As the winter season has now set in and we are improving I beg to advise horse-owners that I am ready to take charge of horses at so much per month for pasturing, at the same time making myself responsible for the value of any horses lost (not including such as may die a natural death), on the following conditions:
1st. Horses not exceeding \$600 in value will pay 80¢ per month.
2nd. Horses worth from 600 to 1,000\$ will pay 100¢ and horses worth over 1,000\$ shall be charged 10 per cent., on their value for monthly pasturing.
3rd. Horse-owners will have to send for their horses to the estancia, and when delivering them will get a receipt from the Mayor or owner, but when there are more than 4 horses the undersigned will send to take them or return them to town at 60¢ a head.
4th. Horse-owners may leave their animals as long as they like, but cannot take them away until first paying whatever is due for them.
5th. After 4 months of pasturing the owner will be required to pay the cost of same, and if this be not satisfied within a further term of 2 months the horses will be confiscated as property of the estancia and branded with the estancia-mark.
6th. Every horse-owner will receive a ticket bearing my signature, expressing the value of the horses left for pasture, the date and conditions.
7th. Every horse-owner shall deliver to me the 'boletos' of the horses or a copy of same, to prevent the horses being seized as stray animals.
8th. In case of horse dying, a piece of his hide with the mark will be returned to the owner.

THE WAR IN THE WEST.

MAILS FROM THE PACIFIC.
RETREAT OF THE SPANISH SQUADRON.
The Chilean mails arrived on Sunday.
We have files from Valparaiso to the
23rd ult., and Panamá to April 25.

On the night of May 5th the Peru-
vians sent the steam-launch Sofia to
blow up the Blanca with an infernal
machine, but the Spaniards were on
the alert, fired 11 shots, and then
seized the Sofia and torpedoed. The
report of cannon about midnight
alarmed the citizens of Callao, who ran
about in a state of semi-nudity to as-
certain if the enemy were again firing
on the town. The Spanish frigates
were some days repairing injuries and
burying their dead on San Lorenzo
island. On the morning of the 10th
Admiral Mendez Nuñez sent a notifica-
tion to the British Consul that he
raised the blockade and was about to
start for — parts unknown, and at
12.30 the frigates were out of sight,
steering 'S'. It is said one half the fleet
goes to Montevideo the other to San
Francisco or Manila to make repairs.
Before leaving they sunk the Paquete
Maule and returned the Matias Cousi-
ño to the British Consul. The Peruvian
Government ordered 3 days to be kept
holidays at Lima in celebration of the
retreat of the Spaniards. Mendez
Nuñez is wounded only slightly in the
arm. The following is his farewell
letter to Mr. Barton, H.B.M.'s Minister
at Lima.
Numancia, Callao, May 9th.

Dear Sir,
The naval forces under my orders hav-
ing chastised the Peruvian effort, by
bombarding Callao and its forts, whose
numerous heavy guns made no attempt
to reply till my vessels were drawing
off, I have the honor to inform you
that the blockade is raised and I depart
from Peruvian waters. But if any
outrage be committed on Spanish re-
sidents the Spanish forces will come
again to avenge same.

From Panamá we read as follows in
the 'Star and Herald,' respecting the
Barbacoa gold mines, near Guaya-
quil:—

The schooner Pedro San Juan, with
27 returning miners, arrived at this
port from Tumaco on the 28th inst.,
with later dates from the mining dis-
tricts. By this arrival we have received
the first number of a little newspaper
called the 'Cauca Miner,' published at
Barbacoa under date of 7th of April,
by Mr. M. de Kraut. From the 'Miner'
we make up the following summary of
the news from the mining regions:

A company of about fifty men have
been formed for the purpose of exam-
ining the Pombana Mine and exploring
the country around the head of the
Telamby River. About twenty of the
party left on Thursday, the 5th inst.,
fully equipped for the expedition and
accompanied by a suitable number of
Indians and peons. The remainder of
the party will follow in a few days.
Last Wednesday a portion of Dr
Weaver's company returned from their
prospecting tour in the interior. The
accounts given by these gentlemen
are anything but encouraging. They
prospected for nine days in the
neighborhood of Tuquerres without
finding anything. There are so e
fifty or sixty miners yet remaining in
the province who, when heard from,
may materially alter the aspect of
affairs in the interior. Dr. Weaver
still remains in the province, and in-
tends prospecting for some time.

THE FUNERAL OF LIEUT. PORTELA.

At 10 o'clock on Sunday morning
some 200 gentlemen assembled at the
residence of the Portela family, in calle
Maypá, to convey the remains of this
gallant young soldier to their last
resting-place. We noticed some of the
Ministers of the National and Provin-
cial Governments, the Chief of Police
and other dignitaries, among the num-
ber, and the cortege comprised nearly
100 coaches. As soon as the coffin was
brought out the immediate friends of
the deceased refused to allow it to be
put in the hearse, and bore it on their
shoulders as far as the Plaza Marte.
On arriving at the Recoleta the corte-
ge was received by three clergymen
who commenced the service for the
dead as the coffin was carried into the
chapel, a servant following with a
dozen wreaths of 'immortelle,' the
last sad gifts of the bereaved family
and friends.

After the 'De Profundis' a procession
was formed and bent its steps towards
the family vault, in front of which the
coffin was laid down, the conclusion
of the service read, and then in accor-
dance with the custom of the country
the chief mourners and others pro-
ceeded to take a last farewell of the
deceased in short and affecting
speeches.

Sor. Alvarez, his brother-in-law, re-
called with lively emotion the noble
qualities and patriotic ardor of the
young soldier, who was wounded in
the capture of Corrientes, May 25th
1865, and received his death-wound
exactly a year after at Estero Bellaco,
surviving only a few weeks, to breathe
his last in the arms of his afflicted
mother almost on the 20th anniversary
of his birth-day.

Don Santiago Estrada then pronoun-
ced the following graceful address:
"But yesterday a youth, and to-day
a martyr! The sword of the enemy
has quenched the flame of his exis-
tence and overspread the morning of
youth with the dark shadow of the
tomb. But yesterday he started for
the battle-field with the dewy flowers
of life's morning upon his forehead,
and to-day he returns to die a martyr's
death in his mother's arms. He saw
his brothers fighting in defence of
fatherland, and rushed forward to
join them, offering on the shrine of
Liberty the holocaust of his life and
the dreams of his boyhood. His mem-
ory will rise from his sepulchre where
his remains are enveloped in the ban-
ner of his country, the present genera-
tion will celebrate his virtues, and the
nation will shed a tear of gratitude
over his ashes. May the Most High grant
him the wreath of martyrdom due to

the Christian soldier dying in defence
of his country!"

Other discourses in a similar strain
were delivered by Lieut. Conde, a com-
rade-in-arms, by Dr. Montes-de-Oca,
his brother-in-law, by Sor. Cantilo
junr., Major Romero &c., after which
the cortege returned to town at half
past 12.

Julian Portela was nephew to the
Minister of War, Gen. Gelly-Obes, and
eldest son of the late esteemed Dr.
Portela. Soon after his father's demise,
Julian entered the War Office, and on
the breaking out of the Paraguayan
war was appointed Ensign in one of
Conesa's battalions. In the attack on
Corrientes, May 25th, 1865, he greatly
distinguished himself and first planted
the Argentine flag on the bridge of the
Bateria where the terrible bayonet-fight
took place. He was wounded in the
fray, and returned to Buenos Ayres,
but no sooner was convalescent than
he again hastened to the seat of war.
But one short month after the invasion
of Paraguay he again fell, wounded
by the deadly bullet of the enemy, on
May 25th, amid the fatal jungles of
Estero Bellaco. His wound was pro-
nounced slight, and his family hoped
that it might be a motive for his re-
maining at home for the rest of the
war; but the want of prompt medical
assistance aggravated the symptoms,
tetanus set in, and the poor youth,
after taking to his bed, on his arrival
home, never again rose from it. On
Friday night he breathed his last, in
his mother's arms, wanting but a few
days to complete his 20th year. He
was a fine young man, of fair talents
and bright prospects, and well read in
English literature. His funeral was
one of the largest we have seen for
some time, and in a few days the
Mass for the Dead and solemn obse-
quies will be performed, when we may
expect to see a still more imposing evi-
dence of the respect entertained for
the gallant young soldier and the
highly respectable family who deplore
his untimely loss.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The funeral of Lieutenant Portela
was the great event of Sunday; it was
one of the largest we ever recollect in
Buenos Ayres. We give full details
in another column.

The Portela arrived from Montevi-
deo at daylight: she only stopped in
port a few minutes, and at once weighed
anchor and proceeded up the river
bound for Itapiru. Scarcely had she
passed the roads when the Provedor,
from Corrientes, hove in sight. The
crowd on the mole to hear the news
was, as a matter of course, great, but
the disappointment still greater when
it was known that she brought no news
whatever.

About noon the Minister of War put
off in the 'falua' for an excursion trip
in the little steamer Argentina, which
we suppose is about to be sold to the
Government. She was built, we be-
lieve, by Messrs. Allan & Sherman.
At the Tigre the English boating
party was as usual on the water. It
was a charming day and our friends
enjoyed the athletic sport amazingly.

The meeting at the Teutonia Club
was one of the gayest ever held in this
city. The Hon. Mr. Talbot made a
very eloquent speech in proposing the
health of the society. Mr. Phillips
was the hero of the night, with his
bones and banjo. 'The feast of reason
and flow of soul' held sway until 5
o'clock on Sunday morning.

Notwithstanding the heavy rains we
are glad to hear from the south that
the Southern Railway has not in the
slightest suffered. The camp was again
flooded, but the new drains and cul-
verts carried off the water.

The Ibiyu, with the mails from Cor-
rientes to the 15th inst., is due to-day.
She brings two days' later news than
the Provedor.

A new steamer for the Pacific may
be hourly expected to bring news from
Europe: she left Liverpool on May
24th and was due in Montevideo on
Sunday.

Major Richard has sent us a photo-
graph of his mining-works at Hilario,
San Juan: they are very extensive,
and turning out lead and silver in
large quantities, for England.

We have received a letter from a
subscriber who has recently moved up

to Dr. Alvear's estancia near Rosario:
he says "I like this place so far very
well; the weather was beautiful, but I
have not seen the newspaper since last
month."

The drama of Emile de Girardin
"Supplice d'une femme" was excel-
lently performed on Sunday night at
the Victoria theatre: the Governor
and Minister Avellaneda were present.

The 'Mosquito' has a caricature of
gods and goddesses, a la Keller, in
which Gen. Mitre is Jupiter Tonans,
and Sor. Octaviano is Venus.

We receive great complaints about
the patched up state of Calle Florida,
the men that were employed repairing
the street have been discharged, and
in fact a broker assures us that the
street is only transitable as far as D.
Manuel Ocampo's house. Yesterday
morning there was a terrible row in
front of D. Juan M. Molina's house: a
cart stuck hard and fast, and but for
some half dozen of butchers with lassoes
the cart would probably be still there.
Our friend the broker is very indignant
but we can assure him that bad as Calle
Florida may be it is nothing to Calle
Belgrano, where yawning chasms, capa-
ble of smashing the strongest bullock
cart, are to be seen opposite our office.

There has been a sale of some first-
class mestiza sheep near Mercedes,
in the Banda Oriental, at 20 rs.—10,000
al corte, all the lambs going in gratis.
The camps in splendid condition, but
very heavy rains.

The Keller Company is proving a
great success. On Sunday night the
theatre was crowded to overflowing to
see Mrs. Keller as Venus visiting
Vulcan.

The Casado Bank of Rosario is now
merged in the River Plate Bank in
that city. The operation took effect
from yesterday: it will secure the
English Bank an immense business.

The Triton which leaves Montevideo
for Rio will take down ample stores to
the colonists at Chupat, supplied by
the Argentine Government. We can-
not too highly praise the very liberal
conduct of the National Government
as regards this colony.

The gentleman to whom we lent the
'Daily News,' with the report of a
railway meeting in London, will oblige
us by returning same to-day.

The Boca Railway now takes freight
for the Boca at reduced rates; and
owing to the fearful state of the roads,
the merchandise offering is much more
than what the manager anticipated.

The Esmeralda is the name of a new
steamer which has just been launched
in England for the Valparaiso Company.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

NEWS OF THE WEEK.
Montevideo, June 16, 1866.

The run on the Mauá Bank has con-
tinued the whole week. But very few
merchants or respectable people have
removed their money: the class of
people who are frightened are the Ital-
ians and Gallegos, who have very
small deposits. I noticed to-day more
money going into the bank than going
out. Two merchants deposited nearly
\$30,000 while I was there. The first
to create the panic was Mr. Letson,
who went down early on Monday morn-
ing and drew the English Hospital
fund, amounting to upwards of \$10,000.
This was done without consulting the
Committee at all, and was contrary to
the regulation made with the bank
when the money was deposited, when
it was agreed that they should give 48
hours notice before withdrawing the
money. As Mr. L. walked up the
street with a man carrying two bags of
gold, it naturally caused some excite-
ment, and frightened others to do like-
wise; however, the bank is all right,
and the confidence long entertained in
the stability of it is not the least shaken.

The beautiful steamer Oriental will
not be ready to commence her trips
until the latter part of next week. The
damp, wet weather has been rather
bad for drying the paint. She is decid-
edly the finest steamer ever in these
waters. There is some probability of
her adopting the American plan of
charges for passage and meals separate,
which will give very general satisfac-
tion. The Portela is still in port
loaded down very deep for Corrientes.
I hear that the Oriental will make
three trips up and down each week.

The excavation for the new Italian
Bank building is going on rapidly and

soon there will be a great change in
the corner where the livery stable was.

The parties who are trying to get a
steam launch to haul passengers in
Buenos Ayres, Messrs. Costa and Bal-
antigue, are likely to purchase one
in Rio de Janeiro, as they cannot get
the Bombayeito.

The appointment of Mr. J. D. Long,
as American Consul here, came out
from Washington some time since, but
he had to give bonds and sign certain
documents, before he could take office,
and these have to go back to Wash-
ington, so he will not be able to take
the office for some time. He has
spent some time in Montevideo as clerk
at Messrs. Zimmermann & Fairs. The
appointment took every one by sur-
prise.

The story about the captain of the
Carmel refusing to let passengers come
on board with their friends, on her last
trip down, is all humbug, as well as
the river-water-cocktails. I had ocu-
lar demonstration to the contrary, so
give the devil his due, if he is black.

There is great mystery here about
the sudden departure of Bustamante,
the editor of the 'Tribuna,' for Rio
Janeyro. All sorts of stories are cur-
rent about this. Some say the Emperor
sent for him. He left in the Carmel
and will return I believe in her also.
Tristany writes for the paper now.

In the Policia there has been great
business going on; patent hearing ma-
chines put up so that the Chief inside
in his private room can hear
every word the 'vigilantes' say when
conversing with the black women in
front. It is a decided improvement,
although I cannot say I see much the
use of it.

I hear that a young Oriental, who
has been for some time a middy on
board the Veloce, Italian gunboat,
has been promoted for good conduct,
his name is Crescencio Gallino.

The Durazno Railway, I greatly fear,
is done for. What with the war in
Paraguay, the bad news at home, the
failure of Peto and Betts, and the in-
formality of our Government, it being
what is termed a Provisional Govern-
ment, to bind the country, the conces-
sion already granted may be regarded
as a dead letter. The tramway, I
doubt not, is in the same boat. We
want tramways, and I believe they
would pay splendidly; but there is a
bitch somewhere, and Mr. McColl, with
all his influence seems to be unable to
get the matter through here, much less
in London.

We are all very sorry that Captain
Scuriano has left the American steam
line and gone for his own account on
the Correntino line. Galvan and
Madero are about to run the Julia;
they have chartered her for 3,500
patacons per month, from Captain
Manson. The Julia is a splendid
vessel, and I believe under Scuriano's
command will pay well.

There is great talk here about esta-
blishing what they call an Eseejela
Normal. The 'Siglo' has taken the
matter up, and I suppose when Gen.
Flores returns it will be carried out.

The deaths of Captain Mouton and
Lieutenant Peyralto have caused a pro-
found impression here. The first was
an adjutant of General Suarez, and the
second belonged to the celebrated
24th April Regiment, which got anni-
hilated on the 24th May. Dr. Muniz
attended them.

Most people in this city believe that
next steamer will bring us the news of
a war in Europe and a smash up in
Rio; but, as far as I can learn, the
state of the market here is very sound;
there is no forcing the dealers to buy,
as in Buenos Ayres, with your heavy
trade auctions; besides as the business
carried on here is on a far less exten-
sive style than in your city, the
stock of goods is less; and now,
as our dealers are doing a heavy
business with Corrientes and Entre
Rios, the result is, that this branch of
our trade is not only active but safe.

None of the allies have suffered so
much in proportion during the present
war as the Orientals. The plain fact
of the matter is, that with the excep-
tion of a few officers there is no longer
a Montevidean army in Paraguay. If
you have any doubt as regards this, I
refer you to General Flores' order,
which amalgamates the Battalions
Voluntarios and Independencia, hence-
forth to be called the Battalion Volun-

tarios Independiente. General Flores
is more required in Montevideo to day
than behind the allied ditches in the
Bellaco, and you join with the press
of this city in calling for his return.
Things are not in such a satisfactory
state here as you may imagine. The
Government is only provisional, and
cannot be regarded in any other light
until we have the Governor back and
the Legislature duly installed. Govern-
or Flores ought to at once return and
leave the conduct of the war to Presi-
dent Mitre and Marshal Osorio.

AMERICAN EMIGRATION.

We see an article of our correspond-
ent "Canelones" has been copied by
the Mobile Tribune, published in the
city of Mobile in the United States.

The Standard with its numerous
corps of talented correspondents does
more towards diffusing a correct know-
ledge of the Argentine Republic, its
advantages and resources, throughout
Europe and North America, than all
the other journals in the River Plate
put together.

We have just seen a letter from the
President of the National Bank of Mo-
bile to a friend here, of which we give
an extract hereunder stating that 15
wealthy cotton planters from the State
of Alabama intend coming out here to
engage in the culture of cotton at some
favourable point in the Republic to be
selected by a party now on his way to
this country.

The general amnesty granted by
President Johnson to the Southerners
who were in rebellion, except all those
who are worth more than twenty thou-
sand dollars; of course the forty or
fifty thousand men screw themselves
down so as to avail themselves of the
amnesty; but, all those who figure in
the hundred thousand dollar class and
above—and their name is legion in the
Southern States—have to emigrate or
stay in their own country with rights
of citizenship curtailed. This valuable
and intelligent class of emigrants is
precisely what we want to make us
gallop a little faster in the way of pro-
gress than we are now doing. The
following is the editorial notice of our
correspondent's article.

EMIGRATION TO SOUTH AMERICA CON-
SIDERED.

"We publish below an article written
for the Weekly Standard of Buenos
Ayres in South America. We do not
recommend to our young men any
project of emigration; but we know
many have already gone, and others
are going. If, therefore, they 'will' go
it is doing them no unkindness to fur-
nish them with information, to enable
them to judge whether they had better
go. It would appear from the last of
the article we allude to, written under
the "nom de plume" of 'Canelones,'
that the culture of cotton is likely to
attract attention in the Argentine Re-
public."

To the Editors of the 'Standard,'
Gentlemen,

I enclose you a notice of the republi-
cation of an article from your excellent
'Standard,' with a few explanatory
notes which are at your service if you
should see convenient to make use of
them. I also enclose you the heading
of my brother's letters as a guarantee
to you of the truth of what I say. Mr.
Matthews is coming out to report, and
if his report is favorable 15 of his intelli-
gent and rich neighbours will come
out with him when he returns to this
country. As the 'Standard' really is
the most useful paper in the River
Plate I see no reason why you should
not say so.

BRAZIL.

THE IMPERIAL SPEECH.

On the 3d of May the formal closing of the third, and opening of the fourth session of the present Assembly took place with the usual ceremonies.

The Emperor opened the session with the following speech— "August and most worthy Representatives of the nation.

To day more than ever your reunion is a subject of pleasant hopes for Brazil, as an aid of much reliance for the Government.

Full of pleasure I announce to you the birth of the prince D. Pedro, happy fruit of the marriage of my very dear daughter the princess Da. Leopoldina with my well beloved son-in-law the Duke de Saxe.

I congratulate myself and you on the public tranquillity which the Empire has enjoyed during the war.

The reputation due to the national honor injured by the President of Paraguay does not yet permit us to lay down our arms; I rejoice, however, to acknowledge that the endeavors of all have been unceasing in the discharge of so sacred a duty.

A treaty of alliance, offensive and defensive, was celebrated between the Empire and the Argentine and Oriental republics. This alliance has been maintained between the contracting parties with all loyalty.

The province of Rio Grande do Sul being invaded by Paraguayan forces I judged it my duty to go thither to animate with my presence and my example the defence of the Empire. My well beloved sons-in-law, moved by the like sentiments, accompanied me.

The surrender of Uruguayana, by utilizing the invading forces, rendered unnecessary the continuation of my presence in that province.

The Province of Matto Grosso, by a patriotic effort has preserved its capital and a great part of its territory free from the enemy's invasion.

Our army, our squadron, the national guard and the volunteers every day prove still more a gallantry and discipline meriting the national gratitude.

I deplore profoundly the precious lives sacrificed in this war, but my pride is unspeakable as I contemplate the heroism that accompanies the Brazilian name, and the glory which immortalizes the memory of so many brave men.

The Allied banners were already in the enemy's territory.

Trusting in the protection of Divine Providence, and confiding in the valor and discipline of our army and navy, and of those of our Allies, I hope to see in a short time the war terminated.

Our relations with the other nations of the world remain unaltered.

Diplomatic relations are reestablished between the Empire and Great Britain.

With sincere satisfaction I communicate this important fact to you, due in great part to the efforts and perseverance of the August mediator the King of Portugal my well beloved nephew.

Penetrated with inmost sorrow I commemorate the death of the King of the Belgians; it is a tribute of acknowledgment I owe to the memory of that constitutional and friendly King.

The state of our finances is embarrassing, I call your attention principally to this object. I recommend to you therefore, with the greatest earnestness, the amelioration of the circulating medium, the strengthening of our credit, and the equilibrium of expenditure and receipts.

August and most worthy Representatives of the nation.

I thank you for the means conceded in the session ended, to the Government, towards supplying the public needs; and counting on your intelligence and patriotism, I look to you in the present one to enable the Government to satisfy the obligations of the ordinary and extraordinary service, taking into consideration at the same time the matter referring to the administration of justice and to the development of the public wealth.

The third session is closed, and the

fourth opened of the twelfth legislature."

[NOTE.—The above translation is so horrid and faulty that we feel obliged to declare our innocence of having mangled Dom Pedro in this manner.—ED. STANDARD.]

THE TEUTONIC ANNIVERSARY FESTIVAL.

Si señor, I took the hint in Saturday's 'Standard' of your inability to attend the above feast, owing to the Baracas road having imbibed its share of the last wetting. Well, Sir, there were present a goodly company of patriotic Teutons, with a fair sprinkling of us Britishers, or what you may call the Aborigine-Saxon-Dane-Norman race of the British Isles. You pride yourself on having a turn for pedigrees, and prove your cases by similarity of name. I am more philosophic; proving relationship by similarity of tastes. On that principle we had an ocular demonstration last Saturday evening that we are first cousins to these jolly Teutons. Certainly history says the same thing, but what of that, history is patched, perverse, whimsical, one-sided, while philosophic principles are as fixed as the polar star and as unalterable as the roads of Buenos Ayres. You would have had a negative demonstration of this too if some of the Latin races had been thrust in amongst us; for they could no more have understood or enjoyed the festival than if they were among a horde of 'changadores' on the mole, or caged within Leibig's laboratory. But 'we' did. Must I prove that now? 'Bueno.'

One thing indispensable to keep us in humor, as you are aware, is a good sandwich (when it is not dinner time) and a smacking glass of wine. Then we are in trim for a lively conversation with no restraint of smoking. Now, that is just what had at this festival: the tasty sandwiches invited tasty sayings, and the sparkling wine provoked sparkling wit. We also like to see evidence of something doing; this we had in the shape of a beautiful flag presented to the club by, 'on dit,' some lovely ladies, who are lebarred by the rules from having but such a representative. It was brought forth by a speech [the pole borne by a man], which speech was to us—well, as the saying is—was Dutch, but nevertheless less fired us also like cousin Teuton. Another requisite to keep our lungs in a healthy state is a good laugh, and while a member was giving a German Jew's account of his sociabilities, you would have thought the roars were really English. We did laugh too, though unable to appreciate the points any further than action went. But need I tell you that music was the great delight of the evening. Where the Teutons are, so also is music; and, I will add, where the English are before, and when they are happy there must be a song. Some people may think it amusement to listen to a £5 piano at every other window: may be, because it used to be fashionable. A combination of instruments well played is undoubtedly a treat, and a fine solo sensibly rendered is real enjoyment.

The orchestra (all string) played two pieces, the first exceedingly graceful and intelligible, the music telling its tale as if it was plain prose. That is a manly characteristic of the German music—it being intelligible—none of those warbling, frivolous, meaningless harpings of the Italians. In fact, some of the German music is far clearer to common sense than German philosophy. We had also solos on the violin, and a quartet with some Alpine calls by the cornopean at a distance. But a novelty was introduced in the instrument line by one of us, viz., whistling; very sweetly indeed; and accompanying the air on the piano himself. But after all it is the vocal music that stirs up one's nervous system altogether. Some part songs were given by the choir of the club; the taste and cadences were always well rendered, but time neglected, especially at the commencement. Do it? yes; that choir can sing with the precision of clockwork when they take care; but this was a free meeting of friends. One little piece was charmingly sung, in which the voices were nicely balanced. We had also some

comic songs of course; first of all came that well-known character of "The Englishman on the Continent," by a young member of the club, and we heartily laughed at it ourselves, enjoying the vanities and superficial ideas of the roaming fop. And then came Bones Phillips, just with bones alone, then with such a laughing song that many a button went rolling on the floor, and then again accompanied by the whistling genius. It pleased the Teutons as much as it pleased us, and it pleased us to the extremity of pleasure. The 3rd of July, I see, he will make the walls of the Coliseum ring with laughter.

One of us toasted the "Fatherland," which brought out their patriotic enthusiasm to a pitch. I should have toasted the "Teuton abroad" as a noble fellow, but that I wanted it for the next merry meeting.

He served in America and the Mediterranean; was returned M.P. for Athlone in 1835, and represented Shaftesbury from 1837 till 1841. Was appointed Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Bahama Islands March 26, 1844; Consul at Charleston in the U. S. of America, March 8, 1850; was Consul at Philadelphia from July 5, 1853, till May 28, 1856, when his Exequatur was revoked by the President of the United States; was appointed Consul-General for the Russian ports in the Black Sea, Oct. 31, 1856, and Consul-General for the Russian ports in the Black Sea and Sea of Azoff, to reside at Odessa, Sept. 14, 1857, and Secretary to the Legation in Mexico, July 24, 1858; was Chargé d'Affairs from Sept. 20, 1859, till May 25, 1861, when he was appointed Chargé d'Affairs and Consul-General to the Republics of Guatemala, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Honduras, and Salvador; was promoted to be Minister Plenipotentiary to the Republics in Central America, Aug. 21, 1861; was appointed a C.B. Aug. 7, 1863.

ON 'CHANGE.

June 18, 1866. Paper price of ounces, \$115 Do. sovereigns, 127 First price of patacons, 25 50 Last, 26 95 Cash sales, 66,438. Specie was firm to-day and closed in the liquidation room at 2s, buyers. There was great anxiety to know what foundation there was for the rumor of peace, and only a few of the brokers

seemed to think that there was the slightest possibility of terms being come to, but fresh advices from Brazil have been received, and are of such a gloomy nature respecting the financial crisis in Rio, that those connected with that market believe that peace is by no means impossible. War news there was none on 'Change, and all await the regular mails per Bieuy to-morrow. The 1st vessel brought no mails from headquarters.

The great topic on 'Change to-day was the branch of the River Plate Bank in Rosario. It seems that when Mr. Green was in Rosario arranging for the opening of the bank in that city, he made a definite arrangement with Dn. Carlos Casado, the great banker and banking broker of that town, whereby the paper money emitted by the Casado Bank; and, in fact, the entire business of that very influential house now passes to the River Plate Bank of Rosario, of which we suppose Sr. Casado is now consulting director. We congratulate Mr. Green on this admirable arrangement, as it will, no doubt, prove of the very highest utility to the River Plate Bank and secure for it an immense business.

National Bonds recovered slightly to-day, and 1,400 were sold at 39½. Respecting the very sudden fall last week in these securities there was much said: to-day they looked much firmer, but still the market is far from being firm.

The time sales of specie were as follows:— For Tuesday 3,000 26 — Saturday 58,350 26 13 — June 30 87,000 26 13 — Dec. 31 20,000 26 25 — July 31 18,000 26 05 Business ruled rather slack to-day. In produce business in the plazas nothing done. From the camp there is very little arriving, save sheepskins and dry hides, the latter is very weak, and prices falling. At the saladeros nothing doing; sheepskins rule firm.

Two new wool-washing establishments are about to be started in Barracas. The washing of sheepskins is represented as a lucrative business.

The steamer Ada left for Montevideo on Saturday evening; it was said on 'Change that she took some specie, but we understand she only took copper and silver-lead.

The new Chilean steamer with advices from England to the 22nd May is now looked for, as also the new steamer La Plata, from Liverpool.

The Provincial Bank is discounting in gold pretty freely, and in paper only for small amounts. In Exchange on England there was a good deal done to-day, at 49½, bank bills 49.
