General Goods.—Collected or delivered within Four squares of the Great Southern Railway Station at 2 1/2% per arroba. To any address South of the Calle Rivadavia at 3 1/2% per arroba. To any address North of Calle Rivadavia at 4 1/2% per arroba.
Market Produce.—Such as Milk, Butter, Eggs, Fruit, Vegetables, Meat or Poultry, requiring great punctuality will be charged double the above rates.
The collection and delivery charge will be calculated per arroba, and all fractions of an arroba will be considered as an arroba.
One pair of Hens, Ducks, Geese or Turkeys will be carried as an arroba.
Parcels—Parcels of one arroba and under will be collected or delivered to any part of the city at the rate of 55 per arroba, every 1/2 arroba extra will be charged at the rate of 52. All consignments of any kind whatever except Market Produce of less than 5 arrobas will be considered as parcels.

BULL-FIGHTING IN MONTEVIDEO.

The bull-fight, last Sunday, at Montevideo, was one of the most shocking spectacles seen for a long time, resulting, we believe, in loss of life. Two 'matadores' badly wounded, the bulls jumping in among the crowd, one man tossed high in air, several women carried off fainting, children narrowly rescued from imminent death, knives and revolvers used on all sides—such is a summary of the innocent and delightful recreation of Montevideans on the day ordered to be kept holy.

The first bull, having cleared the ropes, got in among the benches of the spectators, causing such confusion and panic as can better be imagined than described. The animal was wild with rage and with the wounds so barbarously inflicted in the ring: he tossed a man over to the other side of the arena, breaking his leg, and was next about to gore a child to death, when D. Juan Cruz Varela bravely rescued the little victim. The bull then ran along the benches till he reached the azotea, and there firmly held his ground against knives, swords and revolvers, for a time, but was at last lassoed and killed by an expert gaucho; the first 'matador' having got some bad wounds in the arm and back.

The public was not yet satisfied, and a second bull was let into the ring, nearly as furious as his predecessor; he managed again to put the public to flight, and caused such consternation that the police had to carry away the women (we cannot call them ladies), and only after much skirmishing the animal was over-powered outside the circus, and despatched.

This disgraceful and demoralising spectacle, which is also highly dangerous, should be immediately abolished by the Montevidean Government, to place that country in the same grade of civilization as B. Ayres. What can be more revolting than to see the delicacy of womanhood and infant innocence outraged by the attendance of mothers and their children at these blood-thirsty and degrading exhibitions? If it is the purpose of Oriental legislators to train up a nation of butchers, the utility of bull-fights is apparent, notwithstanding their dangers. But it is repulsive to every noble sentiment that all classes of society should be made accustomed, by special permission of Government, to the horrid sight, of blood spouting from a bull's neck and horses dragging their entrails along the ground—and then for virtuous matrons, gentle young ladies, and innocent children to be found looking at and applauding such horrors. Good God! the mind recoils from such barbarism.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The *Porteña* arrived true to time yesterday, bringing passengers and mails from Montevideo. As to this vessel being sold to the Brazilians, we can hear nothing very positive. An offer, we understand, has been made, but declined. We hope she will be kept on the route.

The new iron bridge to replace the old Barraca bridge is, we are happy to learn, already shipped and on the way out from England. It is very much wanted, as the old bridge is in a most scandalous state. A large bullock-cart, laden with wool, almost fell through a chasm in the bridge yesterday, but so accustomed are the people down there to this sort of sport, that the accident caused but little amusement.

It will be hardly credited by our home readers that near the railway in *Barracas* some of the ruts in the street, called here 'pantanos,' are filled

up with large pieces of jerked beef. We witnessed this the other morning when passing out in the train. We suppose the beef must have gone bad in the saladero, and be fit for no other purpose.

On Wednesday night we were again visited with a delightful shower, which somewhat cooled the atmosphere, but yesterday the heat was frightful. The oldest resident of the city of Buenos Ayres states that this is the hottest summer he remembers.

Maize promises to be so cheap this year that all our subscribers will be able to keep corn-fed horses. The railway is now running out to the very 'chacaras,' so no more maize will be burnt outside as fuel owing to the fearful freights charged by the 'tropicos.'

Our colleague the 'Tribuna' errs respecting our disbelieving in the capture of the *Coradonga*, since we gave a full account of how she grounded and was lost; but as regards the *Resolucion*, we expressed grave doubts, as nothing official or authentic has come to hand.

We publish in another column the list of the new Justices of the Peace for town and country. It seems that the new Judges are all, to a man, supporters of *Sor. Acosta* for Governor, and decided opponents of *Dr. Don Adolfo Alsina*, who is the candidate of the *Club Libertad*.

We saw a German yesterday who has just returned from the States, and brings letters from *Sarmiento* and *President Mitre's* son. They are all in good health and spirits, and also young *Halback*.

The steamer *Proveedor* leaves this port on Saturday for *Corrientes*, taking passengers and cargo.

Two more Brazilian transports left yesterday for *Corrientes*; we hope they will not be so unfortunate as the other transports which are now aground in the river.

The Chief of Police has got 30 fat cows in the stocks. The prisoners were taken at the corrales, as the commissary suspected they had been stolen, the driver not having the certificates for the marks.

The *Cuyo* diligence has arrived at *Rosario*, and brought no confirmation whatever of the news of taking the *Resolucion*. The 'España,' a Spanish paper published here, states that the 'parte oficial' of the commander of the *Esmeralda* is also a 'bola.'

We regret to inform our readers that in the neighborhood of *Navarro* several estancieros have lost, during the last week, several hundred sheep, owing to delaying too long in giving the flocks water. Our informant, on his way into town, states that at every house he called to, he heard the same complaints. West and north the farmers have been for some time watering their sheep daily, but in *Navarro* they waited rather long, and the result is that hundreds of sheep have died.

By latest advices from Rio we learn that *Mr. Thornton*, the new British Minister, is living with his family at *Petropolis*. The heat in Rio this year is so excessive that no one can live in that city. In the arsenal the greatest activity reigns—now ironclads by the dozen, and recruits arriving from every quarter of the Empire. Money is very abundant; each mail from Europe brings specie remittances on account of the loan.

Several respectable and influential parties have called upon us about the British colony at *Bahia Nueva*. We feel it our imperative duty to remark on the perilous condition of the colony. The city for the last week has been full of all sorts of rumors respecting these poor people. We do not wish to give publicity to any unjust and unfounded charge against those concerned in bringing the colony out here, but really we think it is time to demand that some action be taken in the matter, and, as an English merchant very properly observes, that the British Minister or the Argentine Government should despatch an agent to enquire into the real state of the colony. We hope *Mr. Ford*, the British Chargé d' Affaires, will take the matter up, and as *Admiral Elliot* is about to despatch *H. B. M. S. Narcissus* to the *Falkland Islands*, we regard it as a rather favorable opportunity to send some person

down to visit the colony and report on its condition. Another vessel, we understand, is shortly expected out here with a second batch of emigrants for the same colony. If things are as bad at the *Chuput* as is represented, the sooner that provisions, etc., are sent down, the better. In the annals of pioneering hardships we never heard or read of anything to equal what our unfortunate countrymen at the *Chuput* have suffered, and we feel we will not appeal in vain to our subscribers when we ask them to aid us in having something done for the poor people on the lonely *Bahia Nueva* coast. An Englishman, who assured us that he knows the real state of the colony, entered our office on Tuesday, and asked us was it our intention to allow these poor people to perish of starvation? Such seems to be the sad fate which awaits them. Yesterday we made further enquiry into the matter and regret to say that we find the same alarming rumors current on all sides. We hope, therefore, the British Minister, *Mr. Ford*, will at once take steps in the matter. *Admiral Elliot*, we feel certain, will only be too happy to render any assistance when the matter is brought under his notice.

The most difficult task in *Buenos Ayres* is to find out reliable statistics about anything. Verily, we believe, if we entered *Mr. Cazon's* office tomorrow, and asked him how many prisoners in the *carcel*, he would be as much afloat as *H. E. Don Mariano Sampedra*, did we insist on knowing the possible value of the wheat crop in this province. And yet it is a subject of much importance, yet not a man in *Buenos Ayres* can answer the question, how many acres under tillage? In the United States the Government is so keenly alive to the importance of agricultural statistics that at *Washington* there is an *Agricultural Department*, which is found to have a most beneficial influence. It is right to observe that this year, the season having been so favorable, the wheat and maize crop in the Republic will be immense; some persons think that the wheat crop of *Buenos Ayres*, including the crops of the colonies in *Santa Fé* and *Entre Rios*, will reach eight hundred thousand fanegas, whilst the maize crop will be more than double that. We would thank any of our readers who may know anything about these matters, to send us all information in their power, as it is a subject of the highest importance.

A *Correntino* estanciero informs us that the lands this side of the river *Corrientes* are admirably adapted for sheep and are selling very cheap, from \$2,500 to 4,000 *Bol.* per square league.

Governor *Lagraña* of *Corrientes* has not suffered so heavily from the war as was expected. His house in the city was not sacked.

A very wide-awake young gentleman entered the exchange-shop alongside the *Bolsa*, where the other day the clerk made a slight mistake in the price of ounces, and sold a Confederate note or bond to the money-changer in \$200 *mpe*, who thought he had done a splendid business. Shortly afterwards he showed it to a leading and emphatic English broker, who told the dealer its real value, 'half a red cent.' The matter caused great noise in the street.

Out in the camp the Italian horse cartmen have made an invasion. At every railway station on the Southern Railway, dozens are to be found, and as they charge very low they do a great business in carting wool, &c., to the train.

We hear that on one of the islands in the *Capitan* a splendid hotel, American style, is talked of. It will be called the 'Gran Chaco House.'

A gentleman interested in the beef packing business, informs us that 2 1/2 *d.* per lb. for beef in *Liverpool* does not pay. The last beef fetched this price.

We hear nothing about the iron light-house said to have been built in France for the mouth of the *Guazu*. We suppose that it has been lost, gone down, or embargoed, as no one seems to know anything about it. The buoys at the mouth of *Las Palmas* require some attention, as since *Captain Bruce* left the river, there is no one to look after them.

MONTEVIDEO.

Salvage of the *Herschell*—Russian and other war-vessels—*Kate Carny* in quarantine—Banquet on board the *Rio Paraná*—Railway news—Suicides—Brazilian mortality—Brazilian deserters—Subterranean noises—New *M. Vidéan* bank-notes—Bull-fight accidents—Desecration at *Mercedes*—Photographs, varieties and offences.

The articles saved from the wreck of the *Herschell* are of more value than was thought, and it is likely the purchaser will make some money by the business: they are to be sold at *Mr. Wilson's* barraca by auction to-day [Friday], and comprise the following: 135 doz. port wine in boxes, 18 casks and 5 half do., 52 sacks coffee, 5 casks oil, 6 boxes wax-candles, 42 cases English and French goods, 2 saddles, and a quantity of cloth, calico, cotton goods &c.

On Monday morning the Russian gunboat *Caboal* arrived from *Rio*. Her commander is *Capt. Pilkil*, and she carries a crew of 93 men, and six 60-pounders: it seems she is to remain in *Montevideo* on station. The Brazilian transport *Lamego* arrived same day with 800 men. The American war-steamers *Kansas* and *Hagur* have arrived at *Rio* en route for the Pacific. The Russian corvette *Ascol* is hourly expected from that port, also for the Pacific.

The British barque *Kate Carny* from *Hong-Kong* has been put in quarantine. A select banquet was given on board the *Rio Paraná* on Sunday, and we learn that the wines, viands, speeches, &c. were first-rate.

We read with pleasure, in the 'Europa,' that the agent of the projected railway from *Montevideo* to *Durazno* will arrive from *London* by next packet, in order to deposit the amount of guarantee for the fulfilment of the enterprise. The Government has, also, accepted proposals for a line from *Salto* to *Uruguayana*, and the tramway from the Custom-house to *Paso del Molino* will shortly be set on foot.

The hot weather seems to have induced several suicides: we find two occurring on the coast of the river, as if the unfortunates sought relief there from the scorching element. A negro was picked out, with a stone fastened to his neck; and on Tuesday a German soldier of the Brazilian troops was found in a pool behind the gas-house: he had shot himself in the heart and then fallen into the water, the hand still grasping the pistol, when his body was taken out. His name was *John P. Biofett*, age 35 years, and in his pockets was found a sum of 15 hard dollars.

The mortality among the Brazilian troops is on the increase, some days no fewer than 6 dying. Some have also begun to desert, and the Chief of Police apprehended two, who have been sent back to their regiments.

On Sunday night the neighborhood of *calles Colon* and *Mayo* was thrown into consternation by a gentleman named *Magin Vila* who gave the alarm that there were robbers digging under the floor of his house. The police came and also heard the noise, as of picks and shovels, working away underground. It seems *Mr. Vila* is known to keep much treasure in his house, and it was at once concluded the robbers devised this method of effecting an entrance, through the floor. The police and neighbors set to work pulling up the floor &c., until they came to the sewer, when they were assailed—with an infernal stench; but all the lights brought to bear on the 'cloaca,' through which the robbers were supposed to have approached, could discover nothing. At length it was found the noise proceeded from a Venetian-blind in a neighbor's house, slightly agitated by the wind: we have known an identical ghost-story in *Ireland*, attended with serious consequences.

The authorities of *San José* write to *Montevideo* stating that an alarm has been caused by a general refusal to take the notes of 'Banco Montevideño,' as in some the date is lithographed, and in others written. The notes, however, are in both cases good, the difference being according to their value, and all difficulty will soon be at an end as the Bank has ordered new notes from a first-class American factory, which will be inimitable, and far superior to those of *B. Ayres*: they are expected to arrive in two months, when the present circulation will be called in.

Dr. Brunel has furnished plans for a Lunatic Asylum, which is intended to be built at the *Buceo*. The funeral obsequies will take place to-day for the late *Dr. Ferreyra Artigas*, killed at the battle of *Yatay*.

The pupils of the late *Don Juan Manuel Irigoyen* are about to place his portrait, in oil-painting, in the National Museum. Messrs. *Bate* and *Co.* have taken a splendid photograph of the new *Hotel Oriental*. The *Acrobat Company* is playing with great success.

A *Frénchuan* has been taken up for beating his sister, and a boatman for biting another in the face.

There is a great row going on at *Mercedes*, about some alleged desecrations in the cemetery, stealing the coffins and burning the corpses.

WERNER AND SCHRAMM'S FAREWELL CONCERT.

The chief eulogium that can be given to any artist is, to be able to say that his performance drew a crowded audience. When such an artist has already played several times for the same public, and lost at least the charm of novelty, if he still succeeds in commanding a full house, it is a sure sign that he possesses real talent. In the present case the public (the best of all judges no matter what critics may say, crowded to the *Coliseum* to hear Messrs. *Werner* and *Schramm's* last Concert.

After so many concerts, given in a brief interval, and at a season, moreover, little suited for musical soirées, we had fancied that the wish to hear these distinguished performers would be somewhat abated, but it has been quite otherwise. The farewell concert has been a great success, both as regards the attendance and the merit of the execution, surpassing any which have preceded it, while the programme was made up of a happy selection of pieces from the German and Italian schools.

We are especially happy to notice the progress of taste in our public, for serious and classical music, which the *Coliseum* promises to aid powerfully in creating, and we may almost venture to say that, the Concert-hall in *calle Parque* is destined to form the musical education for our city, which has hitherto been entirely taken up with Italian music of the modern style. Let it not be supposed that we mean to attack the Italian school: we would only remark *en passant* that Italy is naturally proud of her past history and over-confident of her instinctive superiority in all the polite arts, which she may be said to have called into existence, and perhaps for this reason sets no value on other than vocal and dramatic music, almost ignoring the great progress of instrumental music which has taken place in Germany since the commencement of the present century. Italians only know by name the great master-pieces of poesy and symphony by *Haydn*, *Mozart*, and *Beethoven*. It is even surprising that, after the long domination of Austria in Lombardy, and the fruitful alliance by *Rossini*, between the instrumental harmony of the German school and the grand vocal melody of his own land of song, Italy has yet acquired intimacy with the fine compositions of German art. Not that we could wish to see nations or even individuals lose their distinctive characteristics, or make clumsy attempts to imitate the general features of their neighbors. By all means let Italy remain what Nature has made her, and preserve her unquestionable supremacy in vocal music; but let her be, at the same time, less disdainful of whatever great achievements her neighbors are making around her.

We trust our readers will pardon us this long digression: we began this article promising them an account of *Werner* and *Schramm's* last concert, and only now we discover that we have hardly said a word about it. We will not therefore trespass on the patience of our readers by detailing, one after another, our opinion of the various pieces played and sung. We can only refer to the many critiques published by our colleagues, comprising all that can be said in praise of *Werner's* playing, *Schramm's* execution, and *Mme. Krutisch's* beautiful singing. But we must not fall into repetitions, and will conclude by

saying that it was a great success, and in regard to its being a farewell concert the sentence is very applicable—*Finis coronat opus.*

A TOUR IN THE NORTH CAMPS.

We are indebted to our esteemed friend, *Sr. E.*, for the following interesting items from his note-book of travels in the northern Partidos:—

San Andres de Giles is one of the most wretched villages in the province, although surrounded by pretty quintas and plantations. There are numerous Irish sheepfarmers in the neighbourhood, some of whom are very wealthy: it is believed they will contribute liberally to aid the native parishioners in building a new church, as the old one is falling in and in a ruinous condition. Some sign of improvement is noted, in the new municipal school just finished, which is capable of accommodating 160 children: it cost \$200,000 *mpe*. The municipality also intends building a house for the *Cura* and another for the *Juzgado*.

Capilla del Señor ranks as one of the most thriving 'partidos' in the North, and is for the most part Irish. *Father Grenuan* and *Dr. Priestly* attend to the spiritual and sanitary affairs of the parishioners, and two splendid monuments of public liberality have recently been completed. The church built by *Mr. Hunt* (in 7 months) is a handsome edifice, with a fine altar made in this city by *Cruelles & Garcia*: the total cost was 700,000\$. The State-school, for boys and girls, can accommodate 100 in each department: it cost 270,000\$, and the average attendance is 80 boys and 60 girls.

'*San Antonio de Areco*' although more than a century old, makes little progress, and the church is falling to ruin: *Mr. Hunt* thinks the walls might be left standing and the edifice repaired without the trouble of building a new one. The *Rev. Mr. Curran*, Irish chaplain, has a large congregation, and here is also an Irish school, under *Mr. JeNamara*, which meets with general support. The State-school, for boys only, recently built at an outlay of 160,000 \$, can accommodate 150, but the average attendance is only 68.

It rained heavily in *San Antonio* on Saturday night, which was very welcome as the sheep-farmers were already suffering from the drought.

'*Fortin de Areco*' is another flourishing Irish settlement, and the place is going ahead, shewing many and great improvements, effected at considerable expense. The new church cost 800,000\$, part of which was defrayed by Government, and the rest by the neighbors, native and foreign, including some Protestants. The Irish chaplain, *Rev. Thomas Leaby*, preaches a sermon to his countrymen, every Sunday, after-Mass. The Municipality is building a parochial house for the *Cura*, and making arrangements for lighting the town at night. There is a Club, where weekly and monthly balls are given, the native and foreign residents attending. The new school, for the construction of which the indefatigable *Mr. Archy Craig* lent valuable assistance, holds 130 boys: it cost 180,000 \$.

We are happy to announce that the Government has given 15,000 \$ *mpe* to the Municipality of *Luxan*, which it is intended to lay out in providing the Plaza with handsome seats. In the new Plaza, *Dr. Real*, Justice of Peace, proposes to erect a market-place after the manner of the new ones in town. The girl's school has been newly painted up by the Municipality, which counts on an increase to its funds by selling the 'chacaras' lots near the town.

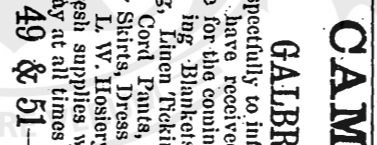
