LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

Montevideo, March 24, Five P.M. The Uruguay arrived here this morning, bringing dates to Feb. 15th. Her news is not very important.

Consols 93 to 94 for both money and account. Fair demand for money, and rate firmer at about one and a half per cent.

Serious Fenian riots had occurred in Cork. The police were violently pelted, and obliged to use revolvers in self defence.

REVIEW FOR EUROPE.

The last fortnight has been chiefly remarkable for the utter dearth of political and general news. Since the passing of Humaita, and the unsuccessful canoe attack by the Paraguayans on a Brazilian ironclad, military events at the seat of war have been at a complete standstill.

The six Brazilian vessels now above the fortress of Humaita are without coal, and a merchant steamer is at present being fitted out in Buenos Ayres to run the gauntlet past the Paraguayan batteries, with the object of supplying coal to the ironclads now lying useless at Tayi.

Speculations as to the duration of the war in Paraguay is now more hopeful than ever, and there at least seems much less reason to look for a speedy termination than at the date of our last review. Nothing approximating to an authentic statement of the real strength of Lopez, or of the plans of the Allies, has reached this city.

The inactivity in military operations reacts on politics; and on the chances of those candidates for election to the Presidency of the Republic, whose hopes may depend on the maintenance of the present policy of this country in relation to Brazil.

Dr. Elizalde, the Government candidate, is, however, still pressing his cause in the Provinces, and with the active aid of Brazilian influence. General Urquiza, on the other hand, now openly allows pamphlets to be printed and distributed, advocating his own candidature for the Presidency.

Dr. Costa, the special National Commissioner in Santa Fé, for the arrangement of the political troubles in that Province, has been completely unsuccessful in his mission, and is about to retire, leaving the factions in Santa Fé to fight out the question in their own way.

The preliminary Presidential elections are fixed for the 12th of next month (Easter Sunday), when each Province elects a certain number of electors, who are to meet on the 12th of July—and proceed then to elect directly the President and Vice-President of the Republic.

As the former of these dates is now close at hand—the intrigues of the various parties to secure the return of their own partisans keep the whole of the interior in a state of deplorable ferment and agitation.

General Taboada, who, besides the local influence in his native Province of Santiago is, by his position as National Commissioner invested with the military command of all the Northern Provinces, by the unscrupulous exercise of the powerful official means at his disposal is likely to have undisputed control of the votes of four or five Provinces, in order to perpetuate his military rule over them.

While he at some places studiously allows reports to be spread that the Argentine territory is about to be invaded by the defeated leaders of the Federal party who have sought shelter in Bolivia and Chile; at others, he seeks by the anticipation of imaginary revolutions plausible pretences for his electioneering intrigues.

In addition to the evils entailed by this state of things, the spread of cholera to the far Interior comes to fill the cup of misfortunes of those unhappy countries. The Province of San Juan is at present under the terrible lash of this scourge, and latest accounts from the town of the same name and capital of the Province,

show a frightful mortality. The bordering Province of Mendoza had virtually cut off all communication by establishing a 40 days' quarantine on all vehicles from San Juan. The Chilean Government has also established a vigorous military cordon in all the passes of the Cordillera, but, notwithstanding this dire epidemic seems to continue its westward progress.

As far as appearances denote, the new Conservator Government of Gen. Batlle in Montevideo is consolidated. But the inevitable greediness of a new party, and one newly arrived in power, is already producing its evil results.

Among the local events of the last fortnight was the annual meeting of the British Hospital, in B. Ayres. The late cholera visitation, and the extreme liberality of the regulations have again exhausted the funds of the Institution, notwithstanding the continual efforts and generosity of the British residents.

Mr. Crabtree, the newly appointed Manager of the Northern Railway, seconded by the engineer and other officials of the Company, are trying all that human skill can do to remedy the neglect of the line by the Company in England.

Commercial affairs are pretty much the same as at the date of our last review. Large operations continue to be made in wool and hides, and at fair prices.

The new well-boring machines, which have been so successful in Abyssinia, and are so adapted to the wants of this country, subject as it is to periodical droughts, are likely to be quickly introduced.

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whose political opinions, if they have any at all, I am utterly ignorant of." The correspondent, from whom we quote, after moralising on the absurdity of the police regulations above referred to, says:—"Every honest man is interested in the punishment and discovery of criminals, but it is the fault of the Blancos, that late crimes have been flung upon them? Do justice for the sake of peace! Bring the force of the law home to everyone, however elevated his position, however delicate the circumstances. Try and condemn the assassins of February, whatever be their political color, if they have any; fulfill in fact the promises made by Gen. Batlle to the people in his manifesto of March 1st, and never mind the private conversations of the Blancos. I have been accused of sowing discord in the dominant party; but it is not my poor letters, but the acts of the party in power which sow the discord.

On all sides of the camp the same insecurity exists, and a circular sent by General Caraballo to all the Gefeles Politicos ordering the repression of any acts of vengeance, seems to have produced very little effect.

A telegram from Montevideo announces the approaching departure of our much esteemed Prussian Minister to the River Plate Count Von Galich. The severe family affliction with which he and his amiable lady were visited by the simultaneous death of cholera of his two boys, must, we suppose, be the cause of his departure, and while we shall sincerely regret the absence from the River Plate of this popular diplomatist, we must hope that he and his lady may in change of scenery find alleviation for their great sorrow.

THE JUDGE who presided at the 'mesa electoral' in the parish Cathedral at Sul, Don Julian Veloz, died suddenly on Sunday of an apoplectic stroke whilst in the discharge of his magisterial duties at the elections. PARAGUAYAN VERSION OF THE SUB-PRIZE OF 3rd NOV. 1867. The repeated successful events of this long campaign, however glorious in themselves, were antirly surpassed by the brilliant victory of 3rd Nov., which, whilst delivering a fatal blow to the audacious invader, has surrounded our arms with an imperishable halo of glory, and illumined the undying fame of our devoted chief.

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As regards our second proposition, the mere fact that so large an extent of territory remains in a state of uncultivation, the consequence of its being so thinly populated, would of itself prove what amount of good emigration to this Republic will effect; and this fact is even more apparent when we remember that the Spanish race is altogether destitute of the steady go-aheadism, energy, and determination necessary for progress under any conditions, and much more necessary when the inevitable hardships, trials, and obstacles of a settler's career have to be battled against and overcome.

Now to our third consideration. To one class of emigrants unusual advantages are offered: this class is the surplus of the laboring population of other countries—real hard working men, to whom are offered every chance of bettering their worldly condition, and of ultimate success, either in any of our large towns, or in any of the flourishing provinces of the interior.

Let us glance over some fruits attainable by their labors: in metals and minerals—gold and silver are found in every province but Buenos Ayres, Santa Fé, and Entre Rios, while the following are generally distributed throughout the Republic, iron, lead, tin, zinc, nickel, mercury, antimony, bitumen, lime, coal, salt, petroleum, marble, various precious stones, &c.; in produce—wheat, barley, oats, maize, and all other cereals, pears, apples, figs, grapes, peaches, lemons, oranges, pine apples, sugar, coffee, tobacco, cotton, potatoes, mustard, and an endless list of productions of lesser importance, while among manufactures we notice grease, soap, olive and other oils, sugar, coffee, cocoa, tobacco, mustard, cotton, cotton goods, silks, cutlery, horse-gear, bricks, cigars, wines, flour, cheese, various preserves, &c. &c.

Let us not deny that a country possessed of such capabilities is favourable to emigration, for such emigrants as are able and also willing to work? Let only such come out, and they will, by increasing and cultivating, and improving these natural and unequalled agricultural resources, improve the country, augment its prosperity, and what for themselves is more important, their own prosperity also.

Do we not mean to argue educated men cannot work, far from it; but what we do mean to say is this: that the men who do come out here, whether gentlemen or laborers, will have either to work long and hard, or else starve; the former will very soon find their English prejudices in the way, and, if wise, will soon cast them overboard, and, with the other class, put their shoulder manfully, steadily, soberly and practically to the wheel in real good earnest; but let all who come out clearly and fully understand that the days for making fortunes in this country in a few years have passed, never to return, and that now they must all be prepared to work on, hope on, and push on for fifteen or twenty years at least, and even then such as, of either class, as are able to return to the land of their birth may esteem themselves lucky. Work there is for all who can work, and also pay, but the work is hard, and must be long persevered in. We make these remarks so that emigrants of the former class may not experience the deadliest and most depressing check an emigrant can meet with, which is to find, on first setting his foot on the shore of his adopted land, that his impressions are false, his hopes unfounded, and all his schemes blown to the four winds of Heaven solely through his having formed his impressions from books, whose authors have generally not written from experience, but from what they hear, and, as they see around them men who have made large fortunes, most falsely concluding the same can be done now, thus raising a beacon which guides the voyage out to the shoals and troubles of disappointment, too often wrecking the hopes of a man's future in life through such a false and disheartening start at the commencement.
