THE GOLD-MINES OF TACUAREMBO.

SCIENTIFIC ANALYSIS AND REPORT.

PROSPECTUS OF JOINT-STOCK CO.

The Tacuarembó gold-field is now a reality, and we subjoin the analysis and 'denuncia' respecting same. This mine was discovered by Don Manuel Martínez de Castrillon in the locality so long famous for its auriferous character. There is nothing new or strange in the event, since it is known that many people have for some time gained a livelihood by the gold which they pick up in the fissures and rivulets of that territory, without the aid of practical knowledge or regular works. But the matter now assumes a more formal shape, since, after repeated explorations, Sr. Castrillon discovered in the Sierra Arecua a gold-bed of great yield and value, which he has taken measures to work, by renting the land from the owners and obtaining the necessary privilege from Government, which is conceded in the following terms:

Decree.—Ministry of Government, Nov. 20th, 1865. We hereby concede to the petitioner the right of working the mine which he has 'denounced' with the samples presented; without prejudice to the rights of the Nation.

A joint-stock Co. is being formed to commence the works at once, and everything promises the greatest success to the undertaking. We have seen the samples alluded to, and being convinced of the undeveloped mineral wealth of Tacuarembó, feel much pleasure in recording the establishment of an enterprise of such magnitude. The results will be, probably, splendid; and we trust there will be no difficulty in raising the funds to commence operations immediately.

Sr. Castrillon having submitted 5 samples, for analysis by Messrs. Weber and Las Cazes, these intelligent chymists have reported as follows:

N.º 1. A piece of quartz containing auriferous metal.

N.º 2. Some gold globules amalgamated by mercury from a piece of quartz weighing 50 grammes [$\frac{1}{2}$ oz.].

N.º 3. Fifteen grammes ($\frac{1}{2}$ oz.) chloride of silver with 10 grammes pure silver: this is from the same quartz as the gold above-mentioned, which we find also contained 7 per cent mercury, used in the amalgamation.

N.º 4. Gold ore as found in the mine.

N.º 5. Pure gold, cleared of the various other metals.

The analysis of the gold samples shows the following aliquot parts of 100: Pure gold 62, silver 8, paladio $\frac{1}{2}$, iron 5, antimony 2, silicious quartz 22.

Sample N.º 1. is a piece of quartz studded with bright yellow metallic globules, of incomplete formation: the quartz is opaque, with red veins of oxide of iron, showing the complete character of auriferous quartz, with gold crystal interspersed with bits of gold. In order to analyse these crystals they have been mechanically extracted with great care and separated from the silicious clay. The result of the analysis shows this mineral to be one of the best for extracting pure gold ore. The silver, which appears as 8 per cent, is an important item, and its separation from the gold an easy process. By the adoption of modern methods this gold quartz may be worked with great profit, and a considerable economy of time and labor."

Mr. Castrillon in his prospectus concludes thus:

"It is unnecessary to add a word more, as to the benefit promised by this mine, and not having sufficient capital, myself, to undertake the works,

I purpose forming a joint-stock Co., with \$50,000 capital, in 100 shares of \$500 each, one half payable on subscribing to the stock, and the rest as the progress of the works may require. The abundance of the precious metal, the facility for extracting it, and the materials I have already procured promise a splendid return for those investing in an enterprise both of private and national benefit. D. Bernardino Esparraguera [94 Sarandí] will enrol share-holders and give every information, and as soon as all the stock is taken up, a General Meeting of share-holders will be called, to elect a Board of Directors."

We have taken these interesting details from the 'Siglo' of Montevideo, and expect soon to hear something more of the Tacuarembó gold-fields from Mr. Jehu Hitchins who is at present exploring there, for 4 Loudon house. The existence of such deposits of precious metal is beyond all doubt, and some years ago there was a gentleman in Montevideo, who possessed a splendid dinner-service made of Tacuarembó gold. The readiness of the Montevidean Government in giving Mr. Castrillon the necessary permission for his undertaking is a pleasing contrast to the shabbiness of the Argentine Congress in the matter of the Jujuy petroleum-beds, the unfortunate discoverer of which (Sr. Villa) is now a raving lunatic in the Convalecencia. We heartily congratulate the Banda Oriental on the new era now opening up, for the development of its resources, which is another sign of the great future destined for the River Plate territories, and which we hope is not far distant.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The flood, on Friday night, nearly inundated the Barracas; on the banks of the Riachuelo the water rose nearly to a level with the railway, but during the night subsided. The arrivals of all descriptions of produce are now so heavy that the schooners have to lie off waiting for a place to land. Dry hides, hair, wool, are coming in so fast by the Riachuelo that the barracas are all full.

Yesterday morning the whole city was startled by the firing of a grand salute by the Brazilians; as it was the 2nd December we suppose the salute was in honor of Napoleon's last 'coup d'état.' Our friends the Brazilians are the greatest people we know of, for firing salutes. Some of our friends who were busy in the wool market, thought that perhaps news had arrived of the fall of Humaitá.

The Porteña, from Montevideo, arrived yesterday with heavy mails. The Government down there seems to be an out-and-out go-ahead administration. A new immigration Office is about to be established, as the public works in that city are so numerous that hands are very scarce. The immigration office is a move in the right direction, and we have no doubt will lead to good results.

The arrest of Berges, the Paraguayan Minister, has proved to be a 'bola'; he has returned to Asuncion and has taken his post as Foreign Affairs Minister. The Flying Fish, which brought the celebrated despatches to President Mitre, is aground at the mouth of an arroyo, and many think that she came down to reconnoitre the enemy and in case of danger had the despatches to save her.

An Englishman dropped dead in the Paseo Julio on Friday. We have not heard his name. We suppose the excessive heat was the immediate cause of so sudden a death.

General Borges has been sent up by order of the Government to Paysandú; we believe to supersede Mr. Mundell; we regret this much, as Mr. Mundell was an active, good man, and very popular amongst foreigners.

The steamer Hercules, which commenced running on the Rosario route, has been taken off and is now chartered by the Brazilian Government to take up troops to Corrientes.

The Agnes Arkle has been also chartered by the Brazilian Government to take troops from Rio and other Brazilian ports. We hear the sum paid is eleven thousand patacons per month.

Mr. Stone, the agent for Colton's maps, now so well-known in the River Plate, has arrived from Rio Grande at

Montevideo; he will shortly come to Buenos Ayres.

A terrible case of murder has been just discovered at Zubeizu's saladero, near Rosario. An Italian, known to have money, was assassinated and lay for several days in a ditch, near the Saladero before the corpse was discovered; the murderer has not been caught.

There is a story current about the great antipathy which Italian Admirals bear towards the River Plate; two were named for the Station at Montevideo and both refused, preferring to throw up their commissions than leave for South America.

Mr. Werner's Concert has been postponed until next Saturday, owing to the engagements of Sr. Poppe. We are happy to assure our readers that Mr. Schramm will play at the next Concert.

The National Government has just decreed ten thousand patacons to be paid to the Argentine Minister in Paris, for soldiers sent for the Argentine army.

One of the finest houses in this city is now being constructed at Paseo de Julio, a little above Llavallo's house by a wealthy German Doctor.

Our colleague 'La España' is making a great noise about the case of the murdered lottery boy. We confess we think there is every room for complaint; a more *prima facie* case of murder was never known and the release of the accused has we understand been taken up by the Spanish Minister.

We notify our readers that in a few days the police dog-killing law comes into execution; owners of the canine race should therefore be on their guard. A new tariff of fines against dogs has been published: it is not worth the trouble of translating.

The Chilean Minister, it appears, applied to the Oriental Government for liberty to establish a prize court in Montevideo; we are happy to say that it was declined, and we trust the Argentine Government will act with the same discretion in this matter.

The Club Libertad declares war against Spain, and takes up the cause of Chile: all the members of this plucky club, we suppose, are about, at once, leave Buenos Aires for Valparaiso to fight the Spaniards; the Cocidos will not be sorry for this, as it will rid them of their old opponents.

We hear that two or three new papers are about to be started in Montevideo, one will be called the 'Nacion Argentina': there is not the remotest chance of these papers succeeding, already that city has too many journals. The papers are also too large for the size of the place and the number of subscribers.

The 'Nacion Argentina' states that another naval engagement up the rivers has probably come off; if so we suppose the Brazilians have attacked the Paraguayans, for we question very much if the Paraguayans would attempt to come down on the allied squadron.

The Rev. Mr. Goodfellow returned from his trip through the provinces of Entre Rios and Santa Fé, by the Tala, on Friday. He attended the dedication of a church in Rosario in which the service is in English, and another in Esperanza where the services are in German and French. A site for another, was obtained at Villa de Urquiza, in Entre Rios, where an edifice will be erected early next year. We are promised some interesting details of the progress of the colonies in the provinces of Entre Rios and Santa Fé.

The Brazilian Minister, Dr. Octaviano, we learn, has taken an Englishman's house in Calle Cuyo, and will shortly remove from his hotel. We believe he is in Montevideo, and that it is not probable he will go up to Corrientes for some months.

The schism amongst the Crudos is the great talk of town; a new club is being formed which will put down the old club: we are in the dark as to what all the political squabbling is going on about; it would seem that some of the members of the Club Libertad want to push matters too far, but the power of the Club seems now at an end; they are so divided they can effect nothing.

In the province of San Juan there has been a frightful hurricane, all the vines and peach trees blown down, and several houses also. Some of the largest trees in many places were torn

up by the root. An unfortunate watch-maker was waylaid by some deserters and robbed of all his watches and jewellery. The mines are all doing well particularly those of Rickard's company, and Klappenback's. A number of Spaniards have arrived from Chile, and a meeting of Ohlenos, resident in San Juan, has been held to consider about fighting for their flag. The Governor is busy forming primary schools, and affairs in general are progressing most favorably in this distant province.

The Government of the province has decreed that the election of eight deputies to the National Congress shall take place on the 1st of January. The Crudos have not yet made out their list, but the Government list, it is thought, will be composed of the moderate party, and will carry the day.

We publish to-day an interesting letter from our friend 'Cuevas,' and are obliged to hold over another till Tuesday.

Mr. Billingham has some auctions to-day at Caballito and Mercedes: he gives free tickets by rail, and the 'paseo' will be agreeable.

The Boca branch-line will not be opened to traffic till Thursday.

Dr. Minelli's new paper 'Europa' has appeared at Montevideo: it is well got up, of the usual size, and we return his salute with pleasure.

We had thought the Glee Club (like many other Institutions in Buenos Ayres) defunct, but we are glad to learn that under the able management of Mr. Marshall, so well and favorably known in musical circles, the society continues its weekly meetings as heretofore. In view of the progress of musical science amongst us, we should like to see this Club lay claim to greater pretensions, and instead of hiding their light under a bushel; we think they ought to lay their modesty aside, and give their friends the benefit of their talents. Their capability admits of no doubt, and under the guidance of their well known leader, no other society of this class can claim precedence.

NEWS FROM THE FLEET

To the Editors of the 'Standard,'
 Corrientes, Nov. 22, 1865.

Gentlemen,

Since my last the only thing of consequence that has taken place around these 'diggings,' has been the threat of an attack of the Paraguayan squadron.

Several times since we have been here General Barroso has sent up the river at times four, and at others five, gunboats, accompanied by our steamer Libertad, to reconnoitre the enemy, never meeting with any opposition, and at times not even seeing the enemy.

A few nights ago this town was thrown into confusion, as there was a report that the enemy had come down in force to reconnoitre (which was true), and they intended 'en seguida' to attack us. This piece of information caused the editor of the 'Esperanza' to publish his stupid opinion respecting our position, and the serious consequences it would cause the town in case of an action. This, of course, made things worse, and 'quien sabe' to what a pitch things would have got had not 'our old man' rather energetically requested Governor Lagrana to shut the 'rattle-trap' of the said editor. To make things look still more alarming, the same day that the news of the enemy's intention of attacking us got into circulation, the Italian gunboat Veloce that was laying inside of us got up steam, took her brigantine in tow, and cleared out, dropping anchor again below the point, and entirely out of reach of all danger. We, of course, although not in the least expecting an attack, got all ready to give the enemy a warm reception. We were all night on the 'qui vive.' The next morning the long wished for Italian steamer, Principe O'Doné, arrived from Humaitá, bringing of course information of some consequence.

We have received both reliable and unreliable information. That of the captain of said steamer you cannot, I think, rely much upon. He gives the Paraguayans a naval force of from 18 to 20 steamers, and 20 odd 'chatas.' This of course is preposterous: had they such a force they

would have attacked us long ago. He says Humaitá mounts from 200 to 300 guns, and has three chains across the river, over schooners, anchored abreast each other, the whole width of the river. He has also said that there are 60 guns at the Paso de la Patria.

The information given by the pilot of said steamer to ours, in confidence, is more reliable, but still inclining to the other extreme. The said pilot told us that he had not seen any 'chatas,' but heard they had 6 or 8, and 10 or 12 steamers, but most of those were up at Matto Grosso. He said the Paraguayans had a battery of 30 guns at the mouth of the Atajo, I forget the name of the place, but it is some miles below Humaitá.

The entrance of the Atajo river is right abreast of us, so you see it would have been useless for the enemy to have put any battery at the entrance of the Paraguay river, for by going up the Atajo we would leave it nine miles in our rear.

At the Paso de la Patria there are from 40 to 50 guns, and some 10,000 or 15,000 men.

At Humaitá there are, according to the pilot's account, only 100 guns. He also informs us that Lopez gives 'bailecitos' to his officers and men to entertain them and to keep them from deserting. They are dying off by squads, of all kinds of horrible diseases. The 'vaqueano' of said steamer also gave us the cheering intelligence that Capt. Mazzini, other officers, and some men were still living, but closely confined at a village called Villa Pilar, that they were perfectly naked, and suffering all kinds of miseries. This piece of news was received with great surprise and joy by all of us. We can not help doubting it, but still sincerely hope it is true.

Respecting the number of steamers composing the enemy's squadron, I assure you the 'vaqueano's' information is not correct—they have more than he says. I enclose you a list of the steamers comprising their fleet, with some remarks respecting their condition and qualities for war. This list I have procured, as I do all my information respecting the enemy, from a gentleman who is well informed of their forces and movements.

Ygurey—quite a large steamer, but severely damaged in her engine in the fight at the Riachuelo—Tacuari, Ipora, Salto de Guayra, Casado—late Ranger—Iberá, Quayqui, Gualeguay, Añambay—all very small steamers—Olimbo—formerly the Argentina, a steamer that Captain Page had in the exploration of the river Paraguay—Piraveve—Flying Fish, a small English steamer that went up to Asuncion on the 14th of April—Vesuvio—late U. S. Pulaski, good for nothing—Parana, Corrientes, 25 de Mayo, Rio Blanco—a very large steamer lately sunk at Asuncion—Paraguari, and another steamer lately launched, and a brigantine called the Rosita. Of all this list there are only five or six good for anything, most of them being small tenders.

The people of this town take alarm at the slightest rumor, and they certainly have good reason, as they have had enough of Paraguayan 'liberty,' and the very idea of the enemy ever getting hold again of this unfortunate town causes a perfect terror amongst the people. Marshal Lopez seems determined to frighten us out of this place by threatening to attack with his squadron. Poor, ignorant fool, did he but know the desire there is in this squadron for them to make their appearance, he would not 'blow so much gas,' as the Yankees say.

The most important piece of news the O'Doné brought down was, that Lopez intended to be more humane hereafter in his way of waging war, and begins to show us his intention by offering to liberate all the unhappy families of the officers of our army that he and his savage hosts carried off from this town and province.

In looking over the 'Tribuna' a few days ago I noticed the publication of a letter, written by one of our Generals in confidence, to a gentleman who, in my opinion, should never be informed of anything that required secrecy. Fancy how imprudent it is for an officer to write to a weak-minded individual respecting the deplorable condition of his force in men, arms, and horses, knowing the army to be

38 leagues from here and coming along at the rate of a snail, and he in front of a force of 15,000 of an acute and daring enemy, and the officer holding the key of this unfortunate town, which could by his information easily receive another blow. It certainly has been a step of little forethought on the part of our General.

I do not think there is a single thing said or done here which Lopez does not know 48 hours afterwards. There are still many Correntino rascals of his around here.

The river is again falling rapidly—this is not strange, it's the announcement of the great annual rise in December.

The Ibiyá arrived at 10:30 this morning, bringing the news that the army is at Bella Vista, and taking advantage of the dry state of the arroyo to advance. She brought very few letters or 'encomiendas,' and to most of us it would have been the same if she had not come.

We have had three day's good substantial rain, which was required very much, as the heat was beginning to get insupportable. CUEVAS.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

December 1.

Whilst the last faint rumors of peace are dying away on the lips of the false apostles of River Plate equilibrium, as General Lopez understands it, and the faith of his supporters is waxing faint, we are startled from another quarter by reports of pending evil to the body politic in your city. Dark visions of trouble, are evoked by the enemies of Buenos Ayres, who now, as ever, prophets of bad tidings to what they choose to call a faithless people, assure us that all the seven vials of the Apocalypse are to be poured forth on the devoted head of General Mitre and his mercenary sectarians! His enemies gloat over the prospect of the coming struggle, and assert emphatically that the result of the different elections shortly to take place must overturn General Mitre's unstable (?) administration! The evil day has come at last, it is now upon us as upon him, and we must weather it as we may. However, there is something consoling in all this; when we reflect that the people who foretell the shameful discomfiture of General Mitre and his followers as near at hand, foretold too as Doona, emphatically and as nearly as possible in the same phrases, the complete triumph of General Lopez, the downfall of General Flores, and the return from captivity of the saviours of this state—the Blancos—who forsook their hearths and their altars on the 21st of February last to flee from the invaders of the barbarians! So every one must have his say, and we must not grudge to the enemies of the 'situation' with us the small consolation of venting their spite in vociferous vituperation and senseless prognostics.

The Custom-house revenue for the last month has amounted to \$225,000.

The 'Manifestacion Popular' (!) in honor of the advocate and jury who were instrumental in condemning Sr. Arrue as the holder of the Donec rate, of which I have spoken in a former letter, took place last evening.

The sovereign people, represented in the persons of a multitude of little boys and somewhat suspicious-looking adults, formed with the music in front of the advocate's house, where were assembled, I am told, the members of the jury. The 'national anthem,' as emblematical of all righteousness and honest intent, was of course forthcoming, and the shouts of enthusiastic urchins, mingled with the clash of cymbals, announced that within the lighted 'sala' there was revelry that night, as at least a 'quidnunc' informed me, expressing at the same time his regret that the master of the band was unfortunately unacquainted with that march, so appropriate for the occasion. 'See the conquering hero comes!'

However the affair did not last long, and as I turned away, arm-in-arm with a friend lately arrived from Europe, we fell into a train of disquisition on the curious state of that society where such intensely ludicrous exhibitions as the one we had just witnessed could find place.

The Government has under consideration an important measure, which if carried out, may be of much service

to the country. This is to establish an immigration office for the fostering of national agriculture and rural industry.

SANITARY MEASURES IN M. VIDEO. When the first alarm of cholera in Europe reached the River Plate, the 'Standard' took occasion to insist with energy upon the adoption of some precautions against a visitation of the plague.

Art. 1. The Board of Health shall at once appoint committees to go round and report on any focus of infection or filth in the city.

Art. 2. Such committees shall, with a written order, have power to visit private dwellings, jails, barracks, markets, &c.

Art. 3. In case of foul drains &c., after the inspector's report, the owner of the house shall be notified to make the necessary repairs within 5 days.

Art. 4. If such repairs be found impracticable the Board shall order the owner of the house to shut up such sink or drain entirely.

Art. 5. The Board shall have power to make openings in the streets wherever judged necessary, to communicate with the sewers, taking care however to employ carbonate of lime, or other deodorising stuff.

Art. 6. The sewers shall be oval in form and with brick foundation, so as to carry off the foul waters as quickly as possible.

Art. 7. The conduits shall be furnished with valves, or else carried out beyond the low-water mark, into the river.

Art. 8. In cases of private drains such as in calle Cerro-del-Sud, the owner of the same shall not allow any of his neighbors to make use of it.

Art. 9. The constructor of the sewerage shall be bound to supply steam-power for flooding the sewers with clean water every 24 hours.

Art. 10. It is expressly prohibited to clean water-closets without the inspector's certificate of having used 6 lb of chloride of lime as a disinfectant.

Art. 11. All water-closets shall hereafter be made like an 'aljibe,' with walls of brick, lime and roman-cement, at last 6 feet from the boundary wall.

Art. 12. It is expressly prohibited to throw dirty water, whether of washing, cooking or bathing, into the street, under a penalty of 34\$.

Art. 13. The Board shall order the use of disinfectants in water-closets and drains, by all house-holders, under penalty of 20\$.

Art. 14. In accordance with art. 3, the Board is empowered to whitewash any place it deems fit, and to mend or level house-pavements, for their better drainage.

Art. 15. The public health being above every other consideration, the Board may employ its own masons for these works, without submitting them for tenders.

Art. 16. The Board shall exact from the several house-owners the cost of any such repairs it may order, and in case of resistance embargo the house or furniture.

Art. 17. At each hospital or lazaretto shall be established a wash-house, for washing the bed-clothes &c., of the patients, or of vessels in quarantine.

Art. 18. The Board is empowered to burn the bedding and clothes of those infected with any contagious epidemic.

Art. 19. No hack-coach shall carry any infectious patients, under pain of \$100 and forfeiture of the coach: coaches for the use of sick shall bear a label to that effect, and be enrolled in a special list at the Police.

Art. 20. The inspectors shall seize all bad meat, unripe fruit &c., and destroy same, and levy fines on the offenders.

Art. 21. The Police shall lend every assistance in domiciliary visits, fines &c., as directed by the Board.

LATEST FROM ROSARIO.

AMERICAN COLONY IN THE GRAN CHACO.

A friend just arrived from Rosario gives us the following intelligence:—The place is very busy, no fewer than six vessels in port with materials for the Central Argentine railway: the engine now runs out some 17 leagues, and the rails are being laid down about 3 miles per week.

NEW STEAM-LINES FROM GENOA.

The 'Corriere Mercantile' of Genoa gives the following particulars of a project submitted to the Italian Government by a North American Co.:—It is proposed to establish two lines of ocean-steamers between Genoa and New York, and South America.

The N. York line to make fortnightly trips, and the steamers to South America once a month: a branch line from Genoa would ply to Leghorn, Naples, Messina, and Palermo; carrying goods and passengers for the ocean lines.

The only condition requested by the Company is a subsidy from the Italian Government, of 800,000 fr. [£ 32,000 sterling] per annum.

H.B.M. WAR STEAMER TRITON.

We feel much pleasure in publishing the following letter from Capt. Napier, of the Triton, to the Swedish Consul in Montevideo:—

Dear Mr. Wildner, Having just received a letter, expressing their Lordship's approbation of our work at Castellon Bay, and stating that the Swedish and Norwegian Governments had given two silver chronometers to Rutter and Neville, and awarded £100 to the widow of Mr. Williams, I hasten to thank you for your share in these transactions, feeling certain that this most generous conduct has emanated from you; and I give you my word I do thank you sincerely for getting such a grant for this poor woman.

If at any previous time I have not expressed sufficiently clearly how obliged I feel for your kind representation of our work, pray accept this apology, and believe me to be,

THE STEAMER NEWTON.

An unfounded report was some time ago spread that Mr. Thornton had had reason to complain of the treatment he had received on board the Newton on her passage to Rio Janeiro, this having come to the ears of Mr. Thornton he with his accustomed fairness has refuted the malicious rumour in the following lines—

"If you should see Mr. Boyd pray tell him that I should be indeed sorry that any one should say or think that the Captain of the Newton had been unkind to us; it was quite the contrary, and we should be ungrateful indeed if we did not acknowledge in the warmest terms, the extreme kindness that he showed us and the great exertions he made to do everything he could to make us comfortable: even wishing to give us up his own cabin to make us more so, and this we accepted for our use during the day. In writing to— by last mail I begged him particularly if he should see anybody connected with the Liverpool Company to say how much pleased we had been with the great kindness and attention of Captain Johnson of the Newton.

RUMOURED RETURN OF THE PRESIDENT.

Last night it was current that President Mitre had arrived at the Tigre. We inquired at headquarters, and discovered the report to be without foundation.

ON 'CHANGE.

The specie market ruled somewhat steadier to-day, although the downward tendency still continues. At about mid day the market stiffened slightly, owing to a few purchases to meet orders from outside; but before two o'clock the price receded to the opening figure, and closed weak.

The feeling on the Bolsa is that we are now entering on a sort of paper dollar famine, alike ruinous to producer and exporter. Not one tenth of the wool has yet come into market, and yet money is becoming so stringent that the very best buyers are abstaining from the wool plazas rather than have their names offered about in the streets at 1/4 or 1/2 per cent. a month.

Collections about town were miserable this afternoon. Merchants bitterly complain at the slow payment of the shopkeepers, who though apparently doing a good business, rarely can pay over a thousand dollars on Saturday. In fact, money has become so scarce, that nothing can be expected from shopkeepers, who are obliged to sell to all the neighbors on, we might say, an unspecified credit: business appears to be overdone, notwithstanding that the importers assert there is not three months' stock of any article in Buenos Ayres.

We heard on 'Change to-day that all the banks in town complain of the run on them or money. One of our leading private banks paid away five millions in currency, every dollar of which we suppose has gone up to the wool plaza.

At the Provincial Bank the demand is not limited to paper, gold now is withdrawn in large amounts. The discount brokers assure us that to-day, even for the very best signatures, it was difficult to obtain paper money.

We heard one wool broker who took up this evening to the plaza several millions in paper, to pay for wool sold during the week. How long is this to last is the universal question. Our most experienced merchants believe that it is only now beginning. As the saladeros at Barracas are killing fast, much paper money is required for the camp. Several large troops of novillos are now in average price 160, but some have cost more. 2000 salt hides were sold to-day from a new saladero at Barracas, 62 lbs., at 32 rls. Some 2,000 more are engaged at reserved prices. 80 pipes mares' grease at 550 mps, and 1200 Cordova hides at 36 rls. There seems for some cause or other to be a lull in the saladero business this season in Montevideo. Lafone and others are all brought to a stand-still, owing to the extraordinary arrangement or league entered into by them. In Rosario the saladero of Mendoza is at a stand-still. Zubeiza is doing very little, and the saladero at Goya it is said is about to change hands, either managers or owners. Salted hides rule firm at home; tallow is touched extreme prices; cattle are fat and cheap. There never was a more favorable season for the 'faena,' and yet nevertheless only a few Italians in Barracas are doing anything. Dry hides were steadily rising, but have received a great check, owing to the decline in the value of gold. The stock on hand is small,

as the American houses here have shipped nearly everything.

We regret to be obliged to notice the stoppage of one of our specie brokers, owing to his constituents having failed to pay the difference; also a well-known native discount broker is marked off the Bolsa list until he arranges with his creditors.

The creditors of Kounnerst and Tidblom are notified to send in their claims. The establishment in Barracas is closed. Sr. Irrigoyen is the new liquidator in Mr. Tidblom's place.

Another new steamer has arrived to-day, the Pollux. She is very small, only 80 tons burthen, stern-wheel system, draws only 4 feet, is 90 foot long and will be worked in port as a sort of steam lighter. There is another small steamer, sister ship, expected out. The Pollux is consigned to Mr. Hall.

The Sirena, from Bahia Blanca, has arrived, but there is no news about the British colony. The English brig Toy, from Cardiff, has also arrived. We heard of a sale of salt to-day, 3,000 fanegas, at 14 rls., to arrive.

Mr. Fennecy, who was long a member of the commercial community here, we are happy to hear is now connected with the leading London firm of Barclay & Co.

The steamship Henschell may be expected in port to-day. She will sail again for Liverpool about the 9th. inst. The cargo of salt ex Ebba, from Cadix, has been sold in Montevideo, deliverable in Uruguay, at 18 rls. silver.

The following gentlemen have been admitted as new brokers on the Bolsa: Mr. Salvador Pandal, Mr. E. Diaz, Mr. H. A. Arceo; Mr. J. Casado has applied to be admitted. Brokers are now becoming as numerous as attorneys in Ireland.

This being Saturday, there was very little done in the wool markets. The highest price paid to-day that we could hear of was 82. Wool has fallen sensibly, owing to the unprecedented decline in specie. There were several sales on Friday which we omitted and now give.

Mr. Herrat's wool, from the Mochas estancia, has been sold at reserved price. Several large sales in shopkeepers were effected to-day at 190, 180, and 160 per dozen.

Mr. Arch. Craig's wool, they said on 'Change, has been sold, price not stated.

4 carts primo wool, 8 do do, 2 do do, 4 do do, 1 do do, 40 various lots from 65 to 75.

In Barracas very little doing; the only sale of importance, 3,000 @ Entre Riano wool at 19 rls, of 17 to ounce, free of 'abrojo,' bought by an English house. Several thousand arrobes from Gualeguaychú arrived, but cannot be sold having been bought there too high.

Exchange on England offered freely at 49; few takers; the rate looking low.

The British barque T. A. Darrell has been chartered to load for the States at 8 patacons for bales, and 5 per cent.

We hear that one thousand bales for Antwerp, for Heroes of Alma, engaged at 30s., and 5 per cent.

A very fine lot, 2,500 ar. good wool in Colonia, almost sold. Mr. Donovan, the broker, took a buyer over in the Lili to look at the wool, but the sale not yet effected.

Our commercial advices from Montevideo are of an importunate nature. At last there has been something done in wools. M. Martell, who left Wednesday evening per Portefa, bought nothing, but since his departure the following important sales have been effected:

4,500 @ Primo wool good color, from an English estancia near Paysandú, free of bellies, etc. 35509

1,300 @ do, very superior lot in the very best condition. 35609

700 @ do, from an English estancia near Mercedes; this wool is clean but heavy, 35303

A sale of some 40,000 @ is spoken of, but as yet the business has not been concluded. Two English houses appear to have intentions of buying largely, and a new buyer for American account has made his appearance, which has caused some little activity in the market.

In dry hides we hear of another sale to an American shipper, at reserved rates. All the dry hides in the Rio Grande, some 40,000, have been bought up for American account. The saladeros have as yet made no contracts, and in Montevideo in consequence of the dispute going on between the estancieros and saladeros no killing is going on.

A very important sale of public land has taken place; the land is at the Puro del Molino, facing Gomez's quinta, and last year could not be sold for more than 7,300 patacons; it has now been sold by auction realizing the handsome sum of 11,200 patacons. There is the greatest possible speculation going on in Montevideo in real estate in the city. Owing to the great number of banks, money is very easily obtained to buy landed property.

Sales of imports in Montevideo still rule active; all the late arrivals of wine have been disposed of at full rates. There have been two coal sales, 530 tons Cardiff, ex Cornwall, to arrive, at 108,25, and 703 tons Cardiff, ex Alberta, to arrive, at the same price. 300 barrels Alsop's ale, ex Curmine from London, at 2 patacons per dozen. From Paysandú, some 500 bags of wool, from an English estancia, gone into barraca, and 136 bales from the same quarter.

The Hanoverian brig Edder has arrived with salt.
