THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

REAL STATE OF THINGS.

COAL ALL GONE.

WORDS AND REVOLVERS CHEAP.

Mr. T—, an English gentleman who arrived per Espigador, called at our office yesterday and gave us the following still later information:—

Sinbad left Corrientes at 1 o'clock for the Paso de la Patria, on board the steamer Susan Bevin.

At 4 p.m. two steamers from the Pass arrived, and I spoke with an Argentine officer who came on board with despatches.

The Brazilians, during the night of the 5th, threw over one battalion of sappers and miners, one of artillery, and two of infantry. Paraguayans opened fire at day-break, and the cannonading, the heaviest and longest yet heard, lasted till noon. The island is larger than the Plaza Victoria, and has a few trees, it is a mere sand-bank. It is thought that the Paraguayans have masked batteries. The distance from the Paraguayan shore to the island is about 1000 yards.

The attempt to pass the river will not be made for at least ten days.

The English transport-steamers refuse now to convey troops under fire, as they are not bound to do so; this matter has caused a fearful row, as Baron Tamandá has ordered them up to the Pass.

Coal is now all finished, and the woods are full of soldiers cutting wood for the steamers.

Our informant states that the most open robbery is going on in Corrientes. Brazilian soldiers offering to sell officers' swords for a Bolivian, revolvers for two or three dollars, and even their very uniforms. No Argentine troops in Corrientes, but crimes committed every night.

DEPARTURE OF MR. PALLIERE.

We cannot allow this distinguished artist to take his departure in the French packet without paying him a farewell compliment to which his talents have so justly entitled him. M. Palliere is a painter and a poet, and his sketches of South American life will for ever preserve his memory among us. On the termination of his studies among the grand associations of art in the Eternal City, he came to the River Plate, and his youthful imagination created its own world of poetry in the silent wastes of the Pampa, conjuring up scenes for his pencil in the rude rancho of the gaucho, or by the wayside 'posta', or under the shade of an ombú. His earliest efforts were associated with those of our gifted young countryman Sheridan, with whom he was united in the closest bonds of friendship, and whose early death he still deploras as one of his hardest trials.

During ten years wanderings through these countries, M. Palliere became more conversant with the habits of the people, scenery, &c. than any other man living, and all these are truthfully reproduced in his Album. His picture of the Cuna was particularly admired in Europe, and his name is favorably known at Paris, where he is now going to test his powers in a more extended field, and present a picture for the Great Exhibition of 1867.

In private circles M. Palliere will be much regretted, for few men have gained more sincere friends in a life-time than he leaves behind. Gentle and unobtrusive in his manners, and full of a poet's delicate sensibility of whatever is good and beautiful, his conversation is as charming as his pictures, without

any of those drawbacks so often peculiar to men of genius. We could wish to hope he will again return to Buenos Ayres, though he says such is not his intention, and he assured us yesterday he did not think his departure would cost him such regret till he went round shaking hands for the last time with those who have been his more immediate friends.

M. Palliere entertains a lively appreciation of the encouragement he has always met with from the foreign residents, and Englishmen he says in particular, and we know our readers will be glad to learn that he promises to write to the 'Standard' at intervals from Paris. We wish him a pleasant voyage and the fullest success in his career of art.

THE OPERA OF VICTOR PISANI.

This new opera which Sig. Pestalardo produces to-morrow-evening is a lyric drama by Maestro Achille Peri, founded on a brilliant episode of Venetian annals in the 14th century, and the best proof of its artistic merit is, that it was played for 30 nights running, at La Scala, Milan, on its first appearance.

The plot, as usual, is love under difficulties. Victor Pisani, (Celestino) high-Admiral of Venice, has a very pretty daughter Maria, (Briol) who (while her papa is away, fighting the Genoese) falls very much in love with a fisherman named Piero (Lelmi). At the same time an aged patrician named Barbo (Nerini), one of the terrible Council of Ten, conceives a violent passion for the young lady, and old Pisani having got 'whipped' by the Genoese, Barbo contrives to have him tried over treason, promising Maria that he shall be released if she consents to make him [Barbo] 'the happiest man alive.' In the nick of time Piero and the boatmen break open the prison and release Pisani, whom the Doge restores to the command of the fleet. Barbo next attempts to 'levant' with Maria, but she is rescued by Piero, and old Pisani being seized with a very bad illness (probably gout in the stomach) while in command of the fleet off Manfredonia, has just time before he dies to embrace Maria and Piero and say "bless you, my children; be happy," when the curtain falls.

Act. 1st opens with the Piazza San Marco full of people merry-making on the occasion of the annual fête when the Doge of Venice weds the Adriatic by dropping a valuable ring into its waters. The boatmen and citizens sing the chorus 'Godiamo,' and retire; after which Barbo appears with a brother-senator Memo, and while talking about the recent defeat of Pisani, they perceive two ladies, draped in black, issue from the church of San Marco. These prove to be Maria and her maid, who are saved from patrician-rudeness by the timely interposition of Piero. Scene 4th is in the Pisani palace, and Maria relates to her maid a shocking dream she has had 'sognai solinga scorrere,' when Pisani himself appears, in a very bad humor at his defeat by the Genoese. Maria shows him an anonymous letter, which he recognises to be in Barbo's hand writing: there are some pretty passages here, and the next scene ends this Act with the arrest of Pisani, after a touching duo with Maria.

Act 2nd opens in the outskirts of Venice, and some fishermen are getting ready to put to sea. After their departure Piero comes in and sings 'povera Maria,' and when his comrades return he engages them to join him in rescuing Pisani from prison, with the chorus 'si di speranza.' In the 4th scene we return to the Pisani palace, where Barbo, wearing a mask, forces himself into Maria's presence and says her father's life depends on her compliance. Filial piety triumphs, and while she pours forth her whole soul in the adjuration 'salvate lo,' the scoundrel responds with 'bello esumpio,' after which she signs a marriage contract, which Piero is in time to snatch from the infamous Barbo. Scene 8th reveals the dungeon of Pisani, with the Grand Master and guards; the latter retire and Maria is introduced. Presently the populace tear down the prison walls, with shouts for the Admiral, who is set free, while the

boatmen sing 'di Venezia.' Scene 12th is a grand display in the Piazza San Marco, with the chorus 'tergi lo lagrime,' and a triumphal procession. Pisani is solemnly reinstated by the Doge, and with Piero for his standard-bearer, mounts his galley and sets off to fight for Venice and the Lion of San Marco.

Act 3rd opens at Manfredonia, the Venetian galleys in front, and the encampment in the background, Piero soliloquizing on the glory of Pisani who has just beaten the Genoese. Maria appears and there is a delightful duett between the lovers 'salmar della vita.' Scene 3rd shews a little chapel where Maria is praying for her father who is [we are sorry to say] very sick. The old sinner Barbo hires a number of boatmen to carry off Maria who on coming out sings two pathetic strains about her father and Piero. Just then the abduction is attempted, when Piero rushes in and tells the boatmen it is the Admiral's daughter, whereupon they turn on Barbo to butcher him, but he clears out and is accidentally drowned on the sea-coast. Scene 8th is in Pisani's tent: the Admiral is dying, he convokes his officers, bequeaths the command to Memo, gives his blessing to Piero and Maria, making them man-and-wife, and entrusting his valiant sword to his new son-in-law, breathes his last, amid some very pretty singing and appropriate scenery.

Sig. Pestalardo has spared no expense to get up this new opera with 'great eclat.' New scenery has been painted by Sig. Pittaluga, new dresses provided, and every preparation made to have it a complete success.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday we had mails from Montevideo. The Cisne left with four large boxes of gold for Corrientes. The gold came from that Californian mine, the Maua Bank, and was escorted down to the Mole. We could not find out the exact amount, but believe it was over £400,000 sterling.

The last news from the Paso de la Patria is now fully digested. 'Sinbad's' letter is by far the most reliable and descriptive: he is, beyond all question, the best correspondent on the war. The 'America' states that the Brazilian canoes, &c., blown on to the Paraguayan shore, were captured by the Paraguayans; but this is manifestly incorrect, as 'Sinbad' gives the full account of how the Brazilians sent off and took them.

The Brazilians took possession of the island in front of Itapira on the 5th, and on the morning of the 6th opened fire on the enemy, raining down shot and shell. General Hornos, who is so well known in Buenos Ayres, has been sent up by the Commander-in-Chief to land on the Paraguayan banks above Itati. The business is very risky, but the General has four Brazilian regiments, two Argentines, and two pieces of rifled cannon. He went in the steamer Buenos Ayres up a small 'arroyo,' and found the place full of Paraguayans, who took to their heels when they saw the General on the wheel-house. As yet, however, no landing had been effected, but it is probable that the next steamer will bring us the news of a fight with Hornos.

The surveys made by the Brazilian engineers of the river Parana, go to show that when the river is not very low, vessels drawing from ten to twelve feet of water can go up as high as Itati.

A ball from one of the Paraguayan 'chatas' struck the steamer, Duque de Saxe below the water-mark and nearly sunk her. She filled with water, but after awhile the hole was stuffed up and the water pumped out.

The amount which the Sanitary Committee realized by the benefit given by Mr. Peyres, the wizard, is only \$1383, a rather miserable pittance.

Decond, the unfortunate Paraguayan

who suffered such unkind-of misfortune during the journey down the river, when he made his escape, expired the other day in the hospital; the poor fellow was reduced to a mere skeleton.

We have been informed that at the Tigro there is a very fine wool-washing establishment, which is doing a large business. We intend to visit the place some of these days.

The Municipality has ordered the street in which Mr. Cazon lives to be repaired, and neglected in toto the Calle Belgrano, which is the worst paved street in the city.

We call attention to two steam thrashing-machines offered for sale, they will be sold cheap for cash, and are in splendid condition.

Mr. Brittain's carriage, horses, and harness were sold by auction very cheap, a dead bargain, \$7000, although a few weeks ago the owner was offered \$15,000 which he declined.

On the night of the 6th 8,000 Brazilian troops crossed over to the island in front of Itapira, and the following night they were to have crossed over into Paraguay. The next steamer from Corrientes must bring us some startling news.

A 'chasque' arrived in Corrientes, just when the Espigador was weighing anchor, with the news that 10,000 Brazilians had at last embarked to force the Paso de la Patria, and Flores at the head of 500 troopers had galloped up above Itati. He has been ordered to cross there with some 10,000 men, but as yet the men had not arrived. They will ascend the river in steamers, and then, with Flores at their head, cross into Paraguay.

Caceres, the great Correntino chief, seems to have fallen into disgrace. We read nothing of him now. Where are his men? Where is he himself? Our colleague in Corrientes bemoans his condition. We, for our part, do not understand why an officer, who displayed so much heroism, should now be made to stand aside.

The state of the Correntino treasury is most deplorable, not a dollar has the Government, and the public clerks, &c., without their salaries. This seems strange to us, as now the Government ought to be receiving a greater revenue than ever, owing to the enormous trade of the place.

Podestá, the wholesale assassin of Bella-Vista, has, as a matter of course, escaped from prison in Corrientes. He was supposed to be in prison when he escaped. We confess that it reflects the greatest discredit on the Government. The relatives of the murdered family have offered a reward of one thousand patacons for his apprehension. We wonder if Dr. Acosta will object to this. He was about to accuse the 'Standard' some years ago for getting up a like subscription, when the Guardia Monte murder occurred.

We hear that a small steamer about the size of the Lili, if not smaller, will shortly be ready to ply about in the Port of Buenos Ayres; this will be a great convenience, as since the Lili has been sold the trips to the packet have been dispensed with; in fact the worst part of the voyage from Buenos Ayres to England is from the mole-head to the outer-roads when the weather is at all rough. Mr. Ferrer, the ex-Custom-house-broker will be the agent of the new steamer.

As news of the passing of the army from Corrientes to Paraguay is hourly expected, great preparations are going on for firework displays, &c. We learn however with much astonishment that the Municipality will not spend one dollar in rockets owing to the hard-up state of the treasury.

In consequence of the repeated complaints about the victuals supplied the prisoners in the Carcel, Mr. Cazon called upon a gentleman named Manuel Blancos to breakfast and dine with the prisoners one day. Mr. Blancos complied, but reports that the food is very good with the exception of the biscuits, which might be fresher.

We read that in the late storm at Corrientes a flash of lightning caused great damage in Bustillo's encampment, one sergeant was killed and five soldiers severely wounded.

Paunero, when last heard of, was at the Paso de la Patria, with his whole division, ready to embark and cross over when the order is given. He has written to Buenos Ayres stating that

the hour for crossing had at last arrived, and by next mail his letter will be dated from Paraguay. Antar, the 'Nacion Argentina' correspondent, says the same, so we suppose that now the allies are in Paraguay. The 'Provedor' is expected hourly with the news, she will not come without it.

Our readers will perceive that our La Paz correspondent reports Consul Hutchinson travelling and taking notes; he is at present in Corrientes and we suppose will take a run up to the Paso de la Patria.

MONTEVIDEO.

Decree against factories—News of Barrn Port Alegre—Ball-fighting—Preserved beef from Paris—Anniversary of the 18th—More thieves from Buenos Ayres—Varieties.

On Monday the Government published a decree prohibiting the establishment of factories for making starch, fire works, refining grease, and tanning, within the limits of the new city, or at Union, or within 600 yards of the roads to Union and Paso Molino. Establishments with steam-power cannot in future be made North of Calle Medanos, and those beyond this limit must have a clear space of 20 yards every way.

The celebrated Baron Port-Alegre, who as become has great an enigma as the ghost at the cemetery, has again been heard from, with dates to March 28th. He did not suffer a defeat in Misiones (as rumored), because he was not there, having only just now crossed the Uruguay in front of San Borja, and all the stories about his having reached Itapua are equally ridiculous. He has yet a long and tedious march across the desert of Misiones, and had despatched his vanguard of 4,000 men towards San Carlos. The Paraguayans last year left all the country a howling wilderness.

The bull-fighting last Sunday at Union was first-rate, in the opinion of those who assist at such barbarous diversions. The new-bull-fighters from Spain made their 'debut' with some spirited bulls: one of them narrowly escaped being killed, the bull making a lunge which he avoided, but was caught by his sash and pitched clean over the rails.

Samples of preserved beef have been received by the Junta from Mr. Julius Welner of Paris: they are in good condition and prepared by a new process which promises to be very successful.

Great preparations are on foot for the anniversary of Flores's invasion, 19th inst. Several dinners are on the 'tapis,' and the Races will probably be very brilliant: the Chief of Police convened a meeting of the committee to arrange preliminaries.

Another gang of thieves arrived from Buenos Ayres, and the Police are looking them up. Sor. Bustamante arrived on Saturday, his exile being revoked. The 'Tribuna' has got out a fine Ericsson engine from New York. The Bishop started on Saturday for Tacuarembó, on visitation. Some pasquins appeared in the streets against Dr. Ramirez, but were torn down by the police. Several papers now copy the On 'Change article from the 'Standard,' showing the interest taken by the merchants in Buenos Ayrean commercial matters.

The Junta is at loggerheads with the Government relative to the auction of the Lottery, the members insisting that they will resign if it is not again put up to competition: it seems the Government wishes to accept Gen. Borjes's proposal, but will probably yield to the Junta. The Normal School occupies attention, most of the preliminaries being now resolved on. The road to Union demands immediate attention as it is already in a bad way, and the inhabitants write to the 'Siglio' that they fear all communication by land in winter will be cut off, which alarm has forced several families to remove to the city.

The Banco Comercial publishes a notice that the month's interest on the Government loans is now recoverable at its office.

The 'Tribuna' has an article on the flourishing state of the Piedmontese Colony.

From the published returns we learn that 14 Sisters of Charity tend the city hospital, and take care of 40 orphan-girls. The number of lunatics

under treatment is 137, and children in the foundling-house 120.

MR. DOWDALL AND THE TIGER.

CONSUL HUTCHINSON TRAVELLING.

To the Editors of the 'Standard.' Gentlemen,

I have very little novelty to report to you since my last communication. Things are going on much in the same way. The scarcity of horses has increased, and the possession of a fat animal is a rather doubtful advantage, as he is almost sure to be stolen. The notorious horse robber, Dn. N..... N..... infests the neighbourhood. He rejoices that the army are so much in want of horses, in order that he may have an opportunity of carrying on his nefarious proceedings. He is, forsooth, a 'commissionary' of Mitre's, and ostensibly buys horses for the Argentine army, at the same time it is well known, that on account of the higher prices given by the Brazilians, his transactions with them are as large as are those with his reputed employers.

You will perceive by the statistical paper published, that the accounts I sent you some time ago of the giant strides made towards improvement by this town and department are not exaggerated. I send also Mr. Garcia's advertisement, in order to show the advance of the town in a commercial point of view, joined to that of Ambrosio Ordano, our steamboat agent and auctioneer. The stock auction referred to in the latter took place on Monday, the 2nd inst. Although prices were low, the attendance was both numerous and influential. Seven reals was the highest offer for the sheep. Sr. Ordano, who is a La Paz gentleman, is distinguished in his business, as well for his integrity and honor as for his tact and discrimination.

This peaceable town was lately visited for five or six consecutive nights by an unusually large tiger. The whole community was disturbed by the cries of terrified women and children living in the neighbourhood where the animal made his appearance. After a couple of nights the disturbance became a nuisance, and people began to consider it necessary to rid themselves of their disagreeable visitor. Some suggested a cannon, others hand-grenades, and it was even proposed, as the tiger usually approached along the bank of the Paraná, to send to Corrientes for the celebrated Paraguayan 'chata' which had caused such consternation amongst our friends the Brazilians; but Dn. Raphael, the hotel-keeper, whose valued dog had been devoured, and being determined to seek aid in the proper quarter, applied to Mr. George Dowdall, the most famous tiger-slayer in this department. The brave never turn a deaf ear when the weak cry aloud for help. Mr. Dowdall responded promptly and in person to the call made upon him, and on the 31st ult. rode into La Paz from his residence in the camp. He was accompanied by his 'fidus achates,' Mr. William Gibbings. The two gentlemen took up their quarters at the hotel, there await-

ing the announcement of the tiger's... approach. They were not summoned to their post until midnight, the tiger delaying until after his usual hour of visitation; possibly he had a presentiment of the warm reception prepared for him. Notwithstanding the unseasonableness of the hour, crowds of citizens were in the streets, seeking safety from the common danger in each other's society. Nothing daunted by the numerous warnings of their friends, and the expressed anxiety of their assembled fellow-townsmen, the two champions went forth, and arriving at the spot indicated by the guides found themselves facing the tiger. The animal desisted from his occupation of supping off the carcass of a large dog he had just succeeded in capturing, and savagely awaited the approach of his enemies. The excitement of the spectators was intense as they beheld the fearless advance of their defenders. They saw them approach within almost springing distance, but the buzz of anxiety which ran through the crowd was changed into a sigh of relief when the ferocious beast was seen to turn around suddenly, and crossing with a plunge or two, the small river Cavallo Cuatca, which runs by La Paz, to bury himself in the woods at the other side. Great was the disappointment of the two Englishmen, as they did not succeed in obtaining the skin as a trophy. Their steady and undaunted advance no doubt cowed the savage monster, and thus they were left without an opportunity of showing what they could do in a close encounter. However, it is satisfactory to be able to add, they must have frightened the animal effectually, as he has neither been seen or heard in the neighborhood of La Paz ever since. Relative to the camp and department, there is no security for life or property, owing to the numbers of deserters and loose characters which abound. We can scarcely hope for an improvement in this respect until the war is over. On the night of the 19th ult., while Buenos Ayres was being visited by the hurricane, a gentle shower fell here, unaccompanied by much wind or storm of any kind. Consul Hutchinson, of Rosario, has gone up the river to Corrientes. He is taking notes and making some sketches and we may shortly expect an interesting pamphlet on the subject of his trip. INTERESTING FROM HIGUERITAS.

Abundant showers during the last thirty days have improved the camps and allayed the fears of the timid respecting the lambing. Pasture is plentiful, and the flocks, without exaggeration, are in excellent condition. These blessings are, I believe, not general in this department. In the proximity of the Colima, the camps, up to very lately, have been bad, and the complaint of sheep-farmers unanimous; on the other hand, north of this point towards San Salvador and the 'Puntas de Marciel', fat capones have been sold during the entire summer without interruption, and it is from these districts principally that the saladeros of Prange at San Salvador and Zimmermann have received their 'tropas'. The news of the conflict between the Brazilian iron-clads and the enemy at Itapiru was received here with feelings of regret. The officers of the monitor Tamandaré were highly esteemed by the inhabitants of this town, for they had an excellent opportunity of appreciating their gentlemanly deportment during the stay of that vessel in this port. It should be remembered that the Tamandaré received her armament and the armour-plates of her tower in the port of Higuieritas, the best, undoubtedly, for such purposes on the rivers Uruguay or Paraná. Gazzom, well-known to your readers. This was a terrible

This alteration, although apparently beneficial to the travelling community, is not so; on some occasions her days of sailing fall on that fixed by the other steamers, and frequently it is one day prior or after. The old captain was far preferable, and we could then count upon a steamer for your city, and 'vice versa,' every other day. The 'diligencias' that leave here for San Salvador and Carmelo, in combination with the 'Rio de la Plata,' are obliged to alter their departures and arrivals with a view of meeting the 'Rio Paraná.' Game is plentiful in this neighbourhood; the officers of the U. S. gunboat 'Shawmut,' who passed a week here, may testify to the truth of this. The same sport awaits all your counting-house gentlemen who have the courage to tear themselves away from business for a few days, in order to enjoy the bracing sweet air of this locality.
