MILITARY COLONY AT FRAYLE MUERTO.

There can be but little doubt that our system of frontier defence as at present constituted is fundamentally defective. In the first place I would say that no frontier whatever, of any considerable extent, can be permanently guarded and defended by purely military means.

Against the savage a belt of tilled land is a better wall than that which China raised against the Tartars. By agriculture did the U. States within 3 generations banish forever the red race from its most valuable soil.

As to the mode of planting military colonies of real and permanent utility in this country, I would say, that combined action of National Government, Province, and private owner, could alone create a sufficient number of them.

The engaging of families (for families not single men would be required) could take place here or better still by means of an energetic and honest agent in Europe, who, by lecturing in England and Germany more especially, giving a truthful picture of the capacities of this country and the liberal intentions of Government could induce, not 10, not 100, but thousands of sober, hardworking families to bend their steps hither instead of anywhere else.

The mounting and armament of the frontier forces should be as efficient as possible, that few men might do the service of many. Each colonial force must be liable only to act in defence of its own property, covering its front to a given number of leagues on each side, but of course combining attack with defense whenever property confided to its care has to be recovered.

The allowances of the settlers (each recipient representing a family) should in every respect be the same as those of the regular troops. So soon as the necessity for military organization should have ceased, the troop-horses, armaments and fort-fittings would be returned to the National Government, who could utilize them in another place.

The land granted by the province should be divided into two parts. A small one to be allotted to the colonist for tillage during his term of service in the immediate neighborhood of the fort,

the other of about 1-10th of a league, at some distance from it towards the front, to be handed over immediately after the expiration of the term of service. In this manner a double advantage would be gained in as much as the second grant, drawn up in a line, would be a screen to the lands previously rendered safe by the fort, thus vastly increasing the security and confidence of the district.

Such a liberal grant of land would also be necessary to take the place of a bounty, usually given to men submitting to military discipline and service.—Considering that the frontier service would have to be carried on unremittingly and with great vigilance, really useful families could not be expected to go out as pioneers without some such inducement.

Annexed is an estimate of costs for establishing 50 families as a military colony near Frayle Muerto. By it it will be seen that in addition to what Government could be expected to give, a pretty considerable sum would be required to set the colonists up, and it is this amount which should be covered by subscription.

In the case of the colony to be planted now, special facilities exist for overcoming this financial difficulty in as much as the foreign element forming the complement, should represent more than one nationality.

The advantages which must accrue from such settlements are patent. The National Government would within 30 years require no more frontier garrisons, but count a vast number of additional tax-payers. The estanciaero would see his flocks and herds in safety, and the Provincial Governments, in rendering their public lands saleable, would open to themselves a mine of wealth incalculable.

But to secure this latter advantage well, a special law would become necessary, prohibiting the buying up of considerable quantities of land in the neighborhood of the colonies by one person.

MAILS FROM THE INTERIOR. THE WAR OF THE ANDES. IMPORTANT LETTER OF GEN. PAUNERO. The Zonda of Dec. 16th contains the following from San Juan.

On Sunday 9th inst. Governor Campos arrived: the Governor of San Juan and a number of citizens went out in coaches to meet him. The force he brings from Rioja consists of 100 men of Arredondo's old regiment of the 6th of the Line, and 50 Nat. Guards. The Casino is going to give a grand ball in his honor.

Gen. Paunero, before leaving Frayle Muerto, wrote the following letter to the Governor of San Juan. I have written to-day to Lieut. Col. Irrazabal as follows— "I have arrived here with the 7th batt. and 6 pieces of cannon, and will push on soon for Rio Cuarto, where I am to be reinforced by the frontier cavalry of B. Ayres and all the forces of Cordoba. I am only waiting for horses. I recommend you, therefore, in no case to risk a fight with the rebels unless you have double their number and every assurance of success; but confine yourself to harass them and cover the San Juan frontier till you get further orders, or that we shall have assembled sufficient elements. Hoping you will let me know, through the Governor, of whatever may occur and your impressions of same, since this war places you in an important light, I engage to acquaint you also with my movements.

"On Tuesday at 6 a.m. a picket of 15 men under an officer of Irrazabal's came up with some invaders from Mendoza, near Alto de Mulas, but I do not know with what result. Another small body under Carlos Ortiz was sent to make observations near the lagoons of Rosario. The rebels have 50 men at Jocoli, and these make rounds as far as Chafnar. Our scouts reach to Atravesado."

On the 10th inst. the Government of San Juan, finding 300 head of cattle insufficient to feed the troops, ordered the expropriation of 600 animals, the value to be afterwards settled by arbitration.

A letter from Mendoza, Dec. 13th, says that the rebel Governor, Rodriguez, and his cabinet display wonderful activity: they are making a general sweep of all the cattle in the province, and driving them over to Chile, where beef is getting very cheap in consequence. Sor Villanueva has escaped from Mendoza and taken refuge at San Juan.

D. Emilio Godoy reports the discovery of a new metal in the mines of Mme. Herrera de Barbosa: it is a mixture of zinc, bismuth, and tin.

D. Domingo Sarmiento writes a long letter from New York to Sor Salas, sub-delegate of mines. The Fejro-Carril says—A passenger from Mendoza gives the following important news: the rebel army now numbers 3,000 men, with 8 pieces of cannon. Col. Ohsacagua is their Chief of Staff. Juan Saa was hourly expected at Valparaiso from Puanama, and is now probably in Mendoza. The manifesto of Rodriguez to the Nat. Government is only a ruse, in order to gain time and reinforcements before Paunero come up. The forces are armed with flint-muskets and lances, all well paid and equipped, and wearing the red ribbon of the old Federal party. Varela who invaded Rioja from Chile, is at the head of 700 men near Jachal. There is now no doubt of the Chilianos being leagued with the rebels.

THE CURRENCY QUESTION. DEBATE IN THE SENATE.

Seldom has any session of the Provincial Legislature been attended with such interest as that of Thursday, in the Senate: the project for establishing an Exchange-office, as voted by the Deputies, was the order of the day.

Dr. Esteves Segui moved a postponement till the following day, as he had been out in the country and had not had time to study the matter. Sor. Marmol objected to the postponement, adding that no Senator could allege as an excuse his having failed to study a project already passed by the lower Chamber, and in which no modification had since been made.

Dr. Segui's motion was put to the vote, and rejected. The bill was then put in discussion, and supported by Sor. Lezica. Dr. Esteves Segui opposed: he predicted the downfall of the Bank, and censured the Legislature for authorizing a new emission in violation of the spirit of the law of 1864.

Dr. Varela, Finance-minister, rebutted the statements of the last speaker, and showed that only two months ago the British Government had to suspend the Bank Act, and permit the extra-emission of bank-notes to meet the general monetary crisis. This was a patent proof that it became necessary at times to increase the circulating medium. Nor could the present be viewed as an ordinary emission, since it was exclusively intended for the purpose of changing specie.

Hereupon an animated dialogue ensued between Dr. Segui and the Minister, and just as the matter was going to be put to the vote D. Francisco de la Serna presented a petition to the chamber, as follows— B. Ayres, January 3rd 1867. To the Hon. Chamber of Senators "The undersigned merchants of this city, by virtue of the constitutional right of petition, come to address you, not on behalf of any sordid interests, but for our own and the general welfare. Some days since, the mercantile body was surprised by the Chamber of Deputies creating an Exchange-office under pretext of a scarcity of paper-money.

"The proposed method of organization, the circumstances of the case, and the hurried introduction of the bill in the extraordinary session of the Chambers, lead us to infer that the bill would have little chance if debated with coolness and reflection. But the matter is a very serious one. Of course it is difficult to estimate how far private interests are compromised; but the Hon. Senate must prefer to study the general interests of the country. We will not speak harshly of the movers of this bill. God alone can judge each one's intentions; but the bill is in reality double-faced and pregnant with danger,

"It is a mine against the Provincial Bank, so long the object of machinations, and still the sheet-anchor of B. Ayres, which never lends itself to fantastic enterprises, but powerfully aids all legitimate commerce. And if the Bank survive, we shall afterwards see speculation and gambling at a greater height than ever. Let the Senate, therefore, ponder well, lest in seeking to effect a benefit it tend only to foment immorality.

"It is not true that paper-money is scarce: there is abundance for men of good standing; and it is only sought to make use of the Bank as a medium for improper transactions. Moreover, this new emission (for it is nothing else) is a violation of past engagements, and will bring about such a depreciation of paper-money as to ruin thousands, especially those who have not speculated.

"These considerations will suffice to remind you how grave is this question, and we deem it unnecessary to enter into further details.

"We beg, therefore, that you will attend to our petition, by preventing the injury that threatens the public, and the inevitable ruin and discredit of the Bank.

"And in order to shew that we are animated by a wish for the public welfare, we undertake to get up and realize the domestic loan originally projected for redemption of the currency. The present state of the money-market favors such an undertaking, which would be entirely frustrated by the Exchange-office. This is a proof of the sincerity of our petition.

May God preserve the Senate, Alejandro Arocena—José Magdalino—Pedroffons, Larigau & Co.—M. de Mendon—Manuel A. Guimaraens—Cayetano M. Cazon—Carbone, L'Esperon & Co.—Nicolas Repetto & Co.—Francisco Basarte & son.

"NORE—It is proper to advise the Senate that owing to press of time and the urgency of the moment we have not had time to procure the signatures of the leading merchants; but a duplicate more numerous signed will be laid before the Chamber in due course."

Some amusement was caused when it was found that the petition only bore nine signatures. The bill was then put to the vote for first reading, and passed by 11 votes to 5.

THE NEW CURRENCY LAW. ESTABLISHMENT OF EXCHANGE-OFFICE. This bill having duly received the sanction of both Legislative Chambers was yesterday promulgated as law by the Executive.

Art. 1. The Provincial Bank is authorized to give 25 paper-dollars for every patacon presented to be changed.

Art. 2. It is also authorized to give the amount of specie so received at one patacon for 25 paper-dollars.

Art. 3. If paper-money should go above 25 to the patacon, and that the Bank have paid away all the specie received in exchange for the amount of the present emission, the Bank shall still continue to give gold at 25 paper-dollars to the patacon as far as its reserve of specie will go.

Art. 4. Parties indebted to the Bank or the State can satisfy their debts indifferently in gold or paper-money, at \$25 mpc. per patacon.

Art. 5. The Provincial Bank may emit as much paper money as will be requisite for fulfillment of this law.

Art. 6. The Executive is authorized to receive proposals for conversion of the paper-currency, and submit same in the most convenient form for the consideration of the Legislature. Buenos Ayres, Jan. 4, 1867.

ALSINA. MARIANO VARELA. EDITOR'S TABLE. The new Exchange-office Bill, promulgated in the Tribuna, was the sole topic in town yesterday. At last the long-talked of relief measure has been passed, and there was a very uneasy feeling amongst the immediate friends of the specie brokers as to their future prospects. We heard it suggested that the poultry business seemed to offer the greatest inducement, a fat turkey being at present worth more than a cow. But we share none of these apprehensions; the brokers will always find enough to do in National Bonds, railway shares, and such like. Even if the present Exchange-office scheme should work in the most favorable manner, and the price of the paper money be fixed permanently, still the brokers will always find employment, and of a more legitimate character than speculating in the price of food

and all the articles necessary for the maintenance of life. An English gentleman, who has just arrived in the Cordova, has kindly promised to place on exhibition for a few days the celebrated Snyder rifle. We invite the Minister of War, and, in fact, all the military men in town, to inspect this inimitable weapon. The National Government could not do better than buy a number of these rifles and send them to the encampment.

Mr. Banfield, Manager of the Southern Railway, with Mr. Ezeurra, of the same line, accompanied by Mr. Harry Woods, of the Argentine Central Railway, are at present out at Dolores. Many attach much importance to this visit, and believe that it portends an extension of the road to that town. We should be very glad if such prove the case, although we there is but little chance, as Mr. Robertson distinctly states until the present line gives 10 per cent. profit, it is idle to talk of any extension.

The case of Mrs. Price and the 'alcaldes' has produced a great sensation. The matter has been carried before our friend, Mr. Cazon, who on looking into the facts informed Mr. Price that he could do nothing. It will, however, be productive of one good; namely, to caution house owners against renting to 'alcaldes.'

A Brazilian gunboat left the other day, taking all Tamandara's goods and chattels, secretary, &c. We suppose that they will be all trunshipped at Montevideo on board the Apa.

Yesterday we received a letter from Copenhagen, enclosing an advertisement for old postage stamps, which we publish in another column. It is surprising the interest taken in Europe for Argentine postage stamps.

Owing to the temporary illness of our renowned correspondent Sinbad, we are constrained to take whatever army correspondence we can get. We had made arrangements with an English clerk in Corrientes, but he has come down to Buenos Ayres. Mr. Ryan's letters have one great defect—they contain more comments and reflections than news, and that is exactly what we do not require. The Englishmen at present in head-quarters, no matter in what capacity, will please therefore take notice, that during Sinbad's absence all letters containing useful reliable news sent to us, and which we publish, we shall pay for liberally, but we reserve to ourselves the right to strike out whatever we may think ill-advised or unpropitious.

We regret to chronicle another horrible tragedy in this city: the particulars we gather from our colleague, the Nacional. At midnight on the 28th ult. a man entered a small house in Calle Chacabuco, occupied by a lady and her daughter: some others subsequently entered, and the mother getting alarmed rushed into the street and called for the 'serenos.' When they arrived they found the poor girl beheaded. The whole affair seems locked in a most impenetrable mystery. As a matter of course, the public will get no further particulars of this atrocious crime, as the Chief of Police does not believe in making such things public: he says it tends to defeat justice.

Respecting the Lorea fair there seems to be great noise, owing to the very small net proceeds: coaches, &c. for the members had to be deducted, and, on the whole, the expenses were much heavier than expected.

The Republic states that there is an effort being made in Montevideo to abolish the amusements of Carnival. We think if the throwing of water business could be done away with, it would be so much the better. The Republic is beyond all question one of the best printed papers in town, and very admirably got up. We notice that it is the only paper in town that publishes the business at the 'corrales.'

Felipe Varela, one of the disturbers in the Interior, has published a proclamation, calling on the Provincianos to aid him. The Nacional publishes the proclamation, but it is not worth the trouble of translation.

A native gentleman who has come down from head-quarters, states that one of the most extraordinary features of the present war is that the Paraguayan corpses dry up, and do not decompose, the only parts of the body that are corruptible being the hands and feet. Large piles of dead Paraguayans are on either side of the Itapiru road, and the bodies, with the exception of the hands and feet, are in the most perfect state of preservation; the scorching sun dries up the bones and flesh, and it is supposed that this is mainly attributable to the peculiar food of the Paraguayans, being, we may say, purely vegetable, as the bulk of the Paraguayans live on mandioca. We could wish some of the doctors up at head-quarters would send us a short treatise on this extraordinary affair. We should like to hear Professor Murray's opinion on this subject.

Respecting the exact whereabouts of Gen. Paunero we have no advices, but our colleague the Nacional states that at this date he must be marching into Mendoza, at the head of some 5,000 men.

Messrs. Wells and Bell have left for Frayle Muerto. We wish them a

pleasant journey, and hope they will on their return favor us with their views on this colony; which is at present attracting so much attention. The German paper, we notice, cautions all Germans from going up there. If the plan suggested by Capt. Wehrans, and published in our columns to-day, be carried out, Frayle Muerto will become in a few years one of the most important places in this Republic.

The news brought by the Pavon is: That the Paraguayan insurrection is extending, and that the Brazilian and Argentine armies had been reinforced the last contingent that arrived up there being from Entre Rios.

The interest on the National Bonds is now being paid, and the amortization will take place on the 9th, the amount to be redeemed being 41,748 \$ fs.

Our colleague the Nacion has taken the extraordinary idea of publishing a sort of city directory in its columns. Rather novel matter for a newspaper.

We hear at Sr. Costa's magnificent estancia, on the banks of the Paraná, there is at present a capon saladero working away hard and fast; and that the proprietor has contracted for no less than 80,000 capones, at various prices.

The National Government has recognized Sr. Lanza as Brazilian Vice-Consul at Santo Tomé.

We are glad to hear that the National Government is at present in treaty with Messrs. Aguirre and Murga for some sheep and cattle for the Welsh colony. We cannot too highly praise the tried and steady friendship of Dr. Rawson for our countrymen on the lonely shores of the Chubut.

To-day the new Municipal Board of Buenos Ayres will be elected. We hope sincerely the members will do something for this neglected city. Messrs. Lezica, Blanco, and Bosch have already resigned.

We have received an interesting article on the working of business houses here and in England, which we are reluctantly obliged to hold over until to-morrow.

General Hornos will not remain long here, but return to head-quarters, as it is generally and confidently asserted that about the middle of Jan. the allies will resume operations.

There is much inquiry made about the proposed new land law: as it has not yet been finally passed, we do not publish it in English; but in a day or two, the Deputies will decide the bill, and then we shall give it to our readers. Parties anxious to buy land, must wait however for at least five months, the time allowed by law to 'squatters,' after that period Mr. Billinghurst will begin to sell by auction the Government land.

IMMIGRATION RETURNS. FOR 1862, '63, '64, '65, AND '66. The Office of National Statistics, directed by Mr. Hudson, has favored us with a comparative table, from which we learn the following:—

Table with 2 columns: Year and Immigrants. 1862... 6,716; 1863... 10,408; 1864... 11,682; 1865... 11,767; 1866... 13,696.

Making in all, 54,269 immigrants within the past 5 years. Of these, Italians formed 31 per cent., French 28, English 10, Spanish 7, German 2, and trunshipped at Montevideo 22 per cent.

The returns for 1866 exceed those of any previous year, and are just double those of 1862. The chief increase has been in Italians: the French show a great falling-off; the English have almost doubled since 1864, but the sailing-vessels from Ireland have ceased; the Spaniards were greatly increasing till 1865, but have diminished by one-third; the Germans last year were more than double the average of the preceding ones.

On the whole the returns are most encouraging, and we would call special attention to the steamers from Liverpool, which bring us many useful immigrants, possessing the triple recommendation of intellect, industrious habits, and capital.

EXTRAORDINARY CASE OF RAPE. ARREST OF THE CRIMINAL. For some time back there has been a ruffian going about committing various crimes and attacking English farm-houses. Through the indefatigable exertions of our acting British Consul this fellow, called El Tape, has been arrested, his last crime being to attack a girl only 9 years old. The following letter has been received from Chascomus, and we trust that the authorities will take care that he does not escape. The following is the letter in question.

Chascomus, Dec. 31, 1866. To Her Britannic Majesty's Consul. Sir, I have the satisfaction to inform you that through your-kind influence the man that committed the rape on my child is arrested, and is in Chascomus. My testimony has been taken, also that of the child. The prisoner has been brought face to face, and is fully identified to be the guilty party. I return my sincere thanks for your interference, and leave you to see the prisoner punished. Yours sincerely, N. N.

ENGLISH SETTLERS IN SANTA FE. WAITING FOR THE SURVEYOR. To the Editors of the Standard. Gentlemen, Seeing a letter from your correspondent 'L. S.' complaining of the trouble and loss of time caused to the settlers in Santa Fé by the continued delay of Mr. Livi, the Government Surveyor, in measuring and marking out their lands, I must beg a small space in your valuable columns to say a few words on the subject. At the sale of Government Lands in Santa Fé, on 9th of last October, the buyers were told—"You can buy your camp, get your title-deeds, have your land measured out, and be put in legal possession of it in less than a fortnight."

They were further told that the Government Surveyor was at their disposal whenever they chose to send for him to mark out and give them possession of their lands, and for this privilege, together with 'mojones,' and other surveying expenses, they paid an extra sum of 30 Bolivianos per league. It is now more than three months since the lands were purchased, and as yet no steps have been taken in the matter, notwithstanding various expeditions, letters, &c., to Santa Fé for the purpose of seeing the surveyor on the subject.

Mr. Livi (unlike most of his race) does not approve of the maxim, "time is money," but has changed it for the ever-recurring phrase, "mañana," and has always some excuse for delaying the unwarly and hard-put-upon sheep-farmer. Let us hope that Santa Fé will not so soon lose the 'prestige' she so justly bears at present, and be reduced to the same state as unfortunate Frayle Muerto.

In Santa Fé we have no Indians to harass us and rob us of our hard-earned gains. We have no difficulties to contend against in the shape of a scarcity of 'peones,' horses, &c., so do not let a wearisome procrastination like this deter and make settlers flight shy of going there, and relieving the Banda Oriental, Entre Rios, and B. Ayres, of its overflowing stream of emigrants. There are in Santa Fé, hitherto almost unknown, advantages in railway and water facilities, a Government inclined to support and aid foreigners, cheap, clean camps, only requiring a few years' refining to make them equal to any; and, above all, a truly hospitable go-a-head set of estanciaeros, determined to show what changes, perseverance, industry, and science will work in unpopulated camps, only delayed by the trumpety excuses of a surveyor. Many of them have long since made their preparations and left their camps to settle in Santa Fé, are now kicking their heels in disgust in Rosario and other places, at a great loss of time and money, only waiting until this mythical surveyor feels inclined to measure and deliver over the lands to their rightful owners. Trusting that this intrusion on your columns will be sufficient to call attention from the proper quarter to this crying evil.

THE WESTERN RAILWAY. Strangers Club, B. Ayres, Jan. 2, 1867. To the Editors of the Standard, Gentlemen,

At the Chilivcoy terminus of this railway it chanced that on the 31st ult. I wanted a first-class ticket to this city, and, not having sufficient money of the country, I tendered a sovereign in payment. The ticket-issuer, having consulted a native journal, said he would allow me at the rate of \$100 for the coin, to which I expostulated in vain.

Not wishing to allow such a wholesale advantage being taken of my dilemma (the sovereign in your impression of the 30th ult., or previous day, being quoted at \$112) I determined to go second-class.

Now, Gentlemen, in following out this determination, not alone would my comfort have been to a great extent sacrificed (but which, as merely affecting one of those despised articles of traffic 'clept passengers, is possibly no more a matter of concern to railway directors in this country than it is in Europe) but the company would have lost exactly 50 per cent. of the fare, and, as my case is doubtless that of many others, it may become the interest of the Board of Directors of the Western Railway to order some more moderate discount to be charged on foreign money.

Possibly the ticket-issuer may have fixed the impost 'proprio motu,' in consideration of his being able, and having on the occasion; to jerk out some broken English. The operation, I am willing to admit, was evidently painful one, and I should have no difficulty in allowing a reasonable compensation, but deemed the amount attempted to be charged too extortionate; in which view, if the foregoing hypothesis is correct, I trust the Board of Directors will concur.

Happily, on leaving the booking-office, I met a fellow-countryman, a perfect stranger, yet one who played the part of Bassanio and rescued me from the fangs.
