OPENING OF THE EXCHANGE-OFFICE.

GREAT SCENE AT THE BANK. At 12 o'clock precisely, yesterday, we entered the Bank, to witness the opening of the "Oficina de cambios," of public Exchange office. We expected to see a great rush, and perspiring clerks rushing in and out; but nothing of the kind, the paying and depositing offices of the Bank were pretty full with the usual class of customers, but the new office for exchanging paper into gold and gold into paper seemed to be as yet unknown to the public.

At a quarter past 12 o'clock the first transaction was effected, and as it symbolical of the state of the market, we observed that it was an Italian quintero who changed his gold into paper; next came the Bolsa king, with one hundred thousand patacons to exchange for paper; Mr. Guimaraens entered with a large bag of gold for the same purpose, and a young clerk with an athletic peon forced his way up with several bags of gold rolled up in canvass. The office was now crowded, and at the door were assembled numerous brokers, who, having nothing whatever to do on the Bolsa, dropped into the Banca to see how things were going on.

At 3 p. m. to-day, the valiant Gen. Wenceslao Paunero arrived here, and we remark a general feeling of satisfaction among the citizens at the visit of so distinguished a guest; we hope the gallant General and his staff accompanying him will pass some pleasant days among us, before proceeding to crush the rebels of Mendoza.

NEWS FROM EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF THE GALILEO.

Our colleagues received telegrams yesterday from Montevideo with the following news.

Montevideo, January 7th 12.30 p. m.

The Curuzú is in from Rio, with dates to the 1st inst.

The Galileo arrived on the 30th, ult. with dates from Lisbon, Dec. 6th. A Fenian insurrection is feared in Ireland, and several emissaries had arrived from the U. States. Head-centre Stephens is at Bremen, and others are at Hamburg. Troops have been sent to Ireland, arrests made in Dublin, and arms seized at Cork, and Limerick. In Canada there is also great excitement: the Government declined to hang Lynch and Mac Mahon, which the Fenians attribute to debility.

The French papers treat of Canada and the Fenians. Napoleon has called for 300,000 recruits for the levy of 1867. The Empress is going to Rome. The French troops will leave Civita Vecchia on Dec. 10, and it is thought the Pope will remain in Rome, although conspirators are introducing men and arms. The Italia says the Pope is ready to renew negotiations with Victor Emmanuel.

The revolution in Candia is not yet quelled by the Turks. The Queen of Spain is expected in Lisbon, and a palace has been prepared for her. Seven transports, to carry 10,000 men, will leave Toulon for Mexico to bring back the army of occupation. Advice from Vera Cruz state that Maximilian abdicated on Nov. 15th, and in New York it is rumored that he had gone to Vera Cruz, leaving the French troops at Acapulco.

It seems President Johnson has sent Gen. Sherman to Mexico; the latter had arrived at Havana. Some think he will support Juarez, others that he will take charge of Mexican affairs on the retirement of Maximilian.

MAILS FROM THE URUGUAY.

The Comercio of Paysandu mentions the case of a woman selling her daughter to some Brazilian cattle-drivers, but as the girl resisted her new master they abandoned her on the road and she was luckily picked up and properly attended to in time. Another shocking murder has been committed at Salto, the victim being the officer of the serenoes, a Brazilian, generally esteemed by the townfolk. The murderers are unknown.

From Concepcion we learn that a Deputy who absented himself from the Chamber incurred popular odium, and a petard was exploded under his window, breaking all the panes of glass.

Professor Clark left for B. Ayres, to solicit from the National Government some reforms in the Concepcion college. A grand picnic was given to the Molinas family on board General Urquiza's new steamer, the party visiting the colony of San José and the town of Paysandú. The new Bank of Benítez & Co. has been opened.

The Uruguay has an article on the destruction of the Eco printing-office, recently burnt at Parana by incendiaries. The Porvenir says—"A letter from Paso Hondo, 2 leagues beyond Curupaity, states that Telmo Lopez of Santa Fé has been named by the President of Paraguay to command his reserve army, a force of 18,000 men." This is, however, doubtful, since it is not customary in Paraguay to give high command to an alien.

THE WAR OF THE ANDES.

MAILS FROM THE INTERIOR.

GENERAL PAUNERO AT SAN LUIS.

The Ferrocarril of the 6th inst. contains the following:—

Dates from Rioja are to the 27th. ult. Colonel Vera surprised a band of assassins under Indalecio Nieto, and captured three, but the rest escaped. The National Guards of Pamatina have been called out, to the number of 200 horse and 100 foot, under Col. José M. Linares. Another force of 400 men is under arms in Vinchina and Guadacol, both which points are threatened by Felipe Varela and the Rioja rebels. All able-bodied men in Rioja are now under arms, but the rebels receive every support from the Chilianos both in that province and beyond the frontier.

The Boletín Oficial of San Luis, Friday, Dec. 21st. says—

"At 3 p. m. to-day, the valiant Gen. Wenceslao Paunero arrived here, and we remark a general feeling of satisfaction among the citizens at the visit of so distinguished a guest; we hope the gallant General and his staff accompanying him will pass some pleasant days among us, before proceeding to crush the rebels of Mendoza."

An English gentleman who arrived yesterday in B. Ayres from Chile says that the rebels of Mendoza are doing an active business, driving all the cattle over into Chile, and getting men, money, and arms in exchange.

A private letter, says the Porvenir, has been received as follows— "The Mendoza rebels have murdered an emissary sent by Gen. Paunero, and Col. Videla also caught a courier

of Paunero's, en route for Rioja, and shot him. It is not known where Felipe Saa is at present. Gen. Paunero delivered up to the Cordobese Government the arms he seized on the road from Rosario, and which he had supposed were intended for the rebels. Jachal, a department of San Juan, has declared in favor of the rebels. Varela carries on his exploits in Rioja. It is said Paunero will have to fall back on Rio Cuarto, as his men began to desert from him." (This requires confirmation.)

The Tucuman contingent for Paraguay, 130 rank and file, arrived at Rosario on Friday evening, and was at once put in the barrack.

All mail communication with Mendoza has been cut off by the rebels, and it is thought that even the Chilean mail-bags will be detained by them.

The Municipality of Rosario has taken up several bakers for selling light bread. A youth about 18 years of age, committed suicide on Friday. A contingent of 25 criminals was shipped on Friday for the seat of war. Professor Hermann arrived and was warmly saluted by the press of Rosario; his first performance is to come off on the 8th inst.

The Tiempo of Santa Fé, 3rd. inst., has the following:— The Gran Chaco expedition is now arranged: it will be under the command of Col. Nelson, and comprises 400 men, including 50 volunteers from the capital.

A steamer arrived from the seat of war relates that the Paraguayans lost 10 men in the great explosion before spoken of, and since then Lopez has prohibited smoking in the batteries.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The houses at the corner of Piedad and Reconquista, in front of Mr. Terence Moor's, will shortly be tumbled, and the foundation of the new River Plate Bank building laid. We hope Mr. Green will take our hint, and instead of using the miserable soft bricks made by the Basques in this city, will construct the new bank of Martin Garcia granite; it would cost of course a little more, but it would be the only building of the kind in Buenos Ayres, as there is not in the whole length and breadth of this city a single stone house.

Last week over 750 emigrants arrived at this port, the majority of them from Italy and the Basque provinces. All these find immediate employment, hundreds being sent up the rivers on contract to the saladeros. It is a strange fact, and speaks for the peculiarity of the country, how much easier these classes of emigrants find employment than our own countrymen. The town is full of strong able-bodied Englishmen looking for work, many of them have been out to the estancias, and returned stating that such employment gave not the slightest prospect, as the wages they earned hardly kept them in clothes and tobacco, and they now look for employment in town on the railways or else where. It would seem, therefore, that we cannot compete with the Basques and Italians, who live cheaper and work for far less wages than others. The Italians have got all the building in the city into their hands, they have also complete possession of all the quintas about town, they have actually pushed themselves into the saladero business, and now the Italians are the principal saladeristas in Barracas, and as for the river trade they have an absolute monopoly. In fact, the Italians have got everything save the sheep-farming, and now we hear that they are all going over the camp, taking flocks of sheep on fourths and on fiftis.

The lighter men are all furious with us for taking up the question of the new tariff. They say that the poorest business going is the lighters', as owing to the heavy expenses many of them hardly cover their working. If this be so, then it must be through the worst mismanagement, as the whole trade of the port is in their hands. The new export duty on wool and hides, we hear, is now lower by two per cent. than last year. This is a trifling boon the Government has made to the farmers, but trifling as it is, the increased activity in wool shipments shows how extremely prostrate the wool market has been, and how the very least thing affects it. Now with the patacons firm at 25, and this reduction in the duties, the farmers ought to at least expect an improvement of ten dollars per arroba. Our advice from the camp go to show that the season is very backward this year, and will probably last till May and June.

In the partido of Zarate a large estancia, known as the Diaz property, originally belonging to the Jesuits, has been sold to a native 'comestibles' broker, at the rate of \$500,000 per square league. The land is some of the best and finest in the country, and has, in former years, been occupied by Irish sheepfarmers. It is the highest price we have heard paid for land during the year 1866.

The rents now-n-days paid for stores in fashionable streets in town are the highest we ever heard of. The almaceons in San Molina's magnificent house in calle Florida are rented at seven thousand dollars each per month. In the best part of London

a higher rent than this could not be expected. The site of this house alone cost, we hear, one million eight hundred thousand dollars, and the edifice two millions currency. Except the Hotel la Paz, this house is the most valuable in town.

There are many persons who insist that there is every probability of peace being arranged at headquarters. They go so far as to say that all the terms have been agreed on, save one article, which has been referred to the respective Governments. Our French colleague goes so far as to say that on last Friday at 12 o'clock the Commander-in-chief had another interview with Lopez, but we are all in the dark on this question. Sinbad is sick at Esquina. Marryatt never even hints at it, and the probabilities are that there is no foundation for the rumor.

The state of the Calle Larga in Barracas is at present beyond description. The sand is in some places six and seven inches deep; the coachmen refuse to go down the road for any money whatever, and private carriages have to be put on extra horses. A very fine carriage road through Dr. Avellaneda's quinta is the only possible way to get to that delightful spot called the Banderita, but of course only the immediate friends of the Minister are allowed this carriage drive. Dr. Palgoun Huergo's house, facing Standard Hall, and between the charming residences of the two Ministers, is to be rented; in the garden is the tallest Eucalyptus Globulus in Barracas. Sr. Dn. Juan Antonio Fernandez's quinta is really one of the sweetest places about Buenos Ayres; the trees and shrubs are not of yesterday's planting, but full grown; the vines are unrivaled, and it is to be regretted the fashionable broker does manufacture some pure Barracas wine. Strange to say, with all its advantages, Barracas is steadily going back. Mr. Balbin, the President of the Bank, did his best the other day to sell a very fine piece of ground he has on the Calle Larga, next Mrs. Atkin's, which he bought 7 years ago in \$50,000—taxes and interest, the place now stands him in about \$100,000, and yet when put up at auction not even the original purchase money was bid for it. What Barracas requires, is, to pave the Calle Larga or macadamize it, like the Miguelita road, outside of Montevideo. We understand that at Martín Garcia there are immense piles of small stones which can be had for nothing, save the freight, which to the foot of Calle Larga is \$45 per ton.

Mr. Banfield's trip to Dolores in company with Messrs. Escarra and Woods has plunged all our colleagues into reveries about new railways, estanciero subscriptions, &c. We read that the estancieros along the line offer to subscribe liberally for the new Company, but our colleagues seem to forget in toto that the estancieros have not the money to start such an enterprise; there is hardly an estanciero in that neighborhood who could even pay down for 200 shares; it is therefore perfectly idle to think of building a railway with such elements; from the trade of the Southern Railway at present it is pretty evident that the Government will have little or nothing to pay on the guarantee; the line is at present making 8 per cent. and over; with such pleasing facts to guide the Minister, we think the Government might easily make a new contract and give an 8 per cent. guarantee.

Indian corn is now very abundant in the market, but considered very dangerous for young children, although in the United States mothers give young corn to children as the most wholesome food. The corn grown in this country is, however; generally of the coarsest description, as very little care is taken by the Italian 'quinteros'; besides, we have no Indian corn bakers in this country. Corn cakes for breakfast are unknown in the land; the price of poultry is, owing to the heavy importation going on, fall-g. It will seem, no doubt, a novelty to some of our readers to hear of river craft coming into the Boca with a cargo of cocks and hens, yet several vessels arrived last week with deck-loads of fowl. The price of butter still rules high, and for a very inferior article. We hear that many parties buy butter from the colony at Santa Fé, price three Bolivian reales per lb.; the butter is fresh and good.

Yesterday Miss McLean's new school-room, at the Banderita, on the Calle Larga, was duly inaugurated. It is large, roomy, and commodious, and was built by the wealthy English brick-layer, Mr. John Purviss.

The subscriptions to the shares of the new Argentine Bank are rapidly increasing. Over five thousand shares have been subscribed for already in this city. Mr. Cullen is most indefatigable in his exertions, and we suppose the bank will shortly be opened to the public, although there seems to be some difficulty as to getting possession of the house, next the bank before the end of February. The new notes manufactured in the States for this bank are the best and finest we have yet seen, and will completely eclipse the paper dollar of the Provincial Bank.

Our colleague, the Nacion Argentina, has hit on the novel plan of publishing in its columns a 'directory' of the city. The idea is very original, but goes to show the great dearth of news. The little steamer Guazu, which plies between Fray Bentos and Gualaguaychu, almost went to the bottom the other day. She struck on an unknown rock on entering the Gualaguaychu Arroyo, and made a large hole in her bows. With the greatest exertion of the captain, crew, and passengers, they succeeded in putting a sail over the aperture, and ultimately beached the little steamer. The Benitez Bank, which was provisionally opened on the 10th November, has at last been publicly inaugurated in Gualaguaychu. The notes are well printed and bear the likeness of Don José Benitez, the founder of the great house of Benitez. The bank, it is believed, will do a large business in the thriving town of Gualaguaychu.

On the 2d inst. the anniversary of the capture of Paysandú, the people of that town attended the church, where funeral obsequies were performed with great pomp. The people of Paysandú have been somewhat alarmed by what they believe a case of 'cholera morbus' the owner of the theatre, Sr. Porta, took suddenly ill and was dead in a few hours.

The sergeant of the 'serenos' in the town of Salto, Banda Oriental, was murdered the other night, and his body taken out to a short distance from the place. The whole town was thrown into the greatest alarm, and on examination of the corpse it was found that the poor man had received over 20 stabs. The unfortunate man was a Brazilian, and bore a very high character. No trace whatever can be found of the assassins, but there is a fearful animosity in the town against all Brazilians. Mr. Sarmiento has published in Washington a pamphlet on the present war in the River Plate. We hear that it is very well written, and in a few days we expect to receive some copies from the Minister of the National Government. There seems to be some delay about the great Charity Lottery, which should have come off on the first day of the year but is postponed until the 1st of February.

There are no less than 18 papers now published in Buenos Ayres, of which we doubt if there are more than three or four that cover expenses and give the editors wherewith to keep life together. This is the hardest season we have experienced for some time—money scarce and expenses heavy. On the 31st December we struck off our list 48 camp subscribers, who have never paid us a farthing for the last four years.

The branch railway from the Once de Setiembre to Barracas is, we understand, condemned, and not likely ever to be carried out, notwithstanding the immense outlay of capital by Mr. Haedo.

Right in front of the North Barracas Station, on the Northern Railway, there is a large saladero worked by a Company of Basque peones who have each subscribed ten thousand dollars, in a joint stock fund; the men earn no wages, but draw their shares of the profits each month; the peones in this manner earn enormous wages and interest on their little money; they have all accounts in the Bank. The average gain of the saladerista business at present is about one patacon per head. At Sr. Cambaceres Saladero the killing last year figured up to 60,000 or 70,000 head, which gives to that popular saladerista nett, say 70,000 pats. per annum, rather a handsome sum.

With reference to the alarming statement of Sr. Cabral's peon, about being called to bury a woman from Dr. Uriburu house in Calle Piedad, we learn from a member of the family that it is wholly untrue, that no one (young or old) died in the house, and that no peon was sent for, or went to the house, to convey a corpse to the Recoleta. We may add that Dr. Uriburu has been for some time staying in the suburbs, and we regret having mentioned his name in connection with the matter. There is no doubt that Mr. Cabral's man made the statement as we reported, but it is rumored now that the occurrence was not in Calle Piedad, but in Calle Cerrito.

DECREE OF THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT.

THE "STANDARD" ABROAD.

Standard office, B. Ayres. December 29th 1866. To H. E. Dr. Avellaneda, Minister of Government. The undersigned editors of the Standard present themselves before the Provincial Government, and respectfully say—

1st. That from 1861 till 1865 we sent by every packet files of our paper to the chief public reading-rooms of England, Scotland, Ireland and Canada, with the sole purpose of making this country known abroad, and attracting immigration; this being at our own expense and without any remuneration.

2nd. That since 1865 the National Government has been pleased to pay subscription for these numbers, but is now obliged to suspend same.

3rd. That the immediate benefit of making this country known abroad results almost exclusively in favor of Buenos Ayres.

4th. That the amount of subscription for these 42 papers is a mere trifle, only \$840 mjc. per month; and we now beg the Provincial Government will charge itself with this expense.

5th. That we are, nevertheless, still determined if necessary to continue sending these papers at our own expense; it being no less our interest than that of the country at large to invite English emigration to these hospitable shores.

With this motive we respectfully salute the enlightened Government of which Your Excellency forms part. M. G. and E. T. Mulhall.

GEOLOGICAL OBSERVATIONS ON SOUTH AMERICA.

Cordoba, Dec. 26th 1866.

Among the great topics of the day none have engrossed the attention of travellers and geographers so much as the discovery of the north-west passage, the source of the Nile, and the inscriptions on the rocks in the Desert of Sinai. The two former have now been pretty well set at rest: Kane, Grant, and Speke have immortalised themselves; but the latter still remains a mystery.

Some have pretended to tell us that the thousands of inscription, carved upon the rocks of the Desert of Sinai were done by the Israelites on their way from Egypt to the Holy Land; and others, that they were done by Christian pilgrims on their way to Sinai. Either of these suppositions is quite absurd. Had the Israelites carved them they would have been done in Hebrew; moreover, the Israelites did not remain long enough in that part of the country to accomplish so great a work. They are not the work of Christian pilgrims, because they are written in a language not known to any Christian people on the earth. Had the pilgrims done this work, they would have left writings on places where it was known they did stay, and not upon rocks surmounted by barren sands, where not a blade of grass grows, and not a drop of water can be obtained, and where there is no shade to protect the traveller from an Arabian burning sun. Whoever wrote those thousands of inscriptions, and carved those pictures of animals, must have lived in that now desolate valley, for it is the work of hundreds of men for many years. We, therefore, come to the conclusion that the whole of that valley, which has now been known as a desert for 2,000 years, was once a cultivated fruitful country, teeming with population and with richness and verdure. We have reason also to believe, from the ruins which here and there peer above the surface of the sand, that large portions of the great African desert were once fruitful fields, abounding with life and happiness.

Those countries now so barren and desolate were once invigorated by abundant showers of rain. Great changes have taken place in their political as well as their physical conditions. Palestine has also undergone great changes, and now bears no resemblance to its former beauty—the "Cedars of Lebanon" have passed away for ever. The whole country around the Caspian and Dead Seas show, by marks upon the rocks and geological formations, that it was once blessed with abundant rains. What has caused this wonderful change? We turn to the other side of the globe for an answer. The upheaved mountain ranges have changed the currents of the atmosphere, causing the rains which once fell upon those countries to be carried to distant parts of the earth's surface.

The Andes not only bear every appearance of having at no distant period been under the sea but even large portions of them, together with much of the level land which forms the continent of South America, have been below the surface of the ocean since the world has been the residence of man. The highlands of Ecuador, Peru, and Bolivia are in many places covered with ruins of temples and even large cities, built of stone. As the Lucas and Peruvian Indians knew nothing about working in stone when Pizarro entered the country it is evident that these ruins must be the work of a former race, which has long since entirely disappeared from off the face of the earth. These stone ruins are to be found in the mountains, or on high level plains; and even in some places enormous structures are to be found at a height where, on account of the rarefied air it would be impossible for men to work at the present day, showing that only the higher portions were out of the sea when inhabited by this now extinct people; while, on the other hand, the 'huacas' and ruins of the Indians who have come in at a later period are most plentiful on the lower lands. There are also in many places to be found shore-marks of the ancient ocean on the side of the mountains, and beds of ancient rivers now dry, the sources of which were formerly supplied with water from clouds passing over the mountains, but which at the present time are turned away to other countries or fall upon the opposite side. In some places there are chains of mountains crossing these river beds, thrown up since the rivers have run dry, and their channels may be distinctly traced up one side and down the other. Nearly all of this phenomena may be found almost the whole length of the Andes, and through Central America, Mexico, &c. In California there is the channel of a former river connecting Great Salt Lake with the ocean. What became of the ancient people who inhabited this immense tract of country is a mystery. In the north of Mexico are cities which apparently have been destroyed by some volcanic fire, as the stones and ruined walls all have a glazed appearance, as though they had passed through the fire.
