DEPARTURE OF MR. THORNTON.

In another column will be found a letter from one of our English residents which we venture to regard as an interpretation of the feelings of our community, suggesting a public meeting for the purpose of getting up a farewell dinner or some other testimonial to Mr. Thornton on the occasion of his removal from the post of British Plenipotentiary in the River Plate to the same important trust at Rio Janeiro. Few foreign ministers who have come to Buenos Ayres since the epoch of Independence have better succeeded in gaining the good opinion of the Government and people of the country, while at the same time maintaining a perfect liberty of action as becomes the dignity of a British minister.

Mr. Thornton's removal is an elevation in the diplomatic corps, and may be considered a reward for long and valuable services. He commenced his career at Turin in 1842, and after a subsequent interval in Mexico, came first to the River Plate in April 1852 (immediately after the fall of Rosas) as Secretary to Sir Charles Hotham's special mission. During the last 13 years he has seen many and great changes in these countries: he was Chargé d'affaires at Montevideo during the wars of Blancos and Colorados, then Minister at Paraná under the Presidencies of Urquiza and Derqui, and afterwards removed to Buenos Ayres when the battle of Pavon changed the destiny of the Republic. In the late ill-omened, but successful, revolution of Flores, he lent his offices towards an arrangement between the belligerents, and his failure was certainly not owing to want of energy or tact. Since the outbreak of the Paraguayan war he has carefully attended to the succor of British subjects wherever endangered. And if we descend to the tenor of everyday life among us, we find him among the most active supporters of the British Hospital, and ever ready to patronize our local associations; we have, moreover, personal knowledge of distressed British subjects generously relieved by him; and of the numerous importunate visitors seeking redress at his hands none have ever complained of an impatient or rude reception.

In acceding to the suggestion of addressing some public mark of esteem to Mr. Thornton, we consider it is deserved as something more than a compliment, and hope the British residents will at the earliest hour convoke a meeting for the purpose. Perhaps a public dinner would not be convenient under the circumstances, but there are a thousand other ways of showing our appreciation of the late Minister, which will better form the matter of discussion at a public meeting than in our columns. We have, in conclusion, to repeat (on the part of the British residents) our regret at losing Mr. Thornton, who takes with him to his new position the best wishes of all and the assurance that in his hands the restored relations of Great Britain and Brazil will be preserved with credit to himself and to the Government he represents.

THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

ARRIVAL OF THE TEVERE.

URUGUAYANA WILL HOLD OUT.

CONFERENCE AND WHITE FEATHERS.

The steamer Tevere arrived yesterday from Concordia bringing three days later news from the seat of war. On the 10th the Brazilian Minister of War arrived at Uruguayana. On the 12th the Emperor was expected; as to the whereabouts of President Mitre we could find out nothing, only that as yet

he had not arrived at Uruguayana. Col. Bustillos arrived in the Tevere, we hear on a mission to the Government. The two Paraguayan peace-makers Decoud and Iturburu have again had interviews with the officers of the garrison, and it was generally supposed so much negotiation had gone on that ultimately Estigarribia would come to terms. Again from passengers come down in the steamer we hear a contrary version, and that the Brazilians have at last commenced to bombard the place. The Emperor had halted at Alegrete, but was about to push on. Urquiza when last heard of was at his saladero in Concepcion, Santa Candida. The allied army was in the same place. The news of the invasion of the Gran Chaco by the Paraguayans had caused intense excitement at Concordia. The 'bola' was believed by every one. The Entre Rianos are all assembling: horses and men in good condition. Urquiza meets them at Yuqueri.

Things were getting dull at Concordia; hotel bills more moderate and everything cheaper, save horses and postillions; bullock carts are also at a premium.

THE MONTEVIDEAN 'TIMES.'

The 3rd. number of the Montevidean 'Times' is at hand; we notice that our Anglo-Oriental colleague although started as a weekly paper is only published once a fortnight; owing to the demise of Mr. Buggeln, who, it appears supplied all the funds, the editor has been obliged to publish the following notice:—

TO THE BRITISH PUBLIC.

"The re-appearance of the 'River Plate Times' in this City depends upon the steps that may be taken by the representatives of the late Mr. Buggeln, or by the Public, in continuing the requisite guarantee for payment of all the expenses attendant upon its publication."

From this notice many would suppose that the British public in Montevideo were unable to support a paper. This is not so, as can be proved by our list of subscribers in that city and the country districts, which is more than sufficient to support a respectable weekly paper, published once a week. The Montevidean 'Times' is too dear (2s. per No.) to live save by subsidy, and too dry to expect any public support; however talented the editor may be, he demonstrates his inexperience by forcing on his readers six columns of jerked beef; no English reader in the Plate can digest such a lengthy and insipid subject. The news of the day is purposely excluded to make room for clippings from home newspapers. Three of the most atrocious murders ever heard of were perpetrated at Carmelo about a fortnight ago; two days after the tragedy we published full details, and a week after we gave the particulars of the capture of the assassin.

The Montevidean 'Times' which is supposed to be the English organ in the Banda Oriental instead of giving fuller details than the 'Standard' of Buenos Ayres, fills its columns with uninteresting matters such as "Sounds we cannot hear" 2 (columns) Trial of Dr. Pritchard, Calcraft, Seward's demands on England and France, the vote of censure on the Lord Chancellor, and a subject of the most vital interest to English residents, such as the butchery of poor Mr. Campbell and his family, only deserves the following notice.

"A Scotch shepherd has been killed near Carmelo, but at present we cannot furnish guaranteed details: the holders of letters said to contain them declining to give them without a pledge that the whole correspondence (unseen) shall be published."

Can our readers now wonder that our Oriental colleague can only subsist by subsidies.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday the arrival of two steamers, one from Concordia and the other from Montevideo, filled the town with news, although none of our colleagues published a bulletin. From Uruguayana nothing very particularly new, but from Montevideo the startling news of a collision in the harbor between the steamer Galileo and an Italian barque. We regret to say that two sailors belonging to the barque were drowned.

The damage done to the Galileo was trivial—she leaves to-day. At the Buco a French vessel was blown on shore, but it is hoped the Decidde will get her off.

Our popular and deservedly respected British Minister left yesterday for Concordia, en route for Uruguayana. Sr. Elizalde, Minister of Argentine Foreign affairs, was to have gone up along with him, but owing to some official business was detained. Mr. Thornton, we believe, will return to Buenos Ayres previous to leaving for Rio Janeiro.

To-morrow the Boca Railroad will be open to the public. The first train will start from town at 7 o'clock. Those of our friends who wish to make a cheap and pleasant excursion can not do better than ride down in the cars to the Tres Esquinas—the trains run every hour.

The paper-money is still the great question of the day. The Provincial Chambers, have now, at the request of the Government, taken the matter up, and will probably settle it in full at this session. It is proposed now to sell in London all the National Bonds which the Bank holds, at the highest price which they will fetch. The probabilities are that the legislators will settle the value of the paper dollar, and thus shut up for a time the Bolsa.

We learn that Mr. Kirk, one of the principal breeders of pure Saxony merino rams, has sold out the whole of his famous establishment and shipped the animals for Montevideo and Buenos Ayres. Mr. Kirk's breed was distinguished for abundance and fineness of wool, strength of limb, and numerous progeny; and having obtained several prizes at European Exhibitions, and being favorably known in all wool-growing countries, especially France, United States, Australia and Cape of Good Hope. We expect shortly to announce the arrival of these animals in the River Plate.

Our joke about specie-brokers to be thrown out of employment by redeeming the specie will probably be taken up by the 'Mosquito'; we were told that yesterday several brokers were seen buying hoes and spades, with the probable intent of cotton-planting, Eucahyptus, etc.

Plans of the new town of Jeppener, nicely lithographed, may be seen at this office: we understand the owner will sell lots at reasonable prices.

We have received a note in a feigned writing, signed by a Ladies' Committee, in answer to the Bachelors' Meeting at the Retiro, but the letter, unfortunately proved a 'fiasco'; it is not of public interest.

The Police report mentions the arrest of 14 gamblers in a 'hell' on the beach, quite close to the Government House.

A woman in Brazil concealed her sex to enlist in the army: in England she would have been sent to prison; here they endeavor to make her a Joan of Arc.

GOVERNOR SAAVEDRA ON THE REDEMPTION OF THE CURRENCY.

Buenos Ayres, Sep. 14th 1865.
To the Hon. Legislature of the Province of Buenos Ayres.

The Executive, being still bent on the idea of redeeming the paper-currency and impressed with the necessity of speedily carrying out the same, has the honor to propose to your Hon. Chambers a measure which will efficaciously contribute towards this result, satisfying in this manner the most legitimate desire of the commercial body and the public in general.

This measure consists in sending to Europe the 5 million \$ of National Public Funds now forming part of the capital of the Provincial Bank, to sell them at the best possible price over the rate at which they were purchased, and add the amount so produced to the reserve-fund which the Bank is bound to have in answer to its emission, conformably to the law of November 3rd. 1864.

In the present state of the money-markets in England and on the Continent, it seems the disposal of these funds will offer no difficulty, especially since the Bank will take charge of paying the interest and thus present to the lender the double guarantee of the Nation and the Province.

The considerable amount of specie

which, owing to extraordinary causes, is now flowing into our market comes unexpectedly to favor the project of redemption; but as this can only be done on the solid basis of a sufficient disposable capital to be possessed by the Bank making such an operation, it is clear that we must begin by providing the same.

The political situation of the country will not, at present, allow us to count on the resources which in normal times we might have realized from the sale of Public Lands, and this makes it doubly necessary for us to resort to the only means now remaining, if the Legislature wishes to take this step for the purpose of conferring on the country the inestimable benefit of ridding it of a paper-currency whose existence is so injurious to its most solid interests.

The Government, therefore, begs you will turn your attention to this important matter and grant the authorization solicited, to sell in Europe the National Public Funds on the conditions and for the purposes hereinbefore expressed.

IMPORTANT NEWS ABOUT PRESERVED BEEF.

THE MORGAN SYSTEM SUCCESSFUL.

Montevideo, Sept. 13th.

Gentlemen,—

I write to say that unavoidable circumstances have detained my voyage to Europe till now, but I will proceed without further delay per French packet on the 15th inst. My object in going is to make definite arrangements with the new Company to carry out the Morgan system of curing beef, etc., on a very extensive scale—what we have done hitherto has only been by way of samples. Yesterday, by English mail I received a report on a small cargo of samples sent by me in June last per steamer Pavon; the result is most satisfactory, viz., that they arrived in a perfect condition.

By the Cordova, which left here on the 7th inst., I have also sent forward some two hundred barrels of preserved beef and mutton, and from which I expect a much better result than former lots. There is now no doubt whatever of the result of this wonderful and truly interesting discovery of Dr. Morgan, viz., that it is the cheapest, most rapid, most simple, and by far the most secure way of preserving beef and mutton, and that all meats so preserved will last almost an indefinite period. We have had samples sent from all parts of the world to England; in particular, I may mention, two barrels that were sent from Australia to Liverpool on the deck of a sailing vessel; during the whole of the voyage, some 90 days, they were kept exposed to the sun, and when opened on arrival, after having stood such a strong test as crossing the line in the sun, the meat was found in perfect condition, and quite equal to the day it was packed. As a still greater proof of the great power of this process I may tell you, that on the 31st of last August I tried a 'horse' by this system, using a very powerful injection; in one hour afterwards, through a small opening in the abdomen we removed all the entrails, &c., and had the cavity refilled for a few days with dry salt, after which it was removed, this animal now remains perfectly sound and is thoroughly cured, the flesh being quite hard and sound, and can be seen any day in the Galpon of the Saladero, where it lies from the day it was prepared, of course with the hide on, hide, the hair of same is also quite firm and has no tendency to come off. We have now got Patents for England, France, United States, Australia, Falkland Islands, Banda Oriental, and Republic of the Argentine States, &c. for a period of many years for each country and very shortly expect to have agents and establishments in full working order in these places. Enclosed I send you a copy of what Baron Liebig says on the subject.

And now I gentlemen must conclude, wishing both of you, during my absence of three or four months from this country, happiness and prosperity.

MR. THORNTON AND THE BRITISH RESIDENTS.

Buenos Ayres, 15th Sept. 1865.
To the Editors of the 'Standard.'

Gentlemen,
In your paper of this day there is a paragraph headed "Diplomatic Service." The opening sentence of which is "Mr. Thornton now Minister at Buenos Ayres is to be Minister at Rio Janeiro."

The residents in Buenos Ayres have, of course, since the arrival of the last mail, been more or less prepared for this unwelcome information, and I for one have waited with impatience to see some steps taken to give a public expression to the feelings of the British Community on the subject. The time is gradually slipping past, and it becomes the more necessary that action in the matter should be taken, especially as it is generally understood that the remainder of Mr. Thornton's time here will be limited. Therefore for want of a better champion of the cause I enter the lists, and all the more readily as I will have all Buenos Ayres on my side, being persuaded not one single dissident will be found to the proposition I have to offer. Unfortunately for us who are compelled by circumstances to spend, at least a portion of our lives in exile, it is but seldom we have the good fortune to find ourselves in a country where England is represented by so worthy a man as the present British Minister to the Argentine Confederation. His popularity with the Government to which he is accredited is notorious—his uniform watchfulness over the interests of British subjects is equally so. His frank and cordial manner have endeared him to all who have had the pleasure of his acquaintance. In every way whether in public or private life our British Minister: and his family are equally popular, and Mr. and Mrs. Thornton will carry with them our best wishes for their happiness, and the assurance that their names will long be remembered in the River Plate with the warmest feelings of regard.

Let us therefore without loss of time give some united expression to our feelings either by a public dinner to Mr. Thornton or some other means which may be considered suitable. I would suggest, Messrs. Editors of the 'Standard' that you give your readers a leading article advocating the cause, and calling upon our very worthy Consul, Mr. Parish, [who from his intimate relations and friendship with Mr. Thornton may otherwise have delicacy to act in the matter] to convene a meeting of the British residents to consider the most desirable form of giving expression to the crude ideas advanced in this letter.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

GREAT DEATH OF NEWS.

THE LATE MR. BUGGELN'S PAPER.

Montevideo, Sept. 15, 1865.

To the storm of rain and wind yesterday has succeeded fine calm weather. I have again to chronicle some disasters to the shipping in port. The Italian barque Carlota, from Genoa with emigrants, broke from her moorings in the roadstead and came into collision with the Galileo. The damage however to the steamer is insignificant, but the Carlota drifted ashore very near to Sr. Capurio's 'aguadero' on the beach. At the moment of coming in contact with the Galileo six men from the Carlota jumped from on board of her and got safely at the steamer's deck.

A messenger arrived in town this morning from the Buco reports that the French barque Lucie, from Cardiff, loaded with coal, had gone ashore. The French steamer Decidde has left for the Buco this morning to render what assistance she can at the scene of the wreck.

There is scarcely anything besides of any interest, to communicate. It would be only tiring your readers to speak of our newspaper controversies, and I will content myself with mentioning that the question of the Sisters of Mercy, and their merits and demerits, are still on the tapis, that is to say, they continue to be treated of in our daily papers. The Commission named by Government to examine into the

administration by this Sisterhood of the hospital confided to their care, has not yet made public their report, but it is said to be favorable to the much-abused Sisters of Mercy. The alleged abuses are scarcely to be called such unless I am very badly informed, or at least have faded into very insignificant proportions under the searching scrutiny of the Commission named 'ad hoc' by Señor Torriola, our Minister for the Home Department. The publication of the result of their labors will doubtless excite a renewed discussion, and I hear that more than one admirer of Monsieur l'Abbé * * * and Monsieur Michelet are sharpening their pens to commence a new tirade against this useful charitable institution.

The want of 'discipline,' an absence of 'habitual' subordination to laws, and rules, has been spoken of with too much reason as the 'curse of these countries.' Without venturing so far myself, it is too evident to all thoughtful minds that a restlessness under restraint of any kind has much to do with the present ultramontane movement. Such, united with the Masonic crusades, gives such an energy of self-will to the destructive movement that the ultimate result can no longer be doubtful.

The worst of it is that the confusion of tongues is growing each day faster and more furious. The 'reformatory' propaganda is supported by those who when they inspire confidence, inspire but little respect, and when they inspire respect, they inspire unfortunately little confidence.

Too many of them belong to that body of whom Oliver Goldsmith once said that "They eat mutton cold, and cut blocks with a razor!"

The Postal Reform has not met with general approbation. I notice this with great surprise, because the reductions already made are so calculated as to leave the Post-Office revenue almost at zero, after paying the necessary expenses of administration.

The article in the 'Siglo' of to-day, signed 'A,' attacks this Government measure, and calls on the Executive for greater liberality in its pretended reforms. To place the matter in its true light, it is well to mention that the writer in the 'Siglo' falls into an error when he speaks of the amount of reduction on the scale of postage. In my former letter I gave a synopsis of the new rates, and a comparative scale of the reductions. The smallest amount payable on a letter from Europe was nine vintens, or 18 cts., and not 12 cts., as 'A' erroneously supposes. The present charge is 10 cts., or five vintens, being a reduction of nearly one half. All the other reductions and modifications are proportionally favorable to the public, neither could it well be otherwise when we consider that the sole object that the Minister of Finance and his able coadjutor, Sr. Gutierrez, could have in view would be the framing of a reform acceptable to the general public.

It is a motive of congratulation that the reform has been already inaugurated, and if the well known principles laid down by the article of 'A,' of a cheapened article augmenting in a manifold degree the demand, hold good in our case, as they undoubtedly will, the present reduction of nearly one half on the former postal rates must so increase the Post Office revenues as to put the Executive in a position to make still further and more considerable reductions after the lapse of two or three years.

Till then I think we may well rest and be thankful, for there is something in such thorough reforms as some of us seem to advocate, that inspires a want of confidence.

The 'River Plate Times' has again appeared in an edition for the packet, this being the third number. I notice an advertisement in this paper that the continuance of this journal will depend in future on the success of certain arrangements connected with the late Mr. Buggeln's estate, and the subscriptions which some other parties may be disposed to make towards its support.

It will be much to be lamented if such a well-conditioned and useful paper as the 'River Plate Times' should have to cease through want of timely aid. I am told, however, that there are great hopes of its being enabled to continue.

Buenos Ayres British Clerks' Provident Association.

The annual meeting of the members of the association was held in the British Library on Tuesday evening, the 5th instant.

The chair was taken by the President, Mr. J. A. Stanfield, who gave a brief 'resumé' of the position of the society, expressing also his desire to see more new members joining...

THE REPORT

For the half-year, ending Aug. 31, 1865:

Upon the occasion of its fourth anniversary, your committee had hoped to be able to report favorably with regard to the position of this society, but it is with the deepest concern that they find themselves compelled to lay before you a statement which but too plainly shows that without fresh impulse is derived from the accession of new members...

The following is a copy of the balance sheet to the 30th of August, which has been duly approved—

Upon this the committee have to observe that at no time since the foundation of the society has so favorable an interest been obtained...

Members' loan account as usual is very large. This sum has since, however, been balanced by transfers to share ledger account. In view of the high rate obtained for the funds at interest, the committee have charged 1 1/2 per cent upon these loans.

Bills receivable, &c., may be considered to represent the actual capital of the society, as the cash on hand has already been devoted to paying off retiring members.

Share ledger account—This represents the amount standing at the credit of the 25 members of the association.

Interest account—The amount standing to credit in this account represents interest on bills not yet due, and as usual has been carried as a reserve to next half-year.

During the past six months two members of the committee have sailed for Europe, Messrs A. Kerr and A. le Rosignol. One of the auditors also, Mr. Carrol, has left the country.

When at the foundation of this society no fewer than 58 British clerks were found desirous of becoming members, the gentleman to whose philanthropy and energy it was mainly owing that Buenos Ayres for the first time possessed an institution of this nature...

It is for the remaining members to decide whether with such reduced numbers it is practicable to carry on the association, but the committee, on their part, earnestly deprecate the allowing so invaluable an institution to fall to the ground...

It has been repeatedly pointed out by former committees, that the very considerable trouble and responsibility which they voluntarily incur, can only be repaid by the knowledge that their labors are in some manner appreciated.

Your committee may therefore fairly be allowed to deplore the utter want of interest in the progress of the society and of consideration to themselves which was evinced by the shareholders on the occasion of the last half-yearly meeting...

In returning into your hands their delegated authority, it is with no little satisfaction that your committee point to the result of this last half-year, which shows that they have given a care to your interests, and at the same time that they have never lost sight of the great essential, 'security.'

In conclusion, the committee has again to refer to the unfeeling kindness of the Messrs. Mulhall in opening the columns of the 'Standard' to our reports and advertisements; and to the committee of the British Library who so kindly continue to afford us the use of these rooms.

The report was then adopted, and the chairman stated that the members present would then be called upon to elect the new committee for the ensuing year.

The spirit of the meeting was decidedly in concurrence with the committee in deprecating the idea of allowing the association to fall through, and the following members were chosen:—

President—Mr. John Thomson. Committee—Messrs W. McKinlay, U. Smith, A. L. Thomson, J. E. Willmott, James Turner, William McGill, Auditors—Messrs. J. P. Stanfield, George Chisholm. Substitutes for Committee—Messrs. Charles Nuttall, J. Cummins. Substitutes for Auditors—Messrs. A. Millroy, J. McCrae.

The meeting then proceeded to votes of thanks to the retiring President and Committee; also to the Messrs. Mulhall, and to the Library Committee.

Mr. McCrae, on the part of the Library Committee, said that they should be most happy that the rooms should continue at the disposal of the society.

Several new gentlemen were also proposed as being anxious to become members of the association, and the proceedings then terminated.

There were becoming clamorous for the prohibition of the importation of foreign cattle, a measure the immediate effect of which would be to increase the pressure of the meat famine, by enhancing the value of native cattle very far beyond present rates.

It may readily be conceived, adds Mr. Neill, that in these circumstances, any quantity of 'good' Monte Videan beef would meet with a ready sale at a price that would yield a large profit to the shippers; but as he has so incessantly iterated, any but really good beef would now, more than ever, confirm hostile prejudices, and enable interested parties to close the British door against the admission of Rio Plata meat...
