MONTIVIDEO REGENERATED.

THE NEW MERCHANTS' EXCHANGE OR BOLSA.

The new Exchange building, or 'Bolsa,' at present being constructed in Montevideo, attracted our particular attention during our last editorial visit to that regenerated city.

The new Bolsa stands at the corner of Calles Zavala and Piedras, 42 1/2 varas front on the former, and 50 varas on the latter.

Looking on Calle Piedras it has 13 windows and 7 offices, with 'entre sols,' besides two private houses, part and parcel of the building.

On entering the building at the main entrance, in Calle Zavala, we find a large passage or peristyle the whole front of the building, on the right hand of which is the Director's office.

We pass now from the vestibule into the Exchange Hall, which of course will be the 'chef d'oeuvre'—no expense is being spared to make this the most attractive part of the building.

The floor of the hall will be of a peculiar description of hard wood, laid in 'Parquet' style.

walls, etc., will be panelled and adorned with stucco work. As we walked up and down this splendid hall we thought of all the difficulties the Spanish Bolea brokers at Montevideo would have in trying to create speculation, owing to the enormous fluctuations of the fluctuating paper dollar.

NEWS FROM THE URUGUAY.

MURDER AND SPEEDY JUSTICE.

We have papers from Concepcion of the 16th inst. The annual festival of the 8th inst, was kept with great solemnity, a large number of clergymen arriving from Buenos Ayres and the Provinces.

Gen. Urquiza is getting up and equipping his infantry at San José. Major Garcia is to command another new battalion in formation. Dr. Marin has been appointed to the bench of Justice, and Dr. Victorica president of the Chamber.

A terrible tragedy has occurred at Urquiza's palace of San José. Major Cristo (an Indian chief), was assailed by one of the drunken Indian soldiers, who stabbed him with a lance.

The unfortunate Cristo was held in much esteem especially by Gen. Urquiza: he was a native of the Pampas of Buenos Ayres, and had risen to the rank of Major in the Argentine army.

The Government has suspended the law for increasing export tax till the Legislature re-assemble.

LATEST FROM ROSARIO.

A passenger just arrived informs us that people are in a very bad humor in Rosario for the following reasons:—

1st. The Indians have been making a clean sweep in the interior, and carried off 80,000 head of cattle from San Luis.

2nd. The heat has been terrific for several days, business almost at a stand-still.

3rd. Several persons have been drowned bathing. a woman on Thursday, two men on Saturday, and the body of another found close to the landing [supposed to be a soldier] on Sunday.

4th. The steamboat service is shocking. Mr. Matti, having taken off the line the Rio Paraná, crowds 70 or 80 passengers into such cockle-shells as the Tala and Ibicuy: the table of the former, very bad. There is no bulwark, and a man fell overboard, or at least was missing at Barradero. Sor. Acuña who was lost from the Ibicuy; his body has been found at the Nueva Vueltas. The Iron King is a very good boat, but comes to Buenos Ayres instead of the Tigre.

There was a strong current up-stream last week; the Espigador reached San Nicolas at 1, and Rosario at 3 p.m., instead of 7, as usual. Such a current has never before been known in the Paraná.

The passengers complain of great fighting at the special train on the Northern Railway; instead of the steamboat passengers, numbers of genteel 'roughs' attempt to force their way and cause much inconvenience.

The troops are on drill every day at Rosario: much compassion is felt for the poor fellows shot for mutiny: the men got no pay and so little food that they are often seen picking bits of beef out of the 'basura.'

Mr. Woods, engineer of the Central Argentine Railway has arrived in Buenos Ayres, per Iron King; and all accounts give much praise to Cap. Thomson for his attention to passengers.

MAILS FROM CORDOBA.

THE RIOJA CONTINGENT.

We have received the 'Eco de Cordoba' to the 10th inst: it contains no local news, but an interesting letter from Rioja, December 1st:—

Governor Campos was to leave Rioja on the 10th with a contingent of 600 men, from his head-quarters at Olta, in direction of Rosario. The total amount of bills drawn on the National Government for 8 months' campaign against the rebels, and equipping the contingent, only reaches \$28,873, while those drawn by the Cordoba Government exceed double that sum.

Zalazar has arrived prisoner at Rioja, for trial, and the other rebels are slain. Rivaderra had escaped into the mountains of Catamarca, but was pursued and taken by Governor Campos's escort. Col. Irrazabal has sent to Cordoba in a bundle the old guitars and rags taken from the rebels at Cruz del Eje, about which Gov. Ferreyra made such a row.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The event of the day, yesterday, was the grand excursion to Chascomus. The special train left the terminus at 8 o'clock. The place was crowded, and the guests could not all be accommodated in 3 carriages, so a fourth was put on. A band of music played when the train started, accompanying the party. Among the dignitaries present were Ministers Elizalde, Martinez and Dominguez. Messrs. Armstrong, Green, Drabble, Thompson, Peltzer, Beltran and most of our leading merchants made up the company, which numbered over 70. The shelves for hats were filled with boxes of Havana cigars. The hampers &c. were in a luggage-van, the band in one of the covered trucks. Nothing was wanting to ensure the pleasure of the day; but by some mishap the soda-water was left behind. Our brother-editor will furnish a full report to-morrow.

The auction of Rua's quinta at the Lomas, on Sunday, was a failure: about a dozen bidders were on the ground, but Mr. Billinghurst felt bound to stop the sale, owing to the total want of animation. We understand this was exactly as Don Mariano had foreseen: the property owes money to the Bank, and the sale was ordered,

but in view of the stringency of paper-money and the high rate of interest, no other result could have been expected.

The municipal elections in towns passed off so quietly that people hardly knew of their occurrence. No rioting, table-smashing or brick-throwing, thanks to the new Registro. We believe Mr. Drabble has been unanimously returned for the Socorro parish; Messrs. Thompson and Armstrong were also likely to be elected. The new Municipality will probably regenerate Buenos Ayres, but they will find plenty of work to be done.

We have had a visit from several passengers per Cordoba, come out for sheep-farming: they are fine-looking fellows, mostly with capital, and speak in the highest terms of the steamer Cordoba and the popular Capt. Batty: the captain has brought out two handsome gigs for the new Regatta Club of the Tigre.

A correspondent from Gualeguaychú states that it rained a little on the night of the 9th: the 'seca' was causing great losses in sheep, as it had not rained before since August.

On Sunday the 11.30 up train from Barracas narrowly escaped a catastrophe. The stupid or evil-disposed peons near the Casa Amarilla, who are continually giving trouble, seem to have no regard for the lives of passengers. A fellow was driving a troop of cattle across the line, at Fair's quinta, and one of them got under the engine, but, strange enough, the engine-driver never felt it till the animal got under the first carriage. The passengers on the roof were, luckily not thrown off, as the driver at once stopped the train: the mangled remains of the bullock were with some labor extricated, and another was found to have lost his horns. It is imperative for the Co. either to put up gates or have a policeman at these crossings. On Saturday evening, at the same place, a stone was thrown by a black boy into the ladies' carriage, but fortunately killed or injured no one.

The farewell concert of Werner and Schramm was to come off last night at the Coliseum: we are promised a 'critique' of the three Concerts.

The 'Pueblo' mentions a case of highway robbery in the Calle Larga, Barracas, at 3 p.m. on Saturday. It seems that in broad daylight, in this great thoroughfare, 3 Italians stopped a Frenchman and robbed him of \$11,000. The first duty of the new Municipality will be, to provide the city with a proper police-force.

We hear of another dreadful Indian invasion within 6 leagues of the town of 'Nueva de Julio'. Six Basque peons in the employ of Mr. James Gaynor, have been murdered: the Indians remained unmolested, although a garrison of 800 men was almost in sight.

The Christmas Examinations have commenced in most of the schools, and the boys are gladly looking forward to vacation.

The Sanitary Committee acknowledges the receipt of \$20,500 from the Foreign Club, subscribed by 41 gentlemen at \$500 each.

The loss of the Herschell on some hidden rocks not marked on the nautical charts, shows the great danger captains run by keeping in too close to the coast, and we hope Admiral Elliot will confer a favor on the English shipping interest by having the coast surveyed, for if we are to believe reports there are many and other rocks of an equally dangerous nature in the same neighbourhood: as yet of course we are not in a position to give our readers full details of this melancholy affair, but we expect when the Captain arrives in Buenos Ayres he will supply us with a copy of the official report of this disaster.

Respecting the duel said to have taken place in the allied camp, we are happy to say that we learn on good authority neither of the officers was killed, but both wounded.

A large steamer from Rio has just arrived in Montevideo with nothing but munitions of war; she will proceed up the Paraná, but owing to the very low state of the river cannot go up beyond Paraná.

Sr. Aymes has just published a new plan of the city of Buenos Ayres, with all the railways, &c., marked thereon; it is the best plan we have seen yet,

and gives a very correct idea of the city.

Our colleague the 'Nacion' says that the last rumour about the invasion of Corrientes by the Paraguayans was a 'bola' got up for the supplemental French mail: this however is not so, since our squadron correspondent, advises us of the fact, and an English engineer recently arrived states that as he was leaving Corrientes 17 prisoners were brought in, having been taken in the fight between Besquin and Caceres at the Paso de la Patria.

The Argentine Minister of War has just received 106 complete military uniforms: it seems that all the officers of rank in the allied army get their uniforms made to order in Paris, as they say the tailors of Buenos Ayres cannot as yet cut out a general's jacket or a colonel's pantaloons.

On Sunday there was another trial trip of a steamer from Marshall's yard. We have not heard the name of the steamer; she is very small, and brought out by one of our leading produce brokers for a saladero friend in the Uruguay; she will probably work on the saladeros.

The Castor, twin steamer of the Pollux arrived out last Sunday; she is very small, but admirably adapted for River traffic.

We hear that a splendid English horse which Capt. Batty was bringing out in the Cordoba, died on board; this is a loss for the River Plate.

Abraham's celebrated hearing machines have at last arrived, and are on sale at our office; people who suffer from deafness can now find ready relief: these extraordinary inventions have a world-wide fame.

On Saturday night and very early on Sunday morning it rained a few drops, but very slightly in town; in parts of the Southern camps it rained heavily.

There is a very anxious desire to know what has become of the committee appointed to report on the state of the Boca, the mud is so on the increase that soon the little river craft will be unable to get into the Riachuelo; we notice that the 'drag,' which has cost the country millions, is now lying idle at the Boca mole when it might be profitably employed in cleansing the mouth of the Riachuelo.

People down in Barracas want to know why does not the Government contract with Mr. Rumball for the building of a bridge over the Riachuelo on the same scale as the railway bridge? The Barracas bridge will soon fall in, and it is high time that the Government take up the question.

The Bath-house alongside the Bolsa will be opened on the 1st Jan. to the public: We suppose on the inauguration, swimming will be free, gratis. The Artesian-well baths are greatly patronized, Doctors recommending them for all nervous complaints.

NEWS FROM BRAZIL.

Cotton in Pernambuco.—The cotton crop of this province is, this season, of unusually great amount owing to the great extension given to its cultivation, and the large yield. The sugar crop does not promise well.

American Immigration.—The Rev. Ballard S. Dunn and Messrs. George W. Walley and Charles Clarke, who came lately from Louisiana and Texas to examine suitable locations for about one hundred families who have the intention of emigrating from those states have been furnished with transport &c. to Itabapoana and Itapemirim, whither they proceeded on the 10th inst. accompanied by Sr. Carlos Pinto de Figueiredo, who is charged with the duty of guiding them and obtaining for them whatever information they require respecting the districts of Espirito Santo and Rio de Janeiro that lie along the rivers Itabapoana and Itapemirim, and the other locations in that part of Brazil.

The Matto Grosso Expedition.—The march of this corps towards Cujabá by way of Rio Claro has been stayed and the troops ordered to march direct to Coxim, where they are to be stationed for the time being.

S. Paulo.—Owing to the heavy rains a great fall of earth took place on the 7th into the cutting of the second inclined plane on the Serra do Mogy,

bringing down one of the abutment walls. Owing to this and one that took place a few days previously in the same locality, the S. Paulo railway cannot will be interrupted for some weeks. The through transit from Santos to the city of Sao Paulo had been effected a few days previously by the completion of the great viaduct of Grota Funda, which is about a half mile long and in places 200 feet high.

Count Janisky, on the 4th, held a meeting at S. Paulo to form an associate society there for the formation of Polish immigration. The gentlemen present determined on constituting themselves a committee to favor the formation of an association for that purpose.

Count Janiski will leave shortly for Europe and expects to return in a little time with 200 Polish emigrants.

An iron bridge to cost 215 contos of réis is to be built over the river Sanhaúa in the province of Parahyba. The contractor is the Baron de Livramento.

COURT-MARTIAL OF GEN. CANAVARRO.

The Court-martial appointed to try this commander and Colonel Fernandes Lima and Captain Valle is composed of Marshal Bittencourt, as president, and Brigadiers Portinho and Menna Barreto.

The report of the Commission who were charged with the duty of investigating the conditions under which the Paraguayans were enabled to cross the Uruguay and march unassailed to Uruguayana, states that, on examination of the ground, and other circumstances, the passage of the river, June 10th, at the point where it was effected above San Borja, could have been easily prevented by 800 men and three pieces of artillery, the river there being above 700 yards wide and having high & steep banks, while Estigarribia only possessed 19 canoes, capable of carrying 470 men, wherewith to transport his force across. That on July 2d, while the invading Paraguayan army was still 40 miles from Itaquí, that town was left so defenceless by those who should have protected it, that a party of 43 Paraguayans crossed in seven canoes from the opposite side of the Uruguay and, unmolested and without loss, sacked various houses and returned to the right side.

That the Ibicuy being strategic key of that part of the Province, Canavarro's troops permitted a battalion of infantry and two pieces of artillery to be crossed over, in their sight and unresisted, at the ford of Santa Maria although the situation was favorable for the defence, the defensive side being covered with timber while the other was bare, and this small force though isolated for two days from the main body, which crossed at another point, was allowed, unmolested to join the latter; and where this last was transported over, some 4 1/2 miles higher up, though the right bank was wooded up to the river's side, the left was open and dominated by a hill, yet, though Estigarribia had only 20 canoes to aid his crossing of a river a quarter of a mile wide, he was permitted to cross over, unassailed, 6,000 men and 6 pieces of cannon with a large number of animals, and occupy Uruguayana.

Taking it in all it was one of the largest audiences ever assembled in that spacious theatre, and we congratulate the officers who took part in the performance upon the successful result of their charitable exertions.
