**THE WAR IN THE NORTH.**

**ARRIVAL OF THE IBICUY.**

**NO MORE FIGHTING.**

We have files from Corrientes to Friday, 28th ult.

Eleven steamers laden with wounded arrived from Curuzú, and the remains of Col. Charlone were put aboard the Iron King for Buenos Ayres. Gen. Flores, with his 400 men, touched at Corrientes: he says there is much pasture beyond Estero Bella, and that he attacked the enemy at San Solano with 3,000 cavalry. Lieut. Paz, son of the Vice-president, died on Wednesday. Gen. Rivas is improving. The ladies of Corrientes are very attentive to the sufferers.

Two aides-de-camp of Flores have fallen into the enemy's hands. The 23rd was a quiet day at Curuzú: the fleet had forced the palisade and fired some shots at Curupaity.

Gen. Flores on leaving for M. Video sent the following note to the Gov. of Corrientes:

Tuyuty, Sept. 24th.  
Dear friend,  
"The affairs of my own country tear me away from the war at the very moment when I could most desire to accompany my valiant allies. But before going, I beg you will convey my thanks to the hospitable people of Corrientes, and if you have any commands for M. Video please let me know."

He wrote a similar note to General Caeceres, besides a proclamation to the allied armies, praising their valor, and regretting that he had to abandon them. A cannonade was heard on Thursday.

Letters in Paraná report the Argentine loss at 2000 and the Brazilians at 3000.

**MAILS FROM CHILE.**

**FORCED CONTRIBUTION OF SEVEN MILLIONS.**

**IMPORTANT FROM CENTRAL AMERICA.**

The Chilian papers, up to Sept. 1, contain little of importance except the new loan of seven and a quarter million dollars. It is not long since the Government negotiated a loan, for four millions, with the banks, but the one now voted is the most monstrous ever imagined. From all the inhabitants 80,000 are to be singled out and set down in six categories: 1st. Capitalists must contribute \$1000; 2nd. Flourishing traders \$500; 3rd. People not so rich \$300; 4th. Small merchants \$100; 5th. Struggling shopkeepers \$50; and 6th. Poor folks \$25. Fancy levying \$200 off a rich man by way of contribution! A committee in each district is to classify the various inhabitants. The classification is on the following basis:—1000 men 1st class; 3000 of the 2nd; 6000 of the 3rd; 10,000 of the 4th; 20,000 of the 5th; and 40,000 of the 6th class. It is thought this tax will cause great disturbance among the people; but, in spite of its monstrous character, it was voted unanimously by the Chamber of Deputies. This system of forced loans is of Mexican invention.

tutions and has still a larger number yet to sell. The newspapers speak very harshly of the Argentine Government for having suspended the American. The commander of the U. S. steamer Tuscarora denies having received orders to seize some of the war-steamer brought from the U. States by Sor. MacKeima. Some murders have occurred at Valparaiso.

From Bolivia we have dates to Aug. 10th. President Melgarejo seems at last firmly established and has received the submission of various departments. He has removed the Government from Laja to La Paz and ordered the necessary outlay for the new road which the Prefect of Santa Cruz is making to Curumbá on the River Paraguay. A despatch has been received from Monsignor Sanguigni announcing his arrival at Rio Janeiro with letters as Nuncio to the Republics of Montevideo, Buenos Ayres and Bolivia. The national anniversary of Perú was celebrated at La Paz with great rejoicing.

The convention was elected in Peru for choice of a President, but Prado is sure to be re-elected. A new loan has been voted, for 6 million dollars, and a new Orphan asylum is projected. The Government received a note from the cabinet of Ecuador relative to the attempt to assassinate its envoy, Garcia Moreno, at Lima.

From Panamá we learn that the Australian steamer for the last month had not arrived. The N. Granada Government despatched some troops to the frontier of Venezuela. The popular feeling is with the Government, in favor of a strict neutrality in the Spanish question.

Venezuela is torn by civil war. Pres. Falcon set out against the rebels: three provinces rose in favor of the latter. A line of steam-packets has been established between New York and Caracas, the Venezuelan Government granting a subsidy. Some American colonies are projected. The revolution in Hayti continues.

Costa Rica declares neutrality in the Spanish question, in common with all the rest of Central America. The Government has arranged its debt with Peru, amounting to \$100,000, payable at \$10,000 per annum. A grease tree has been discovered, from which Sr. Alvarado manufactures excellent candles: he has taken out a patent.

In Nicaragua the elections cause agitation. Some mines reported of fabulous wealth attracted crowds of foreigners.

San Salvador is quiet. A new French coffee-house has been established. From Honduras we hear of new silver mines. In Guatemala there were fears of an American filibuster expedition, but Gen. Fitzhery Warren, the new American envoy gave every assurance of friendship.

**THE SWELL-MOB OF B. AYRES.**

Civilization is making rapid strides in B. Ayres, and we have now among us an element formerly unknown, in the shape of a complete gang of 'chevaliers d'industrie' of European growth and education. Their operations have been hitherto daring, successful, and attended with impunity. Several watchmakers' shops have been cleaned out lately, and robberies are now of daily occurrence. That practised on Sr. Zumaran is worth relating: Two 'gentlemen' and a 'lady' drive up in a coach, the 'gentlemen' alight, enter Sr. Zumaran's house, and carry off \$25,000 m/c; but they were disappointed in not finding a sum of a thousand doubloons paid to Sr. Zumaran the day previous.

Some months ago an association of thieves was discovered in Montevideo, numbering 140 persons, men and women. Most of them seem to have come up to B. Ayres for change of air, as the police here give them very little trouble. It must not be supposed they carry on their labors secretly. On the contrary they are well-known in most of our public thoroughfares, and the shop-keepers have a close eye when the 'chevaliers' pass their door. NOTES FROM PORONGOS, B. O. It is more than ten years since we have had a winter so stormy as the one just past. From the middle of July to the middle of August was one succession of 'tempestades,' which deluged our camps; and from all sides came tales of losses and disasters, many entire flocks of sheep being drowned, and even 'mandadas,' points of cattle, and gray oxen. Those who have strong 'royos,' with 'montes,' on their camps have been the chief sufferers, as the animals sought shelter in the 'rincones' and were drowned by the overflow. Some strange sights have been seen in these 'montes' after the storms, such as sheep, cattle, and horses hanging dead in the forks of tall trees. One man looking for a stray bullock, found him at last hanging from a tree, with his hind feet more than a yard from the ground; and the tree had to be cut down before the hide could be got off. Farmers in the more open country have suffered more from exposure, and consequent losses in lambs, and, of course, all weakly sheep succumbed to the weather. But in spite of all the water that has fallen, a month of comparatively dry weather induces the wish for more rain again; vegetation is rather backward, and pasture is not near so luxuriant as we like to see at this season. The storms have told so heavily on the lambing, that few will this year get more than an average increase, say 30 per cent; but on the other hand, the prospects of the clip were never better,—there is hardly any scab, and the wool very well grown and clean, and there is no fear that this year buyers will complain of 'old' burr, which was universal last year. Troopers have been about here lately, buying up capones, for madafero, at 11 and 12 rs.; but they find very few sellers at these prices. Three capon saladeros are talked of, within a radius of ten leagues from this: one four leagues from Durazno, one at Chancico, and one west of the Cerros de Ojolmi. They will prove a great boon to sheep-farmers in this district; they are too far from Montevideo to

profit much by the demand for madafero. Last year capones sold freely at 10 rs in April, but this year 8 and 9 rs. were the utmost prices. Stearine establishments can afford to pay higher rates for fat wethers. ... RIVER PLATE BEEF FOR ENGLISH CONSUMPTION. The following report on the methods employed in the River Plata for curing meat for European markets has been laid before both Houses of Parliament:— Mr. Ford to the Earl of Clarendon. (Received August 3.) Buenos Ayres, June 26, 1866. My Lord, I have the honour to transmit herewith to your lordship a report I have drawn up on the various methods now present employed in this country, with a view to utilising the same for the purpose of curing meat for exportation. The methods mentioned on 'Change' was also purchased by Mr. Green for the London & River Plata Bank, in Calle Recoquista, alongside Don Pastor Obligado's house and facing the residence of the Irish clergyman, the Rev. Canon Fahy; whereas the price paid is one million two hundred thousand dollars. The site is one of the best and most central in Buenos Ayres and in what may be termed the English and Irish part of the city. The London & River Plata Bank is now doing an immense business and the new site, although a little distant from the Bolos, is a splendid position for a bank. The present edifices where the Mañá Bank has been purchased some time since by the Baron Mañá in the sum of seven thousand ounces or 112,000 dollars, and the banking offices are about to be enlarged to meet the increasing business of the bank. The impression is general that peace is near at hand, and thus a termination put to this campaign, which has at present lasted so long.
