GOODS AND PARCELS DELIVERY

In Buenos Ayres.

From the 19th October 1865 till further notice.

The Great Southern Railway Company has the Collection and delivery of Goods and Parcels in all paved parts of the City of Buenos Ayres at the following rates:—

General Goods.—Collected or delivered within four squares of the Great Southern Railway Station at 2 1/2 p. per arroba. To any address South of the Calle Rivadavia at 3 p. per arroba. To any address North of Calle Rivadavia at 4 1/2 p. per arroba.

Market Produce.—Such as Milk, Butter, Eggs, Fruit, Vegetables, Meat or Poultry, requiring great punctuality will be charged double the above rates.

The collection and delivery charge will be calculated per arroba, and all fractions of an arroba will be considered as an arroba.

One pair of Hens, Ducks, Geese or Turkeys will be carried as an arroba.

Parcels.—Parcels of one arroba under will be collected or delivered to any part of the city at the rate of 35 p. per arroba, every 1 arroba extra will be charged at the rate of 32. All consignments of any kind whatever except Market Produce of less than 5 arrobas will be considered as parcels.

Orders for the collection and delivery of Goods and Parcels left at any of the Great Southern Railway Stations, at Mr. Twyford's No. 102 Calle Defensa, or addressed to the Administration of the Great Southern Railway will be attended to, where also any information may be obtained.

The delivery charge for Parcels, Market Produce or Goods can be paid or made payable together with or without the Railway Charge, at any of the Great Southern Railway Stations or to the Carriers. The collection charge can be paid to the Carriers or made payable at any of the Great Southern Railway Stations.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The steamer Ibiouy, with mails from Paraná and Santa Fé, arrived true to time yesterday. There is very little news stirring in those quarters. In Paraná the elections have been going on—Ricardo Lopez Jordau is the favorite candidate. The steamer Victoria passed up on the 31st. Urquiza marched from the Yuguero on the 27th, for Corrientes. A now Irish colony on the splendid estancia of San Antonio, near Las Conchas, is being got up. We know nothing whatever about this scheme beyond the few lines we received in the 'Paraná,' but suppose the land in question to be part of Sr. D'Espuy's magnificent estancia close to Paraná.

The ironclad Tamandaré has gone right up to Corrientes, followed by the San Roman, which has her guns on board. The guns will be mounted in the tower of the Tamandaré at Corrientes. This, after all, seems a riskish business; it would have been safer to have prepared the Tamandaré in the Tigre.

Some parties in Rosario have received letters from Valparaiso stating that the bombardment of that city was to commence on the 10th October. Over 20,000 people had left that city, only those capable of bearing arms remained. In Valdivia there were already 14 regiments of volunteers, in Chiloe 11, in Chillan 10, and in Concepcion 15; all these were got together by private subscription. In Santiago over one thousand of the principal residents asked permission of Government to defray all the expense in equipping the garrison of that town. 65,000 Patacons were subscribed in two days, and more than double that amount in jewelry. The greatest enthusiasm reigned all through Chile.

A subscriber who has just come up from the Boca states that every vessel there taking in cargo is loading for Corrientes. Comestible men find business brisk; orders are flowing in from all quarters; if the population of that city was ten times what it is, the supplies going up would be sufficient for twelve months.

The best news which the packet has brought is the re-nomination of our indefatigable friend and countryman, E. B. Neill, Esq., to the post of Oriental Consul in London. Mr. Neill has worked so hard for the River Plate that his name alone is suggestive of preserved beef. We congratulate the Montevideo Government on so excellent an appointment. Meat is touching famine prices at home, yet we see very slight exertions made here to ship beef to London. As to the scheme which the 'Nacional' talks of, namely, constructing ships purposely for conveying wild cattle from the Pampas to Liverpool, it is so absurd and ridiculous as to be unworthy the trouble of remark. The idea of shipping wild 'novillos' on board a steamer or sailing vessel to Europe is the most extravagant freak of imagination; if the cattle were tame, or accustomed to handling by caretakers, it might be possible, although the voyage being so long the business would be attended with insuperable difficulties. Our colleague had therefore better begin by taming all the cows in the country; either that or hit upon the most approved plan of cutting down and packing. Mr. Neill's remarks on this subject will be found in another column.

The weather of Thursday and Friday was so cold that it is believed there must have been a great storm in the far South. As yet we have not heard from that quarter. To the north it has rained but little as yet. Great here are entertained about now

shorn sheep, but we think they are groundless, as the sheep are strong and in healthy condition.

Sarmiento is the best letter remarked that a small sign-board, with 'Please keep off the Grass,' stuck up in the City Hall Park, in New York, was sufficient to keep the thousands who pass daily from treading on the greensward. How different are things in this country! On Thursday evening the guard of the Boca Railroad, stationed at the crossing leading to the Boca, was stabbed by some fellows who attempted to cross the line, and the engine coming up. There is a printed sign-board up with due notice, besides this there is a guard whose duty it is to enforce the notice, and yet, notwithstanding all this, people will violate the regulations. There is no respect in this country for the law. Sarmiento was right when he said the little sign-board in the park was more effective than all the Cazons and policemen in the Argentine Republic.

We have to thank our friend, Mr. Gilmour, Argentine Consul in Glasgow, for a copy of the orders of the Privy Council, respecting the disease in cattle which at present prevails to such an alarming extent. Any of our readers who would like to peruse same, will please call at our office.

Yesterday we heard of an Anglo-Iberian party of excursionists, which leaves Rosario to-day for Mendoza. The object of our friends is to explore the Mendoza Pampa, and we believe to start a fat-cattle trade with Chile. We cannot say that we have much confidence in these expeditionary enterprises. The mule scheme through the Gran Chaco proved a decided failure: still we wish our friends the best success. The party is composed of men of capital, and it may possibly lead to happy results.

The latest news from the allied headquarters is, that Sr. Gelly y Obes has been rescued from the island. He saved everything, even that memorable diplomatic hen, which laid an egg in Mr. Thornton's bed. The ladies of Mercedes went out to Flores camp, and decked the 'old man's' tent with flowers. He ordered up a band of music to play for them, but there was no dancing. The greatest sickness and mortality exists amongst the Paraguayan prisoners taken at Uruguayana. They drop down on the road during the march. Over 140 are in hospital dying, besides scores of others in the regiments.

To-night the great concert in Colon comes off. From all we hear, it promises to be a great success, and notwithstanding the war the Colon will be crowded.

To-morrow the town of Moreno will be the grand centre of attraction. The Governor, Bishop, and Ministers will be there to bless and inaugurate the new church in that straggling railway village.

Scarcely a ship comes into port now that does not bring us arms. The people in Europe must imagine that we have more soldiers than what we can boast of. All the manufacturers in Liege and Birmingham have their eyes centred on the River Plate. A few months ago muskets sold well. To-day they are a 'clavo.'

The manager of the Northern Railway has called on us to state that in the accident of last Wednesday on the tramway, the horses were not killed, as we stated: we can only say that when we left the place, they were to all appearance dead.

We have great pleasure in welcoming back the Hon. Mr. Washburne, American Minister to Paraguay, who arrived in Montevideo on Tuesday evening per steamer Kepler: he is accompanied by his lady.

FRIGHTFUL MURDER IN ARRÉCIFES

MR. PETERS ASSASSINATED.

It is our melancholy duty to record the murder of Mr. C. D. Peters by an Englishman named Richard Robinson: up to the hour of going to press the only details received are as follows: Mr. Peters was the Majordomo on an estancia in Arrécifes belonging to Mr. Silletoe, and Richard Robinson a medianero on the same estancia; on the morning of the 1st. inst. whilst shearing was going, Robinson was knocking about the place; he caused so

much noise and disturbance that Mr. Peters was obliged to go up to him and ask him to go home, and actually went with Robinson to the 'patenque,' when Robinson suddenly turned round and stabbed him in the groin or lower part of the abdomen. Mr. Peters lingered until the evening when he expired. Robinson jumped on his horse and galloped off. The authorities were soon on the ground, and chase given to the assassin, he was apprehended on Thursday, and is now being sent into town a close prisoner. Poor Mr. Peters was well known in this city and the whole British community was plunged into sorrow yesterday when the sad news arrived: we expect further details to-day.

THE BALVANERA COLLEGE.

We are authorized to contradict the stories going the round of the native papers about some outrage by Jesuit priests, said to have broken a boy's rib and jumped on him &c., &c. at the above college.

In the first place there is no Jesuit of any grade connected with the college, which is entirely directed by Basque clergymen who, we are happy to say, enjoy an enviable reputation in this city. The college was founded by the Basques, and several ex-students of the house, who are now among our subscribers, speak in the highest terms of the institution.

In the second place, the charge of ill-usage is against one of the monitors, a layman, recently employed, and not one of the superiors. As he has been dismissed from the College, the Directors have saved themselves from all blame, and the institution is free from imputation, if even the charge were correct.

In the third place, we are positively assured on the best authority, that the monitor in a passion struck the boy in the face causing much injury to his eye but did not jump on him or break his rib.

It is to be regretted that the ill feeling against the Jesuits is made a mask for these cock-and-bull stories, and we gladly make room in the columns of the foreign journal for the defence of an order which Sir Woodbine Parish says has been so ungratefully treated by the natives.

THE ITALIAN GUNBOAT VELOCE.

CORRIENTES SAVED FROM PILLAGE.

We have been requested by Don Mariano Billinghurst to publish the following:—

Corrientes, Oct. 27th 1865.

The inhabitants of this city, recently occupied by the Paraguayan hordes, owe to Capt. Casiné of the gunboat Veloce, their lives, the honor of their families, and the property of all natives and foreigners in the place: The towns of Goya, Bella-Vista and Empedrado are also tokens of the paternal care of the Italian commander, his officers and crew, to protect and aid all those needing succor. Capt. Casiné was indefatigable in doing good. On the 20th inst. an army of 25,000 men in its retreat from Cuevas drew near this city: hungry and naked, they came along devastating all before them. No doubt the same fate awaited our city, and our situation grew every moment more desperate. The townfolk filled with alarm rushed into the churches, to implore the mercy of the Most High, while they embraced their weeping children, and strove to conceal their little property from the enemy.

The confusion was increased by numbers of families from the adjacent villages: on the 21st, some hundreds of waggons full of afflicted families came pouring into the city, seeking shelter and security, while a panic was caused by the numerous bodies of armed men going about both day and night. From the 15th inst. two steamers arrived every day to take away families and their properties. Many of the houses belonging to persons who had fled were sacked. On the morning of the 23rd two steamers entered port, and at 6 a.m. patrols were sent out in all directions to arrest the principal men in the city and carry them off to the dungeons of Humaytá. Messrs. Garrido, Gorostiaga, Salas, Estevanot and several others fell into their hands, but Robert Billinghurst, Vivar, Quiroz, Lotero, the Fonsecas and others had a miraculous escape, and the Paraguayans searched

the houses of the latter, questioning the wives and children for their fathers.

In this terrible emergency Capt. Casiné and his officers were busy all day, saving the affrighted families and conducting them personally on board the Veloce: at 8 p. m. the gunboat presented a spectacle no pen can describe; husbands restored to their wives and children, all crying with joy. Two hours before, the Paraguayan Minister, Berges, evacuated the town with all his troops, putting it in charge of the gunboat Veloce and the foreign residents. On the retreat of the enemy, order was speedily restored, the foreigners and a few Nat. Guards patrolling the streets. Thanks to Capt. Casiné, his officers and vessel, the city and inhabitants were saved a thousand horrors.

Honorable mention is also due to the Italian Vice-consul, D. Rafael Gallino, and his lady, who sheltered for many days a number of families, and treated them with every attention. D. Antonio Amoretti, a resident shopkeeper, in like manner concealed several people and aided Captain Casiné in giving them every assistance.

It is the wish of the citizens that this testimonial be published in English and French, to make known in Europe the magnanimous conduct of Captain Casiné of the gunboat Veloce. They will also call a meeting to arrange on the most suitable manner of presenting a token of public gratitude to the gallant Captain.

LATEST FROM CAPILLA DEL SEÑOR.

CAMPS GOOD, SHEARING GOING AHEAD.

I am glad to say the camps here are in splendid trim, and so are the worthy owners: you could actually behold the smile of content on their well-chiselled brows. In different places the 'cardos' are starting up rapidly, and will soon be stout and strong. The hills and hollows in this locality would indeed remind any thinking soul of the ups and downs of life.

The town is progressing rapidly, owing to the untiring exertions of the Judge and Municipales. These gentlemen are not naturally avaricious, like other Municipales; they do not fob the Municipal treasury, nor spend it in dancing and carousing, but in useful purposes.

The Judge is a gentleman of natural discretion, and, I believe, administers justice with an air of magisterial impartiality.

Not long since an Irishman was stabbed by a 'gancho,' who the following morning was miraculously arrested, but in consequence of the poor victim not having an eye-witness to corroborate the would-be assassin's guilt, he was as usual liberated. The wounded man was cured by Doctor Priestley.

The new church is a magnificent and durable monument of public piety. It is a credit to its ingenious architect, Mr. Hunt, and is indeed a splendid memorial to those who have gratuitously and bountifully subscribed towards its erection. There is still a balance due, and the trustees call on all those that have not helped to build it, and will, I dare say, help to fill it, to come forward and give their mite towards its decoration. A few weeks ago the bell was hoisted to its aerial destination, and is truly a splendid donation of a generous and popular Basque. It is tongue-tied at present, to the great mortification of the plaza ladies, who are most anxious for the learned prelatial doctor of Buenos Ayres to come and cut the fibre of tautumity.

The plaza is unchained at present, but will, as soon as the church is finished, be regulated. The ladies themselves of a fine afternoon have it beautifully linked.

Shearing is all the go now, and wool is going gradually in to the higgledy-piggledy market to undergo the ordeal of examination. Mr. Scales' remarks, respecting the condition of wool and the stowage of carts, are really very egrotious and fantastical. He don't want the fleeces tied like Brian O'Lynn wore the hide, 'the woolly side out and the fleasy side in.' If the dirty fleeces were all put in the mouths of the carts, as poor Scales wishes them, and a buyer came alongside and asked, 'what wool is this?' 'It is

mine, Sir, and I have all the clean wool in the centre.' The gentleman, of course, would become horrified at such absurdity, and walk away, indulging in detestable contumelation. Buying a cart of wool is like buying a pig in a bag. You see only piggy's face, and even after the grunter is unbagged he turns out to be a boar. It is all the same, for a pig is a boar, and a boar is a pig; a fleece is a fleecce, and a bargain is a bargain.

THE ENGLISH CATTLE PLAGUE AND MEAT FAMINE.

Mr. E. B. Neill, whose re-appointment to the London consulship for the Banda Oriental is a good omen for the progress of the Rio Plata meat movement in Europe, reports, by the French mail of the 24th of September, that there is a yet further increase of the alarm he has so frequently dwelt upon as to the spread of the murrain, and the augmenting price of meat, and indeed of food of every kind, especially butter and milk, which articles the cattle plague so perniciously affects. Of the thousand nostrums for the arrest and cure of the disease not one finds general favour, and each specific is superseded by another, which is abandoned in despair almost as soon as mentioned. In fact scarcely any person in England dares to admit to himself, much less to proclaim to the public, the real truth, which Mr. Neill's communications have pointed to from the beginning, namely, that the chief source of the evil lies in the use on the land of guanos and phosphates, producing an unnaturally fattening herbage, which corrupts the blood and manure of the animals feeding upon it, and renders them either direct sources of disease, or incurably susceptible of whatever disease may appear in their neighbourhood.

A well known philanthropic sanitary writer, of great eminence and influence, under the long familiar signature of S. G. O. [a clergyman and nobleman named Osborne], has at last roused the public to a recognition of this fact, that diseased vegetable nutrition, raised from stimulating and fly-breeding manures, must beget disease in the animals partaking of it, and that flesh so contaminated must produce disease in human beings eating such flesh, as in the case of pigs, which are now largely fed in England on the cows perishing of the pestilence.

Further force has just been given to this true view of the mysterious visitation by a convincing letter in the 'Times' of September the 21st, from the well known Mr. Tattersall, who, after going very fully into the question, and quoting authorities of great weight in Austria, where the same means are being employed, declares that the only plan of even curtailing the spread of the disease is to draw a line round every parish in which it appears, and immediately kill off every head of cattle, whether affected or not, and instantly bury the slain animals at a great depth;—the national exchequer being called upon to make good the loss to individuals. Mr. Tattersall admits, what it obvious enough, that this is a terrible remedy, both in a pecuniary and every other sense; but he contends, as is equally obvious, that it is less terrible than the evil itself, which menaces a whole nation, several nations, with a most awful calamity. The worst of the business, however, is that even so sweeping a cure may, at best, prove imperfect; nor is there any promise of one more efficacious being found.

As was to be expected, the price of meat in England continually advances, and the quality proportionately declines. In London, at the date of Mr. Neill's last advices, per French packet, good mutton was not obtainable under a shilling a pound, good beef being yet higher, and respectable butchers making it a favour to serve customers at those figures; while, notwithstanding the prejudice against the flesh of swine, because of its being reputedly

unwholesome, on account of pigs largely eating diseased cows, bacon of ordinary quality was selling at 12d. to 15d. a pound, the quotations from all European markets showing an upward tendency. After a summer of extreme heat, a very cool autumn was expected in England, and this state of the weather, combined with the circumstances just enumerated, was regarded by Mr. Neill as most favourable to the popularity of River Plate meat, of which several improved preparations were arriving, great hopes being entertained that the wet beef, in the manner adopted in North America, will be found very suitable, from its resemblance to an article for which there has long been a large demand in British markets. In conclusion, Mr. Neill repeats the usual burden of his instructive bi-monthly budget, that the prospects of Rio Plata meat are most encouraging, and the ultimate supply hence of a vast demand on the other side of the Atlantic an absolute certainty.

THE WHEELWRIGHT FOSSILS.

Dr. Burmeister, Director of the Museum, publishes the following account of the fossils presented by Mr. Wheelwright, which we mentioned last week.

In 1844, Dr. Xavier Muniz discovered near 'Villa de Lujan' the fossil skeleton of an animal of the mammiferae-carnivorous kind, which has long excited the wonder of all who have seen it, as well for the peculiarity of its construction, as for the almost perfectly preserved condition of the bones. Dr. Muniz gave it the name *Munifelis Bonaerensis*, in a detailed description published by him in the *Gaceta Mercantil*, Oct. 9th 1845. During the tyranny of Rosas which then prevailed, the only people who occupied themselves in the fossils of the country were the English, and on learning of Dr. Muniz's magnificent acquisition they offered him 500 guineas for this superb skeleton, to place it in the British Museum, London. But, Dr. Muniz being an intelligent man and a good patriot, thought it a pity if so rare a skeleton were transferred to any museum but that of Buenos Ayres, and therefore declined the offer, waiting a chance to sell it to some one who would give it to the Museum.

This chance arrived at last. Mr. Wheelwright, concessionaire of the Central Argentine Railway, a man of noted munificence and sympathy for the advancement of the country, resolved to buy the skeleton and present it to the Museum of Buenos Ayres, which he accordingly did, on the 24th inst.

It becomes my duty, as Director of Museum, to express my warmest thanks to both these gentlemen, the one for having kept the skeleton in the country, the other for the liberal donation of 30,000\$ to procure same for the Museum. Such generosity deserves to be imitated. In order to give the public an idea of the value of the skeleton, I will briefly narrate its classification in the scientific world under the head of mammifere.

The skeleton in question is the only one as yet found complete, in the possession of any museum in the world, and belongs to a class of carnivorous animals between the tiger and hyena which is long since extinct, but once existed in S. America, Europe and Asia. It is distinguishable by its long tusks and hooked form, and several *sarans* have taken much pains in its classification. In 1824 Cuvier classified these tusks among those of bears, and called the animal *Ursus Cultridens*; but Bravard, who was the first to discover a complete skull, demonstrated in 1828 that it approached nearer to the family of cats, and therefore called it *Felis Cultridens*. Nevertheless the peculiar form of the tusks showed it could not be classed with one or other of the above carnivorous animals, as the German philosopher Kamp proved in 1833, when he declared it a new 'genus' under the name *Machaerodus*. This classification was accepted by Owen in his treatise on the extinct mammiferae of England, in 1840, when he designated a new species, of this kind as *Machaerodus Latidens*; he mentions, at the same time, having seen teeth of a similar description among the collection of fossil-bones made by Falconer and Cantlay in India, and as Bravard has described

another new species as *Felis Megatherion* we have now four classes of this relic of antiquity. The first mention of this animal in America is made by Dr. Lund, an eminent Danish naturalist, who discovered its remains in the natural caverns of Minas Geraes, Brazil. At first he took it for a hyena, and called it *Hinocaea* [Institut. VII, 125, 1839], but soon found that it was quite another kind of animal to which he gave the new name *Smilodon Populator*, in 1842. As this entry made in the acts of the Academy of Copenhagen is of prior date to the description published by Dr. Muniz in 1845, the scientific world cannot accept the designation *Munifelis Bonaerensis* which he gave it, and as the name *Smilodon Populator* is also more recent than that given by Kamp, of *Machaerodus* we must necessarily follow the law of precedence and call it *Machaerodus Neogaues*, under which name it will adorn our museum. RANDOM READINGS. During the last ten years the camps of Pilar were not in such good condition as they are just now; they have more the appearance of meadow fields than grazing land. Sheep and cattle are all fat and their owners in excellent spirits.

If the weather holds good, shearing will, be over in this partido before the middle of November; it began earlier than usual, some having commenced on the 25th of September. We had a heavy shower of hailstone last week but, to my knowledge, it occasioned no losses in sheep; peachmounts were very much damaged by it.

A few sales of wool were effected, the highest price obtained has been 80s.

A flock of shorn sheep were sold last week at 40s a head; the sheep are of pretty fair quality but nothing particularly good about them; the flock was sold without being what 'Leinster' would call arranged. The purchaser is a native farmer and an old resident in the partido; he knew of flocks, or parts of flocks, for sale much cheaper, but then, he also knew these cheap flocks were well arranged. To hear of a foreign practical farmer paying the top price for sheep is an every day occurrence, but to hear of native farmers doing so is indeed something new, for these gentlemen hitherto have been very fond of cheap stock; in this predilection they have many foreign comrades, who, however, are almost invariably new beginners; unhappily they sometimes pay severely for their fondness, but after an apprenticeship of one or two years they completely change their mind. A new beginner came to buy sheep of a farmer two years ago; the farmer had only one flock of sheep and yet asked the purchaser four different prices: 30s a head if the seller was allowed to pick, 45s by the cut, 55s if the purchaser himself picked, and 65s if experienced farmers picked. There were nearly four thousand in the flock; the purchaser preferred the 30s sheep and got 700; I will leave 'Leinster' to decide if this was the best bargain of the four.

The 'Standard' of Oct. 28th says my last letter on public lands contains some inaccuracies; that letter was written on the 21st, it reached the Standard Office on the 23d, and was published on the 25th. The Law referred to by the Standard, and which seems to be my only condemnator, was although dated on the 3rd., only published on the 24th by the paper which may be called the semi-official organ of the Provincial Government. Consequently, it was published three days after my letter was written. For the truth of this assertion I refer the Editors to the 'Tribuna' of Oct. 24th. On the other hand, this law makes no other alteration beyond that of allowing tenants six months extra to solicit the lands they hold. With this single exception I still maintain that my last letter contains no inaccuracies, and if it does they should be pointed out, for a great number of our countrymen are directly interested in this subject. The Editors have fallen into a grave error in stating that holders have ample time to see the result of the auctions. This law only prorogues the old one to the 1st of July, as such, no general auction can take place until after this date; therefore, tenants, by the new law will be exactly in the same position on the

1st of July as they would have been on the 1st of January by the old law. The land held by tenants who may have forfeited their claim, through non-payment of rent &c. may be auctioned any day, but land with a valid claim will not be auctioned until after the 1st of July. DICK.

MONTEVIDEO

October 30, 1865. The English steamer Agnes Arkle arrived this morning from Rio, bringing the French mail for the Navarre. She brings 23 passengers for Montevideo and 84 for your city; total, 107 passengers brought to Rio Janeiro by Navarre.

The Kepler had sailed from Rio for Montevideo on the 25th instant, and the Newton arrived at Rio from this port on the 23rd inst.

I have no news of any interest to communicate. Business continuing more brisk, and up to the 25th inst. the Custom House had yielded 271,000 national dollars. It is supposed the revenue of the month will reach 300,000 dollars, a sum exceeding the amount of any one month in any former year, including, I believe, the largest months of the years '46 to '48. This is very satisfactory, more especially as the present extraordinary expenses entailed by the war require considerable disbursements, and nothing facilitates the march of Government administration so much as having sufficient financial means at hand to meet all exigencies.

Don Hector Varela arrived in the Recife this morning from Buenos Ayres, and the Government has received some interesting communications from General Flores.

The attitude assumed by the Government on the Chileno-Spanish question is satisfactory and calculated to allay the well-grounded alarm that was at one time felt of an interruption of our peaceful relations with Spain.

The report of some imprudent 'patriots' pretending to purchase and fit out a 'corsair' was unfortunately well-founded, and of course steps have been taken to stop such a foolish and reckless proceeding. Though it is necessary to observe in the present delicate state of affairs a prudent reserve, yet I may mention as a fact publicly known that the Government has refused to accept Doctor Vicente Lopez, in his capacity of Chilean Consul, a step which we may heartily congratulate ourselves on having been resolved upon by the Ministry, as this gentleman's views on the present question are too well known, and too exaggerated not to inspire serious fears of a conflict taking place had the Government here shown its sympathy with Doctor Lopez's opinions, and perhaps projects, by accepting his nomination as Consul-General. We may, indeed, in the present breathing time, congratulate ourselves on having avoided the breakers that threatened the peace of the country. It is not every one who is aware how close to the wind on a lee shore the vessel of State has been steering for the last past few days, and we may indeed be thankful to Providence that the less reckless counsels of thoughtful men have prevailed, and thus avoided the peril.

"The foaming waters surge in the wake of the laboring vessel." Messrs. Navia's have commenced issuing their notes, and both the design and paper do much credit to this establishment, and to Messrs. Hecquet, the engravers, in the Calle Misiones.

Some small parcels of wool have already arrived from the country, being the first instalments of the new clip. The wool this year, though perhaps a little lighter, owing to the recent copious rains, promises to be generally of a superior quality to last year's clip. The shearing is being actively prosecuted all over the country, but the scarcity of hands in some parts of the

The state of the campaign is gradually improving, and several ruffians remarkable for their bloodthirsty deeds have been summarily punished for their crimes. I should not be at all surprised if some Quixotic stickler for the observance of established forms should raise a cry against these extraordinary proceedings on the part of the authorities. For such cavillers who know-

ly and wilfully ignore the exceptional conditions of 'life in the camp,' with all its necessary lawlessness and petty despotism, the columns of that venerable opposition organ, the 'Siglo,' are always open.

The Recife, on her way down from your port, experienced some bad weather, and had some of the planks of the paddle-box staved in by a heavy sea.

THE FENIANS.

(From our correspondent.)

Dublin, Sept. 23. Heretofore I have kept you advised of the spread of Fenianism in Ireland, and of the objects of the promoters of the movement. In so doing I never imagined that the organization possessed so numerous a body of adherents amongst the people as the events of the past weeks here have revealed. East, West, North and South the police are actively engaged in arresting Fenians. The American steamers have been thoroughly searched on arrival at Queenstown, and any amount of Fenian documents found on the persons of Irishmen returning from the States. As usual on such occasion, informers have come forward and betrayed those whom they previously entrapped. There has been a run on the banks for gold; English and foreign visitors and tourists are making a hasty departure, and the public mind is kept in a state of ferment. Disaffection has been discovered among the soldiers in Cork and elsewhere, and the Fenian spirit is making itself felt in almost every circle of society here. The Catholic clergy to a man are against the movement; but I cannot forego the belief that the people, to a very great extent, disregard the warnings of their pastors. Many incline to the belief that we are on the eve of a revolution, and certainly the signs of the times lead to such a belief.

EXCEPTIONAL SALE OF WOOL.

While the average prices of the best class wool in the markets scarcely reaches \$80, a parcel of wool from the Cabaña Benevento and Latham, was sold on Thursday, October 26, in the Plaza Constitucion, at \$122 per ar. Last year the same wool was sold at \$125, but taking into consideration the difference of exchange, this year's sale in sterling is nearly 10 per cent. higher than last year's. The Benevento and Latham Rambouillet sheep and rams are attracting the attention of all who have an opportunity of informing themselves about them. They are considered the greatest success that has ever been attained in the River Plate; and when it is considered that the ewes of these Cabañas average nearly half an arroba each of wool, and that the wool finds eager purchasers from \$35 to \$40 above all other wools in the market, it would be strange indeed if the attention of sheepfarmers were not directed to this breed, which, as it would appear, is destined to create a revolution in River Plate sheepbreeding practice. It is unprecedented in the annals of wool-growing in this country for a sheepbreeder to get more than \$60 for fleece from his sheep.

The first transaction of the day, 90,000 patacons, was the only one worth recording; patacons fell off five centesimos, it was even

said, owing to the arrival of gold in the Daman, for a leading American merchant. In National Bonds 30,000 were sold at 4 1/2, market stiff. There was much talk on 'Change about the Argentine loan, and the very heavy commissions which, according to one of our colleagues, is charged in London. The general impression is, that the new loan will be done between 65 and 70, and that the Buenos Ayres Bonds in London will follow the same example as the old Brazilian. Advice received by the packet respecting this matter are not of a favorable nature, inasmuch as the high prices talked of were ridiculed in England. Notwithstanding the heavy arrivals of wool in the market money rules very easy, and paper money is by no means as scarce this year as last.

This was the first day we noticed what we could term animation in the wool market. The lots of wool offered were in excellent condition. Nearly all the above sales were made by the leading English broker of the Once, who has reason to be proud of the very splendid prices which he obtained for his constituents. The wools above mentioned came principally from the partidos Zarate, Capilla, Aroca, etc., and all belonged to Irish sheepfarmers. We noticed to-day one well known American buyer in the market; he bought the last lot.

Both Plazas are full of the burry wools, the very description which buyers object to, but primo lots, free from burr, we learn from a leading German buyer, are in demand and looked for.

The stock of unsold wool in the North Plaza is about 320 carts; in the South Plaza it is nearly as heavy, and on every road leading to town the carts are coming in.

Salt is beginning to look up: to-day there were two sales—1,500 fanegas at 18 rs. on 3 months' time, and a cargo to arrive, at 18 rs. less 5 per cent.

Tallow is in active demand, and, in fact, none in the market, 1,400 from Mr. Leslie's estancia, Estrella del Norte, was sold at 16 1/2 rs. The Liverpool steamer Leda leaves to-night with almost a full cargo for England. She takes bales of the new wool home. She will remain in Montevideo until Monday evening or Tuesday morning.

Messrs. Lumb, Brothers, have placed the English steamer, Agnes Arkle, on the berth for Rio. Messrs. C. W. Benn and Co. have placed on the berth the Dutch brig Louise, to load for Antwerp.

Messrs. Tay and Upton have placed on the berth the British barque Normanby, to load for New York at current rates.

Messrs. H. A. Green and Co. have chartered the British brig Lapwing, to load bones and bone-ash in the Uruguay for cruises, at 36s. and 5 per cent. pilotage, on account of ship.
