PARAGUAYAN OUTRAGE ON A BRITISH SUBJECT.

MR. GANNON'S STATEMENT.

On Tuesday, 29th ult. Mr. Gannon an old and peaceable Irish resident of Bella-Vista arrived in this city from Goya, and before going to the British Hospital to have his wounds attended to he came to the 'Standard' office and made the following verbal statement:—

"About the end of last April, after the invasion of Corrientes, an army of 12,000 Paraguayans passed near my estancia situate close to the banks of the Paraná, a little below Cuevas and some 6 leagues south of Bella-Vista. Being summoned to the camp of Gen. Robles, I proceeded thither and was kindly received by the commander-in-chief who conversed with me for more than an hour, directed me to return home and remain strictly neutral in the war, assuring me that I should not be molested. He even gave me an officer to accompany me beyond the lines. On this their first visit to Bella-Vista the Paraguayans did me no injury beyond killing a few cows.

"On Sunday, August 13th., the enemy's vanguard, of 1,500, appeared in the vicinity a second time, and 400 of them encamped about 500 to 1,000 yards from my house. They began killing cows and even came up to my garden several times, carrying off maize, mandioca and vegetables without my permission. At 10 o'clock on the morning of the 20th, just after I had taken coffee, a party of 8 or 10 soldiers came up on horseback, armed as usual with swords and lances. The sergeant saluted me with 'Mará-terá,' (in Guarani, 'good morning'), to which I replied by inviting them to dismount. They all dismounted together, and the sergeant and corporal approaching me, the former gave an order in Guarani to the corporal, whereupon the latter proceeded to bind my arms behind my back, the sergeant assisting him. I remonstrated that I was innocent of any offence, and requested to be led before the Commandante. The sergeant struck me with his broadsword and pushed me into the house, saying 'give up your money, for you are going to die.' The others had meantime begun sacking the house.

"The sergeant then told the corporal in Spanish (deguellalo) to cut off my head, and the latter made a cut with his knife which I tried to avoid by a jerk, but received a gash from my left cheek to the back of my neck: at the same time the sergeant stabbed me in the right side and the corporal in the groin. The former then drew his knife across my stomach, but luckily only cut the front of my pantaloons, and I fell to the ground pretending to be dead. They then dragged out of the servants' room into my room a boy aged 14: I heard a scream and the fall of the boy's headless corpse. Another cry, from the servants' room, announced to me the murder of the wife of my 'capataz': she was pregnant at the time, about 30 years of age and mother of 4 children. Her sister was next dragged into my room and her throat cut.

"Believing me dead, they proceeded to strip me, while the blood flowed from my wounds: in order to get off my coat they had to cut the cords which bound my arms, and to this, under Heaven, I owed my escape; they stripped me of everything but my shirt and drawers. It was about 11 o'clock when they retired with the booty of the house, mostly clothes, which they carried away on horseback. I never lost my senses, and after a little managed to crawl towards the door, when one of the women who was not yet dead told me to "keep close as they

were watching." Seeing some of them not far off I remained another hour motionless until I saw the whole column retire from an eminence fronting the house. I then crawled out behind the house and found one of the servants' blankets in which I rolled myself.

"It was then about noon, and creeping on my hands and feet I managed to reach a hollow (cañada) about 1,000 yards off, and was then able to walk. I had gone about a league, when about 2 p.m. I saw another party of Paraguayans catching mares about 500 yards ahead of me. Lying down in the long grass I lay concealed till after sun-set, still bleeding profusely from my right side. When it was dark the Paraguayan party passed close to where I lay, and after that I again rose and attempted to walk, for two miles more would place me without the enemy's lines; but I was too weak and faint from loss of blood, and fell senseless to the ground, remaining there all night under a severe frost. Next morning, tired and limping, I contrived to push on one-half a league and came up to an empty house which had been sacked by the enemy. I lay hid all day in the weeds of the garden, and at night I entered the house, where I found an old stretcher-bed and some wool with which I covered myself up. I had not slept over half an hour when three soldiers came up to the house, but they proved to be Correntinos: on telling them my story they took me away on horseback, a distance of 2 leagues to the estancia of D. Pedro Córdoba: the family had fled, but we found two peons who treated me very kindly and helped to bind my wounds. I remained all night, and next day a Spaniard came from Santa-Lucia with a horse to convey me thither. On reaching there I again rested, and proceeded next day to Goya where Dr. Newkirk very kindly dressed my wounds, and advised me to present myself to the British Minister at Buenos Ayres. The captain of the steamer Esmeralda gave me a free passage, and the passengers generously subscribed a sum of money to provide me with clothes &c.

"I have been 13 years resident in Corrientes, and have lost 1,000 head of cattle, all my horses, and all other property."

Note.—The above is a hurried statement of Mr. Gannon's case, and as it contains some apparent inaccuracies, these result probably from the haste in which we took down his notes.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The steamer Rio de la Plata arrived on Wednesday from Concordia with 127 passengers, heavy mails, and despatches for the Government. We spoke with some English passengers who came down in her; they say that in Concordia it was rumoured the bombardment of Uruguayana was to have commenced at 6 o'clock on Monday morning, with 47 guns on the part of the allies. From the tone of Estigarribia's reply to Gen. Flores note, a very sanguinary resistance is anticipated, but as the Brazilians have been reinforced by some five thousand infantry under the Count D'Eu who is now the Commander-in-chief, it is not supposed that the Paraguayans can hold out long. A strong Paraguayan force is said to be crossing the Province of Corrientes by forced marches, but they can render no assistance, and run every chance of being cut off like Duarte.

We have received from an English gentleman some beautiful stereoscopic views of Rio Janeiro, its harbour, &c. They are without exception the finest we have ever seen, and reflect the highest credit on the amateur artist.

The Cricket match at Palermo was the great centre of attraction on Wednesday. The cars on the Northern Railway were crowded, and all the horses in the stables hired. The bachelors were beaten.

The arrest of foreigners in the camp, who have no consular protections is causing great complaint and serious difficulty. In the district of Junin three Spaniards were taken up, and we believe kept as prisoners: the matter was taken up by the Spanish Minister, notes passed, the justice of the peace examined, and a great row caused about the matter; the result was that

the three men were ordered to be at once set at liberty."

Shearing seems to have commenced earlier than usual this year. We noticed a small flock in the suburbs all newly shorn, but we suppose that the sheep are housed at night. We learn from our camp friends that in consequence of the great scarcity of hands this year the farmers intend to commence clipping earlier than usual.

We call the attention of our readers to a very important sheep auction which will take place by order of the Court on the 6th inst., at the Court House in San Pedro. The sheep are of a superior class, and we recommend them to our friends who think of investing.

Mrs. Young has opened a travellers' home near the Southern Railroad station: the house is good and airy, and will be found convenient, being so close to the Southern Market.

A fine steamer, we understand, is expected to arrive shortly from Boston. She will be of light draught and adapted to river navigation.

The steamer Feliz Colon which, it may be remembered, was despatched by Government to rescue the unfortunate families in the Gran Chaco, has arrived up as far as Paraná at latest dates, and will probably be in time to afford assistance at Goya.

The Italian war steamer Veloce has gone up the river, but as yet has not reached the Rincón de Soto, where the squadron is. We believe, however, she will be allowed to pass up: the Argentine Admiral we know will make no resistance, and it is not probable, as the Italians have lent their magnificent Hospital to the Brazilians, that Tamandaré will offer any opposition to the Veloce.

Respecting the rumour so current a few days ago in reference to Urquiza having left San José, we learn that the General did leave his estancia, but only for the purpose of having an interview with President Mitre about the conduct of the war. It is said that the Entre Riano chieftain got the cold shoulder at Concordia, but this is of course only a rumour.

The best news we have from the interior is that Taboada, at the head of 1,500 men, had arrived at Santa Fé: he will shortly arrive at Rosario. The St. Luis contingent, 300 men, has arrived at Rosario.

Our Goya colleague has been obliged to leave that town owing to the near approach of the Paraguayans. His valedictory is beyond question one of the richest pieces of composition we ever read—he curses Lopez in the most polished style for forcing him to fly.

The Provincial Government has published a decree prohibiting fowling in the suburbs and partidos adjacent to the city. This new law has caused the most profound grief amongst our sporting friends, and not a few insist that it is unconstitutional.

The Ibiyú, from Paraná, is due this morning: it is possible she will bring us news from the squadron.

Respecting the case of the Lili and the Tevere, which we mentioned on Wednesday, we learn that it was the Little Bee and not the Lili which so nearly "collided" with the Tevere. The Lili sighted the Tevere afar at about 12 o'clock at night, the Lili having her three lights in their places, and close by the Tevere was a small steamer supposed to be the Little Bee, which arrived in Montevideo at midday. The Lili left this Port late in the evening and arrived in Montevideo with the supplementary mail at 7½ a.m. the following morning.

OUR LONDON CORRESPONDENT.

London, July 23rd.

The political agitation of the hour has caused stagnation throughout the country, and depression in every branch of commerce is the result. The foreign and colonial imports in wool, oil, hides, &c., up to the present are in excess of the same period last year, and when business resumes its wonted activity, reduced prices will have to be submitted to. The amalgamation of Baron Mauá's Bank with the London and Brazilian has given much satisfaction here, and the arrangement will tend still farther to induce English capitalists to turn their attention to your country. The London & H. P. Bank

is now quoted at £48½, with an improving tendency. I learn, from reliable sources, that the agent of your republic now in England has received numerous offers relative to the loan, and that his only difficulty is to select without offending from the many who have thus stood forward as the friends of your popular government.

Leaving monetary and commercial affairs aside. I turn to the engrossing subjects and events of public interest. First amongst these is the laying of the Atlantic cable, which is now being carried out by that wonder of modern and naval architecture, the Great Eastern, from Valentia in Ireland to Newfoundland. Yesterday (July 21) the shore end of the cable was safely laid, and this day the splicing of the sea end takes place. On the accomplishment of this important operation, the big ship will proceed on one of the most momentous voyages ever undertaken. Steaming at the rate of six knots an hour, the mystic wire destined to interchange the throbbing and monetary thoughts of Old and New World will sink silently from the deck of the Great Eastern into the abyss of the "vast deep." It is almost beyond the power of any writer to describe the measures adopted to secure the success of this wondrous undertaking; but they are of such a nature that leading men in science and every branch of mechanics look upon its successful accomplishment with the most sanguine expectations. By the last week in August if all goes well, Great Britain and America will be united by the magic highway over which thought travels.

It may gratify your readers to learn that the existing political and diplomatic relations between Great Britain and the United States were never more friendly, or the mutual interest of the countries better understood by the statesmen ruling their destinies. In the success of the mission now being carried out by the Great Eastern is involved a new era in the world's history, for it will establish the fact that the uttermost parts of the earth can be brought into close relation and harmony through instantaneous interchanges of thoughts, ideas, and feelings.

A brief trial has just concluded at Salisbury with a result which thrills the heart. A young lady, possessing rare personal attractions, has been sentenced to death, for the murder of her infant step-brother. The name, 'Cousance Kent', in connection with the Road murder, has been before the world for some years—and now, having confessed her crime; one feels almost regret that a girl brought up amid all the refinement of affluence, and endowed with attractions seldom met with, should pass from the world at the hands of the executioner.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

ARRIVAL OF THE LILI.

The little steamer Lili arrived in port yesterday at midday, bringing mails, and one of our friends who went down after the skeddaddled shopkeeper from Calle Potosí; the defaulting Tendero did not go in the packet but has not been captured. The police have however found his better-half, and we are given to understand some gold.

Everything is quiet in the Mount: the Government has received a note from the king of the Belgians, respecting Mr. Vidal having been named Provisional Governor.

The 2nd battalion of the Nat. Guard has been called out.

The 'Tribuna' states that the British Government has sent out instructions to Admiral Elliot to demand of Lopez satisfaction for the Dotoréll affair in Corrientes.

A splendid English steamer, the Hero, had arrived at Rio to be sold: it is thought she will be bought for the River Plate.

The Opera Company was singing in Solis, to crowded houses.

The Commissary of Mercedes had seized some letters on board the schooner Estrella, from Gualeguaychu, notifying the Blancos that on the 30th there would be a demonstration.

The Little Bee had arrived down safe.

The Argentine ship Paraná had entered in ballast from Buenos Ayres.

The Captain of the Lili had delivered the supplementary mail to Captain Ourléwis and got his receipt.

The Susquehanna, with Admiral Gordon's flag, had arrived at Rio, and was about to proceed to the Plate.

Exchange for the packet was not to say very active: the English Bank passed from 14 to £20.00.

GRAND OPERA AT SOLIS.

LETTER TO MME. FLORES.

MURATURE AND THE BRAZILIANS.

RAGGED BANK-PAPER.

August 28, 1865.

It is a quarter to one o'clock, and the Carmel has just dropped anchor in our port. The late arrival has to be accounted for.

The closing week in August is a time of relaxation from business with us, for it is the Christmas of our year, and holidays do so abound that even the commercial mind is apt to yield in some way to the benignant influence of social festivities. Though to be sure these seem to be "growing small by degrees and beautifully less," and the pleasure-seeking and part-time-loving portion of this our highly cultivated Montevidean society have to refresh their over-worked (?) existence by patronising amateur performances, and applauding amateur songstresses who in their turn, and *sui generis*, play and sing for applause, and the benefit of poor little foundlings. Our "hours of idleness" are also losing their only redeeming trait—the means of intellectual improvement, as the saying goes—is denied us, and we flock to hear Madame Marietta Mollo and the National Hymn, impelled to follow the "ignis fatuus" of the lounging and objectless pleasure seeker, to fill up the vacuum in our life when the "douce farniente" has well nigh grown burdensome to us, and seek for novelty and new sensations in hearing and seeing what is older than the hills. All this exordium is but to notify to your readers that Madame Mollo, with a commensurate train of artistes, gave, as was announced, a grand, a treble grand performance at Solis on the 25th instant.

Now this is a high day amongst the native dwellers in this land, for it was on such a day in the year 1825, that the star of the house of Braganza was clouded under the Declaration of Independence made and executed in La Florida in that year, whereby the machinations of its enemies were set at naught, the independence of the State was solemnly declared, and Portugal's nurselings lost their hold for ever and a day on the rich and coveted prize of the Banda Oriental. Peace and independence. Long years of strife have since harried the land, and the legacy bequeathed by the "Patres conscripti" of La Florida to their children is what we see at the present day. "And thus," as the Spaniard says, "is history written."

Thus on the 25th of the present month—the Augustan epoch too!—the restless "dilettanti," of all species and tongues, made the spacious halls of Solis their common rendezvous. As I said just now; they longed for something new, and they found an old Opera in the hands of an every-day company, for *novità* is like "Angels' visits, few and far between," and worth and novelty, both dramatic and musical, have long since departed from the boards of Solis.

The *Junon* on the 25th in Solis has been a grand success. That is to say, in a pecuniary sense, for after paying the thousand dollars for which Madame Mollo and her co-partners in the adventure were contracted, a surplus of some five or six hundred dollars will remain to the credit of the shareholders in Solis. This is quite a god-send for them for such an out-of-elbow speculation as this same Solis Theatre Company has been—few, if any other, can be remembered in the annals of a country where the normal value of capital fluctuates between 12 and 18 per cent.

From the army we have no correspondence, only General Flores' letter [written by Sr. Candido Bustamante] to Madame Flores. The reason of this general silence would seem to explain itself in a desire, on the part of the General-in-Chief, to put a stop for the present to those "sporadic" effusions which, in the form of 'correspondence,'

have served to fill many a column of the daily press; and satisfy the shrill leech cry for copy, that according to competent authorities doth wrong the directors of our printing-office most sorely.

I think, however, I can repeat what I have on good authority, that General Flores considers it only a question of days the capture or total destruction of Estigarribia's division in Uruguayana.

Time will show whether the vaticination thus boldly hazarded is to be realized or not.

I notice some of your correspondents indulging in very uncharitable remarks as to the manner in which the Brazilian squadron was led past the Cuevas battery. I believe I am only echoing the opinion of all sensible and right-thinking people when I take exception to such uncalled for strictures. As to my own opinion, I might say much on the subject, but I think, after the affair at the Riachuelo, we Englishmen might well allow some credit to Brazil and Brazilian valour, however lightly we may value them both, especially so as there does not exist with us that cause for envious jealousy which is inherent in weakness, and our own unequalled maritime strength and courage might well give a tinge of generous liberality to our judgment and opinion.

It is said, and the observation is made in a contemptuous manner, that the Brazilian Admiral placed all his men below whilst running past the battery at Cuevas, and that, on the contrary, the Guardia Nacional steamed slowly past, keeping up a heavy fire from above deck, killing and being killed!

I would not willingly join in the cry against a brave officer and a true man like Admiral Murature, but the principle on which Napoleon carried on his wars was he said "to inflict the greatest loss on the enemy with as little loss as possible to himself."

Great complaints are being made of the bad quality of the paper on which the Montevidean Bank has printed its notes. The complaint is well founded, and in presence of the abundance of notes with which we are now threatened, people will do well to look closely to the paper money they receive, especially that of the Montevidean Bank that differs but little in the quality of its paper from a very coarse kind of cigar paper.

Some time since I read in your paper a very well written article on "Buenos Ayres and the English Capitalists" that merits the attention of every true friend of the Argentine Republic. You say that the failure of the Brazilian lines has produced such an amount of disconfidence that there is very little hope for any project in the River Plate, however based it may be on substantial grounds, unless the railways now in construction will not turn out like those in Brazil but "result in 10 per cent to the shareholders."

Reckless railway originators have ruined all Railway schemes in Brazil and it would seem such will be the case in the Argentine Republic.

Grand schemes make great men—and were I not so remarkably modest I would forward you for publication an "interesting correspondence" between myself and the man in the moon in reference to a line I have thought of to the lunar regions!

In your paper some time ago you made some remarks about the projects for the improvement of this harbour. The Government appointed a commission, to report on these schemes, composed of "D. H. W. Koch, D. Pedro Beare, D. Vals Hausen, D. R. Offig, D. A. Montero and D. A. Capurro." There have been two meetings but it is very uncertain when any definite result will be arrived at. It has been determined to do nothing more until certain parts of the Bay have been sounded, so as to determine, by comparing with old charts, what changes are going on in the port. This commission seems quite a secret conclave and carries on its meetings unknown to the public. Even your correspondent "who seems to know every thing" is not aware of it. I only disclose the secret so that you may not be "too much astonished" when the result of this commission's astounding labors is ushered forth to the world.

There is such an internal row going on that I drop my pen to stop my ears. I remain, in haste, Your truly.

THE WAR IN THE RIVER PLATE.

Under this heading an important political pamphlet has just been published in London, advocating the cause of Brazil and Buenos Ayres against Paraguay. The author is evidently an Argentine who has a considerable knowledge of English, but we regret he did not get some one to polish his periods and round them into something like style.

The preamble shews a truthful and highly colored picture of English emigration, English capital, English railways, &c. in the River Plate, and proves that since the downfall of Rosas every successive Government has encouraged the development of the country.

After thanking the Brazilians for restoring order in the River Plate, the author proceeds to comment on the Paraguayan invasion of Matto Grosso and repents the charge (contradicted by Captain Parish) about the soldiers of Lopez cutting off the ears of the Brazilian captives.

With respect to Gen. Urquiza, the writer much extols his patriotism in supporting Gen. Mitre: the former he says represents the 13 Argentine provinces, the latter the wealthy and influential State of Buenos Ayres.

After a well-turned compliment to Mr. Thornton, and expressing the hope that the rupture between G. Britain and Brazil may soon be arranged, the author concludes thus:—

"Such are the causes of 'War in the Plate in 1865.' That war, on the part of the Allies, aims, it has been shown, at peace by the punishment of its unprovoked violator, and at the realization of a balance of power which shall recognize and give efficacy to the rights of all the States to free navigation, unthreatened and unimpeded by great fortresses."

The pamphlet is accompanied with a good map, and has an appendix in the form of a letter to "Hostilities in the River Plate" to the editor of the 'Daily News,' London, controverting an attack on Brazil in that paper.

MURDER IN THE PARANA.

Parana, August 28. Gentlemen, A hard-working poor Irishman, formerly a cartman and 'aguatero' here, had a small public-house opposite San Miguel Church. Some one entered his house with a hammer, struck him on the head, and to all appearance a scuffle ensued. The poor man was found dead in his grog-shop, with his throat cut, several wounds on his body, and his place plundered of everything.

The Brazilian transport Apa left here on Thursday morning.

NEW LINE OF STEAMERS IN THE PACIFIC.

A measure for establishing a monthly steam line to China as been approved by the Washington Congress. San Francisco is to be the port of departure, and the vessels on their route to China will touch at Honolulu, and also at some port in Japan. The subsidy per annum is not to exceed \$500,000, which at the present value of the American currency will be equal only to £50,000.

"They have numerous wants, of which before they were unconscious, and they offer for export silk, tea, cotton, and other products in increasing quantities. The specie freight outwards and silk freight homewards promise to be the most remunerative. Added to this is a passenger traffic to the treaty ports in China, the ports on Formosa, Japan, and the Amoor River, while the eastward travel would embrace a large proportion of those having business with the Pacific coast of America, north and south.

HEROIC REPLY OF COLONEL ESTIGARRIBIA

The Commander-in-chief of the Paraguayan forces on the Uruguay Headquarters on March, at Uruguayana, Aug. 20th., 1865.

Viva la Republica del Paraguay. To Brigadier-General V. Flores. Late last night I received your note of yesterday conveyed by the prisoner, Lieut. José Zorrilla, who will also give your Excellency this my answer.

I have attentively perused said note in order to answer it as becomes a soldier of honor to whom his Government entrusts a delicate post: I must therefore tell your Excellency that as a Paraguayan, a soldier, and a defender of the cause and independence of my country and of my Government, which is determined at all cost to maintain the integrity and equilibrium of the River Plate Republics, I neither can nor ought to accept your proposals.

Even supposing, as you say, that I am lost and can hope for no relief from the armies of Paraguay, honor and obedience impose on me the necessity to die rather than deliver up the arms entrusted to me by H. E. Marshal Lopez, President of the Republic, in defence of the sacred rights of so noble a cause, to a foreign foe. The officers and men of my command are of the same opinion, and resolved to die at their post sooner than accept a proposal which would dishonor and brand with eternal infamy the name of Paraguayan soldiers.

1, and all my division, desire the moment to prove to your Excellency that the Paraguayan soldier neither asks the number of the enemy nor offers to treat with them, when he has to defend such noble and cherished rights. God preserve &c.

The question was, whether persons who can neither read nor write should be admitted as voters, and it was carried in the negative by a majority of 47 against 22.

The 'Edmunds Scandal,' as it was termed, is not yet over. We learn, on good authority, that Mr. Leonard Edmunds has filed a bill in the Court of Chancery against Lord Brougham and his brother, William Brougham, to get back the money paid for them, as he alleges, since the year 1853.
