Next day, Tuesday, the deaths were limited to 200, and, strange to say, whilst this awful mortality was going on at Curuzú, at the encampment of Tuyuti—in the very swamps—and where the bulk of the allied troops is quartered, not a single case has occurred.

SHEEP-BREEDING.

Gentlemen, I now take the liberty of replying, by the following lines, to Mr. Latham's article on "Sheepfarming and Breeding," which appeared in No. 1,334 of the Standard.

In the first place I must state that I was greatly astonished that Mr. Latham should read me a lecture for doubting his assertion respecting 'galpones,' &c. I should never have ventured to express myself thus openly on this point, if Mr. Latham had not made use of some severe remarks about myself, by raising against me in his first article the accusation that my article was calculated to mislead, and not bringing any proofs before the public to justify this assertion.

I have already had occasion to regret the tone of Mr. Latham's former article, and I must do so once more today, as Mr. Latham renews the same charge in his last article, unsupported again by any proofs. I wish, therefore, to explain to Mr. Latham, that in this plainly expressing my opinion, I was only echoing his own words on the principle of the equality of the parties to the discussion. But if Mr. Latham is inclined to think that I enter the lists especially against the animals he has in his charge, I am sorry to say that the importance I attach to his single establishment would not have been sufficient to have induced me to enter into a long newspaper controversy on account of it, and I have only done so, and continue doing, in order that the public may be able to judge which is the best and most profitable system of sheepbreeding in this country. It is not personalities I seek, principles are what I wish to contend with, but I would turn against any one who provokes me.

I observed to Mr. Latham that I was happy at his recognising the merits of the breeds of Messrs. Martinez, Stegman, &c. These gentlemen have imported only for themselves animals that were taken from the very same flocks from which I import likewise, and they have been more or less purchasers of my imported animals.

Referring to the long pedigrees, which have no value for Mr. Latham, I can only say that he is welcome to have and to keep his own opinion on the subject. In England as well as in Germany genealogical tables are kept, which are much more profuse than pedigrees, so that it is always possible, in conjunction with the pairing lists, to follow up the descent, as well as to observe, by the results of the breeding, whether the pairing has been done correctly. Where no attention is paid to this in a sheepbreeding establishment, no guarantee can be given for the good issue of the animals which it sets up for sale; and I must remark to Mr. Latham, that not only those gentlemen he particularly mentions, but also a great many others, who work their establishments in a rational way, are very careful in following these rules, and have for that reason had notable results.

If Mr. Latham is not of my opinion about the superior quality of breeding of a ram, derived immediately from a pure-blooded flock, and which is not of such a very fine outward appearance, as a mestiza ram selected for breeding, and which is of a more promising outward appearance, I am most decidedly obliged to maintain the views I formerly expressed on this subject, derived from my own experience, and will only add that the well-formed (so-called) strong mestiza ram, with a short pedigree, as Mr. Latham calls it, does not possess the quality of general usefulness which Mr. Latham is so desirous of attributing to it. I should like Mr. Latham to answer me the question, why such careful genealogical registers of fine horses, cattle, and sheep are kept in England and Germany?

All the rest of Mr. Latham's assertions are mere repetitions of his article in No. 1311 of the Standard, to which I have sufficiently replied in my article in No. 1325 of the same, and therefore refer to that article in order neither to tire the patience of the public or on the other hand unnecessarily to abuse the kindness of the gentlemen who edit this paper, and who have so obligingly opened their columns to this discussion.
