THE ARNO'S MAIL.

PARLIAMENT OPENED. The Arno left Rio Janeiro on the 8th inst at 8 o'clock, arrived at Montevideo at 6 p.m. of the 12th, and sailed from there for Buenos Ayres at 4 p.m. of the 13th.

The Queen opened her 30th Parliament in person on the 5th Feb. The Lord Chancellor read her Majesty's message unusually long: promises of a reform-bill, tenant-right for Ireland, restoration of Habeas Corpus, and other matters.

Address to the Throne moved by Lord Beauchamp and Delamere, and in the Commons by Messrs. De Grey and Graves. All made flattering allusions to Ireland, and also Earl Russell and Mr. Gladstone.

Lieut. Brand was committed at Bow St. on charge of willful murder for the execution of Gordon in the Jamaica revolt. Gen. Wilson and ex-Governor Eyre will also soon be brought to trial. The Times ridicules the prosecution.

The O'Donoghue had a grand reception from the Manchester reformers. The Japanese students arrived in London. Bank rate 3 per cent.

William Dargan, the great Irish railway-contractor, is dead. Dr. Kieran was consecrated Archbishop of Armagh by Cardinal Cullen. The Prince of Wales is going to build a residence. The new British and American Telegraph Company has been launched; capital £600,000; the cable is to be via the Azores islands. Letters from the Abyssinian captives report them all still alive, but in chains. An American company has connected Canton and Peking by electric telegraph.

The steamer for Brazil and River Plate left Southampton on Feb. 9th, with £73,000. River Plate Bank £8 prem. Southern Railway £3 dis.

From the continent of Europe little important since the news per Humboldt. The Czar has dissolved the Russian Chambers. In Belgium serious riots occurred, and troops were sent to Roux and Jumetz.

The oldest of the superior officers of the French army, and probably of any in Europe, Colonel Andre Marchal, has just died at Chalons-sur-Saone, in his 103rd year. He was born at Lyons in 1764. He entered the service in 1781 in the Cantabrian Hussars,—a corps which became in 1791 the 5th battalion of Light Infantry. He was Corporal in 1783, Sergeant in 1785, Quartermaster-sergeant in 1788, Sergeant-Major in 1791, sub-Lieutenant in 1792, and Lieutenant and Adjutant in 1793. As Major in 1794 he first commanded the 5th battalion of the Chasseurs of the Eure, then a battalion of the Demi-Brigade of the Eure-et-Loire, and one of the 17th Demi-Brigade of the Line. He was made prisoner at the battle of Trebbia in 1799, and returned to France after the peace of Luneville in 1801. In 1805 he made the campaign of Austerlitz; in 1806 he was Lieutenant-Colonel of the 102nd of the Line; and in 1812 Colonel of the same regiment, in which he continued till June, 1815, when he was placed on half-pay. He then counted 34 years' active service, 22 campaigns, five wounds, and he had repeatedly distinguished himself. He was a Knight of the Empire, Officer of the Legion of Honour, and Knight of the Military Order of St. Louis. Only two years ago the Emperor Napoleon III. conferred on this gallant veteran the cross of Commander of the Legion of Honour.

A few weeks ago 10,000 Austrian uniforms, part of the spoils taken in the battle of Königgrätz, were disposed of by the War-office. The enterprising individuals who bought them were buoyed up with the idea that the Austrian Government would be but too happy to repurchase at any price these unpleasant mementoes of defeat. But what was their dismay on finding the Vienna authorities of a different opinion! Their offer was flatly declined, it being, as it seems, a point of etiquette in the Austrian service to use no piece of military equipment which has passed through the enemy's hands. Precedent makes us inclined to think that the discarded coats will eventually find their way across the ocean, to re-appear on the backs of the South American soldiery. The creole States in those latitudes have ever been the best customers of this Government for old guns, muskets, shakoos, and such like articles.

With the exception of the railway-market, which seems still in a state of complete confusion and uncertainty, the prices of securities to-day have generally had a better tone. Consols have again ranged between 90½ and 90¾, closing at 91 for delivery, 90¾ to 91 for the account. Bank Stock left off at 250 to 252; Reduced and New 3 per Cents., 90 to 91; India Stock, 214 to 216; India 5 per Cents., 107½ to 108; Rupee Paper, 102 to 103 and, and 107 to 108; India Bonds, 25s. to 30s. pm.; and Exchequer-bills, 11s. to 14s. pm.

The decline in the rates for money has caused renewed attention to be directed to colonial bonds, and the new Victoria Six per Cents. have been firm, at 105 to 110.

There was an average discount demanded at the Bank to-day, but in the Stock-Exchange advances are freely at 1½ to 2 per cent.

Pres. Johnson's enemies intend to accuse him of complicity in the murder of Lincoln, and produce Surratt as a witness. The Fenians have deposed Stephens as an imposter, and elected General Gleason to succeed him as Head-centre. The steamboat Fashion was lost on the Mississippi; 300 passengers drowned.

LATEST TELEGRAMS. Madrid, Feb. 7. The Government has recalled the decree of exile lately issued against Marshal Serrano, and will grant a similar favour to other persons recently exiled who shall solicit it.

Berlin, Feb. 8. To-day a Court dinner was given at the Palace in honour of the Count of Flanders, who leaves tomorrow evening for Düsseldorf.

Florence, Feb. 8. Austria has informed the Italian Government that the officer who ordered the frigate Formidabile to be fired upon in the waters of Gravosa has been punished.

M. Langrand-Dumoucau has deposited 500,000 lire as guarantee for the fulfilment of his covenant with the Government relative to the liquidation of the Church property.

Siguori Scialoja and Bogatti, the Ministers of Finance and Justice, were present at to-day's sitting of the Committee on the Free Church and Ecclesiastical Liquidation Bill. The Ministers of the Interior and Foreign Affairs have been requested to be present at to-morrow's sitting.

The Official Gazette of this evening publishes some new regulations relating to the officials employed at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs.

Athens (via Trieste), Feb. 2. A Bill has been introduced in the Greek Chambers, proposing to increase the naval forces by 2,000 men.

New York, Feb. 6. On the 1st of February the debt of the United States was \$2,543 millions.

The Reconstruction Committee has reported a Bill for dividing the States which took part in the rebellion into military districts, under military governments.

New York, Feb. 7. Gold 137½. Five-Twenty United States Bonds, 108½. Exchange, 108½. Erie, 59¼; Illinois Central, 114¾. Petroleum 18¾c. Cotton, 33c.

Paris, Feb. 7. The Bourse has been very firm. Rentes closed at 69f. 62c., or 5c. higher than yesterday.

The France of this evening says:—"The discussion at the sitting of the Council of State, held yesterday at the Tuilleries, relative to the re-organization of the army, had the effect of bringing forward for fresh consideration decisions which had previously been abandoned. It is now proposed simply to revive the law of 1832, and at the same time to reduce the terms of service and organize a National Garde Mobile."

Berlin, Feb. 7. To-day the Upper House adopted the Railway Loan Bill as amended by the Lower House.

The Chambers of Deputies have adopted the law on associations in the form in which it was passed by the Upper House.

The Count of Flanders paid a visit to-day to the King, which was immediately returned by his Majesty. A Court dinner was given this afternoon at the Palace.

The King gave a farewell audience to Count Barral, the Italian Minister at this Court, who presented his letters of recall. Count Bismark was present at the audience.

Vienna, Feb. 7. The Emperor has addressed a letter to Count Belcredi, accepting the latter's resignation, and conferring upon him the Cross of the Order of St. Stephen. His Majesty appoints Baron Beust to succeed him as President of the Ministry. Baron Beust is also intrusted with the temporary direction of the Ministries of State and Police.

An Imperial Patent has been issued postponing the assembly of the Diets until the 18th inst.

Paris, Feb. 8, 3 30 p.m. The Bourse has been heavy. Rentes closed at 69f. 50c., or 12c. lower than yesterday.

An Imperial decree has been issued to-day terminating the relations of the Senate and Corps Legislatif towards the Emperor and the Council of State, and establishing the organic conditions under which their labours will be conducted. This decree, which is a modification of the decree of the 19th of January, contains no important regulation not already known.

The Standard of this evening publishes a telegram from Alexandria, announcing that Lord Clarence Paget has visited the works of the Suez Canal, in company with M. de Lesseps, to whom he expressed his appreciation of the greatness and utility of the enterprise.

EDITOR'S TABLE. The Arno arrived early yesterday morning, and was at once put in quarantine. The Captain of the Port immediately sent a boat off to have the mails on board, the 'Ponton,' where they were fumigated. Mr. McLean's boat lay off, waiting the process, and at 11 o'clock we received our files of English papers and supplements, which come outside the mails. Our brother editor, however, fearing that the quarantine business might be like last packet, sent us up the Times of the 8th by a passenger on board the Parana. Those who called in our office at an early hour had the advantage of reading the Times before many of our subscribers were up. Our supplement contains the Queen's Speech at the opening of Parliament, which we therefore do not reproduce; it also contains a capital money article. Subscribers will please send to our office for their copies.

We welcome back from Europe quite a number of old friends and subscribers, who have been amusing themselves for the last six months. The Arno brought this trip an unusually large number of passengers, and also a quarter of a million of patecons for the London and River Plate Bank and £2,700 for Mr. Hayeroff.

The little steamer Quinto has been taken off her station, and sent to the Tigris to get a high rail fixed, so that she can run alongside vessels in stormy weather.

As will appear by a paragraph cut from the Times of the 8th, which we publish, some Germans are about to send out to the River Plate an immense invoice of Austrian uniforms, taken by the Prussians at Sadowna, sold by auction, and bought on speculation.

It was rumored in town yesterday that General Flores and family will spend the ensuing week at San José,

the palace of General Urquiza, to witness the grand function.

Yesterday the police made a fresh haul on the bank-note forgers—some 1,800,000, in 5,000 dollar bills, seized in Calle Talcahuano. The police ought to be on the look-out about the beach, where we hear some parties have been offering to sell bad bills at a discount.

The Siglo of Montevideo mentions a rather amusing duel between two Brazilian officers about a very pretty Correntina girl. They fought until the seconds got so tired that they made them desist.

Meyer, of the Mosquito, has left in the French packet for Paris to attend the Exhibition; he leaves Mr. Adams in his stead.

The Telegraph wires are still out of order; it is thought all will be right this morning, and that messages can be sent early to-day.

Yesterday morning at 8 o'clock a salute was fired in honor of King Victor Emmanuel, it being his birthday; few of our Italian friends however commemorated the day.

In Rio Janeiro there is now nothing else talked of save peace; the row in the provinces and the delay about taking Curupaity has completely opened the eyes of the Emperor. There is every probability that Sr. Lamas will leave for Asuncion on the morning of St. Patrick's Day.

The latest news from headquarters is that Caxias is building a church to celebrate the approaching victory, and a theatre to celebrate the function, at least one of our colleagues says.

We have to thank Dn. Pepe Herrera, of Barracas, for his immediate attention to the nuisance we complained of yesterday; at the Pateros de Carthy. He visited the place, took the Comisario down to see what was going on, and at once had a stop put to this worst of nuisances. It seems that the animals were killed merely for their hides, and the carcasses left on the ground. The smell was, of course, something so insupportable, that there was no going down the Calle Sola.

There is every probability now that the Calle Larga in Barracas will soon be lighted with gas, which will be a great improvement. At the last meeting it was determined to at once commence the branch gas-house on the Riachuelo; a committee is named, and now, as soon as the ground is bought, the new branch gas-office will be commenced.

Yesterday, at two o'clock, the President of the Provincial Chambers, Dn. Emilio Castro, attended at the Government-house, took the oath of office, and assumed the office of 'locum tenens,' Governor, during Governor Alsina's absence.

We are happy to inform our readers that one of the gentlemen who accompany the Governor to the camp, has very kindly offered to act as 'special correspondent' for us. We feel quite confident that he will keep his promise, and thus we shall be able to inform our readers of the movements of his Excellency.

Great importance is attached to the mission of Dn. Andres Lamas to Asuncion; and all agree that unless there were prospects of arranging peace, Sr. Lamas would not undertake the mission. Every one who knows the Minister feels confident of this. It is every way probable, therefore, that this distinguished River Plate diplomatist will identify his name indelibly with the history of the times, and attach his name to a treaty which, besides securing the blessings of peace for these countries, will reflect the highest honor and credit on himself.

The Provocador made a splendid passage down in her last trip. She brings news of another and a fierce bombardment of Curupaity. Admiral Iguacis seems determined to at last secure a name for himself; and unless, as Martos' hints, the ammunition falls short, the place must eventually give in; but it is really astonishing how so insignificant a place as Curupaity could so long hold out. If the Brazilians take the place by assault and plant their flag on the topmost mud banks of this extraordinary place, they ought to at once come to terms; for if it has taken twelve months to reduce Curupaity, how long will it take to level Humaita, a place which for the last quarter of a century the Paraguayans have been constantly fortifying?

The total number of Government circulars sent round town respecting the new Provincial loan, is 900. The clerks at the Government-house are pretty hard worked, and as for Leguina, the great 'repartidor,' the delivery of the circulars gives him more trouble than the distribution of the morning papers. Notwithstanding all that is said against the loan and its high rate of interest, the people are subscribing for it. We hear that the Government has no power to alter the rate for emitting the loan, as the Legislature has dictated the terms.

There seems at last some probability of the port being cleansed of that perilous stuff which weighs upon our shipping interests. An Englishman has sent in a proposition to the Port Captain, which has been transmitted to the Government. As yet we have not got at the full details of this proposal, nor do we even know the names of the parties connected with the pro-

posal. Mr. Petty, the pilot, 'some years ago sent in a very liberal offer, and as he now comes up in the packet, he comes at the right moment to renew it.

At a judicial auction sale the other day held in the partido of Pilar, 5000 fine mestiza sheep were put up for sale and no higher bid could be obtained than \$10 each, which as it did not amount to ½ the valuation, was at once declined.

We hear on good authority that the question of extending the Southern Railway tramway will be laid before the Provincial Legislature; it appears that owing to some new law, the Municipality has ceased to have any jurisdiction in this matter.

The merchants of Rosario it seems are attempting to get up a Bolsa in their town; the business of the place will be hardly sufficient for any very expensive exchange hall, still Rosario is doubtless going ahead. A new English house with first rate home connection is about being started up there, and the gentleman who has come out to start the house is looking for a first rate man either as a clerk or with capital giving him an interest in the business. A very sad accident occurred the other day at the Gefé's office, the wall gave way and buried an unfortunate prisoner who was working at the wall in question.

MONTEVIDEO. Wednesday March 13th. The Arno entered port at 7 o'clock last evening, and was at once put in quarantine. The cholera seems to have abated at Rio, although it is said six cases proved fatal on the 4th inst. Don Andres Lamas has arrived by the packet as is supposed on a peace-mission: the feeling for peace is now general in Brazil. I enclose a very interesting letter from our Rio correspondent. I have heard a German merchant say "that some of the mail-bags must have missed this time as he has not got his usual letters."

This morning no fewer than 8 steamers entered port, including the Humboldt from Rio which has been put in quarantine. The pilot-boat Poma with mails from the Falkland Islands has also arrived. Commodore Brownrigg's steamer La Plata leaves this evening for Liverpool: among her passengers is Mr. Beard proprietor of the English School here, who makes a trip for the benefit of his health.

It has been rather unfortunate that the electric telegraph was suspended this morning, owing to some mishap to the wires between San José and Colonia. Mr. Reeves, however, started from San José at sunrise, and the superintendent at Colonia would doubtless send a man to meet him, so that the damage will probably be repaired to-day. Enclosed is a duplicate of the telegram with news from Europe, which was too late for transmission last night, the Tribuna being the only party that had the news early.

The Queen's Speech has been received here with much interest. It is exactly forty years since Ireland has been mentioned with such favor, so that after all the Fenian chimeras seem to have produced some real good, or as they say in Spanish "no hay mal que por bien no venga." The news of salt hides is considered very unfavorable. Brazilian and Argentine securities are flat tending to bathos, the former at 64½, the latter at 77½, whereas both were a couple of years ago at par.

The attendance to-day on 'Change was very thin, and it is generally felt that the want of a first-class lunch-saloon detracts very much from the success of the Bolsa. The only transactions to-day were—9,000 sold novillo hides from Mercedes at 68½ ris. pesada, and the fallow corresponding to above at 1892, all on board.

No tidings of the Paquete de Maule.

EXTRAORDINARY DISCOVERY. GREAT POLICE VICTORY. EIGHT MILLIONS OF FALSE MONEY FOUND.

STARTLING DISCLOSURES. Within the last few days there has been great noise and much fuss made about two false five thousand dollar bills, stopped in one of the shops in town. These bills were taken to the Bank and Bolsa, inspected, and notice published in the newspapers. The next day a lady of one of the first families of Buenos Ayres was marched off to the Police, having one of these 'bogus' bills on her person; she accounted for it and was at once discharged. People began to get nervous, and even the newest five thousand dollar bills were carefully inspected. The police were at once put on the 'qui vive,' and with the most signal success. Messrs. Agrelo, Saavedra, Hernandez, Araua, and Co., who took part in the prosecution of the forgers, deserve well of the public, and the coffers of the Bank should be opened to make them a suitable return. The police acted with the most becoming zeal, arresting every one on whom one of these false notes was found: in this way over thirty bills were recovered before evening. Of six parties taken two, Juan Mass and Felipe Trevino, appear to be heavily implicated in this illegal trade. The suspicion of the police being aroused they pursued

them, and came up with the two gentlemen at 7 p.m., in the new Elysian fields of Palermo.

Having received information of the apprehension of their accomplices, they had skeddaddled with their tools, and were actually burying them in the park at Palermo, when taken into custody. In their possession was found a number of plates, one for the old rose-colored twenty dollar bill, another for making the water-mark. One plate of 100 dollars, with a small engraving of the port of Buenos Ayres; another for making the water-mark. A plate for taking off the blue side of the 5,000 dollar bills, and an accompanying one for affixing the water-mark.

As yet the black plate for the front of the \$5,000 mpc has not been found, but an active search is being made, and great hopes are entertained, as they cannot be far off from where the others were discovered.

The entire set are of copper, and their finish is so perfect as to produce an impression which would defy the most careful scrutiny. All the other imitations appear of the most clumsy description when compared with them. Besides these twenty-two bills of \$500 mpc, one hundred and fifty bills of \$100 mpc, and some \$20 mpc bills were found with the prisoners, also a few forgeries of 1 pat. on the Montevideo Bank, dated 1865. Some ink and paper concluded the booty which rewarded the exertions of the police. The nest and young ones have therefore been secured, but where is the old bird gone? Juan Mass was only an assistant, and was informed on by his wife. From him Felipe Trevino bought the notes at the rate of \$2,000 mpc, for every \$5,000 bill, and so on. Neither these nor others since taken could possibly be the authors of so audacious and clever a scheme.

Where then is the author? His 'carte de visite' is already in the hands of the police; he is a Spaniard by birth, intelligent looking, apparently respectable, and by name Pablo Jalledo. This youth is well known in town; he formerly lived in Calle San Juan, whence he moved into a room in Calle Talcahuano No. 40, over a tinsmiths shop at the corner of Piedad. He was out when the Police entered his apartment, and they waited some time for his return but up to the present he has managed to elude their most active operations. During their day a widow named Agustina Martinez was taken up for trying to pass some of these notes; she declared she had been imposed upon in another shop, and could not tell the good from the bad; she was kept in custody however until further information should turn up.

At night Don Francisco Mell appeared at the Policia, and said, "As I have no desire to compromise myself by harboring a forgerer, I bring you here my tenant, Pablo Jalledo." The delinquent was then brought forward, manacled, but otherwise quite the same as when photographed; he was searched, but nothing found on his person. When asked for his name, to enter in the register, he said they called him Juan Pascual. He was forthwith conducted to the 'carcel,' and shut up in a close dungeon. Jalledo was engraver of the plates, but both he and his handiwork are now in safe keeping. Still there remains much for the detectives to do. We trust this evil will be thoroughly sifted, and overcome once for all.

Up to the present the number of \$5,000 bills taken, amount to 60 odd, representing a value of \$300,000 mpc; but report says that there are notes to the value of \$8,000,000 of this false money in existence.

The best thanks of the entire public are due no less to the indefatigable zeal of the police, than for the noble conduct of Sr. Mell, for thus saving the city from being so shamefully victimized by a gang of unscrupulous swindlers.

NEWS FROM BRAZIL. Rio Janeiro, 4th March, 1867. Senator Octaviano arrived in the transport S. José on the 22nd and was met by a numerous concourse of friends, who chartered the steamer Trariata to take them out to the entrance of the harbour. At 5 p.m. his Excellency visited the former scene of his literary occupations, the office of the Correo Mercantil where the present proprietors and employe's had prepared a modest festivity to welcome his return to Rio. The proprietors and the Editor expressed in short but touching speeches their extreme gratification at seeing the talented diplomat and author once more in his native city. His Excellency returned thanks for the honor and attention paid him and then retired.

The American colonist who shot a Brazilian gentleman when intending to shoot his fellow-passenger Mr. Mills is now in custody.

The fine English Steamer "Braganza" has been purchased by Sr. Luis Antonio da Silva Guimarães to run on the new line of packets between Rio and Santos; The "Braganza" and the "Corcovado" both belonging to the same owner are now the largest and fastest steamers running to and from Santos and have first class accommodations for passengers. Captain Peter Capper well known in the River Plate as the popular commander of

the steam transport Susan Beirne for a long time, and who brought the Braganza out from England, continues in command of this vessel.

The Dutch Brig Columbus, 60 days out from Liverpool to Montevideo was spoken by the Apollo on 8th ult. in Lat: 9° 36' S and Long: 33° 48' W.

At eight o'clock on the morning of Sunday, 24th, the premises 59 Rua Direita were discovered to be on fire. Formerly this building was the bank of the Visconde de Souto, but was lately rented by Mr. William Scully, who occupies the store below, while the upper part was let to Sr. Campos Porto. Fortunately, at the time of the fire there was no property up in the second and third floors, as Sr. Campos Porto was having the premises painted before moving into them. The fire originated in the centre of Mr. Scully's store, and spread towards the back part, communicating with the upper stories by means of a skylight. As no one was in the building at the time of the fire it was necessary to break open the doors of the store, and before a sufficient supply of water could be obtained to subdue the flames the fire had destroyed all the interior of the building, so that only the front is left, and no property was saved. The adjoining premises on either side, occupied respectively by Messrs. Fales & Duncan and the English Bank of Rio Janeiro, were with difficulty saved from taking fire. The building destroyed was insured in a native insurance Company for about £12,000. Messrs. Fales and Duncan are insured in the Royal Insurance Company but their only loss will be that accruing from the hasty removal of their Goods from their Store to a place of safety. Mr. Scully on appearing at the scene of the disaster was arrested by order of the Chief of the Police but after being some hours in custody was examined and then liberated.

Mr. Scully has been singularly unfortunate as regards fire. On the morning of the 7th February, 1866, his store at 31 Rua da Alfandega was found to be on fire, and at that occasion also only the front of the building was left standing and scarcely anything in the way of property was saved. At that time, however, Mr. Scully was insured in the Royal for about £2,000 sterling, and the agents of that Company here paid the amount of the Policy over to him at once without any investigation on the part of the Police as to the cause of the fire. On this occasion unfortunately Mr. Scully was not insured either in any Native or English Company and his loss will therefore be very severe.

On the night of the 27th ult. an attempt was made to rob the Custom-house of Rio and the thief had penetrated to the store adjoining the room where the iron safe is kept. The guards however hearing a noise inside gave the alarm but the thief managed to escape leaving behind him a complete set of burglars tools and a dark lantern.

Dr. Dario Raphael Callado, late chief of Police of Rio, and who returned about a fortnight ago from the River Plate where he had been staying with a view to recovering his health, attempted to commit suicide by throwing himself from one of the ferry boats as he was crossing the bay from Praça Grande to the city. He was fortunately rescued and conveyed to the private Hospital of Fragozo where he still remains under treatment.

D. Andrade Pintos was married on 2nd inst. to D. Carlota Lucinda, do Carvalho Moreira, daughter of the Barao de Penedo, who was for many years representative of Brazil at the Court of St. James.

The bearer of this, the transport S. Jose, takes a further contingent of about 300 men to the Brazilian army in Paraguay.

The Police have prohibited the use of the Fountain perfumes of Messrs. Rimmel, John Goswell and Co. and others during the three days of Carnival; this squirting of perfumed water in the faces of passers-by had become a thorough annoyance, and the veto of the police to this amusement is generally approved.

The Humboldt with our friend Captain G. Markwell arrived here yesterday, and will sail for the Plate on the 5th. I give you separately the latest news from Europe and a list of the passengers for the River Plate.

The management of the American Ferry Boats has for a long time been the object of general complaints and many American gentlemen who held shares in the Company since its commencement have sold out through sheer despair of the future of the enterprise. On the 2nd inst. a serious riot took place in the palace square and in the Station of the Ferry Company caused by the bad management of the concern. For some days one boat had alone been doing all the work, and the public had consequently been very badly served; but on the 2d this boat got aground about five o'clock in the afternoon, and there was on this account no conveyance for the crowds of people who kept arriving at the station, and who lived on the other side of the bay, at length about seven o'clock, p.m., this immense concourse of persons, vexed by the apparent impossibility

of meeting their families, or of having any dinner that day, became excited. Shouts and exclamations far from complimentary to Dr. Raine, the manager of the company, first were heard, then followed a volley of stones at the windows of the station, and at last the crowd commenced smashing and demolishing everything at the ferry station. Some police and authorities appeared, but were unable to tranquilize the excited crowd, but later on a reinforcement of police and National Guards appeared on the scene, and the Chief of Police addressed the people and requested them to be calm, promising to see that they had their rights. Things then took a better course, and the boat which was aground got afloat and arrived at the pier, when the Chief of Police gave orders that this boat should continue to run all night as long as there remained a single passenger to be conveyed across the Bay.

The cholera continues to cause mortality here, but in the city it does not appear to have gained much ground happily; in the Lunatic Asylum and in the Hospitals however it is said to be committing great devastation, though the authorities are doing everything possible to conceal this from the public.

A great excitement was created here the other day by the discovery of frauds which had been committed in the Banco Rural e Hipotecario, and all kinds of exaggerated rumors were afloat. It is now, however, ascertained that the amount lost is Rs. 130,000 (£13,000), which a clerk named Antonio Gomez Ferreira had pilloined, by means of cheques with sundry forged signatures. This employee has been arrested, whilst the secretary—J. J. Franga, the accountant and the treasurer have been dismissed. The unfortunate young man Ferreira is of high family, a son of the Comandante Manoel Gomez Ferreira, a wealthy capitalist of Rio, and appears to have been led to the commission of this crime by some expensive and improper connections with deities of the Alaxar Lyrique.

THE PROVINCIAL LOAN.

FINANCIAL ADJUSTMENT OF THE PAPER DOLLAR. Finance Department, B. Ayres, March 11, 1867. To Don Antonio Terrero, President of the Bolsa.

I have received your favor, in which you have been pleased to communicate to me the reasons which induced your Syndical Chamber to postpone a reply to my note, soliciting their powerful assistance to realize the Loan which the Government proposes to make, for the definite solution of the paper dollar question.

In thanking you for your attention, I take the opportunity to explain more fully the intentions of the Government in this all important matter. Many believe that it is solely meant to support the Exchange-office, as it now stands. This is not so. The Exchange-office has lent, and continues to add, immense benefits to the country, not only by fixing the value of the medium, but also because it has thrown on the market a vast quantity of capital, which was previously retained by speculators to rule the exchange. But the Exchange-office is not the radical solution of this vexed question, for the bill is not really a bank note.

What the Government seeks, then, to arrive at this definite solution; and it is for this that it looks for the support of the whole country, hoping that a prompt response will be made to the call, as it is made in behalf of the legitimate interests of every class of the community, and inseparably involves them in the issue.

Some parties have positively refused to take any part of the Loan on the ground that the terms are unfavorable. When issuing the invitations the Government did not mean to place it in the light of a profitable transaction, but rather as a patriotic appeal; for after all it would be but a secondary consideration, in comparison to the infinite advantages to accrue to the entire country from a convertible currency. The immediate result must be an absence of all fear of the baneful effects of fluctuation, and a consequent development of capital and increase of trade. In fact, it may be asked, Where are these benefits to cease? How many are to be gainers by the patriotism of a few? To the latter question it may be answered; to as many as are engaged in business, as far as the workings of the Exchange-office can be felt.

On the other hand, in the present state of our money market, the Government is of opinion that no sacrifice would be incurred by contributing to this grand object under the conditions of the Loan. It will be quickly amortized, as it is intended to apply for that purpose the profits of the Bank, and the proceeds of the National Bonds founded on the sales of Public Lands.

Begging you will submit these observations to the meeting of merchants, receive the assurance of my most sincere respect and consideration. May God preserve you, MARIANO VARELA.

A GLANCE AT THE FRONTIER.

IMPORTANT ADVICES.

THE LAST INVASION.

We are stopping at Don Francisco Noras' place, which you will find on the Registro-grafico with the name of Bullrich. This house is perfectly safe, being an azotea surrounded by a fosse, and there are plenty of Minnie rifles and other firearms with people to use them.

At Fernando's we stopped three nights and two days, and then started on for D. Henriques', which is on the land in the name of Daniel Burke on the map, and from there we came here, but not being able to find the landmarks we went to Chiribiqui Lolo, which you will find on the map in Ruparap's land; the same afternoon we went to Godoy's house, which is an azotea of two stories surrounded by a fosse. Chiribiqui Lolo is one of the Fortines.

The first night, while at Godoy's, we heard three guns fired from the fortin, which means 'que hay novedad de Indios.' Our first care was to secure as many of the horses as possible inside of the fosse, tie up some others close to it, and put the remainder in the corral. Our tropilla in all consisted of twenty-five horses, which in the corral were perfectly safe, but we thought it prudent to secure them better still by the steps I have already mentioned. We were well prepared, having seven revolvers and some other firearms, and men enough to handle them, with the fortin about three leagues outside of us, precisely in the direction the Indians would take in an invasion. The establishment we were on had no horses or horned cattle to attract the Indians. A chasque from the fortin passed by in the night on the way to Junin; and the 'huellas' passing close to the house. Next day, by another chasque going to the fortin, we learned all about the invasion, and the forces going out passed in groups not far from the house. The invaders were about fifty in number, and they took two Indian women and a man (a Jagnel) away from Godland's place, but the man afterwards escaped to Chiribiqui Lolo, besides some cattle from Amadeo's place. So far as I can learn the whole affair is more noise than anything else, unless the invasion has been at some other part.

At Godoy's we slept two nights, and then started from his south-east 'mojon,' following the line of the Sobrante till we struck the line between the Sobrante and the three leagues following Guerris' south-west line to this house, arriving here last night. To-day we have allowed our horses to rest, and to-morrow or next day we will examine the south-west line of the three leagues. Every time we move we are six men, each with his revolver, so that we consider we run no risk. The invasion is now over.

The land I came out to see is very fine, the greater part being pastos tiernos and puna, which is the coarsest of grass. I must also remark that the pastos tiernos are of various classes, so that a sufficient supply can be depended upon at all seasons. Large 'cañadones' pass through the land, and the high land is of good pasturage. These lands are all full of 'cardon,' but I do not consider it so objectionable as the thistle, as I find that pastos tiernos grow among it. There is some 'romerillo,' but only occasionally a few plants, but I learn that sheep and other cattle do not eat it where there is so great an abundance of pastos tiernos, they will take it, however, after having been driven and when very hungry. I find that P.'s assertion is true that there is a zone of poor land on each side of the Salado. All the high lands here are excellent for agriculture and profitable for growing wheat and corn, but the freight would be heavy.

There are many azotea houses on the frontier which are perfectly safe, but there are many more such as ranchos and huts without even so much as a ditch for protection, and it is astonishing to me the Indians do not make frequent invasions and attack all those unprotected places. I think the Government should oblige every house or rancho to be surrounded by a fosse and have a corral made of sufficient capacity for whatever cattle there is on the place, and at each place there should be plenty of firearms.

One would suppose it would be to the interest of each individual to seek protection by a proper house to live in, and have it surrounded by a fosse, but I assure you there is most criminal neglect, and the Government, for the welfare of all, should oblige even the poorest to be protected. A drawback for a fosse I look upon as a requisite.

Sheep out here are dearer than inside—80 is asked per head. I learn from people living outside of the zone of coarse land about the Salado that there is no necessity for the sheep to be acclimated.

The plot is so familiar to most of our readers, that it is unnecessary to enter into its details here. Mme. Briol, as the Druid priestess, was all that her most ardent admirers could wish, particularly in the scene where she upbraids Pollio (Lelmi) with his faithlessness, and implores him, with truthful and terrible agony, to repair the wrong he had done. Her Norma was grand, both in singing and acting, and will bear comparison with many of our European celebrities. Milie. Sereno, as Adalgisa, sang her part very creditably. This lady has a voice of much compass, rather thin in the upper register, but still in good tune, and we have no doubt she will be a valuable acquisition to the company. Lemni was a very good Pollio; the music was flowing, and suited his voice admirably, his acting was also good, and devoid of stiffness, which he is getting out of gradually. The Orcevo of Signor Nerini was splendid, both in acting and singing; his conception of the character was truthful, and in some of the scenes with Norma his voice rang through the house with thrilling effect.

At the end of the 3rd act the principal artists were recalled forward, and received a splendid ovation. The chorus was good, and showed careful training. We congratulate the manager, and hope this opera will be repeated, as it is the best that has been put on the boards for many seasons.
