THE PARIS EXHIBITION. PRODUCTS FROM LA PLATA.

LETTER OF M. PALLIERE.

31 Rue Veron, Paris, 23rd April. To the Editors of the Standard

My dear friends—

Another chapter on the Exhibition, and now, according to promise, I shall say a few words about the Argentine section. It is composed of three stalls placed alternately with as many Brazilian stalls, all in a line. It has caused me the most profound regret to see the condition of these stalls, for nothing could be more miserable than the way in which the interests of B. Ayres are represented.

The River Plate is well-known to the merchants of Antwerp, Havre, and Liverpool; but what idea can the general public form of a country, from seeing two or three arrobas of wool in a glass-case, placed alongside some bad samples of Paraguay tobacco? Why not also have a chart shewing the railways of B. Ayres?

I have not yet seen the Brazilian stalls, as they are not yet ready (you know Brazil is the slowest country in the world for everything in life), but I believe it will not be behind-hand. The worst part of the Exhibition is what they call the "savage section," including the part allotted to the Spanish Republics, and the more I reflect on it, the more I wonder how this has turned out so badly.

In the 2nd stall, which is much larger, the three sides are occupied by glass-cases, which also have a very bleak aspect: a dozen ponchos, some homemade shirts from Paraguay and Cordoba, some riendas trenzadas or gaucha bridles, and other handiwork—voila tout! The middle of the stall is occupied by three wretched horses badly stuffed with straw and harnessed; one is surmounted by the figure of a gaucha, holding the bolas in his hand; the second has a gaucha, and his wife en ancas; and the 3rd bears a little boy who is represented taking a mate-cup from a gaucha-girl who stands beside the horse.

glass-cases on three sides, and it was intended to leave the front open, but it has unluckily been blocked up, so as to shut out the view of the inside. Chile has a large quantity of minerals, some very common wool and a sample of cotton. Nicaragua exhibits specimens of gold and silver, Indian handiwork, stuffed birds and insects. Venezuela boasts an urn found in the cavern of Atures (on the banks of the cataract of the same name on the Orinoco.) The rest of the stall has cases filled with Indian curiosities, serpents, silk-worms, coca, and vanilla of various woods, tobacco and saffron. Finally in one corner are the wools of B. Ayres and Montevideo, viz. from the estancias Maua, Germania, Mallmann, Newton, Wilfrid Latham, Solanet, Martinez de Hoiz, Du Portal, Drablot &c.

As for me, who love the River Plate as a second mother-country, nothing could be more afflicting than to see this confused collection, which gives so miserable and false an idea of our young Republic: it seems an exhibition of South America before the time of Columbus, and Calfuera could have sent quite as much as we have to shew. The Argentine Confederation, which had so much interest to stand alone and shew the products of a rich and rising country, is placed on the same footing with Paraguay.

If I had been entrusted with the Argentine exhibition I would have set to work very differently. I would have selected a place for myself in one of the three stalls, instead of being in three parts. I would have come out very strong in wools, and put the Argentine arms on a large shield over the stall. I would have had dry, salted, and tanned hides; and put on each of the wool-samples the words "clip of 1866," so many thousand pounds, worth so many francs; so many dry hides, worth so much in hard money; so many salted do., weight and value. On a black-board I would have put the import and export tables. I would have also had a panoramic view of B. Ayres and its port with a return of shipping and tonnage, and the daily papers of your city pasted on either side. People then could form a proper idea of B. Ayres as it really is.

A universal exhibition is not a cabinet of natural history, to contain merely Indian-wove stuffs, serpents and stuffed birds: it is rather a condit of human intellects, each bringing all its forces into play, with all the world for a judge; and ill luck next befal him who, instead of putting forth all his powers; shews only his weak points. Certes, if we had Domingo Sarmiento at Paris, he would not have left Buenos Ayres to be represented by 'chiripas,' and its very name confused with Paraguay and Venezuela.

Since my last letter the Exhibition has been completed in many of its details, although not yet entirely finished, but the general appearance cannot be much improved on. The trees are beginning to bud, and the parterres of the park will soon be in full bloom. The machine section is one of the greatest attractions, and most of the machinery is in full play: thus the English and North Americans have great steam-pumps which raise incredible volumes of water; and in another place you see steam-saws working away. In the park there is a nicely carved wooden building, containing 25 beautiful Russian horses, the Emperor's stallions, with strange harness and droshkies, all neatly finished.

Belgium, Holland, and Switzerland, have erected pavilions for themselves in the park, where you will see fine galleries of paintings, but of this I shall speak another time. The English coffee-houses are the richest of all, and the proprietors hit on the lucky notion of putting a dozen bewitching bar-maids behind the counter. I assure you this is the best part of the English section, and always crowded with visitors and admirers. Switzerland has just opened her section, being behind time, but displays wonderful taste in the arrangement and decoration of her stalls. In my next I intend to give you a full account of the English quarter. Yours very truly PALLIERE.

THE GUALEGUAYCHU ENGLISH RACES.

(FROM A CORRESPONDENT.)

Our first meeting of which you were previously advised came off with great success on Thursday the 30th May. The weather was delightfully fine and the spectators mustered in large numbers, amongst whom were many of the fair sex (and here it is not out of place to remark that the ladies of Entre Rios in respect to beauty, esprit, and elegance of toilet, can compete with those of any province in the country) graced the meeting with their presence. Great credit is due to the indefatigable secretary for the arrangements he made for the comfort and accommodation of the ladies, who had a good view of the different races from the temporary stand which was erected for the occasion. The jockeys were turned out in a style worthy of Newmarket or Punchestown. The police arrangements for keeping the course clear were excellent, and the natives seemed to enter thoroughly into the spirit of the sport.

In the evening nearly 60 gentlemen sat down to a sumptuous repast, provided at the head-quarters of the club. Don Renaldo Villar our energetic Gefé Politico being in the chair. Our Queen, the Governor of the province, General Urquiza, the Standard and other toasts were most enthusiastically received. The day following the races was devoted to the national game of Sortija at which the Englishmen distinguished themselves.

Loafer jumped off with the lead with the rest, well up in a ruck, till coming into the straight, when Pescador, with Waterloo waiting on him, gradually drew away from his horses, and, after a most exciting struggle, won by a short head. Four other horses ran.

The Grand Gualeguaychu Steeple-chase. \$5 each, with \$50 added. 1 mile and 1/2.

Mr. Risdon's Adios (owner)..... 1 Mr. Taylor's Emigrant (owner).... 2 Mr. Forrest's Scotia (owner)..... 3 Mr. Edmiston's Fee-to-fum (owner) 4 Mr. W. Shand's Pioneer (owner).... 5 3 to 1 agst. Pioneer; 4 to 1 agst. Adios; 5 to 1 agst. Fee-to-fum. Emigrant, pulling double, rushed to the front and took the first fence in front of the 'stand' (a still post and rail) well, the others following close together. Emigrant continued his lead to the turn, where he tried to bolt, and was passed in succession by the others. Pioneer now took the lead and cleared the brook (a regular yawner) in gallant style, about half a length in advance of Fee-to-fum, Adios and Scotia close together, a length behind. Pioneer increased his lead up the hill, but the severity of the pace told upon him, and he came back to his horses. All the horses refusing at the next fence enabled Emigrant to come up, and getting first over, again resumed the lead. But it was of short duration, as he refused at the next fence, and his place was taken by Adios, who clearing the remaining obstacles without a mistake, won easily by three lengths, the rest coming in pretty close together.

Six other horses ran. Jacksonian Plate. A Piece of Plate to the winner. 1 mile and 1/2. Over hurdles.

4 to 1 agst. Maori Chief; 5 to 1 agst. Zou-Zou. Maori Chief made running as far as the turn of the lands, when Scotia came to the front, but coming down a regular 'buster,' Maori Chief resumed his former position, and never after being headed, won by six lengths.

THE INDIANS AT MELINCUE.

SAD FATE OF THE LA FLOR FAMILY.

The unfortunate Sor La Flor, whose daughter and niece were carried off some weeks ago by the Indians, from Mr. Armstrong's lands, on the Santa Fé frontier, called on us yesterday, to tell his sad story and enlist our advocacy, seeing that he can get little or no redress from the authorities.

On the 23rd of April two bands of Indians, each numbering about 150, invaded the frontier lands close to Fort Melincue, and after murdering 5 Christians, carried off 25 captives, mostly young women. Among these unhappy victims were the daughter and niece of Sr. La Flor, aged respectively 11 and 19 years, the latter only recently married: they were escaping in terror from the cholera at Rosario, towards the estancia, at the very time that La Flor was trying to rally the neighbors to save their cattle from the savages. The garrison of Melincue, 100 men provided with small arms and artillery, looked on passively at the devastating barbarians and refused to sally out of the fort: the commander Carbone, was not there, and the horses were in bad condition. The Indians slept that night within 5 leagues of the fort. La Flor, on learning the loss of his daughter and niece, got 18 neighbors together, and begged for 50 or even 20 men from the fort, but in vain. Next day the Indians drove their booty of sheep and cattle quietly in sight of the fort, and were not molested in their return to the Pampas.

It happened that one of the savages, being thrown by his horse, remained behind and was captured by La Flor: his name was Pancho Francisco, formerly of Cristo's Indians, and now of Calfuera's tribe: this captive indignantly denied that his tribe had been the offender, conducted La Flor through his entire village, shewed him the women and cattle, and convinced him that his tribe had taken neither booty nor captives.

At last the captive Indian confessed that he belongs to the tribe of Calfuera, so famous for marauding excursions, although in the pay of the Argentine Government. Coliqueu caused to be drawn up an ACTA, duly witnessed, showing his innocence; this document is in the War-office, and the Minister seems little inclined to publish it, or throw any light on the subject. The anxiety of the afflicted father to push active measures for pursuit and investigation may well be imagined, yet he is told with the greatest non-chalance "not to make himself uneasy."

Meantime La Flor's captive has been sent to Azul, and he himself intends immediately starting for Salinas Grandes to search for the poor girls. There is in B. Ayres an "Association for redemption of Indian captives," under the presidency of D. Bernabé Molina: it was founded some 20 years ago by General Escañada and has always been maintained by the wealthy estancieros.

Of course Sor Molina and his colleagues at once hastened to aid this poor man to get back his girls? Nothing of the kind! They referred him to the War-office; the war-office sent him to—

And will it be believed that this most sacred deposit of moneys given for the redemption of captives was recently in danger of being devoted to soldiers disabled in the war against Paraguay!

What has Government to do with the funds of a charitable association or the exercise of its functions in relief of the afflicted. Here is a poor man, whose case is truly heart-rending. We call upon Mr. Bernabé Molina to do his duty, as an Englishman would feel bound to do under the circumstances, to send out a commissioner to Calfuera's tents and purchase the girls back. Owing to the wretched state of the frontiers we cannot be surprised at such horrible occurrences as those recently enacted by the Indians, but we can at least insist on Charitable associations doing their duty.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The child's-play and nonsense that is going on at Tuyuti baffles comprehension. None can believe; none can credit the news brought down by the Espigador. Here we are all anxiously awaiting a termination of the war; a wind-up one way or the other, and yet the public of Buenos Ayres is treated to the latest news from headquarters in the shape of both armies amusing themselves with music, dancing, and salves, to celebrate the anniversary of a 'two sided victory.' Now it requires more than human patience to stomach such military tom-foolery. Far better for Caxias to have opened fire on the dancing crowd of Paraguayans with causter and grape than tolerate their example to be imitated by his own men. Then again, is gunpowder so cheap, does it cost so little, that the whole cargo of a gunboat is to be spent in firing off salutes to the moon? Happy for Caxias that he has neither a Wellington nor a Napoleon to deal with. Time is too precious, gunpowder too expensive, public patience too much exhausted, to trifle either with the enemy or the interests of the countries which have placed him in command, and no more humiliating or ludicrous 'role' could the allied com-

mander play at present than that of Tyrtaeus amongst the palm-trees. If the Commander cannot try to attack the enemy and plant his colours on the mud fortification of Curupaity, let him at least spare us the affliction of this "Pop goes the Weazel" business in front of the enemy's lines, either that or tear off his epaulettes, throw his cocked hat into the river, and assume the character of "Sam Slick," for which possibly, for aught we know, he may have rare qualifications.

The newspapers in town, with the exception of the Nacion, cry down the President's message, and some of our colleagues cut the document up with the greatest severity: there seems to be a deal of party spirit mixed up in the business; from which we hold aloof. But it is really surprising that the President omitted to call the attention of the house to the Indians; the state of the Santa Fé frontier calls for some measures, and no subject demands more immediate attention than this. Then again the shocking state of the Port; the utter absence of all navigation laws in the rivers; the lamentable and filthy condition of Buenos Ayres, the capital of the Republic. These are matters which should be urged on the attention of Congress, for they cry out for Legislative reform. Still a man cannot at all times speak out his mind, and the reticence of the President on these topics may have been through a desire to avoid intimidating the members by making out such a heavy list of business. We believe he found as much difficulty in hitting on what to say as thinking what not to say; far too much importance seems to be attached to these inaugural addresses, which in reality amount to nothing. Had the President told the Deputies that they had a narrow escape of their lives in coming down the river, and might have got snagged at the top of the mole-head by some of the snuken anchors, possibly a special committee might have been named to consider the paragraph; or had II. E. emerging from red tape obscurity told the house that a disconsolate father from Rosario whose child had been swept off last month by the Indians, was now in this city trying to raise a subscription to ransom his poor captive child; what would the Congress members have thought of such a departure from all Government-house precedent? The gallery might have cheered, but the Senators and Deputies would doubtless have been 'riled.' Such matters must be kept out of inaugural addresses, unless the innovator has the courage to risk the indignation and anger of the house. The President's address is open to the most severe criticism by an English public, but as a Spanish document we hold it is faultless!

The patent law seems to have been passed too soon. Some parties have applied at the stamp-office for their respective patents, but found to their astonishment that no printed forms are as yet ready. The tax is regarded by all as invidious and odious, and we fully concur with our colleague the Nacion in what it states respecting only half a year's tax being collectable. The very slight tax imposed on lawyers is also much commented on; a wholesale grocer of much experience assures us that some lawyers make over one million of paper dollars per annum.

We have to return our best thanks to an Argentine friend for a very rare curiosity from Patagonia, namely, a square piece of 'tosca' with various shells imbedded in it, and dug out from the bottom of a well, some sixty feet below the surface. The firing in the woods continues at Tuyuti; every night surprises, picket fighting, palm-tree shooting is kept up. The cold weather has set in, and camp life anything but agreeable; most of the soldiers have mud cabins, and as fire-wood is abundant large fires are kept up.

The Diario de Rio Janeiro has published a very able article on the Presidential question in the Argentine Republic. The article in question is a reply to the remarks of the Tribuna respecting Dr. Elizalde as candidate. We regret we have no space to reproduce this well written rejoinder of our Rio colleague.

We call the attention of the public to the fact that the old wooden bridge in Calle Defensa, the nest-hole of every filth, still exists. Last week a little child, the daughter of a poor washerwoman who lives in that neighborhood, died of cholera. It is idle to ask the Municipality to do anything; if the nuisance existed anywhere else the public would set fire to it and do away with the plague spot; here in Buenos Ayres there is no possible relief.

Respecting the brewer's fire in Calle Bolivar on Saturday night there are various rumours as to its origin. Some think that the floors heated, others that one of the peones of the establishment committed arson. The whole top part of the establishment was burned down. Mr. Hopkins' petition about the continuance of the American steam-line from Rio to this port will be closed on Friday; it has met with signatures in every class of our community. All

the merchants and capitalists have signed, and at our office the sheep-farmers North, South, East and West have signed; all agree with the measure and hope to see it realized.

On Friday night, 7th inst. and again on Sunday, 9th, there will be a German concert at the Coliseum, along with an exhibition of the large Scriptural transparencies already shewn at Montevideo. These pictures of the Life of Our Saviour are much admired, and we believe the proceeds of the exhibition are for the very laudable purpose of building a German church at Montevideo. A concert by our German friends is always a grand inducement, and the object in view will be an additional reason for all foreigners to attend. We understand the Friday concert will be a private one; the second will be public, and tickets may be had at MacKerns, price \$30.

SIR A. ALISON ON THE STATE OF EUROPE.

In opening a volunteer drill hall at Glasgow, Sir Archibald Alison, historian of Europe, spoke at some length on the subject of our national armaments. Referring to the present state of matters abroad, he said—"Europe, in Mr. Disraeli's words, has become a 'great camp,' and this very day the French funds have sunk two-and-a-half per cent., from the rumours of an approaching rupture. Now, this is the state of affairs when the volunteer question comes forward, and in common with the whole empire we have to reflect on the present alarming state of public affairs, and the way in which we can best escape their disastrous effects. Everything depends upon taking the right way of doing this. Every day you hear the continued 'I hope in God we may keep out of it. Let the continental Powers fight out their own battles without any interference.' All right, gentlemen, if you are sure that will keep us out. But will it do that? Rely upon it, it will not. A dreadful war is about to commence on the continent, which will, to all appearances, terminate in the undisputed supremacy of one Power. What such Power will be, whether Prussia, Germany, or France, as yet lies buried in the womb of time; but of one thing we may be well assured, that whichever gains on the Continent will ere long turn its victorious arms against us. The simple enthusiasts who think that commercial interests will govern the earth and arrest the arms of conquest will then find how miserably they have been mistaken; and power won by the sword will never cease to make use of the sword for its extension. Look at Rome in ancient, and France under the First Napoleon, in modern times. The Power victorious on the Continent will, beyond all questions, turn its arm against this country, the only remaining check on its ambition. Besides their natural and unavoidable inclination, all the great Powers of Europe have wrongs to avenge, inflicted on them by Britain in former times, and which they will willingly seize the first opportunity of requiting. We have paid two visits to France within four centuries, and have occupied Paris; and her sons would gladly return the compliment at London. We have made a long visit to Russia at Sebastopol, and she will always feel awkward till she has returned it to us at Portsmouth. Our victorious arms have been sent to Washington; and the Americans are only waiting for England's difficulty to let their standard be seen in London. Contemplating, then, as likely, I may say almost certain, such a coalition against us as no very distant period, what we have to consider is what means we have to resist it? And here an observation of the utmost importance occurs, to which, gentlemen I earnestly request your particular attention. It is, that the application of iron to the plating of vessels, and ensing all ships of war in armour which is impervious save to 200 or 300-pounders, has not only made a change in the art of naval war, but has, at one blow, deprived us, so far as available ships go, of our naval superiority. Three Trafalgars won by the French or Russians, the Germans, or Americans, could not do this as effectually as the use of iron vessels has done. Our great wooden fleet, so long the pride of Britain, the terror of the world, lies stored up in Portsmouth harbour, or on earth only in maintaining any maritime contest. Those noble three-deckers, such as the Duke of Wellington, would be sent to the bottom by a single gun carrying a 300lb. ball. We have, at one blow, virtually lost the fleet which has been growing up for 200 years. For the construction of a new fleet of iron-clads we must wait for time and money, just as all the other Powers must do. We have lost our start in the race; we must all set off anew and abreast. This is the real secret of the vast sums voted annually for the navy, and the general complaint that we have so little to show for them. We have been laying the foundations of a fleet which can be as yet only in its infancy. Other nations are just as far on as we are. It is doubtful whether our royal navy has yet equals that of America. United

to that of Russia, the latter is decidedly superior to anything we could bring forward. If a forest of hostile iron-clads appear off Spithead or Plymouth, rain will be the forty or fifty noble sail of the line lying in our harbours. Everything will depend not on the fifty old wooden line-of-battle-ships, but on the eight or ten fine iron-clads. This great change has entirely altered our relative position in any naval war; and unless steps are taken, and that speedily, to counterbalance its effects, it may safely be predicted that evil days are coming upon us, and that the days of our national independence are numbered."

To the Editors of the Standard.

Gentlemen, As I should be very sorry to incur, without sufficient reason, the hatred or ill-will of any person, especially of an old acquaintance, if not friend, I beg of you to insert the following in the Standard at the earliest opportunity. It is but a fair and true statement of the participation in your Saturday's communication that can be laid to my charge.

I do not wish by any means to screen my responsibility, but I must declare, and you are well aware of it, that the report of the Athletic Games at Palermo, as published in Saturday's Standard, was not what you received from me. Nor is this retiring before the enemy, but said in my own justification, and you can testify to the fact, as also Mr. Hughes, who actually saw my report in the printer's hand, that I had not the slightest participation in the running comments after each race, or even in the subsequent amalgamation of the two reports. With the exception of the few casual remarks, which apparently have given so much offence, the report is mine, and I am ready to abide by it in any sense whatever, inasmuch as I cannot possibly see any just cause or reason for resentment.

In Mr. Cooper's gentlemanly but pointed letter, I see something much to be annoyed at. If I am prosy, I am sorry for his sake, I certainly am no poet; yet I do not think the Palermo Games of so Olympian a cast, nor, with all respect for his great athletic powers, Mr. Cooper such a Milo as to require the peu of a Pindar to pass their fame down to posterity. If he ever bear the weight of a tolerable-sized heifer, let alone the bull, I shall certainly deem him worthy of immortality—

"I borrow my comparisons from clay, Doing clay myself. Let those spirits be Offended with such base low likenesses, We know their poets are nobler far than these." I make this and other quotations out of compliment to the highly poetical character of my honorable adversary, in the hope he will allow me to cite what otherwise I could not possibly compose.

As to Mr. Cooper's knowledge of Ancient Greece, being a competent and correct writer, it must be very great, but on reflection he will confess that women in this country are not absolute beauties much less slaves.

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
