THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

ARRIVAL OF THE IBIQUY.

TELMO LOPEZ'S FEELING.

THE ENTIRE KANGOS MARCHING.

Yesterday the Argentine steamer Ibiqny arrived in the Tigre, bringing mails and passengers from the interior. In the city of Santa Fé everything is quite quiet. A grand ball was given to General Mitre, at which all the leading people of Santa Fé attended.

General Mitre was to leave Santa Fé on the 15th for Rosario, there to ship his men and start for Rosario.

People still seem to think that Telmo Lopez meditates an invasion. The 'peon' or 'vaqueano' who conducted Lopez and Carreras to Empedrado, was caught by the Correntino outposts and immediately shot.

The Santa Fé Legislature has granted 25 silver dollars a month to Mr. Elias Gollan until he concludes his studies. The concession of public lands to Don Estevan Rams will begin to take effect when the navigation is open from El Bracho to Santa Fé.

A private letter from Telmo Lopez to one of his friends states the Paraguayan army on the bank of the Parana numbers 27,000, which is divided into three columns, 1st. at San Roque, 2nd. at the Estancia Aloza at the paso de Aguirre, and the 3rd. at Cuevas: that Errasquin or Rasquin is the Commander-in-chief. The batteries are commanded by Colonel Brugues and mount 70 guns. A small boy it is said has escaped from Bella Vista in a canoe, who states that the families in Bella Vista have been ordered to embark for Paraguay, but little faith is attached to the boy's statement.

The father of Telmo Lopez fought under Belgrano, and was made prisoner in Paraguay; he escaped and afterwards became Governor of Santa Fé.

In Rosario there is a decidedly strong feeling against the Government for attaching such importance to the *bola* about the invasion of the Gran Chaco. A correspondent in the 'Cosmopolita' openly charges the authorities with having forced 'black mail' from the townspeople. Some persons had to pay 100 Bolivians to escape sleeping all night in the barracks. All the horses in Rosario have been swept away and all the native peons.

The Legislature of Santa Fé has granted to the Bank of Rosario a privilege for ten years, to emit mortgage tickets according to its statutes.

The Jefe Politico of Rosario has received increased powers and his jurisdiction has been greatly extended. He is now armed with all the powers of the Executive as far as regards Rosario.

Don Belisario Ortiz has petitioned a patent from Government for the opening of a 'matadero' and beef market in Rosario for 12 years, at a yearly rent of 4,500 patacons. The Government granted it, but the Legislature vetoed it.

Our special correspondent from Parana, under date of the 13th instant, writes as follows:—

"This week there is no news whatever, only you will see by the 'Parana' that the cavalry of Entre Rios are to meet next week. The only thing that we have notable here, is that the mission belonging to the Paraguayan Government in this place, has been marked out for the Correntino emigrants; and I hope soon that subscriptions will in some way alleviate their sufferings."

"Since the passing of the Esmeralda nothing has arrived from up river."

"The Alliance from the Uruguay arrived to-day about the sailing hour of the Ibiqny, consequently it is im-

possible to say what she may have brought, but nothing was expected.

"It is the opinion here that the Chaco being invaded by Paraguay is all a farce, as it is well known that on the arrival at Cuevas of Telmo Lopez, Carreras, and others, they immediately embarked in a steamer for Paraguay, according to the declaration of the Correntino 'baqueano' that took them from La Paz to Cuevas, and was himself taken on his return to La Paz with correspondence."

THE RIESTRA LOAN AND THE CURRENCY.

The 'Tribuna' takes up our comments of Thursday on this subject, answering *seriatim* the difficulties which, to our view, prevented the realization of so desirable a purpose as the redemption of the currency. The French paper of yesterday also pronounces one of our objections untenable. Although open to conviction and even glad that our case should be so far weakened, we cannot flatter ourselves that the new Loan will prove an Aladdin's lamp to furnish endless treasures for every imaginable or actual necessity.

For the basis of any correct calculation, it is requisite to have some positive figures to guide us. Now it is simply absurd to suppose that Mr. Riestra will be able to effect his loan at 83½, when the 'Daily News,' (a philo-Brazilian organ,) admits there is no chance of the new Brazilian loan being done over 75. Our correspondents tell us the Argentine loan will fetch about 60 or 65. At this rate we cannot expect more than seven million patacons nett.

We will admit that the 75 or 100 millions now already spent by Government need not be deducted, as the amounts due in Buenos Ayres could as well be paid in convertible specie-notes [which we had not at first remembered]; but the sum due to Brazil for advances and the actual specie remittances which may be spent before the redemption is consummated, will necessarily reduce the amount to be lodged in Bank to about 5½ millions. This sum would be barely enough to redeem all the currency, even allowing the 'doubling' process, of the Bank emitting 2 dollars paper for every patacon in the coffers.

What then remains for the Government to carry on the war, the cost of which a writer in the 'Nacional' estimates at \$80,000 silver per day.

The 'Tribuna' pretends that the expenses of the war have nothing to do with the question of the currency; but may we ask, supposing even the redemption be effected as our colleague proposes, how is the cost of the campaign to be defrayed after the present year, or must we resort to the old dodge of new emissions?

It is stated the currency can be as easily redeemed whether Sor. Riestra procures ten millions or only eight; and if this were true it might be as easy to effect it with only five and a half millions, and Messrs. Baring and Brothers might throw in half-a-dozen railways or a score of gunboats for 'yapa.' Verily, our ideas become enlarged when we talk so glibly of millions, and the prospect of such an influx of gold has blinded our colleague to the fact that if exchange falls lower than its actual rate (49½) it will be profitable to export specie and our market will be perhaps poorer than before. If the redemption of our currency depends, therefore, on importing ten millions extra, we should at once imitate the Paraguayan regulation of putting a penalty on the withdrawal of specie from the country.

There being no reason why another revolution should not take place in France before the end of the century, or why Buenos Ayres in the same period should not again quarrel with the other Argentine Provinces—much as we should regret it—it remains to be settled on a clear understanding how the paper-money and the Loan would then stand. If Buenos Ayres meantime derives the benefit of redeeming her currency, will the Confederation take all the responsibility of the debt? This would seem to be 'Irish reciprocity'—all one-sided. If there were not such jealous distinctions, keeping the Bank as Provincial property, and making this city only temporarily the metropolis of the Republic, we should

not allude to this point, but the restrictions which fence round so many minor matters render every precaution necessary in so important a measure as the one at issue.

We repeat, after having consulted many clear-headed foreigners, we believe it necessary to authorize Sr. Riestra to make the loan for 25 instead of 12 millions, and to nationalise the Bank. The destruction of Humaytá and of our fluctuating currency is then secured by a stroke of the pen.

HINTS FROM THE STOCK-EXCHANGE

LATTER THAN THE PACKET.

London, August 16, 1865.

My dear Sir,—

As it is possible that you may not receive papers by the steamer Iago, from Liverpool, herewith I enclose you two matters that may be of moment. The first is the list of diplomatic changes somewhat affecting the Plate, and the second is an article from the 'Daily News,' a thick and thin supporter of Brazil, as you are aware, shewing the difficulties in the way of the Brazilian loan. The amount sought is understood to be four millions, and it is believed that the Rothschilds have undertaken to place it, of course at a nominally very low figure for the public, and a tremendous price for the operation. Still, I think it is very probable that the loan will be a failure; for although the first appearance on the market may be an ostensible success, it is very probable that only a small portion of the nominal whole will reach the coffers at Rio and Buenos Ayres. I include the latter, for I believe its loan is pretty much in the same category as the former, and, virtually in the same financiers' hands. The truth is, as put by the 'Daily News,' why should any one here invest in any foreign loan when seven or eight per cent. can be got at home on excellent security. Borrowers from a distance forget the important change that has supervened in these latitudes; and although it may still, and does, well serve the object of 'manipulators,' to launch these undertakings, at a price, and a prodigious one, the principal parties really concerned, that is to say, the borrowing States and the lending investors, suffer severely, and will continue to do so more and more every day.

I hope you have commenced to poke up your people about the great French Exhibition of next year. It is high time to commence to make preparations.

You will see how the cattle disease, and the consternation attendant thereon, are increasing. Nice preparation for the cholera, whose prompt arrival now seems inevitable.

AN OCCASIONAL CORRESPONDENT.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday the absorbing topic in town was the new amphibious bridge, constructing by Messrs. Vandevelde Bros., of Calle Ruen Orden, for the allied army. The bridge can be thrown across any of the rivers of the interior in half an hour, and when the troops are across, wheels are put to it and it serves as a luggage van. The plans of this extraordinary bridge are at the Government House and 'Standard' office. The whole cost of the bridge will not exceed fifty thousand patacons.

The steamer Ibiqny arrived from Santa Fé yesterday, bringing passengers and mails. There is nothing new whatever from the provinces, save some rumour about an Indian invasion. From the squadron nothing.

The steamer Tala in her last trip downwards broke her shaft: it was repaired temporarily and she at last got to the Tigre but in consequence of the accident she did not leave yesterday.

We regret to say that the auction of Sr. Stegman's rams by Mr. Billingham proved a decided failure, we regret this sincerely; the highest price obtained was \$6000, but only a few were sold.

The Terere with news from Uruguayana is due to-day. The steamer will leave in the evening for Montevideo; the mole will of course be crowded, as the news of the fall of the doomed Uruguayana is hourly expected.

A go-ahead cartman ran into one of the Plaza coaches yesterday in Calle

San Martii; the occupants of the coach narrowly escaped, and the horses displayed an anxiety to clear out but were immediately stopped by a heroic policeman. The streets became so crowded, owing to the accident, that many thought the Chief of Police himself and come to grief.

One of our leading city-lawyers was yesterday placed in a very unpleasant predicament owing to one of the new ten dollar bills in his pocket having lost its color. But for the very high position of our friend, Dr. Roque Perez, he would we suppose have been walked off to the Policia. The matter has caused such attention that the gentleman in question has declined henceforth receiving any of the flash ten dollar bills. We understand that our learned friend thinks of suing Mr. Nunez, whose signature is to the bill, and claiming heavy damages for attempting to force on the public such extraordinary notes.

We have just received a copy of 'Le Commerce du Globe—Zone de la Plata.' A book abounding in the most useful statistics, and essential to every counting-house. The nice calculations which the author makes on shipping produce to English and French ports, prove the experience and labor of the author. To-morrow we will review this invaluable work.

We had no news whatever from the Uruguay yesterday. Our readers all agree with us that the delay of the allies at this miserable insignificant town is inexplicable. Had the place been assaulted immediately after the battle of Yatay, Mitre might now be before Bella Vista or Corrientes.

The paper money threatens to be soon finally settled. A gentleman, recently arrived from London, states that Sr. Riestra openly asserted in London that the paper money would be redeemed by the very gold which he was shipping.

It is rumored that the Government is about to form a new artillery corps in the city, and unfortunately one of our 'repartidores' will have to join.

The Minister of Hacienda for the province, we regret to learn has been unwell, and for some days unable to attend his office.

It was rumored that the 'Reforma Pacifica' was about to be resuscitated; but Messrs. Bell and Garcia have published a contradiction. The new paper about to be started in Montevideo will have no connection with the 'Reforma.'

The new American steamer Portena is not expected to arrive for at least twelve days. Captain Bruce's friends are beginning to look out for him, as his steamer is about due now. One of our colleagues states that the Emperor will return shortly to Rio, in order to receive the English Minister. We believe this is incorrect, as we are informed Mr. Thornton purposes leaving immediately for Uruguayana, to wait on his Majesty.

We received too late for publication a very excellent letter respecting Mr. Thornton's departure, and the propriety of giving expression, in some public manner, to the general feeling of Englishmen in the River Plate towards this deservedly popular gentleman. To-morrow we will publish the letter in question, with a few remarks.

INTERESTING about the GRAN CHACO

THE BRETE PASS.

TELMO LOPEZ.

Gentlemen,
The old Parana Pilot who informed you that at the 'Paso el Brete' above Parana the Chaco shore was only distant 5 squares from Entre-Rios is labouring under a serious mistake: this old sweet-water tar may be very familiar with the course of the main channel of said river, where the larger crafts must pass if they want to go up at all, but his knowledge of said locality is certainly confined to the main channel alone and, as it appears, he is entirely ignorant of what is beyond that which he considers the Chaco shore; this is only an Island the shores of which at said pass being higher than they usually are at others. Besides there is from that point leading towards 'the Laguna de Santa Fé' a strip of elevated land something like a road; this is favourable to drive cattle across the Island and at another pass through said Laguna; but this road is only practicable

when the river is not high. Between the main channel and the western shore there are two smaller branches of the river Parana, el arroyo de la Laguna, and el arroyo Colastiné, the last only is of importance; its mouth is at what is called in the locality 'la Boca de Santa Fé.' Let us for a moment navigate up this arroyo and we have to our right hand the Island which the pilot mistook for the Chaco shore, and to our left a peninsula called—'el Rincon': ¾ths. of the year this peninsula turns into an Island and it happens sometimes that it is entirely submerged, causing great damages. Far this peninsula is a thriving agricultural district and furnishes the finest and largest water-melons and pumpkins in the whole River Plate (population entirely natives) Besides the innumerable 'charcos' and 'quintas' there is a neat little (of late) progressing town 'San José' situated on the banks of the arroyo Colastiné. This town has a good sized church, custom house and 'Juzgado de Paz.' We follow the river in all its innumerable windings without naming all the 'rincones' and 'potreros' we find on our way. About ten leagues further north the bank to the left is gradually rising and at little town called 'Calchines' it commands a good view of the Island and the shores of Entre Rios: a little below, opposite, we can see if the weather is clear, at a distance of about 3 leagues straight line, the colony 'Villa Urquiza' or 'las Conchas.'

'Calchines' is an Indian village rather than a town, but it is laid out for a town and has a splendid new church, with about 150 inhabitants mostly Indians. A few natives speculating in the products, about the same as those raised at Rincon, of the many 'chaclas' all around this place, are settled here and all with pulperias.

This is the only point where a battery could be placed to throw balls into the Island but not into the main channel of the Parana. Now let us see how cannons could be carried to Calchines, by land above six pounders is all out of a question, because this place is all surrounded by extensive marshes, which it is true, can when the weather has been dry for nine months be vanquished with a great deal of trouble even then, but in ordinary times it's hard work to get through on horseback.

By water when the Colastiné is not dry at this place it could be managed. About two years ago I crossed the bed of this arroyo at Calchines on foot without getting water into my boots [I had my boots on my feet]. Let us continue on, but not by way of river but by land. About a league further north we find a hill [in these countries rather a strange sight]: the place very justly bears the name 'El Cerro,' but this hill although about 80 feet above the common level of the country, for a battery, is of no more use than Calchines because it lies about at same distance from main channel; now we cross woods and marshes about seven leagues and enter into an open campo called 'los campos de Cayesta,' this we may call the Chaco or the southern frontier part of the Gran Chaco. The banks of the river San Xavier here are about 100 feet high; the mouth of this branch river is a little below Hernandezias, and from the main channel to the old ruins of Cayesta this river averages a depth of 24 feet, few windings. This shore is distant from the main channel about 4 leagues, no battery could harm any vessel from going up or down. It is true that as far as here the Paraguayans could advance without any obstacles if they have Telmo Lopez with them. And this to me does not appear at all impossible nor even improbable, for when we go back to see who Telmo Lopez is and what he is, we will soon discover that the fear of an invasion from that quarter is not so unfounded, and the national Government had better keep a sharp look out on that point.

Telmo Lopez is yet a young man, about 30 and odd years of age, the son of General and Governor Estanislao Lopez and nephew of Juan Pablo Lopez ex-Governor of Santa Fé. I'll be short. Estanislao was a man of determination, very shrewd, and, a courageous soldier: he managed by all kinds of means to submit and keep at bay the different tribes of Indians for a great number of years, and with all these Indians at his orders as we may

say, he imposed Buenos Ayres in such a way, that to be good friends with him and his savages, this province paid an annuity of I am not certain how much, but a large sum of money. Santa Fé in those times (the immediate neighbourhood) as a matter of course prospered. Though their industry was confined to cattle raising, and the estancias were scattered away beyond the Cululu to the west and beyond Cayesta to the north. Every body was getting rich doing nothing, sleeping we may say; those were happy times of course for such people, and all the old folks remember that time and old 'defunto Estanislao Lopez' although dead he lives yet with them. As a matter of course some of the old man's popularity must have passed over to his son, who from his days of youth has roved all over the Chaco with his uncle Juan Pablo, and a few years ago was Commandante of the frontier forces against the Indians and made a few rather successful exploits and the peasantry rather liked him. I am afraid that, among the peasantry [gauchada] and 'monteras' he is the most popular man, and if he unfortunately should reach the frontier cantons, which are now occupied by the last named, I very much fear, they, instead of turning out against would join him to overturn the present Government. This would really be a bad job, for Santa Fé is the key of the Provinces, and the matter should be carefully attended to and reliable troops put to the frontier to prevent treachery. Telmo Lopez knows all this and besides knows all the ways and means in the Gran Chaco and it is an easier matter for him to turn all the Indian Tribes on to Santa Fé and Santiago than to place a single cannon at Calchines. Besides there is not the least doubt, but, that at all times, there is a number of persons in Santa Fé wishing to overthrow the present or any other Government, it's all the same to them which, but particularly they do not like the Government that wishes them to abide by constitutional laws and regulations.

We have seen the Basualdo affair; what can we think of it when among the chief and officers we find Juan Pablo and Telmo Lopez: what were they doing, or what did they expect to do in the Entre Riana army?

Although the reports of the Santa Fé invasion have been contradicted, it would be well to look sharp into that quarter in good time, for I ask any one, if such a thing should happen, what provisions have been made to repel such a foe? None which would prove efficacious. I know only a little of the main channel of the Parana, but much of the small streams, islands, lands, woods, camps and inhabitants of said quarters.

Whenever an opportunity offers itself again to say more about said countries I'll thank you to consult them into consideration.
