THE LATE MR. WHITEHEAD.

If it can in any way alleviate the regret of the friends of this lamented gentleman to remove the mystery attending his sad end, some interesting tails by one of the witnesses in the judicial proceedings will be read with interest. Mr. Whythead, as chief of the Arsenal, held perhaps the most important post under the Paraguayan Government, with a salary, we believe, of £2,000 per annum. For many years he discharged his duties with great ability and satisfaction both to the Government and himself. But he had overrated his own physical endurance, and the climate soon began to tell on his over-wrought frame. In 1862 he was seized with dysentery, from which he never entirely recovered. Having come to Buenos Ayres for a short time to recruit his strength, he returned to Asuncion, but was observed by his friends to be a little strange in manner. The solitude of his quinta and weakened powers of body soon induced a species of monomania, which made him fancy everyone plotting against him. Some time previous a native workman of the Arsenal had stabbed him, for which the offender was shot, notwithstanding Mr. Whythead's intercession for him; and this occurrence had an evident effect on his spirits. He almost shunned society, thinking his countrymen jealous of him, and that the natives looked at him disrespectfully when he passed through the streets. He had no idea of quitting his post for some years, being only fearful of losing it, and on the arrival of the Dottorel at Asuncion, last June, shewed no desire to leave the country. Owing to the war his labors were re-doubled, and his infirmity increased.

On Sunday, July 16th, Messrs. Burrell and Valpy, engineers of the railway, went to his Quinta to see him and found him in a very despondent state. He complained bitterly of the ingratitude of his own countrymen, and said he was tired of life. They advised Dr. Fox to look after him, and gave notice to the War-office that his state was critical. Dr. Fox accordingly went to see him on Monday and tried to rally him, leaving him that night with a caution to his servants to keep constant watch on him. Next day the Doctor again visited him and noticed no change. They were conversing in the evening, it being very dark, when Mr. W. suddenly got up from his sofa, went to the door, looked out, and then examined the windows: he then went into his bedroom, where he kept his rifle, and Dr. Fox getting alarmed was preparing to escape, but Mr. W. reappeared without the rifle and invited the other to walk towards town. He asked the doctor, on the road, three times with great earnestness if President Lopez had returned from Humayta, and on being as often answered in the negative said he was very sorry, as he wished to resign the Arsenal and go home to England.

On returning to the Quinta, Mr. W. again complained of his countrymen and said their machinations were enough to make one commit suicide. Dr. Fox left him with much misgiving, resolved to apply at once to the authorities for permission to put him under restraint. It was then too late, and next morning he rose very early to go at once to the Minister of War: at 6 a. m. when preparing to leave his house he was shocked by the appearance of Whythead's old Irish servant, named William, who told him his master had hanged himself.

The authorities at once summoned Dr. Barton and Fox to make a post-mortem examination, and Messrs. Stewart and Atherton as witnesses. It appeared that about 11 p. m. shortly

after Dr. Fox had left, the unhappy gentleman proceeded to his bed room, and some noise was heard, but the Irishman was afraid to go into the room. In the morning he was found hanging from the hammock-ring in the wall, his feet barely three inches from the ground.

It is a singular circumstance that on the day previous Dr. Stewart, the surgeon-general, speaking with President Lopez at Humayta, said "I am sorry to hear from Asuncion that poor Whitehead is very bad, and something may happen if you do not put a guard on him." To this, Lopez replied that it was a delicate thing to interfere with a man like Whitehead, and he hoped the case was not so bad as stated. Next day he called Dr. Stewart and said "You are almost a prophet: I have received a telegram that our poor friend Whitehead is dead."

The deceased gentleman belonged, we believe, to one of the South-Western counties of England, and leaves an only sister. He was a man of great talent in his profession, and chosen by General Lopez when on a visit to England in 1853 as the most fitted to construct an arsenal in Paraguay which would have no equal in South America. How well he discharged so difficult a task, with the rude elements at his disposal, is known to those who have visited the magnificent establishment at Asuncion with which his name will ever be associated. Of gentlemanly manners, refined tastes, and obliging disposition he won the esteem and affection of all; and his friends viewed with profound regret the cloud which recently began to obscure that bright intellect and generous mind so characteristic of the noblest type of an English gentleman.

We understand the Paraguayan Government always acted with justice and liberality towards so valuable a servant, and Mr. W. has left considerable property some of which is held in trust for him in this city. During his long residence in South-America he only once re-visited England, on a brief leave of absence in 1860.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Leda from England arrived yesterday, she made a splendid trip, and we have to thank her gallant Commander, Captain Brownrigg; for late papers. She brings a good list of passengers and a full cargo.

The Tevero on her way down to Montevideo smashed her shaft and with difficulty got into port. We have not yet received the particulars of the accident. We have to thank Captain Brownrigg for kindly bringing up the Montevidean mails.

One of our leading English merchants who has just returned from Europe in the packet paid a visit to the Dublin Exhibition, of which he speaks in the highest terms. We cordially welcome this distinguished English merchant back to the Plate.

The Spider from Montevideo arrived yesterday, we could hear nothing about Mr. Thornton or how he proceeds to Rio.

Captain Bruce and his new steamer, we learn, on the highest authority, are not to be expected before the 20th instant.

The price paid for shearing on most of the English estancias in San Vicente and Ranchos is \$50 per hundred.

We publish an extract from a report of the Northern Railway Co. read in London at the last Meeting, it shews that the unjust charges brought against Buenos Ayres had little credit amongst the stockholders.

The Coliseum dispute still continues: we have received a rather severe reply to 'Z', which we will publish to-morrow.

The Argentine Central Railroad Co. was publicly inaugurated yesterday at the Carcerana station. Minister Gonzales and the congressmen were present. We did not attend, not having received an invitation.

The news from Paraguay by the passengers of the Rosita was the chief topic yesterday: things in Paraguay seem to be in a bad way. The arrest of Messrs. Oliver and Bussy is greatly talked about; it seems now beyond all question that these were the two parties who got out at Lafont's saladero on a shooting excursion, and which our Equina and Navy correspondents noticed; we suppose in due time we

shall learn full particulars. The business upon which these parties made such a perilous trip must indeed have been urgent. Mr. Oliver, we learn is a French subject, and Mr. Bussy a German.

We welcome back from Paraguay Mr. Stewart, who it may be recollected left this in the month of March last—before the war broke out—on a commercial speculation.

Dr. and Mrs. Barton came down in the Flying-fish as far as Corrientes; they may be expected here in the Velocce.

Respecting the death of Mr. William Atherton in Paraguay, we learn that Dr. Barton held a 'post-mortem' examination and gave it as his opinion that he died of heart disease.

In Paraguay it was currently believed that Paraguayan yerba was selling in Buenos Ayres at an ounce the arrobo, and several vessels laden with yerba were awaiting the departure of the Velocce to come down. The river was rising fast.

The names of the three new steamers belonging to the New York and Rio Janeiro line, are, we hear, the Mississippi, Merrimac and Havannah; these are large ocean steamers, and a smaller one to connect Rio with the River Plate will also run, but we have not heard her name. The first steamer is expected to arrive on the 27th of October, and she will leave Rio for the States on the 2nd of November.

The Provincial Minister of Government has issued a circular to the various justices of the peace, requesting them to increase their vigilance about the robbers who are said to be prowling about the camp, and also calling on estancieros to stake hides with the ears on, so as to detect fraud. The Minister says that if the police force is insufficient the justices must at once increase it, and the extra expense will be defrayed by the Government.

On Saturday evening a duel occurred in the woods of Palermo, between a young native gentleman formerly clerk in a well-known English house, and a captain in the army. It seems that the duel arose out of a quarrel which occurred in Concordia when both parties were in the allied camp. The officer struck the quondam clerk on the cheek, for some insolence, and a challenge ensued. Fighting not being allowed in Entre Rios, both parties agreed to settle the business in Palermo: accordingly, on Saturday evening principals and seconds repaired in carriages to the rendezvous. Swords were agreed on, and both parties seemed out of practice, but the officer had the advantage. The fight only lasted for a few minutes; the clerk fell, having received three ugly wounds. It is said that he will recover.

We hear that there is a great row up in headquarters in consequence of President Mitre's mail-bag having been mislaid or stolen several times. The Government despatches are not of so much importance, as they are all published in the papers. The 'Tribunas' and 'Nacion Argentinas' are also lost, but this is of little consequence, since all the officers have them, but President Mitre is the only subscriber we have at present at Paso de los Libres, and his mail bag being lost he cannot see the 'Standard' any where; this is the real cause of the row at headquarters, and certainly, we think Gelly is to blame.

When the news of the fall of Uruguay reached Rio, the whole city was illuminated. Madame Briol is starring it in Rio. When the Mersey arrived with Estigarribia on board, the people of Rio went almost mad with joy; for three days there was no business done, all the public offices were closed. The steamer Apa was expected with 500 Paraguayan prisoners on board.

The Argentine war steamer Libertad was to have left yesterday for the squadron. We hear that several other vessels are ordered up also.

The 'post-mortem' examination of the late Mr. Jacques, resulted in the most conclusive evidence of apoplexy; the doctors believe that the attack was two days coming on.

It was with much pleasure we noticed the other day that the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company has

named Captain Curlew to the command of the new steamer Arno. The Company could not better have consulted the wishes of foreigners in Buenos Ayres, and we may add the very interest of the company itself, than by giving the Arno to this popular and experienced officer. The awful accident which has just befallen the Carmel shows in striking colors the great necessity of care and precaution on the part of the commander. The neglect of the engine-room, the supposed heedlessness of pumping cold water into red-hot boilers, can only be accounted for by the grossest neglect and bad management on board. We look back with pleasure on the many years Captain Curlew has been commanding the English mail-steamer without a single accident occurring traceable to mismanagement or neglect, and we feel indeed that we owe it as a duty towards this careful and prudent officer to publicly ratify the Company's nomination.

The Government received on Monday a despatch from Colonel Machado, stating that there had been a battle with the Indians at Pillaluluco, in which the savages were completely routed and about 900 head of horned cattle retaken. The invasion was very formidable, the Indians numbering nearly 400, of which several were killed and wounded and the rest put to flight.

Brazilian vessels still keep arriving at Montevideo with troops. The Princessa, San Paulo and Leopoldina have arrived within the last few days.

Respecting the row in Rosario about the site of the new Custom House, we have been informed that the government engineer is the party who selected the locality, and that it is the only eligible spot in the vicinity of the city. The object in moving the Custom House is to avoid the current of the river, which is at present washing away the old building. We certainly see no room for all the complaints made about this matter.

Mr. Powell's juvenile party on Monday evening was a charming affair, and the young people enjoyed themselves greatly. Owing to press of space we must defer till to-morrow speaking more at length of the 'soirée.'

ARRIVAL OF THE ESPIGADOR.

PARAGUAYAN STAMPEDE.

SINBAD ABSENT.

Yesterday the steamer Espigador arrived from Goya and the fleet bringing the important news that the Paraguayans were in full retreat for the Paso de la Patria. It was rumored that Lopez was in Corrientes and about to make a stand in that city, but the force to be left to defend that place was said not to exceed a few thousand men.

All the guns of the Cuevas battery have been sent to the Paso de la Patria where we hear they are to be mounted. The sweep of cattle, horses, mules, sheep, &c. is represented to us as something unprecedented.

At Parana it was rumored that Resquin was marching for the interior of the province to pulverize Gelly Obes, but few believed this story, as all along the banks of the river the news was that the Paraguayans were retreating.

The fleet was in the same place doing nothing, the Brazilians were impatiently waiting the arrival of the ironclad to at once proceed to Humayta.

The allied army was proceeding slowly towards the Parana, the Brazilians slightly in advance of the Argentines.

Sinbad, our Esquina correspondent, we have not heard from, but we suppose he has left for the allied camp to give our readers a true description of the allied army.

In Parana and La Paz there is much discontent; the cavalry militia of Parana have all marched.

The Espigador brought down a couple of sick Brazilians, very few passengers and little cargo.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

October 26.

The terrible catastrophe on board the Carmel having been reported already in your paper I abstain from going into the sad details of the disaster. The cause of the explosion is unascertained as yet, and as is generally the case with such accidents, the opinion

expressed by most people is that there has been great negligence on the part of the engineers. On the other hand it has been presumed as just possible that the explosion may have been caused by the boiler being struck by lightning, and the stormy state of the weather at the time gives a certain degree of credibility to the story. Mr. Salles, commander of the Saintonge, had a fortunate escape, being lifted off the ground in his cabin to the height of upwards of a yard by the force of the concussion in the atmosphere. This intelligent and gentlemanly officer escaped entirely unharmed. I have been told that the scene on the deck of the Carmel presented after the explosion was harrowing in the extreme. They are too painful to dwell upon, and represent such a picture of woe and pain and destruction as happily seldom afflicts our city with the sight.

To-day the Recife arrived from Rio Janeiro, with upwards of a thousand men on board. We are to have a deposit, I am told, of Brazilian troops, whose number is to be gradually brought up to six thousand men, and they will be gradually draughted off for the scene of war as required, and their place supplied by freshly levied troops now arriving daily at Rio Janeiro from every part of the Emperor's vast Empire.

Business has experienced some improvement of late, though it is far from brisk.

The news of the war between Spain and Chile has been received here with expressions of sorrow on the part of thoughtful, far-seeing men, who fear the future complications that a strife between an European Government and the first of South American Republics must give birth to. The known weakness of Spain, her unstable Governments, impoverished exchequer, as well as the immense distance she is placed from what promises to be the seat of a war where bitter remembrances and mortifying associations promise to give it a character of tenacious endurance wholly unknown in South American annals.

The Newton carries the mail of the Carmel, and will leave to-morrow morning early.

THE RACES.

SPRING MEETING.

The entries for the Foreign Amateur Races of the 1st of November were made on Monday evening, resulting in seven horses being named for the first race, amongst which the veteran Ituzaingo figures, and is likely to be a favorite, together with the Standard. For the 2nd (half-round), five horses, amongst which the gallant Portefino appears, and will be a favorite should he run, but there will be no betting on the event amongst 'aficionados' until his owner declines a start or otherwise. The Grey Mare has some fanciers; the stable, however decline to back him at anything but long odds.

3rd Race. All the crack horses meet. Sin Pin, Engañador, Chacabuco (pescado flojo), and Portefino. Engañador, for his splendid condition, has the call, and can be backed at even against any horse. The 'stables' of the other three will not be slow to back their respective 'favorites' against Engañador or the other.

4th. Six horses, including the Brown Mare, and Star, who is likely to be scratched. Pica Flor, Standard, and Yena, are spoken of for this race.

The weight for age race had only two entries, viz., Engañador and Star of the South, and in consequence falls through.

6th Race. Twice round. Three entries. No sé como, Blundering, and Sofferino. Sofferino has the call at even against the field.

For a few days there will not be current odds. What is principally doing is even betting between horse and horse in the different races.

THE GUARANTEE.

One member of the committee has had an interview with his Excellency Señor Riestra, Minister of the Argentine Republic, now in this country, from whom the committee gather a most favourable opinion of the value of the line under proper management, and they learn that the most friendly feelings are en-

tertained by the Government towards the company. His Excellency also informs us that the Government is ready to pay the guaranteed so soon as the accounts have been presented and vouched, as required by the concession. Before this is done, no claim arises against the Government, and his Excellency states that the accounts have not yet been furnished. His Excellency added that he had no doubt the line would pay more than the guaranteed dividend if properly and economically worked.

FINANCE.

The amount now owing is said to be, to the City Bank, £12,500 (in respect of which interest at 5 per cent., and commission at 2½ per cent, every three months, is charged), and to the South Eastern Bank £1,500 (in respect of which as much as 17 per cent. has been and for which 11 per cent. is now charged as interest and commission). Debenture bonds to the extent of £25,800 have been issued; other debenture bonds, to the amount of £24,200 have been lodged with the City Bank by way of security for their advance.

The City Bank also holds the promissory note of this company for the amount due. Other debts, amounting altogether to £15,253 8s. 7d. are now said to be due from the company, including £5,000 on account of the Tigre Extension, but exclusive of £7,565 9s. 10d. profit on the working of the line, which the directors have applied as capital to discharge the ordinary liabilities of the company, instead of in paying the dividend to the preference shareholders. The committee cannot doubt that the present condition of the company is partly attributable to the pernicious system of borrowing money, which the directors have carried on to an enormous extent, and at most extravagant rates. The total already charged to the company for interest on borrowed money, exclusive of debenture interest, is £6,497 17s. 1d. The rate of interest, partly under the name of commission, charged by the City Bank and the London Bank of Mexico—of which your chairman, Mr. Laurie, is director—has been as much as 16, and by the South Eastern—of which your director, Mr. Harrison, is director—as much as 17 per cent.

This borrowing commenced within about a month after the allotment of shares, when a sum of £30,000 was borrowed from the City Bank, and has continued to the present time. The aggregate amount borrowed, exclusive of debentures, appears to be £108,500, of which £14,000 appears to be now due. None of these advances appear to be mentioned in the accounts furnished by the directors to the shareholders. At the time these loans were effected, a large amount of the capital was uncalled, and even now the uncalled capital and arrears of calls amount to £11,647 10s.; so that the shareholders who have paid up in full not only lose their promised interest, but have to pay a very high rate for the accommodation of those who have not; and in this latter class are nearly all the directors. The general indebtedness of the company including £7,565 9s. 10d. net profit on the working of the line, which has been applied as capital, but belongs to the shareholders as dividend, is about £37,500, exclusive of the debenture capital raised (£25,800), or altogether, £63,300. Of this a sum of about £10,000 may be set down to the Tigre Extension, which is not included in the original contract, but on which, it is understood, the Government have agreed to guarantee 7 per cent.; the remainder of the indebtedness having arisen from payments for the old company, extra works, locomotives, rolling stock, &c. Your committee have not considered it part of their duty to inquire whether all the items charged are legal and proper payments; this may be matter for further consideration. To meet the present indebtedness, there appears to be only available a sum of about £12,000, arrears of calls, interest, and unpaid capital, the Liverpool mortgage, and the arrears of the guarantee from the Government, the amount of which is not yet ascertained, but part, at least, of which belongs to the shareholders for unpaid dividend.

CONCLUSION.

Your committee having fully and anxiously considered the position and

prospects of the company, consider it their duty to advise the shareholders... 1. To withdraw their confidence from those who have brought the company into its present position...
