STATISTICAL RETURNS FOR 1864 CITY OF BUENOS AYRES.

We received yesterday the official volume of statistics for 1864. It is, of course to be regretted that these publications are always 15 months after date, which greatly detracts from their interest and value, but as the tables seem to be drawn up with consummate care we will not pass a censure upon a department yet in its infancy, but proceed to take up the returns of marriages, births and deaths in the order before us.

The total number of marriages was 1,267, including 76 of Protestants and 3 mixed. The proportion of colored people was only 5 per cent. The majority of natives was under 25 years, and of foreigners between 25 and 35, the general classification of age standing thus: under 25 years 50 per cent., between 25 and 35 years 40 per cent., over 35 years 10 per cent. The marriages celebrated in the Protestant chapels were as follows: German 42, Scotch 20, American 8, English 6. Under the heading of nationalities we find:

which shows a very even balance and a considerable blending of the two great elements of our population. No fewer than 148 native women have taken foreign husbands, while only 22 foreign women [including 6 Montevideans] have married native husbands. The Italians figure for 288, or 23 per cent., the French 12 per cent., the Spaniards 9 per cent., but such is the sympathy of blood that more than a-third of the mixed marriages was between Argentines and Spaniards. The English stand 4th in the list of foreigners: 42 Englishmen married their own countrywomen, 5 took Italian wives, 4 Argentines, 2 Montevideans, and one English-woman married a North American; in all 54, of which 28 were Irish, 20 Scotch, and 6 English. Classified under professions, the bulk appear to be of the middle-class; 252 shop-keepers, 117 operatives, 327 dress makers, 89 servants, 94 young ladies, 39 estancieros, and of the learned professions only 1 lawyer and 1 surveyor. It may be taken as a favorable sign that in no previous year was the number of marriages at all so great, the present returns being exactly 100 more than in 1863, and about 33 per cent. over the average for the last 19 years.

The total number of registered births was 5,810, including 253 Protestants. The excess of males was 48. The proportion of illegitimate children about 11 per cent. The baptisms at the Protestant chapels were: Germans 151, Scotch 54, English 30, American 18; it is curious to observe that two-thirds of the Germans were females, two-thirds of the English males, the Scotch just even, and three-fourths of the Americans males. Under the classification of nationality of parents we find:

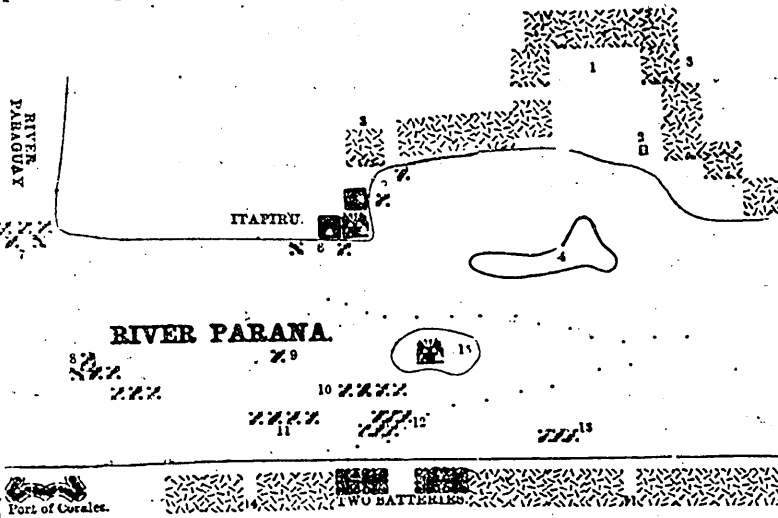
Of children of foreigners the sexes were as 13 males to 10 females, of Argentines as 14 females to 11 males, and of mixed parentage as 39 males to 37 females, shewing a remarkable tendency of foreigners to beget male children, and of Argentines female. This table of births is very cheering, being the highest ever known in this city, 718 above that of 1863; and 25 per cent. over the average of the last 10 years. It is, moreover, in excess of the number of deaths by 1,372, or nearly 1 per cent. of the population, net increase (without taking into account increase by immigration).

THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

RECENT ENGAGEMENT WITH ARGENTINE FLEET.

PLAN OF PASO LA PATRIA.

We have received the following bird's-eye-view of Paso la Patria from Major Chodosowicz, a Polish officer on General Mitre's staff. It is of peculiar interest as giving a defined sketch of the enemy's encampment, and shewing the island abreast of Lopez's house from which the enemy opened masked batteries on the Argentine fleet.

THE OPERA OF VICTOR PISANI.

On Thursday night the new opera was given with great success at Colon theatre, before a crowded house, and from its first reception we venture to predict that it will have a run of several nights, as on its first appearance at La Scala, Milan. A new opera, by a strange composer, has always its disadvantages, and we were agreeably surprised to see everything pass off with such smoothness and accuracy, thanks to Sig. Pestalardo's excellent preparations, and to hear the theatre ring with such hearty plaudits.

The 'mise-en-scene' was perfect, the orchestra highly creditable, the chorus well drilled and sustained throughout, the decorations and scenery most appropriate and tasteful. Sig. Pittaluga, scene-painter, was twice called before the curtain, and Mme. Briol and Lelmi, received quite an ovation at some of the charming duets which occur in the various Acts.

As regards the value of the opera itself we cannot pretend to emit an opinion ex-cathedra, our talented friend Moise having promised us his critique on its musical merits, but we confess a decided admiration for Maestro Achille Peri (whom we had not before the pleasure of knowing), and were really charmed with the many songs and duets of surpassing sweetness so beautifully rendered by Briol, Lelmi, Celestino and the rest. The prima-donna was in all her grandeur, and held the house suspended in breathless admiration of the rich flood of melody with which she poured forth all the genius of the composer in unison with her own. In the 1st Act we especially admired Maria's 'Sognai solinga scorcere,' and the duo with her father. In the 2nd the aria 'Si di speranza,' and the closing scene. In the 3rd, the duet 'Sul mar della vita,' and the lovers' tete-a-tete.

But we must not anticipate the judgment of 'Moise,' and as the opera is to be re-produced this evening, we have only meant to call the attention to some of what seemed to us the most striking passages.

Sig. Pestalardo and the Lyric Co. are entitled to our warmest congratulations for the splendid manner in which they have brought Vittore Pisani before the public, and we trust that their efforts will be fully appreciated.

NOTE.—The Palazzo in front of San Marco, in the last scene of Act 2nd, is a faithful copy of the old palace of the Venetian ambassadors, at Piazza di Venezia, Rome.

NOTES FROM THE STOCK-EXCHANGE.

London, March 8. To the Editors of the 'Standard.' Gentlemen, There is little of interest to report from England. The money market is not easier, the bank rate of discount remaining high: at present 7 per cent. and little chance of going lower, the directors thinking it advisable to so keep it, in order to prevent the rush of new and rotten speculations. Consols are 88 3/4 to 1/2. The Argentine Minister, M. Bal-

carce, is expected to-day in London from Paris. His business is not known; perhaps to look after the Argentine loan, which John Bull does not appear to swallow. It has been an entire failure. A new subscription is expected on the 17th of April, but it will share the same fate. There appears to be a want of confidence in Argentine matters, and Englishmen prefer Chilean saltpetre and copper to Argentine wool and hides.

The loan for Chile, brought out by Thomson, Bonar, and Co., has been a complete success, more than ten times the amount wanted having been subscribed in a few days. The scrip is at 2 1/2 premium.

The cattle plague is on the increase here. In England, Wales, and Scotland last week 1,411 cases in excess of the week ending 10th February, were reported.

Little hope of success can be entertained in importing beef from the river Plate: it would not pay.

Several French and German papers speak favorably of Paraguayan matters.

The Princess Helena is about to be married to Prince Charles Christina, of Schleswig-Holstein, and he is about to be made a 'Royal Highness.'

The London season is expected to be a very gay one. The Queen has shown an inclination to emerge from her solitude, and a great impetus will be thereby given to those trades patronised by fashion.

Your readers will be amused to hear that a public singer has actually been 'sold by auction,' or rather his services were. And some 'pious' young man, doubtless a member of the 'long firm,' advertises for residence in a family where his 'Christian example' will be taken as an equivalent for board and lodging. The earliest dodge to 'raise the wind.'

THE WAR IN THE WEST.

THE BOMBARDMENT OF VALPARAISO.

Yesterday a leading merchant of this city favored us with the following extract from a private letter received per last mail from Chile.

"We are here in moments of the most intense excitement and alarm expecting that the city will be bombarded by the Spanish fleet; business is at a complete stand-still; the time which the Spanish Admiral has given to receive an answer to his ultimatum expires on Tuesday 27th inst. at 8 a.m. and as the conditions are inadmissible I fear that the Spaniards will carry out their threats, raise the blockade, and at once proceed to Peru. Exchange on England 48. Freights not talked of.

Quere, will the foreign naval commanders in Valparaiso stand and witness the city destroyed? We hope for the honor of England and America, No. A German merchant assures us he has seen a letter dated Holy Saturday which says 'The city is now burning in several places, the bombardment continues.'

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The steamer Paysandu, which left Corrientes on Monday night at 7 o'clock, arrived as far down as Parana, where she stopped to load coal for the Brazilians and tow up two schooners laden with provisions for the army. The only news of importance is that as yet the army had not crossed; the Brazilians were in the Island, and kept up a continuous fire on Itapiru; the Argentine fleet in dropping down the river from Itati had to weather a masked battery in one of the Islands. Several of the vessels were hulled, and we fear there must have been great loss of life, but as yet we can get no details. The affair looks something like the Cuevas business.

A Brazilian transport has passed down the river from Corrientes with no less than 180 officers retired from the service, and over 200 wounded officers and men, in all over 400; they proceed at once we believe to Rio Janeiro.

We hear that Baron Tamandaré is now only waiting the arrival of two transports to cross over the army; one of these transports, the Leopoldina, left Parana on Tuesday for Corrientes. The river, we hear, is falling.

On Friday evening the cook of Sr. Tamandaré caused a great row at the corner of calles Cangallo and San Martin; the fellow was fearfully tipsy and stopped the brokers as they entered the Bolsa; he accosted Mr. Harratt and some other gentlemen who happened to be passing by, and asked for a cigar. We hear that he is the very best cook in Buenos Ayres and therefore his distinguished master does not wish to lose him, he speaks English fluently.

The time for paying the Contribucion Directa has been extended to the 2nd May, after which defaulters will be fined.

Mr. Rom has requested us to say that he is in noway connected with the new mercantile sheet about to be published.

We give our readers another sketch to-day of the Paso de la Patria sent to us by Major Chodosowicz, who pencilled it from the river side.

Bancroft, the celebrated historian, has made a remarkable speech on the state of affairs in the continent of America: his total oblivion of all the South American republics, however, savors badly, and has drawn down severe strictures from the English press.

D. Mariano Billinghurst's memorable description of the view, from Consul Parish's house has so tickled the fancy of our English colleagues that we find it reproduced in a London paper.

We have received, but too late for publication, the annual report of the British hospital. On Tuesday morning we will give it to our readers. We have also received a communication from a friend of the hospital, with some very good remarks, which we intend to publish on Wednesday.

Respecting the supplies for the Argentine army, about which there has been such noise, we are informed that nothing can be more unjust. Mr. Lanuz, the present contractor, has immense supplies at Corrientes, his men are in Entre Rios driving the fatted and best cattle up to head quarters; in fact, there is one continued stream of oxen to the Paso de la Patria, and besides this, there is about 15,000 arrobas olden beef and charque, rice, farina, biscuits, maize, and grease; the soldiers cannot want for supplies.

On Friday night it rained in torrents in town, it is to be hoped that it has also rained outside, as in many parts the camps were in a sad state.

The Liverpool steamer 'Memnon' left yesterday for England: she takes a full cargo, a number of passengers, and a heavy newspaper mail from our office. The postage per French steamers on newspapers being too high to send files of the weekly or daily to our home subscribers.

We regret sincerely to notice the demise of Mr. Storp, one of our principal Belgian merchants. Deceased had been for many years in Buenos Ayres, and his loss is deplored by a wide circle of sorrowing friends.

The gold which the Brazilian Minister received in the packet from Rio has been placed in account current in the Maná Bank.

The opera on Friday night was a signal success; we have been promised a critique by our musical correspondent.

This morning at 8 o'clock the steamer General Flores departs for Montevideo, where she loads her cargo and will at once depart for Corrientes. This steamer was formerly called the Terzagant, but she has been purchased by the Brazilian contractors, and goes down to Montevideo to take in stores for the army. These day-trips to Montevideo as a general rule don't pay, as passengers prefer travelling by night. We send to-day's 'Standard' down in her to our subscribers and agent.

It is probable that Mr. Laroque, a French lawyer practising in this city, will be named Professor of Philosophy in the National College. Many of the students have petitioned the Minister about it.

We notice a sort of divorce suit commenced in the Ecclesiastical Court, against Don Benito Burgos. The Sr. Creswell Creswell of the River Plate is Canon Auciros. We believe this class of suits is a novelty in Buenos Ayres, matrimonial dissensions being, comparatively speaking, unknown here.

A tall poplar tree on the 'barranca' at the foot of Calle Fern, in Sr. Gonzalez Moreno's quinta, almost facing Mr. Edward Zimmermann's house, has been split down by a flash of lightning, during the rain storm last week.

The meeting of Coliseum shareholders, held on Thursday night, has resulted in a resolution to emit new shares, leaving it to the option of the present shareholders to subscribe or not. The majority has agreed to subscribe, and thus rescue the company from prematurely collapsing.

On last Wednesday a well-known Capuchin friar, Sr. Rosa, died. His remains were interred at the entrance door of the church, and one of our colleagues takes great exception to this, insisting that it is contrary to law, custom, and the sanitary regulations of the city.

The Provincial Bank has declined to publish in English its monthly statement, although last month it thought fit to enlighten the English people in the camp of the real state of the bank. We certainly think the Directors, who well know the immense deposits of English people, ought to publish the balance-sheet in English. The directors throw the blame on the Government; but from what we know of Sr. Dominguez, our talented Finance Minister, we think he would be the last person to object to it.

For the information of our friends in Frayle Muerto we mention that Mr. Charles Jackson, one of our leading English brokers, has orders to purchase fifty leagues of land at Frayle Muerte at one thousand patacons per league. As the prices obtained at the last public auction of lands there were considerably under Mr. Jackson's limit, we have no doubt if this is communicated in the proper quarter Mr. Jackson will find no difficulty in purchasing the fifty leagues he requires. Indeed, if we had any interest with the Cordova Government, we would urge that the fifty leagues be sold at once to Mr. Jackson at 500 patacons per league, as we have no doubt the lands in his possession would be immediately improved and settled on.

Sr. Torrent, the new Argentine Minister to Rio Janeiro, left per Carmel for Rio. He was accompanied by his secretary, Dr. Delgado.

We regret to hear that an English sailor belonging to one of the ships in the roads fell from the mast-head the other day on to the deck and broke his leg.

Mr. Cazon's nephew, we understand, is at present up at Corrientes speculating in what the Americans term 'nothing'. His last operation was in soap, which gave him a very handsome profit. We believe since the nephew has proved so successful, the uncle might make a nice profit in a small cargo of toothpicks.

On and after Monday, the time table of the Northern Railway will be changed [see new table.] This road, we are pleased to remark, is doing a splendid traffic and excellently managed.

The remains of the brave Leandro Gomez, who fell so heroically defending the little town of Paysandu, have

been at last discovered, as also those of his companions Piris, Lengua, and Mogrell, they have been exhumed, sent to Uruguay and interred in the cemetery there.

A special train ran out the other day as far as the rails are laid on the Chivilcoy extension: as a heavy consignment of rails has arrived, the works will now progress more rapidly. Commander Noguera was to have left yesterday to take command of the frontier, in place of Machado, who, it seems, has been removed.

A terrible rumor has arrived in town from Las Flores, to the effect that the 'peones' of a troop of carts mangled, killed the 'capataces,' and then sacked the bullock carts. This is the first case of the kind on record.

Farmers from the north camp advise us of a current rumor that Pergamino has been invaded by Indians. As the camps out there are now very thickly settled by Irishmen, who have put up 'puestos' and driven their sheep out there, it is to be hoped the Government will take the precaution of placing strong garrisons to keep back the savages.

On Friday last it was exactly a year since Lopez seized the Argentine steamers in Corrientes. Who would have thought then that the war would last so long?

Mr. Telemachus Gonzalez is the name of a new land surveyor who has just obtained his diploma; the surveyors now are nearly as numerous as the lawyers.

Mr. Aymer is about to publish a map of the country through which the Southern Railway passes; he only prints a sufficient number for his subscribers, therefore those who want the map had better send their names to his address, 316 Bolivar.

We hear that the 'pulperos' in the camp, owing to the extravagance of the farmers, are all becoming sheep-farmers. They are hauling up all their debtors before the judge, and those who cannot pay have their flocks embargoed, and subsequently, as many sheep sold as will cover the amount of the debt. A well-known confectioner in San Antonio de Areco has, in this manner, bought largely at \$25. The sheep are good and first-class, but this new business cuts both ways, as now the farmers are getting so economical that they spend very little in such places, and at the rate things are going we expect ere long to see half the pulperias in the country shut up for want of business.

The state of the prisoners in the Carcel, we are given to understand, is most appalling, and an appeal is made to the public for old clothes. Why not try the prisoners at once and thus free the prison of these characters?

The Sheldrake, which has been lying in the Boca for some time, is now offered for sale: parties interested can get full particulars by applying at Mr. Tomkinson's in Calle Piedad.

The winter uniforms for the Argentine soldiers are now being got ready, for 18,000 men. We wonder if the commissary has inspected the splendid English uniforms in an English house in Calle Piedad: they are the finest and best we have ever seen in the country, and far cheaper than any clothes that can be made here.

The telegraph wires of the Northern Railway had to be cut on last Thursday in order to allow a vessel which had been built in the Paso Julio to be launched.

Fuson's auction attracts crowds: we ran into the place yesterday to see what was going on, saw a small oil painting of fruits knocked down to a very fashionably-dressed Argentine at \$7000: we thought it was about time for us to leave; the picture at home would be considered dear at £5. The place was almost as thronged as our office on a packet day.

The 'Iron King,' which now belongs to Sr. Lanuz, has at last left. We hear she towed up two large vessels to the mouth of the Guazu, and then ran up the Uruguay to take some more of Urquiza's men, who are said to be anxiously awaiting at Conoscion for some steamers to take them up to Corrientes to join their comrades on the battle-field.

At Vidale's splendid shop in Calle Florida we hear everything is selling off monstrously cheap, the owner is
