TREMENDOUS EDITORIAL VICTORY.

COMPLETE DEFEAT OF THE MUNICIPALITY.

COMPLAINT DISMISSED WITH COSTS.

The long talked of lawsuit between the Municipality and the Standard came off yesterday, before Judge Boneo. At 12 o'clock the Court opened. Dr. Arajo appeared for the Municipality, and Dr. Quintana for the Standard.

Dr. Arajo opened the proceedings by stating that the Municipality, feeling itself aggrieved at an article entitled "The Municipal Joint Stock Co." published in the Standard, which charged them with crime and fraud, had ordered a prosecution against that paper. He then called upon the clerk to read the documents.

The clerk read the papers.

Dr. Quintana stated that without going into the merits of the case at all, which were, however, entirely in favor of the Standard, he objected to the jurisdiction of the Court, as the question was one for a jury.

Dr. Arajo said that if the Standard retracted the statement, the Municipality would be satisfied.

Dr. Quintana replied that the Standard would carry the question to the highest court in Buenos Ayres before it would retract a line,—that what it stated was the truth, and every man in Buenos Ayres knew it to be so.

The Judge considered that the article in question was a retrospective glance at what former Municipalities had done, and not referring to the present board.

Mr. Mulhall stated that finding on the very day the article in question appeared that some paragraphs wounded the susceptibilities of many of the foreign members of the board, and that people seemed to misunderstand the question, he published an explanatory article, showing that as the present board had only just come into office no charges as yet could be made against it, but that the shocking state of the city was such that it inspired little confidence in any municipality; this article was published three days before the Municipal board took up the matter.

The Judge considered that from the whole tenor of the article there was no charge whatever, against the Standard; he therefore dismissed the case, ordering the Municipality to pay the costs.

Dr. Quintana observed that he felt it an honor to defend the Standard, and freely stated that for his part he would charge no fee whatever; the Municipality would therefore only have to pay the costs of the 'escrivanos' and the Court.

Mr. Mulhall thanked the Judge for the very lofty manner in which he had adjudicated the question, and the Court then rose.

ARRIVAL OF THE PRESIDENT.

GREAT CROWDS ON THE MOLE.

In consequence of the notice in the morning papers of the President's departure from Rosario for this city the whole population of Buenos Ayres was on the 'qui vive' for his arrival.

In and about the mole the crowds were excessive. As the morning wore on the scene became more and more animated, and towards noon the Plaza and streets leading to the mole were thronged with people, all eagerly hurrying on to catch a glimpse of his Excellency. In the Plaza Mayo a battalion of National Guards was drawn up in front of the Government House. Following the crowd we at length gained the mole, in the centre of which a company were drawn up to keep the way clear, and give the signal on the General's approach.

At a quarter past twelve o'clock the Guardia Nacional hove in sight, with General Mitre on board, and the band on the mole at once played the National Hymn. The troops in the Plaza formed and marched off along Calle Reconquista and down Cuyo, where they were drawn up in double file. The head of the column opened on the Paseo Julio in front of the mole and extended back three squares. General Nazari and staff dressed out in full regiments, occupied an open space, from whence he issued his orders.

It was 1.30 p.m. before the General touched the mole; we were close at hand and struck by the rather improved appearance of His Excellency; he was dressed in a Colonel's uniform, wearing an unpretending kepi. The Vice-President and Ministers of the Nat. Government accompanied the President up to his house, but the squeeze was something fearful. We never recollect on any previous occasion such a crowd; all Buenos Ayres seemed to have turned out on the occasion; and by a strange coincidence as the guns boomed across the river to announce the President's landing Mr. J. H. Green, manager of the River Plate Bank, took his departure.

For fully an hour after the arrival of the President the streets down town were so crowded, that it was almost impossible to get to the Bolsa. The Consuls' flags were flying, National Guards hurrying to their homes, cocked hats and sabretashes at every corner. At the President's house hundreds flocked to pay their devoirs and welcome him back to Buenos Ayres.

The total want of order, regularity, or authority at the Mole-head, was the subject of severe comment. The President was knocked about, and since the rough-and-tumble at Chivilcoy we have not witnessed such a disgraceful affair, which we hope never to see again repeated.

WHY SHEEP DON'T PAY.

In a late impression of the Standard, we were sorry to see it stated, that a number of Medianeros and Terceros were selling off their shares and returning to town, there to look for work, as they found the Sheep did not pay. It is a remarkable fact, that we never heard of a large estanciero selling off and betaking himself to a town occupation. So far from this being the case, two Gentlemen of the latter class, in books they have written, one some years ago, and the other quite recently, declare, that for making money, the sheep business has no rival. It would seem then, that while it enriches the capitalists, it does not afford a livelihood to the poor man. If this be true, the sooner the alarming truth is made known the better, not only for all intending camp men here, but also for all intending emigrants abroad. If it be not true, then contradiction and proof ought also to be circulated, that the failure of a few may not raise a prejudice against a trade, which affords living to the industrious many.

The Sheep business of South America may not inaptly be compared to the gold diggings of Australia or California. As the countless crowds that rushed to the gold fields, were of every class and exhibited every variety of character, so the Shepherds and sheep owners of this country, seem to be composed of a promiscuous multitude of men, blown hence by the four winds of heaven from every quarter of the globe. There are carpenters and bakers, clerks and cutters, doctors and drapers, painters and printers, porters and ploughmen, sawyers and lawyers, soldiers and sailors, tinkers and tailors,—in short every profession, trade or calling, has a host of its representatives in the camp, besides a motley tribe following no particular occupation of the Tom, Dick and Harry style, and numbers more of the rag tag and bobtail squad. There are even a few of the Gentlemen in black, who thunder in the pulpit for the edification of their Christian flock on the Sunday, and who, with a careful eye, scan the condition of another, and perhaps a better paying flock, on the Monday. Is it to be wondered at, that out of this heterogeneous mass of characters, three fourths of whom understand little or nothing about sheep, a few should fail as Sheepfarmers? The wonder rather is, that so many succeed, seeing that any knowledge of the business is possessed by very few indeed. But ignorance alone is not the chief cause of a man's failure in Sheep farming. There are many who settle down to a camp life, firmly impressed with the belief of two things.

1st. That it is a very easy and idle life and 2nd. That when a man is owner of a few sheep, he can afford to spend as much money as he pleases. These men labouring under such delusions, make a false start at the outset. If they are Bachelors, they hire boys to herd their sheep, while they gallop about visiting, or take a canter into town. They generally affect the gaucho coming out strong in chiripos, tiradores and spurs. By the way, we have frequently observed, that a native, as his worldly circumstances improve, invariably adopts the English dress, while young men from home think it manly and becoming to don the gaucho attire. The one deserves praise for seeking to go forward—the others merit censure by allowing themselves to go backward. These would-be-shepherds whom we are speaking of, are very fond of attending horse races and all sorts of gatherings—are very often away from home, and do nothing when they are at home—spend no inconsiderable sums in pastejeros as they call them, as if they could not ride fast enough on the ruinous road they are travelling—they practise no economy in their dwellings, and throw away as much money in pulperias and fondas, as would pay for sufficient stores all the year round. If again they are family men, then one of the children is generally appointed to take care of the flock, while the father occupies himself in odd jobs and in returning the visits of his neighbours. In both of these instances, it would be monstrous to expect anything like a decent increase in flocks so carelessly tended. Frequent mixtures with neighbours sheep, and the masters eye not overlooking them during the lambing season, have a tendency to keep the number of the flock, year after year at the same figure, and in many cases it gets less. The end of the first year generally finds them in debt, and instead of beginning a new year with a new course of conduct, they get disheartened and more careless than ever, until at last they leave the camp in disgust, ana thematizing the sheep business as a poor speculation. Now if these people, be they single or married, would only consider, that the duties of the situations they go to fill in town, must be performed by themselves and not by deputy, that they must devote all their attention to their several employments, and that they must practise the most rigid economy to make both ends meet and keep up a respectable appearance,—if they consider all this, they will not be apt to think harshly of a camp life, or be surprised at their want of success. No business will prosper, unless it be properly attended to. The tradesman, the merchant, the lawyer, the clergyman and even the President—all must work, and work laboriously or assuredly they will come to grief. And so it is with Sheepfarming. Keep your sheep and your sheep will keep you. Leave them, and you will very soon find that they have left you. It ought never to be forgotten that the best shepherd is care. It is a common opinion that the sheep business is not so lucrative as formerly, on account of the more expensive habits of the Sheepfarmers. We do not think so. The days of bullock heads for seats, and cow hides for windows, are done away with, and we hope for ever. Now, when we enter the humble ranch of a shepherd, we are sensible of being in the home of a civilized being, and though we are indulged with a chair and a plate, thanked with knife and fork, which must cost money, yet we cannot help thinking, that the extra expense is very trifling, and with care need not be repeated for years. Besides, it is generally found, that these luxuries as they are designated, are accompanied, not only with cleanliness, but also with care and economy in other matters to which the denizen of the mansion with the bullock heads and cow hides is quite a stranger. The experience of many will bear us out when we say, that the amount of the yearly bills may be determined by the condition of the house and its inmates. If both have the appearance of poverty, then the household expenses may be set down as being very heavy.

We might enlarge more on the subject to which the above remarks apply, but space will not permit. We wished only to say a few words in behalf of the sheep business, for we are one of those who believe in its importance to the prosperity of this country. A bad season in the camp is followed by bad debts and bankruptcies in town. We believe also that this will never become an agricultural country, and that it is on sheep all our hopes depend. The sheep business like the paper dollar question lately, has reached a crisis, and it is in danger of utter ruin by wars and revolutions. We consider it the duty and interest of all to give it a helping hand, and if it were possible for the Government to do as much for it, as it has done for the currency, by fixing the price of the mestiza sheep, the tide in the affairs of farmers would lead again to fortune.

Allow me to lay before your readers the following data which I have taken some trouble to collect. Let us take for instance the south plaza, should a quinn which in creases into it be included, there will be an area of about 3x3 squares.

Therefore five per cent on thirty-six millions is four millions eight hundred thousand dollars, much more than fifty per cent of the cost of paving the Plaza in one year.

I do not presume to say now how the money might be raised, I do say that were the Plaza paved five per cent would be added to the value of the wool and though paid away in payments for two or even three years the ultimate advantage is self evident.
