**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE POST-
MASTER-GENERAL.**

We have reviewed the above Report for 1867, already sent in to the Minister of the Interior. As usual, it shows more vigor and painstaking labor, as well as more real progress, than any other Department of the Government. New Post-offices have been established in San Lorenzo, province of Sta. Fé, Fraile Muerto, and Villanueva, Cordova, San Carlos, and San Rafael, Mendoza, Colon, Entre Rios, Belen, and Andalgalá, Catamarca, La Cruz, and Alvear, Corrientes, in Ayacucho, in the Province; and, finally, in the Boca, and Once de Setiembre, in the city of Buenos Ayres.

Along the lines of railway also letter-boxes have been placed at all the stations, amounting to thirty-seven in number; and on the Argentine Central Railway, by an arrangement with Mr. Wheelwright, the travelling railway post, the greatest of modern improvements, has already been inaugurated.

This is pretty well for one year, and that unfortunately a year of war and pestilence. This advance in means has been immediately justified by a great advance in results, and consequently we are told that the number of letters has augmented over that of the year 1865, some 178,000; whilst the printed matter increased some 180,000 packages. The rents of the general-office also increased some 5,000 had dollars, notwithstanding that the rebellion in the Interior for the past five months, leaves the statistics necessarily imperfect.

Mr. Posadas makes a most singular complaint about the paucity of the fines recorded during the year, which were three in number, and of only fifty six dollars in amount. This appears to be owing to the great ignorance as yet of the local tribunals about the powers and attributes by law of the Post-office Department, or they would neither encourage the mulcted parties in a lawsuit, or give their verdicts against the orders of the Department, as is now too frequently done. Some further legislation seems to be imperative upon this point, so that better service may be meted out to the public.

By this report there seems to be two 'dead-letter' offices in the Republic: one at the General Post-office in the capital, and the other in Gen. Urquiza's capital of Entre Rios. When is this system of 'imperium in imperio' to cease in the land? Certainly our respected Postmaster-General knows that in all the Governments of the earth, when letters are written and sent, there is but one 'dead-letter' office, and that the General Department, where alone the 'archives,' &c., are kept of this most necessary and most delicate branch of his business is that office.

We are sorry to learn that no efforts have been made under the advertisement of the department to carry the mail in light waggons and on horse-back through the Interior, as provided

by law of the last session of Congress, introduced by Senator Bustamante of July. This is supposed to be owing to the disturbed condition of the Interior; but we should say it arises also from the smallness of the remuneration offered by the law, which must not exceed 3,000 hard dollars per month.

We are happy to count up the names of twenty new steamers which have applied for and received the license of packets within the past year, and they by no means include all those which have taken their places upon our magnificent rivers.

This report is adorned with a plate showing an iron street letter-box, which is quite pretty, and also a map of the railways, finished in hand, or projected, of the Republic. Notwithstanding the foreign and domestic wars, which have served to check all expansion of public enterprise, the Central Railway continues its work towards Cordova, and the country already possesses the considerable number of 513 kilometres of finished railway, all constructed in, I may say, within the last four years.

One of the chief charms about these annual reports of the Postmaster-General is some old historical or statistical document he always publishes, touching, in some evident manner, upon the branch of the public service confided to his special care.

This year we have a lengthened report of the post routes in use about the end of the last century from B. Ayres, the capital of the new Viceroyalty, to Chile and Peru, which ends with the census of said capital for 1770. The population of our city was then only 22,000 souls, including a goodly number of priests, friars, monks, and nuns, slaves, Indians, &c. We recommend this document to the historical student, and are sorry that we have no space to analyze it here.

The absolute change which has come over the discipline and general management of our Post-office Department since it fell into the active and intelligent hands of D. Gervasio Posadas, entitles him not only to the thanks of the public, but also most largely to the consideration of Congress. In our opinion the time has come when, as in the United States, the Postmaster-General should be a Cabinet Minister. No branch of our Government is of more importance to the true progress of the Republic, or requires a better opportunity to express itself authoritatively both to the Cabinet and Congress. This can only be properly done by the Postmaster-General in person and *viva voce*, from the Bench of the Secretaries of the Executive.

EDITOR'S TABLE.
The mole-head was crowded yesterday. Passengers and their friends were arriving up to three o'clock; such a crowd we have not witnessed for years. One of our popular agents, Mr. Torrobas, of the Villa Mercedes, left for his native hills in Spain. We salute this gentleman on his departure, and wish him a pleasant voyage. Two small steamers took the passengers and their friends off, and on the return trip cheer and a hearty God speed echoed along the Roads. The scene was very exciting.

We are happy to learn that there is some probability of the Montevidean port being opened to Buenos Ayres shortly. It seems that our friends down there say that we have no cause to complain, as some years ago, in the time of the yellow fever the Buenos Ayres authorities shut the port to Montevideo. As there is now as much sickness in Montevideo as in Buenos Ayres, the object of keeping the port closed cannot be well understood.

Immediately after the opening of Congress, President Mitre will leave to take command of the army, at least such is the rumour. It seems that Dr. Paz is unwilling to resume his old place in the Government house, and Congress will be called on to name some party to act in his stead.
So thoroughly has the revolution in the Interior died out that we notice now the Rosario merchants are despatching large troops of carts for mostly all the towns of the Interior. The National Government has taken measures to re-establish the post-houses in the different Provinces, and in a few days we expect to have the overland mail from Chili. We hear that in San Juan the mails have accumulated, and that a special diligence will have to be put on to convey them.
The Minister of War is expected from Rosario, as the war in the Interior is now all over, his presence there is no longer required.
The dispute between the Sanitary Commission and the Government still continues. The *Nacion* publishes a very stiff rejoinder to the proclamation of the Committee. We regret to remark the very gross personalities mixed up in the question, both the Government and the Committee seem to have lost their tempers in the question. The real cause of which as far as we can understand was the nomination of an Inspector by the Government. To-day the Sanitary Committee will hold a meeting in the Municipal

back parlour, as to the future disposition of the funds on hand.
The bon-fires were continued on Thursday night, principally however at the South end of the city. In the North such have been the nightly burnings that there is no fuel left. All the empty boxes, barrels, &c. have been burnt up so there is nothing now save, fire-wood or coal, but such is the determination of several parties to purify the air by these fires, that numbers subscribe liberally and keep a blaze in front of their houses all night.
The Inspecting Committees are constant in their daily rounds, and we are pleased to learn, effecting much good. Some dozens of foul filthy fondas have been shut up by their order, and each day they make discoveries which we are reluctant to publish. In the neighbourhood of the old market scenes passing credence have been discovered; in fact no man could believe that the population of this city was so squeezed up as it really is. We think the Government ought to at once set about taking a census of the population. There are houses in town where the workmen lodge; the bunks or shelves upon which they sleep the instant they are vacated at daybreak, are occupied by Serenos and night watchmen.
We have received samples of the famed Blackberry Brandy imported by Messrs. Bate and Livingstone: it possesses properties which are peculiarly adapted for the present time. We have tried it and pronounce it delicious, but we refrain from speaking too much about it, lest our readers might suppose we had a penchant for the stimulant.
There is a very general desire to see the last note of the American Minister to the Argentine Government respecting the peace mediation as all the previous notes have been published. We see no good reason why this should be withheld, and we believe Gen. Asboth will view the matter in this light.
The Provincial Bank has passed a rule authorizing the opening of accounts current in the camp. We don't think this will amount to much as the country people have few financial transactions. Still in the country towns it may be found a convenience.
The demand for our pocket edition yesterday was something extraordinary; every number printed was sold, and had we printed off a hundred extras, we believe they would have been bought up also.
Pestalario has now his Opera Company duly formed and performing at Montevideo. Briol is starting it at the Solis. On Sunday night 'Hernani' was given before a crowded house.
The cause of Osorio's delay, it seems, was the great desertion in his ranks. But news has arrived that he is at the Uruguay. The number of desertors in Rio Grande is put down at from 7,900 to 8,000 men; and in the Banda Oriental it is said there are no less than three thousand Brazilian deserters.
The Bishop of Montevideo, in consequence of the cholera epidemic being pronounced, has suspended his trip to Rome when just on the eve of his departure.
The steamer *Guarani* has laid up for a few days to be painted and cleaned up. She will sail on the 8th proximo.
We received our mails from Rosario yesterday. The news from the Interior could not be more satisfactory; but still there is much sickness in Rosario, and we regret to say, Mr. Bollaert, who lent such charitable aid at the hospital, has been attacked; but, we trust, he is now out of danger.
The Provincial Senate has approved of the last elections; owing, however, to the state of things in town, the Legislature will not do much before the 25th of May.
We regret sincerely to chronicle another barbarous murder in the Banda Oriental. The victim, an aged German. It seems that the poor man's house was attacked by a set of villains, who believing he had money, ransacked the whole place after the perpetration of the murder. The poor German lived at the Rincon de Sauce, in the Department of Colonia. We hope the neighbors will inform us what steps the authorities have taken.
One of the murderers of the Scott family is said to be hiding on an estancia on the coast, near the mouth of the river Plata, or escaped to Montevideo. The British Minister, Mr. Buckley Mathew, has had an interview with the Governor and Dr. Arvelaneda, and we are happy to hear, that both the 'alcaldes' and 'tenientes' will be punished. The Governor ought to make a public example of these fellows, by so doing he would endear himself to the whole foreign population in the river Plata.
We hear that Captain Batty, formerly of the steamer *Cordova*, has formed a steam lightering Company in Liverpool for the River Plata, and may be expected out shortly. Under the management of so practical a man as Batty, we have no doubt the Company will do a good paying business.
Our advices from Lujan go to state that the President is expected out, and that Sr. Saavedra has taken a small mud rancho outside of the town for a few weeks. The state of things in

Lujan passes ordnance every house, rancho and room is crowded, even in the very quintas there are hundreds of families quartered, all having fled the epidemic in Buenos Ayres.
It is rumored in town that the last Brazilian mail, has brought positive information of a fearful revolution in Pernambuco. We publish all we know from that quarter to-day, things looked bad there, and much discontent existed but we have no reliable information of the rebellion spoken of.
We expect mails from Montevideo to-day per Edward Everett and look for a description of the Inauguration of the Railway which is the great event of the day.
We have received a private letter from Rio which paints things in a bad way, no Exchange operations and in addition to the Government remittances, we learn that \$255,500 in gold has been sent to the Plata within the last three months.
Major Mansilla has arrived in town after a lengthened absence with the army. This distinguished officer has been in the Andes campaign, having previously served in all the great battles in Paraguay. We salute the Major on his return to town.
Our latest advices from Rosario are most satisfactory, the cholera is rapidly on the decline, and some of the afflicted citizens are beginning to return.
The loss which the country sustained in the death of Mr. Rams, who early fell a victim to the epidemic, is considerably lessened by his son-in-law, who has nobly determined to continue Sr Rams' favorite scheme, the Sala de Navigation. This is an enterprise to which we attach much importance, and Sr Señorans has our best wishes for his entire success.

IMPORTANT FROM BRAZIL.
NEWS FROM THE PROVINCES.
DISTURBANCES IN PERNAMBUCO.
Amazonas.—The Peruvians of the affluents of the Amazonas were greatly pleased with the approximate opening of the Amazonas to the merchant's shipping of all nations, and it was confidently expected that the Peruvian Government would adopt the same measure with regard to the Peruvian part of the Valley of the Amazonas.
The Magerons Indians, who killed Lieutenant Soares of the exploring expedition up the Jacary, have sacked a trading establishment below. A party of twenty national guards have been sent up that river to punish the Indians if possible.
Pará.—The Russian brig *Lino*, loaded with coal for the Gas Company, which was anchored off the Arsenal of Marine, dragged anchors and struck at the mouth of the Guamá, and as she made water freely it was found necessary to tow her to the Praia do Cacaolmo to discharge and undergo repairs.
The commission to promote the sale of the 6 p. 3 Government bonds had reported to the President that the current rate of discount being 12 per cent, they could effect no sales, but that they themselves would take 30 contos of them.

Marankáo.—The first district has elected for deputies to the Imperial Assembly Drs. Belfort Duarte, Vieira da Silva, and Augusto de Castro.
In Mearim, Tuloya, Ita e curá, Vargem-Grande, Boroatá, Caxias and S. José das Capoeiras the voting was in favor of Dr. Fortanel, Colonel Zidro, and Dr. Sinvol.
Centá.—The first district has elected deputies Dr. João Ernesto Vieira de Medeiros, Avelino Gurgel do Amaral, and Joaquim Bento de Souza Andradé.
The second: Dr. José Julio de Albuquerque Barros, Francisco de Paula Pessoa Junior, and Hyppolito Cassiano Pamplona.
The third: the Baron de Crato, Dr. Ratisbona, and João Brigido.
In the elections for the two Senators the list voted by the Capital, Maranguape, Aquiraz: Casavel and Baturité showed a list of *Conselheiro* Saldanha Maranhão, Dr. José Lorengo, Padre Antonio, Dr. Correia, Conego Pinto de Mendonga, and Dr. Ratisbona.
The Provincial Library was inaugurated upon the 25th of March, the book numbering some 1718 volumes, about a thousand of which were donated.
The 25th was signalized by the inauguration of the Benefica water-works, which bring the waters of that stream within the capital.
There is an old beggar woman in the Fortaleza whose birth dates back to 1745 and she consequently is 113 years of age, but still maintaining much of her former powers of mind and body, being able to tell old stories and sing odd songs for the amusement of her patron.
Rio Grande do Norte.—A lady who has just died at the age of 82 years has left a descendant of 15 children, 119 grandchildren and 61 great-grandchildren, in all 195 of a posterity. She

was *Nhaca Anna Rita de Azevedo*, widow of Lieut. Colonel Vicente Ferreira Nobre.
Parabyba.—The first district had elected Imperial deputies Dr. Felizardo Toscano do Brito, Dr. João Florentino Maria de Visconcellas, and Padre Lindolfo José correa dos Reves.
In the second district the voting thus far was in favor of Dr. João Leite Ferreira and Dor Antonio Manoel de Aragáo.
It is said that the brother of a conscript attacked, himself alone, at a place called Jacupia, a body of 20 national guards belonging to the battalion of Livramento, and succeeded in rescuing his brother, after shooting down the commander of the party!
Pernambuco.—In Pernambuco seven of the eight battalions of national guards had gone into quarters and as soon as the other battalion would appear the 1,000 men required from the city would be chosen.
At Paó d'Alho, however, the prison there, which had in it 26 recruits and conscripted national guards, besides some criminals, was assaulted at daybreak on the 22nd of March, and the guard of seven men being overpowered by the assailants, who numbered some 200 persons, the prisoners were all set at liberty. A party of national guards who were making the rounds of the town attempted to prevent the rescue, but were beaten back with a loss of three of them killed. The Chief of Police, with a force of national guards and cavalry of the line, was on the spot investigating the affair.
The same band, it is supposed, four days afterwards entered the house of Lieutenant Colonel Luis Francisco de Barros Rego, commanding the 4th battalion of national guards, and took from it all the arms and munitions they found there.
Pressing had been suspended by orders of the President.
The voting of the 5th district, so far as known, gives the elections in favor of Dr. Francisco Carlos Brandáo and Dr. Caetano Xavier Pereira de Brito.
Bahia.—In Bahia the Senatorial elections in 23 of the colleges gave *Conselheiro* José Antonio Saraiva 1364 votes, Dr. Antonio Tiberio de Montecorvo Lima 1104, Desembargador Luiz Antonio Barboza de Alameda 851. The three next were Colonel Spínola, *Conselheiro* Ernesto Franga, and Desembargador Silva Gomes.
For deputies the known voting of the 4th district were in favor of Dr. Moura, *Conselheiro* Dautes and *Conselheiro* Saraiva.
Those of the 5th gave the majorities to Dr. Souto, Dr. Frederico, and Colonel Spínola.
The national guard was in quarters and the designation of the contingent was being rapidly proceeded with Lieut Colonel Soaquim Mauricio Ferreira is appointed to command it.
Rio Grande do Sul.—The cholera had broken out with severity, especially, at Porto Alegre the capital. In that place, a town of some 24,000 persons, 51 deaths from cholera occurred on the 14th of March, and 39 on the 11th. These amounts, however, appeared to be the culmination, and the deaths afterwards fell to about 8 a day.
In Rio Grande the disease was not so serious. In Pelotas it was chiefly confined to attacking the slaves. Sr. José do Norte had so far escaped a visit from the epidemic, although there was not a doctor in that port.
The latest statements as to the progress of the Baron de Herval, report that he had been joined by General Canavarro and had crossed the Ithiby at the Mariano Pinto ford with 2,500 men, and that some contingents had not yet joined him.
A further change in the bar of the Rio Grande has been ascertained, and deepening to the south west.
The Baron de Amazonas accepted a hall in Jaguará upon the 11th ult, and started on the 12th for Artigas and Serro Largo.
The hired slave girl, who last year attempted to murder by suffocation the child of Mr. George Milford, of Rio Grande, and whose sentence of four years' imprisonment had been commuted to three hundred lashes, has again been guilty of a murderous attack, she having with a hatchet inflicted several dangerous cuts upon a companion, a mulatto girl, while this girl was asleep. The cries of the poor woman brought assistance and the assassin was seized and lodged in prison, showing no signs of compunction or trouble for the murderous action she had been barely frustrated in consummating.
Matto Grosso.—A despatch from Miranda says that the chief of the Lapangue Indians had captured a Paraguayan post in the Apa.
The Paraguayans still occupied Albuquerque, but no movement of the brigade of Brazilians at Miranda had yet been made against them.

nary incidental expenses that might arise over and above shepherd's wages, &c.
The sum of 100 £. for personal expenses is an exceedingly low estimate, and only the most parsimonious of lives could be led in this country on that amount; but the whole or part of the sum of 1,383 £. (the annual interest on the capital) could be also diverted to personal expenses.
Sheep when sold are worth little more than what they will fetch if thrown into the vat, and have fallen in value from 8s. to 4s. each. The calculation, therefore, of 5s. a piece for the sheep includes the expenses on commission and driving, and the sale price at the expiration of the eighth year is fixed at 4s.
The foregoing may be considered as a fair and impartial statement of the working of a sheep-farm, or "estancia," as it is termed, in the Argentine Republic (the province of Buenos Ayres excepted, where the land is considerably dearer than in the other provinces), and may serve to throw light on a subject that is open to unbounded controversy and difference of opinion. Indeed, so much depends on contingencies—such as weather, quality of land and stock, variations in the price of wool, &c.—that it would be next to impossible to arrive at any exact appreciation of the merits of sheep-farming as a pecuniary speculation. That good fortunes have been realized by it we can only be able to deny, whilst it is equally notorious, on the other hand, that many a man has expended the best years of his life in sheep-farming with but very inadequate results.
A course very generally adopted in this country, and termed the "mediavero" system, or sheep-farming on halves, is open to a person of small means, but anxious to embark in sheep-farming. With a capital of 400 £., a sum of 700 £. can be realized, or a net profit of 300 £. on the original sum invested, at the end of five years. No land need be bought or rented. 500 picked ewes will have to be purchased by a man who intends personally, and without other assistance, to look after them. These picked ewes are added to a similar number belonging to the owner of the land, who gives the use of it for nothing, as compensation for the other's personal labour. In some instances the landowner gives the use of a hut (or "rancho," as it is termed) and fold, value about 100 £.; sometimes the cost is defrayed by both, and at other times the beginner has to find both.

The 500 picked ewes would cost
8s. each 200
The cost of the hut and fold for the beginner would be 100
First expenses in town and country previous to settling, and including passage-money. 100

One thousand picked ewes during 5 years should increase to 6,500, which 6,500 sheep would, of course, not be picked ewes, but would be sheep of different sexes and ages. The 3,500 belonging to the beginner, or "mediavero," estimated at 4s. each, would be worth 650 £., and the hut and fold, which had cost 100 £., if well looked after, would be worth 50 £. Thus the total proceeds would amount to 700 £., against 300 £. capital invested and 100 £. first expenses.

LATEST FROM LUJAN.
GRAY CROWDS.
HOLY WEEK CEREMONIES.
Villa de Lujan, April 23, 1867.
Gentlemen:
The fear of the cholera has caused great numbers from the city to take up their residence here within these last few days. They all wear a sober serious aspect instead of the light giddy careless gait which is one of their leading characteristics. They seem impressed with deep religious feeling, if we can judge from the attendance at mass each morning.
Report says that some foreign minister has rented a rancho in the suburbs—that the President is coming to the casa of Sr. Casas—and that the son of Governor Saavedra is going to reside with D. Mariano Flores.
The ceremonies of Holy Week came off with more grandeur and solemnity than on other occasions, and the presence of many of the genteler classes from the city caused the congregation to have a far more respectable appearance. The church, the music, the sermons and the processions reflected great honor on the cura. It may not be omnia to remind some of the more matter-of-fact readers of the *Standard*, that this an old Catholic country—that many of the customs and habits of this people are of an Oriental cast—that they are accustomed to have their reason appealed to through the medium of representations offered to the senses, and hence that some religious ceremonies that might appear strange to us of the cold north, are not, after all, superstitious, and are stamped with the seal of most venerable antiquity.
On Holy Thursday the procession and tenebre as well as the office of the preceding evening are much the same as your Catholic readers are accustomed to at home; with this exception however, that instead of a side-altar being decorated on the occasion the high altar was converted into a 'chapel ardente' where the blessed Sacrament was deposited, the altar so decorated being called in Spanish 'El monumento.' The veiled crucifix was laid on a cushion on the pavement before the high altar with lighted tapers on either side and the people went in crowds, in a most respectful manner to kiss the foot of the cross. On Friday the ornaments and lights were removed from the church and mass without consecration was celebrated as at home. On Wednesday evening how-

During the intermediate years—from the first to the fifth—the annual sale of wool, sheepskins, grease, and wethers would have given sufficient money for a labouring man (not a gentleman) to live pretty comfortably, and as the necessity for forming new flocks arose, his annual sales would also be sufficient to admit of his hiring land for each new flock to graze on, and to pay a shepherd likewise to tend it.
Sheep are often taken on thirds; and many an immigrant, without one shilling of capital, and even after having only been a few months in the country, has experienced no difficulty in finding persons to give him sleep on thirds; that is to say, the sheep-farmer, or "estanciero," finds the land, the hut, the fold, and a flock of about 1,500 sheep of different sexes and ages—"al corte," as it is termed in this country. The immigrant gives his personal attention, and receives every year one-third of the proceeds of wool, skins, grease, and wethers, and is allowed to kill, for his own consumption, two sheep per week, and at the end of the third year receives one-third of the increase; in which case, if the original 1,500 have become 3,000—the increase being 1,500—his share would be 500 sheep, and in the meantime he has received a sufficient sum annually to enable him to live without getting into debt. It must be understood, however, that the man must be a hard-working, industrious labourer, of parsimonious habits.

We can only repeat that our data about this Curuzu business is on too high an authority to be called into question, and one of the parties who gave us the news has offered to certify as to its correctness, under his own signature in our columns, under these circumstances it would be more discreet of our colleague to cry peace. There is room for very serious comment on this whole business—so serious that we wait for the disappearance of the epidemic before we treat of the subject in the proper way; but it would seem that the grave must give up its very dead and the winding sheet be held to the gaze of the public, before common sense and necessary precaution can be forced on the council of the Government.
