THE WAR IN THE NORTH.
LETTER FROM "SINBAD."

Corrientes, March 9th.
Gentlemen,

Since our last, nothing noteworthy has occurred either by land or on the river. No movements are reported to have been made by the belligerents at any place. The allied fleet was to have sailed a week since. At present there are no signs of making a move. The report of the hour is that to-morrow they will sail in two divisions, one going up the Paraná to attack Itapirí, while the other is to ascend the Paraguay river to shell Humaitá. Such stories have been so often repeated here that they are no longer listened to by anyone. Preparations are making to march; still it will take some days to put all in readiness to do so. During the last 24 hours the river has been upon the rise, which is considered the beginning of the "ereciento grande;" this is another reason to retard for a few days any movement of the allied fleet. Sick from the various encampments continue to be brought in. On the 5th the Pávon for your port left here with one hundred and eighty invalid soldiers of those that were wounded on the 21st of January. The steamer that took them might have come, without an effort, to almost within a stone's-throw of the hospitals from whence the wounded men were taken, yet from some unaccountable cause she remained a mile and a half below the landing place to where the hurt men had to go. A few of the officers were moved upon litters, such as could walk footed it, while those unable to do so were transferred in foul scavenger-carts pertaining to the police of the city. This was done at noonday in the streets [where pieces of timber lay across at many places which had to be jolted over] crowded with soldiers, who might be seen going listlessly about at every turn, at every corner, while the thermometer stood at 94.° in the shade.

Persons who left the allied army this morning report all quiet there. The Argentine army has moved towards the Paraná, as the pasture was used up where they were encamped. Street fights continue. Panics take place in the Brazilian camp, at the battery, by day and night. No notice is taken of anything that is going forward in the city or its vicinity by the local papers. By them you will observe, the procrastinating movements of Tamandaré are not approved of by all. If something is not soon done, we fear the Admiral will have to listen to language galling to a brave man's ears. Almost every house in the city has been transformed into a restaurant, tavern, store, or shop of some kind, the proprietors of which recommend keeping the fleet moored in front of the town, as also the temporary embargo laid upon sailing vessels under the Argentine flag. In fine we crave your indulgence for forwarding you such matter, and further beg you to wait until the 25th, when you may rely upon stirring news.

THE WAR IN THE WEST.
LATEST FROM CHILE.

DETAILS OF THE NAVAL COMBAT.
(Chilian version.)

EUADOR JOINS THE ANTI-SPANISH ALLIANCE.
The "Tribuna" received yesterday, via Rosario, papers from Chile to March 1st, containing the following account of the fight near Chiloe by Capt. Lynch, commander of the Chilian steamer Lautaro:

Ancud, Feb. 8th 1866.
To the commander of the allied fleet,
I have the honor to inform you that at 6.30 yesterday morning two frigates were seen near the Tabon inlet: they resulted to be the Madrid and Blanca of the enemy's fleet, and kept for some hours moving about looking for the entrance of the roadstead. We at once made preparations, getting ready the battery, sending coal to the steamers, and putting reinforcements on board the Apurimac and America, after which I took my place on board the Covadonga.

At 4 p. m. the two frigates came up the Boca Grande towards us, and the Apurimac opened fire on them: the fight lasted an hour and a half, during which our vessels sustained very little injury, having only two men killed in the Union. Our firing seemed to take effect, for the enemy kept at a respectful distance, and finally drew off. We were so far apart that we could not see whether our shots told, and the Covadonga allowed the enemy to waste his ammunition, without replying. At 5.15 p. m. seeing the Blanca partly aground, we went out and fired some shots at her with great precision, but the latter began to incommode us with a very hot fire, and as we could not use our swivels we retired. Captain Villar commanded our fleet: after the fight, we began to take in coals, and passed the night under arms. The America was of little use in the combat, one of her boilers being actually under repair.

To-day the enemy's frigates were seen off Tabon, steering southwards, and will probably not return without reinforcements. Meantime we are making all defensive preparations, and constructing a battery of 4 guns on the Island, the officers of the garrison lending every assistance.

The officers and crew of the Covadonga behaved well, and I learn those of the other vessels also fought like Chilian mariners. The Apurimac and America could not go out to attack the frigates, owing to the disabled state of their boilers. The land-battery, under Lopez and Hudson, could not join in the fight, being out of range, but sent a force to prevent any attempt of the enemy to effect a landing. The Blanca, before leaving port, seemed to be making repairs. If the frigates continue out of sight, the other vessels (Esmeralda and Maypú) will be able to join us.

Private correspondents give many interesting and fanciful details, but their accounts of the allied fleet shew the authors of previous despatches to have been grossly imposed on: for instance, we were told that "the Apurimac did not take part in the fight, having no guns on board," and now we learn she discharged the stupendous amount of 341 shots in 90 minutes, or nearly 4 a minute! Of this number, 325 were 'wide balls,' but 16 struck the enemy, and one of them was a 110-pounder. It is needless to remark what sharp-sighted people Chilians must be if they can see where a ball hits, at long range (say 2 miles), and even determine the weight of said ball, amid the hurly-burly of battle. Nay more, an officer of the garrison of Ancud asserts the enemy fired 1200 shots, of which 1191 fell wide of the mark (this is worse than the French in Algiers), only 3 hitting the Union, 1 the America, 1 the Covadonga, and 4 the Apurimac. Although the Chilians were firing 4 a minute, their shots were beautifully aimed, as they 'bulled' the frigates 38 times, besides 80 shots in the rigging and bulwarks. It is really wonderful that the Spanish frigates were able to return to Valparaiso, a distance of 200 leagues, in 6 days, in such a battered condition, and the loss of the allies not exceeding 2 men!!

But these Chilian journalists think they are writing for children, and the wonderful tales which throw in the shade 'Ali Babá,' 'Earl Guy' and 'Whittington's cat' do not find believers on this side of the Cordillera. It is now pretty evident that the Madrid and Blanca destroyed or disabled the whole combined fleet of Perú and Chile, blew up the forts, and cut down the telegraph-wires: this alone can explain how the Spanish vessels were the first to announce the news of the

engagement, at Valparaiso: The only part of the Chilian account apparently true is, that the sailors of the allied fleet got no breakfast or dinner, were completely unprovided with ammunition, and felt very hungry that night. The Spanish vessels had Chilian pilots on board.

Nothing fresh is known of the iron-clad Numancia and the Blanca, which left Valparaiso on a second expedition, February 18th.

Advices from Quito give the text of a protocol concluded, on Jan. 20th, with the Peruvian and Chilian Ministers, whereby Ecuador engages to join the anti-Spanish league. This news was received with music and illuminations at Valparaiso.

From Bolivia we learn that General Melgarejo has withdrawn the declaration of war against Chile about the guano-islands of Mejillones. He has also revoked the decree convening a National Assembly for August.

MONTEVIDEO.

The phantom-ship-The Foreign Races-Official notes-The murder of M. Reboul-The new Panama light-Railway to Durazno.

Nothing fresh is known of the 3-masted steamer supposed to be a Chilian or Paraguayan 'Alabama', seen off Lobos island. Some people accuse the pilots of having invented the story, but it is just as probable the privateer was really seen and has since put out again to sea.

The Foreign Races are postponed to April 3rd, which is very inconvenient, as the Belgrano Races come off the day previous: it looks rather strange that English turf-goers in Montevideo should seem opposed to their brother-sportsmen in Buenos Ayres.

The Government has issued no new decree, but publishes official notes from the King of the Belgians, renouncing his father's death, and from Queen Isabella with intelligence of the birth of a Spanish Infanta at Twickenham. Governor Vidal condoles with the former, and congratulates the latter, of his 'great and good friends.'

It seems the recent action against the 'Siglo' was for having charged the authorities of Mercedes with wilful neglect in looking after the assassins who murdered an old French resident named Reboul. The neglect was clearly proven, yet the Alcalde is unpunished.

A temporary light has been put up on the Panama bank, where the steamer Falcon was lost a few days ago. Sr. Senou Rodriguez expects by this packet the final news from London as to whether the intend Co. will make the Railway to Durazno or not. Mr. McColl and two other members have been named by the Junta to carry out the arrangements about making a new Plaza at the Aguada.

The Chief of Police is preparing a funeral service for the remains of the Frenchmen slain by Oribe in 1844. A project is on foot the erect a monument to General Pacheco Obes who defended the city during the siege. Wednesday being Victor Emmanuel's birthday the Italian officers will have a grand Te Deum at the Matriz.

Sor Bustamante, of the 'Tribuna,' has shot Capt. Martinez in a duel, and the latter died soon after.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday the rain which is so much wanted, and was so anxiously sighed for, put us all in a good humor! It commenced about 3 a.m., and rained heavily until daylight. The morning was very heavy, and it rained off and on. At 10 o'clock we had a splendid shower; the weather still keeps heavy, and we hope that we are in for plenty of rain, as the south camps are in a shocking state. The rain in this month is peculiarly serviceable to the camp, as the young grass has sufficient time to grow strong before the frosts set in.

In Barracas the great novelty is cotton-picking at Standard-hall. The plants are all covered with pods, many of which are fully blown. The cotton is of a beautiful long staple, very fine, and resembling the best Sea Island samples we have seen. Cotton grows well in Barracas, and we regret that the English proprietor of the 'Potreritos' at the Boca did not take the hint last year and plant cotton: the crop would have given him more than what the hills are worth.

The Portefa arrived yesterday from Montevideo, true to time, but did not bring one word of news about the Chilian privateer, which, we suppose, we must regard as one of the 'holas' of the day. The 'Telegrafo Maritimo,' which is generally the best informed in maritime news, has not a single line about the Spanish war-vessels which, it was said, had left Montevideo to chase the stranger.

There has been a terrible duel in Montevideo between Sr. Bustamante and Captain Servando Martinez. Bustamante, at the first fire, shot Martinez. The cause of the duel seems to have been some dispute about the elections. Young Flores, Bustamante and all concerned are in custody.

The camps of Santa Fé are in splendid condition, and offer great inducements to Buenos Ayres' sheepfarmers. The price of land is very moderate, the grass high, plenty of room for thousands of flocks, and all sheep moved into the province doing well.

Notwithstanding the war, our readers will be surprised to hear that the number of 'pobladores' in the islands in the Paraná is so increasing, that soon there will be nothing left to let but the Gran Chaco. At the mouth of the Paraná, in front of San Fernando, every habitable isle is denuded, out even to the Boca del Guazú: whilst all up along the river, as high as Santa Fé, there is scarcely a good island that is not settled on. In front of Zarate there is a Frenchman who has actually sheep and cattle thereon. He has made so much money during the last few years, that he now thinks of selling the island and returning to La belle France.

The English steamer Hercules leaves for Rosario to-morrow. She is a fine boat with good accommodation.

From Magdalena we have the most alarming news respecting the drought. The country is all burnt up, there is no grass for sheep or cattle, and if the rain does not come soon the stock will all perish. Many farmers are moving their sheep nearer the coast where the 'bañados' exist, as there is some green grass there still.

The article on the Paraguayan war, published in Monday's 'Nacional,' has created a profound impression. We regret, from its length, our inability to produce it, but we commend it to the attention of our readers. It is generally supposed that Dr. Velez Sarfield is the writer of this rather famous article. The author, whoever he is, evidently believes that the allies will get the worst of it when they attempt to cross the river; and even if the allies obtain the most complete triumph, he considers that the war will last for years, and ultimately exhaust all the nations engaged in it.

Yesterday the interesting ceremony of launching a small river schooner took place at the Boca. The vessel was built in a small garden, several squares from the river, and had to cross the railway in order to reach her element. As a matter of course, crowds witnessed the ceremony, which is now becoming almost an every-day occurrence at the Boca.

There is some tremendous row going on in Rosario and Santa Fé about a correspondence published in the 'America,' charging Governor Oroño with the most wholesale electioneering swindling. The papers up there all defend Governor Oroño and deny the accusations. Some very important public-land auctions are to come off on the 26th inst, some 12 estancias; and as Mr. Leon Mujica, who, we believe, is the Government auctioneer, does not take the trouble to send us full details, we are unable to inform our readers where the lands lie, and what is their probable value.

The arrest of Mr. Cornac on Monday night was not generally known until Tuesday morning. There was a strong feeling on the matter when it was first rumored that the Government and the Bank had him arrested, as people regarded it as a most arbitrary exercise of authority, there being a suit actually pending against him; but later on it was discovered that neither the Government nor the Bank had anything to do with the matter, and that the arrest was simply made by order of the Judge in case he refused to return the papers. It seems that Mr. Cornac's lawyer, Dr. Garcia, had

the documents in question at his country-house in San Fernando, and consequently it was impossible for Mr. Cornac to deliver them up. The measure seems to us very sharp practice and a harsh proceeding, as some hours' notice might have been given to Mr. Cornac previously.

The samples of silver at present on the Bolsa belonging to Mr. Klappenback, are but temporarily placed there, as the owner intends that they shall be sent to the Exhibition in Paris.

A gaucho who knows how to 'tresnar,' i.e. plait thongs into lassoes, is wanted, to be sent to Paris to be placed on exhibition. He will be required to build a mud rancho such as is used in the camp, put up a palenque, make a hide bed and drink maté, so that the visitors at the exhibition can form as correct an idea of a gaucho's residence in the camp as if they paid a visit to La Plata.

Mr. Oliver, the celebrated Belgrano judge, has accused the 'Nacion' of libel—the case will shortly be tried. It seems that the Court has summarily suspended Mr. Oliver for disobeying the order of the Court—this is probably the first case of the kind in this country. We notice that there is much personality mixed up with the case. Mr. Oliver charges Dr. L. Torres with holding a quinta near Belgrano which does not belong to him; what this has to do with the question we are at a loss to say, but the judge is charged with being a most litigious character, having no less than 60 lawsuits against him during his official reign.

We have received advices from that flourishing quarter known as Frayle Muerto, and are happy to inform our readers that the English settlers up there are doing well, and each week increasing. The Government of Cordoba is about to pass a law exempting all 'peones' on the English estancias there from military service, which will prove most beneficial for our countrymen.

The Gran Chaco expedition leaves Rosario on the 20th. The greatest preparations are going on; and, in fact, there is nothing else talked of in Rosario. The whole party will consist of some fifty persons, and the following is a list of the Englishmen who intend going:—Messrs. Perkins, M. T. English, Washbourne, Hildreth, Stewart, Parker, and four or five Englishmen from the Paraná.

The Espigador, with Corrientes mails, arrived at 11 o'clock yesterday. Col. Roca, commander of the Tucuman contingent, dropped dead in the allied camp.

Admiral Tamandare was about to start with the fleet on Thursday, when he received a letter from President Mitre, which set the Admiral in such a rage that he kept walking up and down the quarter-deck fuming for half an hour afterwards. No one knows the contents of the letter.

'Sinbad' has sent us a description of his visit to the prison of Corrientes, which we will publish to-morrow. Captain Richeson, of Rosario leaves to-morrow for the States. He will return in August with a splendid vessel, which he intends to run between Rosario and Montevideo. His 'chacra' at Rosario he has given up, and it is now owned by the Baron Maua.

An Argentine officer, we read, shot a Brazilian sergeant on Tuesday, at the battery at Corrientes, and escaped. Osorio has issued a decree, ordering the arrest of all Argentines found in the Brazilian encampment without a written permit.

On Sunday night, between 12 and 1 o'clock, a carriage with three persons drove up to the Socorro and stopped in front of the old burial ground and plaza; the parties in the coach got out and threw some large parcel into a well. A black woman who happened to see the midnight scene gave information on Monday morning, the neighbors assembled and tried to explore the well—it is said that a broker went down half-way and came up again; yesterday the police were on the ground, but it is so full of weeds that as yet they have discovered nothing. This mysterious affair has plunged the whole neighborhood into the greatest excitement, as they suppose some dark deed has been perpetrated.

Mr. Saltwell, of a leading foreign house, has won in the lottery 250,000

pes. We congratulate our friend on his good luck.

On Saturday night, at about eleven o'clock p.m., a most exciting scene occurred at the Foreign Club. It appears that a man without his hat rushed into the reading-room, and followed immediately by another, who with a cocked revolver pursued him, shouting out 'asesino.' Before the gentlemen who happened to be in the club had time to turn round, an old gentleman entered in a most excited manner, and catching the man with the revolver dragged him out, telling him at the same time to put up his pistol, which he did. The pursued then left the club, and the 'sereno' took the man's hat to the Policia. Nobody knows anything further about this rather extraordinary business.

LATEST FROM SAN JUAN.

THE CODIGO DE MINAS.

Gentlemen,
Very few of your Buenos Ayres readers, I suppose, have ever perused the collection of laws relative to Mining, bequeathed to the Argentine and other Spanish American Republics by the Spaniards, commonly called the "Ordenanza de Mejico"—a collection of laws which for the period in which they were given, show uncommon talent and are carefully and wisely calculated and adapted to the newly gained provinces. Through changes from wild countries but scantily populated by Whites under Spanish Viceroy, to thriving Republics, with increased and continually increasing want of improvements in legislation, the old Ordenanza de Mejico holds its own in Chile and Perú. That these two countries are the richest in Mineral Wealth, the most advanced in mining enterprise of all South America, is however no proof of the Ordenanza's perfect excellence or sufficiency. It has been kept on because it was in general use from nearly the beginning of Spanish immigration. Chile without altering the original code, obviated the want of clearness, which is its greatest short-coming, by a sort of supplementary explanation, composed by D. Pedro Nolaseo Cobo of Coquimbo, which did away with arbitrary expoundings of certain articles, and provided for many deficiencies. The Argentine Republic kept the Ordenanza intact till 1853—chiefly because in the absence of miners and mining districts there was no cause to alter it, or even to enquire into its efficiency; but the mines of Cordoba, Chilecito, and Catamarca gained importance, the law was found insufficient and the Estatuto of 1853 was issued, professing to be an improvement on the Ordenanza. However good the intentions of its compilers may have been, they did not succeed very well in their object: instead of improving the law, they rather put a new difficulty in the way of mining enterprise by allowing, say one man, to monopolize all the mines of one district by paying patent, without obliging him to work them. Any person or Company might speculate on monopolizing a newly discovered district, and hold on for a good purchaser, whilst it is clearly the interest of Government and people to have that district worked and to promote industry by passing the produce through the ports and markets of the country, for the country's benefit. Since the discovery of the San Juan mining districts and their increasing prosperity, the subject of improvement of the Mining Legislation has been repeatedly brought before Government, until last year Congress determined upon taking steps in the matter. D. Domingo de Oro was requested to draw up a new Ordenanza, and a commission was named, the members of which were D. M. Fraguero, D. F. B. Correa, D. G. Davila, D. P. Agote and D. Regulo Martinez, to examine the draught with a view to its applicability and completeness, taking into consideration all requirements and conditions of the country. The plan of the new Code was finished but Congress had no time to consider it last year—it is to be hoped it will have better luck in this. Not that in its present condition it would supply all wants; Mr. Oro's proposals should be commented upon by practical mi-

ners, mine-owners, and especially by such as have had experience in mining outside the Argentine territory and might bring that experience to bear upon many questions.

Hitherto, then, the miners of this province conformed to the Ordenanza de Mejico, as modified by the Estatuto Nacional, paying a patent of twenty hard dollars to the Aduana Nacional for every mine annually, and working it or leaving it alone as best suited them.

But last month the Government of the Province, anticipating the decision of Congress, took the matter in hands and decreed the suspension of the Estatuto and sole validity of the Ordenanza, according to which a mine if not worked for three months becomes denounceable, the original owner losing all right to it.

This decree is good as far as the obligation put upon the mine-owners is concerned, that if they cannot do their part towards developing the resources of the country, they shall at least not stand, like the dog in the manger, in the way of those who can; on the other hand it has this drawback: it puts the San Juan miner between two fires—which master shall be obeyed?

San Juan is a poor place; many who would willingly work their mine, can barely scrape together \$20 to pay patent and keep it for better times, they fulfil the orders of the Nation and act strictly up to the law, yet three months, perhaps three weeks or days, after their payment of patent a third party can dispossess them, being equally in his right according to the law of the province.

The Government of the Province of San Juan cannot plead ignorance of the Estatuto Nacional de Hacienda y Credito Publico, sanctioned at Santa Fé Dec. 9th, 1853, accepted by Congress on the 17th of the same month, and published in the 'Nacion Argentina' No. 64, on the 18th; has it power to do away with an act of Congress and to take its own measures, however useful they may be, instead?

The question is important enough to all who have invested capital in San Juan mines, or intend doing so; foreigners or natives of the Argentine Provinces naturally look to the National law for their guidance; are they to pay patent and still be liable to lose their mines according to Provincial law, or are they not to pay and be liable to lose them according to the Estatuto? One of the largest mine-owners in the Province, to clear up all doubts on the subject, tendered the Administrador de Aduana the amount of patents due this year; this official wrote to the Minister of Finance in Buenos Ayres and received a rather ambiguous reply "to act according to the Presupuesto." In the Budget there is no provision made for Diputadps or other Government Mining officials, and the Administrador refused to receive payment of patents on that account.

He has been requested to give this decision in writing, and if he does, the miner's mind may be at ease on the subject of the patent.

Another serious question arises out of the publication of a decree in the 'Zonda' of the 3rd inst., which imposes a duty of so much per mark upon all produce containing silver, be it in bar, lead, or regulus, threatening confiscation and fines to all smelters and amalgamators who even deliver up to the owners such produce without having previously received the certificate of duty paid. Now Congress, on the 1st of August, 1855, declared free of duties of extraction all metals, minerals, etc., and Government sanctioned the decree on the 6th of the same month. It cannot be denied that the duty, considering other advantages, is moderate, and would meet with no comment; but is it legal whilst the decree of Aug. 1st is in force.

The coming Congress will settle that and all other questions bearing on mining legislation, once and for all; the want of a good code has so often made itself felt in this province, that miners in general will heartily welcome the results of the labours of the Representatives of all provinces, hoping that one or other of them may know something about Mining.

NEWS FROM ENTRE-RIOS.

GREAT DEMAND FOR GOVERNMENT LANDS.

THE CHURCH ON FIRE.

On last Thursday the whole town of Gualeguaychú was alarmed by the ringing of fire bells; people were running to and fro, just as if the Paraguayan were around the town. Soon it was discovered that the roof of the old church was on fire; the roof was burnt clean off, but no lives lost.

The theatre of Gualeguaychú is open and Madame J. Amey performing twice a week to crowded houses. The receipts at the cas'om-houses for January are \$7,931 bol. Mr. Coghlan the engineer, from Buenos Ayres, is busy at Gualeguay with the railway, a small branch line is talked of.

On the 15th the school examinations were to take place and a distribution of prizes at the Theatre. The Uruguay lottery is proving a great success for the owners of the lottery, people in Entre-Rios complain that they never win anything, the bulk of the tickets is sold in Buenos Ayres.

The Gov. has granted a subvention of 300 pats. per an. to pay for pasture lands for the colony of San José which has now grown to such importance that there is no room for the cattle. Colonel Nadal has gone to Buenos Ayres, being in bad health.

D. Augusto Rivero has protested against the sale of his estancia at the Arroyo Malo. D. Lorenzo Solanne a shopkeeper has failed for a large amount.

Land is now so looked for in Entre-Rios that the busiest place in Entre-Rios is the public-land office, but we notice that neither the price of the land nor its dimensions are given in the papers.

The Legislative Chambers have been twice convened, but no meeting, owing to want of a quorum.

In Concordia things are very dull. On the opposite side of the river there is a great stir, pickaxes and shovels going up to the diggings. Salto is a very thriving town, the department contains no less than 902 leagues, and stretches over 100 leagues on the Brazilian frontier.

The steamer, Rio Paraná, is greatly liked. She is the favorite steamer on the Uruguay.

Entre Rios is crowded with English, all looking for camp. The last sale of land has been in the district of Concordia, at 7,000 patacons per league. In and about Gualeguaychú the land is as thickly settled on as in the province of Buenos Ayres.

Good sheep worth 16 to 18 rls. Land, from 7,000 to 10,000 patacons per league.

Wool all sold and shipped to Montevideo and Buenos Ayres. Total clip this year half a million of arrobes.

THE REVISTA DE BUENOS AYRES.

We gladly seize the first leisure hour amid the whirl of politics and commonplace distractions to take a stroll through the fields of Argentine literature with our esteemed and gifted colleagues of the 'Revista.' The number now before us (32nd) commences with a paper by Dr. Juan M. Gutierrez on Leiva's commentaries of Azara's history, a valuable manuscript which was accidentally sold to the Brazilian Government among the books and papers of the late Sor. Angelis, but which has just been restored to the public library of Buenos Ayres. The 'Revista,' in publishing this M. S. from the copy taken by D. Andres Lamas, has rescued it from oblivion and from

future dangers. D. Vicente F. Lopez's essay on the languages and races of this continent before the Spanish conquest, would be accepted with thanks by the Ethnological Society of London. The letters of the Jesuit fathers Gervasoni and Cattaneo are translated from the Italian by D. José Manuel Estrada junr.: we have already reproduced some of the collection in our columns under the title 'Buenos Ayres 140 years ago,' and will do so again as soon as we have a spare corner, since they throw an interesting light on the early, but not remote, history of our city. Doña Fernandez de Córdoba, an episode of the Spanish regime, from the pen of Dr. Quesada, has reference to the vice-royalty of Toledo in the historic city of Potosí. D. Manuel Garcia contributes a paper on the nature of the Federal tribunals, a subject as yet only imperfectly understood by our lawyers, and a dead-letter to the bulk of the nation, as we have seen at San Luis and Cordoba. The history of the first printing-office in Buenos Ayres is very entertaining, Dr. Gujierrez furnishing us with a catalogue of the works published therein: these are mostly on religious subjects, with Latin dedications in the best Ciceroian style, besides a treatise on Philosophy [also in Latin] printed in 1792. This printing-press originally belonged to the Jesuits of Cordoba, and after their expulsion was brought to Buenos Ayres and presented to the orphan asylum of San Miguel. Since then the art of Guttenberg has made great progress in this city.

This number of the Revista has not such a variety of subjects as the public generally likes to see, and 7 papers make up its 160 pages; but, on the other hand all, except the Ethnological studies, are most entertaining to the general reader, and the style and scholastic merit of the Revista are superior to any thing in the way of periodical or light literature that our city can boast.

NOTES OF TRAVEL.

A TOUR IN THE URUGUAY.

Gualeguaychú is a little town in Entre Rios, opposite Fray Bentos, at the mouth of a small river of the same name. This town is rapidly growing, and from its river commerce, and the fine country dependent on it, we shall probably see at this point one of the most important places on this side of the river. It is now in population the second city in the province. In the department of Gualeguaychú there are five saladeros, each of which uses from 40,000 to 50,000 cattle annually.

The lands of Entre Rios are attractive for their undulation and supply of water and of timber, and superior richness of soil. The Government makes very favorable terms with the immigrant as to their sale. Occupancy gives preferent right of purchase to the occupant, and after 10 years' occupation, one-third of the price is abated, and 20 years will abate one-half of the price. The valuation by Government is \$3,000 s. per league. The Government arranges for annual payments for land, extending through ten years. By paying cash a liberal reduction, 20 per cent. is made, and a portion can be paid in provincial scrip, with in cash 60 per cent., which two facts are highly favorable to the purchaser. The Government will also rent land to settlers at \$50 s. per annum for a league. Among the farmers of Entre Rios good tame horses can be bought for \$8 to \$10 s. each, milch cows for the same, oxen \$10 to \$12 s. each, sheep, \$1.20 to \$2.50 s. each, farmhouses and shepherds are hired for \$8 to \$12 s. per month.

A traveller passing along the borders of a province could hardly be relied on for all these items, but what was beyond my own observation I gathered from old residents of the various localities noticed.

For the reasons, and counting already on the protection of some influential Irish residents who have done me the honor to promise me their children, I have resolved. 1st. To establish in Mercedes a college for the Irish community of the neighborhood, in which I will receive up to 50 boarders. 2nd. To provide the institution with the necessary elements for a literary and scientific education. 3rd. To open the said college on the 1st of May of the current year, under the title of..... For the fulfilment of my purpose, I have fitted up a first-rate house, which combines all the requirements of comfort and ventilation, having large 'patios', aljibe, &c., and situate in the centre of the town. The monthly charge for boarders will be 5005 pps per month. I have to beg of those parents who may resolve on entrusting their sons to my care, to call on me at the Colegio San Luis, of which I am Director, or at the house of Messrs. Forrada, where boys can be entered on the books till April 15th; and in case the number of children so entered will encourage me to undertake the heavy expenses called for by an establishment of the kind, I will positively inaugurate the same on the 1st of May. Irish parents will please bear in mind that this college will have no connexion whatever with the present 'Colegio San Luis'. I have the honor to salute the Irish residents of Mercedes with the assurance of my highest esteem.
