The Escorial, Valladolid, Burgos, Miraflores.

We returned to Madrid on Saturday and assisted next day at the funeral of Marshal O'Donnell...

The interior is grand and solemn, especially the Capilla del Condestable: in the sacristy is shown an old chest that once belonged to the Cid. On leaving the church we again pause before the Gothic portal to take a full view of the exterior...

Returned to the hotel we order a carriage for Miraflores, and meanwhile proceed to the town-hall to see the bones of the Cid and his wife, Ximena: they are contained in a walnut urn under a glass cover.

The convent of Miraflores is a chef d'oeuvre of Gothic art and Philip II. on seeing it said "We have done nothing at the Escorial." It was built by Isabella Católica for the burial-place of her parents, whose tombs of alabaster, beautifully carved, occupy the centre aisle.
