THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

ARRIVAL OF THE GENERAL FLORES.

DREADFUL FIGHTING AT ESTERO BELLACO.

DETAILS OF THE THREE DAYS' FIGHTING.

The steamer General Flores arrived yesterday with dates from the field of battle, Tuyuty, to the 19th. We regret to find that the 'Nacion' was more correct than the 'Tribuna' in appreciating the late awful struggle, which was at first believed a signal victory. The latter even now admits that the dreadful loss of the allies was far too much, and in exchange for an earth-work the enemy's, and after three days' the belligerents found themselves in the same position. The diary of the 'Tribuna' bulletin is as follows:—The whole allied army was decimated by awful fighting all day from the 17th to the 19th, and was defeated by the Brazilians. We feared that the allies would be cut to pieces, and as it was, the Brazilians suffered heavily. The fighting continued all day.

point at any cost and poured down overwhelming forces: the battle lasted all day, the firing had continued from dawn till ten o'clock at night, but the Brazilians held the position they had taken at sunrise. It was the most awful day of battle ever seen in South America. The enemy's right is impregnable owing to the thickness of the woods and the magnificent position they hold: we deceive ourselves with hopes that Lopez's army is dwindling away, while they are raising strong masked batteries and decimating our troops every day: the fleet does nothing. Perhaps General Polidoro Jordan will induce Admiral Tamandaré to move, although he seems greatly afraid of the torpedoes. We blew up 4 of the enemy's ammunition waggons to-day with a shell. The 2nd Argentine division held a battery all day, the rest retired. It is impossible to know the losses of this sadly glorious day.

July 17th. The firing of cannon, rockets and musquetry continued all night: we had no time for sleeping. At 11 a.m. the 3rd Argentine corps went to relieve the 2nd: firing continued all day. The Brazilians lost yesterday over 1,500 men. Gen. Flores, in a morning ride, saw numbers of dead Paraguayans, supposed to be killed by the fire of our artillery. Where their powder cart blew up, the ground was strewn with heads, legs, etc. Our troops held the new position all day, and even fired some shots from it.

July 18. Firing going on last night upon our left flank, and another great fight to-day. The 3rd Argentine corps, with Colonel Palleja's men, and some Brazilians, opened fire on the battery which the Brazilians had attempted to take on the 16th. They then charged through the woods, drove the enemy out, and carried away by zeal, actually rushed on the Paraguayan lines. Col. Palleja was shot down, the Mendoza battalion cut to pieces, and the rest put to the rout. The entrance to the enemy's fortified camp is only 12 yards wide, commanded by splendid batteries flanked with woods, which nothing but a number of skilful manoeuvres and consummate valor on our part can attempt. At this critical moment our 4th division, with 2 batts. National Guards, were ordered to carry a post which the Paraguayans may well call 'irresistible.'

Our men marched up in serried column, shouting Vivas, while some were cut down by stray shot and shell from the enemy's cross-fire. Our men entered the narrow lane leading to the position; they tried to assail the battery in front but had to recoil; they then threw out flanks right and left planting their flags near the enemy's bastions, but all in vain. Lopez had adopted the Wellington tactic; he allowed the allies to get in, then at a signal 6,000 bayonets rose from earth and the intruders were partly slain, and the rest repulsed. The firing along the lines paused at 1 p.m., and the allies went to pick up their wounded. The 2nd Argentine division suffered greatly from the enemy's rockets. The Almighty covered this dreadful day of carnage with a dense fog at nightfall, and a cold rain began.

July 19. Night without firing. Raining all day. God help the wounded. It is thought that the Brazilians suffered heavily. The fighting continued all day.

ment. In the office of the corner of Calle Moreno and Peru, the 'Nacion' Argentina first saw light, and he watched over the destiny of the state paper from its tender infancy. At this time he was partner with Sr. Bouco, who retired from the business two years ago. He had been intimately connected with the press of Buenos Ayres, and has laid the country under a debt to him, having been the first to establish a type-foundry in this city. We have had many business transactions with the printer in question, and when he printed the 'Nacion Argentina,' we sold him several hundred reams of paper. His connection with the 'America' is purely as printer, never having, we believe, written a line for the journal in question. His printing-office is one of the finest in this city; it is next door to Dr. Roque Perez. His imprisonment will seriously affect his business, and we regret sincerely to hear that the Government thinks of sending him to Patagonia. Mr. Bernheim is a married man, about 46 years of age, and of some standing in the Masonic fraternity: he is thick-set, and wears spectacles, being short-sighted, but of much penetration in business matters. The French paper, whose editor is unfortunately in the same predicament as the subject of this memoir, belongs to Mr. Bernheim, and his book shop comprises all the newest French works. We trust the Government will at once liberate him.

Sr. Guido Spano, son of the veteran Argentine diplomatist, Brig-General Tomas Guido, of the epoch of Independence, is a native of Buenos Ayres, aged 40 years, married and has three children: he lived in the celebrated Quinta de Guido, in Calle Potosi. We first find him, some 20 years ago, travelling as Secretary of Argentine Legation to Rio and the United States; and subsequently, in Europe: he next figured as under-secretary of the Minister of Foreign Affairs at Paraná. When the Government moved to Buenos Ayres he came to this city and lived in retirement until the Peruvian question became the topic of the day, when he came forward and made some splendid speeches at the Baturo and Colon. During the Paysandu affair he was again before the public as a writer, and actually left this city to throw himself into Paysandu to help Leandro Gomez. He arrived too late, then went to M. Vides, where he remained until the Government fell. Chile next attracted this talented young man; he took up the cause of Chile against the whole world. His name is identified with all the great questions of the day. He is the author of a pamphlet entitled, "La Alianza y El Imperio." We hear that he never wrote a line for the 'America.' Even while he is in prison we willingly stand forward to testify to the splendid talents of Sr. Guido. His arrest has caused a domestic affliction, which has thrown a gloom over his home. Sr. Guido is a man of very impressive appearance; his hair falls over his shoulders; he is prematurely grey. He speaks English and French fluently, and was brother-in-law of the late Sr. Bilbao.

Don Juan José Soto is a native of Montevideo and relative of the renowned Argentine ex-journalist D. Nicolas Soto. His name was connected with the 'Forma Pacifica' before its extinction in Buenos Ayres, and he was a member of the

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday we were favored with a map of lands on the banks of the Carcaraña, in the province of Santa Fé, situate about 10 leagues from Rosario. We had no idea until we looked over this map that the lands about there were so thickly settled by foreigners. The first estancia next to the railway we notice is Mr. Armstrong's: it is on the road from Rosario to Cordova, and is known there as the estancia de Aldao; it contains 16 leagues of land but has only about 5,000 head of horned cattle on it. Nor-west of this estancia is that of Don Carlos Vernet, which is four square leagues, has no stock on it and will be rented at a cheap rent. Alongside of Vernet's is Mr. Wilcken's estancia, also four square leagues, which we believe is offered for sale. North of Wilcken's is Major Munroe's estancia, which is a very fine place; has 5,000 sheep and 200 goats, angora. Messrs. Kemmis and Cookson's estancia is next, and beyond this is the estancia of Mr. Congrave. Probably the finest and best stocked estancia in this neighbourhood is that of Messrs. Scharf, Nordenholz and Deedjen, four square leagues, with eighteen thousand fine sheep. Right at the very end of this magnificent estancia is Mr. Marshall's, which enjoys a melancholy renown, owing to the murder of Mr. M's brother; here is Lafone's immense estate, 16 square leagues, without any stock. Chavarri's estancia adjoins Lafone's; it has 8,000 sheep on it. Another nearer to the railway is Von Post's estancia, a very fine property with some 12,000 sheep on it. We are well pleased to see Santa Fé going ahead so fast, and hope that some of our subscribers up at the Carcaraña will write to us frequently about the prospects of the place.

The Liverpool steamer Cordova was to have left for Buenos Ayres on the 13th of July.

The astronomical steamer Memnon was to have sailed from Liverpool for Rio and the River Plate on the 30th of June, and the Newton of the same line on the 19th of July.

Latest advices from Salto, in the Uruguay, the new Municipality is busy mending the streets; the Dramatic Company has left for Montevideo, and the townspeople hope that shortly another English concert will be given. The sheep-farmers are all doing well; cattle and sheep fat but peones scarce.

In Paysandu, our correspondent writes us that all has been fuss and feathers. A grand picnic at the 'Saca'; 'carne con cuero.' Rodriguez, the school-master, took out his pupils, and in fact all Paysandu has been amusing itself. The remains of General Fausto Aguilar are about to be exhumed and forwarded to Montevideo. We suppose our colleague 'El Comercio' will give us full details of the whole ceremony.

We learn on good authority that the survey of the railway to connect Rio Grande with the coal mines has at length been completed. The fortifications of Rio Grande are progressing rapidly, and eight guns have already been mounted. In the Province of Ceara the inundations have been terrific and many of the plantations destroyed.

The Cisne with the regular Corrientes mails is due to-day; she will bring advices from the seat of war up to Friday the 27th inst. We expect full details from 'Sinbad' whose long silence has caused much notice.

Directors were all opposed to this—still the majority were of opinion that a serious crisis is imminent and the mode to avoid this was discussed. An emission of three millions fuertes was proposed, guaranteed by the capital of the bank. An issue of paper money was also discussed and at last it was decided that there should be no emission of any kind; that the bank should prepare itself for the busy season, and should hold a reserve of 40 millions in its vaults to pay for the wool. In consequence of the crisis in Europe the idea of redeeming the paper money is now abandoned. There was also some talk of opening an account current limited with the National Government, but we have not heard the result.

The benefit which the Keller family gave in the French theatre for the wounded soldiers, we hear, realized no less than \$30,000 mpc. This is really a handsome amount.

Our colleague, the 'Nacion,' says that the *ultima hora* which caused such extraordinary attention, contradicting the battle and victory of the 17th, was a mere joke, and only intended as such on the 'Tribuna.'

We regret to chronicle a very melancholy accident which befel a countryman down at the Barraca de Peña station the other day. It appears that our friend got out to cross over to Miss McLean's school, and when on the road was attacked by some ferocious dogs belonging to a neighboring barraca. They bit the unfortunate man in several parts and actually pulled him down on the ground. He lies in a most precarious state in the British Hospital.

Latest advices from Brazil confirm the report of more men having been called out; in Rio Grande alone one thousand National Guards have been called to arms, and all the officers on furlough have been ordered to Corrientes.

We hear that there is some unpleasant question going on respecting the Justice of the Peace of Obivilcoy. The matter is in the hands of the Government and will ere long no doubt be made public.

The Western Railway to Obivilcoy will be opened to traffic on the 11th September next by Governor Alsina. This will indeed be a great and glorious affair for Buenos Ayres, and one which the country may justly feel proud of.

The Western Railway to Barracas will soon be finished to the station on the Riachuelo. This station is solely for the convenience of the manager of the railway, as here will be landed all the materials for the road and forwarded in waggons to the Plaza 11 de Septiembre: thus will be economized all the cartage, etc., from the Parque to the river. We believe the Riachuelo station will prove a great gain to the Government.

We hear from a farmer who arrived in town on Saturday from Chacabuco that the lands as far as San Vicente are flooded and in parts the camps resemble a large sea. This is admitted as the wettest winter since 1857.

In the town of San Salvador, in the Banda Oriental an English school will shortly be opened under the auspices of Mr. Rea, formerly of Montevideo.

The chance to make a fortune so long offered in our columns is now gone; Meeks & Kelsey, the world-renowned photographic men, have at last sold out and the gallery on the top of the 'Standard' office now passes into the

Bank has now the great... fashion, and the consumption of English coal is immensely on the increase. This present storm not having been predicted by the Consul has taken many of us unawares, and postponed a party which has been greatly talked of for some time.

There has been some extraordinary news current here for the last few days respecting things at the Estero Bellaco, and the non-arrival of the steamer from Corrientes, serves to give color of truth to the stories: I will not repeat what I have heard, because I am slow to believe it. This place is so full of persons opposed to the allies, that I have remarked there are always more lying rumors current here than Buenos Ayres.

There is the greatest anxiety to hear from 'Sinbad,' who is regarded by all your subscribers as the best and most reliable correspondent of the war. Of one thing you may rest assured, the campaign is going to take a totally different aspect. General Polidoro assumes command, and has received his instructions. The Brazilian Government is preparing to send twenty-five thousand men more to the war, and an equal number of blacks, who, when the war is over, will receive their liberty and a small farm in Paraguay.

The most important business talked of is the opening of General Netto's will, which will take place in a few days at the Brazilian Consulate. He died, I am told, immensely wealthy, and has large lauded property in this Republic, besides being a holder of some of the foreign debt. When the will is read I hope to get full particulars as to the value of his estate, but, from what I can learn, it is very large.

The Schleswic-Holstein question, difficult as it was for Englishmen to understand, when they did not wish to know anything about it, was a mere trifle when compared with the present Germanic war. The city is divided: some are for the Bund, others side with Bismark, others for the Gastein Convention, and a few for giving Schleswic to England. Where all this will end it is difficult to say. Germans who were intimate friends now hardly salute; the Bundists say that Prussia ought to be ashamed of herself, whilst the Bismarkians glory in the prospect of doubling up half the small German States; but though Prussia and Italy are allies at home, I can assure you the Prussians and Italians of Montevideo entertain no great respect for each other. Blood is thicker than water, and the Germans, although they may squabble amongst themselves, regard Victor Emanuel as more an intruder than anything else in the present question. The Germans are all of accord that, unless France helps Italy, Austria will make short work of her, and then come to terms with Prussia. You had better not meddle much with the question, for fear of getting Sprunck into a rather tight place, who, by the bye, is now the great pianoforte importer of this city.

The apothecaries are at present very busy, as the Brazilians have called for bills to supply the hospital, and as quinine and magnesia have run up in the market. There is great speculation as to who will get the contract. My private opinion is that Cranwell and Co. will get the business.
