CONGRESS—SENATE. FIVE OF SENATORS FOR ABSENCE.

MINISTER GONSALEZ'S OLD ACCOUNTS OF 1864. SENATOR PIÑERO ON THE PROVINCIAL PATENTE-TAX.

D. MARCOS PAZ NOT YET RESIGNED. Yesterday there were nearly twenty spectators in the bar of the house, which is usually empty, and the cause of such attendance was due to the rumor that Vice-President Paz would present his resignation.

The Committee of Petitions submitted a project for cutting off the salary of all Senators who may be absent more than 8 days during session of Congress (even with the permission of the Chamber). A monotonous discussion, as to the formalities in such cases, ensued; but it was finally agreed to hold it over for the order of the day, next day's session.

Senator Piñero called attention to the new Provincial Law of Patentes, which he held to be illegal, as the Legislature of B. Ayres has nothing to do with the capital.

The Hon. members then rose, not without an evident effort, and wrapping their clocks tightly around them, adjourned for cuarto inter-medio, to that place where smoking and mate form an interval in parliamentary labors.

THE TUYUTI FLOODS. There never was a period when the public of Buenos Ayres knew less of the doings at headquarters than at present. Letters come down by the steamers, with a kind of military day-book, giving everything that transpires at the top of the watch-tower from daybreak to sunset, and often an account of how the men passed the night.

The heavy rain storm which visited the city on Wednesday was accompanied by thunder and lightning, which descending on an alto house in the Calle Parque, almost proved fatal to the residents. Some of the children were playing about in one of the passages, when a stroke of lightning fell right at their feet, scattering around them the bricks and mortar which it tore from the adjoining wall.

Some Paraguayan deserter, possibly a spy, tells the Commander that Curupaity is so flooded that it is deserted; he believes the statement, judges the enemy's condition by his own, which is a very grave error, and at once orders up the whole fleet to take possession of the place; the fleet obeys, and just as the unfortunate and condoling Brazilians come within range, a murderous fire is opened upon them.

An important feature of the news from above is the reception of a photograph of Gen. Urquiza by Caxias, and an invitation by Port Alegre to the Commander in Chief to attend a grand 'Te Deum' for the disappearance of cholera. Lopez is in Humaita, and all Paraguay prays that the rains may continue.

EDITOR'S TABLE. The resignation of Vice-President Paz was the great topic in town yesterday. Although it was known the matter was to come up before Congress, the galleries were empty, and for the first time for years the public attention was concentrated on what was doing in the house.

therefore is not eligible: The question is regarded by the city politicians as one of the most vital importance, although up to the present the office of Vice-President seems to have been of secondary importance.

Dr. Elizalde, would, like the Sheriff in Ireland, be entitled to receive from the hands of the President of the Senate a pair of white kid gloves, emblematic of the spotless character of Argentine foreign relations; but such customs as these never take root in this country.

At the Debating Society on Monday night an Honorary member read a paper, to the very high satisfaction of even the most fastidious member; the reader is evidently no novice in the art, and the exact intonation, and correct cadences were the reader's own, and elicited marked applause.

The Argentine Bank is now collecting the second, third and fourth calls, on the shares. The Bank business is going a-head, money plenty, but rumor says that the Government is going to pass a law requiring stamps on cheques.

The export of gold from Rio has commenced; from 13th to 23rd of May, total shipped 195,000 pats., of which only 17,000 pats. came to the River Plate.

THE ACCIDENT TO THE SYLPH. In consequence of some remarks published in the Standard, respecting the accident to the steamer Sylph, Mr. George Taylor, the engineer on board, called on us yesterday with pieces of the broken piston, to show that they had been previously broken, and furthermore, that the iron was too thin.

The Sylph was built at Hull for a blockade-runner in the year 1864. She never ran, however, and was then put on the Thames as a passenger-boat, where she plied for sixteen months. She was then sold to Captain Harrison. I came out as second engineer, and my son as third; the first engineer has gone home, and will probably bring out another steamer.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs seems to have been the first this year to publish his report. We notice that the Argentine Government is on the most friendly relations with every country under the sun, save Paraguay. There have been some slight questions with the foreign powers about seizing horses for the war, which induces one to suppose that some of the carriage horses of the foreign Ministers have been walked off with, and ergo hackney coaches have come in vogue; but all these questions have been happily arranged, and if the Paraguayan war could be brought to a termination, the distinguished Minister of Foreign Affairs,

GEORGE TAYLOR, First Engineer. ROSARIO. (FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.) The following is the Message of the Governor, Mr. Oroño, on the opening of the Provincial Legislature at Santa Fé, on the 25th May.

Honorable Representatives, Again we meet each other in this august assembly, and our first thought should be to offer up our gratitude to Divine Providence for having extricated us from the difficulties and dangers that have embarrassed the onward march of this province as well as all the rest of the Republic.

The aspect which the province of Santa Fé presents at the present time is a profound and fruitful lesson to those communities which, impelled by personal ambition and paltry intrigues, have again been precipitated into the slough of civil war, the origin, and only origin, of our poverty and retrogression for more than half a century.

Santa Fé also paid her tribute to this characteristic evil of our past history, and served more than once as the arena in which men and parties, ambitions and principles, met for mutual destruction.

More than two generations of men have passed away with sterile and profitless lives, because they never learned to comprehend that intestine wars never were, and never can be, adequate means towards resolving questions that are purely of an economical nature, and the solution of which must be sought for only in the inspirations of the patriot, and in the calm reflection of the Cabinet.

Two short years have been sufficient to unroll in our people those sentiments that throw a halo of dignity over the man and the citizen. These two years, in which the love of peace has been incessantly inculcated, have witnessed the augmentation of our population and the value of our agricultural products; the progress of our various industries, and the increase of our commerce; the considerable rise in the value of lands, fountain of our future prosperity; the establishment of new colonies that will attract a still greater affluence of emigrants, the great want of our extensive and empty territory; the opening of new and easy means of communication, which will serve for fresh arteries for commerce, and augment the vitality of capital and industry.

the inestimable benefits of industry, of morality, and civilization! With these sentiments, and filled with the most flattering hopes for the future, I take pleasure in declaring—"That the Legislative Sessions for the year 1867 are now open."

THE WAR IN THE NORTH. CORRESPONDENCE OF MATTO. Tuyuti, May 24th.

Everything was in readiness to make a grand attack on the enemy, by the 15th of May, but the Cholera Morbus broke out on April 26th, at Paso de la Patria, and in three days spread through the whole army with terrible ravages: at Curuzú, no fewer than 4,000 men were prostrated, and of this number 2400 died, including 87 officers. At the same time, 774 Brazilians and 500 Argentines died at Tuyuti. Viscount Port Alegre went about day and night among the sick and dying, and still held his ground at Curuzú, with barely 2,000 men, under the constant fire of the enemy: the fleet also kept up its fire, although decimated by cholera, scurvy and ague.

General Polydoro retiring from ill-health was succeeded by Marshal Argollo, and a few days later Marquis Caxias went in a steamer to the Paraná as far as Itati, where he conferred with Gen. Osorio, who had also come down from Misiones in a gunboat.

The next occurrence was the arrival of Baron de Bourquenot, who has just arrived from France to succeed M. Cochelet as Consul at Asunción, and who requested an escort to the enemy's lines. The Marquis Caxias refused, on account of the recent occurrence of the enemy firing on some men who went to meet a supposed flag of truce; but General Gelly-Obes acceded to his request and sent word to Lopez, but Lopez refused to receive him.

Some two months ago General Urquiza, as rumor goes, refused 6,000 horses which he had engaged to sell the Brazilians, but last week he sent his likeness to Marquis Caxias and an offer of 20,000 horses. The Marquis accepted the likeness, but declined the horses.

On May 22nd, an enemy's force appeared on the right and skirmished with the Argentines for two hours: we had 4 men hurt. It is rumored General Mitre and Flores will soon return. During their absence Caxias has ably organized the army, and provided horses, war-material and all necessaries for crossing rivers, lagoons, fosses, abatis, and storming fortified lines. He has also run telegraph-wires all though, the encampment, besides an intended submarine cable to communicate with the fleet, and a portable submarine wire similar to that used by the French in Italy.

The fleet is ready and the Admiral only waiting the word to advance, while a constant cannonade is kept up day and night against Curupaity. It is said the forces at Curuzú are to be withdrawn to Paso la Patria, and that Osorio will be made a Lient. General to succeed Polidoro.

To-day being the anniversary of Tuyuti we had a salute of 21 guns, and balls and serenading at night, while the enemy kept up a brisk fire on the Brazilian left.

May 25th. To-day the Argentines had flags flying and grand salutes for the anniversary of 1810. The Paraguayans did not molest them. May 26th. Viscount Port Alegre arrived to-day to confer with Caxias and invite him to sing a Te Deum for the conclusion of the cholera.

May 27th. Caxias and Port Alegre left for Curuzú, the Rivers Paraguay and Paraná rising extraordinarily. May 28th. The Marquis has returned and gone to Paso la Patria: the flood was so great that all the war-material at Itipurú had to be put on board shipping. The garrison at Curuzú received orders to embark, as that place is nearly all under water. May 29th. Only 2,000 men left in Curuzú, the rest embarking, while the iron-clads made a pretended attack on Curupaity, from noon till 6 p.m.

THE ARGENTINE REPUBLIC AND ITS CAPABILITIES. THE CENTRAL ARGENTINE RAILWAY. (From the Money Market Review). There is a class of persons who would not of aforesaid action to the slightest wrong, either in action or opinion, but to whom the very names of the South American Republics are wearisome and who honestly consider that nothing good can come out of them.

This is a prejudice originating in narrations of Spanish oppressions, confirmed by accounts of native degeneration; yet it must have occurred to those who entertain it, that they may possibly have done an injustice to the country. As far as the Argentine Republic is concerned, there can be no doubt of the unsoundness of the prejudice; and we would invite the attention of all who may be in search of reliable information as to both, to the able reports just issued by the Foreign-office from Mr. Ford, the Secretary of the British Legation at Buenos Ayres, on the financial and commercial condition of this State.

The greatest misfortune it is suffering from is the war with the neighbouring Republic of Paraguay: but the latest advices afford grounds for the belief that the end of the conflict is at hand. It is a conflict into the causes of which we shall not inquire. It is sufficient to observe that it has not in the slightest degree impaired the natural resources of the country, and that it seems to have inspired the people with confidence in their strength and in their destiny.

The territory of the Republic is vast. Mr. Ford tells us that though only one-half of it is settled, the settled half exceeds in size the whole of Great Britain and Ireland, France, and Spain put together. Mr. Ford does not give, and we do not find elsewhere, any estimate of the total area of the Republic, but we can estimate for ourselves the area of the settled half by ascertaining the number of square miles, to which we shall add the population of the countries with which Mr. Ford has compared it:—

It will be seen from this glance at the Argentine Republic that an extension of our commercial relations with it is not only desirable but perfectly practicable. Almost every day we hear of a like expression from the Republic of a desire to extend their commercial relations with us.

Our object is to assist in dissipating injurious preconceptions by showing that, however opinions may be warped by historical reminiscences, or theories of ethnological degeneracy, which to a great extent are assumed, this Republic has claims upon our regard that cannot but be admitted when fairly suggested.
