LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO. (BY ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH.) Montevideo, May 7.

Bolsa crowded—allotting railway shares. Police have discovered false five half pieces. Port opened soon.

THE STATE OF TRADE. The stoppage of the saladeros the closing of the port of Montevideo, and the public system of incarceration.

Things have come to such a pass, owing to these outrageous prohibitions, that another week and half the merchants and traders of the city may close their doors.

The only flourishing trade in Buenos Ayres to-day is that of billiard-marker; all the tables in town are crowded.

Verily the people in the Government-house seem to know nothing of the total paralysis of trade, the loss and ruin spreading far and near by the continuance of prohibitions which sap at the life springs of trade, commerce and credit.

Yesterday another soothing telegram from the Court of Rat Island arrived, announcing the opening of the port of Montevideo with the establishment of four days' quarantine.

After patiently enduring the inconvenience of the most arbitrary and unnecessary act ever attempted in a free country, we are still to be told that the quarantine nuisance must be continued.

For our part we are surprised that the commercial body have so long endured this despotism in silence. But whatever excuse we can make for Gov. Flores, whose education and instincts are so unmistakably camp that we are not surprised he should be induced to lend himself to such measures, what shall we say of Governor Alsina, who comes

of a stock renowned for depth of thought and profound erudition? How shall we excuse a Governor who steps from his attributes and dictates a decree which it would be difficult to estimate if even Collins had taken the place of salted hides in Barracas?

What apology can we offer for the Governor who has recently returned from Europe, and must necessarily be inspired with European ideas? The stoppage of the saladeros has caused public injury and private loss, and to our mind the saladeristas have a clear action for damages against the Government of Buenos Ayres which can be brought in the Federal Court.

A verdict for a couple of millions against the Government would be the greatest safeguard ever afforded in this country for private rights, and we badly want such a case as a precedent for future emergencies. It is argued that the saladero faeno is over, but in this there is a grave error also, as by reference to the statistics of last year—from now until the end of the season—if we are to be guided by last year's returns, at least 140,000 animals might be killed; these represent in the corral fifteen millions, but in saladero produce are another fifteen millions, say thirty in all.

It is nearly too monstrous to pass such things in silence, individual rights and public credit should be regarded as too sacred to be trifled with in such a manner. The Bolsa is deserted, business at a stand still; cattle coming in, in droves and returning in thousands, ship Captains, Merchants, Produce brokers and a whole population of peons, all brought to a stand still because no man in the country or out of it has the courage to tell the Governor the fearful consequences of his intemperate edict.

We tell the Governor of Buenos Ayres that if he does not rescind this saladero prohibition he ruins the country, which under the brightest auspices, and the most solemn oaths he pledged to govern and protect.

MONTEVIDEO. Saturday, May 4th.

The occurrence of the week has been the rupture between the Junta, Gefe Politico, and Government, with reference to certain sanitary regulations prohibiting the sale of fruit and vegetables. Some twelve days ago the Health Committee, in view of the increasing number of cholera cases, judged it necessary to forbid the sale of pears, tomatoes, cucumbers &c; but, as too often happens, the decree was considered a dead letter: on the 25th inst. we had no fewer than 16 cases of cholera, and, next morning early, Mr. McColl, as chairman of the Health Committee, repaired to the Market seized all the forbidden fruit and carted it off to the Plaza Ramirez, where it was destroyed.

The firmness of Mr. McColl, as chairman of the Health Committee, and he executed in half-an-hour what the Ministry or Police would have perhaps hesitated to attempt. It is well known that market huxters and Italian gardeners exercise a sort of terror in this city, having twice before obliged the authorities to retract their decrees. It is also a remarkable coincidence that since last week Gen. Flores keeps a guard of honor at his house. Out of self-respect the authorities should have continued the vigorous action initiated by Mr. McColl, but, from one cause or other, the Chief of Police gave permission to the fruit-vendors to disobey the prohibition. Hereupon the Junta and Ministry, declared their intention to resign office unless Sor. Aguiar were removed from the post of Gefe: the ultimatum had its effect, and Sr. Bustamante, editor of the Tribuna, was named to succeed Sr. Aguiar. Nevertheless, painful to relate, the prohibition against fruit has not been carried out, and the decree of the Health Committee is treated as a matter of joke.

It is ascertained that 68 persons died of cholera here since its first appearance six weeks ago: and the first victims were Major Albornoz and Dr. Solitto. On the 2nd inst. one case proved fatal, and none, thank God, since then. It is more than probable that if this city were in the same condition as E. Ayres and no precaution had been taken to close the port, we should have suffered as heavily as you.

The new French packet Aunis caused serious inconvenience to the commercial public by going on to B. Ayres without the mails (although specially bound to wait for them), and this at a time when communication is almost suspended. If I gave expression to the strong language which I have heard on this subject the French people would charge the Standard with hostilities to the Mensageries Imperiales.

The subscriptions for the survivors of the cholera-victims in Buenos Ayres continue to pour in freely, and the amount will probably exceed £2,000. The inhabitants of these countries are generous and unselfish whenever the cause of charity calls for assistance: but they are also dreadfully quarrelsome at times, and an angry dispute raged here for several days about the

propriety of giving the Mendoza Fund (£3,000) to the poor of Buenos Ayres. Most abusive letters were published in the papers, ending in a challenge between two of our leading men, and a hand-to-hand scramble that happily resulted in ridicule instead of bloodshed. It is humiliating to remember that large sums were subscribed in England, North America and the River Plate, for the Mendoza sufferers, and most of the money was expended on muskets.

Some of the eminent literary men of this city are going to give a Literary Conversazione shortly in aid of the B. Ayres fund, and the newspapers have strenuously aided the same charitable end. On Thursday night a party of serenaders perambulated the streets in commemoration of the victory over the Paraguayans on May 2nd 1866.

The Government has abolished the extra-duty of 3 per cent on coal. The Spanish Minister announces that parties interested in the project of laying submarine cables from Cuba to the Canary Islands, Mexico and South America, can learn the basis for proposal by applying at the Legation.

The notorious burglar Giovanni Monti, who was caught last week in robbing M. Gally's shop, has escaped from prison. The prisons in South America are no guarantee for the detention of criminals, and this Monti is a ruffian who has several times escaped justice.

The Italian Bank has established a branch at Colonia under the management of Sor Salvañac. The papers say that some false 50 cent notes purporting to be of the River Plate Bank are in circulation. In the English papers we read of a steamer from Liverpool for South America wrecked at Sathill, Dublin. The new steamer George Bell had to put into Cork for repairs, en route for the River Plate.

Messrs. Fels Seyffert have a large trade-auction on Monday. There will be a grand Te Deum tomorrow at the Matriz; in honor of the city patrons, SS. Philip and James, and fireworks at night. The Opera Co. give Norma to-morrow night. The diligence from Mercedes arrived last night, having been 4 days on the road; one whole day was spent in pulling it out of a 'pantano.'

The Junta of Cerro Largo is putting up some suertes of estancia for sale at Chuy and Saradi, and will receive proposals up to May 30th. The cholera had entirely disappeared from Yaguaran and Artigas, and the hospitals were broken up. Latest advices from Rio Grande mention the death of Gen. Canavaro, from a kick of his horse which brought on mortification. The local papers give a list of troops, summing up 26,000 men, furnished by Rio Grande for the Paraguayan war. Talking of figures, the Rio Janeiro papers state the reserve of Nat. Guards still in Brazil at 450,000 men, and yet the Emperor cannot raise 5,000 to reinforce Caxias.

The Diario de Rio says a Cabinet Council has resolved to present to the Legislature a bill for the abolition of slavery against January 1st A.D. 1900. The nation is to indemnify the slave-owners. All children born in the interim to be free, but remain in tutelage of their masters. On 'Change. The attendance at the Bolsa to-day was unusually thin even for a Saturday, but Mr. Seymour's new luchsaloon alongside was crowded: the place is tastefully fitted up, with handsome steel engravings, lunch tables, and an American bar; soups, sandwiches, cocktails, beer &c., of first-rate quality and at moderate charges. The want of this place was the hitherto much felt by frequenters on 'Change, and the proprietor is very attentive to his customers.

A new regulation has been made in the Bolsa, whereby all sales of public securities &c. are to be made viva-voce. A monthly publication has just been issued called La Bolsa giving the quotations of stock &c. D. Pedro Varela and another influential gentleman were on 'Change' yesterday canvassing subscribers for the Railway. The contractors are going on with the earthworks and have pitched their tent about 2 miles beyond Paso de Molino.

A good deal of animation continues in the stock of the Fomento Territorial, which rules at a high premium. In other transactions the following are noted: 4,000 hides al barrer at 453 p/s. in barraca. 2,200 hides despatched, at 45. 1,500 salted matadero do. at 41 in barraca. 2,000 North American at 47 despatched. 150 salt novillo at 51, and cows at 44, on board.

The very Latest. 4 p.m. A Cabinet council was held to-day, as Gen. Flores seemed inclined to re-open the port, but it was unanimously resolved that such a measure would be premature and highly dangerous; it is notorious that epidemics are most contagious when apparently dying out.

NORTHERN RAILWAY OF BUENOS AYRES.

A special general meeting, convened by requisition, was held yesterday at the London Tavern, for the purpose of appointing inspectors to examine into the affairs of the company; Mr. Hayne in the chair.

Mr. Elborough, the former secretary of the company, contended that if the accounts of the company had been properly kept the revenue account would have shown that the line had earned 7 per cent. on its capital of £150,000. He said that the accounts did not show the actual results of the year's working, stating that certain items, which he named, amounting to £5,100, had been charged during the year against revenue instead of to capital. He concluded by moving that inspectors be appointed to examine into the affairs of the company.

Mr. Roby seconded the motion. Mr. Bartridge thought it was fair to assume that the directors would not oppose the motion. Mr. Morris, the solicitor to the company, stated that at the ordinary meeting held on the 17th of September last the report and balance-sheet had been fully discussed, upon which an amendment was moved to the effect that a committee of shareholders be appointed to examine the accounts of the company. On the amendment being put to the meeting only four hands were held up in favour of it, and 22 against it. The original motion was then carried by 32 against six. It was the interest of all parties to improve the property as much as possible, and make it productive. He complained of the irritation that had been kept up for some time by a few shareholders, stating that there was no ground for the allegations that had been made, and which had tended to injure the company in Buenos Ayres. The Board, he hoped, would be enabled to continue paying off the creditors of the company. The interest was now ready for the debenture-holders, and by giving the directors sufficient time, the interest on the preference shares would be forthcoming. The arrears must be cleared off, and as to the books and accounts, they would be open to the inspection of any shareholder at the office of the company. There was not the shadow of a pretence or excuse for the continual worry that had been kept up by adverse interests; and he was glad to say that the directors had proxies enough to carry any resolution three times over.

Mr. Hartridge contended that the course adopted by the Board under their legal adviser had, by withholding desirable information, been the cause of all the irritation. He thought it wrong that inquiry into the accounts should be refused. Mr. Spratt, one of the auditors, said he was a holder of deferred shares, and had examined the accounts of the company with great care. He thought they were as satisfactory as could be expected under the circumstances. They had to deal with the separate items as sent to them from Buenos Ayres.

Mr. Goetz thought if items in the accounts were not correct, the sooner they were made so the better. He hoped the directors would see the necessity of rendering the accounts so as to be clear and satisfactory to the shareholders. The Chairman said any shareholder could go and examine the accounts at the office. There were items charged in one of the accounts, during Mr. Elborough's time, that ought to have been charged to another account. For instance, the line was 17 1/2 miles in length, and was worked by six locomotives; when two of them broke down two new ones were sent out, instead of renewing those worn out at the expense of revenue, and the cost of them, about £5,000, was charged to capital instead of to revenue. He then put the motion, which was negatived by 18 against four, and the proceedings terminated.

EDITOR'S TABLE. Mr. Gustavo Grothe, the engineer employed by the concessionaire of the Rosario Gas works, paid us a visit yesterday and showed the plans of the new gas-house in that town. The works will cost about £22,000 to supply 3,000 lights, but with capacity to increase that number to 5,000. Sr. Artega, the concessionaire, will commence the works with the least possible delay, and we hear an agent will be sent to England to purchase the necessary articles, &c. Now that the revolution has been put down in the interior, the trade of Rosario begins to show signs of resuscitation. The new Gas-works may be regarded as a move in the right direction, and we believe will prove a paying concern.

The Baron de Campy we understand has sent into the Municipality a most comprehensive scheme for paving, watering and sewerage the city. We hope the city fathers will carefully consider this matter, agree with the Baron, and at once conclude the contract. The Baron agrees to take payment in city bonds, 6 per cent. for the work according, as it is concluded nothing can be more business like; but we greatly fear the business is too grand for the calibre of our Muni-

cipales, who seem to paddle over the smallest trifles. The Baron's project should be published, the opinion of the public through the papers taken on it, and then the matter at once decided. We cannot improve the city for nothing. Let us see that the price is moderate, the works good, guarantees given, and then there can be no further objection. On Monday we received our Provincial exchanges, Rosario to the 4th inst., Santiago and Tucuman to 18th ult., Salta 12th, and Jujuy 11th. There is little news to be found in any of the papers. The whole country is now in the enjoyment of peace, and the small Provincial sheets are filled with the glorious deeds of the National troops.

Under the head of "Atrocious Canjummy" we find an article from the Bolivian official organ unequivocally refuting the charges of the Argentine press. The article in question is strong and ably written, and though not seeking to hide its sympathies for Paraguay, scouts the idea of making a cowardly descent on the unprotected border of a neighboring State. The whole affair seems to have produced as much indignation and surprize among our transandine cousins as with ourselves.

According to the 'Noticias,' the loan which the Provincial Government solicited from the commercial body has proved a failure. Of the four millions necessary for the conversion of the paper money, only some 613,000 patacones have been offered, and of these some do not seem 'bona fide' offers. A foreign loan seems to be the only real solution for the conversion of the paper money. Everything seems at a stand still in Buenos Ayres. All our theatres are closed, and even the Debating Society is mute. It is a pity some Mark Tapley does not turn up, just to rouse society from its present state of lethargy. Meanwhile Mons. Peyres Layougnade performed at the Colon last night.

General Melgarejo, reported dead some time ago, has again turned up. According to the mails from Jujuy, this usurper is preparing an expedition to invade the northern provinces. It is hardly credible, however, Melgarejo will leave Bolivia, not for want of will, but of way. Happily, he has more than enough on hand at home. The splendid new steamer, Georgia Bell, on her way from Liverpool to Montevideo, experienced very bad weather in the Channel, and was obliged to put into Cork to get repairs. When these are concluded, she will continue her voyage, and may soon be expected out. The Georgia Bell is intended for a passenger boat, being fitted up with large saloons and roomy cabins. She is admirably suited for our river trade.

Our overland communication with the Pacific, via Mendoza, is now open, and dates have been received in town to 15th April. The Cruado revolution has been suppressed. A change in the Ministry is expected. The Peruvian fleet is still at Valparaiso. Admiral Tucker sent in his resignation to the Chilean Government. It was unhesitatingly accepted. Bolivia has ceded to Chile a large territory in Mejillones. The Brazilian Minister, Sr. Errazuriz, formerly Plenipotentiary, at the Court of St. James, was received at Santiago on the 11th.

The Chilean Government is well pleased with the success of the new loan on England for two millions sterling. The papers are filled with the elections which came off on the 14th. The feeling against Spain is still very strong, and whilst many advocate the good offices of the United States, there is a large party whose 'voice is still for war.' Before the departure of the mail the defeat of Saa was known in Santiago. We are happy to perceive that Gen. La Torre has arrived in town after a prolonged absence, during which many unpleasant reports were circulated. We understand the gallant officer brings despatches with which he hopes to clear himself before Government. We never for a moment doubted the General's honor. His noble conduct in Paraguay was more than sufficient to refute the grossest charges of our Provincial magnates.

Sr. Salvandech has been appointed to the important post of Manager of the Italian Branch Bank in Colonia. Since Mr. King has established his headquarters there, Colonia has shot rapidly a head, and must, ere long, become a place of considerable maritime importance. Numerous British mechanics are constantly employed there at high wages, and we have no doubt, if Mr. Salvandech can speak English he will find ample business for a Savings Bank. The magnificent steam-transport Leopoldo, has been shipping horses for the Brazilian army in Paraguay. Four hundred have already been booked for Itapiru by this and the Brazieria, and still the demand for quadrupeds and fodder continues. From this it would appear that the Brazilians are at last going to show us all a move.

The 'Correo del Domingo,' of its kind one of the best papers published in Buenos Ayres, has lately under-

gone great improvement. It is not only interesting, but highly instructive. The translation in last week's number of Byron's 'Parasita,' by Vedia, reflects the greatest credit on the translator. The version, while highly poetic, is as literal and close to the original as such works allow, and shows that Vedia fully appreciated the poetic talents of Byron. This reminds us, that of all our poets Byron is the most popular abroad, nor without reason, for if our pitiful spirit prevents our thorough appreciation of his works, the gay and gallant people of the south, equally influenced by love and hate, are his most enthusiastic admirers. This is not the only Argentine translation from Byron; the 'Giaour' was admirably translated into Spanish some time back by a young Portefio, whose name we now forget. This argues a taste for English literature, which is springing up in Buenos Ayres.

Speaking of artists in our yesterday's paper, we mentioned Dr. Epaminonda Chiama. This young man has another painting on exhibition: the subject is 'A Rancho in the Pampa' with a 'bisacha' or two in the foreground. We are sorry to say that the artist is not so much at home in his camp scenes; one of the 'bisachas,' it is true, is fairly done, but his fellow in the background, though represented in a natural and passive mood, is carelessly executed, as is also the whole perspective. We do not say this to discourage, but to animate, the artist; he possesses talent, but this painting seems to have been done in a hurry.

We received a parting visit yesterday from our friends Messrs. Phillips and Wells. These gentlemen embark to-day for the United States. We wish our excellent countrymen a happy voyage and speedy return. Mr. Cabreanu's auction came off yesterday. Things sold high. Auctions are now so fashionable that it seems better to pay the upholsterer a visit and have the furniture first hand. The rebel General Saa, after the defeat by Panero, retreated towards Chile accompanied by 500 men. When he arrived at the Andes, he found the passes closed by some Argentine emigrants who endeavoured to force him back; a brisk engagement ensued, in which the emigrants were defeated, and Saa is said to be now in Chile.

CHASCOMUS. The health of the Guardia continues good. The work of the sanitary commission proved almost a sinecure. There is still, however, much room for improvement. Drainage and paved streets are unknown here, and it would be a great boon were the principal street, Calle Buenos Ayres, paved, so that in wet weather the traffic, which has so increased of late, need not be suspended. On emerging from the railway station the view is comically picturesque, on account of a large sheet of stagnant water to be seen filling up nearly the breadth of the whole street. A stranger on passing through Chascomus the other day inquired if this was the 'laguna.' It is supposed that the new store opened at this part takes its name from the view of the pool, being called Almacén de Bella Vista. Instead of removing the beef booths as an eyesore and a plague spot, we notice that one has been recently repaired: this certainly shows an anxious desire to improve the appearance and preserve the health of the place.

The camps are in fine order, and some flocks have already yielded 20 per cent. increase, so that farmers are in better humor than they were a few months ago. The price of sheep rules low: a sale of 700, which cost four years \$45, was effected at \$18; others sold at \$30 to remain on the ground. A good many new houses have been erected lately, especially around the railway station; and Mr. Reeves of the English Hotel finds it necessary to build three additional rooms, including a billiard-room, owing to the increased pressure of business. The splendid mansion of Messrs. Peto Betts, overlooking the laguna has at last been purchased by Mr. Thomas Armstrong in \$275,000 and by time reared the rent gives 9 per cent per annum on the purchase money.

SALADEROS. To the Editors of the Standard. Gentlemen,

In Friday's paper you published an article by a victimised saladerista, entitled "A voice from the Saladeros," and which gives a very lucid account of the evils attending the closing of said establishments. At the same time the author makes a serious mistake when he says, "let the saladerista be prevented from throwing their solid, not liquid, refuse into the river. The brine, far from being infectious, is, on the contrary, a preservative. The water, purified by the fire that produces it, is fetid, but not unwholesome. The proof is, that neither now, nor in the time of the yellow fever, have any cases occurred there. The only remedy to prevent the decomposition of the Riachuelo is, as explained a short time since in your paper, the doing away with throwing either solid or liquid refuse into the water."

The saladeristas say—"What are we to do with it; we cannot throw it about on the ground?" We would tell them—"Evaporate all the liquid refuse to dryness, and then mix it with the solid, thereby making an excellent artificial guano, which could be exported to less favored countries." If the saladeristas should not make a fortune by it, they would at least pay all the expenses of preparation, and have something over. The extra cost would only be the vats required for the evaporation and fuel. Guano owes its nutritive properties to the phosphates and nitrogenous products, principally ammoniacal salts. The 'agua de cola,' and the blood would furnish the nitrogen, and the bone-ash the phosphate. By mixing in proper proportions these products, they would obtain an excellent guano, which, I am perfectly sure, would fully repay all the outlay on preparing it.

By doing this, the saladeristas would benefit themselves and the population of this city, by doing away with the disagreeable stench which so often (perfunctus) the air when a south-easter blows. Hoping that the idea I have given may be made use of, I remain, Gentlemen, Yours truly, CHARLES MURRAY.

PRUSSIA. Berlin, March 23. England hesitating to join Austria, Russia, and France advising Turkey to cede Crete has had the effect of causing the three mediating Powers to delay the formal execution of their purpose. In addition to this motive for reconsidering the step they were about to take, the late publication of the offensive and defensive treaties between Northern and Southern Germany will, it is hoped in this capital, tend to prevent an understanding between the three Empires which, were it to be further developed, would, in the very nature of things, not be directed against Turkey alone. In the meantime Russian troops are moving south, an event which in the "Moscow Gazette" is frankly accounted for by an alleged "necessity of supporting the demands of the Czar with regard to the condition of the Christian Rayah."

In Berlin and all Germany Count Bismark has reached the highest step on the ladder of repown in consequence of divulging the above-mentioned treaties. Indeed, the merest glance at the situation in which he managed to secure these important arrangements is enough to bring out his diplomatic energy and skill in strong relief. Notwithstanding his decided victory in the field, Napoleon's threat to cross the Rhine had obliged him to spare Austria from destruction, and confine his uniting tendencies to the country north of the Main. At this very juncture, when success and failure were so cruelly blended, the elastic genius of the Count discovered a ready means of redress, and, by whispering to Bavaria that but a few days previous a portion of her territory had been demanded by France but refused by Prussia, easily convinced her on which side her safety lay. The very Prussia which would not permit Bavaria's being dismembered now offered to guarantee her integrity, provided she would place her armies under Prussian command in the event of war. There is now not much sagacity needed to perceive that to accept the proposal was the safest course for Bavaria to adopt; but there was no common talent displayed in discovering the fact so early in the day, driving the hostile State into a corner, and with the clangour of arms still resounding, making a useful ally out of an annoying enemy.

The King having yesterday attained his 70th year, rejoicing in good health and crowned with victory, the day was celebrated with more than usual pomp. To-day His Majesty attended a magnificent carrousel given in his honour by the aristocracy. Eighty ladies and gentlemen of the Court, in gorgeous fancy costumes, and mounted on choice steeds, went through the figures of several quadrilles, and performed numerous other equestrian games and feats in the presence of la crème de la crème. Since the marriage of the late Princess Charlotte with Prince Nicholas of Russia such a splendid spectacle has not been witnessed here. To mark the day in a more serious manner the King ordered that the cathedral begun and left in a very infant state by his predecessor should be completed. If the original plan is executed, it will be one of the grandest ecclesiastical structures in Germany, and a particular ornament to Berlin, a city too poor in olden, and too lukewarm in modern times, to erect fine churches. As a fresh improvement upon the prevailing system of decorations, a large number of ladies who distinguished themselves in nursing and providing for the sick and wounded during the war were on the King's birthday, presented with the Order of Queen Louise. This is the first time that such a mark of distinction, hitherto confined to the Court ladies, has been benignantly conferred upon the public generally.

The King has now distributed the one million and a half thalers placed at his disposal for the heroes of the war. Count Bismark has received 400,000 thalers; General Roon, the Minister of War, 300,000 thalers; and Generals Moltke, Steinmetz, Vogel, and Herwarth each 200,000. In the letters accompanying the gift the King is said to have requested the recipients to invest it in estates.

PROGRESS OF VICTORIA.

The volume of statistics recently issued by the Registrar-General of this Colony records the excess of arrivals over departures in 1865 at 5,681. The number of immigrants into the colony in each of the years 1864 and 1865 was 36,156 and 30,976. Of the latter number 25,872 were unassisted. The population of the colony in 1865 was 616,375, including 260,300 persons at the goldfields. By the census of 1851, taken shortly before the discovery of gold, the population was only 77,345. The number of births was 25,915, being in the proportion of 12 per 1,000 of population. The deaths were 10,461, or in the ratio of 17 per 1,000 of population. The number of marriages was 4,497, or in the ratio of 729 per 1,000 persons living. The value of the imports in 1865 was £13,150,748 against £14,974,815 in 1864. The exports amounted to £13,150,748 against £13,808,384 in the previous year. The value of the colonial produce exported in each of the years 1864 and 1865 was a follows:—Gold, £6,206,237 and £6,190,317; wool, £3,250,128 and £3,315,109; tallow, £60,230 and £15,566; hides and skins, £102,724 and £83,361. The receipts from the revenue of 1865 were £3,058,338, and the disbursements for the service of the year were £2,227,747. The Customs' revenue was £1,256,686. The public debt on the 31st of December, 1865, was £8,733,445. A detailed report of agricultural statistics for the year ending March 31, 1866, records the number of holdings at 20,063, or 1,708 more than in the previous year. The average size of each holding was 338 acres, that of each farm was 102 acres. The average area in occupation to each person was 108 acres or 108 acres to every ten persons. Nine years since the average size of holdings was 206 acres, that of farms was 90 acres; and the average area occupied by each person was 4 1/2 acres; 72 per cent. of the occupiers were freeholders, either wholly or partially, and 28 per cent. were tenants. The area of the entire colony was 55,571,840 acres; 6,785,225 acres were occupied, of which 5,337,962 were enclosed; about 530,196 acres were under cultivation. The 178,628 acres under wheat produced 3,514,227 bushels, which was very satisfactory, as the years was one of drought. The extent of area under vines increased from 13,027 acres in 1865 to 18,063 acres in 1866, but the number of vines, including cuttings failing to strike, owing to drought. The grapes gathered amounted to 49,749 cwt., of which 31,686 cwt. were made into wine or brandy, and produced 176,959 gallons of the former, and 795 gallons of the latter. The live stock returns record 121,051 horses in the colony in 1865-6, 121,337 cattle, 8,835,380 sheep, and 75,869 pigs. These figures, as compared with those of the previous year, show an increase in the number of horses and sheep, but a decrease in the cattle of 19,288, and in the number of pigs of 37,661. At Melbourne the mean temperature of the year was 56-9 deg., and the rainfall was 15-9 inches.
