THE NEW LAND LAW.

As the extended period prescribed by
law for the payment of the Government
lands is drawing near a close there is a
very natural anxiety to know what the
Government intends doing in this
regard. As we mentioned previously
the banner of the new Government on
entering office was cheap lands and
quick sales. A month has nearly
elapsed since Governor Alsina's pro-
gramme was given to the public, and
yet up to the hour of going to press no
step has been taken, no measure pro-
posed by the new administration.

To recount all the acts of legislation,
all the fiat of governors, all the de-
crees of ministers respecting the public
lands of the Province of Buenos Ayres
would require a volume fully as large
as the last edition of Webster's diction-
ary. For years there has been a petti-
fogging system of legislation going on
with regard to these lands which could
result in nothing else save opprobrium
on the legislators and direct injury to
the estancieros.

On a fine sunny day, when every-
thing looked smiling in Buenos Ayres,
and the great nabobs of the day were
estancieros, a member of the Camara
was found to stand up and assert in
the House that the real value of Govern-
ment lands inside the Salado was
\$400,000, and beyond that river half
that sum. As, previous to that event-
ful day, the current price of Govern-
ment lands was only half these rates,
the whole House chimed in with the
orator and the prices were at once
raised nem con. The period when the
lands were to be paid for was fixed,
the credits allowed specified, even the
way in which the purchase money was
to be employed was expressed. No
legislation could be more complete,
and it only required for the law to
state the names of the buyers to
conclude the whole business. We
well recollect that period. A league of
the worst land in the province was
looked on as dead cheap at a million.
Briol was singing to empty benches,
Pauline wasted her most winning
smiles on scene shifters and policemen,
for the great attraction every night
was the land auctions at the Cabildo,
where Irishmen were bidding one over
the other for square leagues of land.
Competition became so great and bids
so continuous that the ordinary hours
of daylight were insufficient for the
legal auctioneer, candles had to be
brought out—the crowds increased—
some people thought there was a revo-
lution going on in the Carcel, others
that the prisoners were escaping, but
soon it was generally known that the
whole fuss was a land auction. Arm-
strong, Lamb, Anchorena, Pereira,

were forgotten in that epoch of terres-
trial excitement. The auctioneer, with
that keenness for which all members of
the hammer are proverbial, gazed dis-
dainfully at all the well dressed per-
sons who gathered around, and looked
wistfully for those who invariably dress
in pea jackets and short corduroys.
He watched every movement of all
whom he classed by their apparel as
campmen, and not infrequently the
presence of a man smoking a clay pipe
or chewing tobacco at once added fifty
thousand dollars to his bid. From the
Cabildo to the Chambers is but a
stone's throw, and soon the prices paid,
the auctions held, and the locality of
the estancias sold became the absorb-
ing topic in our Provincial Parliament
House.

Inspired with the great success of
these auctions, infatuated by the sums
paid, the legislators did not take long
to dispute over the measure. The
prices were raised and fixed, the period
stated, after which all unbought lands
were to be sold by auction by Billing-
hurst in the Plaza, who was to take
his stand on the top of the pyramid so
as to leave ample room for the bidders
beneath! Greatest of all delusions.

Scarcely was the law passed when
the enfetensis rights which hitherto
have been of great value fell 10, 20, 30,
40, 50, and ultimately 90 per cent. All
the sales of public lands were at once
brought to a standstill, and before the
period mentioned in the law for the
sale of the lands had expired, the
result had been so contrary to the
general expectation that the land auc-
tion was adjourned sine die, and the
time extended for six months. When
the first six months expired, then an-
other six months was given, and so on,
until to-day we arrive at the period
when legislation is required to inter-
fere, for at the rate we are going on
not in ten thousand years would the
Buenos Ayres public lands be dis-
posed of.

The last six months is now nearly
out. Something must be done; either
a further extension given, or the law
altogether changed. The latter, we
believe, is the best course, for the
price charged for a league of land at
Rojas, Chivilcoy, or Chacabuco, is so
exorbitant, that few men can afford to
buy them. We hope the Minister will
carefully study this matter, and agree
with us that all these outside lands
are not worth one farthing over
\$100,000 per square league.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Rio Paraná, coming up from
Montevideo on Wednesday night, ex-
perienced very bad weather. The
night was very stormy, and it blew so
strong that all had to keep below.

An English merchant has requested
us to say that one of the French mail
bags has been lost or mislaid this trip.
It appears that several merchants in
Montevideo, and also some here are
without their letters. We hope the
French Consul, or the Postmaster-
General will inquire into this matter.

On Thursday there was a grand
"baraquero" breakfast at Watson's in
Belgrano, quite a splendid affair. At
the Tigre an English boating party
came to grief; the boat got aground
and lost amongst the islands. After
endless exertions the party waded
ashore at daylight: the night not being
warm, our friends shivering and wet
made for the nearest estancia, which
they reached after two hours walking.
The establishment belonged to a Mr.
Pacheco, where our friends got the
cold shoulder. With the aid of an
Italian peon, who charged \$50 for his
advice, they found the road to San
Fernando, and arrived there at eleven
o'clock p.m. So much for boating in
this season. Boat, oars, &c., were of
course abandoned, and the rowers ar-
rived in town in rather an abandoned
plight also. The cricket match came
off, but as we received no returns, sup-
pose that both parties won. The day
was so cold few waited to see the game
out.

On Monday night there will be an
English book auction at Posada's mart
in Calle Bolivar; we advise our friends
to attend.

One of the Paraguayan Yatay pris-
oners, who is at present employed as a
servant in a house in town, drew one
thousand patacones this week in the
lottery.

The steamer 16th April, late White-
inch, left on Thursday for Corrientes.
She found great difficulty in starting.
Several engineers were sent for, and
ultimately her old captain, who at once
got her underway.

Diaz, the bank clerk robber, previous
to leaving Buenos Ayres, took letters
of introduction to several influential
parties in Lisbon.

The home stockholders of the Buenos
Ayres Great Southern Railway are
about to present a service of plate to
Mr. Frank Parish for his untiring ser-
vices in their behalf.

Resquin, the Paraguayan command-
er who led the cavalry charge at the
last fight, is said to have been mounted
on a splendid black charger all capri-
soused in silver. Barrios, it is said, led
the attack on the Brazilians where the
battle raged the worst; it is rumoured
that he is wounded. Some of our col-
leagues state that the Paraguayan
soldiers were all half drunk before the
fight commenced.

A Brazilian, in a letter in Sunday's
'Tribuna,' calls Antar, the army cor-
respondent of the 'Nacion,' over the
coals for his partial account of the last
fight. He states that the battle was
fought and won by the Brazilians, and
that the Commander-in-chief was occu-
pied with the wounded in another
part of the field during the fight.

The Esmeralda left on Thursday as
also the Pollux, the former was crowded
with passengers, but the Prime Min-
ister was not seen on board, Cap. Price
did not go up with her this trip, as
he is now convalescent we hope to see
him soon at his old post on board the
Esmeralda.

Mr. Pollock, the Argentine Govern-
ment engineer, is at present at the Paso
de la Patria looking over the Govern-
ment steamers there.

Mr. Foley, who some month ago re-
turned from the army in such impaired
health, has been obliged to return to
headquarters. Capt. Davis is still in
town.

The total number of Brazilians in the
hospital, previous to the last fight, is
stated to have been 4000, we suppose,
therefore, that there cannot be less
now than 6000.

It is rumoured that General Sampaio
is dead. He fought with the most ex-
traordinary courage and bravery in
the battle of the 24th. Although
wounded and his horse killed under
him he still, sword in hand, led on his
men, the best in the Brazilian army,
they were, however, terribly handled
during the fight. Over 300 dead
Paraguayans lay before the Brazilian
encampment.

It is said that Tamararé refused
point blank to move one inch up the
Paraguay river until the allies first
passed the Bellaco which was effected
on the 21st ult., he then ordered the
fleet up but they were brought to by a
palisade across the river at Curupaít.

The committee appointed by Con-
gress to consider the Vice-President's
resignation, has reported to the house
that it should not be received.

There is probably no article which
has risen more in price in consequence
of the war than blankets. The allies
appear to have bought up all the
blankets in town. The hospitals are
well provided, but the troops, we hear,
are in great want of good winter uni-
forms, and the fever and ague amongst
the troops is greatly owing to the want
of good warm clothing, and being
obliged to sleep in swampy ground.

Sr. Galvan has received possession
of the splendid English steamer, the
Whiteinch. The price paid, we believe,
is \$65,000. Her late captain returns
immediately to Cuba.

The impending fight at Humaitá
threatens to be the most awful battle
ever known or heard of in South
America. It is very questionable whe-
ther Lopez will take his army into this
stronghold. It is already manned by
4,000 picked men, and if the iron-
clads cannot force their way up, the
siege by the allies will be a rather
lengthy affair. Until Humaitá sur-
renders it is impossible to say how long
the war will last.

We hear, on good authority, that
the Argentine Government has arrang-
ed another loan for £200,000 in Rio
Janeiro, and next English packet
some of the gold will probably ar-
rive.

On Friday morning there was a
heavy white frost over an inch thick on
the ground; in the camp the frost was
even still more severe.

The Hon. George Fowler Hastings
is named as the new Commander-in-
Chief on this station. Lieut. Elliot, of
the Dotorel, Lieutenant Hardy, of the
Gleaner, and Lieutenant Kennedy, of
the Spider, have been promoted to
the rank of Commander.

The Stromboli, on her passage home,
called in at Siera Leone, and there
caught yellow fever. The death of
one of her junior officers (Mr. Wheeler)
is reported. Several officers and men
were laid up with fever.

There are three unfortunate Swedish
sailors locked up in the Carcel now
over three months awaiting their trial.
It seems the only charge against them
is, that they deserted from their ship,
which long since left this port. The
officer of the guard-ship heard the boat
passing in the night with the runaway
sailors, and had it stopped. The
sailors were sent ashore and put at
once in prison. Although there is no
one to prosecute, the American Con-
sul refuses to do anything, as the cap-
tain has left. The Swedish Consul
has labored until he is tired in their
behalf. There seems to be no getting
the poor sailors out, as the judge is
always sick or absent, and the escri-
baos are too busy. We raise our
voice on behalf of these unfortunates,
and hope this passing notice will meet
the eyes of those who can open the
prison doors.

The Liverpool steamer Ada has at
last arrived at Montevideo; she brings
a valuable cargo for that port so we
suppose we need not expect her here
before Sunday.

The University has just received on
board the Buffon 5 large boxes contain-
ing instruments for the class of Natu-
ral History.

Marshall's new steamer is fast ap-
proaching completion. We understand
it will be the largest steamer ever
built in Buenos Ayres—about the same
size as the Pavon, but far more com-
modious.

Captain Bruce, the Commodore of
the Parana, has bought another pro-
perty near Southampton, adjoining the
farm of the celebrated Juan Manuel
Rosas, and it is thought will not return
to the Plate. This we much regret,
for so long as we had Captain Bruce,
the river was well buoyed.

Ex-Governor Saavedra is still so-
journing at Higuera, where H. Zim-
mermann, Esq., his son-in-law, has a
magnificent saladero establishment.

Congress is now nearly one month in
session, and up to the present has done
nothing. Quere, what about article
28?

The Paraguayan Romero, who was
charged with conspiring against the
life of General Caraballo, is dead. The
affair, as far as we can understand, it
is that the police went to arrest him,
he resisted and was killed in the
struggle.

We regret to hear that several of
the wounded who came down in the
General Flores have died in Montevi-
deo, notwithstanding the very best
medical care. Dr. Witch has made
himself conspicuous by his untiring at-
tentions to the wounded.

The Machado rebellion has complet-
ely died out. Letters received from the
frontier state that everything is quiet.
The Minister is away off towards the
Indian camps. There has been no In-
dian invasion whatever.

A private letter from Corrientes
gives the most horrible account of
that city, which may be said to be in
the hands of a pack of 'gauchos.' An
unfortunate organ-grinder was induced
to play at a 'baile,' whilst there a row
occurred, and the organ-grinder was
butchered. No arrests whatever:
every species of eatables rule at
famine prices.

A VACATION TRIP IN THE URUGUAY.

Crossing the Bellaco—Mr. Green's estancia—Ride
to the Rincon.

On Friday morning I prepared to go
down the Arroyo Negro in one of the
ferry-boats that ply to Concepcion, and
was about to take my passage with D.
Juan Lartigue when to my disgust I
found he was also taking down some
pigs: the boat was very small, and
while debating with myself whether to
go or to wait till evening, two En-

glishmen arrived at the saladero, one
of whom proved to be Mr. William
Ferguson, manager of Mr. Green's es-
tancia of Bella-Vista, and he invited
me to go over and see the place. Don
Adrian Morvonnais kindly lent me a
horse, and I accompanied Messrs. Fer-
guson and Pickford.

We got into a thick wood pushed on
reaching the Bellaco, which winds its
course through some very fine sylvan
scenery ere it disembogues into the
Uruguay. Here we found some Bas-
ques putting down posts and fencing-
in this side of Mr. Green's estancia.
Fences seem to be the order of the day,
and soon it will be difficult for the
traveller to escape from the labyrinth
of posts and wire now springing up on
these estancias. I believe the law de-
clares a free passage must be left open
at least every league. Emerging from
the Bellaco woods, which so much re-
minded me of the woods we have at
home, saw on all sides the same neat
brick 'puestos,' as at Drysdale's. The
camps as usual rolling and fertile here
and there broken by a clump of trees,
the sheep and cattle very fat, and the
grass almost knee-deep, but with quan-
tities of thistles.

The estancia-house of Bella-Vista is
an irregular succession of buildings,
with court yards, adjacent to an Ombu
where probably the primitive inhabi-
tants had a 'ramada.' It is difficult
to bear in mind that all these edifices,
the brick puestos &c. have sprung up
within the last few years. Mr. Fergu-
son tells me that when he came here
7 years ago, there was not a single
brick house from here to Paysandu.
Large capitals, have been freely ex-
pended on all these estancias, and flatter-
ing evidence of progress crop up on
all sides in return.

The stock on this estancia compri-
ses some 1,600 head of cattle and 8,000
sheep, with 7 puestos managed by En-
glishmen. The camp formerly was
part of the same [Rivero's] estancia
as that of Mr. James M. Bell, but now
the Arroyo Medio serves as common
landmark. The land has water on
three sides which constitutes the ad-
vantage that is termed a Rincon.

Mr. Ferguson proposed a ride to the
Rincon, and on our way we stopped at
Mr. Nolan's puesto: it was very neat
with matted floors, pictures on the
walls, a rifle slung over the chimney-
piece, and an air of comfort, though
the only inhabitant was our young
friend, whose hermitage would have
been complete but for the casual visits
of naval and diplomatic sportsmen.
It is only a few weeks since the British
and American Admirals were up
here and bagged 40 braces in one day.
Mr. Nolan gave me a wild honey-comb
he had found in the woods, which is
now for the exhibition of the 'Stan-
dard' office.

Here we met Captain Kennedy of
the Delta whose vessel was anchor-
ed at the mouth of the Arroyo Negro,
a mile from the 'puesto': we accepted
his invitation to go on board, and rode
down through a thick jungle, where
lions have sometimes been seen, to the
sandy hills on the coast. Tying our
horses to the shrubs we put off for the
Delta: she has a handsome vessel, from
Dundee, taking in hides &c. from Mor-
vonnais's 'saladero.'

We returned to Bella-Vista by sunset.
The house is beautifully situated, but
unfortunately all efforts to raise the
plantation are in vain, as the ants eat
up everything in the shape of a shrub.
Tanned thongs and a thousand other
devices have been tried to check their
attacks, but all to no purpose. On the
next [Mr. Bell's] estancia, there are
none, for old Rivero had two black
slaves constantly employed in eradicat-
ing this nuisance; Antonio still lives
with Mr. Bell, and is reputed the best
ant-killer in the country: his comrade
died some years ago.

ARROYO NEGRO AND THE SANTA ISABEL
SALADERO.

On Wednesday morning I met Don
Ernesto Carreras at the hotel, and he
said to me "instead of going to Con-
cepcion by steamer, you should take a
ride overland, and send your luggage
down by steamer." It happened that
a friend of his, M. Adrian de la Mor-
vonnais was about to start for his sa-
ladero at the Arroyo Negro, and Sr.
Carreras kindly gave me his horse to
accompany the former. Don Adrian

is as fine a specimen of the French
gentleman as I have ever seen, speaks
English fluently, and we were soon
great friends. As we sallied forth
from Paysandu, I remarked that he
and his two comrades were armed to
the teeth, with Colt's revolvers and
knives silver-hilted: this is the custom
of the country since the troublesome
times of the war when the woods were
infested with 'matreros', but now the
revolvers are worn for ornament or
habit, no personal outrage having oc-
curred for a long time.

It is almost 5 leagues to the Arroyo
Negro. The day was cloudy, with a
slight mist, but rather exhilarating
after the recent dreadful heat. We
followed no road, but galloped across
the country over a succession of hills
and valleys beautifully diversified with
wood and water. We left, keeping
near the Uruguay, till we sighted the
saladero of Casa Blanca, belonging to
Sr. Libaros, then turned inland past
the old estancia of Almagro, and came
up on the banks of the Arroyo Negro
about 5 p.m. after two hours hard gal-
lop. At a given signal a boat put off
from the saladero opposite: the Arroyo
is about 200 yards wide, and getting
into the boat we swam the horses over
in tow.

A ride in these camps is sure to give
a man a good appetite, and the beef is
far superior to what is sold in Buenos
Ayres markets. Our dinner-table
was surrounded by 16 gentlemen of
almost as many distinct nationali-
ties, Don Pablo and his nephew Don
Adrian doing the honors.

The saladero Santa Isabel was built
some 4 years ago by D. Nicanor Elia,
owner of these camps, and rented by
him in 1864 to M.M. de la Morvonnais,
who have made great improvements
in it and rented also the estancia, of
6 square leagues in extent. It is si-
tuated some 2 leagues from the Uru-
guay. The sheds cover a superficial
area of 10,000 square yards, the sala-
dero occupying 24 cuadras of ground,
and having a population of 500 souls
between operatives, peons and their
families. The drying-accommodation is
equal to 5,000 quintals of jerked beef,
and Dou Pablo says he can kill 600
head of cattle per diem. Every thing
is very neat and in excellent order.

The vats will hold each the fat of
300 animals: there are 8 and 6 more
are being put up. The engineer and
book-keeper of the establishment are
Scotch, 120 of the employees are for-
eigners, and the rest Entre-Rianos or
natives. I saw 3 troops of cattle arrive
during my stay, and the saladero is at
present in full play. At times ships
can come up to the mole, but the water
is now low and lighters are used.
There is a police-sergeant, with 4 men,
for maintaining order, and the number
of Brazilian, Misouero, and Oriental
troperos constantly arriving keeps the
place in a bustle. Boats go and come
every hour between this place and
Concepcion, fare 1 dollar.

I slept soundly after my ride, my
bones aching a little, for I had not
been much on horseback since my tour
through Paraguay in 1864. I had,
however, sufficient courage to accept
an invitation to side over to the es-
tancia, where a rodeo of cattle was to
be made, to pick out a few hundred
for the saladero. The horses were sad-
dled before daybreak, and we had a
ride of 4 leagues before us.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

GREAT RENOVING.

From the noise, din, and clamour,
save us. Never was there anything of
the kind like it before. Montevideo
has been converted into a regular bed-
lam, and if things go on as they are
going I think the best paying business
will be importing fire crackers and
casting bells. Bankers and brokers
may shut up until the war is over. The
news of the victory is now being thor-
oughly digested, and they say here
that the Brazilians had the hardest
part of the fight. In the Government-
house there is little doing. Governor
Vidal has sent a congratulatory letter
to the Queen of Spain.

There has been a very current rumour
here that the Peruvian ironclads were
knocking about Ensenada and the crews
mutinous. The Ercole, which arrived
here from the Straits, has silenced all
these bolas, having met the Indepen-

tencia in Possession Bay. The whereabouts of the Huascar does not seem to be known.

Another Brazilian ironclad has arrived, the Rio de Janeiro, she is commanded by Captain B. Silva, has 140 men on board, carries 2 rifled guns, 68-pounders, and 2 70-pounders, also 2 small 12-pounders. Her plates are 4 inches thick. She goes right up to the squadron.

The French barque Alfreda, hence to Havre, has been wrecked, she had hides and wool on board.

By last mail news has arrived here that two more ironclads for the Brazilians have left England—the Columbus and the Medusa—they are the best monitors Brazil has got yet. Brazil has now ten ironclads afloat and five more are building for her.

The packet has left; Mr. and Mrs. Bland left in her.

Exchange closed at 52 1/2. £30,000 at 52 1/2 by the bank. £20,000 at 52 1/2. Total passed about £112,000.

Montevideo, May 30.

We were again disturbed of our usual tranquility this morning, at 5 a.m., by the arrival of the Portefa with details of the last battle in Paraguay, by ringing of bells, firing of guns, rockets, and fire crackers. We had the same thing yesterday from 3 a.m. until sundown, and most people are heartily tired of it. The Spanish story or bola about the Peruvian war-vessels turns out like many similar stories. The Italian gunboat Ercole arrived this morning, 11 days from the Straits of Magellan, where she got aground on a shoal and unshipped her rudder, besides other damage, and was obliged to return to Montevideo in distress. She left here two months since for Valparaiso. The Peruvian ironclad Independencia was there, Commander Maffit, formerly of the Confederate steamer Florida, in command. She first hoisted the American flag, until she found out that the Ercole was not Spanish, when she ran up the Peruvian flag. She offered assistance to the Ercole, and said she was waiting for the Huascar, she also informed them that they had taken two Spanish vessels in the mouth of the River Plate.

We are looking hourly for the steamer Oriental which will soon replace the Portefa.

GREAT SOUTHERN RAILWAY.

Contractor's Office Chascomus 29th May 1866. To the Editors of the 'Standard.'

Gentlemen, In your paper of the 27th inst. while paying a well merited tribute to Mr. Alfred Rumball, the Resident Engineer for the Southern Railway Company, for his foresight in providing a greater number of Culverts than contemplated in the original plans of the line, you refer to him as having 'insisted' upon the contractors building them.

To insist upon anything, implies a certain amount of resistance or opposition to be overcome—and no doubt had Mr. Rumball remained here he would have been the first person to correct the erroneous impression conveyed by the adoption of this expression in connection with the matter.

As the representative of the contractors, so far from offering any opposition to the course described—I highly approved of it nor did I rest content with simply complying with the demands made upon me but according as experience led me to consider it desirable to do so, I still further increased the number of culverts between San Vicente and Chascomus to one third more than required by Mr. Rumball. From San Vicente to Chascomus is about two thirds of the entire length of the Railway and it comprises, with a very slight exception, the whole of the low-lying lands upon the line.

I may add that at the present moment we are building a number of new culverts between Jeppener Station and Chascomus which will increase the waterway upon that part of the line to twice and a half what it has hitherto been.

I think I have said enough to show that so far from the contractors having offered any opposition to provid-

ing ample waterway for the line—they considerably exceeded their obligations in this respect, [and that willingly, and of their own accord] nor would they have rested content with this, had there been the slightest idea that the culverts as constructed were insufficient to carry off all the water occasioned by the greatest floods.

I am not ashamed to admit that although I have seen great floods in many places, I never until the recent rains, thoroughly understood how destructive they may become in level countries possessing so little natural drainage as exists here.

THE ATTEMPT UPON THE CAESAR'S LIFE.

The 'Nord' contains some further particulars respecting the attempt made on the life of the Emperor of Russia. It was made, it says, when his Majesty was leaving the garden on the side of the quay, after taking a walk with Duke Nicholas of Leuchtenberg and the Princess Mary of Baden. The caleche was somewhat in advance, and a sergent-de-ville had presented the Emperor with his cloak when the ball whistled over his head. A young peasant who observed the assassin aiming at the Emperor struck his arm, which happily caused the bullet to deviate. The people would have torn the assassin in pieces if they had not been prevented by the Emperor. He cried out to the peasants who fell upon him, "It is for you that I have devoted myself; he has deceived you, and has not given you enough of land." When arrested he stated that he belonged to the district of Longa (government of St. Petersburg). He has not yet been identified, but there is reason to believe that his declaration is false, and that he is, says the 'Nord' "one of those miserable wretches whose moral sense has been perverted by a vicious education and bad reading." The Emperor went at once to the Winter Palace to inform the Empress of what had happened. In the evening the Emperor addressed the officers of the Guards who filled the palace and related to them the incidents of the attempt. They went in a body from the palace to the Cathedral of Preobrajensky, where a Te Deum was sung while the Emperor and Empress and the rest of the imperial family went to the Cathedral of Kazan, and offered up thanks. The city was illuminated in the night. The young man who foiled the arm of the regicide was presented to the Empress, who thanked him with tears in her eyes. When the Emperor announced to the officers of the Guard that he would ennoble the young man, the announcement was received with loud hurrahs. A subscription has been opened to enable him to support his new dignity. Some papers were found on the assassin, and amongst them a kind of proclamation to the people, in which he says "the world will have no peace till all the sovereigns are exterminated."

ON 'CHANGE.

June 1, 1866.

Paper price of ounces, \$408 1/2. Do. sovereigns, 125. First price of patacons, 25 7/8. Last, 25 5/8. Cash sales 58,800.

There was a serious decline in gold to-day, which, amongst the bulls, was regarded with a panic sort of feeling. Specie seems now to have no bottom, and many brokers think that the present fall is solely attributable to the many pro-

jects before the Government for the redemption of the paper money, and to the moral certainty that next English packet will bring a very heavy specie remittance for the Government. It was said on 'Change' that the Argentine Government had negotiated a small loan with the Bank of Brazil for £200,000, payable at 3, 6, 9, and 12 months at 1 1/2 with the ordinary commissions. The amount realized in England is £275,000, and in consequence of the hitherto unfavorable rates of exchange the Minister has declined to receive it except in specie.

We seldom recollect gold weaker than at present. The brokers look wistfully at Sr. Varela, the Finance Minister, as the one on whom 'Change' is said to be cloaked with Mr. Latham, and that a bill to redeem the currency under their auspices will shortly be launched. We think it right, however, to remark that another and far more feasible project than any hitherto mooted is at present before the Governor and so favorable and comprehensive that it is every way probable it will form the solution of the great financial Gordian knot.

Respecting the Southern Railway and Mr. Green's representing 4,000 shares, there is much said. We have been informed on the very highest authority that Mr. Green holds powers representing over 3,800 shares.

The Durvone failure is still discussed and many of the creditors regard the proposition made as the most favorable nevertheless we learn that we were somewhat hasty in saying that Buron's matter is settled. It appears that many of the principal creditors absolutely refuse to sign an agreement. It is argued that the whole working and preparations of the arrangement is against the express conditions laid down in the Codigo, as in such cases absolute unanimity is required before the court has the power to approve of the concordato.

There was nothing whatever done in Bonds or Gas Shares, although buyers were freely offering. The time sales of specie show how weak the market is. Patacons were sold to-day for October, November, and December at 26, the cash price only a few days ago.

Money is getting so easy that the banks are reducing their rates. The Maba Bank charges from to-day—allowing for gold, 7; for paper, 8. Charging for gold, 15; for paper, 18.

In the wool plazas very little doing. We heard of some extraordinary prices paid for lamb's wool; and a few cartloads of foreign mestiza sold at current rates. The wools deposited in John Smith's barra, said last week to have been sold are not yet disposed of.
