THE WAR IN THE WEST.

MAILS FROM THE PACIFIC.

We have files of the Chilean papers
 to March 17, and news from Peru to
 March 9.

The most important event is the
 return of the Numanca and Blanca to
 Valparaiso, on the 14th, after a month's
 cruise southwards. They could not
 get near enough to the Chileno-Peruvian
 fleet, which lay behind an island, and
 had to content themselves with capturing
 some merchant vessels. On the
 9th they took the steamer 'Paqueta
 Maule,' bound for Montevideo, off
 Santa Maria island, she had 130 pas-
 sengers, of whom 123, Chileans, have
 been detained prisoners of war, and
 the rest, with the crew (Englishmen)
 landed at Valparaiso. The steamer is
 also a prize. They took the Italian
 barque Dos Amigos, the Prussian
 barque Union, and the Chilean brig
 Trujillo, in the port of Chillan, where
 these vessels were loading coals con-
 trary to the Admiral's proclamation.
 The Union, however, escaped one night
 before reaching Valparaiso, the crew
 having overpowered the Spanish guard
 on board, and got away: the Resolucion
 was sent after her, but returned on the
 16th without her.

Much noise has been made about the
 arrival of the American steamer,
 Uncle Sam, with supplies for the Span-
 ish fleet: she had been embargoed at
 Panama, by the authorities of that
 place, but was released through the
 French Consul on guaranteeing that
 her cargo was for Valparaiso. On ar-
 riving at this port it seems the Ameri-
 can Commodore, Rogers, would not al-
 low her cargo to be transhipped by the
 Spaniards, and intends, it is said, to
 send her back to the United States
 under a guard. Some boxes of boots
 for the Spaniards were confiscated at
 Caldera on board the mail-steamer.

The proposed property-tax, to carry
 on the war in Chile, is to be 5 per
 cent per annum (not 15 as before
 stated.)

On the 12th March, Mr. Nelson pre-
 sented his order of retirement to the
 President at Santiago, and Gen. Kil-
 patrick his credentials as new Minis-
 ter for the U. States. Complimentary
 speeches were exchanged, and a num-
 ber of persons assisted.

On the 14th a farewell dinner was
 given to Commodore Harvey by the
 British merchants of Valparaiso,
 Messrs. Gowland and Bland presiding.
 The gallant officer returns to England.

H.M.S. Devastation arrived from
 Callao with the news that the Peruv-
 ians had burned the Salvador Vidal,
 after giving her up to the Italian Con-
 sul. The war steamer Loa was
 launched at Callao. The arrest of
 Spaniards continues.

Photographic experiments have been
 made on the eye of the murdered mer-
 chant, Valdez, at Copiapo, resulting,
 as already proved at Florence, in giv-
 ing a portrait of the assassin.

GREAT NEWS FROM THE STATES.

WALL STREET IN TROUBLE.

GRAND MASQUERADES AT CARNIVAL.

PRESENCE OF JOHNSON ON SOUTH AMERICA.

New York, 28th Feb. 1866.

The Columbian Marine Insurance
 Co. has failed for a large amount, and
 thrown Wall street into a feverish
 state. Various examinations were
 going on, and light thrown on sundry
 matters, when the news spread to-day
 that another Insurance Company had
 gone to the wall. The Morris Fire
 and Marine Insurance Company sus-
 pended. The State Insurance Inspector
 had reported to the Government un-
 favourably about this Co. An order to

wind up the affairs had been granted,
 and the deficit is said to be very heavy.
 The Germans had introduced the
 gaudiness of Carnival, and young Amer-
 ics rather relishes them; splendid
 masquerade balls had been given and all
 along Broadway, and the streets in
 Brooklyn, hundreds of ladies and gen-
 tlemen masked might be seen pome-
 nading; the more sober class of Amer-
 icans condemned the innovation. In
 Galveston things looked ugly; a mi-
 nority had voted the secession ordi-
 nance null and void. The Indians
 were troublesome on the 27th Februa-
 ry. Pres. Johnson had a reception;
 it was the largest ever known at the
 White House. The crowds of stran-
 gers at Washington can hardly be ac-
 commodated although every week
 newly-built hotels are being opened.
 Several Cabinet changes are talked of.
 Stanton's exit seems fixed, and Harlan
 is also about to retire. Gen. Grant
 and staff had arrived at Washington.
 The Mexican question was still before
 Congress; Mr. Van Horn of Missouri
 made a terrific onslaught against the
 French. The collectorship of New
 York is still vacant. The 'Herald'
 states the post to be worth \$40,000
 per annum. Mr. Seward's mission to
 the West Indies is greatly discussed;
 it now appears that the real object was
 to secure a port for U. States ships;
 this augurs for a foreign war. He has
 been eminently successful and arrang-
 ed with the Danish Government for
 a port in St. Thomas. An application
 will be made to Congress for funds to
 fortify and strengthen the new port.
 None of the Southern ports will be
 fortified.

A station for iron-clads has been or-
 dered by Congress near New London,
 Connecticut.

In Albany there was a great row
 about the President's veto on the
 Freedmen's Bill, and the House voted
 a petition to Congress advocating the
 exclusion of the Southern represent-
 atives until the South has given proof
 of its loyalty.

The U. S. war steamer Brooklyn,
 now in Montevideo, was supposed to
 have been lost: she made the voyage
 to Rio under sail. She was 86 days
 from New York to Rio.

The steamers Luna, Leviathan, and
 Peyora were all burnt at the levee at
 St. Louis on Monday night: loss
 said to be enormous.

The Indians at Montana had made
 frightful devastations. Governor T.
 F. Meagher, at the head of 500 mount-
 ed volunteers, chased the savages and
 cut them all to pieces.

The Brazilian Government has ap-
 plied to the United States to purchase
 some of the ironclads, but the United
 States Government positively refuses
 any offer.

Lieutenant-General Cox, of Mary-
 land, it is said will be named to relieve
 General Webb as Minister to Rio.

The British barque Normandy, with
 wool and hides, arrived on the 27th,
 from Buenos Ayres.

The Americans who left the States
 for Brazil have written home respect-
 ing their new country: they are well
 treated and cared for by the Govern-
 ment, but they complain that American
 influence in Rio is quite secondary to
 English, and a first-class American
 house in Rio is much required.

An officer of the Brooklyn has sent
 to the Herald the log of the voyage,
 the vessel experienced bad weather.

We subjoin the following important
 market report respecting River Plate
 produce; it is the latest in Buenos
 Ayres:—

New York, Feb. 28, 1866.

In general trade there is no new
 feature to notice. With the continued
 unsettled state of our commercial and
 financial affairs, and the growing and
 settled conviction in the public mind
 of the propriety of proper legislation
 tending to a gradual contraction in
 view of a resumption of specie payments,
 and a corresponding decline in prices,
 the policy of buyers has become slow
 and cautious, and the movements of all
 kinds of merchandise are confined to
 the narrowest limits for immediate
 consumption.

The President's vetoing of the Freed-
 man's Bureau bill, and followed up
 so soon with his indecorous and undig-
 nified speech, has taken the country by
 surprise. The attitude he has assumed

towards Congress most seriously affects
 the whole commercial interests of the
 country.

Dry Ox and Cow Hides.—The re-
 cepts are by the following vessels:—
 From Buenos Ayres and Montevideo,
 'Glenwood,' 'Belgique,' 'Sarah A. Dud-
 man,' 'Juno,' 'Florence Treat,' 'Anna,'
 'Eliza Young,' with 71,181 dry River
 Plate hides; from Rio Grande, 'Anna
 Bell,' 'Alice,' with 13,804 dry hides;
 from Orinoco River, 'Angustura,' with
 18,883 dry hides; from California,
 'Ohiostain,' with 3,308 dry hides; from
 Europe, 2,434 dry hides; from Aspin-
 wal, 7,984 dry hides; from Central
 America, 6,897 dry hides; from Africa,
 24,046 dry hides; from Mexico, 2,655
 dry hides; from all other places, 3,775
 dry hides.

The market is quiet, with a very li-
 mited demand; the stock is large and
 increasing; holders continue firm in
 their prices, but to move any consider-
 able quantity a concession in price
 would have to be made: prices however
 rule firm.

Unwashed, Mestiza Wool.—With a
 further decline in gold and the conti-
 nued uncertainty of its position, there
 has been a limited business done in
 Mestiza Wool, some few parcels of the
 new clip have been moved at satisfac-
 tory prices, and the most that has ap-
 peared on the market, has proved to
 be of better staple and much lighter
 condition than had been anticipated.

The sales foot up about 500 bales,
 and the importations amount to 4,317
 bales; the market is dull, but holders
 show no anxiety to offer their wools
 at a sacrifice.

From foreign circulars we learn that
 "The Antwerp market for Mestiza
 Wool continued in good demand. The
 last public sales were more numerous
 attended by buyers than ever previ-
 ously known. Prices were 3d per
 lb. higher than the November sales."

Mestizosa Wool.—No stock, none
 wanted.

**General Remarks on the Wool Mar-
 ket.**—The market for the past month
 has been quiet, without any material
 change in price. Fine wools continue
 to be sought after, and are purchased
 by manufacturers in quantities to meet
 their urgent demands. There is no
 speculative feeling whatever, and al-
 though the demand must be regarded
 as moderate, yet the current require-
 ments of wool to keep our machinery in
 motion are so large, and the stock of
 fine wools so light, that prices continue
 firm and well sustained. With a short
 stock of fine wools, holders are not
 disposed to part with them at a loss;
 and, on the other hand, manufacturers
 have been making concessions in the
 prices of their goods, and with the
 conviction that the prices of all kinds
 of merchandise are still too high, they
 are not disposed to purchase wool, at
 what they esteem high prices, in any
 greater quantities than to supply their
 pressing wants. With the declining
 gold market, and the uncertain posi-
 tion of our financial affairs, we must
 remain content with a slow, quiet busi-
 ness for some time to come.

Thursday, April 5th, 4 p.m.

Sinbad's letter and plan of the bat-
 tle have taken the town by storm: there
 was no getting in or out of Spruncer's
 all day, such was the crowd to get the
 'Standard.'

People here insist that the Baron
 Alegre has been defeated, and the
 'Republicano,' a new evening paper,
 publishes two letters from Rio Grande
 about it.

The ghost at the cemetery is all
 cleared up: an English broker, Mr.
 Monaghan, it is said, who dresses in a
 white flannel suit, had been mistaken
 for a ghost.

The races are at last over—it is said
 that the natives were completely
 cleaned out of every 'centina.' The
 Narcissus men won large sums, and
 some gentlemen from Buenos Ayres
 also booked handsome sums.

An Englishman recently swam from
 the fort to the Cerro, for a wager. He
 was three hours in the water, but is
 the best swimmer in Montevideo.

Admiral Elliott will shortly leave
 for the Uruguay in the Triton. Capt.
 Campbell, of the Narcissus, we hear
 will accompany the Admiral.

The Mennon was to leave this eve-
 ning if her cargo could be got out, but
 it is unlikely she will get away before
 to-morrow.

Exchange for England down: all
 drawers and no takers.

The new English wool-washing es-
 tablishment is now at work and will
 effectually shut up Mr. Igaray, as the
 Englishmen wash by steam.

The weather has suddenly grown
 cold, and ladies all now appear in win-
 ter garb.

THE MONTEVIDEAN RACES.

SECOND DAY.

The weather, which had been so
 unpropitious on the first day, was
 clear and fine on the second. The
 bracing zephyrs from the Atlantic
 freshened the atmosphere, and at nine
 o'clock on Wednesday morning half
 Montevideo was on horseback or in
 coaches, bound for the course.

The road to the Cerrito was even
 more crowded than yesterday: it was
 ruddy and heavy, but everything
 looked sprightly after the rain, and as
 the coach-drivers had come down in
 their price, there was a good deal of
 the 'demi-monde' visible. When we
 arrived at the course, we found it cov-
 ered with people: the ladies did not
 muster so strong as on the previous
 day, but still some of the first families
 of Montevideo were present. The na-
 tive element was decidedly in the
 ascendant. The tents behind the
 Stand-house, which reminded us strik-
 ingly of Donnybrook Fair, were full
 of 'gauchos,' who were dressed in the
 full gorgeous elegance of the Pampa.

Mr. Charles acted as the clerk of the
 course, which was a rather arduous
 post, owing to the total absence of
 formality. Government not having
 interfered with the Custom-house or
 business occupations in the city, there
 was a less show of British clerks, but
 the navy men from every ship in port
 were there, betting on every horse,
 and of course winning and losing.

After a deal of bell-ringing, shout-
 ing, galloping up and down the course,
 the races commenced.

FIRST RACE.

A half round. Prize, \$90 mpn.
 1. Tordillo, owned by Mr. Perry.
 2. Tordillo barrigon, do. Mr. Maguire.
 3. Doradilla, do. J. Cross.

The betting was even on this race.
 There were no favorites, and the horses
 came in as above. Total bets, 200 dol-
 lars. Navy men lost heavily.

Mr. Maguire's horse, the Tordillo
 barrigon, was a heavy-looking brute,
 but had great legs: he nearly won the
 race.

SECOND RACE.

A half round. Prize, \$90 mpn.
 1. Tostado, owned by Mr. Gaus
 Ballez.
 2. Malacarra, do. Mr. Signs.
 3. Oscuro, do. Mr. O. Rizzo.

The Tostado was the favorite, and
 won easily.

THIRD RACE.

Once round. Prize, \$90 mpn.
 1. Bayo, owned by General Car-
 berry.
 2. Lebruno, do. Mr. Tomkinson.
 3. Oscuro, do. J. Cross.

This race caused great attention, as
 the horse that won resembled more an
 Angora goat than a racer. Heavy bets
 were made, Mr. Tomkinson's horse
 being the favorite; but the Bayo left
 everything behind, and the General
 won more than six months' pay by his
 ugly-looking Bayo. Bets, about 2,500
 patacons.

FOURTH RACE.

A half round. Prize, 60 patacons.
 1. Oscuro Yatay, owned by Mr.
 Sainto.
 2. Oscuro Claro, do. Mr. A. R.
 Hobbs.

Yatay was the favorite, and won
 easily. The Chief of Police lost heavily
 on this race.

FIFTH RACE.

A half round. \$60 prize.
 1. Oscuro, owned by Mr. Allen.
 2. Tordillo, do. Mr. Morals.

Tordillo was the favorite. Betting,
 4 to 10 on him, but he lost easily, and
 many insist that the race was a 'gau-
 chada.'

SIXTH RACE.

A half round. \$20 entry.
 1. Malacarra, owned by Mr. Q.
 Below.
 2. Tordillo, do. Mr. G. S. Halles.
 3. Malacarra, do. Mr. J. Flanagan.
 4. Doradillo, do. Mr. Van Touro.
 5. Salmo Oscuro, do. Mr. O'Hara.

This was a very close race. The
 Malacarra was the favorite: great bet-
 ting and much confusion, owing to
 their being two Malacarras. No fighting.

Young Flores lost heavily, having by
 some mistake backed the wrong horse.
SEVENTH RACE.

Gentlemen riders.

Once round. \$10 entry.
 1. Oscuro, ridden by Young Flores.
 2. Salmo, do. Mr. Sago.
 3. Oscuro, do. Mr. Usher.

This being the last regular race there
 was great excitement. Young Flores
 backed his horse with all the money he
 had, and some of our navy friends bet
 on Mr. Sago's horse, greatly to their
 own regret. The horses ran beauti-
 fully, and came in well, the Govern-
 or's son taking the lead. Total bets
 on this race, \$50 s.

It was now growing so late that the
 color of the horses seemed all about
 the same. The Chief of Police, who
 rode a fine black horse, decked with
 ribbons, was challenged by one of our
 navy friends for a half-round. This race
 was the most exciting of all. As a
 matter of course the Chief lost, greatly
 to the amusement of the excited police-
 men, who had been busy all day keep-
 ing guard in the tents. The ride back
 to town was attended with much
 danger, such numbers of horses, gigs,
 and bread carts: but every one seemed
 well pleased, even the losers. At the
 Hotel Oriental some jovial fellows
 kept up the sport until daylight, great-
 ly to the annoyance of the families
 stopping at the hotel.

Thus closed the Montevidean races,
 and the public of Montevideo are in-
 deed greatly indebted to the members
 of the Racing Committee for their un-
 tiring exertions, which, we feel proud
 to say, were attended with the most
 unprecedented success.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

We had mails yesterday from Chile
 and Montevideo, with important
 news. People are disappointed at not
 hearing from the seat of war, for if
 anything important had occurred a
 steamer would have been sent down,
 with a display of bunting. The
 Espigador will bring us a letter from
 'Sinbad' on Tuesday.

M. Palliere's auction was crowded,
 yesterday, and most of the paintings
 fetched high prices: we are very glad
 of it, for M. Palliere deserved it.

The 'America' has reproduced in full
 the correspondence and sketches of
 'Sinbad,' which are eagerly sought for
 by even those who do not speak Eng-
 lish. It is surprising how many Ar-
 gentines are dropping in to take the
 'Standard,' some to improve their
 English, others to have the most graphi-
 c accounts of the war.

We have most startling news from
 Central America, in the 'Panama Star
 and Herald,' Feb. 24th, but cannot
 make extracts in full till to-morrow.
 Gold fields have been discovered in
 Barbacoas (New Granada) on the
 West Coast, and 200 Californians were
 already there at work, having sent
 £6,000 worth of gold dust by the mail-
 steamer, and a rush for the diggings
 has set in. From Nicaragua we hear
 of 21 shocks of earthquake on Feb.
 9th, and a volcano in Costa Rica began
 to vomit smoke and dust in dense vol-
 umes. The Panama and Australian
 mail steamers are to begin running on
 June 1st.

We publish to day further news
 from the U. States, sent up by our
 brother-editor, who returns this morn-
 ing per 'Porteña.' He also sends an
 account of the 2nd day's Races, and is
 in high spirits with the jolly time he
 has had of it, among our jovial coun-
 trymen of the Mount.

Villa Luxan is one of the partidos
 which can boast a progressive and
 popular Justice of Peace, and we have
 great pleasure in stating that Dr.
 Real, through his praise-worthy efforts,
 has succeeded in establishing a school
 under the direction of 4 Sisters of Cha-
 rity: the new building is very tasteful,
 and new side-walks have been made
 up to the plaza. The inauguration will
 take place on the 13th. Great improve-

ments in the way of railings, trees, &c.
 have also been made, and Luxan is
 going ahead.

The law-courts to-day are occupied
 with the case of a runaway lawyer
 named Guilbeant, and that of the run-
 away jailor Sanchez: it is very absurd
 to be trying accused parties who are
 not in custody, when so many as 300
 urgent law-suits are awaiting trial.

We learn that the Bishop's College
 will shortly be removed from Calle Po-
 tosi to the Salinas, near the English
 cemetery, which is his Lordship's private
 property.

News from the Southern districts is
 that the camps are everywhere flooded
 after the recent rains, and near Chas-
 comus one has to gallop sometimes
 for a league through water.

All the berths in the French packet,
 and we believe also in the English, are
 already engaged, as well as in the Liv-
 erpool steamer Uruguay: this must
 be owing to the great number of Span-
 ish refugees who have escaped hither
 from the West Coast, returning to Eu-
 rope.

The 'Españia' published, yesterday,
 a sensation bulletin, announcing that
 Valparaiso was destroyed by earth-
 quake on the night of the dust-storm
 in Buenos Ayres, March 19th. Our
 dates are only to the 17th, so that we
 cannot contradict it, much less be-
 lieve it.

A rowing-match takes place to-day
 at the Tigre between Mr. Martinez de
 Hoz and some young Englishmen.

The concert at Colon for the Sanitary
 and Wounded committees will be a
 grand affair. Ten young ladies will
 perform a piece on 5 pianos. Messrs.
 Carius, Niebuhr, Zuvalia and another
 will give a quartett, and several other
 attractive pieces are in the programme.
 No particulars have yet been arranged
 as to the night when it will take place,
 price of admission &c. but we hope the
 newspapers will not be excluded
 although editors can appreciate philan-
 thropy as well as amateur performers.

Messrs. Gatilif and Co. inform us
 that they sold last week a very superi-
 or flock of 2,500 sheep at 25¢ cash,
 about equal to 30¢ on the usual terms,
 in the district of San Antonio de
 Areco. Both seller and purchaser
 were Irishmen. It is very difficult to
 sell sheep in the South, and several
 flocks are offering in Dolores.

We regret to learn that some sheep-
 farmers who recently moved out to
 Rojas have had some losses. Never-
 theless the frontier partidos are now
 much sought for, as the central ones
 are overstocked.

Relative to Messrs. Sloper & Paris's
 beef curing system, it has been sug-
 gested to us by some persons of expe-
 rience that they may find a difficulty
 in packing our grass-fed beef equal to
 that brought from England, but that
 no such doubt can be entertained res-
 pecting River Plate mutton, and that
 the Santa F6 sheep are the best for
 the purpose.

The new Brazilian iron-clad Bellona
 is the finest yet constructed for the
 imperial government. It measures 200
 feet long, by 38 beam; depth of hold
 15½; with full armament it draws 12½
 feet, and is 300 horse-power; speed 10
 knots an hour. It has two revolving
 turrets, each mounting two 150-pound
 rifled guns.

The Provincial Legislature met on
 Thursday to examine the election-
 returns of March 25th. We merely
 mention the circumstance, as our read-
 ers take no more interest in such
 matters, than in the price of patacons
 last year.

IMMIGRATION TABLE.

The official report for the past
 quarter shows the total number of im-
 migrants to be 2,540, which is about
 equal to the average for 1865, and shows
 that the Paraguayan war has not ten-
 ded to reduce the actual influx of Eu-
 ropeans, although it probably checked
 the great increase we might otherwise
 have reasonably expected. Only a
 very small number, 311, availed them-
 selves of the hospitality of the Asylum,
 these being only as 12 per cent. of the
 total number, which we may interpret
 as a sign that the emigrants were not
 in distressed circumstances or that
 even the poorest found employment
 the moment they touched the shore.

The greater number falls to January,
 1300; while February had only 547,

and March 23, but this fluctuation is remarked every year. The total number of vessels with emigrants was 48, showing an average of 55 persons to each, but those from Genoa averaged exactly 100, while those from France only 23.

By far the bulk of our immigration is from Genoa, equal to two-thirds of the total, as will be seen by the following classification:

Genoa 1,602, France 365, Spain 238, Antwerp 170, Liverpool 85, Hamburg 49, New York 5, Glasgow 6, and Montevideo 16.

This table is, however, only approximate, and incorrect as regards Great Britain, since it does not include the Liverpool steamers or Southampton mail-packet, by which the bulk of English settlers now come to the country, and this omission is the more surprising as we see the French mail-steamers included in the list. Again, the number of immigrants transhipped in 3 months at Montevideo surely exceeds 16, when they figured last year for 2,000! By supplying these apparent omissions we may safely set down the number of immigrants at a much higher figure.

Those who entered the Asilo were as follows: French 171, Italians 92, Belgians 26, Spaniards 5, American 1, Montevideans 16, and British none. The passengers by the Zingara and Flor del Plata were mostly of the poorer class who at once started off for the sheep-farms, but those who came by the steamers from Liverpool and Southampton had more or less capital, and perhaps for this reason were not set down as immigrants.

On the whole we consider the above returns very cheering, and will aid as far as in our power to place Liverpool higher on the list, but must be the Secretary, Mr. Von Barte's not omit next time the steamers of Wright, Kelso and Co., those of the Astor, for most of the passengers are new settlers, with capital to boot.

DIARY AT HEAD-QUARTERS.

LATEST FROM PASO LA PATRIA.

GREAT DIFFICULTIES IN FORGING THE PASS.

The following correspondence to the 30th inst., is the latest yet received from Paso la Patria: the dates 27th, 28th, and 29th have not come to hand.

March 23rd. The beef is falling off, and soon we shall have had meat again, bringing its inevitable hunger and dysentery. As the boats were to go up yesterday exploring the left channel, and the iron-clads to follow to-day and take soundings, we have been expecting to hear cannon, but all has remained quiet, except at noon some firing near the Tres Bocas.

The Rivas division has fallen back to its old quarters, and the Brazilians have taken up his ground in front of Itapiru. Gen. Mitre has also come back, and it seems the idea of bombarding Itapiru is abandoned, a change of plans being resolved on in the conference last night.

Heat excessive, 40 centig. We learn that the enemy's steamer and flat-boat came out this evening and kept up a constant fire, with one gun, on the fleet. The latter replied and the iron-clad Barroso shewed good firing, obliging the flat-boat to retire.

March 24th. Rations of yerba, tobacco, paper, and soap. Gen. Flores reviews the troops. The iron-clad Barroso had another skirmish with the flat-boat.

March 25. Mass and distribution of palm to the troops. Stocking beef, but the Argentines are no better off, for they pass days without meat good or bad. The flat boat and battery firing on the fleet. The iron-clad Tamandaré and steamers Martins and Lindoya drew up near the fort and sunk the flat-boat. The men on board the flat escaped and also saved the 68-pounder, while the enemy's infantry came down and fired at the vessels, which replied with shot and shell. The Paraguayans are first-rate shots and fire well; to-day they sent a 68lb. shot into the Apa (flag-ship) between wind and water. Barroso has come up from Corrientes with 3 gunboats, leaving the Amazonas alone and in danger of a surprise; the Argentine vessels, rifle, &c., have also come up. A deserter passed over to-day, he tells us Lopez

has sent 15,000 men to Itapirí to cut up Baron Port Alegre's army at that point; we learn by despatches that this army really amounts to 15,000 men, with 30 pieces of cannon, and had reached Santo Tome on the 15th. He says Lopez has only 20,000 men remaining here. Flores visited General Mitre to day.

March 26th. General Flores started at daybreak to attend a council of war at Paso la Patria. The beef is now abominable, but there is no remedy. The General does not return to-night, but goes up with two steamers as far as Itati, where horses are waiting for him. At 1 p.m. another flatboat of the enemy took up its position where the former was sunk, and fired at Tamandaré's flag-ship (Apa), hulling her in four places. Three ironclads then came up and shelled the fort, also blowing up the flatboat with the men on board, but the enemy's infantry rushed into the water and hauled out the gun, which had been blown up 20 yards. One of the ironclads was much damaged by an 80lb shot from the enemy. They have still another flatboat and I fear, a masked-battery beyond Itapirí, waiting for the fleet to go up.

Another council of war: I hope the Generals will unite in their plans.

March 30th. At daybreak General Flores returned. Artillery heard near the Tres Bocas. The enemy during the night raised a new battery a 'fleur de'eau' to the right of Itapirí, but we seize the island we can destroy their works in two hours, with the aid of the iron-clads. Most of the wounded men on board the iron-clad Tamandaré have died. A cemetery has been made at Paso de la Patria, surrounded with a paling to receive the iron-clad victims, and the harvest of death will soon fill it completely. This business of invading Paraguay is harder than people thought. It is now resolved to cross here: to-morrow we begin to move up, on the 3rd April the army will be drawn up on the bank, and on the 5th the fighting begins. We have to leave all our supplies, baggage, &c. behind, with the cavalry, for we have barely elements to throw 10,000 men into Paraguay in half-a-day. Probably we shall lose everything we leave behind, but there is no remedy. Robberies are frequent in the camp. Gen. Flores has served round two lbs. of soup and bread to the men, as to-day is a fast-day.

Crowds of gentlemen of all nationalities attended, yesterday, at the Auction of M. Palliere's splendid collection, which comprised works of fine-art illustrative of the habits of S. American life. At 12 o'clock we endeavored to get in, but found the place densely packed with bidders. Don Mariano Billinghurst was pouring forth a volume of eloquence, and got into a discussion with one of the by-standers about the propriety of designating a certain picture 'La conferencia de amor,' which the latter maintained should be 'La Mazamorra.' Bidding was very brisk, especially for the Cum [a picture that has gained honorable mention in Paris] which reached close on the English figure of 100 guineas but it was found the purchaser had overbid himself \$1000 in his anxiety, and it was knocked down at \$11,500. THE SAN PAULO BRAZILIAN RAILWAY COMPANY.

The assertion of the chairman of this company, at the meeting of the shareholders on the 12th inst., that the Brazilian Government had broken faith with it is not warranted by the facts referred to, and I regret not having been present at the meeting, as I would there and then have protested against such an assertion. Captain Melchior evidently had only powers to treat 'ad referendum.' What he agreed to was not approved by his Government, but modifications were proposed; this is the truth, and to conclude from this that the Government has broken faith with the company is not fair. The fact is that the Brazilian Government has always fulfilled its obligations and engagements made under proper authority. As a Brazilian who takes a great interest in everything referring to his country, I may be allowed the insertion of these lines.

"1, Gresham-house, Feb. 14." The following announcements have appeared in the 'London Gazette': The Queen has been pleased to approve of Don Eduardo B. Nell as Consul General in England for the Oriental Republic of the Uruguay. The Queen has been pleased to approve of Don Juan Arellano y Hall as Consul at Liverpool for the Oriental Republic of the Uruguay.

The 'Gironde' announces the arrival at Bordeaux of the ship Trois Sœurs, of Cherbourg, from Buenos Aires, having on board the captain, his wife, and the crew of the English ship Palmerston, in all 29 souls. The Palmerston foundered at sea on the 28th of January, in 31.50 north latitude, and 34.41 west longitude. The 'Journal de Rouen' states that the British Government have just sent a valuable gold watch to Captain Roussel, of the Desiré Gustave, of Dieppe, and a telescope to his chief mate, for their rapidity in saving the crew of the English ship Eliza Olive.

ON 'CHANGE.

Specie declined to-day with every appearance of a continued fall, owing to the large amount of gold so readily offered for discount, which, unable to find suitable bills, is converted into paper for discount at 1 1/2 to 1 3/4. The activity for the last two days in the wool market has also affected the price of patacons. It may be taken as a rule that every discounter holds specie which, on being lent, is at once changed into paper, the business of the season being carried on in that medium; thus no matter what efforts speculators on the rise may make, they will but victimize themselves in attempting to force patacons to a higher price, as long as paper money commands ready employment at a much higher rate of interest.

In Exchange there seems to be rather a lull; several takers, but drawers not inclined to give way. Rate to-day 5 1/2 to 5 1/4. On France, 5 3/4 to 5 3/8 for good paper.

National Bonds rather stiffer, owing to the greater abundance of gold. The amount for amortization is some 35,000 patacons. We hear great complaints as to the tediousness of despatching claims before the Comision Clasificatoria; in fact, we believe they do not intend to emit any more till the war is over. We hope his may not be the case, for there is as much vice, of credit in not despatching claims quickly as in not paying the interest.

Great anxiety seems to prevail amongst a certain set, that the National Government do not appear in any way to be providing funds for the large amount of their impending debts. This is by no means a bad symptom of the public pulse; the feverish excitement of the war is fast dying out, and the sooner people become calmly aware that they are loading themselves with debt for no palpable benefit, the sooner shall we have definite prospects of peace.

4. To a proportion of gains resulting from increased value of the National Bonds acquired by the inversion of funds.
