THE ARREST OF MR. HENRY HALL.

Last week we published the arrest of our respected countryman Mr. Hall of Bella Vista, but made no commentary on the matter, waiting some further particulars or rather expecting to hear that it was the indiscreet act of one of Governor Lagraña's officers and that Mr. H. was soon after set at liberty with an apology for the mistake. The mails since arrived, however, have brought us no news whatever on the subject, and as we must suppose Mr. Hall to be still in custody, it is well the British public should be reminded of it, that steps be taken in the proper quarter for investigation and fair play. It is absurd to suppose that any sensible man in Corrientes could have suspected Mr. Hall of Paraguayan tendencies, or accuse him of betraying the hospitality of Argentine soil he has so long enjoyed. His name is well known among us as having been associated with the firm of Proudfoot, Hall & Co. of Montevideo, and during his residence at Bella Vista he has gained the respect and esteem of all classes. His efforts to promote cotton-planting evinced also the spirit of industrial progress with which he was animated, and he always kept aloof from politics. Add to this that he is a gentleman of refined tastes, and kindly disposition, and an Englishman proud of his nationality: this is quite enough to shew that he is far above the petty passions of a gaucho captain of militia or ambitious hair-dresser, such as usually play a part in the commotions of Argentine villages.

It happened, however, that when the approach of the Paraguayan invaders made the authorities of Bella Vista take to their heels the affrighted inhabitants placed themselves under the protection of the only Englishman in the place, and Mr. Hall was elected *Cefe Politico*. We will not stop to enquire whether he continued in office after the entry of the enemy, since the legal authorities were gone, and he was certainly the fittest person to supply their place. But, we repeat, there is nothing in all this, why he should be placed under arrest. Nay, we were about to propose that the Government should send him a graceful acknowledgment of his services, which if unsuccessful in preventing the sack of Bella Vista were no less nobly meant than perhaps prevented still greater excesses. We certainly feel proud of Mr. Hall, and call for his immediate release.

LATEST FROM CHILE.

THE BLOCKADE CONTINUES.

Yesterday we received our exchanges from Chile up to the 28th October, the blockade still continues. In the correspondence between the American Minister, Mr. Nelson, in Santiago, and the Brazilian Minister, Señor Varnahagan, in Santiago, the latter brings to light an important omission of Admiral Pareja, who declared the blockade of the whole coast, and began to put it in execution without having presented his credentials in proper form to Chile, as Plenipotentiary of Her Catholic Majesty. As the blockade has already been obliged to limit his blockade to the ports he can actually blockade effectually, it is probable he may now be compelled to raise it altogether. This correspondent writes of Señor Varnahagan puts another version on the blockade matter. Several Spanish vessels had run the blockade of Yaguajay, greatly to the annoyance of the Admiral. The blockade of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, who had disembarked from Val-

paraiso, robbing the office of some 20,000 patacons, has been apprehended in Mendoza and sent back a prisoner.

The following ports are now declared blockaded: Tomé, Talcahuano, Valparaiso, Herradura, Guayacan, Oquimbo and Caldera, and Admiral Pareja had published a notice to this effect. The Chilean Government, was engaged in raising an army and collecting subscriptions. There were rumors of peace in Valparaiso.

Great excitement was caused in Santiago by the news that eleven Spaniards who had fled from Chile to the Argentine Republic were captured on the top of the Cordillera and sent back close prisoners.

Some Spaniards in Santiago had been arrested as spies and would be tried by a military tribunal.

The British war steamer Mutine had gone out of Valparaiso to meet the mail steamer and get the mails.

The Chilean census has at last been taken, resulting in 1,815,218 inhabitants in the republic. The population of Valparaiso is a little over 74,000.

Fourteen prisoners had escaped from the public prison of Talca.

There has been at last a sort of fight between the Spaniards and the Chileans, in which some blood was spilt, but no one killed; some marines from the blockading squadron landed at Valparaiso to cut out some boat; the artillery corps on guard told them to be off, they refused, were fired on, and ultimately fled to their boats some of them badly wounded. The affair caused great noise, and great fears were entertained that the Spanish Admiral would shell the town. All the principal people are leaving Valparaiso until the blockade is raised.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday there was a great effort at Mr. Marshall's ship-yard to get the Ville del Salto afloat; steam was got up, the river high, hawsers thrown out, but all failed. She was up too high on the bank and could not be got off in time, as the river began to fall suddenly.

There is great complaint down in Barracas about the stopping of the works of the Boca Railway. It appears that the diligence people and an insignificant Italian clique have persuaded the Government to stop the works, and the consequence is that the streets are all blocked up greatly to the inconvenience of the barraqueros and others. The Boca Railway to the Tres Esquinas proves a most decided convenience, and if the road was run out to the Church Plaza on the other side of the bridge it would meet a want long felt. It is to be hoped that Governor Saavedra will not allow himself to be led by the nose by the owners of omnibuses, etc., who are the only parties who can suffer by the building of this railway. It is really humiliating to think that the Executive could be forced by the importunities of a crowd of anti-go-ahead Italians to interfere to the direct prejudice of the public at large and a respectable Railway Company.

We are glad to announce that the New York 'Herald' has sent out a special correspondent to study the condition of Brazil and La Plata, and the advantages as a field of emigration. Mr. B. has arrived in Rio Janeiro, and writes us he will soon visit Buenos Ayres. He is welcome.

Owing to our great desire to keep our readers well acquainted with the wool market in the River Plate we have been applying everywhere to get information. As the wool sales in Montevideo are never reported in any paper, we took the liberty of writing down to a leading foreign house in the vain hope that we might at last secure authentic information. The reply we received is so rich, and descriptive of that class of gentlemen called wool-brokers, that we give the following extract: "We are unable to give you any information about wool-sales, much to our regret. Our business leaves us not a single moment for other occupations than our own; but even should we have time enough, we think we could never give you the exact information you require, as the wool-brokers here are the most selfish, aristocratic, and unapproachable people you can find. We are friends of the leading

broker, but we are quite sure that he would never give us any reliable statement of the sales."

Yesterday we received advices from San Juan; we are happy to assure our readers that Major Rickard's celebrated mines seem at last about to realize the bright hopes we entertained of them. The mines are now in a more flourishing condition than ever, and there is little to fear for the future; the new amalgamating machinery has been working for some time, and over eighteen hundred ounces fine bar silver has been sent down to the River Plate Bank. The furnaces are constantly steaming away, and by the 1st January some 500 tons of ore will be worked up which will be worth about £12,000 sufficient to pay off the old shareholders who have not joined the new Company.

The news from the Interior is very flattering, in San Juan and the other Provinces everything is very quiet and people have forgotten politics.

The *Crudos* in Buenos Ayres have at last made a stand in yesterday's 'Tribuna.' Some of the leading members of the Club Libertad published their programme; the object seems to be to turn out the National Government and send the capital up to Rosario. Our friends in Rosario will be glad to hear this, but there is not the remotest probability of these gentlemen succeeding in their extraordinary views. Buenos Ayres is the commercial and political capital of the Argentine Republic and no club nor clique will be ever able to so effectually ruin this city as to make it a sort of Provincial town. Don Pastor Obligado, one of the signers of this extraordinary document, is a wealthy householder in this city; we are at a loss therefore to discover why he should labour to ruin the city, destroy house-property, and reduce rents to one half their present quota. The warm weather seems to have an extraordinary effect on some of our city politicians.

Last night a splendid ball was given by one of our leading English merchants, at the north end of the town, a locality which owes much to the liberal exertions of the gentleman in question. The Socorro neighbourhood was formerly the most neglected in this city. A spirited English merchant some few years ago bought a piece of ground there, reared a magnificent English mansion thereon, and turned an old grass-covered lane into a Broadway or Sackville Street; our friend deserves well to be titled the "Earl of Socorro."

The raising of the railway fares on the Western Railway has caused so much noise, that the manager of the railway has been compelled to publish a table of all the fares charged on the other railways. We have it on the highest authority that the Western Railway is all but sold. Letters by last packet state that Sr. Riestra has all but concluded the bargain. Mr. Haedo might, therefore, as well have left the fares as they were, particularly as the railway in question belonging to the Government, has no right whatever to make any profits out of the public. A charge sufficient to cover all expenses is all that is legal.

The Argentine Foreign Affairs Minister has written a complimentary letter to the Italian Minister, thanking him for the services rendered to Argentines by the Italian war steamer *Veloce*. Mr. Barbolani has replied that the captain did nothing more than his duty.

The total mutiny of Urquiza's army is now the topic of the day. Some say that only the cavalry have cleared out; whilst others go so far as to say Urquiza has not a man left. It is almost impossible yet to say how this may be, but we regret to say that rather alarming news from Parana was received yesterday. Several hundred men had assembled in the environs of that town, and the estancieros were in fear that their estancias would be sacked. Things in Entre Rios look in rather a bad way. Urquiza's power is 'nil.' The rising star in that province is a man named Lopez Jordan, the descendant of an Englishman.

Madame Briol will arrive in Montevideo early in December, where she will remain a few days, and then come on to Buenos Ayres. Our opera-going

friends will be delighted to hear this pleasing intelligence.

The Emperor of Brazil has sent a new Brazilian Minister to Montevideo, Sr. Brito, a gentleman of high diplomatic reputation.

It is our painful duty to acquaint our readers of the melancholy news we hear from Paraguay: all the Decoud family, mother, sisters, sons, and daughters, we are informed, have been arrested by President Lopez, and were expelled Paraguay and landed at some remote spot on the Gran Chaco. We suppose the unfortunate family had to travel on foot through the jungles of the Gran Chaco in a direction towards Corrientes. The only charge against this family is that young Decoud, who was a clerk in this city, is now serving under Paunero; but nothing can justify or extenuate so barbarous an act as to cast a few helpless females on the lonely shore of the Gran Chaco.

The Provincial Government has at last issued the decree for the creation of the new town called "Guardia Nacional." It will be located, we believe, on Mr. Jas. Bell's estancia; Mr. Paucbo Duberty, a vecino of San Antonio de Areco, is named Judge, he is a man well known to our countrymen out there, and, we believe, deservedly liked by all.

Two American gunboats for the Argentine squadron are expected out early in the ensuing month. They have been purchased by Sr. Sarmiento in the Navy Yard in New York, and are first-class. The Argentine navy will be greatly improved by this acquisition, and we highly approve of the Government in at last abandoning the old policy of buying passenger boats for war-steamers.

The last rain was much heavier in the North than in the South. Strange to say the drought is now felt greater in the South than in the North.

The tickets for the Inauguration of the Coliseum are at last sent round. As none but shareholders will be admitted, there is a demand now felt for the shares. We understand that there are only three unsold.

Passengers by the new American steamer *Portefa*, "request us to recommend this splendid steamer to the public. There is no other steamer on the Montevideo line that can be compared to her. The 'cuisine' is far ahead of all the other steamers, and the owners omit no expense to meet the convenience and comfort of passengers. She sails so smoothly through the water that sea sickness is unknown on this steamer.

GREAT NEWS FROM CHASCOMUS.

THE RAILWAY FINISHED.

NEW ENGLISH CLUB.

As we have always taken a lively interest in the formation of the Great Southern Railway, from the turning of the first sod, on the 7th of March last year, now that the line has been completed in such an incredibly short period of time, and in such an efficient manner, we think that the thanks of the community are due, and ought to be conveyed in some demonstrative manner, to Mr. Crawford, the able and intelligent Chief Engineer, for his indefatigable exertions to finish the line before the end of this year. The line now only awaits the Government approval to be opened, and we have no doubt that under the skillful management of Mr. Banfield, who is already shewing a high degree of competency for his responsible position, the line will command every success, and ultimately stretch out to the uttermost parts of the Southern pampas.

Now that the steam-whistle sounds in our ears, and enlivens the neighborhood, we are sadly disappointed that no rumor of any public rejoicings, in connection with the inauguration, is afloat. Has not the inspired man of wisdom said, 'Better is the end of a thing than the beginning thereof?' Surely, then, it is becoming to entertain the different railway officials, the representatives of the world-renowned firm of Peto & Betts, at some dinner in the large and commodious godsheds. A magnificent demonstration

was made at the turning of the first sod, why should something not be done at the laying of the last rail? Why should not the Municipal body, the wealthy estancieros and merchants of this place, unite in acknowledging the services of the railway contractors and engineers, by hailing the arrival of the first passenger-train as the pioneer of civilization, and marking a new and better era in the progress of the country? It is to be hoped that for their own credit something will be done in the matter.

In fulfilment of a promise made by your agents here, a barrel of Guinness' XX porter was awaiting the laying of the last rail at the station, for the refreshment and delectation of the railwaymen under the stalwart Mr. Curtis, the working contractor. The potency of this beverage may account for the fact of some railway 'sleepers' having been found a good way off the line, and apparently 'rivetted to the ground.'

There are now several points of attraction in this hitherto inert and neglected locality, and first and foremost there is the magnificent mansion of Mr. Crawford, with its embattled 'mirador'; in other respects it has quite an English aspect. Situated on a lofty barranca on the edge of Chascomus lake it is the most prominent object, along with the twin towers of the Merced Church in the town, and catches the eye of the traveller leagues distant. Many choice trees have been planted, fields and walks have been laid out, and everything has been done to render it a pleasant and desirable dwelling place, such a place as we fancy associated with 'otium cum dignitate.' If no demonstration is made at the opening of the railway, we hope there will be something at the 'house-warming.'

Another point of attraction is the Plaza Constitucion. The Juez de Paz, Sr. D. Pedro José Machado, has evinced a laudable desire to promote the amenity of the town, certainly much in need of improvement. The ground of the plaza has been laid out in walks, with trees bordering them, and surrounded with an elegant fence, and sown with alfalfa, thus combining the 'utile cum dulce in equine' estimation. He also very properly obliges the proprietors of houses to keep the sidewalks tidy and free of weeds; we should like if he would also oblige the Municipal body, of which he is the president, to 'mend their ways.'

The railway station also commands our admiration: it is decidedly the handsomest building on the whole line. It is a chaste and elegant structure and provides ample accommodation in waiting rooms for passengers.

Another point of notice, though not of admiration, is the pyramidal lamp in the centre of the Plaza del Comercio, fronting the well-known shop of Peter-of-the-great-golden-boot. No longer does it shed its feeble flickering rays, for some migratory birds have extinguished it by taking up their abode in the top. It is easy to account for the darkness that prevails in this benighted place, when lights are put out by a few 'rare aves.' However, it is one consolation that the 'swallows homeward fly' when the night gets longer.

An English Club has been started up here, having for its object the advancement of literature, the cultivation of social refinement, and the encouragement of manly and healthful games. Quoiting, chess, and draughts have already been instituted. Now anyone may come out and measure lances with any of the Scotch and English champions to be found occasionally at the quoiting ground in the immediate vicinity of the English store. We understand that Messrs. Ind, Coope & Co., Burton-on-Trent, and Messrs. Guinness, of Dublin, have been unanimously elected honorary members. These two celebrated firms also carry off the honors in 'draughts,' all other hot-tempered gentlemen being blackballed by the 'Fladnash Club.'

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

SPANISH DIFFICULTY APPARENT.

FRANCE AGAIN.

November 15. "Cuando el río suena algo lleva," is a Spanish adage that people are fond

of applying to all situations and vague announcements of change, whatever be the community in which they may be heard. Perhaps a greater gift of discrimination might lead one to discard the proverb as inapplicable to the present state of things in the River Plate, and indeed at any time, as embryo politicians and social philosophers with us seem to have a peculiar leaning to the fabulous, and draw on their inventive faculties for the preserving of events which are destined to be wholly ignored by future history. And yet the saying is repeated on all hands with reference to an approaching 'dénouement' on the theatre of war, and assurances of a peaceful settlement of the question with Paraguay are echoed and re-echoed on all sides. It would be idle, not to say unwise, just now to repeat all that is said on the subject with reference to private letters from the allied camp. Suffice it to say that there are grounds for such a belief in the possibility of a prompt termination of the struggle, though in the present conjuncture it is quite impossible to affirm what degree of solidity those grounds possess.

I happened to be passing by the Spanish Honorary Vice-Consul's, Sr. Zumaran's residence yesterday, and my attention was called to the fact of some men being employed in taking down the Spanish coat of arms over the doorway. This small incident has given rise to various conjectures and commentaries, but how far it has any connection with certain changes in the Spanish official hierarchy here I am not at liberty to say.

SHOCKING MURDERS IN B. ORIENTAL

The Montevideo papers mention a double murder committed by an Italian named Gian Battista, on the persons of another Italian named Montepino and his step-daughter. It seems Battista lived in the house of his victims, Montepino being separated from his wife, and the murderer being in love with the step-daughter but unable to obtain her. Suspicions exist against Montepino's wife as an accomplice in the deed, but it is only known that Bautista got up at night and killed Montepino and the step-daughter asleep. Some neighbors saw him run from the house, his hands covered with blood, and he managed to mount a horse and escape; but two days after he was overtaken by the police, about 4 leagues from the city, and resisting every effort at capture was shot down and slain. The wife has been arrested.

The 'Republicano' of Concordia quotes a private letter from Tacuarembó [B. Oriental] with the following details of a tragedy committed there on the 23rd ult.—"Don Anselmo La Madrid, a man of respectable character, was teaching his children in his dining room at 8 o'clock on the evening in question, while his wife was with some visitors in the parlor, when two men rushed in upon him and savagely murdered him, with 10 stabs and two blows of a hatchet. The afflicted wife hearing the children's cries hastened to his assistance and found the mangled corpse on the floor weltering in blood, while one of the assassins was cutting off the head. At the same time the other ruffian armed with a murderous knife gave her a mortal wound between the shoulders. The assassins having thus murdered this virtuous couple and left the poor orphans to receive the last sighs of their dying mother, retired from the scene of carnage. It is said that the criminals belong to the police-force of the Department, and that Sr. La Madrid had formerly been *Cefe Politico* of the same. It is hoped that the Monte Video Government will execute full justice on the ruffians who so barbarously murdered a peaceable man in his own house."

We glean from the above that this second tragedy had some political character, which, however, nowise palliates its enormity. By a strange coincidence another Sr. La Madrid (the name is not common) was murdered the month previous on his estancia near Dolores in the Province of Buenos Ayres. In neither case have the criminals been taken.

CRICKET.

MARRIAGE IN HIGH LIFE AT RIO JANEIRO.

The marriage of Alfred Edwin Yarrow Esq. with Miss Inda Gertrude Lattilla was solemnized, on the 8th inst., at the British Church by the Rev. S. H. Preston, the civil ceremony having

been previously performed at the British Consulate by H. B. M's. Consul.

In the evening a magnificent ball, at which the Bride and Bridegroom were present, was given by Mr. Hett at his residence at Ponta do Cajú. The house and grounds were most tastefully and brilliantly illuminated with lamps and Chinese lanterns of varied colors, and the supper table, which was laid out in a most elegant and recherché style for 150 persons, was placed, under a canopy of flags, composed of flags of all nations, in the noble avenue of splendid mango trees lit up with innumerable colored lamps, in addition to several large chandeliers disposed upon the table, and the effect of the arrangement was as charming as it was novel.

Dancing was vigorously maintained by the delighted guests to the music so exquisitely played by the Band of H. M. S. Narcissus, and the well known German Band, who also performed select pieces of harmony in the intervals of the dances, and during supper time.

Altogether the evening passed in the most joyous manner, beneath the influence of the hospitable dispositions of the kind host and hostess, whose engaging amiability lent a further charm to an entertainment which has been rarely, if ever, equalled in any similar scene in Brazil.

ON 'CHANGE.

The fixed value of paper money seems to have at last been ascertained. Patrons find their real level at 26.15. All the efforts of the 'bulls,' all the exertions of the 'bears,' can only change this rate for a few hours some five or ten centimes.

The resignation of Sr. Guimaraens, the late manager of the Maua Bank in Montevideo, was also spoken of, and we are authorized to contradict, in the most emphatic manner, the reasons alleged in the 'Nacion Argentina' of this morning for the resignation of that gentleman.

National Bonds look shaky again. There were no transactions during Bolsa hours, although sellers were offering all round, until late in the afternoon, when we heard of one sale, 5,000, at 44 7/8.

Amongst the English portion of the Bala, the great topic was the magnificent banquet which a leading English merchant was giving this eve-

ning at his West-end residence to the Committee of the Coliseum.

In wools there is continued activity—every road leading to the Plaza is crowded with bullock carts. Mr. Fair's wool, which is one of the largest lots from the South, was sold to-day at reserved prices, but we have reason to believe at a very splendid figure considering the condition of some of the cars.

Our Montevideo correspondent sends us the following interesting commercial intelligence:—"Business is slack, and the importing houses are holding out for higher prices in expectation of the great and progressive rise in all kinds of goods now taking place in England."

"The Banks are doing a considerable and lucrative business, and the Montevideo Bank especially is gradually coming into notice. Its transactions, I understand, are daily extending. The offices of this bank are situated in Don Juan Miguel Martinez's fine new building in the Calle Misiones; and the apartments occupied by the bank are well fitted up.

"I have to note with great regret the retirement of Sr. Guimaraens from the management of the Maua Bank. This gentleman resigned so long back as July last, and Sr. Juan Hayden takes his place. I am not acquainted with this gentleman, but believe he is a Brazilian by birth.

"The Montevideo Bank has published its monthly return, which shows 500,000 dollars, or half the amount of its capital as already paid up. The advances in accounts current made by the bank are to the amount of 321,000 dollars, and the amounts received through the same channel figure for 124,000 dollars.

3. To a proportionate share of the Capitals and Interests of forfeited subscriptions.
