THE BRAZILIAN MAILS. IMPORTANT INTELLIGENCE. NEGRO EMANCIPATION.

Rio de Janeiro, 12th April 1867. The Seine left this port on 9th inst. with 162 passengers of which number 80 were for Lisbon and 58 for Southampton.

The emancipation of the slaves in Brazil may now be considered as a settled matter the only question remaining to be decided is the mode of carrying out the idea. The subject has been laid before the Council of State and met with unanimous approbation the only point of dissent being the occasion for executing this intent.

1st. Slavery to cease totally in the year 1900 that is 33 year hence. 2nd. The State to indemnify the owners of all slaves still existing at that period.

The Barao de Bambuly, colonel of the first battalion of the City National Guard, offers to every one of the guards of his battalion who have concealed themselves 200 \$ as an incentive to induce them to present themselves and form part of the contingent which has to proceed to the seat of war.

In the provinces of Pernambuco and Alagoas the arbitrary conduct of the authorities and the abuses practised by them have at length so exasperated the populace that a revolution has broken out and while in order to quiet the minds of the rebellious in the province of Pernambuco the President was compelled to suspend the recruiting, the blood-stained and torn garments of victims brutally murdered by the soldiery under the orders of the President of Alagoas, are exposed to public view in Rio by Dr. Mello Moraes a distinguished member of society and native of that province.

The Government has ordered the steam corvette "Niterohy" to proceed at once to Pernambuco with stores ammunition &c.

An American song, entitled "The yellow rose of Texas," has been published here by the composer Mr. E. F. Alexander, a popular professor of the English Language, and has been brought out by our leading music-sellers Messrs. Bevilacqua Co. An American named Joseph Albert has caused no little commotion in our City by his smart practices.

THE PARIS EXHIBITION. LETTER FROM M. PALLIERE. 31 Rue Veron, Paris, Feb. 22, 1867.

I enclose you some drawings and an article from the Paris Magazine which will give you a better idea of the Exhibition than anything else I have seen or read on the subject. You can exhibit the drawings in your museum.

The Festival of Easter occurring at the regular period, it happily offered an opportunity for our German friends to give us a Sacred Concert, which, in the absence of that generally given by the operatic company at Colon, came in admirably and suitably under the present circumstances of our Society here. The gathering on the occasion, as might have been expected, was not as numerous as usual, and our best thanks are due to the committee and active members for having, in the presence of such a discouraging condition of our city, given us such an evening's enjoyment.

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As I before mentioned the public is admitted for a franc to the palace and park. I have been there already three times, and shall pay frequent visits to the place before the exhibition opens: it is really a pleasure to watch the progress of the works.

At present they are putting up the sectional partitions, of the various countries, setting up stalls, painting, hammering, gluing, filing, making window-frames, rolling in cases, and arranging machinery. There are tramways on all sides, inside and around, steam-winchies, &c. You see workmen everywhere, even on top of the lighthouse, which is 150 feet high, on the roof of the Egyptian temple; painters, sculptors, joiners, swarming on all parts of the Exhibition, building like so many ants.

Every hole and corner has its group of workmen, some toiling in wood, others in stone. In the park may be seen buildings of every shape and kind known under Heaven. Steam-engines, trucks, and waggons move in all directions, carrying trees, marbles, bricks, sand, shrubs, boxes, &c. Everything goes straight to its destination. On one side they are paving, on another planting, elsewhere macadamizing and running huge rollers over the walks. Of course there is a number of restaurants and cafes, and the scene reminds one of a public fete.

The arrangements are most admirable; each country arrives at once at its own place without encroaching on any other. I saw waggons just arrived from Saxony, their own railway trucks towed up by our engines to within three feet of the palace, then wheeled round on a turning-table and pushed into their own section. There is no shouting or noise; the whole is done like a manoeuvre of troops on parade. All the porters for receiving goods-waggons wear the same uniform.

MR. FORD'S REPORT. BENEFITS DERIVED FROM SHEEPFARMING.

The following Table will show how a net profit of 53 per cent. could be realized at the end of eight years by the investment of capital of £15,600, in land and sheep, and in addition an annual interest at the rate of 9 per cent. be made on the money during the intermediate years.

The amount of land purchased is calculated at 45 square miles, or 32,000 acres, being 5 square leagues of this country.

In order to illustrate the ratio at which sheep increase in this country the following calculation is given, taken during a period of eight years, and based on the actual exports of wool and sheep skins, than which no fairer estimate can be adduced of what was the actual live stock during that time. In the season 1852-53 it was estimated at 4,597,136 sheep, which number had risen in 1860-61 to 13,604,416.

During those years the total export of sheepskins amounted to 10,888,800. It is thus shown that the actual increase of sheep was 5 and one-third its original number, or if the amount of actual live stock alone be calculated then the rate would be three-fold. A stock of 20,000 sheep may be estimated to have increased to 60,000, more or less, in 8 years; and the animals killed, or which had died, at 46,000, each of their skins producing on an average, all the year round, the sum of 1s a piece. The average clip of wool is 3 pounds to the sheep.

EDITOR'S TABLE. The state of the City health yesterday was without any material change; in the Western suburbs there is much sickness, but it is hoped that the Pampero which still continues will rid the city of the epidemic.

A committee has called on us to wait on the Government, respecting the adoption of some measure for sending of lime up to the army. We fully concur with the gentlemen in question, the mortality at Curuzu seems to be wilfully screened from the public of Buenos Ayres, and probably one of the best and safest plans to reduce the epidemic would be to send up a half-a-dozen of steamers with lime from the Parana, the cost would be a mere trifle, we decline however to join the committee. It is high time that the attention of the National Government should be called to this most important question and as experienced medical men are of the opinion that the epidemic springs from no other source than the battle fields of Paraguay, it is obvious that the project of the committee, to send up lime is the very best under the circumstances.

The packet to-day takes home a crowd of passengers, even some of our camp friends leave for a six months tour, we wish them all a pleasant voyage and hope to see them returning with the swallows. The American Steamer Edward Everett will not leave Montevideo before to-night, and we believe her departure then depends on her having a sufficient number of passengers. Our colleague, the Nation, experienced an accident yesterday, something wrong with the press. It is a strange coincidence that the accident should have occurred on the very day that our colleague contradicted our statement about the Curuzu mortality. We were right in what we stated, as the subsequent mails have proved. Our colleague erred and had a press accident.

Yesterday Sr. Rey, the Port-Captain of Barracas, died, after a sickness of about twenty-four hours. He was well and favorably known to our exporters and shippers. To-day a very important wool auction comes off at Mr. Billinghurst's barraca Feria. We advise buyers to be punctual, as Don Mariano will knock down the wool at the appointed hour.

Mr. Cranwell, of Calle Rivadavia, has on sale the best disinfectant in the world, and renowned for its qualities. We believe it comes to us from Egypt. It has a pitchy smell; but the English and French physicians strongly recommend it. It is known as Calvert's Disinfectant. Parties who wish to have their premises healthy ought to call on Cranwell in Calle Rivadavia and ask him about it.

As yet we have received no report of the British Hospital meeting; but we have received a letter from an English gentleman offering to subscribe handsomely for the building fund. On Saturday the Provincial Bonds will be amortised. These Bonds are mainly held by the Bank, and a few wealthy native citizens. The Juez de Paz testifies that Merlo is exempt from the pest, not a single case of cholera having occurred in that town or district.

The Directors of the Argentine Bank have named their offices and clerks, we understand that Sr. Belandier of the Government house has been appointed paying teller. The English Barque "Eugenia" in ballast from Buenos Ayres to St. Johns, 15 days out, put into Babla for water. The Maritimo says the new French packet Annis is expected here to replace the Carmel on 27th inst., with the latest European and Brazilian mails. Should she arrive here by noon she will continue her course for B. Ayres same evening if later not till the following day.

We take leave by this packet of our esteemed friend, Captain Watson, Secretary of H.M.'s Legation in this Republic. During his stay amongst us he has made a wide circle of friends, who regret his departure. Few Secretaries have been called on to take a more active part in diplomatic matters than the gentleman in question. His visit to Chuput led to the most active measures for the Welsh Colony at that lovely spot; whilst his trip to Santa Fé, if it produced no other result, proved to the Provincial authorities the fixed resolution of the British Government to insist on the trial of murderers and assassins of British subjects. Captain Watson is well known in the literary world: his work on Persia has gained for him a high reputation, and although we are well pleased at his promotion, the lament the departure of so distinguished a literary contributor. We express the sentiments of the British community of Buenos Ayres, in hoping that this distinguished gentleman may be most successful in his diplomatic career. We believe he has the stuff in him for a Plenipotentiary. The R. M. S. "Arno" by special permission of the Oriental Government will drop a bag but land no passengers. His great boon to commerce is entirely due to our active British Consul we fear however that owing to

the irregularity of the sailings of river boats since the closing of the Montevideo port there will be no supplementary mail this time. Merchants will thus be unable to answer their letters by the French mail which is not expected here before Sunday morning. We send per "Arno" the Standard to our Montevideo subscribers. The nocturnal fires continue with unabated fury, last night the town was in a regular blaze and every tar barrel was brought into requisition, as the supply of fuel is beginning to fail, numbers of the poorer classes are busy around the city hunting up old barrels &c.

In the Corrientes Hospital a deadly disease has broken out carrying off numbers daily: great alarm prevails among the citizens who think it cholera but the doctors report it a violent fever brought by some of the sick soldiers from Paraguay on her last return trip the Proveedor brought down a crowd of passengers. Among whom a fearful panic spread at the sudden death of one of his numbers; one of the officials who has been engaged where 30 and 50 of his companions' dropped of daily assures us that the body presented no appearance of cholera, being perfectly white and that from what he saw death was brought on by intemperance, he says "Deceased took his passage from Corrientes to Buenos Ayres he suffered much from diarrhoea; and at length expired in the morning; the body was thrown overboard."

THE EPIDEMIC. MUNICIPAL PRECAUTIONS.

The Municipality have divided the city into twelve sections, each embracing a Juzgado. In every section where such has not yet been established, as in the Cathedral North, South, Concepcion and San Nicolas a general meeting of the residents has been called by the Municipal and Curate to elect a Committee for the purpose of enquiring into the public health and cleanliness, and taking the necessary measures to secure same. Said Committee should appoint a dispensary to be kept up day and night for the free delivery of medicine to the poor, and the private attendance of those who could not be brought to hospital, to which two physicians were appointed by the Faculty. The Municipality will lead their best assistance to these various Commissions, and earnestly solicit the police to do the same whenever called on.

These measures, whose positive advantages will be readily seen, served to secure the most healthy measures, whilst allowing the Municipality to concentrate its attention on other subjects of no less vital importance to the public welfare. The cleansing of the city continues with energy, and the returns of the last few days show a favorable result. Nor is the "vassura" nuisance lost sight of, for besides the regular central reservoirs fresh points have been established along the river bank, where the offal is collected into heaps and burnt.

The attention of the National Government has been called with all the urgency the matter demands to the disgraceful state of the soldiers water-closets in the Retiro barracks, which are attributed by the Faculty as the focus of infection to the entire neighborhood.

They have taken possession of the ground for the Cemetery, North of the city, situated on an elevated, open site, close to the "Polvora," known as the Cuelli, and in a few days it will be ready to receive the dead. The provisional Cemetery at the South, behind the Convalescencia, is in like state of advancement, this ample convenience will be made for the increased mortality.

Several fanegas of lime have been thrown over the "pantanos" and heaps of offal, which was found more convenient than to remove them. In the Northern Cemetery is a large depot for the reception of the dead which are brought here without fulfilling the ordinary rules. No funeral shall have more than our coaches, and any excess on this number shall entail on the proprietor of said coaches a fine of \$2,000 besides a detention of three days. Nor can the undertaker excuse himself for such excess on the plea that they are private carriages.

The great difficulty which at first presented itself with the hospitals has been happily overcome. On the first appearance of the disease the nurses had taken fright, and it was found impossible to fill their places for love or money. In this emergency, and at the instigation of the Municipality, they were succeeded by criminals condemned to two or three months public service, who besides board and lodging received a trifle to recompense labor. The quicker to proceed with the burning and burying of the city offal, the contract with an English house, who paid so much a month for what valuables they could root out, has been abolished, from a conviction that the time spent in the search was prejudicial to the public health. The "vassura" problem is one of the most complicated that the Municipality have to deal with, and with the idea of cleansing the city daily, \*



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
