LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.
 (BY ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH).
 Montevideo, April 16, 1867.
 Easter Monday—railway inaugu-
 ration.

Decree—military pensions doubled.
 No sickness—weather fine—Bolsa
 full.

IMPORTANT FROM BRAZIL.
 RECURRING DIFFICULTIES.
 (OUR SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT).

It is now currently reported and
 I believe with truth, that His High-
 ness the Conde d'Eu is most anxious
 to proceed to the seat of war and
 combat at the head of Brazilian
 troops against the enemies of his
 adopted country. His Highness, it is
 said, is perfectly willing to serve un-
 der the Generalissimo Marques de Ca-
 xias but his wishes meet with op-
 position in the Council of State for
 reasons which are not explained. No
 doubt the fact of the Conde d'Eu
 giving the example of devotion to the
 cause of the Empire would go a long
 way to re-ignite the fire of patriotism
 which would appear of late to have
 begun to dwindle, and that many vo-
 lunteers would again spring up to ac-
 company him to the field of battle and
 thus raise the Army to a figure which
 would enable the Commander in Chief
 to make an attack on the Paraguayan
 lines. The sooner this can be done
 the better as after a decisive action
 there is a probability that a peace
 negotiation would be well received by
 all parties as necessary to their
 welfare.

Paraguay must now be in a lamen-
 table state of destitution, and although
 no one can deny that the resistance to
 the Allies has been heroic and brave,
 still it is impossible that it can hold
 out much longer, and humanity de-
 mands that in this case as soon as
 possible this war of misery and
 devastation should cease.

Brazil, has shown her power and
 her resources, has placed a large and
 well armed force in the field, and has
 presented a formidable Squadron in
 the River Plate, but the sacrifice of
 life and of money has been immense
 and utterly out of all proportion to the
 interests at stake or the advantages
 to be gained. The total deficit of
 Brazil is now close on twenty millions
 sterling, an amount which even for
 a European power of importance is
 enormous, and now that S. Paulo Rail-
 way has been accepted by the Govern-
 ment no less than one third of the
 total revenue of the Empire will be
 required to meet the obligations
 already contracted in Europe; con-
 sidering this and the injurious effect
 of the war on the commerce of the
 country it becomes evident that the
 sooner the war can with honour be
 brought to a close, the better it will
 be for Brazil and for all.

The Mining operations in this Em-
 pire have in some parts been attended
 with eminent success. The D. Pedro
 North del Rey Gold Mining Company,
 Limited, will at the approaching Gen-
 eral meeting declare a dividend of 24
 shillings per share which is equal to
 about 14 p. 3/4 for the past year.

The Duke of Montrose, English
 Postmaster General has stated that
 negotiations are pending by which
 Plymouth or Falmouth will be consti-
 tuted the port of sailing and arrival
 for the Royal Mail Steam Packets
 between England and Brazil.

As an example of the present reign
 of terror in Rio and the utter dis-
 respect of all the laws and guaranteed
 liberties of the Brazilian citizens I will
 just cite the following case. His Ma-
 jesty the Emperor suddenly made his
 appearance a few days ago at the bar-
 racks at the Rua dos Barbores. A
 national guard of the 5th Battalion
 took this opportunity of complaining
 to the Emperor that he was there on
 duty already more than two months
 and his wife and children unprovided
 for. The Emperor heard the poor
 fellow attentively and promised to
 look into the matter. Scarcely had
 His Majesty turned his back when a
 Captain in the Police force arrested
 the National Guard, who rushed at
 once out of the door to catch the Em-
 peror and demand justice. But other
 soldiers of the police force ran after
 him surrounded him, knocked him
 down with their swords and dragged
 him off to prison. Next day this poor
 fellow, whose only crime was his ask-
 ing for justice from the Emperor, was
 taken under a strong guard to the
 Fort of Lage.

The "Arino" which left, Montevi-
 deo on the 20th ult. arrived here only
 on the 30th in consequence of the
 breaking of the shaft on the morning
 of the 21st.

The remainder of the voyage had to
 be made with only one wheel.

The lieutenant-captain of the Bra-
 zilian Navy A. L. Hoonholtz has been
 appointed commander of the new
 steam corvette Vitalde Oliveira and
 the first lieutenant J. L. Costa has
 been named to the command of the
 Araguayo.

The Seno arrived on 2nd inst. and
 I hand you separately a resume of the
 advices brought by her from Europe
 and the U. States.

Mr. G. S. Lennon-Hunt, our respect-
 ed consul in Rio, arrived in the Seine
 yesterday; in addition to his functions
 of Consul and Agent for the Royal
 Mail Steam Packet Company this gen-
 tleman will in future perform also the
 duties of Chief of the British Post
 Office Department here, which for the
 last 22 years had been under the charge
 of Mr. Reeves, whose abilities and
 constant zeal rendered him very po-
 pular amongst his countrymen and
 also among the Brazilians.

Mr. Sohn Morgan junr., the enter-
 prising originator of the Paraguassu
 Tranway Company, arrived here from
 Bahia in the Ptslem yesterday; the
 object of his visit is to obtain the san-
 ction by the Imperial Government of
 the plans of the Cachoeira bridge, the
 first undertaking of this Company.

The American gunboat Iroquois
 was at Ceará on 26th ult. "en route"
 for China.

EDITOR'S TABLE.
 The complaints against the Munici-
 pality, respecting the "vasura" nuisance,
 are so numerous and continued, that
 we hope to see some steps taken with-
 out further delay; probably the most
 effective measure would be to take a
 criminal action against the President
 of the Municipal Board. Some person
 must be held responsible for such
 scandalous neglect. We publish a
 letter to-day from a resident of the Ri-
 o: on our table lie piles of letters of
 a similar nature. We now demand of
 the Provincial Government to move in
 the matter. Every other topic sinks
 into insignificance when compared
 with this one vital question of Munici-
 pal cleanliness. The dirt boxes
 ranged before the doors of the houses
 in Calles Parque and Esmeralda, at
 eleven o'clock in the day, admit of no
 excuse; and if there is any law or
 justice in Buenos Ayres, the Presi-
 dent of the City Council should be
 made responsible for it. Letters have
 been written to the Municipality; par-
 ties have personally waited on the
 Board; communications by the score
 have been published in the papers, and
 yet all to no purpose; the nuisance
 still exists and is tolerated. "Can such
 things be?"

The Corrientes steamer Cisne arrived
 yesterday, bringing three days later
 advices from head-quarters. All the
 news of any importance that we could
 gather is that Caxias is preparing for
 a fight.

The latest advices from the Pro-
 vinces are of a satisfactory character.
 General Paunero has marched trium-
 phantly into San Luis city, and pub-
 lished a proclamation, which we give
 in another column. The rebels seem
 to be completely broken. Colonel Ar-
 redondo has written a very interesting
 letter to President Mitre, giving a
 full account of the march into San
 Luis, and the further capture of some
 guns left by the rebels on the high
 road. The rebels will march from
 S. Luis to the Desaguadero, where it
 is believed the rebels are still prowling
 about.

Dr. Scrivener, at Las Conchas, is,
 we hear, most incessant in his atten-
 tions on the poorer class, who, it
 seems, are suffering very severely from
 the prevailing epidemic. Some parties,
 who have witnessed all that Dr. Scriv-
 ener has done, and is doing, in his
 noble philanthropic cause, have called
 our attention to the matter.

The railways have determined not
 to change their time-tables during
 Holy Week. The trains will run on
 all the lines as usual.

Colonel Mateo Martinez has pre-

sented a very splendid pair of epau-
 lettes to Colonel Lucio Mansilla, in ap-
 preciation of his heroic conduct during
 the Paraguayan war.

The Archbishop has ordered a "no-
 vena" in the Cathedral, to commence
 on Saturday, to pray to the Almighty
 for preservation against the cholera.
 We publish the decree in another
 column.

From Entré Rios the only note of
 any importance is an order from the
 National Minister of Finance to the
 Captains of the Ports and Custom-
 house authorities in Entré Rios, pro-
 hibiting the importation of arms. This
 decree is very significant, and has
 been dictated, owing probably to the
 constant rumors relative to the pur-
 chase of arms in Montevideo for the
 Entré Riano Government.

Mr. Cranwell, the renowned drug-
 gist and apothecary, in Calle Riva-
 davia, has presented us with an anti-
 cholera mixture, known as the original
 "chlorodyne," invented by Richard
 Freeman, pharmacist. It is recom-
 mended as the very best antidote.

Our readers will hardly credit the
 fact that on the river beach, from the
 Yellow-house to the Paseo Colon, along
 the Boca Railway, the shore is covered
 with dead fish. A subscriber called
 our office to know if it was anybody's
 duty to burn, remove, or cover them
 with quick lime? There they remain,
 and as the ground is Municipal terri-
 tory, the place is in the most neglected
 filthy state.

The iron-clad Brazil, which suffered
 so terribly before Curupaity, has been
 repaired in Rio, and come again to
 the River Plate. She proceeds at once
 to Paraguay.

Yesterday, as the glass fell, and the
 weather was cloudy, there were great
 hopes entertained of a "pampero"
 storm. Old residents say, give us
 one day's heavy rain, followed by a
 still "pampero," and then we shall
 hear no more about the cholera.

The National Government has or-
 dered the sum of two thousand pata-
 cons to be paid to the Municipality to
 be distributed amongst the poor suffer-
 ing classes to buy blankets, &c. This
 act of the Minister merits especial
 praise.

It is currently rumored that the Ar-
 gentine recruiting agent in Europe
 has contracted for two thousand Ita-
 lian soldiers for the Argentine army at
 Paraguay. The recruits are expected
 shortly. A division of two thousand
 trained Italian soldiers would be worth
 to the Allies all the contingents and
 recruits sent to the army since the war
 commenced.

On board the "Ponton" some cases
 of sickness have occurred, and yester-
 day it was said that the Govern-
 ment had ordered all the soldiers on
 board that vessel to be sent ashore.

Our advices yesterday from Rosario
 are not by any means satisfactory. The
 hospital returns show increased mor-
 tality. Dr. Hutchinson, Mr. Per-
 kins, and Mr. Bollaert, are at work
 night and day, trying to alleviate the
 sorrows and afflictions of the suffering
 poor. Dr. Hutchinson's letter in yester-
 day's Standard caused great atten-
 tion, being regarded as the best letter
 on the epidemic yet published.

Mr. D. P. Carmody has opened an
 office in Calle Corrientes, No. 145. As
 a contractor and practical builder, we
 feel much pleasure in recommending
 him. He superintended the construc-
 tion of the stations and bridges on
 the Southern Railway, built the public
 edifices in Arrecifes, and has now de-
 termined to make a start in town.
 People who require their "azoteas"
 overhauled and repaired, had better
 see Mr. Carmody, as he guarantees
 his work for a certain time. Mr. Geo-
 ghegan's new estancia-house at Lobos
 is a lasting monument of Mr. Car-
 mody's talent and ability as a builder.

On next Tuesday Mr. Billinghurst
 will sell by auction at his Barraca de
 Feria, 2,250 ar. fine mestiza wool, from
 the estancia of José María Suarez, in
 the Rincon de Ajo. Also some small
 lots from other estancias.

The Esperanza, from Corrientes, re-
 ceived yesterday, states that Presi-
 dent Mitre is expected up there short-
 ly to take command. A special sani-
 tary committee has been formed,
 headed by Sr. Martinez, to attend to
 the sick and keep the town clean.
 Another proclamation, calling on the
 Paraguayans to listen to the voice of
 their exiled countrymen, has been
 published and scattered amongst the
 Paraguayan vanguard. The state of
 things in Corrientes is, as we pre-
 viously stated, great sickness and much
 alarm. From the army nothing.

The Provincial Government has be-
 haved most handsomely respecting the
 late Dr. Furst, having granted a pen-
 sion of three thousand dollars cur-
 rency per month to his children for ten
 years, and the younger children of
 the deceased, to be educated at the
 expense of the Government. Such
 highly generous conduct, on the part
 of the Government, merits unanimous
 approbation. The Provincial and Na-
 tional Government attended his fun-
 eral, and Minister Avellaneda made
 a most eloquent harangue over the
 grave.

Yesterday afternoon the remains of
 the late Dn. Juan Cruz O'Campo were
 conveyed to their final home. De-
 ceased was well-known in B. Ayres,
 where for years he played a most con-
 spicuous part in politics. He was

native of Catamarea, educated for the
 legal profession, and one of the best
 native Latin scholars in town.

We understand that a small steam-
 er is about to be chartered to run up
 to Gualeguay. Parties who wish to
 visit that part of Entré Rios should
 look up Mr. Dowse.

Private letters received from Rosa-
 rio give rather an unpleasant picture
 of affairs up there; the hospital is full
 and the Doctors overworked.

There is a general stamped taking
 place to all the small towns within
 easy reach of B. Ayres. The Lomas
 de Zamorra seems to be preferred, but
 the limited number of houses renders
 it quite impossible that every one can
 avail of its healthy and bracing atmos-
 phere, yet in the vicinity of the Station
 we know of some excellent building
 lots for sale, and shall be glad to
 favor our subscribers with all infor-
 mation on this subject.

There has been nothing definite
 done about the Southern Cemetery,
 a split in the Municipality we suppose
 is the hitch. We hope Governor Al-
 sina will himself interfere in this
 matter, as it appears we can expect
 nothing from the Municipality.

We hear of an Athletic Society on
 the "tapis" got up by the young
 foreigners for a day's Athletic Sport.
 The programme of races, leaps, &c.
 with advertisement for entries will
 appear in a few days.

THE CRISIS IN BRAZIL.
DISAFFECTION OF THE NATIONAL GUARDS.
 (From the Jornal do Comercio)

We are going from bad to worse,
 from one abyss into another. The
 folly of the Government is aggravated
 by its utter inefficiency. To order an
 impossibility is the act of imbeciles,
 to decree an injustice is decidedly wicked:
 but to admit the impossibility and
 injustice of a decree, and yet persist
 in it, argues the most lamentable de-
 pravity. Unfortunately it is not only
 the Ministers who are demoralized,
 but the very principal of authority is
 undermined.

We are in a dreadful crisis; all the
 bad elements of society are actively
 at work, and honest men hide their
 heads. The Government inspires no
 confidence in our citizens, nor dis-
 plays energy to quell public disturbers.
 Without prestige, without conviction,
 without patriotism, the Ministry
 is swayed by caprice, and refuses to
 resign its empty honors.

They began the war without an army
 they confided the campaign to foreign
 generals whose interests were highly
 suspicious, they plunge the Empire in
 debt, they sent the bone and sinew
 of the country to Paraguay, and now
 when reduced to the last extremity,
 they have the temerity to outrage the
 National Guards of Rio Janeiro whose
 lives have been already so freely sacri-
 ficed in a campaign to enrich army-
 contractors. Those vampires have
 made splendid fortunes in the new
 El Dorado, but the country will be a
 prey to bankruptcy, taxation and
 tyranny, to meet such enormous out-
 lay, while deprived of the elements of
 labor.

Whether do they drag us? What
 end is there in view, but the ill-fated
 River Plate, and inglorious campaign?
 More than twelve months ago the
 Government declared in the Cham-
 bers that the war was over. They
 lied, and still they levied fresh contin-
 gents from our city N. Guard. Every-
 thing was kept a secret from the peo-
 ple, and the papers were merely an
 echo of the Ministry, but this sad re-
 ality has gradually burst on us, and
 we find the nation sacrificed to the
 mad ambition of inept ministers.

The War in the River Plate was the
 grand dream of the hair-brained Mar-
 quis of Olinda, supported by go ahead
 youngsters who laughed at the grey
 hairs and slowness of the oldest ser-
 vants of the Empire. Now that they
 are ruined they clamor about patriot-
 ism, and seek to carry out their errors
 or their crimes by requiring another
 contingent of a thousand National
 Guards. The commanders find it im-
 possible to raise such a force; only
 eighteen-men present themselves in
 answer to the muster-roll.

There is no alternative, the Ministry
 must retire; or else we shall all de-
 scend to bathos. God grant the Gov-
 ernment may not further try the pa-
 tience of the people; look at the starv-
 ing invalid, the wretched widow, the
 houseless orphan, the abandoned
 family.

Peace at any cost?
 The National Guard has rendered
 many great services to the Empire,
 and more than once saved us from
 anarchy without pay or reward. This
 is not the time to call for cruel and im-
 practicable sacrifice on their part; if
 disaffections seize their ranks we shall
 lose the only force remaining to guar-
 antee us from danger.

The sea is troubled and boisterous,
 and strange objects are rising to the
 surface on every side; strange people
 are beginning to figure among us.
 Not a moment is to be lost: the Minis-
 try must resign, and the National
 Guard will resume their post of honor.
 Any disturbance in Rio Janeiro and
 the Provinces would be at present a
 terrible event.

OUR SANITARY CONDITION.
 [COMMUNICATED].
 It is an evident dictate of common
 sense that of all the "good things" that
 go to make up the fair side of our allot-
 ment on this ball, no item is at all
 comparable in importance to that of
 physical health. Of what avails it
 that the accumulated wisdom of our
 legislators give us beneficial laws and
 free institutions if they cannot take
 up, resolve, and execute the primary
 problem—"What are the conditions
 essential to the public health?" Of
 late, through the advent of an epi-
 demic that threatens to thin off our
 population, they are all astir, and the
 question obtrudes itself for adjust-
 ment. It has appeared to us as some-
 what strange that the foreign element
 of our community has shown such a
 lethargic state of feeling on this sub-
 ject; the foreign element, we say,
 because they represent and have come
 from countries where such conditions
 have had a preferential attention shown
 to them. Our Municipal Board have
 evinced by their selection of many
 foreigners to act on the domiciliary
 committees that they look to foreign-
 ers to aid them in the present journey
 of purifying the private dwellings of
 the population. And this state of
 apathy is demonstrated by the absence
 in the columns of the Standard and
 other foreign organs of suitable articles
 by our more prominent and intelligent
 foreigners calling for energetic meas-
 ures to be adopted, and suggesting as
 to the execution of these measures.

But we all prefer to elbow the duty
 over to Mr. So-and-So, and Mr. So-and-
 So says he is too busy with the packet,
 or some other such imbecile excuse.
 Not so, however, the philanthropic
 Editors of the Standard, for their elo-
 quent pens are never weary of well-
 doing; but, without controversy, it
 would be refreshing to see our mer-
 chant princes turn the current of their
 thoughts from the last sale of "bram-
 antes" to the more urgent, yet, withal,
 philanthropic one of "What can be
 done to stay the epidemic?" In our
 opinion several things might be sug-
 gested to the authorities of the coun-
 try. The removal of the saladeros is
 already mooted, but it is thought that
 the personal and business interests
 involved so far topple the mollification
 offered by the authorities in the
 matter that the pestilential breath of
 the saladero is likely still to inflate
 our lungs, instilling a deadly poison
 into our systems. This, we consider,
 to be the great screw that is loose in
 our sanitary condition, and of much
 more paramount importance than that
 of shutting up the Recoleta. This
 letter we regard as an important propo-
 sition, and, if so, then by parity of
 reason and in all fairness and candor,
 shut up also the British Cemetery.

As to the water supply and drainage
 of the city, these projects are so re-
 mote of completion for our present
 juncture that it is idle here to talk
 about them. It is most devoutly to
 be wished that some one of your con-
 tributors or readers would furnish us
 for our information an article on the
 probable quantity manufactured and
 consumed of what may be called
 chemical wines, liquors, beverages,
 &c. (we mean such wines, &c., got up
 in Buenos Ayres by chemical ingre-
 dients); we imagine the quantity is
 prodigious. It is needless to say that
 a man may as well at once commit
 suicide as deliberately swallow down
 such compounds. We are creditably
 informed that nine-tenths of the so-
 called raspberry vinegar (grocella)
 consumed at the various confection-
 aries and cafés about town is concocted
 of elements purchased at the drug-
 gists. As far as we know the Munici-
 pality are either winking at this vile
 and murderous trade, or else are pro-
 foundly ignorant or unaware of its
 existence.

The inspecting committees as to the
 cleanliness, &c., of the city dwellings,
 have done much through their reports
 to inform the Municipality of the con-
 dition of the town, suggesting in many
 cases what they considered might be
 done to improve or eradicate certain
 evils that were infecting such habita-
 tions; yet it now remains to be seen
 how far their suggestions will be en-
 forced. Householders complain, and
 in many cases we believe with reason,
 of the laxity shown in the administra-
 tion of the duties of the "vasureros" or
 dustman. It is quite obvious that at
 an early hour the refuse of our cooking
 departments should be carted away
 from our dwellings to as respectable
 a distance as possible, and not in the
 vicinity of our suburban retreats,
 where there odours and exhalations
 are neither invigorating or healthful.

So much for some of the evils that
 afflict our social comfort and sap our
 vital energies. We commend the sub-
 ject to other brains and other pens,
 and then, when thoroughly sifted, to
 the attention of our city fathers.
 Before we close we will say, to whom-
 soever it belongeth, to be said—"Why
 did you discontinue the nocturnal
 music in the Plaza Victoria at a period
 when above all others it was most to
 be desired for the public good?" As
 it is not only true that

"Music hath power to calm the savage breast,"
 but also to alleviate and dispel the
 brooding cares and anxious thoughts
 that at times, especially like the
 present, oppress the public mind. We
 suggest not only the Plaza Victoria as

a suitable place for a military band to
 play stirring airs and marches every
 evening for a couple of hours; but also
 in different parts of the city.

THE WAR IN THE ANDES.
PAUNERO'S PROCLAMATION.
 The National Commissioner and Com-
 mander-in-chief of the army Interior,
 to the Province of San Luis.

Fellow Citizens—The National banner
 again waves over your capital,
 whilst the bloody flag of treason and
 anarchy lies trampled in the mud.
 Fellow Citizens—You are now freed
 from the insults, oppression and out-
 rages of the rebels, to which you have
 been so long the victims. The Na-
 tional arms have saved you, the same
 victorious arms which have wrenched
 from the bloody grasp the entire
 Province of Cuyo.

Fellow Citizens—I am persuaded
 that the majority of the young men
 of San Luis have been induced by fear
 to join the traitors, never could I
 otherwise account for their alliance
 with the Indians to pillage rob
 and murder their own relatives. To
 these misguided youths I therefore
 offer the hand of friendship and good
 faith, earnestly inviting them for their
 own and friends' sake to return. I
 come here not to chastize but to pro-
 tect, and whilst fixed in my resolution
 to make no treaty with the ringleaders,
 I have a welcome for all who return.

Fellow Citizens—Fear not, your
 your lives and property are safe in the
 hands of your country's defenders.
 We only ask in return that moral as-
 sistance, which is the best safe-guard
 of a free people. You who have
 brothers, wives, husbands or children
 the State claims your co-operation for
 the re-establishment of order.

Mr. Washburn, the United States'

 truce, and to proceed by road to
 Asuncion (about 72 leagues off), in
 consequence of the dangerous impe-
 diment placed by the Paraguayans
 to the further navigation of the river.
 The "Shamokin," on her way down
 at night, ran into and sunk the steamer
 "General Flores," laden with
 important stores for the Brazilian
 army, which have been wholly lost.

The Marquis de Caxias, the newly
 appointed Brazilian Commander-in-
 chief, had, at the last accounts, re-
 reached Corrientes within a few leagues
 of head-quarters; but the late heavy
 rains had rendered the allied camps
 a complete swamp, and a great
 increase of sickness must be the
 result.

The efforts made by the retrograde
 party, who appear to sympathize with
 President Lopez, in this and the
 neighbouring Republics, have increas-
 ed with his danger; their endeavours
 to create jealousies between the
 Argentine and Brazilian leaders have
 not been wholly unsuccessful, and
 among the people of these various
 States the war has certainly been of
 late rendered very unpopular.

Senhor Octaviano, the Brazilian
 Envoy, on a special mission con-
 nected with the war, has recently visited
 General Urquiza in the State of Entré
 Rios, which has given rise to many
 suppositions; but it is probable that
 his sole object was to insure supplies,
 a remount, and possibly some further
 recruits for the allied forces.
