GREAT DAY FOR BUENOS AYRES.

OPENING OF THE BOCA RAILWAY.

If the 17th of September, 1861, is a day cherished by Portefios, and commemorated by Argentines for the victory of Pavon, from whence sprang the present happy progressive order of things, after a long dreary period of anarchy and misrule, with much greater reason should the 18th of September, 1865, be commemorated by the residents of Boca and Barracas, as the great day of emancipation from the thraldom of greasy diligences and unfathomable mud. On yesterday, the ever-to-be-remembered 18th of September, 1865, a greater victory than Pavon was won by Messrs. Wheelwright, Coghlan, and Simpson—the long-talked of Boca Railway was opened to the public. The dream of the 'barraquero,' the hope of the lighterman, the ambition of the ship-builder was accomplished. At seven o'clock, a.m., the first train, with a motley collection of hide-brokers, 'barraqueros,' and boatmen started for the Boca and Tres Esquinas. The first train from Barracas left at eight, taking up to the city a respectable number of passengers. At the Boca station the 'barraqueros' who had left town per first train were now ready to return, having finished their business for the morning. The second train from Barracas left at ten o'clock, the most convenient hour for editors who are up all night writing for the insatiable English-reading public. The rain on Sunday night tended to increase the profundity of the mud at the Tres Esquinas. As we approached the temporary station, we noticed that the rails were laid right across the Calle Larga, and thus more effectually blocking up the thriving establishment of the laird of the River Plate, Mr. Marshall, than even the questionable earthworks of the allies round Uruguayana. Marshall requires the heroism of Estigarribia to look on quietly at the besieging workmen as they raise the embankments which must isolate him from Calle Larga civilisation. At ten o'clock precisely we took our seats in the splendid American railway carriage. The whistle given off we started. The train was composed of two long passenger cars and a luggage van catering to the customs of the age. The sympathetic Mr. Coghlan has set apart one car for smokers. We skirted along the commercial banks of the Riachuelo, then before us lay the old Villa del Salto, with Marshall and his men hammering away, repairing what civil war and fire had all but destroyed. On one side lay ships, on the other 'barraquero's' establishments: we ran through Lavallol's with the same 'sang froid,' as if that name had never lent a Governor to Buenos Ayres. On, on, we steamed, and leaving the sinuosities of the river, by dint of a half moon curve, we head for town. Now leaving the dull region of bones, bone-ash, hides and wool, we slowly approached the Boca station, and arrived precisely in 5 minutes from the time of starting. Here we noticed immense reserves of rolling-stock, a good permanent and respectable station. It is situated about 200 yards from the Boca settlement, but we remarked that a small branch, evidently for the purpose of carrying produce, runs down to the very mole. Having taken in passengers we started, and now for the first time the road becomes monotonous; we dash over the green sward of an extra all-uvial soil, but there is nothing to relieve the eye, no living birds nor bleating flocks, and the Argentine wealth and grandeur. A low level swampy ground, by the magic hand of nature, has yielded half an inch of watery ve-

station on either side of the road. The speculative genius of a leading English specie broker has dignified this swamp with a name, but left it without a name. No modern wire fence or antique ditch marks out the property of him who treads the Bolsa with the dignity of a Rothschild, and the composure of a 'millionaire.' As we glanced over the swampy plain, our mind involuntarily recurred to cotton. What a magnificent spot for a plantation! Possibly the provident proprietor, when he purchased this property, had an eye to this, and at last was convinced of the grandeur of the cotton plant; perhaps even at the busiest hours of 'Change, he repeated the words of the almost inspired poet—
 O sacred, wise and wisdom giving plant,
 Mother of Riches, now I feel thy pow'r
 Within me clear, not only to discern
 Things in their causes, but to trace the ways
 Of greatest brokers deem'd however wise.
 Then we came up by the Yellow House, a domicile more famed for the color of its front than anything else; here we understand a station will be subsequently erected; we now ran under the hanging gardens of the Argentine merchant-prince Don Gregorio Lezama; further on we noticed the costly brick-works of Mr. Shaw, where are manufactured the finest and best bricks in the Argentine Republic, under the auspicious management of Mr. Colton who with the unmistakable ease of a true-born Englishman, stood on his threshold quietly smoking his pipe and surveying the train as we passed. Now we came up on a sort of 'rus in mare'—trees of stunted growth with dilapidated seats point to the ruin of Cazon's brightest hopes—the place was intended as a sort of promenade, but the beating waves of the Plate, and the uncouth habits of the dusky washerwomen who frequent the shore have long since frightened nursery maids and children from this picturesque spot. Right along the river, with a splendid view of the shipping in the outer roads, we now approach the city. 'Ill is the wind that blows no good.' The Paraguayan war, which the majority regard as a curse, has proved an unmistakable blessing for this railway.
 An extra line with embankment and sleepers is laid along the shore to keep back the surf and secure the track. The rails on this extra line belonged to the Paraguayan Government, and were shipped from England for the Asuncion and Villa Rica Railway: they were embargoed in port, and sold by the Argentine Government at a moderately cheap price to the Boca Railway. We now are in the busy part of town and in an instant the train stops at the Calle Venezuela Station, precisely ten minutes after our departure from Barracas. Here the Station is commodious, large and well constructed. The line will eventually be carried over the Custom-House and into the plaza 25 de Mayo, but the iron works for this expensive scheme are not yet finished in England. It is our pleasing duty to remark on the great solidity which characterizes the works of the Boca Railway: the train ran along smoothly and without a single jolt; the sleepers are only a couple of feet apart, and all of hard wood. The Locomotives, Ensenada, and the Boca, are a credit to the home manufacturers: they were made at the Canada works, Birkinhead; the carriages were constructed in New York, and are on the American plan, having neat easy cane bottom seats; and the long smoking cars are every thing that a lover of the weed may require. The Boca railway meets a want long felt, it will, we predict, do an immense traffic as the charge \$5 to Barracas is within the reach of all; the road is a credit to our friends Messrs. Coghlan and Simpson, who have been untiring in their labors to bring it to a happy completion. Our readers will find the time-table in another column, and when the weather is fine we recommend all to make an excursion to that delectable locality known as the Tres Esquinas.

THE SPRING CAMPAIGN.

The slow progress of the war and experience which we have now attained of the strength of the belligerents suffice to show that the campaign, far from being a three-month's affair as at first supposed, will in all likelihood be only half gone through by the

close of the present year, even supposing the allied arms proceed from victory to victory, without a single serious reverse. If the five months already elapsed since the commencement of hostilities seem almost barren of result to the allies, and find the latter far as ever from Asuncion, it must be remembered that military operations depend greatly on the season.
 With the battle of Yatay we may be said to have begun the Spring campaign, and the same good fortune will soon crown the siege of Uruguayana. All idea of that garrison being relieved by Lopez is abandoned, so that it can hardly hold out another month; and by the middle of October we may expect to see the Uruguay freed from the invaders. Meantime Gen. Urquiza will have re-assembled his cavalry, the new levies from Rio Grande will have come up, and the whole allied army, over 50,000 men, will prepare for the second and more arduous act in the drama, of expelling the Paraguayans from their ill-acquired possessions on the Paraná. The month of November promises us much marching, manoeuvring, counter-marching, and skirmishing, on the banks of the Santa Lucia, Batel, Corrientes and other more or less important rivers. The allied fleet will receive a valuable reinforcement in the iron-clads which should be then arrived, and a joint attack by land and water must infallibly crown the events of 1865 by driving the enemy from Bella Vista, Cuebas and Corrientes, to fall back within the frontier extending from Humayta to Itapua.
 Of course many enthusiastic Argentines and Brazilians feel morally certain of spending Christmas day in Asuncion; but to our idea the conquest of Paraguay is twenty times more difficult than the redemption of Rio Grande and Corrientes. If the allies succeed in driving Lopez and his boasted army of 100,000 men back to Paraguay by the end of the year, the nation will have no reason to complain of the generalship and energy of President Mitre.
 It would be neither wise nor polite of us to express the same opinion as the 'Spectator,' "that any attempt to conquer Paraguay must prove a failure": suffice it to say that only those who have seen something of the interior of that country can form an idea of the impregnable defences erected by Nature as if to protect the descendants of the warlike Guaranis from more powerful neighbors.
 During the hot summer months in the beginning of 1866, the allies will begin to feel the real difficulties of carrying the war against Lopez into his own country. The determination and elements of the former may surmount torpedoes, batteries &c. and raze the forts of Humayta to the ground, for Napoleon used to say nothing was impossible. It would remain to be seen if this would annihilate Lopez, or whether the allied arms must be carried into the interior as far as Villa Rica. But all this must require time, and months pass away speedily.
 The Spring campaign, we repeat, will prove very important and we trust no less advantageous to the allies. The capture of Uruguayana will be a good beginning; and then events will speak for themselves more eloquently and perhaps even more rapidly than we have endeavored to shadow forth in this prospective glance.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The steamer Uruguay arrived from Concordia bringing the news of the attack on Uruguayana. The allied army had at last begun firing, although some parties who come by the steamer state that as yet not a shot has been fired on the town: it is impossible to say which version is correct; we give our readers both, so that they may take their choice. The allied army under Gelly-Obes was marching when last heard from. In Entre-Rios, all the gauchos were galloping to the 'cuarteles' and Urquiza was preparing to leave Concepcion. In Salto there was nothing new, several estancias for sale. In Concordia things so dull that a general selling out by auction was anticipated.
 Yesterday was a sort of Liverpool day in Buenos Ayres: rain and sunshine. More of the former than the latter.

The Espigador from the fleet is due this morning. We look with anxiety for our Equina correspondent's letter.
 Respecting Mr. Thornton's departure, we hear several English gentlemen, taking our own and our correspondent's view of the matter, are about to form themselves into a committee and wait on Mr. Pariah about the matter.
 In our edition on Sunday we referred to a German gentleman, a celebrated sheepbreeder, Mr. Kind, who was about to emigrate to the River Plate, by some error the name which appeared in our columns was 'Kirk.' We wish to correct the mistake, as there are many persons in Buenos Ayres who are well acquainted with Kind, one of the most celebrated German sheepbreeders.
 It is rather a strange fact that although on most public occasions the Chief of Police of Montevideo gives a ball or party, our esteemed friend, Mr. Cazon, never attempts anything of the kind. When the last steamer left Montevideo the sole topic was the sumptuous ball which the Chief of Police of that city was about to give. Now as we are all expecting glorious news from Uruguayana, and as our popular Chief has a large capacious house in Calle Moreno near the Plaza Monserrat, we think there is no excuse whatever for our Chief of Police not imitating the very praiseworthy and agreeable example set him by his colleague down in the Mount.
 A correspondent of one of our colleagues, we notice, passes some very severe comparisons between the reception which President Mitre got at Concordia and the treatment he received at Concordia; in the latter town the most unmistakable hostility to the allies was shown, whilst in the former the whole population turned out to receive his Excellency. There seems to be little doubt as to the peculiar sympathies of the Concordians.
 Mr. Foley, who left some months ago for the allied army, as aid to Col. Cobo, has returned owing to a severe attack of dysentery.
 All the streets in Montevideo are to be ornamented by nice porcelain slabs on each corner with the name of the street thereon. The gentleman who got this contract is Sr. D. Eugenio Corras, of the well known house of E. Corras & Co., formerly Petit & Co.
 The grand attack on the town of Uruguayana, according to the latest dates was to have begun on last Friday at daybreak. If it took place the Rio de la Plata will probably bring the news to-morrow.
 On Saturday morning the allied army was to have resumed its march from Gualaguaycito in whatever direction General Gelly Obes led them. We believe the quondam War Minister rides on Changador, the well known racer, and always keeps slightly in advance of the regiments. The health of the army, we are glad to say, is considerably improved and the soldiers all in the very best spirits.
 The Dutch vessel which arrived in Montevideo the other day with such a terrific long name that it is unsusceptible of pronunciation by Englishmen, has made one of the shortest voyages on record. She comes consigned to Messrs. Arning & Hutz, of this city.
 We regret to say that another sereno or policeman has died from the effects of the severe burns which he received in trying to save some property at the late fire in Calles Chacabuco and Belgrano. The total loss of property at this fire is estimated at \$700,000 mpc.
 An English gentleman, who does not wish his name to be published, has authorized us to say that he proposes giving a splendid cup to the Foreign Racing Society, to be run for each year. He intends sending to England for the cup.
 One of our morning colleagues states that the North American residents in the River Plate propose sending to President Johnson an album with their signatures, to show their respect and regard for him. This is the first notice we have had of this measure, which, tho' customary here, is comparatively speaking unknown in the States.
 The greatest Argentine dramatist of the day is Dr. Paz. On Friday night a new play called Charity, written by

this talented young man, was played in the Victoria.
 The creditors of Lino Sanchez & Co. were called upon to sound in their claims on or before the 20th inst. This case is the one which attracted so much attention a few weeks past.
 The new steamer Lincoln, about to be launched by Sherman & Co., has obtained from Government the privileges allowed to packet steamers. She will run, we believe, on the Upper Uruguay.
 The total products of the Grand Peace bazaar in Montevideo only reach \$3,000. It appears the ladies are highly indignant at the result.
 From the Province of Bioja the news is very unfavorable. We read that the Government troops under Linares have been defeated by the 'montonera.' It is supposed that the militia of the adjoining provinces will aid the Governor in putting down the 'montonero.'
 The contingents of San Luis, Mendoza and Cordova, according to latest advices, were within three days of Rosario. They will all march with Gen. Mitre, when he returns from Santa Fé, for Concordia.
 Mr. Hector Varela is with the vanguard in front of Uruguayana: he wears a long clerical overcoat and has the appearance of a friar.
 We notice that for some reason or other the interesting army correspondence of Col. Palleja has ceased. It is generally supposed that this is at the request of President Mitre, who, like Grant, hates war correspondents and army letters.
 On last Wednesday, during the heavy rain, two children were overtaken on one of the roads leading from one of the corrales; they sought shelter in the ditch, but the rain continuing, soon a rapid torrent came rolling down from the corrales, which threatened to sweep away the poor frightened children; luckily, two peones riding by at the moment heard the cries of the children and hastened to their assistance. They were all but drowned; five minutes more and they must have perished. The peons took them to their homes and were well rewarded by the parents.
 Murders are, we regret to say, of such frequent occurrence in the camp that they attract too little notice in this country. We all recollect the lottery-boy murder which was perpetrated in broad daylight and in the most public place in town, namely, the office of the 'Defensor de los menores.' Had such a thing occurred in England, it would have caused such a sensation and made such a noise that if the murderer was not caught, tried and hung, the ministry would be turned out; yet here in Buenos Ayres the tragedy is now almost forgotten. What is the consequence? To-day we record a murder committed in the very Policia. What shall we say of a Chief of Police and his subordinates, when such things occur in the very heart of this city, and in the house where of all others the greatest peace and order is supposed to reign? It is lucky for Mr. Cazon that he is not Chief of Police of London, Dublin or Edinburgh.
 On next Thursday the new Bishop of Parana will be consecrated at the Cathedral in this city. We believe it will be a very grand affair.
 The rain, we learn from a friend in the North, has been general up in that direction. The farmers are all now in the best of spirits.
 The movement in public lands is beginning to be much greater than usual; 162 petitions were despatched by the Topographical Department during last month.

THE SAN JUAN SILVER-MINES.

The return of Major Rickard, after forming his new Co. in London, will give fresh impulse to the San Juan silver-mines, and the works being so far advanced, with a large stock of ores ready for refining, we may expect to see active operations immediately commenced on a large scale. No better or more exact idea can be had of the importance and condition of these mines, than from the official report in Gov. Rojo's Message to the Legislature of San Juan, bearing date August 23rd 1865, a few copies of which have just reached Buenos Ayres. We translate as follows:
 "The want of proper refining establishments is the great obstacle to the

rapid development of these mines: up to the present we have only two amalgamations and one smelting factory at work, which refine 2,000 quintals a month, yielding a nett product of 900 to 1,100 marks bar-silver. It will not pay the miners to export the raw metal, owing to the enormous price of freight to Valparaiso or Buenos Ayres, which only leaves a profit when the metal gives over 80 marks bar-silver per 'cajon.' *
 "The riches of our mines are unquestionable and fabulous as may be seen, from the following returns:—The mine of Castaño, the most extensive yet discovered in the Province, comprises a number of veins varying from one to six yards in depth, and two to 2,500 yards in superficial length. Near the surface it gives 20 to 40 marks; and this explains how the Rickard Co., which owns 15 mines, has already 30,000 quintals of metal, in its store-houses, although the works have nowhere been carried to a greater depth than 15 yards.
 "Several tunnels have been made by Mr. Rickard, for exploring the veins to a depth of 200 yards, and he has found the deposits of precious metal quite as wide and three times as rich as those near the surface. This shows what immense wealth is reserved for us, and the great development our mines will one day assume. This branch of industry will rapidly go-ahead as soon as the English Company's works are in play: the machinery is of the best class and Rickard's establishment will prove the finest in all South America. It can refine 600 quintals daily, which will give 500 marks silver, according to the results already obtained.
 "Although this establishment will give great impulse to the mines, I believe it will hardly suffice to refine all the metals belonging to the Company's mines. The works, I understand, will be concluded in Spring, and next year the establishment will be able to export 40,000 marks bar-silver, equivalent to double the value of our present commerce. Even at 50 to 60 marks per cajon it will be a splendid business, yielding 500 to 600 \$ on an outlay of 150\$. Up to last April, Rickard's Co. had spent close on 20,000\$ in extracting 600 cajones of metal, which represent a value of 240,000\$.
 "The mines of Huerta and Tontal are well-known, but of secondary importance, as those of Castaño alone will suffice to flood the Province with capital and immigration. There are altogether, at present, 88 mines of silver in active work, employing about 800 hands; and also some 200 to 300 mines lying idle. There are two amalgamation factories already finished, besides Rickard's works (on the double system) nearly completed, and Messrs. Klappenback's refining furnaces.
 "Messrs. Babié brothers are building works similar to the last, and in these constructions over 200 men are employed."
 His Excellency then proceeds to suggest some reforms in theCodigo de Minas, especially as regards parties holding the title of mines and neither working such themselves nor allowing others to do so. The report of Castaño is very promising, and we expect Major Rickard will send us an account of his progress, from time to time, which will be highly interesting to our readers both here and in England.

* The 'cajon' is a measure corresponding to 64 quintals or about 3 tons. The 'mark' is 8 ounces, and the silver being sold in London at 5/8d. per oz, we may estimate a mark of bar-silver at 44 shilling British: hence, a 'cajon' giving 60 marks is equivalent to a ton of ore yielding 137 British in bar-silver.

FRIGHTFUL MURDER in the POLICIA.

SCANDALOUS STATE OF AFFAIRS.
 MR. CAZON AND THE VIOLENTERS.
 On Saturday morning, we read in the 'Nacion Argentina,' a most brutal murder was perpetrated in the very Policia of this city. As a matter of course the public can get few details or particulars respecting this scandalous matter. Our colleague states that the assassin is one of the prisoners, and the victim a man named Alberto Merlo, an Argentine, and a prisoner also. The cause of the murder does not appear, and the only evidence against the suspected party is that a razor was found in his possession and his clothes cov-

cred with blood. The murdered man had been sent in from the camp charged with various crimes, and it is presumed that the murder was the result of a squabble. We feel bound to call attention to the scandalous state of affairs in the Police, when such a thing as a murder under the very nose of the Chief of Police is committed, and we hope the Government will direct the most searching enquiry to be made into the matter.

THE COMMERCE OF THE GLOBE

ZONE OF LA PLATA BY H. L. MULLER.

This is the title of a new work which arrived by last packet: the author, Mr. Muller, is a Havre merchant of great experience, and evidently complete master of the subjects which he treats; the work is essentially mercantile and may be regarded as the merchants "vade mecum."

One part of the book in question (in French) contains calculations showing the exact cost of hides, wool, sheepskins, nutria, deerskins, &c. bought in Buenos Ayres and sold in Havre, which is highly useful to the French exporter. Another part of this invaluable work in English is devoted to similar calculations on like exports to London and Liverpool. We extract the following as a better illustration of the work in question:—

From Buenos Ayres to London invoice and calculation of 24 bales of wool in the grease.

24 bales of wool weighing gross 20,336 lbs.

Tare 14 lbs. per lbs. 336

Or 800 arr. bought at \$50 mpc.

Then follow the charges in Buenos Ayres [too lengthy for publication] which with export duties, &c. amount to \$6191 mpc.

A detailed list of charges in London £82 13s. 5d.

Thus the 800 arr. of wool bought in Buenos Ayres at \$50 mpc. per arroba in the Plazas costs exactly when sold in London £469 19s. or 5d. 46-100 per lbs.

But the author's own preface which we curtail a little is probably his best introduction to the public.

Since the publication of the 1st edition of the 'Commerce of the Globe' in 1839 such numerous alterations have taken place, that the calculations of which this volume is composed are now for the most part unserviceable.

The want of a new work of the kind being much felt by merchants, I have at last decided, in compliance with frequent demands addressed to me on subject, to re-execute the work upon an entirely new plan and a more extended scale. In confining myself to a simple revision of the original work, as it was published, 25 years ago, with the introduction of necessary alterations, I should have but very imperfectly satisfied present requirements. To enlarge the model of the 1st work and embrace in this new one all quarters of the world, the assistance of the French consular agents abroad was indispensable and it is my duty to observe that his Excellency the Minister of Commerce, as well as his Excellency the Minister for Foreign Affairs, upon the particular recommendation of our Chamber of Commerce, rendered me every assistance that I could desire.

All merchants can no doubt make up their Account Sales themselves, but all know by experience that frequently some necessary information fails them. Often during my long commercial career I should have been glad to have had a book, which I had merely to open to find the information sought, as likewise for the verification of my calculations, by comparing them with tables, shewing, at all variations in the price of the merchandise and exchange, the cost price at the port of destination. If my calculations had been made in advance, it would have been a source of great satisfaction and tranquillity of mind to me to find myself in accordance with the book, in question and if I had not the necessary information I should have been doubly happy to have found it with the calculation ready at hand.

The plan of the work is as follows. "An English edition" comprising observations on the trade and commercial marine of the principal ports

as well as calculations of the different descriptions of merchandise imported by England from foreign countries.

Each account is accompanied by a table of equivalents which indicates by the exchange the advantage to be gained by taking reimbursement on this or that city likewise by a table shewing at a glance the differences produced in the cost price by variations in the invoice price, freight or exchange.

"A French edition" comprising almost the same matter as the English edition, with this distinction that the calculations are made for the importation of goods into France.

These two portions of the work will certainly have their importance for European merchants as well as those resident abroad, as it is interesting to know which port in Europe leaves the largest margin for merchandise exported from any foreign port; by means of these tables and the necessary prices' current, comparisons may be made without the slightest calculation.
