In consideration of the people' kindness, and desirous to show them some mark of acknowledgment, we obtained permission of the 'cacique' to give them a 'baile' in his own house, giving him a 'carte blanche' to order from Dn. Lucas whatever he required At nightfall the famed drum, which one of our party purchased, was put into requisition, and summoned al the families to assemble at the 'cacique's' house for a revel. The moon was most propitious; giolin, guitar and dram formed the orchestra. Noth ing could equal the formality and demeanor of the dancers, and (although in the Chaco) the figures, steps, and movements could not be found fault with. I must not pass over one proof of the moderation of the Indians. Next morning we sent for the account of the night's expenses to the state, the amount of which was so small that it appeared to us an impossibility, yet how many joyous faces did we gaze on during the night, how many did we make happy, and what thanks we received from them! We spent the rest of the day boating and spearing fish with the Indians, determined to leave next morning, which we did early, with regret. Our kind host, the 'cara,' accompanied us with his Indian guard, and a guard of honor from the canton was sent for the same purpose by the Comandante. I allude to the circum- write more. A little further on the entire party showed symptoms of fight, and we prepared to receive them in battle array; but they parleyed, and upon receiving a slight gratification they left us in peace. Paper money to-day was inconveniently tight, and many were obliged to sell specie to get the paper. Collections through town were miserable, and on the whole, it was rather a hard day on the Bolsa. The sales of gold on long dates amounted to 72,000 at average prices. For the
