ARRIVAL OF THE ARNO.

NEWS FROM EUROPE.

THE SOUTHAMPTON MAILS.

On Monday morning the mail-steamer 'Arno' arrived in port, with the mails from England, January 9th, the most important news being the revolution in Spain which we had already learned, last week, by the 'San Francisco.' The Arno would have arrived on the 11th had she not experienced a strong N.E. gale and heavy sea for three days on her passage to Rio. The Isabel, four-funnel blockade runner, bought by the Brazilian Government, which sailed from Montevideo in company with the Arno, only making Rio the day after the latter, and with one paddle-box almost completely, and the other partially, destroyed.

The Arno brings the mail of the Liverpool steamer Halley, arrived at Rio on the 2d inst., and announced to leave on the 7th.

The Rhone, with the mails to Rio, experienced a very severe gale off Cape Finisterre, which is said to have caused immense destruction of shipping.

For Buenos Ayres—Messrs F Hühon, Callender, Sikes, Frederick C Barrow, Wheatley, James Good and child; Messrs J M Coe, Mrs Scott and child; Messrs H B Barbour, Gath and Son, M José Conceicao, A de Rocha, M Y Fernandez, Miguel M Kode, J S Ogle and man servant; Mrs Best and child; J F Azevedo, J Baptista da Cunha, Messrs A Malm, J Frederick Lassenberg, William Macbean, Henry Richardson, Mr and Mrs Manss, Mr and Mrs Laing, Messrs Wendelstadt, Barclay, R Browne, Mr and Mrs Banfield, Mr and Mrs Perry, Messrs Thos W Howard, Daniel, P Obru, J Moreira and wife.

The Arno sailed from Rio on the 6th, experienced fine weather, and arrived at Montevideo on the 11th, at 6 a.m., and sailed at 4 p.m. She brought \$146,000 in specie from Rio, of which \$60,000 will be landed in Buenos Ayres.

The 200th anniversary of the Great fire of London has been attended with a terrible conflagration at St. Katherine's Docks, in which property to the value of £300,000 has been destroyed, the river Thames being in some places covered with molten tallow, resembling snow, which a number of barges was at once employed to collect. The coasts of Wales and Ireland have been visited with an awful gale, the worst experienced since the loss of the Royal Charter, and the casualties to shipping are as yet imperfectly known, while accounts from Leeds, Bradford and other inland towns shew that the fury of the storm was felt all over the kingdom. Mr. Bright made a brilliant speech to his constituents at Rochdale on the 3rd, expressing his confidence in the Reform question, but condemning Earl Russell for weakness in having invited Lord Stanley to a seat in the Cabinet. The Jamaica rebellion continues to be fiercely discussed, pending the report of the committee of enquiry sent out by Government; Brig-

adier Nelson has arrived in England, but declines answering the various newspaper attacks calling on him for explanations: the number of negroes executed is now set down at 3,000.

Among the changes preparatory to the new Parliament, we observe that Sir Francis Baring [of the renowned firm of Baring brothers] and Sir John Romilly have been raised to the peerage; Mr. Goschen [another banker], recently named Vice president of the Board of Trade becomes a Cabinet-minister as Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster; Sir Robert Peel receives the Order of the Garter vacant by the death of Lord Palmerston. The committee on Capital Punishment advises a reform, treating as manslaughter all cases of murder without clear premeditation, and subjecting infanticide to penal servitude. The distinguished painter, Sir Charles Eastlake, has died at Florence. The Geographical Society held a session at which M. de Chaillu read a paper on his Gorilla experiences with great applause. Some of the American oil-springs having dried up, petroleum has risen greatly in price, and we notice the new Walschian petroleum Co. formed in London to work some springs in the Danubian principalities. The 800th anniversary of the foundation of Westminster Abbey [by Edward the Confessor] has been celebrated with great pomp. The murderer Forwood, alias Southey, feigns madness, but will positively be hanged. Among Argentine items, we notice the Loan in another column, and have received from Mr. Riestra a translation of Quentin's pamphlet on Paraguay and a treatise on the "River Plate as a field for emigration" with extracts from our columns.

The Fenian trials continue in Ireland the people feeling as little interest in the matter as ever, although the Government pretends to give it great importance, crowding the city of Cork with troops: the prisoners are sentenced to terms of penal servitude varying from 5 to 20 years. The police are still looking for Stephens about Dublin. The rumor of an attempt to murder the Lord-Lieutenant was unfounded. We regret to learn that the Archbishop of Tuam, Dr. MacHale, is very ill. Alderman Mackey was installed Lord Mayor of Dublin on the 1st, with the usual pageant. Mr. Chichester Fortescue has addressed his constituents on accepting the post of Chief Secretary for Ireland. Sir John Gray, at a banquet in Kilkenny, pronounced an eloquent exposition of his parliamentary views, in harmony with those of Mr. Bright on the questions of Reform, Tenant-right, Education, and the Church-endowment.

On New Year's Day the Emperor Napoleon received the congratulations of the corps diplomatique and high state functionaries: His Majesty in reply merely said that the retrospect of the past year was satisfactory and he hoped the present year would be equally so. The Moorish ambassadors brought some splendid Arab horses as a present to the Emperor. The Austrian ambassador presented the Prince Imperial with the decoration of Maria Theresa. The University authorities have suspended the students who made the absurd and socialist speeches at Leige. Some difficulty has arisen about the treaty with England for extradition of criminals. The Marquis de Larochefacquin is dead. The Emperor has resolved, in union with England and Russia, to send forces to occupy the kingdom of Greece and restore order. Gen. Pezet, ex-president of Peru, has arrived at Paris. The Government has prohibited the 'Independence Belge' circulating in France.

The Pope made a feeling address to the French officers on New Year's Day and gave his benediction to France, to the Imperial family, and to the army. Several of the bands of brigands have surrendered to the papal troops. At Florence the ministerial crisis at length terminated, and La Marmora has formed a new Cabinet. The Countess Milleflori, 'morganatic spouse' of Victor Emmanuel, is dead. The marriage of Prince Humbert with the Princess of Leuchtenberg has been broken off, the latter insisting on adhering to the Russo-Greek church. The Prussian Chambers are convened for January 10th.

TEN DAYS LATER FROM THE U. S.

CAPT. SEMMES, OF THE ALABAMA, PRISONER.
 CLAIMS OF ENGLAND.
 The President has removed the Provisional Governors of Georgia, the Carolinas, and Mississippi, and new Governors have been elected by the respective States.
 The editor of the Charlotte 'Times,' a North Carolina paper, has been arrested for writing treasonable articles.
 Walter McCoy, a colored man, was sentenced to be sold into servitude for five years for larceny. Major-General Crook, the Commander of the District, overruled the sentence as illegal, and in default of the decree not being rescinded by the Court all the Judges were to be arrested.

A great nigger panic existed in Yazoo County, Louisiana. The whites were flying to the towns, as the negroes in the country were gathering.
 The brig Attie Durkee, Captain Crosby, from Buenos Ayres, arrived at New York on the 22nd December, with a cargo of hides to George Savery.

Gold very dull at 145½.
 Last sale of hides, 2,000 Buenos Ayres, 24 lb., 20½ cts. gold.
 The question, would Jeff. Davis be hung, or no? was still greatly discussed; the New York 'Herald' argues clemency.

Mr. George B. Upton, a respectable merchant of Boston, has sent in a claim for 80,000 patacons for the destruction of his ship Nora, by the Alabama. The English Government repudiates in toto the claim, and Mr. Upton has now taken the matter before Congress.

In Washington there have been hot discussions, but the President was displaying a firm policy, and of the eleven rebel States five have their own Governments duly elected.
 President Johnson's Message to Congress respecting the Southern States had caused great attention. Generals Grant and Schurz had likewise published reports.
 A call had been made in the House for the early trial of Jeff. Davis.

A very animated argument had taken place in Congress on the subject of the Monroe Doctrine, which was partially revived.
 Mr. Thaddeus Stevens brought in a bill to make the rich Southerners pay the soldiers' pensions, but Mr. Raymond, of the New York 'Times,' made a powerful and successful opposition, and the bill was thrown out.
 Gen. Logan has declined the Mexican mission, and Hon. Luis D. Campbell is appointed in his place.
 Congress had adjourned for the holidays and a recess ordered till the 5th of January.

Great discussions had taken place on the recent decree of Maximilian respecting labor—it is insisted that it establishes slavery in Mexico.
 General Grant was to sail, in the flag-ship of the Gulf Admiral, after the holidays, to the Rio Grande, near Mexico.
 A powerful expedition against the Mormons is talked of and will shortly be fitted out.

There has occurred a terrible split amongst the Fenians in New York; Mr. Roberts, the new President, has applied to have Mr. O'Mahony indicted, the subscriptions have stopped, but O'Mahony's appeal to the Fenian brotherhood to put down Roberts has caused great noise. The whole business is ridiculed in New York.
 A splendid monument is about to be erected to Lincoln, in Union Square, New York.
 A new reciprocity treaty with Canada is being discussed, and it is thought it will be carried into effect.
 Mr. Clinch is acting collector in New York, Mr. King's successor not yet having been appointed.
 Commodore Vanderbilt, of New York, is planning a new line of railway from New York to Montreal.

Two Chilean privateers are being fitted out at New York, and the Spanish Minister at Washington has been notified of the fact that the United States Government does not mean to interfere.
 Congress has voted to the widow of the late President Lincoln 25,000 patacons.

The United States steamer Shamokin, bound for Brazil, when last heard of was coaling at Fortress Mourou.

The steamship Shamrock, only 28 tons burthen, crossed the Atlantic in the worst of weather. She picked up a crew who had lived thirteen days in a capsized vessel.

Capt. Semmes, of the Alabama, has been arrested in his own house and is sent for trial.

THE ARGENTINE LOAN.

(Private Letter.)

London, January 8th 1866.

My dear B.,
 By this packet you will have news of the good or bad fortune of the Loan, which was launched on the Stock-exchange on the 3rd inst. by Messrs. Baring brothers and Co., the subscription list to remain open till the 9th, which prevents my being able to inform you of the result, but Riestra will advise the Government by a telegram via Lisbon on the 10th.

There are weighty considerations both for and against the Loan; on the one side the Press has unanimously received it with favor, all the leading men connected with Riestra are doing their utmost, and it is a great thing to have such a house as Baring introduce it on the market, for the Barings would not do so if they were not sure of success, lest it might affect their credit in the money-market.

On the other hand we have the sudden and unexpected rise of Bank interest [on the 4th inst.] to 8 per cent, with anticipations of its going up to 10; and the news of the mutiny of Toledo, which, as well as all news from Entre Rios, have caused both now and on former occasions a very bad impression among the public.

The amount of Loan emitted at present is a million and a quarter sterling (half the sum for which Riestra is authorized) at 75 per cent, with 6 per cent per annum and a sinking-fund, of 1 per cent—redeemable in 33½ years. If the present emission turns out well the rest will be offered to the public on no less advantageous terms, the preference being reserved for previous subscribers.

HINTS FROM THE LONDON STOCK-EXCHANGE.

London, January 8, 1866.

To the Editors of the 'Standard' Gentlemen,

The new year 1866 has not brought anything cheering, nor ushered itself in at all 'couleur de rose' on the eve of its close, discount was fixed at 7 per cent, and on the 4th inst. at 8 per cent, and during the rise on the 3rd the Argentine Buenos Ayrean Loan makes its appearance, and has the honor of being the first loan of 1866. It is brought out at 75 per cent, and might have been done at 175 per, or any other rate, for all the public or brokers would have inquired into it; and since the Messrs. Baring's circular in the 'Times' of the 4th, not one word has been said by anybody, not even the 'Saturday Review,' nor is there a man in town who will believe any South American Republic worth 75 per cent, when Brazil was brought out at 74, and has fallen rapidly within the last few days, and only stands today about ½ to ¾ prem.; but as this loan will be kept amongst the friends and favored few, if taken at all, or kept over till the other £1,250,000 are issued at some future date, no one knows, and the amount that will reach the financial coffers of your Ministry, unluckily no one cares for. In reality 75 is only about 67 or 65, deducting 1½ interest in favor of the public, commission of bankers, interest on money advances, &c., but even so it is a high figure, and all homage is due to his Excellency Don Norberto de la Riestra, 'give Cesar his due,' and no other man in the River Plate could have done what he has most gloriously effected. To-morrow's 'Times,' which will be in time for the outgoing mail, is expected to have an official statement on the matter, though they have kept perfectly quiet up to today; but as the lists will close to-morrow, the latest advices of the 'succes,' will be telegraphed to Government, by way of Lisbon, and so prevent others making commentaries on the affair.

The Stock Exchange is very dull, and the rise of discount has put a damper on everything. Before Parliament meets discount will be at 10, as a great amount of money is yet required for the legion of bills depending to come before the House, also enormous amounts required for railroads: one known house alone, who as yet has done nothing in the Plate, requires some twelve million sterling for some very important lines, with one of which the public as yet is only acquainted, and that in Russia, the others being nearer home.

Bank shares are rather flat, London and River Plate standing very well, 11 to 13 prem., the old and the new shares at 2 to 3 prem, London, Brazilian, and Maua only 1 to 3 prem. old. Baron Maua is Deputy Chairman in place of Mr. Bischoffheim, resigned through a dispute with the chairman.

THE 'TIMES' ON THE ARGENTINE LOAN.

Messrs. Baring have this afternoon opened subscriptions for the Argentine loan, which has been expected for some time. It consists of 1,250,000. 6 per cent, stock, at 75, and the actual amount in sterling will, therefore, be 937,500, in instalments extending to the 10th of next July. For several years Buenos Ayres has been engaged in applying her surplus means to the reduction of her small existing foreign debt, but the war with Paraguay, in which the Republic has been engaged as the ally of Brazil and Montevideo, has created the necessity for sudden resources. The dividends on the present loan are to date from the 1st inst., and reckoning the advantage from the delay in the instalments the price will be reduced to 73½, apart from the condition that the principal is to be paid off at par by annual drawings in 33 years. THE CARNIVAL.

Carnival is over and we are again hard at work, and it is a strange proof of the inconsistency of our nature, that of the many who rail against the follies of the last three days, there are very few who do not admit on cross-examination that they played 'a little.' We are, on principle, also opposed to the Carnival, yet we have had a share in the sport just like our neighbors. Those who flattered themselves the custom was dying out would find themselves strikingly undeceived on going out during Carnival, or enquiring as to the millions of egg-shells consumed, and all this notwithstanding the formidable war in which we are engaged with Paraguay. On the whole the season of merriment or folly has been unusually brisk this year, and we have hastily picked up some scattered memoranda.

The young men of the city formed themselves into companies or Compañars in tasteful uniforms of which the following were the principal.

Los Negros—Red jacket and cap, white pants, gloves, top-boots, with a good band of fifes, guitars, violins, &c. 50 in number.

Anrora—blue jacket, white straw hat, white pants, &c. and a first-rate band of brass and string instruments—60 in number.

Salamanca—Spanish students dress, good string band—30 in number.

Nacionales—blue jacket and cap, white pants and tops—20.

Santa Lucia [from Barracas]—Garibaldi jacket, Scotch cap, high tops, white gloves, splendidly mounted, riders and horses wreathed with flowers: these gentlemen were only a dozen in number and had henchmen carrying eggs in baskets, which they threw alternately with confectionary, keepsakes, &c. The other 'compararas' were not mounted and besides the above were many numbering from 10 to 30 gentlemen each.

Owing to the rain on Sunday there was little playing in the streets, and even the balls at Colon and the French theatre were thinly attended, while the Coliseum could hardly count 20 ladies, but on Monday the sport began with real zest, although numbers of people were down on the beach anxiously expecting a steamer from the seat of war. Not the least amusing was a grand pitched battle at the corner of Calles Peru and Victoria between a band of gentlemen wearing four-and-nines, mounted on two breaks with fire-engines which they plied vigorously for half an hour, but they were at length beaten off the field, leaving some 50 hats, which the Callo Peru men erected into a trophy.

The playing was pretty general during Monday and Tuesday, and we are happy to say that as yet we have learned of no serious accidents or disorders, everybody shewing the best of good temper even under trying circumstances. Some squabbling of course occurred at the masked balls in Colon, where there is necessarily an 'olla-po-

drida' of Buenos Ayrean society on such occasions: a row also happened in calle Piedad by a Frenchman throwing a bottle, but we believe this is the first Carnival for many years unattended with loss of life.

We are indebted to a correspondent for the following amusing account of the Carnival, to which he also appends his protest, although we have a well-grounded suspicion that the writer more than once attended the celebrated Irish Carnival at Donnybrook.

Scarcely had the gun fired on Sunday, when the playing commenced with the usual programme: knocking off hats, throwing eggs, and loud laughter; but the rain, which commenced to fall heavily, and continued without intermission up to five o'clock, was a damper on those parties who calculated on a day's sport. Monday was fine, and the disappointed players of the previous day seemed determined to make up for lost time. Calles Defensa, Victoria, Florida, and San Martin, seemed to be the headquarters: here the playing was very brisk, and the throwing of eggs and showering down water (mixed with flour) gave a variety and colour to the proceedings. The fair sex seemed to pay particular attention to the passers-by: coachmen were hailed as a prize, and salutations showered down on them in all directions, which they duly acknowledged by bowing their thanks. In Calle Rivadavia a woman and two children were said to be hurt, but we cannot vouch for it. In Buen Orden a milkman nearly came to grief by losing his temper: he was pulled here and there, and escaped in an undressed, or nearly so, condition. In 25 de Mayo the 'shell-practice' was very sharp, and the scene was enlivened by two sailors, not teetotallers, attempting to sing "Let us be happy together;" the audience rewarded their efforts with five or six buckets of water, and they not liking this style of applause, shook hands and disappeared. The various bands of the city played some good music, and we may particularly mention the renowned 'Salamanca.' About ten o'clock the Plaza became enlivened by the appearance of the 'masqueraders.' There was a good assemblage of sailors, Spanish dons, brigand chiefs, &c. The day was wound up by a ball at the Colon, and another at the French Theatre. Wednesday was a repetition of the two preceding days: water-throwing, balls, &c. and so ended the Carnival of 1866. We do not mean to cavil, or find fault with Carnival as an 'institution' or a 'usage' [we don't know the exact term], but we do think this 'pleasant game' ought not to be allowed to monopolise the most useful part of the day to the inconvenience of many.

Another correspondent supplies us the following particulars about the masked-balls. "The balls at the Coliseum were a decided failure: on the first night it was raining, and only 20 ladies and 100 gentlemen attended; on the second night there were barely 50 ladies, and the want of a master-of-ceremonies was much felt. There was no fun; the thing being too genteel, and after a short time all went away."

"The French theatre and Colon were crowded with the demi-monde: in the former they danced the Can-can, Mme. Pauline occupying one of the boxes. The Progreso ball was brilliantly attended and everything passed off with great delat.

"But the Club del Plata was decidedly the gayest of all. On Monday night the saloons were crowded with 500 ladies and gentlemen, who kept up the merriment till 5 in the morning, the fair sex impersonating several roles with great taste. 'Night' and 'Morning' were beautifully got up, also two Swiss milkmaids, and a hundred others in fancy-costume. A lady in pink silk and black lace spoke English, French, German and Spanish so as to defeat any attempt to guess at her nationality: the Lady in White went about jocularly tapping people on the shoulder with her fan: another with blue ribbons and red roses danced all night with an English navy officer: a girl with blue mantilla, calling herself Rosalia, and speaking French fluently, excited general curiosity."

We are told that the three days playing so exhausted the albigos of

water that on Tuesday some houses began throwing beer. Several gentlemen who went to the country returned on Tuesday evening and got wet through for their pains, in coming into town.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Carnival is at last over; it passed off very quietly, few arrests, plenty of fun, and lots of water; over two hundred thousand dozen of eggs were bought, sold and smashed, at \$5 per doz: this gives one million, for eggs alone. 'eau de Cologne' 92,000 small bottles at \$5 each makes \$460,000; newspapers, 120 arrobas at \$45 is \$5,400; then sweet meats; there are 432 confectioners in town each shop sold say \$100 worth of sweets, say \$43,200. Then masks dominoes &c. at least one thousand people went masked and in fancy costume say \$100 each person \$100,000—making a grand total for the 3 days of one million six hundred and eight thousand paper dollars, and this estimate may be regarded as rather under than over the mark. We give a detailed account in another column.

The packet arrived on Monday and half the clerks in town got drenched to the skin going for the letters to the Post-office.

The Buenos Ayres and Montevideo Telegraph at last seems about to be realized. Mr. John Oldham has arrived in the packet; he is the engineer and manager of the Company. We welcome this gentleman to the River Plate, and will publish to-morrow his letter to us, full of interesting particulars.

'Sinbad,' our war correspondent, has met with a glorious reception at headquarters: President Mitre took him into his tent and promised every information for the 'Standard.' Generals Gelly Obes and Emilio Mitre shook him by the hand warmly, and insisted on his staying, offering to supply him with tent, guard, etc. Colonel Rivas offered him half of his tent, and, in fact, all the officers were delighted to find the 'Standard' correspondent amongst them, but, we regret to say, domestic affliction hurried our talented correspondent from his post: he has been obliged to go back to Esquina for a few days—he was to have returned to Corrientes on Wednesday: his letter will appear to-morrow.

The packet brought to Buenos Ayres £55,000 for the Maua Bank and £5,000 for H. J. Ropes, Esq.

The half-yearly meeting of the Club is convened for to-night; the Secretary requests us to call the attention of the members to the necessity of a punctual attendance.

We are glad to see that our friend, Lieutenant Johnson, formerly of the Dotorel, has at last been promoted; on the 16th the Lords of the Admiralty raised him to the rank of Commander. Lieutenant Johnson has a large circle of friends in Buenos Ayres, who will be delighted to hear that he has been promoted.

The Stromboli leaves in a few days for England: we bid the ship and officers a long farewell, and wish them a pleasant voyage: the Stromboli men were great favorites in Buenos Ayres; they will all be paid off now, and probably never again seen in the Plate.

We have received a lengthy communication respecting the departure of one of our Consuls. We cannot publish same until we see the writer, as we are not at all sure the letter in question would meet the wishes of the writer or the gentleman referred to.

The letters which we received on Saturday for the supplemental mail, we forward to-day by Brazilian steamer to the French Consul at Rio. Our subscribers need have no fear as to their delivery.

Colonel Conesa has sent his official report to the Governor, Dn. Mariano Suavedra. For want of space we are obliged to hold it over until to-morrow. The fight on the 31st, after all, seems to have been a very serious affair.

By this packet we learn that the British Government has purchased of an American officer, named Beardsley, his patent for infernal machines. The trials at Portsmouth have been most satisfactory.

On Monday morning there was a great rise in the Boca river. The water kept rising until midday, covered all the streets and gardens, and got into the houses.

We hear it rumoured that Captain Salas, of the Carmel, has tendered his resignation. We suppose the cause of this was the disaster in Montevideo.

Mr. Leandro Pereyra, a wealthy native estanciaero, is building an immense house at the Boca; we suppose it is for a tenement lodging house. Rents in the Boca are very high, and there is no better speculation in Buenos Ayres than building a range of cheap wooden houses in calle Jackson. A wooden house that costs at the very outside \$10,000, rents for \$250 a month. What a splendid business!

The drag lies idle at the Boca, when, if the Government knew its own interest, it would have it every day working away at the mouth of the Riachuelo and clearing the approach to the Boca. This drag cost the country a deal of money, and yet there it lies, rotting in the Boca.

The new Bank of Rosario is at last on its legs. Mr. Iturraspe, a Buenos Ayrean merchant, has subscribed 30,000 patacons—the shares are now all taken.

The Government of the Province of Santiago seems to be of the true South American stamp. A bill has been brought in to declare void all sales of public lands. What a scandal! And another law has been introduced declaring the nutria an animal belonging to the Government. 'Can such things be' in an enlightened country? A Province that would attempt such laws should be deprived of its Legislature and ruled the same as one of the weedy islands of the Paraná.

A new paper recently started in Buenos Ayres called the 'America' rather stupidly attacks the Municipality of Montevideo for subscribing 250 pats. to the English races in that city, alleging that it is an immoral way of spending the public money. Our readers will no doubt laugh at the prudish remarks of our colleague. It would indeed be well for the Orientals if the public moneys were never worse disbursed than in this trifling gift to support a Nat. amusement: there would be less pilloring of the public treasury, if there was always such honesty of purpose, and our ascetic colleague should know that the same corporation which so willingly assists the barnless pleasure of the race course is the only Municipality in the River Plate which keeps the streets well paved, and the roads in good repair. We, for our part, congratulate the Montevideans on their go-ahead Municipality, which flings to the winds all South American hypocrisies, such as that of the 'America,' and employs the Municipal revenue for the public use, advantage, and pleasure.

On next Monday the renowned Dn. Mariano Billinghurst will hold his levee at Messrs. Peto and Betts workshops at the Southern Railway at Barracas: all the surplus tools, stock, engines, &c. will be sold under the hammer, as the engineers &c. are bound homeward: this seems as the death-knell to the Dolores extension, about which we heard so much; and the conviction that the road will go no further than Chascomus is indeed dolorous, but we still adhere to the belief that if the traffic on the line to Chascomus at all equals the expectation of the shareholders the line will be prolonged, since it is alike the interest of the Company and of the Government to extend the road to the most important country town in the province.

The public lands in the province of Santa Fé although now coming into demand are not selling fast enough to meet the Government disbursements; a legal sale has been ordered of four 'estancias' close of Santa Fé in the North: each lot contains several leagues of fine pastured land, the probable value of this land is from £70 to £80 sterling per league, the best buyers in the country are Englishmen, yet notwithstanding, the Government auctioneer has failed to send us any notice of the auction or particulars about the land; We may further remark for the benefit of those interested in this sale that the auction will take place in the public Plaza of Santa Fé, and to the highest bidder on the 18th of this month.

An English bricklayer might make his fortune by taking the steamer and visiting Santa Fé, a new market place has to be built, the Government is

tried calling for proposals, not one man in the city of Santa Fé has the courage to send in a proposal.

Governor Oroño's last expedition to the Gran Chaco proved so successful that now there is nothing talked of in Rosario save small chacaras, estancias laudes, and even new towns in the Gran Chaco. The Government engineer has been sent to survey the new estancia of Mr. Frank, in the very heart of the Gran Chaco: every one is asking what has become of Wilcken, Vernet and Ruding. The American concession is not yet despaired of Messrs. Richard, Inglis, and Navarro are the concessionaires, and it is believed they will soon start for New York. Echagay on his way down from Cordoba called on Oroño and also got a grant so that our readers may not be surprised if shortly we have Don Mariano Billinghurst selling off by auction splendid estancias in the Gran Chaco.

The immense river traffic which the present war has caused, is now felt at every river port in the Republic, freights have gone up and the Italian boatmen are becoming millionaires—at Corrientes, Goya, Santa Fé and the Boca, there are hundreds of schooners being built: in the Boca every cabbage garden has a vessel on the stocks in it also. This great impetus to one branch of trade has as a matter of course caused a rise and a very serious rise in the price of hard wood, Uruguay, Quebracho and Vigas de Guirapita are as scarce as paper dollars on the Bolsa, and although the axe is at work in every mount, the supply falls far short of the demand.

There has been no fighting since last mail. The Paraguayans have taken some few prisoners. Words can give no idea of the state of Corrientes. Every house is filled with Brazilian officers. The Hon. Mr. Washbourne had an interview with President Mitre: 'Sinbad' acted as interpreter. The President refused a safe pass across the lines to the American Minister, as active operations are about to be commenced. There is a crowd of fellows in Corrientes who know all about Schleswig-Holstein, Baden, Richmond, Pittsburg landings; and prices for everything have gone up to the clouds.

A dinner two patacons. The floating bakery has arrived. Pastor Obligado has left and gone in disgust to Buenos Ayres. Governor Evaristo Lopez is very popular, and the strong opposition is dying out. The Correntinos say he is the right man in the right place. Carreras is in Asuncion, and not in prison.

Berges is also in Asuncion, and head man in the Government. The Paraguayans have a large fleet of canoes at Paso de la Patria. A solemn Mass for the dead was ordered at the Paso de la Patria. Barrios, Lopez's brother-in-law, is second in command; he is a man of much more cruel disposition than Lopez.

Every day and night a constant firing at the Pass is going on, but the river is too wide for the guns to do much damage.

Sinbad has sent us a sketch of President Mitre's encampment, which can be seen at our office. Hornos with cavalry at the Pass, then Emilio Mitre's brigade, General Mitre's headquarters next, in an orange grove and a large palm tree in the middle; behind this is Nelson's brigade, and then Sosa's regiment; Paunero is quartered to the left of the President's headquarters.

The Argentine force on the 7th February stood as follows: Commander-in-Chief, 1 General, 5 Gefes, 218 Accounts, 1,815 Troops, 18,373. Total, 21,412

Patacons went up to-day slightly, owing to the growing case of paper, and the news from Europe, as it is thought that the loan will, after all, cause but little import of specie. Notwithstanding, however, the rumors on 'Change, and the rather gloomy prospects held out by our London correspondent, the news about the Argentine loan is highly satisfactory, and several parties have already subscribed: the balance, whatever it is, will be taken by Messrs. Baring Bros., of London, and Hope, of Amsterdam. There can be little doubt, however, that Messrs. Baring, having waited so long, would not have launched it at the present season if they were not certain of success. No telegrams have come to hand, owing to the wires having been cut or in possession of the Spanish rebels.

The time sales of specie to-day were of a limited character.

In Exchange there were several bills passed for the supplemental mail at 61 1/2, about £35,000. All these bills were drawn by merchants—we could hear of nothing done by the banks.

In National Bonds nothing done during Bolsa hours, but afterwards a small transaction was effected at 39 1/2. Holders of these securities hope to see some improvement now that the loan has been launched at 75, and particularly as it is well known that the coming Congress the interest and amortization on these bonds will be payable in London.

Mr. Sassenberg, a well known German merchant, who has been absent in Europe for some months, was welcomed on 'Change to-day by the whole commercial body of Buenos Ayres.

In saladero produce we hear of 100 Pipes tallow at 15s. 2,000 Salted hides, 61lb, at 33s.

Respecting the rate charged by the River Plate Bank for gold, we are happy to say that 18 1/2 is the rate charged, and not 24, as incorrectly stated by the brokers on the Bolsa.

Respecting Capt. Harrison's Steamship Co, we have received from him the following: London, Jan. 8th, 1866.

I have made all arrangements for sending out six paddle steamers and one screw as soon as the time is extended, and they will surpass, both in speed and comfort, any boats now on the river, or that have been there, Mississippi not excepted.

The six paddle steamers are two hundred and thirty feet long, twenty-eight feet beam, with guards all round, and cabins on deck; they have overhauling engines of 240 horse power nominal and will work up to 1,200 horse power. They are new, and have made from eighteen to twenty miles per hour on their trial trips.

We notice the new firm of Miller, Mata, and Co., in Rosario. Sr. Aldao is the head partner, Mr. P. L. Ramayo is named President, and Mr. J. M. Gutierrez Vice-President of the new bank in Rosario, called the Bank of Rosario. 15 per cent. has been called up on the shares.

In one month the Argentine Central Railway Company will run trains for public traffic to Tortugas.

In the wool market, although little animation exists, the highest prices of the season was obtained to-day. Mr. Ninian Johnson's wool sold to-day at 97, but the wool was in prime condition, and although we believe the quality of Mr. Oldendorff's sheep equal in every respect to that of Mr. Johnson's, still the condition of the wool of the latter is far superior. Another first rate lot, belonging to Mr. James Sprout, at 93, say 1,000 ar. In the North Plaza the sales are very unimportant. Few good lots coming to market, the lots offering belonging principally to native estanciaeros and pulperos, which with difficulty fetch 65 dollars.

We heard on 'Change to-day that the importer of a large amount of yerba had been arrested for non-payment of freight.

Many of the shopkeepers who have failed within the last fifteen days are now in close confinement, having been arrested for debt.

Our advices from Europe respecting wool are good; the best and finest classes sell at excellent prices, but there is a general complaint that the growers do not wash their wool on the estancias.

Land—Three square leagues between Chivilcoy and Fortin de Arco, Government land, sold to-day for 10,000 dollars, the right of 'infinitesim.' The French Consul closes his extra mail at 12 o'clock to-morrow [Thursday.]
