The Great Southern Railway Company has made arrangements with a responsible Carter for the Collection and delivery of Goods and Parcels in all parts of the City of Buenos Ayres at the following rates:—
General Goods—Collected or delivered within Four squares of the Great Southern Railway Station at 0 2 1/2 per arroba. To any address South of the Calle Rivadavia at 0 3 1/2 per arroba. To any address North of Calle Rivadavia at 0 4 1/2 per arroba.

Market Produce—Such as Milk, Butter, Eggs, Fruit, Vegetables, Meat & Poultry, requiring great punctuality will be charged double the above rates.
The collection and delivery charge will be calculated per arroba, and all fractions of an arroba will be considered as an arroba.
One pair of Hens, Ducks, Geese or Turkeys will be carried as an arroba.

Parcels—Parcels of one arroba and under will be collected or delivered to any part of the city at the rate of 35 per arroba, except 3 arrobas extra will be charged at the rate of 32. All consignments of any kind whatever except Market Produce of less than 6 arrobas will be considered as parcels.

Orders for the collection and delivery of Goods and Parcels left at any of the Great Southern Railway Stations, at Mr. Twyford's No. 102 Calle Piedad, at Messrs. Robert Muir's & Co. No. 162 Calle Defensa, or addressed to the Administration of the Great Southern Railway will be attended to, where also any information may be obtained.

The delivery charge for Parcels, Market Produce or Goods can be paid or made payable together with or without the Railway Charge, at any of the Great Southern Railway Stations or to the Carters. The collection charge can be paid to the Carters or made payable at any of the Great Southern Railway Stations.

EUROPEAN POLITICS AND GOSSIP.

(From the Havana-Buller correspondence.)

Paris, Nov. 24th 1865.

In the political atmosphere the wind has set in for economy and reduction of the army to a peace-footing. On the 15th the Emperor issued a decree disbanding several regiments, which has been well received: it causes a saving of 12½ million francs per an., but the great importance of the step is, that France sets an example to the rest of Europe, of disarmament, shewing pacific intentions which must have a salutary effect both at home and abroad, and will probably be imitated by the other great powers. Then business will acquire fresh animation, and public confidence produce general prosperity. The 'Times' and other leading European journals have highly applauded this sage policy of the Emperor. The 'Daily Telegraph' calls on Mr. Gladstone to insist on similar reductions in Great Britain, and the 'Standard' hopes that Russia, Austria and Italy will also disarm.

Friendly mutual societies have recently attained a great growth in France, the report for 1864 shewing no less than 5,027 societies, comprising 715,345 members, of whom 97,936 are women: the gross capital amounted to 86,024,622 (3½ millions £).

The commercial world is agitated by the conflict between Spain and Chile. It is to be hoped matters will not be pushed to such extremities, as the vicinity of Admiral Pareja's ultimatum would give room to apprehend: the 'Epoca' and other journals of Madrid adopt a moderate tone, and think hostilities will not go farther than a simple blockade, which can be arranged by diplomacy. The 'Times' states that on the 18th the Cabinet ministers in London held a council and resolved "to address energetic remonstrances to Spain": a courier was despatched same day to Madrid. The London merchants have followed the example of Liverpool by protesting against the Spanish aggression. It is believed the O'Donnell Cabinet has sent conciliatory instructions to Admiral Pareja. French commerce is affected, in the same manner as the English, by the Chilean difficulty: the Havre merchants and Paris Chamber of Commerce have petitioned the Emperor to bring about an arbitration of the question.

The 'Presse' suggests the necessity of calling a Congress, to regulate not only the dispute between Spain and Chile, but also to insist on a suspension of hostilities in the River Plate and submit to arbitration the quarrel between Paraguay, Brazil and Buenos Ayres, about territorial limits.

The Imperial court is at Compiègne since the 12th, and the Empress's birthday was celebrated with great pomp: Her Majesty received some splendid bouquets from different foreign countries, and after the grand banquet there were fireworks in the park: 25 poor orphans were adopted, in honor of the day. In Paris the theatres and public buildings were covered with flags during the day, and illuminated at night.

The Emperor is living quietly at Compiègne: he retires to rest early, while the Empress holds her soirées in the first 'salon' the young people dance, in the second the Empress converses with her friends, in the third, whilst holds undivided sway, and beyond this is a gallery where the Emperor walks up and down chatting with Cabinet-ministers and foreign guests. The King and Queen of Portugal will arrive at Compiègne on the 8th, and the Court will return to Paris on the 12th.

On the 18th Dec., in the chapel of the Tuilleries, will be celebrated the marriage of the Duc de Mouchy with Princess Anna Murat: the princess receives a dowry of two millions (£80,000); the Duke's fortune amounts to six millions. The princess is daughter to Lucien Murat, second son of the renowned Joachim Murat, King of Naples, Duke of Cleves, High Admiral of France, and Marshall to the Empire. The Duke de Mouchy is a Prince and grandee of Spain, descended from the house of Noailles. The princess is very beautiful, inheriting the classic charms of her grand-mother (the sister of Napoleon Bonaparte), and the fine development of Murat, the modern Achilles. She has the small Bonaparte head, which belied Napoleon's saying "My nobility only dates from Marengo." The Empress has placed at her disposal the Palais Elysée, until the Duke's splendid town-house be fully prepared.

Frost has begun to set in, and strip the trees; while literary men shew increased activity, and new journals are being launched into existence: the number of newspapers and magazines published at Paris is set down at 743!

The Duke de Persigny's new pamphlet on the Doctrines of the Empire attracts much notice; it contains in an appendix an Essay on the Pyramids, a treatise on Nobility, and an apology of Charles the Bold. The Emperor's pamphlet on Algiers increases the interest in the new Society of Algiers, which will soon be in working order.

Meantime city-improvements are actively pushed forward in Paris: a labyrinth of houses and lanes in front of the Theatre Français have just been demolished, and a handsome 'Place' will soon occupy the site. The Rue de Medicin is also being pulled down, and 60 houses in other parts, including the famous Belle Jardinière: in this monster establishment no fewer than 5,000 men are occupied with crowbars, and it is said the owners are to receive as indemnity from the Municipality the sum of 14 millions (£560,000).

The citizens who took fright at the Cholera are returning to Paris, and the city is now more brilliant than ever. The season of festivities is about to commence. Count Walewski is going to give a series of splendid dinners and soirées in his residence on the Quai D'Orsay. M. Pereira gives 6 grand balls, and 3 concerts with Mlle. Patti. Then follow, comedies at the Hotel Castellane, also at the Baroness Meyerdorff's, weekly parties at Mme Fould's, banquets by Prince Metternich, and soirées by Mme. Paiva in the Champs Elysées. Morning concerts are now all the rage at the theatres.

The extravagance of the fair sex, in spite of Bishops and philosophers is increasing prodigiously: laces, jewelry, and strange fashions are triumphant. Red petticoats, red stockings, red skirts, red feathers, red velvet hats, give the ladies the appearance of a certain nameless bird. Horse-breakers are also numerous, with jockey hat and amazon costume; and enormous buckles assail the eye, in which quantity not quality seems to be the prevalent idea of this feminine folly.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The flood in Barracas and the Boca on Thursday night took the amphibious inhabitants of that quarter by surprise. The water rose steadily during the night, covering all the country far and near. As we passed up in the train yesterday morning we beheld Mr. Hall's barraca completely surrounded by water, the English rag-yard swimming, Younger's washing establishment only approachable by boats, the lovely Boca prairies—spots designed by Nature for cotton plantations—all one sheet of water. Down at the Boca the water entered into the houses, and at Casares' new store customers could almost row a boat up to the counter. The river covered the railway track, and men were busy filling in where the earthworks had given way. The renowned English brick-yard was an island and the waves beat madly against the well-built parapet of the establishment, but the greatest damage was at Cazon Park, as it is called, Paseo Colon; here the old seats were carried away, and the few struggling

willows apparently giving way. The people say that for years they do not recollect such a 'creciente'; it quite freshened the atmosphere. All the low lands from the Boca to Quilmes were covered with water, but before noon yesterday the waters had subsided, greatly to the delight of the apprehensive residents.

The French mail steamer Carmel arrived yesterday. She made the quickest passage on record from Montevideo to this port: arrived there at 8 o'clock a.m. on Wednesday, and got into port here at 7 o'clock on Friday morning. The Captain deserves a gold medal.

A new emigration agency office has been started in this city, which has for its object the contracting here with employers for any number of German emigrants for 2½ years, at very moderate wages. It is quite a new business here and we hope it will succeed. The agency has a branch in Germany. Such agencies are very common in the States, and have proved highly useful.

Our Cordova correspondent informs us that in the province of Cordova there are no less than six millions of goats, and that a flock of forty goats is considered sufficient to support a family in the camp. The introduction of Angora goats promises the very best results. Hitherto the only exportable value of the goat has been its skin, but the Angora cross will raise the goat to the same value as a sheep, giving a fleece each year. The value of a common Cordovese goat is six Bolivian reals—any number can be bought at this price. From what we can gather from our agent on this subject, we believe that in a few years the Angora goat's wool will be a respectable staple. A Waterford man has established himself on the hills north of Cordova, with a flock of Angora goats, which is doing well. He writes to us to get Irishmen, Englishmen, etc., to go up to Cordova and start in goats, asserting that it is the best business in the River Plate.

A very unpleasant affair occurred on the Northern Railway last Sunday. An Englishman, who was going to the Tigre to take the steamer, got out for a moment at San Fernando to take a drink, leaving his overcoat in his seat in order to keep same. A Mr. Whiskefando entered and sat down on the coat, and when requested by our friend to give up the seat, refused, calling the Englishman the most offensive names; a blow between the Ligurian's two 'windows' was the response, and a forcible ejection, without the aid of sheriff or jury followed, but the Ligurian had five or six friends in the coach, who pounced on him, and we are told would have gouged out his eyes but for the heroic interference of Mr. Walker, who using a "bit of a stick" with politeness and discretion, emancipated the Englishman from the fangs of a set of Genoese maccaroni-eaters. As a matter of course, when the train arrived, all were walked off to the Juzgado and the affair arranged by both parties engaging to sue the Company for not supplying seats enough for the passengers.

The advices received yesterday, respecting the salt-beef shipped from the River Plate to England could not be more favorable. The business is now being taken up by some of our leading merchants, and a new market seems to be opened for the Plate beef. O'Brien's last cargo got shipwrecked, so it is impossible to say what it would have fetched, but, as far as we can learn, people at home prefer the regular salt beef, prime and mess, to beef in bales cured on some secret system.

The Bouffes are off to Montevideo, where they intend to remain one month. The Argentine Theatre, will be closed.

Mr. Olivero, the richest cigar man in town, is building a magnificent house at the corner of San Martin and Rivadavia, in front of the Cathedral. It will be one of the finest buildings in the city, and will be supplied with a large smoking-room for the use of customers.

The merchants of Liverpool have had a great meeting about the Spanish blockade of the Chilean ports. Tomorrow we will publish the petition to the English Premier on the subject. The 'Times' takes up the cause of Chile warmly.

Respecting the value of estancia lands in the north camps, we learn that there are several estancias for sale there, at from \$600,000 to \$800,000 per league; and in the Partido Fortin de Arco at \$750,000 per league. In Junin there is a splendid estancia, not Government land, offered for half this sum.

The Calfucura invasion is now much talked of. Some Indian spies have been caught; and it seems now beyond all question that the savages mean harm. It is rather amusing to see Albaracin's notice, calling for proposals to supply Calfucura's Indians with mares, &c., and in the same paper to read that Calfucura meditates a whole sale invasion.

Captain Bruce's splendid steamer, the Rio Parana, that 'collided' the other night in the river and nearly went down, is now being repaired, and we believe will run again on the river. The rain up in the provinces has been unprecedented. From Santiago to Rosario the country, we hear, is flooded, and all fears of a 'seca' dispelled.

Governor Campos having annihilated the rebels in Rioja, has marched with his contingent to Cordoba. He is decidedly an active Governor.

The report about a newly-arrived German attempting to drown himself and family is all false. It seems the poor man took his family down to bathe in the river, and in one of the washer-woman's places got out of their depth. As they could not speak Spanish there was no understanding them, and of course the 'vigilantes' walked him off to prison for attempting to drown himself and family.

The new champagne brand which has arrived in the River Plate. 'Theophile Roederer and Co.' is the great talk of the day. The wine is the richest that has ever come to Buenos Ayres, and the new plan of opening the bottles, without aid of corkscrew, &c., makes this champagne the most desirable for our fashionable 'picnics' and hotels; the sole agents in the River Plate, E. We hear that in one of our fashionable hotels on last Christmas night, there was a terrible row caused by some jovial Englishmen singing rather vociferously 'And lang syne.' The owner of the hotel remonstrated, but he was at once kicked down stairs: he then went out and brought in a troop of 'serenos,' who, pike in hand, ejected the jolly Englishmen and put their luggage out in the street. The affair has caused much noise amongst our countrymen, who are naturally very indignant at the conduct of 'mine host.'

The 'Times' of the 24th has a slight review, with extracts from the new River Plate pamphlet, attributed to the pen of the ex-Secretary of Legation, Mr. Palemon Huelgo.

Mr. Lastarria has directed a long note to the Decano of the Corps Diplomatique in Montevideo, endeavoring to explain his conduct, and justifying the harsh language used in his letters towards the Montevideo Government. Although sympathizing with the cause of Chile, it had no other course to adopt than send him about his business.

We read in the 'Pueblo' of Montevideo that Messrs. Gilbert and Co. who purchased a portion of the Rincon de Fray-Bentos have got up a joint stock Co. in London: capital one million sterling, in shares of £1,000 each: to work up the business of Liebig's meat-extract, for which an establishment has been set in order on the site of Mr. Richard Hughes's saladero.

D. Carlos Astengo has been named to succeed the unfortunate Picconi, as agent for the Porvenir Life-insurance, at Montevideo.

We understand that the articles saved from the wreck of the Herschell sold very cheap, although only slightly damaged.

Our correspondent from Paraná, 27th inst, says "no news here of any description; only Brazilian transports passing up and down, and they give us no news if even they have any. The rain to-day has been acceptable, but we want much more."

We are glad to notice the arrival of Sig. Nicolai and the first castatrice Mme. Briol, per French packet.

The distinguished savant Professor Agassiz had returned from Tabatinga in Peru to Manaus the capital of the province of Amazonas, towards the end of October, and was to embark in the steam gunboat Ibiuby, placed by the Brazilian Government at his disposal for the exploration of the chief tributaries of the Amazonas.

There was a terrible row in the Policia on Thursday: an Englishman knocked down by the crowd at a religious procession in calle Parque; the affair was very disgraceful: it seems the young man in question was riding down the street when the procession turned the corner; he had the good sense to take off his hat but some fellows in the street pulled him from his horse and treated him brutally: he was locked up all night, and cannot speak one word of Spanish.

A subscriber from Mercedes informs us that within the last few days there have been several sudden deaths: D. Pedro Monez, brother of the judge, is one of the victims to the weather.

ANOTHER HOLE IN THE MOLE.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPES.

IMMENSE INDIGNATION.

A SCENE WITH CAZON.

On Thursday a captain all but smashed his leg in attempting to walk along the mole; his right leg was fearfully lacerated and we believe he is now in the Hospital.

On Wednesday a young lady had a most miraculous escape, having been rescued from instant death by one of the hoops of her mirifaque catching in the broken spar as the falling female was vanishing through the 'chasm.'

On Tuesday a small Italian boy fell right through the man trap and was saved by a vigilante catching him by the heels, and shaking him well afterwards.

On Monday an English sailor almost broke his neck in attempting to come ashore to spend Christmas with a friend.

On Sunday two native washerwomen fainted into the arms of the Capt. of the Port, when passing by the Resguardo and witnessing an orange vendor depart with all his stock in trade through the Hole in the mole.

Yesterday a vigilante got a severe toss in attempting to jump the Hole in the mole, in order to fine a captain for riding in the streets.

Last night a prize jumping match was to have taken place between the Capt. of the Port and the Chief of Police, a hop, step, and a leap, to clear the "Hole in the mole," backwards, the odds are in favor of Cazon, as he does not wear a white hat.

A mock meeting is talked of at the edge of the 'chasm' (if not previously closed) on New-year's day, to take into consideration the most advisable measures for closing up the Hole by subscription or otherwise.

Yesterday, a respected resident of the Paseo Julio came to our office with the foregoing list of fun and casualties, which we promised to publish. He states that the 'hole' in the Mole is right in front of the Resguardo, and that the accidents and mishaps which every five minutes occur relieve the monotony of the guard room: the sentries on guard at the Captain of the Port's, fellows who keep guard on nothing, are in roars of laughter all day at the break-neck sport going on under their very nose. An indignant and lamed British cur, who nearly cracked his shin-bone in the hole, seeing the soldiers laughing at him, went up to the door and expressed his mind in rather unmistakably plain English, which luckily the fellows did not understand. He then determined to do his best to save the lives of others, went straight up to one of the officers, and pointing to the hole inquired who was to mend it? The reply was, 'quien sabe,' which the sailor supposed was the name of a carpenter. After a fruitless search he gave up the carpenter and determined for a ride; when mounting in front of the tramway station, the horse went off at a sharp trot; Jack was taken up and fined \$100. But he had his revenge, for he made the following memorable speech:

Mr. Cazon—You fine every man a town for one cause or another. Now, if there is any justice in the country you should be fined too, and confined and imprisoned also. How dare you spend your day here in this office talking nonsense and fining the public, when within a stone's throw of your establishment there is a man-trap, a yawning chasm? You are a nice old fellow, and don't care a fig how many poor people smash their legs through your neglect. Fine for trotting a horse, and no fine for wounding and maiming sailors. The people in this country must be all fast asleep to tolerate such conduct. Are you a father, Mr. Cazon? Then take pity on poor innocent children and stop up the hole in the Mole. Are you a husband? Then have mercy on the weaker sex and don't let their lives be trusting to a 'mirifaque' ring. Close up the hole in the Mole. Have you ever crossed the seas? Then feel for the poor sailors, who, the moment they land, run the risk of getting their necks broken. Repair the hole in the Mole. Have you ever been to Europe? Then tell the Argentinians where you saw a hole in the mole, in your travels? Go down and mend the hole in the Mole. You fine me \$100; take the trash, you negligent public officer.

He indignantly flung the money on the old man's table, and strutted out of the Policia with the dignity of a Nelson.

Cazon, when last seen, had a small hand-saw, a hammer, and a few nails in his hands, accompanied by two perspiring 'vigilantes,' who were carrying behind him a small inch board of Eastern pine, worth about ten dollars. Fifty to one the hole in the Mole was mended last night!

COLLISION BETWEEN THE PORTEÑA AND RIO PARANA.

Captain Sciarano, of the steamboat Porteña has sent to the Capitania of Montevideo the following official report of the recent collision.

"Manuel Sciarano, commander of the American steamboat La Porteña, at the request of the Captain of the Port, makes the following succinct declaration respecting the collision which took place between his vessel and the Rio Parana.

"On the night of the 22nd, about 35 minutes past 11, while passing east of the Banco Chico, in a course W. by a quarter N., I saw the lights of a steamer bearing down on us. I immediately tacked, so as to shew her my red light clearly, and keep to her right, as ordered by the Regulation.

"The steamer Rio Parana, for such it proved to be, kept approaching us, and when I thought her near enough to hear my whistle, I blew it, to advise her of the danger, so that she might slacken steam and keep well to her right. But unfortunately she did the other thing, and veered to the North, running right across our bows.

"Seeing the foul position taken by the Rio Parana I ordered the engines to be stopped, and then to reverse, as nothing else was possible when the vessels were so close. But all in vain, for the Rio Parana suffered the full shock of our prow in her starboard paddle.

"The collision was, no doubt, terrible for the Rio Parana, which had all the fault, but it was no less so for us. At first we could not ascertain the amount of injury we had sustained, except that we were seriously damaged: nevertheless, thinking that the Rio Parana might need prompt assistance, I lowered a boat to send and offer her any aid in my power, when I saw her boat coming alongside. The Captain of the Rio Parana requested me to tow him up to Buenos Ayres, as he was unable to use his engines, one of his paddle wheels being smashed. I enquired if there was any danger, and, on learning that she did not make water, nor had received any damage to her hull, explained to him that I could neither take him in tow nor remain alongside, not knowing but my vessel, herself, might require aid.

"On arriving at Buenos Ayres I reported the matter to the Captain of the Port, and notified the Agent of the Rio Parana, in order to take proper measures: accordingly a Brazilian steamer went soon after to her rescue,
