THE FRENCH MAILS.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

The Carmel brings dates, London
Oct. 24th, Paris 25th and Lisbon 29th.
The Emperor Napoleon is quite re-
covered, and rode through the boulevards
and Bois de Boulogne, being
enthusiastically cheered by the people.
Peace having been finally concluded
at Vienna between Austria and Italy,
the Austrians have given up Venetia;
it was first handed over to the French
commissioners, by them transferred to
the municipal authorities, and a plebiscite
resulted unanimously in favor of
annexation to Italy. The Italian
troops made a triumphal entry into
Venice, and at the same time a flotilla
of 5 iron-clads arrived. All political
prisoners were set at liberty. The
evacuation by the Austrians took
place on the 16th, 17th and 18th Oct.
each transport conveying 5,000 men
over to Trieste. Subscriptions were
raised for the thousands of operatives
at Venice out of employment. Through-
out Italy a national loan is being got
up, and 40 towns have already sub-
scribed for 20 million francs. The
Government now turns its attention
to internal matters, and proposes
establishing 2,000 new free-schools.
Complimentary telegraph messages
have been exchanged between King
Victor Emmanuel and the Emperor of
Austria. General Menabrea paid to
the Austrian Government, on the
12th, the sum of 87 1/2 millions francs
(3 1/2 millions sterling) on account of
the Venetian Debt; and received from
Count Mensdorff the iron-crown of
Lombardy. A splendid gondola has
been prepared at Venice for the King's
reception, and the troops on entering
Mantua were covered with flowers.
The Emperor Napoleon sent a message
of congratulation to Victor Emmanuel.
The revolution in Sicily cost the lives
of 7 officers and 332 men of the Royal
army: the Princes of Ravello and
Savali are to be tried at Florence for
their share in the rebellion. The trial
of Admiral Persano for the affair of
Lissa has begun before the Chambers,
but valuable evidence has been dis-
covered in his defence.

Lord Cowley has consented to re-
main as Ambassador at Paris, and
withdrew his resignation. The Re-
form agitation continues in England
and Scotland: a meeting in Glasgow
was attended by 150,000 persons, the
city being decorated with flags, and
business suspended. The Irish party
seems resolved to take up the cry of
Reform, which will give the Opposi-
tion a decided majority over Lord
Derby's ministry. The English Vol-
unteers have been most cordially re-
ceived in Belgium and won some high
honors in the international Ty or rifle
competition.

Garibaldi is back again at Capriera.
Francis II. of Naples has at last given
up all hope of recovering his king-
dom, dismissed his ministry, and is
preparing to leave Rome. There is
talk of an arrangement between V.
Emmanuel and the Pope, to guaran-
tee to the Papacy the territory it at
present holds. Meantime the Span-
ish Government has sent a circular to
the other Catholic powers relative to
the protection of the Pope's temporal
power; it seems the Emperor Napo-
leon has given a very lukewarm reply.
An effort is said to be on foot to
unite the Greeks in Turkey under the
Roman Pontiff, on the same footing as
the "united Greeks," who preserve
their own liturgy and whose priests
are married, by permission of the
Pope. The Empress of Mexico, whose
mind was so affected at Rome, has
been removed by her brother, the
Count of Flanders, to the palace of
Miramar, where she is reported im-
proving.

Prussia has concluded the treaty
with Saxony, and the only German
State with which she has not now ar-
ranged is Luxembourg, of which the

believed that when the new German
Parliament assembles at Berlin, on
New Year's Day, the King will de-
clare himself Emperor of Germany.
Meantime the Southern Powers are at
discord: Wurtemberg and Baden seem
inclined to join the Prussian Con-
federacy, leaving Bavaria and Aus-
tria eliminated from German affairs.
The ladies of Hanover have put on
mourning, for being annexed to Prus-
sia, but Nassau and Hesse celebrated
the event joyfully. The Austrian
States have convoked their various
Assemblies, except Hungary, where
the cholera is making ravages. A
Polish noble has been made Govern-
or of Galitzia, which has given umbrage
to Russia. The Emperor Francis Jo-
seph is gone to Bohemia, where his
subjects suffered severely during the
late war.

It is now positively asserted that
Oblie and Spain have both accepted
French mediation, and Napoleon has
communicated to this effect to the
French agents in the Pacific.
The Monde says that Prussia has
proposed to Napoleon, as follows:—
1st. To annex Saxony to Prussia, and
Belgium to France; 2nd. To recon-
stitute the kingdom of Poland and give
it to the present King of Saxony. In
this way Russia would give up Poland,
receiving instead the Danubian Prin-
cipalities; Austria would surrender
Galitzia, and Prussia the Duchy of
Posen.

The Times speaks confidently of the
projected submarine cables from Sin-
gapore to China and Australia.

Marshal O'Donnell is still at Paris.
The Exhibition of 1867 will cover
double the extent of that of London in
1862.

Prince Napoleon is gone to England
to attend the Reform meetings.

Russia is actively arming, and seems
very friendly with the United States
and Prussia, preparatory to another
War in the East.

A Washington correspondent states,
on what he calls good authority, that
President Johnson intends to release
Jeff. Davis on parole or bail, if the
supreme court fails to try him at the
October term. It is also reported
that Jeff. Davis has indignantly de-
clined an offer for his immediate release,
on condition that he would leave the
country never to return.

We are glad to hear that Mr. Gustavus
V. Brook, has not been forgotten
by his numerous friends in Melbourne.
On the 7th of May last the Melbourne
Garrick club gave a performance in
memory of the ill-fated tragedian, and
for the purpose of getting up a suit-
able memorial. The committee of man-
agement included all the leading
men of Melbourne, who exerted
themselves to the uttermost to render
the occasion worthy of the object in
view. In this it seems they were
entirely successful.

NEW STEAM-LINE TO ANTWERP.

SUCCESS TO THE HALLEY.
The pioneer vessel 'Halley,' of the
Astronomical line, left this port last
evening for Antwerp, and in com-
memoration of the event the popular
agents, Messrs. J. P. Boyd & Co. gave
a lunch at their office, at 1.30 p.m.
Among those present were, Messrs.
Drabble, Green, Tomkinson, Russell,
Milligan, Neild, Oldham, Anderson,
Brown, Hargreaves, Williamson, Ar-
rington, Wyatt Smith, Moore, Kinch,
Bunge, Hall, Hart, Mortimer, Mulhall,
Casares, Capt. Johnson, &c.

Mr. J. H. Green (River Plate Bank)
in brief but suitable terms, dwelt on
the importance of opening up this new
line of steam-communication between
the River Plate and Antwerp. The
latter was, of all other continental
ports, the foremost as an emporium
of our export wool-trade. The new line
could not fail to prove a gain to com-
merce, and showed the enterprising
spirit of the owners. He proposed
"success to the Halley, and a good
passage to Capt. Johnson." (Drunk
with full bumpers).

Capt. Johnson returned thanks, and
stated that he had bet a hat to make
the passage in 30 days (applause).

Mr. Drabble then proposed the
health of Messrs. J. P. Boyd & Co.,
so well and favorably known among
us, for their politeness to exporters,
unremitting attention to business,
and successful management of their
important Liverpool line of steamers.
It was to Messrs. Boyd & Co. that we
are indebted for the establishment of
the new service to Antwerp.

Mr. Boyd, in returning thanks,
spoke to the high standing of Messrs.
Lampart and Holt of Liverpool, who
spared no pains or expense to make
the line in every way suitable, by
building new steamers and studying
the exact requirements of the trade. It
was a happy coincidence that the new
line to Antwerp began on the very
day fixed to celebrate the completion
of the Electric Telegraph from Buenos
Ayres to Montevideo, with which he
coupled the name of Mr. Oldham, the
indefatigable superintendent and en-
gineer, who had just completed this
great work.

The 'Electric Telegraph and Mr.
Oldham' was drunk with all honors,
and Mr. Oldham returned thanks.
The company then broke up (at 2 p.
m.) after warmly shaking hands with
Capt. Johnson and wishing him a
good voyage.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The French packet arrived yester-
day morning, and the mail-bags were
ashore at 10 a.m. She brings but a
small amount of specie, and a very
large list of passengers, over one
hundred: we notice amongst the
names, Mr. J. H. Krabble, Mr. Bonne-
mason, Mr. Hntz. We welcome them
to the River Plate.

The most important news received
by the French packet is from Rio
Janeiro: our new correspondent there
gives a graphic description of the
state of things there.

Our agent in Quilmes reports great
excitement in that agricultural dis-
trict on Wednesday, caused by the
commandante walking off with no
less than 34 new members of the Quil-
mes 'contingente' for the war, three of
them foreigners; there was weeping
and sighing at the departure of the
embryo warriors, and there seems to
be no exact knowledge as to the des-
tination of these soldiers, some thought
they were for Paraguay, others for
Mendoza.

Yesterday was a day of general
celebration in town. At the steam-
boat agency office of Mr. Boyd's, in
Calle San Martin, there were flowing
bumpers at half-past 1 o'clock to in-
augurate the Pioneer Astronomical
Line for Antwerp. The Halley left
yesterday with a splendid cargo; as
she will touch at Cowes, we gave the
captain late papers to send up to
London. In the evening the grand
Telegraphic Inauguration banquet
came off; one of the greatest feasts
ever held in Buenos Ayres.

The Telegraph worked well yester-
day; and at an early hour there was
a telegram at the Club announcing
the arrivals at Montevideo. Mr. Old-
ham discovered the hitch the very
day he went over to Colonia. All
goes on right now, and over two
hundred messages were despatched
yesterday.

A map subscriber informs us that
the Standard is at present thriving
under the general benediction of all
the 'tropeiros' in the country: the poor
cartmen have been informed by the
wool brokers and farmers in the Plaza
of our efforts to get the Flores road
repaired, and as they yoke their bul-
locks to their carts they offer up a
fervent prayer for our prosperity.

The meeting at the Rural Society
comes off to-night: all who take an
interest in Mr. Terro's beef-curing
scheme ought to attend, as business
of importance has to be despatched.

We learn from an ex-municipal that
the large piece of ground in front of
the Recoleta, which we had hoped to
see enclosed and added to the burial
ground, is the subject of a lawsuit;
part of the ground belongs to Mr.
Armstrong, but the name of the own-
er of the other portion we have not
heard. It is really much to be regret-
ted that no effort is made to shut up
the Recoleta, and opening a new ce-
metery; if the municipality has not
the funds to do it, by simply offering
charges, a private company would at
once be formed, as it would pay well.

The latest we have about our per-
ambulating Minister of War is that
he had arrived at the Rio Cuarto, and
was pushing a head at full speed nor-
west; the weather is terribly hot
out there, and the poor War Minister
has rather a hard road to travel.

The steamer Ptolemy (Astronomical
line) arrived at Montevideo from Liv-
erpool on Monday; she left England
on the 22nd October, touching at Bra-
zil; she may be expected in this morn-
ing, and will be despatched by Messrs.
John P. Boyd & Co., at the end of
next week.

The loss of a splendid American
steamer, The Evening Star, with over
200 persons on board, is reported by
the mail: the unfortunate steamer
was trading with one of the Southern
ports.

The American Admiral on this sta-
tion, Admiral Godon, left Rio in the
Brooklyn on the 26th October, and has
not since been heard of. It is sur-
mised that he has put in at St. Cath-
arine's.

Our subscribers in Pilar advise us
of the starting of a library in that
town by the Rev. Mr. Carolan. We
hail with pleasure these country lib-
raries. Several of the little towns in
the country now have their libraries,
and we think it would be a move in
the right direction to connect these
libraries with the British Library in
this city.

There is much difficulty experienced
by English people in pronouncing the
new Brazilian commander's name,
Caxia. It has been suggested to us
by an English lady friend that the
man's real name is Casey, and there
is pretty sound reason for believing
this is correct; however, we are slow
to acknowledge this until the General
does something worthy of so great a
name, so honored a patronymic.

The steamers for Corrientes yester-
day took up an immense number of
passengers. Any one wishing to form
a correct idea of the trade with Corri-
entes at present ought to go on board
one of these steamers on the day of
sailing.

The Government has called for bids
for the paving of the Flores Road.
This is decidedly a move in the right
direction, and we hope will be at once
accomplished, as now is the season
when this road is most required.

The meeting of the Directors of the
Philharmonic Society is convened for
to-night, at the rooms in Calle Sui-
pacha.

We notice in the list of suits to be
tried before the city tribunals this
week no fewer than four murder cases.
Scarcely a week passes that a murder
trial is not on the list.

A very nonsensical and unmeaning
row is at present going on between the
editor of the Pueblo and Sr. Pico of
the Nacion. The whole affair is so
grossly personal that it should not be
admitted into any city paper.

We hear that a party of English
gentlemen have started for Frayle
Muerto, and are expected back next
week. We hear nothing more of the
Indians, and suppose that the Corde-
va Government has at last put up a
garrison.

Our Rio correspondent mentions
that the Emperor of Brazil has been
pleased to confer the Order of the
Rose on our esteemed friend Dr. Les-
lie: we salute the Doctor on this
high distinction.

We regret to notice the rather sud-
den demise of Mr. Connyngham, the
second secretary of the British Legation
at Rio.

Mr. Pestalardo has engaged the
Solis in Montevideo. Previous to the
departure of the Opera Company he
will give another 'temporada'. Briol
has gone to live out in San Fernando.

General Mitre has called on Cor-
rientes to at once raise a contingent
for the war, and to this end General
Caceres has been despatched to levy
men. There are great complaints
published against this officer, whose
conduct is considered most arbitrary.
It must not, however, be a very easy
job to get his men together, and mili-
tary discipline is very severe. Caceres
and the Governor are travelling about
the province.

The French subscription for the un-
fortunates who suffered by the recent
inundations is very respectable, and
has been published in the Courrier.
It is probably the largest subscription
ever raised in this country for such a
purpose.

Orion has replied to Sagitta's letter,
and we suppose the matter has now
ended. The dispute has thrown much
light on the Curupaity engagement;
but we decline deciding the matter in
question leaving it to some military
men to give their judgment.

The great case of Hopkins v. King
is on the list for this week. We hope
either of the litigants will favor us
with a report of the trial.

Our advices from Entre Rios by the
last steamer announce the rumored
sale of another sheep-farm. Gual-
guaychú is crowded with English. On
all the English estancias there are
numbers of Englishmen with capital,
looking for a place at a moderate
price. The natives are all on the 'qui
vive' for bad news from the provinces,
as they all believe the Bolivians are
coming.

Strange to say not a single Monte-
videan paper has published a telegram
on the first day the line worked. This
shows an editorial exhaustion we were
unprepared for.

The first principal and large sale of
wool in Montevideo this season has
been that of Mr. Ricketts', from San
Salvador estancia, in 38 rls. all round,
which is regarded as a capital good
price. Since then, however, 39 rls.,
free of bellies, has been offered and
declined.

Mr. Ricketts ships this year about
200 @ Mestiza Lincoln wool raised on
his estancia. We hear these sheep
give on an average five pounds wool,
and that it sells well in England at
18 cents per lb.

The immense trade between this
port and Antwerp has resulted in two
direct lines of steamers each month
between Buenos Ayres, Montevideo
and Antwerp. The first steamer of
one of the new lines left yesterday,
taking one of the finest cargoes ship-
ped from here on board a screw steam-
er; there seems to be some doubt as to
the steamer getting a return, but we
believe trade with the River Plate is
now so brisk that she will soon fill up.

The Antwerp trade may be regarded
as exclusively wool; it has sprung up
with the prosperity of our sheep-
farmers, and according to the Custom-
house reports is steadily augmenting.
Should the Halley not get a full re-
turn cargo, she will call at Liverpool,
tranship her cargo to the first steamer
bound to the River Plate; thus ship-
pers need not complain of delay.
Strange to say there is no direct line
of steamers between Antwerp and
Liverpool.

Specie payments will be resumed in
Montevideo to-morrow. We don't
think that any of the banks will ex-
perience a run, as they have had such
timely notice they are well prepared.

The grand function which was to
have taken place in San Nicolas for
the benefit of the wounded has been
put off, owing to none of the tickets
having been sold.

We hear that there was a small at-
tempt to mutiny in the 2nd reg. of
cavalry, which was at once suppressed
by the decided conduct of the officers.

To know if Watson, of Belgrano, has
rooms to rent for the summer: we
suppose he has, but as there appears
to be some doubt about the matter,
we have been requested to put the
question.

Two small steamers are on their way
out for the River Plate. We believe
one is intended for the Colonia trade
and the other for the Tigre.

NEWS FROM RIO JANEIRO.

HIGHLY IMPORTANT.

(Special Standard Correspondent.)
Rio, November 17th, 1866.

A tragical occurrence took place on
the night of the 6th inst., and has
been the chief topic of public conver-
sation ever since, partly in conse-
quence of the position in society occu-
pied by the parties connected with it,
and partly on account of the sad na-
ture of the circumstances.

Dr. Miguel de Corqueira Lima, Mun-
icipal Judge in the District of Nova
Friburgo, and for the present residing
on leave of absence in Rio, discharged
five barrels of his revolver at his wife,
who fell dangerously wounded by four
of the bullets. The husband then
rushed out into the street with the re-
volver still in his hand but was in a
few moments arrested and taken to
the police station. Here, with the
greatest calmness he denied having
fired the pistol, but said that it had
been stolen from his room the pre-
vious morning; that, on hearing the
report of fire-arms he had rushed
from the room where he was sitting to
the corridor and there found his wife
fallen on the ground, that while de-
scending the stairs to see from whence
the pistol had been fired it was thrown
at him by some person unknown, and
hit his legs, when he picked it up and
rushed into the street to discover who
had thrown it.

These declarations, made with an
incredible amount of coolness and ap-
parent ignorance of the act commit-
ted, together with the actions of Dr.
Corqueira Lima for several months
past (who is laboring under a mono-
mania that his life is in constant dan-
ger from several persons who wish to
assassinate him), seem to warrant the
supposition that his brain is affected,
and that he committed the fatal act
when in a state of frenzy.

The unfortunate lady was at once
attended by medical men, and some
of the bullets were extracted immedi-
ately, after which she was taken to
the house of her brother-in-law, where
she still lies in a most precarious state,
but there are some hopes now of her
life being saved.

Dr. Corqueira Lima had only been
married about eleven months, and, af-
ter a separation of about five months,
this lady had only some five days pre-
vious to this occurrence rejoined her
husband. They have a child about
one month old.

Scarcely had the public mind re-
covered from the first shock produced
by the occurrence just related, when
another tragedy, perhaps even more
sad than the first, came to attract
their attention: At about half-past
seven o'clock on the night of the 6th
inst., Dr. José Mariano da Silva, Sur-
geon-in-Chief to the Police Force of
Rio, presented himself at the Police
Barracks and gave himself up to the
Staff Officer on duty as a prisoner in
consequence of having just killed his
wife!! The cause of this act appears
to have been jealousy. The lady was
only eighteen years of age and very
handsome, and it seems that the doc-
tor, having his suspicions aroused by
some means, commenced examining
the servants and other persons com-
prising his household, and in conse-
quence of what he heard, took his
case of instruments from his pocket
and, extracting a lancet, seized his
wife and, in a moment divided with
this instrument the carotid arteries,
so that death ensued in a few min-
utes.

The Conselheiro Sergio Teixeira de
Macedo has been appointed by the
Brazilian Government as Envoy Ex-
traordinary and Minister Plenipoten-
tiary to the Court of France.

The Exhibition still continues to at-
tract a great number of visitors; the
total number of persons who have
visited this building since the day of
its inauguration up to the present
time (16th November) is 25,578.

Great dissatisfaction has arisen on
all sides in consequence of the distri-
bution by the Government of conde-
corations and rewards to the Officers
and soldiers of the Army, the Volun-
teers and the National Guard. The
general cry is that of the army and
volunteers at the seat of war, those
who had never smelt powder got the
rewards, while those who had exposed
their lives in action were overlooked.
The National Guard complains that
while those who left their homes and
families to defend their country have
received no recognition of their ser-
vices; those who remained behind and
who never unsheathed sword or fired
a cartridge except on gala-days or ac-
companying a procession, have been
honored with condecorations and oth-
er rewards for important services during
the war.

By an imperial decree dated 7th
inst., Dr. John Leslie has been made
a Cavalheiro of the order of the Rose,
for important services performed dur-
ing the war with Paraguay.

By an imperial decree of the 8th
inst., Dr. Jose Mariano da Silva, who
assassinated his wife on the 6th, was
"exonerated" from the post of sur-
geon-in-chief to the police force.

The Brazilian Government is send-
ing a vessel of war to verify the exist-
ence and true position of the rock
discovered by Capt. Colatino Marques
de Souza, of the steam transport Prin-
ceza de Joinville. The position given
by Capt. de Souza is lat. 32° 51' 32"
S., and long. 53° 51' 8" W. of Paris,
about 4 feet out of the water in a
smooth sea.

The daily papers are full of adver-
tisements for substitutes in the nation-
al guards chosen to join the army in
Paraguay; as much as 900 pats.
has been offered for first-class substi-
tutes.

The Government is using every
means to raise fresh levies of men to
reinforce the army in Paraguay, but
this is now no easy job: in Rio, where
the Government is strong, it became
necessary to put the battalions into
barracks before designating the men
who were to march; so that in the
provinces and in the interior it will,
in all probability, be very difficult to
complete the number ordered from
each district by the late imperial de-
cree calling for 10,000 men. The Go-
vernment has also ordered the imme-
diate construction of some small iron-
clad gunboats, which are to be spe-
cially adapted to river navigation.

Two small steamers—the Cecilia,
of 65 tons, and the Theresa, of 49 tons
—sailed from this for the River Plate
on the 12th inst.

By a special decree of the 7th inst.,
the Emperor has opened a 'credito
extraordinario' of Rs. 2,604,416\$53,
for the working expenses of the D.
Pedro II. Railway during the financial
year of 1866-7, as it is now worked by
Government, in accordance with the
contract made under date of 26th
July, 1865.

Some large frauds have lately been
discovered in our custom-house, and
several employes have in conse-
quence been dismissed, and entry to
the custom-house prohibited to the
importers who appear implicated in
the affair. A commission of enquiry
has been appointed by the Govern-
ment, and is now occupied in thor-
oughly sifting the suspicious cases.

His Majesty the Emperor has freed
190 of his slaves, and sent them to
join the army as soldiers of the line.

A great many blacks and mulattos
are now obtaining their freedom by
consenting to go as soldiers: they are
inspected by medical men, and if
found fit for service are bought by
such of the national guards as can
afford to pay for substitutes, and so
free themselves from marching when
chosen.

The steam transport Petropolis has
changed hands, and will in future be
called the Texeira de Freitas.

Dr. Jose Mariano da Silva, who as-
sassinated his wife as before related,
has since become completely insane,
and is now an inmate of the D. Pedro
II. Lunatic Asylum.

On the 6th of October a small steamer,
named the Augusto, 3 tons,
sailed from Bristol for Pernambuco,
where it is to be employed in river
navigation, and was ordered by the
Baron de Livramento. With the ex-
ception of the Red, White and Blue,
of 2 1/2 tons, which lately crossed the
Atlantic from New York to Margate,
no vessel so small has ever attempted
so long a voyage; at any rate, there
is no precedent of a steamer of such
diminutive dimensions having attempt-
ed the trip from Europe to South
America. The crew of the Augusto
consists of Capt. Derstick, one sailor,
one engineer, one fireman, and a New-
foundland dog.

The National Exhibition is to close
on the 2nd of December next, and
probably with the same formalities as
on its inauguration, as the day chosen
is the Emperor's birthday.

On the 15th, in the saloons of the
Club Fluminense, Lieut.-Colonel F. M.
Guimaraes Peizoto, so justly noted for
his bravery at Paysandú, and in every
attack since the war broke out, receiv-
ed a splendid ovation.

The banquet was presided over by
the Cons. Parnaguá, the present Min-
ister of War, and the gallant Lieut.-
Colonel was seated at his side, his de-
corations and scars plainly showing
that he had taken a prominent part in
many feats of arms.

The first toast was proposed by Dr.
Thomaz Alves, who congratulated the
hero of Paysandú, Corrientes, Ria-
chuelo, and Tuyuty, on his good for-
tune in having been able to make a
trip to his native country to regain
his health, and receive such an ova-
tion as the present one, and putting
on the head of the youthful soldier a
crown of laurels, wished him long
life and prosperity. The Cons. Parna-
guá, then in the name of the Govern-
ment, thanked the promoters of the
feast, and added a few words of en-
thusiasm to the same toast.

The following toasts were proposed:
The Cons. Paranhos and Octaviano;
Baron de Porto Alegre, Baron de St.
Gabriel, Baron de Herval, and Gen.
Polidoro. The Minister of War, again
rising, proposed the toast of—"Gene-
rals Mitre and Flores, the Allies of
Brazil," which was received with
great enthusiasm. Vivas were then
given for the prime citizen of Brazil,

the Chief of the Volunteers, the
perpetual defender of the empire,
Dom Pedro II., and the "reunion"
broke up amid shouts of "viva" and
the sounds of the National Hymn.

In political circles in Rio there has
been a good deal said relative to the
part taken by the province of Minas
Geraes in furnishing soldiers for the
war, and complaints were rife that
this department had not done as much
in proportion as the other provinces
of the empire. The President of the
province, Sr. J. Saldanha Marinho,
therefore issued on the 6th inst. a most
stirring proclamation to the 'Mineiros';
and subsequently the Bishop of Ma-
rianna and the Provincial Assembly
likewise issued proclamations, calling
the population of Minas Geraes to
arms.

The steamers San Miguel and Im-
peratriz, which have for some time
back been serving as transports, are
advertised for sale, by public auction,
on the 21st inst.

By the contract of the 11th March,
1851, the Imperial Government gua-
ranteed to the Gas Company an ex-
change of 27d. per milreis, but now,
owing to the sundry financial dis-
turbances, the rate has for some time
been far below the figure guaranteed,
and consequently the amount set apart
in the Budget from 1865 to 1866, for
'public illuminations,' is by a long
way exceeded; consequently, to pro-
vide for this deficit, the Emperor is-
sued on the 10th inst. a decree open-
ing a 'credito extraordinario,' for the
amount of \$42,768\$900 to meet the
necessary payments.

These numerous 'creditos extraordi-
narios' now being opened, some to
cover losses by exchange, some to
meet the working expenses of a rail-
way, which is not paying; others to
provide for expenses which in the
drawing up of the Budget were not
contemplated, show very plainly that
when by and by accounts are squared
up, and the direct and indirect expen-
ture of the empire in prosecuting this
war summed up, there will appear an
amount so large as almost to become
incredible to the unfortunate people
who will have to pay it in taxes.

At present no new taxes have been
imposed, although the law authorising
the Government to levy them has
passed the Chambers, so that the de-
ficit at the end of the financial year
1866-67, will be something tremen-
dous. In the collection of direct
taxes some difficulty is to be ap-
prehended; an income tax, a property
tax, or a capitation tax, are all pretty
easily collectable in cities, or even in
towns, but when they are demanded
in the interior the task of collection
will be very difficult, as it is known by
experience, for the calling of a tax-
gatherer is no enviable one in some
parts of England, even in the present
day.

FROM OUR SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT.
Rio de Janeiro, Nov. 22, 1866.
To the Editors of the Standard,
Gentlemen.

I last wrote you by the steam
transport Galgo, under date of the
20th inst., under cover to your re-
spected agents at Montevideo, and re-
questing them to forward the letter
on by first opportunity, as it contained
the latest advices from Europe and
the United States.

A heavy thunderstorm which broke
over Rio on the night of the 20th inst.
prevented the 'debut' of the Scotch
bell-ringers and Spanish ballet corps,
at our Theatre Lyrique: the said per-
formance is now advertised to take
place to-night.

Business here continues in a wret-
ched state: a great many of the parties
who at the great crisis of '64, when
Souto and other bankers stopped pay-
ment, made compositions with their
creditors, have been unable to comply
with the obligations they then under-
took, and have come to a second stand-
still. The reason assigned by all in
their petitions of bankruptcy is the
impossibility of collecting outstanding
accounts, in consequence of business
having got worse rather than better,
as was hoped.
