GREAT COMMERCIAL HOUSE WARMING.

INAUGURATION OF MESSRS. BATES, STOKES & CO.'S NEW SALES ROOMS.

At 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon the mercantile establishment of Messrs. Bates, Stokes & Co. was thronged with most of the dealers and English merchants of Buenos Ayres. We have seldom seen before such a gathering of commercial men, it even eclipsed the Bolsa meeting on the reading of the Cerro Reform Bill. Mr. Daniel Makinlay, the talented manager of the house, opened the business of the day in a very eloquent address. He glanced over the commercial prospects of the country, the wonderful increase in business of every class in Buenos Ayres, the industrial development which the country was undergoing, and the bright future which yet awaited the River Plate notwithstanding the passing clouds of the day. He welcomed all his friends present to the new sales rooms, which were at last finished, and he called on the gentlemen present to join him in a toast for the welfare and happiness of Buenos Ayres. Drunk with the most vociferous applause.

Mr. Gimenez proposed health and prosperity to the popular and well-known firm of Bates, Stokes, and Co., one of the oldest firms in Buenos Ayres, coupling with it the name of Daniel Makinlay, its excellent manager. Drunk with three times three.

Mr. W. Moore rose to propose the health of Mr. M. Forrester, partner of the house of Bates, Stokes, and Co., the first salesman of Buenos Ayres—[tremendous cheering.]

Mr. Kuich proposed the ladies; and it being then past Bolsa hour, the company took leave of the festive board. All praise is due to the spirited conduct of Messrs. Makinlay and Forrester, in thus introducing amongst us one of the most cherished of our home customs—housewarming; and we hope the other foreign houses will profit by the example.

The new sales-rooms are capacious, well-built, and airy, owing to the greatly increased business of the house the old apartments were found too small. The new building will meet the requirements of the business, and we trust that the auspicious inauguration of the new premises is a happy harbinger of the increased business which will be transacted by Messrs. Bates, Stokes & Co.

THE REVOLUTION IN CORDOBA.

FULL PARTICULARS.

At last we have received full particulars about the mysterious revolution which has been just nipped in the bud in Cordova. We regret to say there has been too much truth in the flying rumours so current through town during the last few days: the arrests embrace some of the principal men of Cordoba; Don Tomas, and Don Nicolas Peñaloza are in irons, Dr. Augusto Lopez, Sres. Rios (father and son), Pio Aebaval, Luengo, and several others. The following is the official report sent in by the officer who made the arrests, to the Government.

In the absence of my superior, I have the honor to give you the full particulars respecting the late conspiracy, which was completely annihilated last night during the hours I was on guard. On the evening of the 4th Commander Arguello of this regiment, told me that a revolution was about to take place, and to aid which, they counted on me and subteniente Mansilla, and that he had given his word for us to Achabal and Luengo. On Sunday following, the 6th inst., a little before 8 o'clock p.m., Commander Arguello ordered me to go to the cuartel of the 1st Reg. of National Guards to bring subteniente Mansilla, that he had gone to visit the imprisoned officers there, I therefore obeyed, and returned shortly. Whilst on the road Mansilla told me that there had been a meeting at Luengo's quinta that night between Arguello, Achaval, Luengo, and a brother-in-law of the Chachos, whose name I forget, and that it was all arranged the revolution should take place on Sunday night, the 13th inst., at 12 o'clock; at that hour Don Domingo Rios was to come with his regiments to the barracks and shout out. Long live the National Government, at which signal the cuartel was to be at once given up and that for this he counted on me Sr. Mansilla.

That at the same time a night attack was to take place on the Policia; that Comisario Rios would be on guard, and although he was not yet spoken to they counted on him having the consent of his father, Commander Rios. Thus far owners of the town, the conspirators were then to march on the cuartel of the 1st Regiment and take the place by storm if they refused to surrender. That night the 6th inst. at 10 o'clock, after what Mansilla told me, I went to the Ministers house, and explained all, yesterday morning, at the order of the Minister, I went to Caballeros barraca, where I spledged myself to stand by the Government.

On returning to the cuartel, Commander Arguello told me that the revolution should have taken place last night, in as much as I was Captain of the troops and Mansilla head officer of the guard, but it was now put off until Thursday, when I and Mansilla would be again on guard and at the same time Commander Rios on guard at the Policia, it not being prudent that this officer should be changed before his turn for fear of exciting suspicions.

On yesterday I acquainted the Minister of the Change in Affairs giving renewed pledges of fidelity to the Government.

Last night at 10 o'clock the Governor sent for Commander Arguello and Capt. Mitre, and ordered them at once under arrest.

At the same time the Minister sent for me, ordered me to call on the first battalion and make Sub-Lieute-

nant Mansilla prisoner, which I accordingly did on my return to the barracks.

I also feel bound to tell you that the Capt. the Band-master, Don G. Ceballos, and Lieutenant Don Pedro Vasques, accompanied me all though until this moment, 9 o'clock a.m. I also send you a list of the soldiers in the barracks all night.

God protect Your Excellency, F. CORTES.

The above is a truthful picture of how revolutions are got up in South America, but for F. Cortes the officer who signs the foregoing despatch, the Government would have been upset, and the city of Cordoba thrown into the wildest excitement; happily for the cause of law and order, there was one officer found faithful to his trust, but disgraceful as these revolutionary efforts are, still more humiliating is it, to think upon what a slender thread hangs the Government of one of the richest and most populous provinces in the Republic. It would seem that the opposition party is stronger than the Government, and there cannot be the slightest doubt that unless Governor Perreyra takes every precaution there will soon be another row in Cordoba.

PHILANTHROPIC CONCERT.

THEATRE COLON.

On Saturday night the Colon Theatre was crowded as it rarely has been. Tertulias and Palcos were filled with the elite of the ladies of the native population in Buenos Ayres, the nature and diversity of whose toilettes afforded a study for costumiers, moralists, and political economists. The Cuzel, from below, appeared a mass of fair faces, none the less fair and attractive for belonging to those whose purse or taste prevented from competing with their sisters in their endeavors to clothe themselves with the best material and at the greatest cost possible. The pit was thronged, and we noticed that a few ladies ventured to break through the arbitrary separation of the sexes usually insisted on in that part of the house. Even the Paraiso was full, and in a word the house presented a most brilliant and animated appearance, the attraction being further increased by the very effective arrangement of the ladies and gentlemen on the stage.

Like all amateur performances this one began late, and our modest editor, ial luneta commenced to feel hard and uncomfortable after an hours' waiting, enlivened only by some gymnastic exercises on the stage, involuntarily performed by one of the committee of management. Finally, however, the last dilatory damsel of the forty composing the chorus took her seat, and Signor Ferrari, giving an introductory rap with his baton, led off with the grand 'sinfonia' from Morla, indifferently well performed by the orchestra.

Mrs. Mantels had the nervous task of opening the performance and sang the solo part of the coro from Favorita with a modesty and sweetness of expression that won the applause of all good judges. The same lady also rendered the air from Semiramide with perfect taste and with a delicacy of execution that combined to distinguish it in our opinion as 'the piece' of the evening, with all due deference to the superior physical powers of the other lady performers, and to the greater novelty of the Oboe and musical glasses.

Miss Reyes made her debut in the the famous duette from Norma, with Miss Sanchez, and sang in a manner that somewhat atoned for her rather questionable taste in keeping the house waiting her arrival. This lady's fame had preceded her and on her entrance she was greeted with a round of applause, but suffered later on the penalty of fame in having to sing up to the most extravagant expectations. Her cavatina from Cenerentola was justly received with continuous applause.

Miss Sanchez sang as Buenos Ayres knows how she can sing. Punctual and obliging as ever, notwithstanding a slight indisposition, she rendered the music allotted to her in a style and with a precision worthy of her title of the best amateur singer of Buenos Ayres. The plaudits of the audience were a proof of their appreciation of this lady's talent.

To go through the whole programme would occupy too much space. Buenos Ayres may well be proud of producing Amateurs like Miss Guterrez, whose performance on the violin was one of the features of the evening, like Miss Amadeo, Sr. Bosch, Miss Lavalle, Mrs. Pistone and others who took solo parts. The eight handed piece for two pianos was played with wonderful exactitude and brilliancy Miss Debarbieri evidently being the spirit and leader of the quartet. The fantasia on the musical glasses produced a wonderful effect and was repeated after continued and vociferous demands from the whole audience, and indeed the sweet tones extracted by Messrs. Alvarez and Sanchez from a few half empty tumblers surprised and charmed all hearers. We must be merciful on the chorus. Notwithstanding the general inutility and helplessness of ladies 'per se,' we must give them the palm for singing the best, perhaps because easiest, chorus from Marcos Visconti. The Orchestra was not perfect, but that and other little inaccuracies must be attributed to the sudden resignation of Sor Nicolay, and under the circumstances that Signor Ferrari may well be proud of having single-handed arranged and directed a concert that has kept three thousand five hundred people in their seats for four hours and a half.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday we had mails from the Uruguay and Montevideo, but nothing from Corrientes or Chile. The steamer due to-day from Corrientes will bring us 8 days' later news from the seat-of-war. There is the most intense anxiety to hear from head-quarters, as it is generally believed that there has been a fight. Sunday, owing to the rain, was a dull day in town; few people stirred out; the Tigro party was, of course, frustrated. We hear that it rained even heavier outside than in town. As the great concert at Colon did not terminate before morning the ladies were invisible all day. We received no letter from our brother editor per Rio Parana.

Yesterday we received a long communication from Captain Page, jaur., respecting his leaving the command of the steamer Rio Parana—as it is contrary to our rule ever to meddle in private disputes we decline publishing it. We regret Capt. Page has left the Rio Parana, as he was greatly liked and very highly spoken of to us by numerous English passengers, but as the river is full of steamers he will have no difficulty in getting another boat. The Arno leaves this month on Sunday, the 27th inst.; the mail at the Consul's closes at 5 o'clock on Saturday evening. As several of our leading merchants and well-known English residents depart in this packet we suppose there will be an ovation on the mole-head similar to last month.

We have received a letter from Rosario which gives the following information about the Tortugas lands:—"The camps from Rosario to the Tortugas are looking beautiful, on the lands the property of the contractors and the Argentine Central Railway Company the grass, in thousands of acres, might be mowed down. This is the best country to settle in that I have yet seen for any honest industrious class of men, and I think the time is not far distant when we shall see the land cultivated in a much more profitable manner."

There never was a greater instance of how public men will at times allow their private feelings to triumph over every obstacle which prudence and discretion interposes than that of Dr. Castro, the late Montevidean Minister. Although the innocent instrument of the publicity given to the Triple Alliance, he was entirely exculpated in the eyes of the River Plate public; none questioned his motives in applying Mr. Lettson with a copy of that treaty; none attached the slightest blame to him for so doing so, as all knew that he had done so reposing implicit confidence in some promise or guarantee of the British Consul, whether authorized or not we cannot say. Dr. Castro, however, was not content with all this, he was not satisfied to descend from the post of Minister with the sympathy of the public and the self-consciousness that all his official

acts had been guided by a lofty sense of patriotism and rectitude, he must under the delusion of vindictive character, sit down and pen the letter which we published on Sunday. The didactic style of the letter, may, as our Montevidean correspondent O'Dowd says, read well in Spanish, but in plain English it lacks the usual diplomatic reserve. Dr. Castro had a good case, but the question if his letter will serve it, and we will be much surprised if he ever receives a reply. That Parliament will meddle in the matter is possible, but not probable, for although, as we said before, the merits of the case are certainly in favor of Dr. Castro the letter is couched to too strong language to be brought before the house. It must be observed, however, that as there are two sides to every question the publication of this treaty may not have been attended with such gross tergiversations as is alleged. Although we exculpate Dr. Castro from all blame respecting the publication of the treaty we are not at all in a position to say how far Mr. Lettson's promises could bind the British Cabinet or dictate to the British Parliament, and Dr. Castro will learn with much surprise that a copy of the treaty in question was offered to a foreign minister here who declined it on the ground that the Government which he represented took no interest in the document.

The news from the south is of a most gloomy nature. The losses have in some places been stupendous. We regret to learn that Mr. John Davidson, of Santo Domingo, has lost no less than seven thousand sheep and seventy-eight English-bred cows; even the English bull perished in the storm, which all the estancieros regard as the severest ever experienced in the south. Respecting the Southern Railway, we are informed that during all storms, the waters flow from west to east, and as the railway runs north and south, it necessarily stops the water. Thus, in parts, there is an immense sea on one side of the railway, whilst the other side of the road is perfectly dry. Small bridges, at very short distances in the low camps, require at once to be put up so as to let the water off, and large drains to conduct the water to these bridges. The Western Railway, as far as Mercedes, escaped the fury of the flood, inasmuch as it ran parallel with the natural flow of the waters; but beyond Mercedes the line takes a different direction, making for Chivilcoy, and here it is that the western road suffered. At the Saladas the bank is washed away, and at other points the earthworks have also succumbed. On the Boca Railway there has been no damage, owing to the great precaution taken in placing large culverts and small bridges at short distances through the potreros. Few of our readers who have not seen the rapids at the Barraca-bridge, can form any idea of the torrent. We wonder the old bridge was not swept away. Such was the current that no boat could cross the stream, and it is calculated that this immense flow of water has carried off at least a yard and a half of mud. All this water came from the camp, and although it is now more than a week since the storm commenced, the torrents at the Riachuelo has abated but little.

News of the Baron Porto Alegre has at last arrived. He is on the banks of the Parana, with a small Paraguayan force of some 400 men in an island in his front. If we are to believe the news brought by a passenger in the Rio de la Plata the other day, the Paraguayans have hoisted a white flag, and by this time have surrendered.

Nearly all the prisoners in Montevideo escaped the other day. It appears that they had bored a large hole under the prison, which was almost in communication with the street, when the Chief got wind of it and had it immediately filled up.

The Polish subscription fund has met with two 'contretamps.' The Municipality refuses to allow 'rifas' during the May Festival, and the ladies of the Sociedad de Beneficencia decline to charge for tickets at the distribution of prizes.

Our colleague the 'America' states that Gen. Flores is shortly expected in Montevideo, and that the principal

objects of his return is to gather up his men and enlist all the Orientals. We confess that we have strong doubts as to the general's returning until the war is over. General Suarez, we believe, is expected back shortly.

We remind our readers that Mr. Edward Goldsmid's lecture and entertainment takes place to-night at the Coliseum. EXUMING THE ITALIANS.

NEWS FROM CORDOBA OUTSIDE.

Montevideo is after all the great place for news. We knew here of the surprise of Flores vanguard on the 1st of May, being the day before it occurred; we know other things also that are about to take place and the people of your city don't as yet dream of. I verily believe that there is some political clairvoyant in town who reads the River Plate future by table knocking or such like. The news of the day is the crusade against broker Gomez. Lawyer Lopez, Lighterman Portela, and merchants Camino and Pinto. As the broker Gomez is a constant reader of the Standard I take a great interest in the affair, will your readers believe that Mr. Orens, the Spanish Minister, has called upon all Spaniards to refrain from doing business with any of the above named parties, because he says they have been sending supplies to the Buenos non-clads. The Spanish business is very large and this fiat of the Minister which is unprecedented, has done these parties much injury. Mr. Orens is a man of the new school and believes in the doctrine of reprisals. An English Captain recently arrived has spread the rumor that he met with six iron plates in the South Atlantic, some of which carried flags; the Spaniards say that they belong to them whilst half Montevideo believe that they are Chilean; the British Captain is of the same opinion.

We all grieve here to learn of the flood at Buenos Ayres; but suppose that the stories current here must be gross exaggerations. An English gentleman at the Office of the Standard roused up in a small boat from their domicile, to the back of Wellington house where I am told the pretty English housewife lives. I have even heard that on some of the estancias, the farmers have had to swim their sheep on the gates of the corral. We read nothing in the Standard about this, nor about the Government sending out boats to Chascomus to bring in the drowned out Minister of War.

There is nothing new here about the Triple Alliance row. There is a capital story told about a certain Consul; when it first commenced, but I do not think until the affairs blows over that it should be published.

The Minister of Government has ordered all the dead bodies of the Italians murdered near Capelones to be exhumed and brought to Montevideo. Since the dismemberment of the French, there is a reactionary feeling predominating at head-quarters, however this last measure is a tribute of respect to the Italians, which cannot fail to be productive of much good.

Dr. Lopez has a notice pasted up outside of his office door. "No Spanish claim or lawsuit allowed in this office" this is, of course, in consequence of the rather extraordinary notice of Mr. Orens the Spanish Minister respecting this lawyer.

ENGLISH SETTLEMENT IN CORDOBA.

FRANKLIN WENT TO GOING AHEAD.

There is perhaps no place in the world which offers such advantages to immigrants as the River Plate, the lands of which are acknowledged as the cheapest and richest of South America. Nature seems to have intended it as the land of promise for the weary emigrant and in the distribution of her favors, both largely endowed it with those natural advantages

to wit, wood and water, which render independent of the caprices of the fickle weather.

Of late years owing, as well to the magnanimity of the Governor, as the natural attractions of the place Frayle Muerto has become the great headquarters of our countrymen and certainly we know of no place better adapted for sheep farming, with few exceptions all the late settlers have doubled their capital in 2 years.

MARITIME ITEMS.

The Brazilian floating mortar battery, 'El Fuerte de Coimbra,' in tow of the Brazilian transport steamer Oyapock, during the voyage from Rio Janeiro, on the night of the 14th, when off the east point, going at easy speed, with a stiff breeze blowing, at 1 a.m. one of the tow lines cut; the breeze increasing, the other line gave way at half-past one.

The English brigantine Alexandria, Captain Winterford, which arrived in Montevideo on the 17th inst., reports coming in collision, the day before entering port, with a barque called the Britania, also bound for Montevideo.

The following vessels have been spoken at sea:—

- The Charles, from Montevideo to Bordenax, the 18th February, latitude 24 south, longitude 26 west.
The Octava, from Buenos Ayres to Boston, lat. 1 north, long. 34 west.
The Prince Alfred, from Montevideo to Queenstown, the 22d February, latitude 43, longitude 28.

From a letter (which we have seen) that arrived, per English pilot-boat Foam, from the Falkland Islands, and dated Stanley, 21st ult., we copy the following:—"On the 21st April, at 11 p.m., during a strong gale from W.N.W., the Dutch ship Orange Nazau, Captain Vanities, with a general cargo, and 670 tons of coal on board, bound from Liverpool to Val-

paraiso, put into that port, repairing fire. The captain of this vessel, tired of the many disasters on the voyage (this being the second time they were obliged to put into Stanley) from Cape Horn, they steered for a reef of rocks, to be met with a short distance before arriving at that port. A little time before sighting the light-house on Cape Paulotte, the captain committed suicide by shooting himself with three pistol balls. As soon as the disaster was known, the Governor of Stanley requested assistance from the Commander of the Italian war-steamer Ercole, which called at that port on the voyage to Valparaiso. The captain of the Ercole despatched immediately to the scene of the disaster two launches and a fire engine, with an officer in command, by whose assistance the fire was extinguished and the vessel set to rights. The same letter mentions the ship has again sailed on her voyage for the third time, commanded by the mate.

NEWS FROM GUARDIA DEL MONTE.

Esquina Galvan, Partido Guardia del Monte, 17th May, 1866. Until lately the weather round about this quarter has been uncommonly fine: the peach and plum trees are partly in blossom, and the cherry bearing fruit for the second time. The young vegetables are coming on beautifully. Until the last few days the cotton plant has been flowering, but of which cotton there is left there is little hope of getting a shirt collar made from it this season.

People who have long lived about here never saw such rain, the camps were like a sea, actually flooded over, and are now somewhat freer from water, although there is a great deal lying about. If we have only a few warm days and no night frost, the camps will be beautiful.

We have not heard as yet if any accident or losses have taken place, although there must have been some loss of sheep and habits, as the sheep have been, and are now, lambing very heavy.

ANOTHER VERSION OF "STOP THIEF."

Pilar, May 18, 1866. To the Editors of the 'Standard,' Gentlemen, Seeing in your issue of last Sunday, a letter signed C— W. B—, and being desirous, for the public good, that the other version of 'Stop Thief' may be made known, I apply to you, Gentlemen, for publicity of the following statements:—Some time since I hired said B— to educate my children, and I therefore engaged to pay him \$300 per month for his trouble. He told me that his trunks were in town, detained in a boarding-house for debt. He required a change and he could not do so without his clothes. Well, then, what was to be done in such circumstances?—I had his trunks brought from town at a cost of some 600 and odd dollars. I strove to make him as comfortable as possible, and treated him as one of my own children. But my kindness was not appreciated when he began to repay my good offices with ingratitude. Suffice it to say that I had to dismiss him for misbehaviour, which I shall not name, as he is a young

man beginning the world. He shall have his clothes and trunks when he refunds the money I paid for them.

OUTLINES FROM NEW YORK PAPERS.

The following is translated from a Bogota, Columbia, paper containing President Murrillo's message on the survey of the Magdalena River and tributaries by the United States engineers.—"The coming here of these officers, who are the most distinguished in the engineer service of the United States of America, is due in great part to the benevolent solicitude of the Secretary of State, Mr. Seward, the enlightened friend of our country."

By late advices from Mexico, intelligence is received that the Belgian envoys sent to announce to the Queen the death of her father, King Leopold of Belgium, were recently attacked by highwaymen on their return to Vera Cruz. One was killed and two were seriously wounded. This is probably the correct version of the report previously received of the murder of the Belgian Minister. Troops were arriving from Europe, and it is estimated that there are now thirty thousand French troops in the country.

The United States Consul at Liverpool informs the State Department by letter, dated March 9, 1866, that all the steamers and emigrant ships leaving that port for the U. States are full of emigrants; that the emigration this year will be enormous, and the indications are that it will be greater this year than at any other time since we have been a nation.

Mr. Anthony from the Committee on Printing, reported a resolution, which was adopted, providing that the further publication of the observations of the United States Naval Astronomical Expedition to Chile be discontinued; which was agreed to.

ON 'CHANGE.

Gold was far more abundant to-day than it has been for some time, almost every broker wanted to sell, but on the price falling to 25 85 a July took place with a subsequent reaction to 25 90.

There is, however, every indication of a greater and continued decline in specie, for paper is apparently as scarce as it was last December.

The Provincial Bank last Saturday refused in many cases to give paper, offering the equivalent in gold. The London & River Plate Bank also limits its operations to gold, and as this latter establishment is said to be about to reduce its rate of interest for gold we cannot but anticipate a return to 25 60 very shortly.
