. 1st.—Reveilleé by the Florida band, and Mass at six o'clock, all the troops in summer-clothing and looking as neat as on garrison duty. At 7.30 the 1st brigade went through ball-exercise, but (I regret to say) without aim or regularity, and at 9.30 the troops retired to their quarters. Gen. Flores was all day receiving complimentary visits on the occasion of the New Year.

Jan. 2nd. To-day is the anniversary of the fall of Paysandú, as glorious to the victors as the vanquished, but which cost the blood of many of our countrymen. The General ordered it to be kept a holiday, and at 11 o'clock the bands and staff-officers went to salute him, after which they visited Goyo Suarez and Gen. Castro. There is nothing in the way of military operations, as we are waiting for Admiral Tamandaré and the rest of his vessels. We shall want rafts, canoes, steam-launches &c., but as yet we have nothing of the kind, and there is not the least sign of preparation or anything to indicate a re-commencement of hostilities. We have several sick, though no epidemic, and are destitute of leeches and blisters. The Argentines and Brazilians receive reinforcements, every day, and the whole country from Corrientes to Ensenada is a vast encampment. We are going to move to the river's side as the men suffer dreadfully from bathing in these lagoons full of dead cattle purposely thrown in there by the Paraguayans.

Jan. 12th. No room to drill, as we are hemmed in by a quagmire, and the underwood is so thick as to defy passage on foot or horseback, but we have plenty of pasture, firewood and easy access to the river. At night very heavy dews, and by day the sun is scorching; thermometer 38 cent. in the shade. The devil got among us to-day, for our quarters were afire in three places, during siesta, and the ranchos which the men had nearly completed were mostly burned down, besides a quantity of arms and clothing. A Brazilian magazine has blown up, killing three men, wounding seven, and destroying 50,000 rounds of ball-cartridge. The river still rising.

Jan. 13th. Rations very bad, the animals having been brought up a month ago by an Argentine contractor,

and now only fit to skin. Four officers, vest for a German or English architect...

Jan. 14th. Mass at 6 a. m., but General Flores could not assist, being slightly unwell.

Jan. 15th. Drill: rations of the same wretched meat as yesterday.

As regards private buildings, there are over 100 in construction, which, taking them at an average value of £200 each...

I think this place would suit the following English or German mechanics or artisans:— A watchmaker, with an assortment of cheap silver watches.

A hatter—All our dandies send their orders to Buenos Ayres or Montevideo: there being no shop of such a description...
