We have news from Rioja to August 30: The Government has declared Bolivian silver money a legal tender, but the people are so poor that any kind of money would be acceptable.

In Mendoza, political party-spirit runs high; new clubs are formed, and if we hear of disturbances there will be no cause for surprise.

The pirates in the Paraná are gaining strength; the authorities of Paraná sent a 'falua' to look after them, but it appears they have now six boats, manned by 30 ruffians, infesting the coasts near La Paz, and the 'falua' did not venture to interfere with them.

OUR LONDON CORRESPONDENT. London, Aug. 9, 1866. The Prussian campaign has come to an end, and notwithstanding the unparalleled military successes of the Prussians, they, not less than their enemies, may well be desirous of a peace.

On the 11th day of the riots, Oct. 29, two Spanish vessels of war that had come to his assistance were sent away by him, and he wrote to Mr. Cardwell that long before their arrival he had got the rebellion under.

But while the exhausted combatants are thus peacefully settling their disputes, France and Italy look sullenly on the scene. The big words, the hungry glances thrown on the Rhine Provinces, the patronage of the 'first military power,' have sunk into astonished smiles since the flash of the needle-gun threw an altogether new light over Europe.

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Pitiable is it to see the vanities and ignoble spite of 'a little brief authority.' Austria, unable to retain Venetia, 'gives' her to the French Emperor, who, in his turn, 'soothes' Italy, and promises to transfer the 'gift' to her (if she is good). But Italy recognises that a nation is not a toy to be passed from the hand of one king to another, and declares that Venetia alone has power to decide, and that by her own will she must be either a republic or annexed to the Kingdom of Italy.

The completion of the Atlantic Telegraph has created far less general interest than the needle-gun. Except those immediately concerned in it, few exult in the triumph of one of the most glorious works of modern science.

In England, the Reform question is still the chief topic. The late disturbances in Hyde Park have brought out in strong relief the English reverence for law. An enormous Reform meeting was announced to be held in Hyde Park. The Government prohibited the meeting on the ground that Hyde Park was an improper place for a 'crowd.'

State of camps.—Good; thistles very low; plenty of grass and water. Peons' wages, and if wanted.—Five hundred strong, active men wanted for shearing, wages \$25 per day; parties wanting employment apply to your agent.

State of stock.—Low; last sale of capons \$44; no sales of sheep; cows at from \$60 to \$70 by the cut; horses scarce and dear.

BUENOS AYRES BRITISH CLERKS' PROVIDENT ASSOCIATION. The general annual meeting of this society was held on Monday evening, the 10th inst., at the British Library. Mr. Thompson, the president, took the chair, and stated that the object of the meeting was to receive the annual report and elect a new committee, and after deploring the want of interest shown by the members in their meagre attendance, he gave a slight sketch of the past working of the society, and then requested the secretary to read the

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some hundreds of good stout Irishmen to help at the shearing, they will get immediate employment, and at liberal wages. The great want in the Banda Oriental to-day is good peons; good workmen and foreigners for shearing are now preferred.

SALES OF SHEEP, CATTLE, &c.—No sales except capons. Sheep in good condition. A native estanciero offers to sell his sheep, 4,000 good mestizas, at \$22 cash; but no buyers. No rams sold about here, except at Mr. Spring's, who has constant demand: he sold 165 rams for Silkeo's estancia, at various prices.

SEALING.—Very good in general. Mr. O'Shea has sealed 700, and has yet 300 more to mark. A Frenchman hard by has done even better. On the native estancieros' great loss in lambs. On Mr. O'Shea's fine estancia the sheep have done well, but the cattle are dying, and 11 'peons' are daily skinning. Molina's camp the same. Dr. Domingo Martínez has had a splendid sealing. His brother is about to sell out to an Irishman: the price offered for the land is \$200,000, which is cheap, as there are fine houses and 'puentes' on it, and his 'corrales' are good. Mr. Michael Brennan and several others have had to move their sheep from the Canada Honda, but now have brought them back.

BIRTHS, MARRIAGES AND DEATHS IN NEIGHBORHOOD (foreigners only)—None. News in town.—Business dull; money scarce; biscuits, \$50; flour, \$35; shears very few sold; twine none, all bought by farmers in town. The judge, a first-rate man, and beloved and respected by foreigners, the English College progressing, and the parents well satisfied with Mr. McNamara. The foundation of the new church commenced; \$40,000 to be the price. State of camps, &c., splendid, and stock in fine condition. At the Canada Honda, which was so bad, is now the very best camp; plenty of grass and water; thistles in some places very high, but not generally through the camp, all preparing for shearing; freights from \$6 to \$7. Price for shearing to be rented or sold; they ask \$7,000 per pnesto.

News in the town.—Your agent is made Municipal, and all the streets in town to be repaired; business dull; biscuits \$45, flour do., twice cheaper than in town; shears at town prices; carts plenty; no contracts for freight yet; \$57 @ about the price; every one preparing for shearing; many commence on the first; price \$60, same as last year. State of camps, etc.—Good; thistles very low; plenty of grass and water. Peons' wages, and if wanted.—Five hundred strong, active men wanted for shearing, wages \$25 per day; parties wanting employment apply to your agent.

Price of stock.—Low; last sale of capons \$44; no sales of sheep; cows at from \$60 to \$70 by the cut; horses scarce and dear.

MIQUELETE, NEAR COLONIA. September 11th, 1866. Sales of sheep, cattle, etc., in neighborhood.—Mr. Peter Farrell, has sold a flock good mestiza sheep at \$18 cash; several flocks for sale at same price and less, but no buyers; cows for butchers \$15 min., and by the cut from \$6 to \$8 min.; Rivero bought \$90 at \$6 min. Sealing done.—Good increase; sheep fat; flocks 45 to 50 \$ increase; very little stub; sheep heavy with wool; at Mr. Drabble's estancia the shearing is splendid; on Mohr's estancia and Mr. Prange's the same, in fact all about here have done remarkably well; at Mr. Fox's estancia 45 per cent. increase in the flocks. Land, rented or sold.—None. No pnestos rented and very scarce; several parties looking for land; numbers anxious to sell half flocks of sheep and go into partnership, in fact, fifty millionaires with capital wanted; Mr. Fox is looking for three, after shearing.

BIRTHS, MARRIAGES AND DEATHS IN NEIGHBORHOOD.—None to my knowledge. News in the town.—Colonia in a ferment about the telegraph; the Government taking up all the poor vagrant children and giving them to parties who can support and care them; Mr. Murtagh, your agent, is gone to Buenos Ayres; dry goods and groceries very dear and very little business done; a shocking murder committed on Gary's camp about a month ago, the assassin hiding in the woods; Messrs. Prange gone to Montevideo; great excitement about the affair of the foreigner, determined to stand by him; a great business going on in stray cattle by the local authorities, but more of this anon; shearing will commence at Messrs. Drabble's and Fox's about the middle of October, the price will be a cartillo per sheep. State of camps.—The camps are in a magnificent state; Neves Quintana lost 300 sheep in the last storm in the Miguelete; thistles promise to be high this year, the grass splendid. Peons' wages, and if wanted.—The great want of peons is a chronic evil, and the 'Standard' would confer a great boon upon us all by sending up
