**EDITOR'S TABLE.**

There is a sort of 'clearing of the decks' going on at the Upper Uruguay, and a terrible hand to hand fight seems to be imminent. Estigarribia refuses point blank to surrender. The families in the town of Uruguayana have been permitted to pass out. The Argentines and Orientals have waited so long that now they refuse to delay any longer, and General Flores has given the Brazilian General distinctly to understand that unless the attack is at once to take place he will move off his army, cross the Uruguay and drive Barrios out of Corrientes. We fully coincide with the Oriental chief. Such inexplicable delays before such a miserable town as Uruguayana, and held by an enemy so numerically inferior to the allies, would be interpreted in Europe as something very nearly approaching the white feather. Had Uruguayana been attacked within a week after the victory of Yatay the place would have succumbed at once, as it was not fortified. Every day longer makes the task more difficult for the allies. But we are assured that President Mitre would attack the place on the 11th come what would, if so, on Saturday we may expect to hear of the storming and capture of the town.

The Emperor of Brazil was 50 leagues east of Uruguayana on the 4th inst. It seems that he travels like Napoleon, on horseback: we regret to hear that the horse stumbled and his Majesty got a severe fall, but he is now all right again, attended by his two sons-in-law. He has ordered a house to be prepared for his residence at Alegrete, which is twenty leagues from Uruguayana.

Yesterday the steamer Uruguay from Montevideo, and Estrella del Norte from Rosario, brought us our exchanges, correspondence, etc. We have received a powerful article in reply to 'Mentor' and 'Canelones' on the annexation of Paraguay, which we will publish to-morrow.

Our office was visited yesterday by several leading specie brokers who desired some cotton and Eucalyptus seed. The former we supplied, the latter we have not on hand and referred them to Sr. Buschental in Montevideo, in whose princely garden we saw the finest specimens of the gum tree in the River Plate.

The rainy weather still continues to the delight of the farmers. In the South the rain has been general, in the North we have not heard yet from our friends.

We regret to notice that the Bazaar in Montevideo has proved a decided failure; the ladies of course are most indignant at the non-attendance of the gentlemen.

The paper money is the great question of the day, it is almost the same as amortized this moment and the fixed value is 25. On the Bolsa there is a slight difference of opinion, and heavy bets pro and contra are readily made on the probable price of patacons for the end of the year.

The 25th August being the Independence day of the Banda Oriental 7 noted cattle stealers were set at liberty at Cerro Largo. This seems to us a poor way to commemorate the day.

A decree has been published in Montevideo which must interest foreign Captains. All vessels from foreign ports entering Montevideo without the Consular certificate from the port of leaving will be fined 50 hard dollars which goes to the Consul.

Sr. Du. Juan Peñalba has been named Comisario to the Montevideo bank. The situation, we believe, is not heretofore but very influential.

The Embassy, from Santa Fé and Pa-

rana, is due to-day. She will bring news from that Indian-believing place called Rosario and Santa Fé. Governor Orofio is greatly censured for believing the Indian story of the invasion of the Gran Chaco; and severe comments are made at the expense of this over-credulous Governor.

The new California steamer Montana was to have left New York for Rio Janeiro on the 12th August: it is probable she will call at Montevideo on her way round Cape Horn. She will bring us seven days' later news than that of the Santiago.

At the request of a leading English gentleman of this city, we publish to-day an article from the 'Globe' of London. It may be remembered that this was one of the papers which not very long ago attacked the credit of Brazil and the Argentine Republic.

Captain Brownrigg's steamer made a splendid run home in 38 days. The passengers write that they had a most delightful passage, and speak in the highest terms of the commander.

We are informed that the number of sheep at present offered for sale in the Banda Oriental is without precedent; in every district or partido thousands of excellent mestiza sheep are offered at the very tempting price of three patacons, not counting lambs, and free of capones. Owing to the present disastrous war no buyers can be obtained. It is feared that the price will continue to decline.

Up to the latest dates received from Europe we remark that Señor Riestra had not yet been presented to the Queen. As her Majesty is now traveling on the continent it is not likely that the Argentine Minister Plenipotentiary will be presented to the Court of St. James for some months.

The 'Spectator,' one of the leading and probably most influential papers amongst the wealth and aristocracy of England, charges our esteemed British Minister, Mr. Edward Thornton, with being an Argentine.

The whole allied army has marched and will not halt until Gelly Obes pitches his tent in Curuzu Cuatia; from thence, we have no advice which way it will go, but we imagine straight for the ruined town of Bella Vista.

The attack on Uruguayana was delayed at the instance of Baron Tamandaré, who wished to bring up 5,000 more infantry from Concordia, to help in the attack. He engaged to have them up in four days, but owing to the rapid falling of the river the troops had to march all the way by land.

General Urquiza seems at last determined to assemble his men. We hear that he solicited the order from President Mitre, and will, on the 24th inst., meet his men at a place called the Yugueri.

Although we have not seen any report of the meeting, yet we believe it is an admitted fact that the name of the London & Buenos Ayres Bank has been changed. The River Plate is now becoming so well-known that the name Buenos Ayres has been stricken out as redundant. The name of this flourishing institution will henceforward be The London & River Plate Bank.

We learn with much satisfaction that Señor Klappenback's silver mines at San Juan are giving to the enterprising owner a splendid yield. Every diligence from the interior brings bar silver to Rosario from these mines. Some other mines belonging to private parties are also giving splendid yields. We gather our information on this matter from one of the managers and directors of the Argentine Diligence Company, who assures us that the freight now gained on silver is becoming a most important item.

**ARGENTINE AFFAIRS IN ENGLAND**

(Special Correspondence.)

London, August 7, 1865.

The lapse of a brief space of time crowds upon the observer of human affairs so many events, that the task of recording them becomes one of considerable difficulty—the more so as the accelerated means of transmitting news becomes more expansive day by day. "Domus et foris agré quod fit, satis semper esse," observes the poet; and at the present writing there is quite enough to be uneasy at, both at home and abroad. Notwithstanding the distracting influences of a thousand and one events, and the daily recurrence of others "Paraguay and Brazil" at the present moment forms a leading subject of comment with the 'Times' and the British press generally. The fight at Riachuelo has caused a strong feeling of interest to spring up regarding the future of your country; and an article in the 'Times' has added to public curiosity on the subject of the Paraguayan invasion.

The 'Times' gives a concise history of "mysterious Paraguay"—this "Christian Japan"—"a community" the writer observes, "unlike any other met with in modern history." The leading journal most strenuously upholds the cause of the Argentine Confederation, observing that "it appears now in a fair way of prosperity under the presidency of General Mitre.... a man endowed with considerable talent." The 'Times' denounces the acts of "Lopez the younger;" and considers that the destruction of his flotilla is finally disastrous to Paraguay. The attempt of Lopez to introduce hereditary and irresponsible monarchy, has all along been condemned by the British press; and the overthrow of this presumptuous and dishonorable man will be hailed, with delight by the liberal politicians of these Kingdoms. The 'Army and Navy Gazette' pays a high and justly deserved tribute to the gallant bravery of the Brazilians; and shows that the prowess of "Jack Tar" in hand-to-hand conflict must still form a main element of success in naval conflicts. The same paper observes that British interests require the Government of Lord Palmerston to give every possible aid to the Argentine Confederacy, and that no time should be lost in offering material assistance, compatible with the dignity of the respective countries. I will dismiss this subject by recording the pleasing fact that copious details of the events of the war were copied by all the leading journals from the 'Standard'—your paper now holding the highest position as a reliable authority in all matters relating to S. America.

England just now is threatened with a plague, the nature and characteristics of which form a subject of momentous importance to the people of South America generally.

Within the past fortnight hundreds of cattle have died off, having become infected with a disease known as the "Russian plague." This cattle disease has swept over Asia and portions of Africa during the past three years; and about six months ago entered Europe. The plague originated amongst the herds of the Tartar tribes traversing the waste Russian steppes; and the disease is of so malignant a type that within a few months, Egypt lost three million head of cattle. Already the cow-keepers alone have lost £30,000 of stock, and consternation prevails among the stock-masters, dairy proprietors, and farmers. More than a century ago, it is said, this strange disease destroyed thousands of cattle in England; yet since that period veterinary science has failed to discover any means for curing affected animals, or checking the distemper. The disease is a catarrhal affection, producing in the blood an impurity which has a tendency to work itself out in every direction—the affected animal becoming entirely covered with offensive pus-

ules. It is highly contagious—so subtle that a person going from a place occupied by diseased animals among the healthy stock, spreads the fatal infection. The Government has interdicted importation of foreign live stock, and the people are now threatened with a meat famine. There can be little doubt as to a large increase in the demand for cured meat, and as the English working population will not do without beef in some form or other, your curers will have an extended and profitable market to supply. I have given you the earliest possible information relative to the cattle plague, in order that your people may hasten to supply a great want here, and thereby increase their receipts.

Although we have an early and abundant harvest in England, business generally is somewhat depressed. The rate of interest and exchange has again advanced, and speculations in matters commercial are restricted. The cotton mills throughout Lancashire are now running full time, and this branch of staple manufacture is resuming something of its wonted prosperity. The price of wool in the English and Scotch markets still declines in presence of large foreign and Colonial imports. The impetus given to trade in America by the cessation of the war is beginning to tell on the English produce markets and imports must materially affect the price of provisions for some time to come. The immense number of new speculations launched in London on the joint-stock principle, seriously affects the success of legitimate undertakings, and foreign railways and other stock suffer slight depreciation. Although I have heard some disparaging rumours relative to proposed loans for Brazil and your Confederation, still there is every confidence amongst large capitalists, and I am confident that the 'sinews of war' will be forthcoming on fast demand. The result of the late general election is the return of a strong Liberal Government to power. The great veteran statesman of the age, Lord Palmerston, will continue to hold the helm of the State, being still full of life and spirits and as energetic in political matters as he was forty years ago.

RUMORS ABOUT URUGUAYANA.

THE PEACE BAZAAR.

Montevideo, Sept. 12, 1865.

Everything with us seems to be in a state of expectancy. All eyes are turning anxiously in the direction of Uruguayana, with a certain foreboding feeling strengthened by reports spread through the town to-day of dissensions of a grave nature amongst the allied Generals. It is currently reported, with reference to a gentleman from Salto, that General Flores and Baron Tamandaré were on the worst possible terms. Too much credit should not be given to this report, as the gentleman who first gave it is well known for the want of harmony between his political proclivities and the opinions of the governing party. Were it true, it would be the forerunner of great and unlooked-for calamities to the allied cause. It is well known that a vulgar and unmeaning prejudice against Brazil may be said to belong to the traditions both of Buenos Ayres and this State, and therefore, unless we count on greater wisdom and prudence than has yet been shown by the weaker allies, the treaty of alliance must before long become a dead letter, and perhaps, too, this may arrive before the close of the war. It seems little short of insanity, the desire to debilitate the alliance with a comparatively powerful Government like Brazil. But the desire exists, and there are but a very few who clearly weigh the merits of the question and consent to the alliance without fretting under the irksome necessity of accepting it.

In the presence of such heterogeneous elements, and a tendency to dissolve the alliance, there is no knowing what course future events may take, but that these may be of transcendent importance, and their course a wholly unexpected and unforeseen one, may be readily supposed. In the midst of all these civil jealousies and the clash of party interests, we must hope that the Emperor of Brazil will be found superior to such petty influences, and if so his presence in Uruguayana may

go far to restore at least a semblance of harmony amongst the quarrelsome chiefs.

The news of Major Fidelis's death is confirmed. This is a heavy loss for the allies, as he was one of the bravest officers in the Brazilian army.

The bazaar in the foyer of Solis in aid of the funds for a statue to Peace, still remains open, but since the first day the sales have been growing 'small by degrees and beautifully less' and bitter complaints are made of the indifference of the masculine portion of the community, as shown in the non-attendance at the Solis bazaar. The young ladies who have volunteered as occupants of the stalls are growing indignant at such scurvy treatment, and elderly matrons pointingly assure you that these are degenerate times, in which patriotism refuses to make a small sacrifice for a statue to Peace! Some prosaic cavaliers pretend they would prefer having the thing itself—a blessing we have been deprived of, it is true, for some time—rather than its representative in a marble column surmounted by Liberty with the prettiest of Phrygian caps. The desperation of some respected dames has gone so far as to lead them to declare that they intend to become renegades to their party. Now this, as it is easy to see, is a most unpromising state of things.

I am told that the statue of Peace is intended to adorn the Plaza de Cancha, in order that whenever Montevideo shall again be besieged it may serve the faithful defenders as the sacred symbols of the Egyptians did the Romans, the preventing of any hostilities in the principal entrances to the town.

I give your readers the name of a vessel that has arrived in our port this morning—a name which is certainly not remarkable for its brevity. It is quite a curiosity in its way. The vessel in question is a Dutch barque and has been baptised by its phlegmatic owner "Yonkheer-Mynheer-von-de-Walran-Puttershoek."

It would be curious to see how they describe such a name in the Custom House books, where, too, an extra column will be required for its insertion.

The dividends will be declared in London by the Directors, but the Buenos Ayres shareholders will be paid here the amount of their dividends, through the River Plate Bank, or in London at the offices of the company, should they prefer it.

The name of the new company is 'La Plata Company,' and the shares value each £10. Major Rickard, who retains a large number of shares, is chief Managing Director, and has full powers to act for the company in San Juan. He has given the old shareholders another chance of coming into the London Company on a par with them, which they must determine upon within 8 days. [See advertisement, &c.]

**THE PARAGUAYAN LEONIDAS.**

The allies having sent a second intimation, on the 2nd inst. to Colonel Estigarribia demanding the surrender of Uruguayana, \* the Paraguayan commander reiterated his intention to fight to the last. The tenor of his second reply reminds us of the heroism of the Spartans and is worthy of a nobler cause:—

Viva la República del Paraguay!

The Commander-in-chief on the Uruguay to the Representatives of the Allied Vanguard.

Head quarters Uruguayana, Sep. 5th. 1865.

The undersigned commander-in-chief of the Paraguayan Division of operations on the Uruguay acknowledges receipt of Your Excellencies' note of the 2nd inst. offering terms of capitulation.

Before entering into the subject of your communication, allow me to repel, with the decency and dignity becoming a soldier of honor, the very offensive epithets therein used towards my Government. Such language, permit me to observe, debases the note to the level of Buenos Ayrean newspapers, which for some years back have done nothing else, and apparently had no other business, than to unjustly blacken the Paraguayan Government, uttering at the same time absurd calumnies against my countrymen; but Paraguayans paid no heed to such, and continued to labor for the progress of their country, seeking only the maintenance of internal peace as the secret of a nation's greatness.

If Your Excellencies are animated with such zeal to give liberty to the Paraguayan people [as you say]—why do you not rather begin by liberating the wretched negroes in Brazil, who form the greater part of the population of the Empire and yet groan under the most horrible and afflicting slavery to enrich and fatten a few hundred grandees? Or by what authority do you presume to call our country enslaved, when the Government which directs our destinies is elected by the free and spontaneous will of the people? By virtue, perhaps, of the plea of Brazilian interference in River Plate matters, since the Empire has evidently shewn its intention to subjugate the sister-Republic of Uruguay, and probably meant also to annex Paraguay, but for our patriotic and far-seeing Government.

Your Excellencies will permit me these digressions since they are called for by the insulting expressions contained in your note, with respect to my Government.

Neither do I agree with Your Excellencies, that the soldier of honor and true patriot ought only to fight when the probabilities of success are on his side.

Open the pages of history and in that great book of mankind you will find that the greatest captains immortalized by Fame neither counted the number of the enemy nor the elements at their disposal, but conquered or died in defence of their country. Remember that Leonidas and his 300 Spartans at the Pass of Thermopylae would accept no proposals from the Persian monarch, and when told that the enemy was so numerous their arrows would darken the sun, then said he "we shall fight in the shade."

In imitation of the Spartan leader I answer, that I can listen to no proposals from the enemy, since I have been sent here with my comrades to fight in defence of the rights of Paraguay, and as their champion I must reply to Your Excellencies' enumeration of forces and artillery "So much the better, the smoke of the cannon shall be our shade."

It the fortune of war decrees us a tomb within those trenches of Uruguayana, our countrymen will cherish the memory of those who die fighting for their country, and who living never surrendered to the enemy the sacred ensign of their nation's liberties.

\* The terms offered are said to have been. 1st. That the garrison should march out with all the honors of war, desfilng with their arms in front of the allies. 2nd. That the officers should be permitted to retain their swords and provided with means of conveyance to whatever part of the world they chose, guaranteeing them a respectable maintenance during the war if they preferred to remain in Brazil or the River Plate. 3rd. That the rest of the troops lay down their arms and accept the attentions paid to prisoners of war.
