THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

ARRIVAL OF THE ESPIGADOR.
MOVEMENT OF THE BRAZILIAN FLEET.
The Espigador entered port yesterday, and crowds of people were waiting on the mole to learn the news, which was speedily communicated by the 'Tribuna' bulletins that came ready printed from Corrientes.

Humayta has not yet fallen, nor had the army crossed the Paraná, up to the 23rd inst., but active operations were commenced on St. Patrick's Day by the Brazilian fleet moving up in imposing force to reconnoitre the Tres Bocas and Paso la Patria.

We have files of the Corrientes papers to the 22nd, and advices from our unrivalled correspondent "Sinbad" to the evening of the 23rd, with dates from head quarters at Ensenadas to the morning of that day.

At 9 o'clock on the morning of the 17th, the iron-clad Barroso carrying the flag of Viscount Blachuelo, vice-Admiral, led the march towards the Tres Bocas, followed by 3 gunboats: this was the first Division. In half an hour, the 3rd Division weighed anchor, comprising the iron-clad Brazil and 4 gunboats, then the iron-clad Tamandaré and three more gunboats forming the rear, with the steamer Cisne carrying the Minister Octaviano and his mules and coach. At 2 p. m. the 2nd Division followed, in this order: steamer Aps carrying Admiral Tamandaré's flag, the monitor Bahía, despatch-boat 'Once de Junio,' and transport Princess taking in tow the floating-bakery and a pontoon laden with troops, besides two gunboats: in all 22 vessels. The only vessels left behind in Corrientes, as a reserve, were the Argentine steamers, Guardia Nacional, Libertad, and Buenos Ayres, and 6 Brazilian gunboats, including the Amazonas, two transport steamers and some sailing vessels. The fact of Tamandaré refusing to allow Admiral Muraturi to take part in the expedition gave rise to unpleasant remarks from Argentines, although the Argentine vessels are really unfit for service.

We are not told what the fleet was doing for 6 days from the 17th to the 23rd, except that the iron-clad Tamandaré approached the fort of Itapirú and (by one account) was fired on, while 3 gunboats made surveys near the Paso la Patria, and the rest of the vessels formed a line across the Paraná near Tres Bocas. It does not seem they met with any infernal machines, but Colonel Nelson has made a plan of the Pass (which is in our possession) showing that the only obstacles are some schooners laden with stone sunk in the channel, and under cover of the batteries the enemy have flat-boats, mounting heavy guns.

It was expected that the grand move of forcing the Pass and invading Paraguay would be attempted on the great Brazilian anniversary, March 25th (Sunday), and that the enemy would offer no serious resistance in proximity to the shore but fall back behind their strong entrenchments, 3 miles inland, beyond the range of the artillery of the fleet, where a terrible struggle must ensue.

The rendezvous for the rafts, canoes, flats &c. was at Santa Anna, about two leagues from General Osorio's encampment. On Tuesday [20th] the Victoria tored up a great number thither. The gunboat Magé followed, next day, and grounded at the mouth of the Atajo: on the 23rd the Belmonte and Blachuelo tried to get her afloat but failed, and the river has fallen 2 feet. On the 24th the Uruguay and Duke of Saxe took up a number of rafts, and the Brazilian commissariat

department was to go up on the 24th, aboard 2 steamers and 12 transports. The return of Octaviano caused much surprise. General Gelly once arrived from head-quarters on Tuesday night to meet his family at Corrientes. All the officers in town had been ordered to the camp. Five deserters from the Entre-Riano batt. were caught by a Brazilian boat, and sent on board the Guardia Nacional.

The Government of Corrientes is still in a crisis. Dr. Lagratta's resignation was followed by that of several other employees, but it is contradicted that the Governor intends to resign. Dr. Torrent, new Argentine envoy to Brazil, left with his bride, on Friday for Buenos Ayres. A Brazilian hospital is being constructed at the Bateria, to hold 200 beds.

LETTER FROM SINBAD. ALL ABOUT THE FLEET. MR. OCTAVIANO RETURNS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES FROM HEAD-QUARTERS. Corrientes, March 23, 1866. To the Editors of the 'Standard.' Gentlemen,

On the 17th the first formal move was made by the Brazilian fleet. At ten a.m. Tamandaré got under weigh with 4 iron-clads and 8 gunboats, and steamed up the Paraná, coasting the left bank. In the afternoon of the same day another gunboat, and a transport, with the floating bakery in tow, also took their departure. The Admirals Tamandaré and Barroso wore their broad pennants on board the iron-clads, which bear their respective names. Octaviano, in the transport Cisne, kept company with the squadron. What he meant to do no one could tell, all were anxious to know; he had hired a coach (not a very decent one) and mules, which were shipped on board the Cisne.

The steamers proceeded five leagues hence, when they came to an anchor under the left bank of the Paraná, abreast of the village of Santa Anna, which is a league distant from the coast. It is said Tamandaré went alone as far as Itapirú without having seen any Paraguayans, when he returned. Subsequent news received from that quarter does not confirm the lone voyage.

On the morning of the 19th a steamer was discovered in the distance coming down the Paraná, and heading for the city. For the time being it made quite a stir. It was taken for granted that the stranger was a Paraguayan prize (guns had been heard at daybreak); by her rapid speed she could be no other than the Ranger. No such thing. The steamer proved to be the Cisne, bringing the identical minister Octaviano, with coach and mules, who had left this so shortly before bound to catch the Grand Marshal. A boat put off from the steamer with the minister and two officers. As they reached the shore, people clustered round the boat to learn the news. All went away as wise as they came. Octaviano was evidently in an ill-humor. The manner peculiar to the Brazilians of expectorating when they are irritated was plainly observable in the Minister. The officers that came in the boat with him were very laconic in replying to their brother-officers who had come to greet them. It was openly asserted in the street that the Minister had interfered with Tamandaré's business, and had got a broad hint to abstain from doing so more. To-day he leaves this for your city. Barroso has returned from the fleet; he is at present superintending the 'chata's,' long strings of which are hourly being sent up the Paraná in tow of small steam-boats.

The Argentine steamers have not moved: that they have been left behind, is severely commented upon by the Argentines in general. They ascribe their being left to improper motives.

During the last six days we have had besides a fleet of sailing vessels thirteen steam transports, arrivals from Rio, Montevideo, and your port, most of whom brought vessels in tow. All came laden with military stores or troops. Amongst others the Provedor and Viper, who made their passage in four days, a thing without precedent in the history of the navigation of the Paraná. One of the trans-

ports brings 50 howitzers, weighing five tons each, a thousand tons of shot and shell, and powder sufficient to set or blow down the universe, to say nothing of the stock on hand of the 'villainous salt-petre.'

On the 19th the Paraguayans acted one of their pranks that deserves to be mentioned in the 'Episodes.' It was known to General Hornos that the Brazilian fleet was at anchor at Santa Anna the day previous. The General left his encampment with an escort for the Paso de la Patria, where he expected to find the allied fleet, in order to salute Tamandaré. As soon as Hornos reached the Paso the horses were unseadled, and preparations made to discuss 'carne con cuero' and 'yerba,' when, instead of an iron-clad, a runaway Paraguayan steamer was seen going down the river; in a little she returned, and fired a shotted cannon, intermingled with grape-shot and musketry, at a close range, at those congregated with Hornos. All took to their heels, never halting to saddle horses or to do anything else but run for life, with their 'recados' upon their heads, until they gained the woods, leaving much of their baggage behind upon the beach. Happily, (although within a hundred yards distance, and amid a 'luvia de metralla' and musket balls) there was no one hurt. From some unknown cause there was no landing attempted from the steamer, which steamed up the river out of sight, whereupon the fugitives took courage and returned to the shore in quest of the chattels they had so lately abandoned.

Enclosed I send two letters, one of which was written this morning at the encampment; also the 'Esperanza' newspaper, which treats of the subject. They go as vouchers that we are not dealing in erroneous statements. This took place within a league and a half of four iron-clads and twelve gunboats.

The political offenders are still in duration at the Policia. In the 'Nacionalista' you will find something; if it does not interest you it does the detained people.

SINBAD. Ensenadas, March 16th. Dear Sir, Yesterday I went to the Paso la Patria, and learned from the soldiers on guard that 4 days ago the enemy put up a battery of several guns on the right wing of Fort Itapirú, on a level with the water's edge. I could discern this new battery, which seems of stone: it has a high flag-staff from which is displayed the Paraguayan banner. There were several men bathing on a bank in the river. At 4 p.m. a Paraguayan steamer came down the river and stopped at Fort Itapirú. As I swept the horizon with my glass I could descry two volumes of smoke at opposite points, which probably proceed from encampments of the enemy. What most afflicted me was to see so many unburied corpses all about here on the bank and in the thickets. I saw three corpses without heads, with officers uniforms. The whole wood from Arroyo San Juan to the Paso la Patria has not a single tree that does not show five or six bullet-marks, and in all directions one sees graves and crosses.

A little below this point I met Generals Hornos and Caceres with a group of officers enjoying a repast of 'carne con cuero.' The spirit of the troops is in general excellent, as the rumor prevails that active operations are about to commence immediately, and officers and men were thoroughly disgusted at remaining so long inactive. Rumors of peace have been flying about for some days, and are still believed by many, though we cannot find out the authority. I forwarded your letter to Gen. Mitre. Do not be surprised if a day sometimes passes without your hearing from me, as letters from head-quarters often get lost on the road to Corrientes.

N. N. Ensenadas, March 23rd. My esteemed friend: On the 19th inst., as the Brazilian fleet went up the river to the bar of San Juan, I accompanied General Hornos and staff on a reconnoitring expedition to the Paso la Patria. We had just arrived there and sighted the Bra-

zilian vessels, when a daring little Paraguayan steamer came down the river, heading for the imperial feet; then she suddenly wheeled around and, seeing us on the bank, within musket-range, sent a cannon-shot whizzing by us, which was quickly followed by a volley of grape and causter. We made a stampede for the woods, some afoot carrying 'recados,' others on bare-backed steeds and never halted till we had got safe into the heart of the thicket, out of the range of that cursed grape-shot. General Hornos cut stick for his life, just like the rest of us, and all this happened with the Brazilian fleet within cannon-shot distance.

Since then, nothing has occurred worth mentioning, but we hear the enemy busy with axes and hammers. We are getting ready to force the Pass, and I think the grand move will occur within a few days. If you find a chance send me a case of soda-water, and believe me

GREAT EDITORIAL VICTORY. THE EMPEROR OF BRASIL AND SINBAD.

Yesterday we had the pleasure to learn that his Majesty the Emperor of Brazil, on the arrival of the last River Plate mail at Rio, sent an officer to an English house in that city for the 'Standard' as it contained the latest news from Corrientes. His Majesty on reading the paper enquired who were the editors, and who was Sinbad, and was so well pleased at the dignified and impartial tone of the Standard, that he sent his aide-de-camp to the English house in question requesting that the 'Standard' by each mail be forwarded to the Palace. The English merchant who informed us of this pleasing news, hinted that it was noways improbable that 'Sinbad' would receive, per return mail, some title or dignity becoming a member of the fourth State.

Sinbad will feel no less proud to learn that all the foreign residents of Buenos Ayres [and many Argentine too] regard him as the Thucydides of the war, equally admirable for his graphic style, impartial spirit, and sleepless activity in procuring information.

We beg to call special attention to the fact that while the latest dates of our colleagues are "Corrientes 23rd," Sinbad has forwarded us a letter from Captain D. at head-quarters Ensenadas of the same date: the letter (in Spanish) can be seen at our office.

Hurrah for Sinbad!

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The long looked-for 'Espigador' has at last arrived, true to time. Her news is of the greatest importance. The Brazilian squadron has at last moved up, but there seems to be a terrible row about the Argentine war-vessels remaining behind: the officers are all indignant and talk about resigning. We certainly cannot see what room there is for this fuss, as none of the Argentine ships have the slightest chance of surviving the fire of the Humaita batteries. The old mole was crowded as a matter of course, merchants, brokers, and editors thronged on the stairs to catch the first words of the captain of the falua, which were as follows: 'The fleet has moved up, the Paraguayans fired on the ships, and the Brazilians replied by the bands striking up strains of music.' There was no cheering on the mole at this news, but every one seemed well pleased that at last the allies had commenced to move.

We publish to-day a letter from Messrs. Cambaceres & Sharples respecting the late accident on the Southern Railway. Our duty to the public demands that we should open our columns to matters of such importance when they come so well guaranteed, still it is right to observe that it is only a one-sided statement, and people should not form any conclusion until Mr. Banfield has had an opportunity to reply.

A friend from Magdalena informs us that it has rained in torrents out there, and the grass is springing up, and those camps which a few weeks ago were the poorest and worst in the country are now beautifully green, and

the lagunas and arroyos are overflowing. The dust storm did immense damage in town and camp, but the old saying "Its an ill wind that blows nobody good" holds true: never since the 'Standard' has been started, have we had such a demand for papers, weeklies, 'dailies,' packet editions, every paper in the office bought up. We printed several hundred extra, and yet before 9 o'clock yesterday morning the edition was exhausted: the mail to Europe is one of the heaviest we ever made up.

We have much pleasure in announcing that the Rev. Mr. Dillon has been named by the Bishop, Professor of Sacred Scriptures and Dogmatic Theology in the Seminario Conciliar of the diocese. This talented young clergyman, an alumnus of All Hallows College, Dublin, has gained much favor since his arrival in the country, from all classes who have the pleasure of his acquaintance.

Mr. Lettson has gained quite a prestige by his prophecy of the last storm: we regret to hear that this excellent gentleman presages another and still worse storm for the 30th; every one in town is frightened, we advise our subscribers to supply themselves with tapers and matches which they had better for greater safety carry about in their pockets. We hope Mr. Lettson may be mistaken.

Yesterday there was a regular run on us for 'Pallière's Album,' we have now only one left, this is the last of the edition.

M. Legout, the editor of the French paper, we hear, refuses to pay the fine of 10,000\$ imposed by the Court, preferring to suffer imprisonment rather than pay the money.

On Good Friday the Rev. Mr. Dillon will preach the Passion Sermon at the Irish Church, San Roque, Calle Defensa, at 11 o'clock.

On Holy Thursday the procession will take place in the Plaza, and the Vice-President will go the round of the seven churches, accompanied by his ministers, &c. He will pass the 'Standard' on his way to the Church of Santo Domingo about twelve o'clock.

Our colleague, the 'Tribuna,' states that Mr. Bell, the American engineer, who placed the infernal machines in the Paraguay river, has consented, for 20,000 patacons, to show Baron Tamandaré where they are. We had heard nothing about this previously, and as our 'wide-awake' correspondent, 'Sinbad' says nothing about it, we strongly suspect that there is some mistake. It is rather remarkable that when we gave the news about the infernal machines, our colleagues ridiculed the idea; now, however, they all admit that we were right.

We notice with pleasure a splendid testimonial signed by all the principal residents of Mercedes in favour of Sr. Zavalia, the criminal judge; we hope this will put an end to this vexed question.

The 'Provedor,' with news of the fall of Humaita, is expected to-morrow. We have been assured that when the news arrives, Government will order a general rejoicing and three holidays—which we suppose will be when Holy Week concludes.

A fellow has been caught in Cordova who has committed no less than 28 murders. He was to be shot the day the diligence left. Shooting is far too good a death for such a wholesale assassin.

The French packet is looked for, this morning; if the letters are delivered early, merchants will be able to answer by the supplementary mail to Montevideo.

During the great dust-storm last week a painter, who was adorning the ceiling of a school-room at the Caballito, had a very narrow escape. The darkness spread so soon that he could hardly get down from his elevated position; the children at the school all began crying and calling for their mamma and papas.

Owing to the pressure of war news we are obliged to hold over till to-morrow the mails from Montevideo, Rosario and Frayle Muerto. Dr. Pongerard, of the Santa Lucia Commercial College is, we are happy to say, fast recovering; his college is now one of the first in Buenos Ayres, and we think is the largest educational establishment in Buenos Ayres. A subscriber from Lujan requests us to advise our readers against moving sheep at present, as the young thistles act as rank poison on the animals. The storm at Lujan caused great mixtures and levelled several houses, but there was no loss of life. The parting of sheep is still going on. Some Basques have not yet found their sheep. Our informant says that if the storm had lasted 5 minutes more not a house in the partido would have been left standing. A woman on Mr. Torrey's estancia was blown down whilst rounding up the sheep on the 'rodeo,' she had to be carried into the house. Our friends in the camp should be on their guard on the 30th, the day Mr. Lettson anticipates a still greater storm.

THE SPECIE CERTIFICATES. The altered specie certificates of the Provincial Bank are the vexed question on the Bolsa: although the Bank has called in all its specie certificates, it appears most of them have not as yet been presented, as these certificates are found so convenient that merchants and brokers prefer them to specie. In a strict legal view of the question there can be no doubt the bank is not liable for a forged note, but there are times when legal liability has to give way to interest and convenience. The certificates in question were badly engraved and miserably printed, on the poorest paper we have ever seen used for bank purposes: they were in a measure a temptation to forgers. Had the bank taken proper precautions, and had these certificates been properly engraven on the very best description of paper, the case would be different, but it is an astonishing fact that with the aid of yerba water the color of a certificate for 100 pats. could be transformed into a certificate for 2,000 pats. The case seems hard that the Bank should be called on to pay these spurious certificates, but if as we hear they are only two or three in number it is the interest of the bank to pay them.

Drs. Avellaneda and Velez Sarsfield, of course, will ridicule the idea, and prove that such an act would be immoral; but if the case went before an English jury, the bank that would emit certificates which could be so easily falsified, would be severely censured. Mr. Goodall, of the American Bank-note Company, offered to manufacture the paper, bills, and certificates for the bank, but the directors saw fit to decline his offer. What is the consequence? That the market is flooded with false \$20, \$50, \$100, \$200, and even \$500 dollar bills: these bills, being for trifling amounts, are destroyed or thrown on one side when by chance they are taken. No one thinks of suing the bank for supplying the city of Buenos Ayres with such rotten currency, but when the bills rise to the magnitude of fifty thousand dollars each, the time has arrived when people should take alarm. The bank holds the monopoly and enjoys the contract of supplying the country with money; just the same as a company may have the contract for supplying the city with water. Will it be argued that if such a company was to pour into the city a foudor or impure water, causing disease and sickness to the inhabitants, an action would not lie against the company by the humblest member of our society, for heavy damages. In like manner we find the Bank of Buenos Ayres supplying us with paper money and specie certificates, but of what a character? As for the paper money, it is unnecessary to point to the abuse, for not one man in ten can distinguish a good fifty dollar bill from a bad one; and as for the certificates, we have now a sad experience of the nature of these docu-
